## Citizens short circuit pay hikes in DeWitt Twp

DEWITT TWP — DeWitt trustees apparently saw what was coming. Or rather, they saw what was not coming — pay raises for them during 1974-75. So they were studies in nonchalance Saturday after tight-fisted township residents voted at the annual meeting to can the raises while approving the rest of a proposed budget.

"What difference does it make?" was a typical official post-meeting remark. Supervisor Dale Emerson, while agreeing the salary issue meant little to him personally, commented, "I feel it's unfortunate for whoever's in this office."

200 Present

A standing room-only crowd of over 200 turned out for the event at the township fire hall.

As expected, the salary debate was the hottest point on the agenda. For the first time officials could remember the regular hand vote had to be followed up by "division of the house" and ballot voting procedures.

The proposed budget called for salary increases of \$12,000 to \$16,000 for the supervisor, \$8,900 to \$11,000 for the clerk, \$7,900 to \$11,000 for the treasurer and \$600 to \$1,200 each for trustees. A move to adopt the increases as proposed failed narrowly. A motion to keep the salaries at their 1973-74 levels, which was made by Bruce Angell II, eventually passed 89-80.

Angell was in the spotlight throughout the meeting, speaking on nearly every topic from salaries to sewers to school crossing guards.

He questioned police chief William Nash on hiring procedures, asking whether current part-time policemen will get first grants at 2 full time positions to be opened up this year.

Nash responded that part time men would be encouraged to apply. He said they would go through the same selection procedure as other prospective employees, to avoid later charges of favoritism.

Emerson added that past service in the

department would weigh heavily in a part-time man's favor.

Angell joined several other residents in reiterating the need for a school crossing guard at Sheridan and Turner, near the Sheridan Road School. He accused trustees Eileen Corrand, Jack Kzeski of "ramrodding through" a previous crossing guard proposal and stalling on the Sheridan issue.

Corr and Kzeski said the board recognized the need for a guard there, but wanted to split costs with the city of Lansing because the school lies on the dividing line between it and the township.

They explained the board made inquiries of Lansing police chief Thomas O'Toole (who in turn referred it to the city council). Corr added that the township would

probably have to foot the whole bill if Lansing refuses to participate.

Land Purchase

Two resolutions for land purchases — 20 acres for fire department expansion and 36 acres for park facilities — were passed with amendments proposed by Angell. He asked the purchases not be made unless 2 outside assessors appraise the land within 10 percent of the price cited.

Approve Budgets

Aside from the salary debate, discussion of the \$107,312 police budget and the \$75,500 road budget dominated the meeting. Budget proposals for the planning commission (\$1,300), fire department (\$30,225) and cemetery (\$12,500) breezed through easily.

## Why was chief fired? DeWitt Twp Board says reason soon to come

DEWITT TWP — The jackpot question in these parts is: Why was Bruce Angell II fired last September?

Soon, everyone will know the answer. That's what township board members promised after discussion of the former police chief's dismissal was blocked in the final moments of Saturday's annual meeting.

Declare Inquiry Out of Order

A resident's inquiry about the firing was declared out of order because another motion was on the floor. But right after that vote, a quick motion to adjourn was made by fire chief Ed Fancher at the urging of township treasurer Oliver Angell, Bruce Angell's uncle.

The motion carried with the former police chief among its supporters. On their attorney's advice, board members have refused comment on the firing despite demands from Angell and his supporters.

The refusal was one factor cited on recently submitted recall petitions against supervisor Dale Emerson, clerk Donna Sverson and trustees Eileen Corr and Jack Kzeski.

They insisted following Saturday's meeting that this time, they had come prepared to discuss the issue.

## Milliken addresses GOP dinner Thursday

Others slated to appear on the program with the governor are committee chairman Brandon D. White, Jr and finance chairman William Gnodtke.

Milliken has been governor of the state since January, 1969 when he assumed the post held by George Romney who resigned to become secretary of Housing and Urban Development in Washington. Eleven months later Milliken was elected to his present four-year term and is currently in the initial period of a campaign to retain his office.

The show will feature over 15 working artists and craftsmen demonstrating their special talents. In addition to the demonstrations they will have finished products and supplies for sale. Some of the artists will be taking names of those who wish to sign up for instructional classes in their specialty.

On hand for the show will be: Summershine of Ovid and the unique line of hand crafted candles will be on hand with a special setup for dipping your own mushroom candles. Also, displayed will be the largest candle car in the world - VW with 350 lbs of wax over it, custom wax job by Summershine.

Specializing in macrame, quilting, and nature arts is a group called The Orange Crate from the Kalamazoo area. In the office are demonstrations and finished products of all types.

Coming all the way from Greenfield, Indiana is Matt Oertel, a leatherworker. He will demonstrate how to make items from the hide to the finished products. His wares include belts, purses, key chains, wallets and more.

Signmaker, T.F. Doyle of Garden City, will be on hand to custom make any kind of wood sign wanted. He cuts, routs, sands, and stains your sign while you wait.

Lynne Bennett, art teacher at Ovid-Elsie High School, is a metal-smith and will be demonstrating and exhibiting her work. Her specialty is copper jewelry and includes anything from bracelets to body armor.

