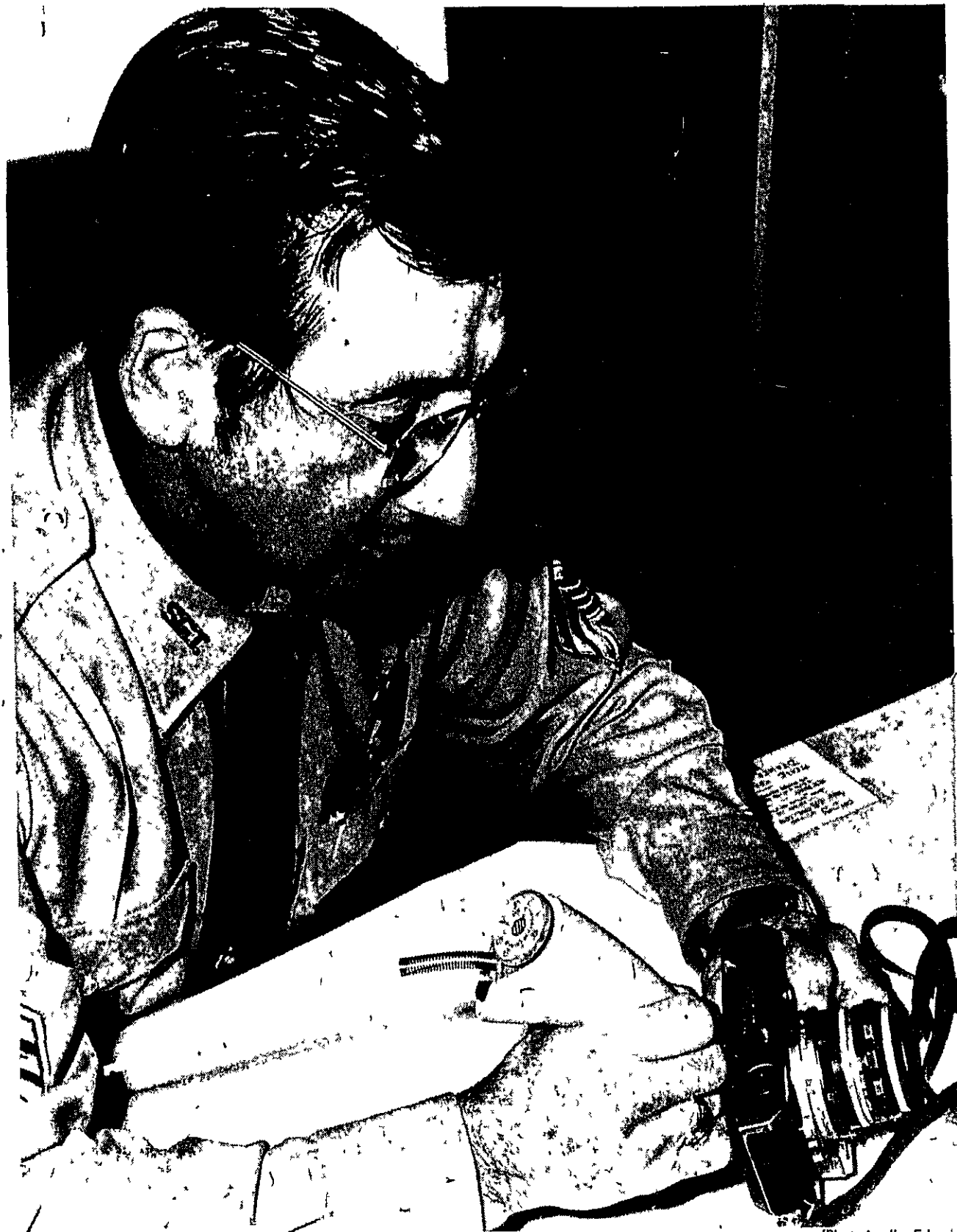

Ballenger announces decision not to run for re-election

State Senator William S. Ballenger (R-Lansing) has announced today that he will not seek re-election.

The 32-year-old lawmaker, now in his sixth year in the Legislature, was elected to the State House of Representatives in 1968 and subsequently elected to the State Senate in 1970.

He becomes the first legislator this year to announce that he will not seek re-election.

Said Ballenger: "I have appreciated my experience in the Legislature over the past half-dozen years and have tried my utmost to fully open lines of communication with my quarter-million constituents through weekly news columns and radio programs, periodic questionnaires and newsletters, and even by opening three district offices at my own expense. In addition, my Capitol office has handled well over a thousand pieces of casework on constituent questions and problems.

"But I have long believed that men and women can outlive their effectiveness in the Michigan Legislature. After six years' service to my constituents as a member of the House and Senate, I believe I can better utilize my legislative experience by moving on to other pursuits, other goals, and leaving the way clear for fresh, new candidates

eager to serve the public in a state legislature.

"There will always be challenges for those in the Legislature. Most of the goals I set for myself when I first ran for the Legislature in 1968 have either been met or are in the process of being met. I'm referring specifically to legislation overhauling our method of funding K-12 public education; providing equal rights for women; improving the status of consumers; and strengthening our commitment to preserving our environment. I remain hopeful that

the Legislature will act forcefully this spring to enact bills implementing the recommendations of my Special Senate Committee on Political Ethics on campaign finance reform; open meetings; conflict of interest; and lobbyist control.

"I believe that despite flagging public confidence in the ability of public institutions and officials to function honestly and efficiently, I am not discouraged by having held public office. I remain eager to consider the possibility of further public service."

Eagles' Robert Montgomery takes it easy after years of local and state service

EAGLE - Mrs Robert Montgomery tells a story about the respect folks had for her husband, who for 14 years was director of the State Elections Bureau. It goes like this:

She was head of a Lansing precinct one year and had a coworker who was quite anxious that everything went strictly according to the rules. Showing Mrs Montgomery a book of regulations, the woman explained that things would go smoothly if they followed its requirements.

"I know," Mrs Montgomery replied, "my husband wrote the book."

Confident that all was under control, her coworker went off into a corner and promptly fell asleep.

The Montgomerys, retired now in Eagle, celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary just last week. And many memories remain.

Montgomery served 4 terms in the state House of Representatives before his 1953 appointment as head of the elections unit. A strong supporter of election reform, he had sponsored the bill which created the unit.

"Those were hectic years. Montgomery traveled to the local units to oversee elections and explain procedures, and often found himself in the middle of election controversies.

"Recounts were really a problem," Mrs Montgomery recalled. "Recount was a naughty word in our family."

She added that local election commissioners, who had held their posts for a long time, sometimes thought they knew

more about the procedures than her husband did.

"Maybe they did," Montgomery injected with a smile.

Montgomery, who was also a Justice of the Peace in Lansing Twp for 19 years, retired from the elections bureau in 1967. He served as Clinton County Supervisor for

Watertown and Eagle Twps, but suffered a stroke in 1970 which has made speaking difficult.

The Montgomerys have lived for 16 years now in a comfortable green stucco home overlooking the Looking Glass River. They have feeding stations for their bird, squirrel and racoon friends.

Bath Twp officials find tires slashed after meeting

BATH TWO - Although topics like an upcoming recall election, a controversial sewer system and township police protection made Monday's Bath Twp meeting a lively one, there was apparently even more action outside in the parking lot.

At least, that's what supervisor Roy VanSickle and Police Chief Myron (Mark) Steffes figured when they found that 5 tires, 2 on VanSickle's car and 3 on Steffes's van-- had been slashed during the meeting.

VanSickle, who faces possible recall in an April 22 election, responded later: "It's too bad people have to resort to violence when they disagree about things."

He said a reward may be offered for information leading to the incident.

Schedule combined election
The board voted to combine 2 elections, on the recall of VanSickle and the incorporation of the charter township, into a single special election April 22 to minimize expense. Drives for the 2 issues were mobilized by the Bath Twp Citizens Committee.

According to attorney Pat Berrardo, the

most recent special election cost the township about \$17,000.

Discuss law enforcement
An informal talk was given by Clinton County Sheriff Anthony Hufnagel on costs and problems of police protection. His report was in response to an inquiry at the last meeting by Trustee John Snyder, who said he wondered whether county protection would be cheaper than current services by the township's own police force.

Hufnagel said he was surprised at the inquiry, and commented "No matter what type of law enforcement you have, it's going to cost money."

He said protection by his department and (3 men 24 hours a day) would cost \$61,877 per year. The cost would rise after July, he said, when a 10 cents a hour wage increase goes into effect.

Noting that the township is "a hot area" for crime because of its rapid growth and proximity to metropolitan Lansing, Hufnagel said township protection was a good idea.

Says Twp doing good job
"And as far as I know," he added, "the township has been doing a really good job of law enforcement."

The township budget indicates that in 1972, \$46,186 went for police protection, including 2 new police cars. Last year's audit is not complete, but \$22,122 was spent on law enforcement during the first 6 months of 1973.

Chief Steffes said the township currently has 23 hours of police protection each day for 21 days of the month and about 18 hours per day the rest of the month.

The board appointed VanSickle and treasurer Thomas Woodruff as members of a committee to coordinate regional planning for use of the South Clinton Wastewater Treatment Plant. Also represented on the committee will be DeWitt Twp, City of DeWitt, Watertown Charter Twp, Clinton County Board of Commissioners and the County Dept of Public Works.

Township sextant Marvin Morrison was authorized to buy an \$1,180 tractor and mower for upkeep of the cemetery. The board voted to raise the cost of grave openings from \$55 to \$65 and the price of graves from \$10 to \$25.

The board also appointed Carl Otto, 16441 Center Rd, East Lansing to fill the Planning Commission seat vacated last month by Clinton B. Fitch.

Education Dept publishes recognition of O-E program

The Ovid-Elsie Area Schools have been listed by the State Department of Education in a publication titled "Promising Educational Practices 1973."

The program meriting attention is the "Remedial Reading and Math Improvement", which is in practice at all elementary schools and will soon be extended to the junior highs.

In the words of Dr John Porter, state superintendent of schools, "This publication is the first of a projected series which will give exposure to a wide array of ideas which we hope will stimulate the development of many alternative educational delivery systems and strategies involving students, teachers, administrators, and parents."

"We also hope this publication will provide teachers and administrators with some recognition for their successful practices. We believe there is a need for all educators to share good ideas and to communicate effective teaching strategies if we are to continue to improve our services to children and youth."

Superintendent Don Kenney of Ovid-Elsie said he is pleased that Ovid-Elsie has been thus recognized and compliments Hugel Leonard for his work in getting the program started.

He further stated that the program has been successful because of the help and cooperation of all of the Ovid-Elsie elementary staff.

Twp Police investigate death

DEWITT TWP - DeWitt Twp police are investigating the death of a 34-year-old, whose body was found Monday in a room at the Hi-Way Motel, 3609 N. East St.

A police official said Karen Joy Willaman, who had been at the motel a week, was found dead on the floor of a small soot-filled room.

He said a fire which apparently started in the shower stall caused much smoke, but did not spread to the rest of the room.