Tom Buckley, from Moon-tower Glass Works, Kalamazoo, is an artist excelling in the art of stained, and leaded glass. His creativity extends from leaded glass planters and terrariums to stained glass lamps and windows and anything in between.

Award winning artist Pat Preston of Lansing, will be available to do charcoal and pastel portraits. Pat has an extensive art education which started at U of M and continued at Western. She is presently working out of Knapps in Lansing, where she does portraits by appointment.

Hailing from Lansing are glassblowers Mark and Patsy Paman, who blow and spin glass in creative ways.

William and Bessie Rogers of Rogers Rock Ranch, St. Johns, will be at the show with goods and services for anything pertaining to the rock hobby. Demonstrations include polishing rubies, tumbling stones in different grits, and all phases of rockology. They will exhibit their prize collection of fossils which include trilobites dating back millions of years and a piece of algae that dates back over a billion years ago.

Unusual and fascinating are the hallmarks of Blair Daley's collection of restored and working antique radios. Blair will exhibit his collection which include the first radios ever

made, and explain their history to any interested viewers.

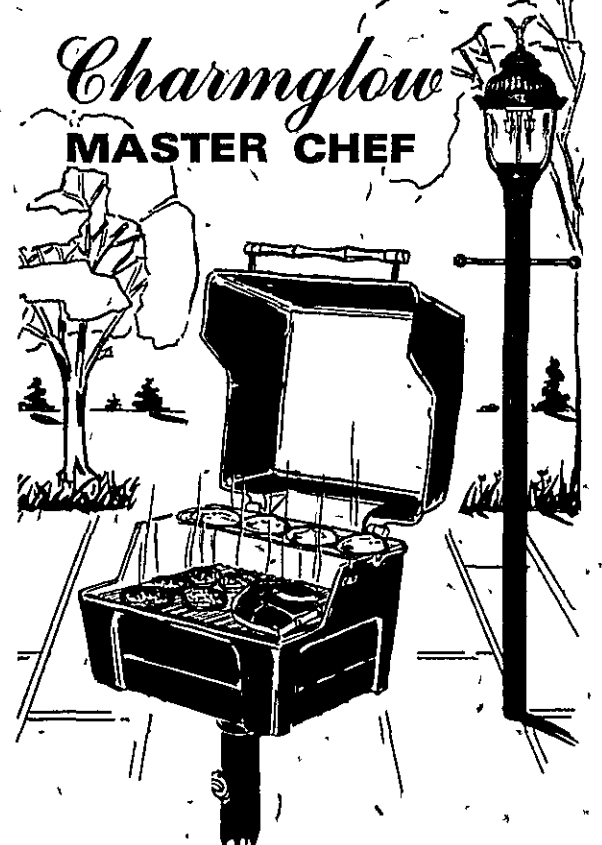

# Bath Twp solves 1 problem, now faced with another

BATH TWP - Bath trustees solved a township sewer hassle Monday only to see a water problem aggravate a personal feud between Supervisor Roy VanSickle and an irate resident.

The positive move came after a rehash of bargaining with developer Paul Grattarola on sewer hook-up of his planned mobile home park at Upton Rd and M-78.

Cities Construction Damage  
Whited and his wife said sewer construction at their home on 13604 Vine had severely damaged their property, removing features such as plants and gate posts, and causing flooding by as much as 6-feet deep in spots.

the engineering firm Fishbeck, Thompson and Carr, whom the Whiteds said had come to help them earlier that day.

For the less emotional, but complicated discussion, about the mobile home park, board members called on bond consultant Raymond J. Stauder for advice.

Stauder reviewed Grattarola's original proposal, which included building the forced main, paying a \$1500 tap-in charge and a \$3 per unit monthly county maintenance charge and basing debt retirement fees on the exact metered amount of sewage placed into the system.

"The assignment is based on capacity to use the system, not an actual use," he argued.

"There's no way you can give preferential treatment to 1 (developer) without opening the door for someone else."

The compromise proposal Schussel offered met with Stauder's approval, however, and won the vote of all but one board member present.

Treasurer Thomas Woodruff explained that he objected to the single tap-in charge and felt the policy would give an unfair break to big developers.

Grattarola said after the meeting he was not pleased with the charges involved in the settlement, but was glad to be able to start work on the 300-unit project.

Whited said he did not see how a law suit could be avoided, but added he wasn't exactly sure who to sue.

"I could sue the township board, the engineers, the sewer system, the Drain Commission or my neighbors," he said.

Whited said Charles Johnson, with aid of a bulldozer, and 2 front end loaders, helped him get out his truck, which was trapped beyond the "flood." He said his car was still trapped there.

When asked whether there was any water inside his house, Whited laughed and said, "No, but of course I haven't been home in a few hours."

Stauder advised the board that allowing the meter provision would open a "Pandora's box" of policy changes.