An autopsy was conducted Tuesday at Clinton Memorial Hospital, but cause of death was not known at press time.

Legend returns to visit Stagecoach inn

Living with a legend is not always easy.

Just ask John and Betty Jane Minsky. Ever since they moved their family into the old stagecoach inn four miles north

of St. Johns, they've been surrounded by tales of one of the inn's legendary former owners, a mysterious Mary "Mayme" Walsworth.

Their curiosity mounted as they heard how Mayme nursed squirrels and woodchucks in her kitchen, how she gathered

stones from neighboring farms to build outdoor fireplaces, and how she herded calves in the front yard to keep the lawn trim.

Legend visits
So it was quite a treat for the Minskys—and others who had known or heard about Mayme—when the legend herself stopped in for a recent visit.

Mayme, still spry at 90, did not disappoint them. She verified many of the colorful tales and even added some new ones.

There was one about how Mayme, an ardent animal lover, once nursed 17 baby lambs in her kitchen, and lost only 5 of them. She said she wouldn't lose any of them if she had it to do over, though. A veterinarian friend later told her that giving lambs just a bit of whisky in their first milk was a sure-fire way to start them out healthy.

Mayme lives in Colton, California now, and many tales stem from her trip out there in 1944.

IN THOSE days of gas rationing, Mayme had trouble getting rationing stamps for the truck she was driving. She economized by coasting down hills (including a 13 mile stretch into Salt Lake City) but ran out of gas near Laramie.

When she couldn't coax stamps from anyone, the spirited Mayme threatened to try the black market. The folks at her Laramie motel talked her out of that, however, and finally the authorities in Los Angeles sent her the stamps.

As it turned out, Mayme reached California with 2 stamps to spare. She conscientiously sent them back to Laramie.

There was a postscript to this episode that further demonstrated Mayme's uncanny good luck. The day after her arrival in California, she sold her truck. Its new owner soon informed her that after only a half-mile drive, the truck's entire steering system went out.

Mayme's husband, Harold, died soon after they moved to California. But Mayme decided to go ahead and remodel their small cottage as they had planned (and fell off a ladder while trying to reshingle the roof).

Secret garden
Mayme did much work on her St. Johns home, too. In the south yard she built a 5 acre "secret garden" surrounded by partial walls of an old stable and thick shrubbery.

She built 3 huge fireplaces on the lawn, lugging stones with a borrowed stone barge from the

fields of area farmers. Later, she threw a lawn party for all the neighbors who had "contributed" to her projects.

For years, the Minskys had been particularly mystified by the fireplace in their north yard, which has the word IRENEREIDARBENOTTO—RITZ carved into the center stone. Mayme explained that her violinist friend, Irene, along with friends Reidar, Ben, Otto and their German Shepherd Ritz, used to come out from Lansing every Sunday to entertain her.

TO MAKE sure her musical friends would be immortalized somehow, Mayme carved their names into the stone.

As for Mayme herself, it seems unlikely that folks around here will forget her. Many friendships and correspondences have already been renewed as a result of her recent visit.

One family who enjoyed her visit was the Burt Whitlocks of 609 N. Clinton, who had not seen her for 29 years. Mrs. Whitlock seemed to sum things up when she said simply:

"Mayme is one person who will never grow old."

DO YOU HAVE A 1974 DOG LICENSE?

Under State Law No. 287.262 Sect. 2, it shall be unlawful for any person to own a dog six months old or older unless the dog is licensed and wearing a substantial collar bearing current license and rabies tags attached.

Dogs are not allowed to run off owner's premises unless on a leash or when dog is engaged in lawful hunting accompanied by its owner or custodian.

A female dog may not go beyond premises of its owner when she is in heat unless she is held properly on a leash.

Any person who owns, harbors, or permits a dog six months old or older to live on their property should purchase a license for such animal before March 1, 1974 or become delinquent.

A certificate showing that the dog has a valid shot for rabies must accompany the request for a license. License may be purchased from the township, city or county treasurer thru Feb. 28, 1974 at \$4.00 each. March 1, 1974 licenses will be \$8.00 and must be purchased from the County Treasurer's office in the Courthouse only, either by person or by mail.

Congressional candidate lashes out at mailing by Ballenger

"Some of our local politicians haven't learned the lesson of Watergate," Dr. Charles P. Larowe, Michigan State University professor and Democratic candidate for Congress, said Tuesday in a prepared release to the media.

Dr. Larowe spoke at a press conference at the State Capitol, where he announced he is filing a class action suit to require State Senator William S. Ballenger (Republican-Delta Township) to repay the state for a 200,000 piece mailing Ballenger ordered printed at taxpayers' expense.

One-third were addressed to residents of the Sixth Congressional District where Ballenger is an unannounced candidate, but none, Dr. Larowe noted, were addressed to residents of the senator's own 30th State Senatorial District. "According to my calculations," Dr. Larowe said, "the mailing cost the taxpayers of Michigan in excess of \$10,000."

"When I received Senator Ballenger's mailing last Saturday," said Prof. Larowe, who teaches labor law and economics at MSU, "I was reminded of a Muskegon judge's ruling last year ordering a State Representative to repay the State for a taxpayer-paid mailing the State Rep sent out when he was running for reelection." Dr. Larowe said he was referring to the case of Misjewski v. Geerlings, decided by Judge James F. Schoener in the Circuit Court of Muskegon County on April 25, 1973.