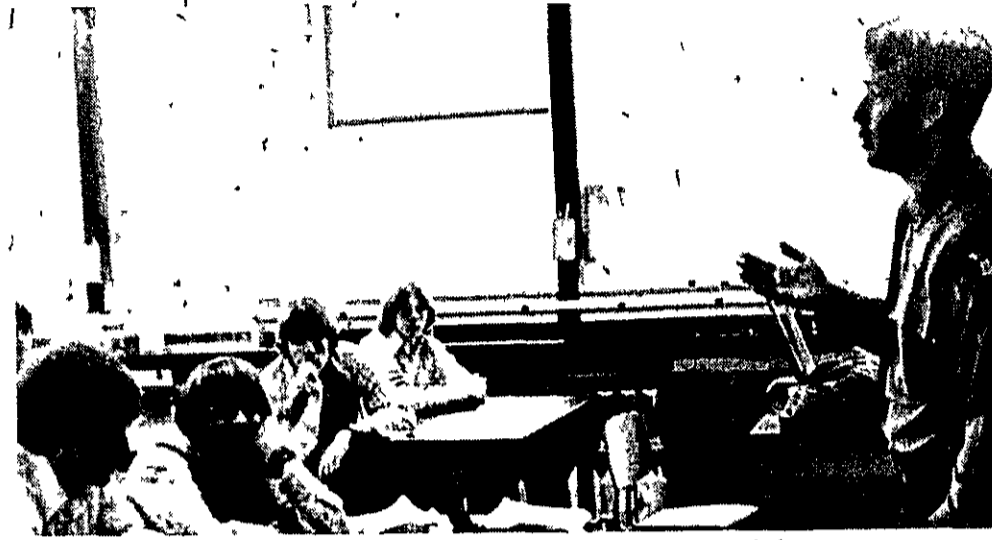

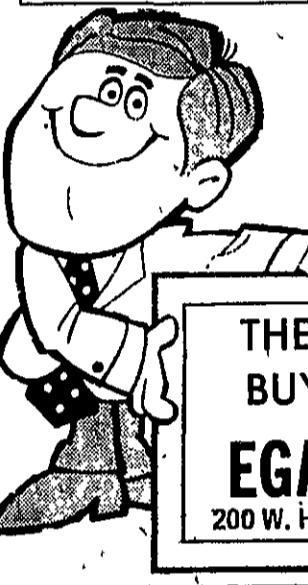
drafting, engineering technological and industrial trades, and human ecology, including fashion merchandizing.

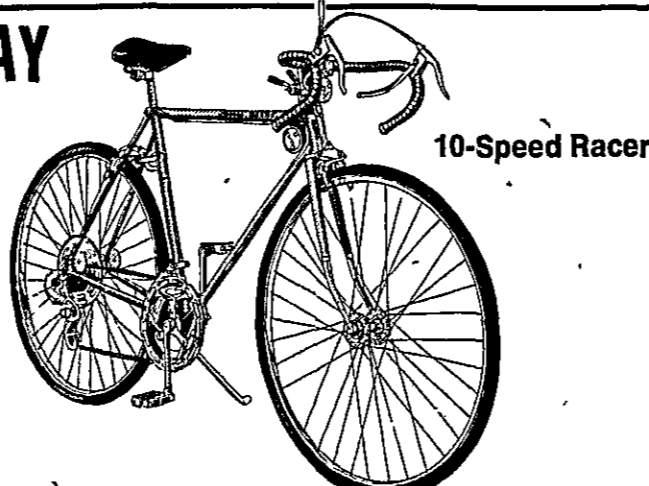

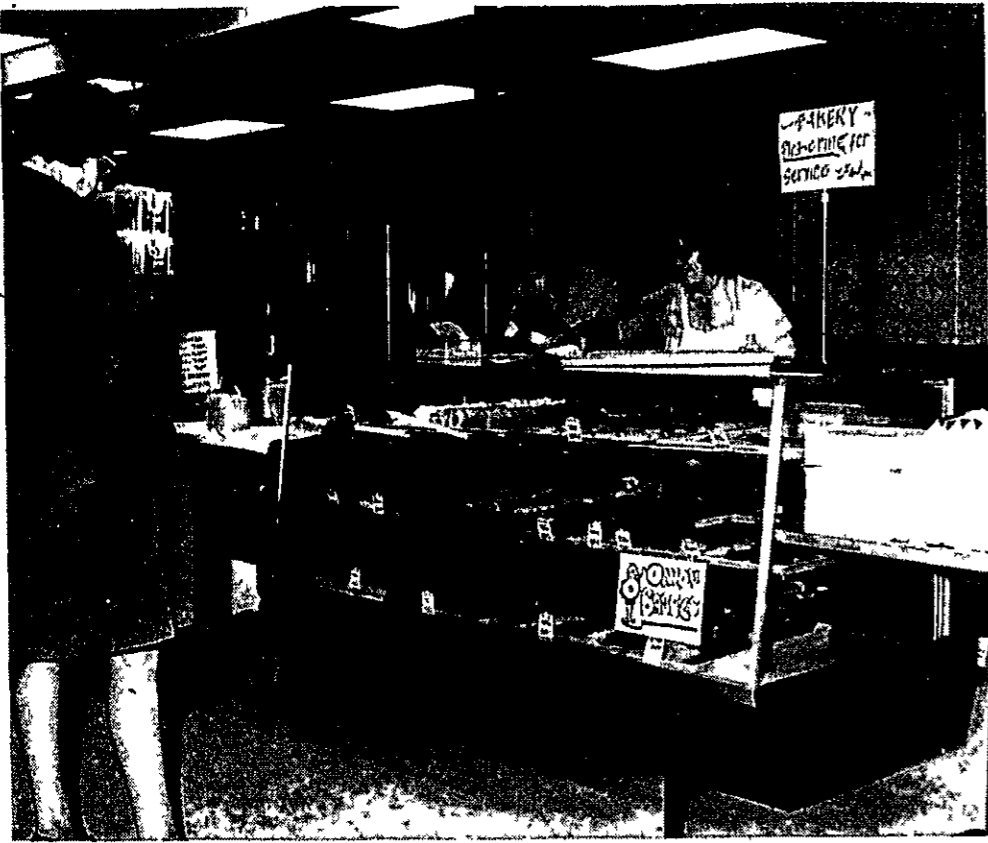

From fruit stand to shopping complex

## Beck's Farm Market on the grow



Beck's Bakery goods are made from scratch.