"Geerlings was running for election in the newly reapportioned 97th District," Dr. Larowe pointed out, "and he sent residents of the new 97th District who were not constituents of the district from which he was elected two taxpayer-paid mailings that were held to be illegal. One was entitled 'What's Right With America'; the other 'Report From Lansing'. Each carried a prominently displayed picture of Representative Geerlings. Judge Schoener, basing his ruling on a Federal Court of Appeals decision (Hoellen v. Annunzio), ruled that Geerlings' taxpayer-paid mailings into a district where he

was a candidate gave Geerlings an unfair advantage over his opponents in the election and therefore were improper and illegal expenditures of State funds."

"My suit (Wilfred Dupuis, Lansing attorney, is representing Dr. Larowe in the court action) charges that what Ballenger did when he sent out the saturation mailing at State expense," Prof. Larowe explained, "is exactly what the Court ruled illegal in Geerlings' case."

Ballenger's mailing dealt, said Larowe, with a question about as obvious as asking citizens if they want their taxes reduced. It asked their opinion of Daylight Saving Time and, as in Representative Geerlings' case, Senator Ballenger's picture was prominently displayed just above the questionnaire residents were asked to answer.

"Significantly," Dr. Larowe added, "the Senator did not send his questionnaire to any residents of his own senatorial district, which lies largely outside the Sixth Congressional District. Instead, he aimed his mailing at the very heart of the Sixth District—the greater Lansing area—where he has acknowledged he is likely to run for Congress."

"Furthermore, in view of the fact that state senators are allowed to print a maximum of approximately 200,000 pieces per year at State expense, Ballenger has used his entire State printing privilege on residents outside his own district, thus irresponsibly precluding for the rest of the year any direct mail contact with the voters who elected him. "Ballenger's flimsy explanation of this 'coincidence' between the target of his taxpayer-paid mass mailing and the areas where most of the Sixth Congressional District voters live," the MSU professor said, "is as transparent as his pretense that he hasn't made up his mind yet if he's running for Congress."

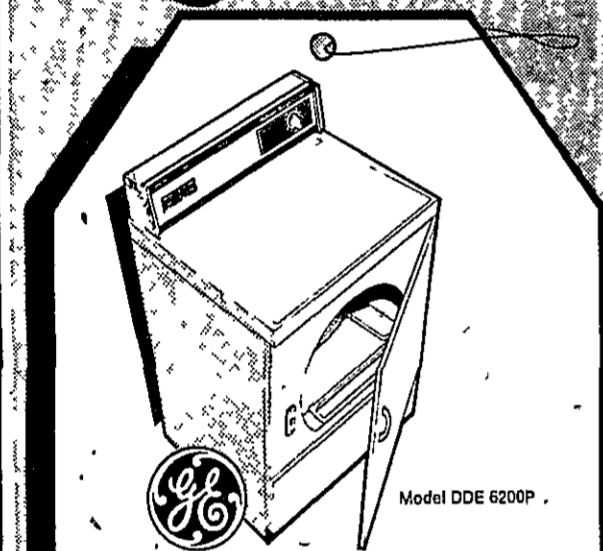
"We're talking here about a professional politician who's announced that he's giving up his seat in the State Senate, a man who a month ago met with Republican fat cats to arrange for them to bankroll his cam-

paign for Congress, a carpetbagger who's talking about moving into the Sixth Congressional District because, according to news reports, 'political tactics and etiquette' make it advisable that you live in the Congressional District

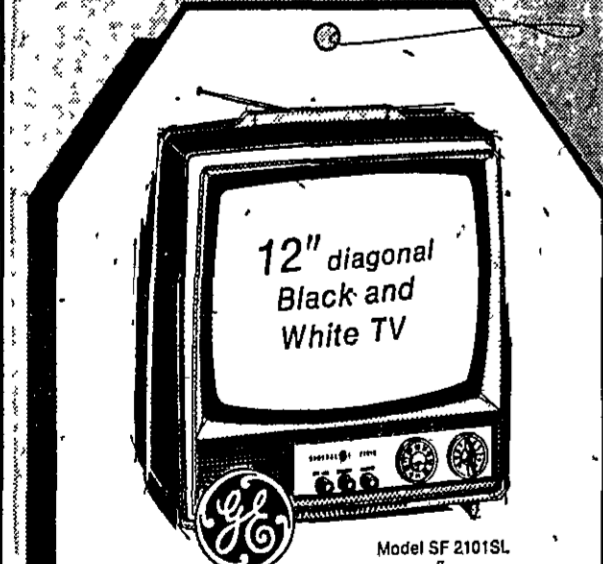

VFW keeps members informed

Keeping its membership informed of the latest developments in veterans legislation is a function of the Veterans of Foreign Wars' Legislative Newsletter.

Officials of the St Johns VFW Post explained the purpose of the newsletter during VFW Week.

Its importance to the 1.8 million members is being stressed during VFW Week, Feb 17-23, which is planned as part of the year-long observance of the VFW's 75th anniversary.

Prepared monthly by the VFW National Legislative Service in Washington, the Newsletter is directed to VFW leaders on all levels.

Its emphasis is on legislation which the VFW National Convention has adopted as a mandate for the current year and then further refined by the National Legislative Committee into Priority Goals.

Although its stress is understandably on legislation that affects veterans rights and benefits, other matters of interest to VFW members and the organization as a whole are not neglected.

The Newsletter's content also covers Veterans Administration decisions, personnel policies and other matters that are within the agency's jurisdiction.

The Newsletter often follows piece of legislation advocated by the VFW from its introduction in Congress as a bill, its status, committee assignment, hearings scheduled on it, results of the hearings, when it is reported out of committees and its ultimate fate.

Congressmen directly concerned with the bill are identified and its number included in the Newsletter's discussion of it to enable VFW members to write their Congressmen knowledgeable about it and to urge a course of action in line with the organization's position.