It was 1957 when Ben and Barbara Beck first opened their little roadside fruit stand 7 miles north of St. Johns. Strawberries ran 3 quarts for a dollar that year, and business was good.

But their friends should see them now. Over the years they've expanded their little stand into 15,000 square feet of supermarket: wide aisles lined with everything from meat to magazines, from pastry to pantyhose.

They call it Beck's Farm Market now, and it's located right on US-27. With their latest expansion the store's size doubled - but Ben Beck likes to think some of the homey touches remain.

"In our bakery, everything is made from scratch," he pointed out. "And we smoke our own meat: hams, bologna and sausages."

The way Beck tells it, the marketing business runs in the family.

"My grandad (Frank Beck) used to have a fruit market up the road," he explained, "then the highway came and wiped it out. I sort of started it all over again."

He's mighty proud of the way

things have turned out, but the 39-year-old Beck, a farmer-turned-businessman, still remembers the lean years.

The year after he set up his first little stand, for example, he operated from a lean-to with a dirt floor. Folks started asking for more things—meat, bread, non-food items—and Beck gave them what they wanted.

He says there is no magic formula for moving successfully from small-time to big-time operations.

"It takes hard work, long hours and a positive attitude, that's about all," he said.

Beck also gives a lot of credit to his 30-person staff, stating that "If you don't have good help, you might as well forget it."

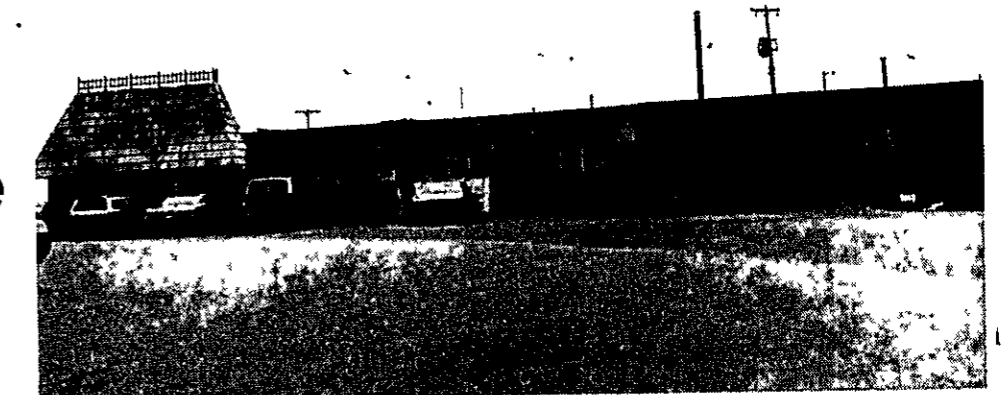
Among the additions of the latest expansion project are a new meat department, bakery, snack bar and computerized check-out system. Beck also added a \$4,000 machine for recycling cardboard.

Some of the biggest additions have been of non-food items ranging from records to grooming aids.

"That's what people want these days," Beck said.

## Clinton County Country Club adjusts annual dues structure

ST. JOHNS -- An adjusted dues structure approved last month by the board of directors of Clinton County Country Club has had a favorable impact toward drawing applications for membership from unmarried persons.

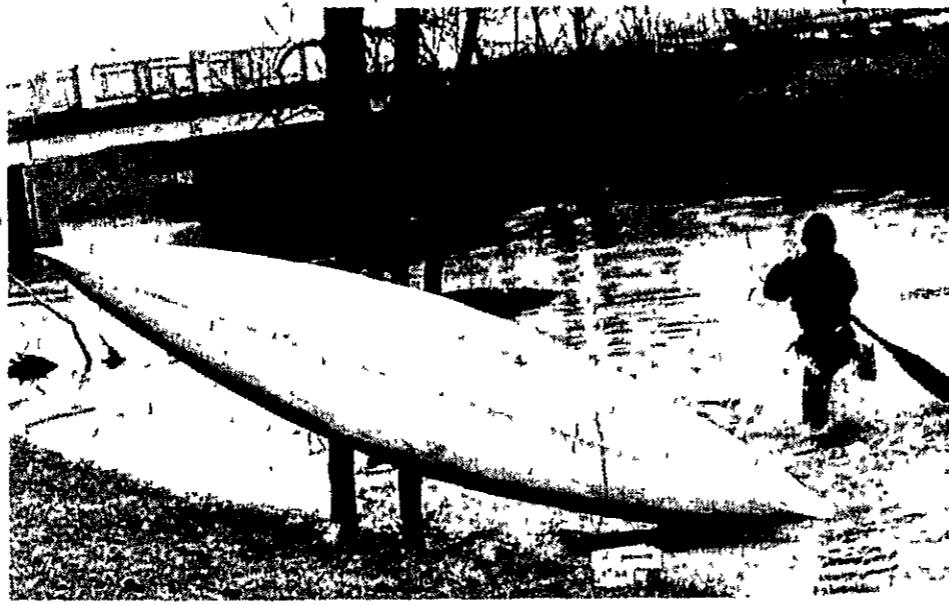

### TO THE GAS CUSTOMERS OF CONSUMERS POWER COMPANY

#### NOTICE OF HEARING GAS ALLOCATION PROCEDURE

Case No. U-3990

On January 15, 1974, Consumers Power Company filed with the Michigan Public Service Commission a Supplement to Application in Case No. U-3990, which requested that the Commission amend paragraph "C" of its Order dated November 26, 1971 in Case No. U-3990. Consumers Power Company states in its Supplement to Application that there exists in the State of Michigan, and elsewhere throughout the United States, a severe gas supply shortage, which shortage, which shortage had made it necessary that suppliers of natural gas, including Applicant's pipeline suppliers, substantially curtail the deliveries of natural gas to their customers. Consumers Power Company also states, in its Supplement to Application, that, in response to this shortage of natural gas, the Commission granted Applicant authority to implement a gas allocation procedure. One of the stated purposes of the currently-effective gas allocation procedure was to alleviate the hardship then being experienced by certain commercial and industrial customers. This hardship existed because prior to the effective date of such gas allocation procedure, gas usage of commercial and industrial customers was restricted to "base year allocations." Thus, weather-related increases in gas consumption and increases in gas consumption arising from increased usage of existing manufacturing or processing equipment was precluded. Accordingly, Applicant proposed, in its authority to create the presently-effective gas allocation procedure, to ameliorate this situation by making sufficient gas available, independent of the proposed gas allocation procedure, to permit commercial and industrial customers then being served (other than those being supplied gas from steam generating equipment, electric generating equipment, or kilns rated at more than 50,000 cubic feet of gas per hour) to "fully utilize their existing equipment" presently utilizing gas as a primary fuel. In response to Applicant's proposal, the Commission authorized Applicant, in paragraph "C" of its Order dated November 26, 1971, in Case No. U-3990, to:

"...make available to its present customers (other than those now being supplied gas for steam generating equipment, electric generating equipment, and kilns rated at more than 50,000 cubic feet of gas per hour) sufficient gas to fully utilize existing equipment which is presently utilizing gas as a primary fuel..."

In recent months, Applicant has been confronted with the claim on several occasions that under the quoted language from paragraph "C" of the November 26, 1971 Order, existing customers may utilize existing equipment to heat new buildings or building additions. The Applicant, uniformly, has denied this claim as being inconsistent with the intent of the gas allocation procedure in general and the intent of paragraph "C" of the November 26, 1971 Order in particular. Accordingly, Applicant proposes that the Commission amend its Order dated November 26, 1971, in Case No. U-3990, so as to make clear that the use by Applicant's existing customers of existing equipment to heat new buildings or building additions is precluded, unless such use is restricted to an annual allocation of gas consistent with the customer's previous gas usage.

As set forth in the proposed paragraph "C," Consumers Power Company proposes that ordering paragraph "C" read as follows:

"C. Consumers Power Company is hereby authorized, independent of the gas allocation procedure herein approved, to make available to its present customers sufficient gas to fully utilize (1) existing manufacturing and commercial or industrial processing equipment which is presently

using natural gas as a primary fuel, except that Consumers Power Company shall restrict customers who are now being supplied gas for steam generating equipment, electric generating equipment, and kilns rated at more than 50,000 cubic feet of gas per hour, to the annual Mcf capacity reservation contained in their present gas service contracts or, if there is no annual capacity reservation in their contracts, to the base year allocation or the commitment made by Consumers Power Company in accordance with the gas sales restrictions authorized by this Commission in Case No. U-3778, and (2) existing space heating equipment, provided there is no expansion or addition in the area to be heated. If an existing customer makes additions to the area being served by existing space heating equipment through additions to the existing building or new buildings, such customer shall be limited to an annual allocation of gas consistent with the customer's previous gas usage."

The Supplement to Application in Case No. U-3990, together with the Commission's initial order therein, is available for public inspection at the offices of the Michigan Public Service Commission, Law Building, Lansing, Michigan 48913, and at each local office of Consumers Power Company.

The Commission has scheduled hearings on the Supplement to Application, and it has ordered that Notice be given that:

A. A public hearing will be held at 9:30 AM on April 19, 1974 in the offices of the Commission in the Law Building, Lansing, Michigan 48913, for purposes of determining whether, or in what form, ordering paragraph "C" of the Commission's Order in Case No. U-3990 should be amended.