Congressmen deserving of praise for their efforts on behalf of veterans legislation are identified and those who have obstructed it are singled out for criticism.

The Legislative Newsletter acts also as a watchdog over VA operations, never hesitating to point the finger of blame for what the VFW feels are shortcomings or inadequacies in the VA.

Principal writer of the Newsletter is Francis M.

Stover, Director of the National Legislative Service who keeps in close touch with key Congressmen involved in veterans legislation and monitors the status of each veterans bill.

In addition to the Legislative Newsletter, the National Legislative Service supplies a monthly column, The Capitol Digest, for the VFW Magazine. Also written by Stover, it contains much of the same information in the Newsletter but capsulized and in less detail. Overall responsibility for the Legislative Newsletter rests in the VFW Publications Department at National Headquarters in Kansas City, Mo.

you're running in. The only thing he hasn't done yet is to make a formal announcement that he's running.

"But for what it's worth," Dr Larrowe said, "Ballenger's explanation for concentrating his mailing in the Lansing-East Lansing area is because as he says in the questionnaire he sent out: 'a majority of every county except Ingham and Jackson argue that Michigan in effect is already on DST all year-round.' That's not much of an excuse, when you consider that the State Legislature was moving overwhelmingly to abandon DST before he sent out his tax-paid mailing.

"When I was persuaded to run for Congress," Professor Larrowe concluded, "I said I was doing so because politics is too important to leave in the hands of professional politicians. Ballenger's misuse of his mailing privilege certainly confirms that view.

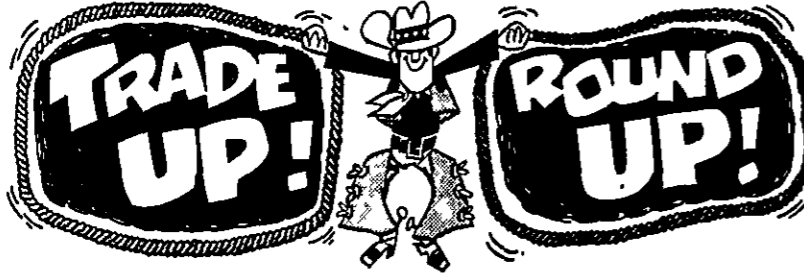
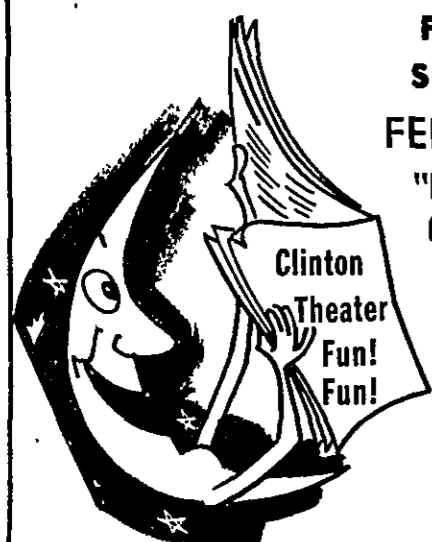

Clinton County man tours the pro links as caddy

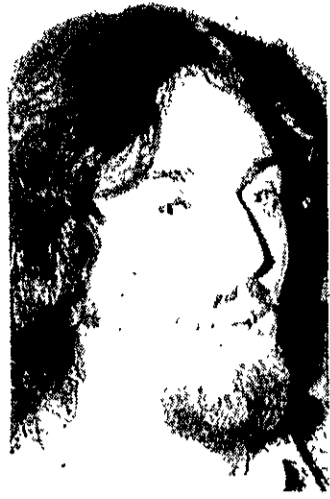
If there was an award for the Clinton County resident with the most unusual job, Richard Welsh would have to take the prize.

His work has taken him as far north as Ontario, as far south as Florida and as far west as Texas. He's met celebrities like Eugene Cernan, Jack Nicklaus and Mickey Rooney -- and he sometimes makes up to \$300 per week.

If you think Welsh sounds like good material for a "What's My Line" show, you're probably right.

The easygoing 19-year-old is a caddy on the pro golf circuit, a job he says involves a lot of hard work as well as the obvious fringe benefits.

"You don't just carry the clubs around," he said, adding that caddies work about 15 hours a day.

"A lot of those guys are nervous wrecks... they act like glamour boys, but they're just going into debt."

The job also involves aggressive "hustling" of golfers, many of whom bring their own caddies with them to the tournaments. And a good caddy is up at the crack of dawn to pace the course for yardage measurements.

Welsh, who only caddies part of the year, was recently laid off from his other job as an Olsmobile assembly line worker in Lansing. He is currently caddying at the Jackie Gleason Inverrary Classic at Ft. Lauderdale, Fla.

The day before his departure for Florida, Welsh was obviously getting enthusiastic about traveling to green grass and sunny skies. He sauntered around his parents' rural DeWitt home clad in casual pants, a loose print shirt and -- would you believe it? -- leather sandals.

What's so appealing about caddying for the circuit?

"Traveling," Welsh answered with a smile, "and the people you meet."

He said caddying has some physical hardships. A person's shoulder gets sore after carrying around a 40 pound golf bag and rounds last 4 or 5 hours each.

Sometimes it's also hard being on the road so much, and finding a place to stay may be a problem.

"I remember this one motel in Tallahassee," Welsh said disgustedly, "where I found a 3 inch cockroach in the shower."

He hasn't exactly become rich from caddying, either.

"Last year when I came home from a tournament in Dallas," he laughed, "I only had \$1.50. I do lend a lot of people money..."

Welsh, who recently became engaged, would like to take a crack at pro golf himself eventually. But he says he doesn't think tournament play is for him.