B. 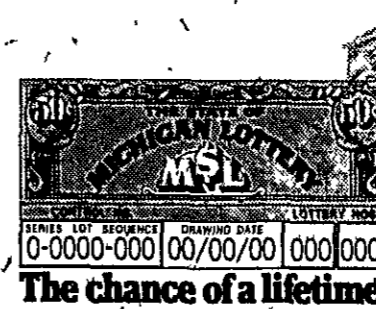
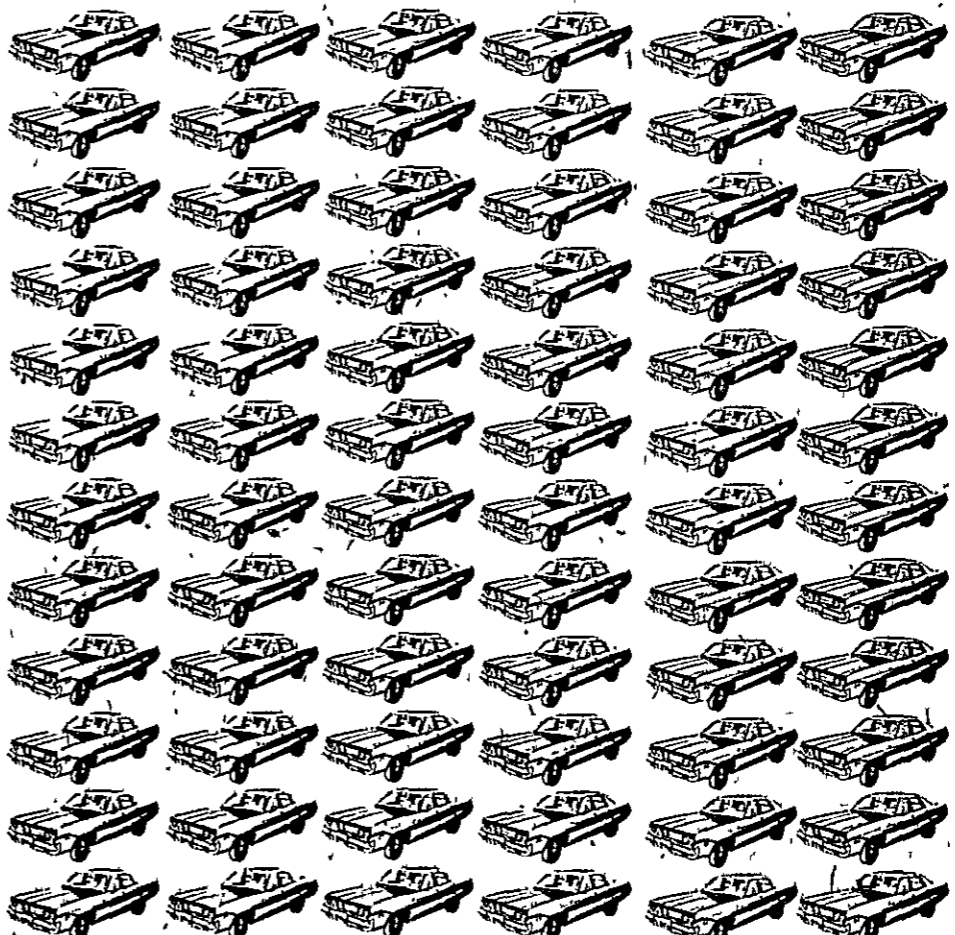

# Deny appeals in murder case

ST JOHNS — Appeals by 2 men sentenced to life imprisonment for the murder of a Round Lake store owner have been turned down by the State Court of Appeals.

William Graves and Richard Collins were sentenced to life imprisonment after being found guilty of 1st degree murder of Ivan Hempsted.

Hempsted was fatally shot during the robbery of his Round Lake store. His wife, Marjorie, was injured from blows during the robbery.

Graves based his appeal on the contention the court erred by informing the jury that only 2 verdicts could be reached, guilty or

not guilty. Graves' appeal contended evidence indicated conviction on a lesser scale was possible.

Also included in Grave's appeal was the contention the charge should not have been a felony murder, arguing that Hempsted was not killed during the actual robbery of the store.

County prosecutor Jon Newman contended the killing was a cold blooded slaying and was in fact, a felony murder. Newman also pointed out that Grave's attorney did not object to court instructions that the defendant be found either guilty or not guilty of first degree murder.

Collins' appeal was based on the con-

stitution that "the warrant... was unconstitutional since it was based on a complaint... which failed to identify sources of information."

The complaint was issued by Trooper Gary Jackson of the Michigan State Police and the court ruled the complaint was legal because it was based on the complainant's information and belief.

In the case of Graves' appeal, the court ruled the lower court had not erred in informing the jury that there were only 2 possible verdicts.

The opinions were written by Judge Thomas M. Burns, presiding judge of the State Court of Appeals.

# Rain making topic Thursday

ST JOHNS — A meeting to discuss possibilities of weather modification will be sponsored by the Cooperative Extension Service at Smith Hall Thursday, April 11 at 1:30 pm.

For the past 2 years, farmers in Gratiot and Montcalm Counties have been tampering with the weather, through a contract with Krick Associates of California to make it rain to the advantage of growing crops.

James Pelham, County Extension director said, "Krick and Company aren't 'rain dancers' or anything of that sort. Rather, they are meteorologists and have a lot of technical know-how concerning

weather. Extension Directors Jim Crosby in Montcalm County and John Baker in Gratiot say they think the plan is working and the idea is spreading to no less than a dozen additional southern Michigan counties."

Baker and possibly some growers from Gratiot county will be on hand at the Clinton meeting to discuss their observations of 2 years of cloud seeding from ground based generators which emit tiny quantities of silver iodide.