"A lot of those guys are nervous wrecks," he said of the golfers. "They act like glamour boys, but they're just going into debt."

Welsh was graduated as senior class president from St. Johns High School in 1972. But after a term at Lansing Community College he found he'd had enough. He quit school and took off for a Florida tournament.

"When I left here it was 17 degrees below zero," he said. "And when I got to Miami it was 80 degrees." Another smile.

Welsh said the average pay for caddies is \$20 per day plus

about 5 per cent of what the golfer wins at the tournament. So how much money a caddy pulls in depends partly on whether his boss gets lucky.

"And a lot of guys miss the first cut," Welsh explained.

He said caddying has some physical hardships. A person's shoulder gets sore after carrying around a 40 pound golf bag and rounds last 4 or 5 hours each.

Sometimes it's also hard being on the road so much, and finding a place to stay may be a problem.

It's tax time

Don't overlook exemptions

An exemption of \$750 for each dependent can help cut an individual's income tax burden, so it's important not to overlook any of the exemptions available.

A taxpayer's first exemption is himself, and if he is at least 65 years old by the last day of 1973 the \$750 exemption is doubled.

Young children, of course, are dependents and the dependency continues beyond age 19 if they earn less than \$750 a year, derive more than half their support from the parent-taxpayer, and do not file a joint

return of their own. If the child is a full-time student, the \$750 gross income test does not apply, regardless of age.

The rules applying to natural children apply also to stepchildren and those who have been adopted.

Any person who is a member of the taxpayer's household and meets the citizen or residence, income and support requirements and does not file a joint return of his own can be taken as a dependent. In the case of parents, children, and certain other close relatives, it is not necessary that they live with the taxpayer.

If one shares with others in the support of a parent or other dependent, with no one individual providing more than half the dependent's support, it

Stuck at the top

A few years ago there was some talk about opening a saloon in the building that formerly housed the Ballentine Dry Goods Co. I immediately protested, claiming such an action would be similar to hiring a harlot to dust the church.

The saloon was never built and I like to think my righteous indignation helped prevent the sacrilege. It is sad enough that there is no longer a Ballentine Dry Goods Co. But it would be pure tragedy if its hallowed walls should be scarred by boozy graffiti and Pabst Blue Ribbon signs.

Ballentine's stood on a prominent corner in downtown Port Huron for hundreds of years, or so it seemed, and never changed. All around it, the world turned to leather and knotty pine, with a chargeplate in every fist and check-out counter blocking every exit. But, until the 1950's, Ballentine's remained a hushed oasis where elderly women sat down to try on gloves, and you could hear the soft fingering of fabrics mixed with the slight slap of turning pages in huge pattern books.

AND A FEW times each day you could also hear the exasperated whispers of clerks telling each other the dumb elevator was stuck again.

I operated that rickety elevator in 1943, when I was 17. There were 3 floors plus a basement used only for storage. The elevator traveled through a cage and was therefore exposed to public view at all times, on all floors. I controlled it by pushing a lever to the left for down, to the right for up, and center for stop. I was a chronic daydreamer and sometimes stopped the elevator when it made no sense at all. Thus waiting people on the 2nd floor got long looks at the passengers' legs while 3rd floor waiters counted dandruff.

It was not easy to manipulate the lever so that the car stopped flush with the floor. I never told

passengers to "Watch your step, please." I always told them to either step up or jump down. Once I advised a departing woman to step up and she asked me for a boost. "Maybe you could cup your hands together and give me a foothold," she suggested.

But the ultimate calamity was when I overshot the 3rd floor and got the elevator stuck to the top of the cage. I did this 4 or 5 times a day, thus making me the world champion marooner of passengers.

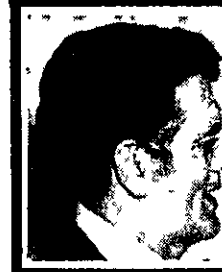
PASSENGERS often accused me of deserting the ship. You see, to get the elevator unstuck I had to squeeze through the elevator door, jump down to the 3rd floor, and then run down 3 flights of stairs to the basement where the elevator power plant was located.

This trip took me from 1 to 3 minutes, depending upon how crowded the stairs were with people afraid of the elevator. At each landing there would be several clerks wishing me Godspeed. My clear duty was to free the marooned passengers before their cries for help could be heard above the fingering of fabric.

Propped against the elevator motor were 2 saved-off broom handles, ever ready. I would push these handles against 2 watchamacallits, there would be several sparks, and the elevator would tremble loose and sag slowly downward.

This was a real experience for the suddenly unstuck passengers. For 3 floors I had remote control of their fate and they didn't know what the hell was going on. You should have seen their frightened expressions when they finally descended into the murky basement where I reboarded to once again take physical control of the ship.

IF I EVER saw a rescued passenger a 2nd time it was on the stairway.



Not much choice in 55 mph matter

I couldn't help but find something a little ironic in the labors of the legislature last week as we wrestled with the question of reducing speed limits on Michigan highways to 55 miles per hour. After all, we didn't have much choice in the matter.

Once the word was passed from Washington that all states would have to reduce speed limits or lose their eligibility for federal highway funds the real question was not "if" we should reduce speed limits but rather "when" and what penalties would be placed on the violators.

So the big battle boiled down to whether people who violated the new speed limits would be assessed points on their driving records for these violations. And, strange as it may seem, even this developed into a partisan issue in the House of Representatives. First, we had a Republican-sponsored bill pass the Senate. Then, a similar, but Democrat-backed bill surfaced in the House. Next we had a spat on the House floor between Democratic committee chairmen over jurisdiction of the legislation. After this was resolved, a deadlock developed in the committee which was considering the bill. Republicans felt that violations of the new limits and the imposition of fines for violations but opposed the assessment of those penalty points. I can't quite figure out why this should

even be a partisan issue, especially since Secretary of State Richard Austin, a Democrat, favored the Republican position.