This treatment can work only where water laden clouds are present. The idea is to get clouds to release their contents rather

than pass by the area. Michigan State University researchers admit to having only limited data as to the effectiveness of this method of cloud seeding. However, agricultural engineer, Dale Linval is on the case and is now working to collect data on Michigan weather and climate and results of this and other Krick Associate's projects.

He will be discussing his research at the county meeting.

All farmers, county officials and others interested in the project are urged to attend the meeting. Ample time will be given for a question-answer type discussion.

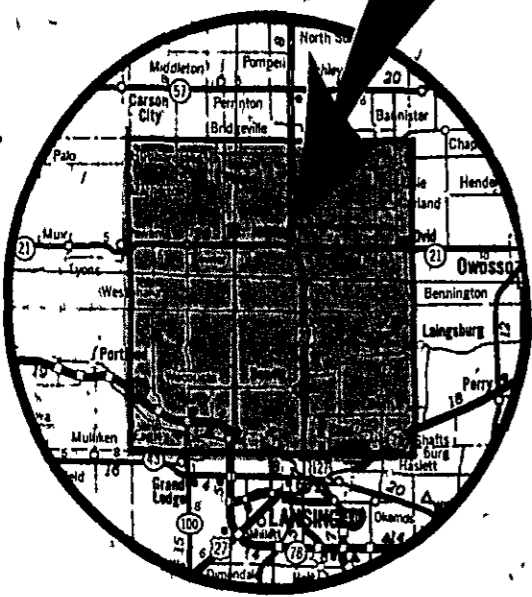

League were the winning team in a tournament held earlier in the month in the sunny South. Keys also won the trophy for Best Ball tournament while others were given golf balls as awards.

This winter vacation took place at the Gulf Hills Inn and Golf Club at Ocean Springs, Mississippi off Highway No 90 along the Gulf of Mexico near Biloxi.

There were 22 men and women from the Elsie area who enjoyed the week of near-perfect weather for golfing, relaxation or "doing your own

thing". Among them were 4 men who were in the original group that began these annual trips to Gulf Hills a decade ago. They were the winners, Betts and Keys and Bernard Conklin and Gus Patrick.

There have been many changes over the years. At first there were just the men golfers, then later their wives joined them and set up their own league plays while non-golfers, sometimes joined by others, enjoyed side trips to such interesting places as: New Orleans and its Latin Quarter; Biloxi Shopping Plaza and Biloxi Lighthouse (1848); Gautier Plantation and family homes along the Singing River; Beauvoir, historic last home of Jefferson Davis; Keester AFB; Ingalls Shipbuilding Works at Pascagoula; USS Alabama at Mobile, Ala.; Bellingrath Gardens at Theodore, Ala; and Dauphin Island.

Many social evenings of cards and visiting were enjoyed by the group after golfing and dinner. There were other sports, available, such as tennis, fishing, swimming and horseback riding.

Until this year the local group lived in villas surrounding a courtyard along the Old Fort Bayou, where the pink azaleas, magnolia and tulip trees blossomed profusely.

Drastic changes at Gulf Hills, began when Hurricane Camille struck the Mississippi Gulf Coast on Aug 17, 1969 with a 20-ft plus tidal wave devastating thousands of homes, businesses and resorts, killing many people and millions of dollars of loss in property damage.

Gulf Hills did not escape Camille as there were thousands of dollars lost. The champion 18 hole course, several buildings and the woodlot setting were damaged by the floods and winds scattering debris which involved months of labor to restore.

Since then, the Elsie golfers have viewed with much interest the restoration of homes, public buildings, hotels, roads and bridges.

On Christmas morning, 1971 the Gulf Hills Country Club was faced with a disastrous fire that left only the tall fireplace chimneys still standing where the clubhouse, dining rooms, lounge and kitchen once stood.

Fortunately, the villas and rooms, golf course, stables and

pool were not involved and by the time the Elsie group arrived 2 months later, a temporary dining room, kitchen and lounge were built and huge machinery was being moved in to complete the leveling in preparation for other rebuilding.

Last year, when the Elsie contingent left, new construction of the Gulf Hills Inn was in evidence with a new main lodge building and wing, housing the 52 new guest rooms in addition to the villa accommodations.

Upon arrival this year the entire Elsie group were assigned to the new guest rooms. The buildings were constructed of weathered cypress with carefully planned functional space in the main building. The interior treatment of the Inn left nothing to be desired. Each guest room was complete with mini-parlor, air conditioning, colored television, and a look of casual luxury.

Chef "Rev", after 30 years in the old kitchen, presides over the latest in modern cooking conveniences but the menu is basically the same delicious "country gourmet". Included were the Creole, French, Italian and Chinese cuisine featuring all kinds of seafood, salads, fruits and luscious desserts. The huge fountain of fruit juices was an added attraction at the breakfast hour.

The beautiful new lobby with

its spiral ornamental stair case, lounge and dining room which seats over 200 were favorite meeting places. The many large crystal chandeliers and the use of full glass doors and windows emphasized the beauty of the lodge.

"Old Pro" Ben Pitt still directs the improvement of the golf course and the new Pro Shop. Gulf Hills is proud that the much publicized 17th hole received another honor when it was selected as one of 12 outstanding holes to be featured in the 1974 Golf Digest Calendar.