At weeks end the split had still not been resolved, partly because one Democrat member of the committee was hospitalized and not available to vote on reporting the bill out of committee. The voting members of the committee were evenly divided so no action was taken.

Frankly, I see a little humor in the whole situation.

One of the things we have read consistently about the energy crisis is that we have no problem compared to that of the European countries. We have been told that the shortage in France, Italy and other countries of central Europe is much more critical than that which faces us. Yet there is no indication that those countries are limiting speeds to the extent we are in the interest of conserving fuel.

Italy, France—90 mph

I recently learned that many European countries have set their expressway speed limits at a nice even 100 kilometers per hour or our equivalent of 62 miles per hour. Italy and France, however, where the fuel shortage is supposed to be most acute, have left their limits at 90 miles per hour.

I suppose many of us who spent some time in those countries during military service, and who recognize that Italian and French drivers use only two parts of their automobiles—the accelerator and the horn—will accept a mere 90 mile per hour limit as a sacrifice on the part of the drivers in those countries.

One more point should be made about imposing a 55 mile per hour speed limit on our roads. The diesel engine which powers the great majority of our highway trucks and buses operates most efficiently at speeds between 60 and 70 miles per hour. It was designed this way to fit in with former speed limits. It lubricates itself best and consumes the minimum amount of fuel when operated at those speeds. Unfortunately, the same can't be said about the gasoline engine used in automobiles.

Ideally, we should have a different speed limit for each class of vehicle so that each could operate at optimum performance but, considering problems of traffic flow and safety, this is not practical.

So by March we will have a uniform 55 mile per hour speed limit in Michigan. We will continue to receive our federal highway funds and, as a side benefit, we'll probably have safer highways with fewer accidents.

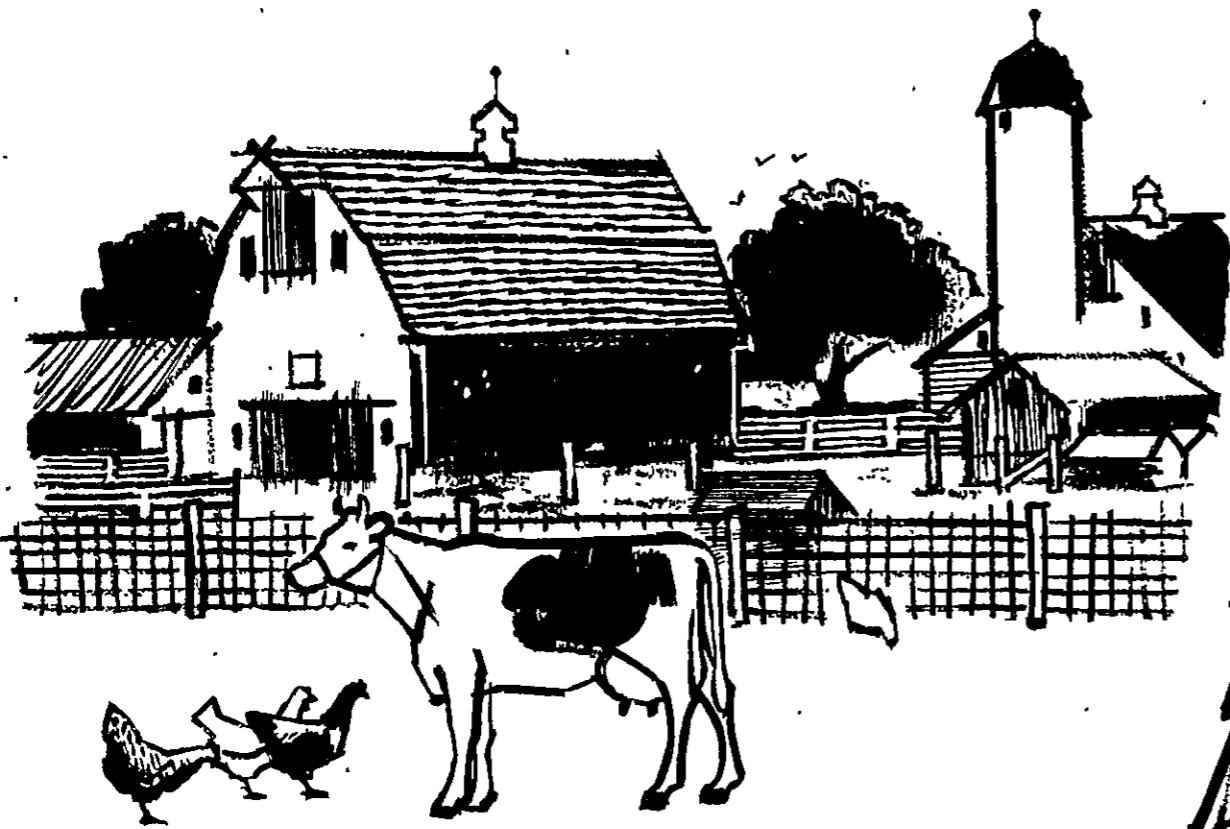

This exchange program is called the Japan LABO - Michigan 4-H Exchange. Clinton County needs at least 3 host farm families for 3 Japanese youth and if possible one host family for an adult Japanese chaperone for this 3-week period.

The timing of the visit is very rigid because Japanese children only have a 40 day school vacation which is the latter part of July and early August.

The host families are reminded not to alter the daily life of their homes. Experiencing daily life as it truly exists with in each culture is the heart of this exchange program.

Anytime is the time to introduce your child to the world of books. Reading to your child and giving him books of his own can be a lot of fun for both of you!

Picking books that your child will enjoy, books that will mean something to him and contribute to his development, takes more than a quick glance at the cover. Take time to browse at the library and choose books that are appropriate for your child's age.

Children at various stages of development have had different experiences that make some sort of books more appropriate than others.

The two- and three-year old, for instance, has had little experience in the world outside his immediate family, so he prefers stories about home and family told in few words with lots of pictures.

By four, the child has broadened his horizons. He has a larger vocabulary and, more aware of his environment, likes to hear stories about pets and nature as well as stories about children and families just like his.

At four, the child is also ready for books of a more fanciful nature. Talking animals are likely to be a big favorite. Books that deal with the how and the why of things and events will help answer his seemingly endless questions. And books of verse and rhyme will appeal to his growing awareness of language sounds and rhythms.

Once you've found a book that seems appropriate to the age and maturity of your child, check for these qualities: -Simple style. Sentences should be short and words familiar and simple.

-Repetition of sounds, words and phrases. -Familiar experiences with which the child can identify. Events or ideas beyond his experience will also be beyond his ability to understand.

-Action. Children prefer stories in which something happens.

Chloe's Column

Accurate information. Stories that mix fantasy with scientific truth can be confusing. -Attractive illustrations. The younger the child, the fewer confusing details should be permitted. Illustrations should accompany the written text and be obvious enough to tell the story on their own. Colors should be bright and should correspond to those found in the real world. Lines should be clear, and backgrounds, uncluttered.

-Plot construction. The course of the story should be clear and easy to follow. -The characters. They should be consistent, life-like, colorful and few. A very young child cannot handle many characters at once.

-Size and construction. For very small children, books should be neither very large nor tiny. Small hands have trouble managing them. Pages should be heavy and durable to withstand rough treatment and should lie flat when the book is open.

Lime

Lime is used to increase the pH of a soil which increases nutrient availability to the crop. The optimum pH for most field crops is between 6.5 and 7.0 for mineral soils and 5.5 to 6 for organic soils.

Lime takes time to raise the pH level in the plow layer. In six months the pH will increase by about 0.4 using the recommended amount and kind of lime. For example, two tons of lime applied now would change the pH from 6.1 to 6.5 six months from now. The lime continues to increase the soil pH at the same rate from that point onward. All lime recommendations are the amount needed to bring plow layer pH up to a pH of 6.8. Applying more than 5 tons of lime per acre in any season is not recommended. Mineral soils with a pH of 5.4 or less need more than one application of lime to correct the soil pH.

If possible, lime should be applied and worked into the plow layer six months to one year in advance of high lime requirement crops. The main benefits of lime are:

1. Makes for most efficient fertilizer utilization.
2. Improves crop yields.
3. Reduces harmful concentrations of aluminum, manganese and iron.
4. Promotes favorable microbial activity.
5. Supplies calcium, dolomitic materials supply both calcium and magnesium.
6. Promotes longevity of legume stands, particularly alfalfa.

"Our 1974 Farmers' Week program includes a campus-full of stimulating programs and exhibits that should be of interest to nearly all people in Michigan. And there are programs planned for both farm and city families," says Dean L.L. Boger of the MSU College of Agriculture and Natural Resources.

Byron Good, MSU professor of animal husbandry and event chairman, describes Farmer's Week as a "practical classroom for people in and out of the agricultural industry."

"Farmers' Week today enjoys the distinction of being one of the most outstanding educational events of its kind in the country," says Good. "It has become a major educational force in the field of agriculture in Michigan."

The theme of the 1974 Farmers' Week is "Food and Energy for the People." Departmental programs and displays as well as commercial exhibits are keyed to the theme.

Among programs focusing on energy are: "Demonstration Studio" and "Energy and Agriculture," presented by the MSU Agricultural Engineering Department on Wednesday, March 20. Energy-conserving practices for the farm and home, standby power sources and re-use of water will be discussed. The Fisheries and Wildlife and Resource

Development Departments also feature programs on energy and environmental quality on Wednesday.

Thursday is crowded with events, beginning with a special breakfast-conference, with Governor William G. Milliken who will discuss energy and land use in Michigan. A Fisheries and Wildlife program in the afternoon will tackle the problems of food and energy shortages in the recreation industry.

Several traditional dinner-awards programs are held during Farmers' Week. The President's Luncheon on Wednesday features MSU President Clifton R. Wharton, Jr.

Other major banquets include the Agricultural Engineering Banquet, also on Wednesday and the Farm Management Banquet, Thursday evening. The latter is sponsored by the Department of Agricultural Economics and features Dr. Thomas K. Cowden, former MSU Dean of the College of Agriculture and Natural Resources. Dr. Cowden is currently counselor to the US Secretary of Agriculture.

Farmers' Week, expected to attract 15,000 people to the MSU campus, includes over 100 programs with a total of 236 participants. Approximately 140 commercial exhibitors will show farm machinery, handling equipment, agricultural building supplies and modern techniques, small tractors and landscaping and gardening equipment.

"This is the only machinery show in Michigan that offers such a breadth of farm equipment and building supplies," says Bob Maddex, MSU agricultural engineer and exhibits chairman. "The variety of exhibits and the amount of specialized equipment shown is not matched at any fair or other event in the state."

Several displays will focus solely on the theme "Food and Energy for the People."

Exhibits are also planned for resource development, family living, landscape architecture, and botany and plant pathology.