Managers Henry Rushin and Dean Spencer and owner Ike LaRue were at hand to welcome the Elsie folks again this year.

A model residential development has been laid out with improved roads and many new homes between the rolling fairways and greens which greatly enhances the new Gulf Hills Inn and Golf Club.

The Elsie party included the following: Mr and Mrs Bernard Conklin and Mr and Mrs Harold Chadwick, all of Elsie but wintering in Florida; Mr and Mrs Kelley Carter, Mr and Mrs Homer Hoshield, Mr and Mrs Sidney Keys, Gus Patrick and Joe Bartek, all of Elsie; Mrs Eulah Falor, Orville Sillman and Mr and Mrs A.C. Linman; Mr and Mrs Herb Betts of Ithaca and Mr and Mrs Max Capen of Wheeler.

There is always a "casualty" with a vacation group such as the Elsie folks. One of their golfers, Mrs Durward (Thelma) Conklin had the misfortune to turn her ankle and fall on a step while going to dinner.

The next morning she was taken to the hospital for x-rays, which showed a broken

metatarsal arch in her foot. The final days of her vacation (3 weeks) were spent with her husband, friends and relatives in Florida in a walking cast and using crutches most of the time.

## "If It Fitz . . . Golfing with DiMaggio

Cast your bread upon the waters and it may come back spread with caviar. That's how I got this sunburned nose.

Many years ago I removed a thorn from the paw of a high school freshman. "Go forth and write me some school sports news," I told him, and he did. Thus was Chuck Werle launched on a career of journalism that took him from Lapeer County weekly to the Milwaukee Journal.

And today he realized the dream of every newspaper reporter. He is out of the newspaper business and is a public relations executive in Miami, Florida. He has a home with a pool and his name is engraved on hundreds of memo pads.

"COMMON DOWN," he phoned the other week. "You can play in our Tony Lema Memorial celebrity-pro golf tournament on Marco Island. Enjoy a week of great fun and marvelous weather. You and your wife can stay in the most luxurious hotel you've ever seen. There'll be a big dinner-dance with Harry James playing."

Which sounded pretty good. And then he added the magic words: "Be our guest." My wife and I were on the next plane south, already telling strangers about the virtues of Deltona Corp, owner of Marco Island and Werle's employer.

We had to switch planes at the Miami airport and that's when I first began to fear my visit would make Chuck wish he'd taken his thorn to Blue Cross. We missed our flight to Marco Island. There was another flight a half hour later and we missed that one, too. The reason was a breakdown in the airport's electronic communication system. The Marco Airlines clerk was paging me loudly throughout the airport but I couldn't hear him. There was a busted loudspeaker in the bar into which my wife had dragged me.

Chuck had asked Bill Gentry, head of Marco Island public relations, to meet our plane. Fortunately, Bill used to work for the old Detroit Times so he naturally has a keen understanding of

the pitfalls through which an intrepid newsman must often splash while pursuing an assignment. "Don't worry," he phoned Chuck in Miami. "He's a newspaperman and it's a freeloader. He'll be here by cocktail hour." I was.

THE NEXT DAY, bright and early at 3 pm, I went out to practice for the big golf tourney which was just 48 hours away. My first drive was so powerful it went over a fence surrounding a power plant. The gate was locked. My 2nd drive petered off into a lake where 2 naughty ducks didn't even flinch.

I switched to a pitch and putt course to practice the finer points of my game (and to protect my dwindling supply of golf balls). I blasted out of one sandtrap and into another - the Gulf of Mexico beach. While I was battling my way back on the course, chipping over sunbathers, 18 golfers played through. My wife fell down laughing when she noticed one of the athletes leaving me behind was an old man on crutches. "Yes, but he has his nurse caddy for him," I explained.

My dismay became complete when I learned people would be paying \$7 a head to watch the tournament. And I would be playing with such touring professionals as Jerry Heard, George Archer and Bobby Nichols. And such celebrities as Joe DiMaggio, Joe Garagiola, Garo Yepremian and Don Shula. And each player would be introduced on the first tee, over a microphone, while hundreds watched. And I would have to get up at 6 am, the morning after Harry James . . .

I did the only honorable thing. I inserted a thorn in my paw and limped to Werle. "Get me out of this tournament," I said, "and I promise to tell the world to get marooned on Marco Island, the finest sun-fun community on earth."

HE DID AND I AM: Go to Marco. But if you play golf, be careful you're not trampled by that old man on crutches.



## Emergency medical services

Everyone who watches television on Saturday nights has come to know a lot about "emergency medical services." The popular series "Emergency" shows paramedics at work, saving lives and performing a lot of medical work we usually think of as being done by doctors and nurses.

Not legal in Michigan Unfortunately, such a medical service is not legal in Michigan today. Performance of those medical procedures, as shown on TV, would constitute practicing medicine without a license and, as such, would be in violation of law.

Some of us are trying to do something about it. We have introduced a bill, with almost universal support from the professional people, which would allow ambulance attendants to perform certain advanced medical procedures at the scene of the accident or injury as long as they were getting directions from an authorized doctor or nurse by radio or telephone.

As it is visualized, the doctor would be receiving vital information - an elec-

trocardiogram, for instance - on a monitor at the hospital and directing the attendant to administer specific medicines or perform certain procedures at the scene.

Not every ambulance attendant would automatically be allowed to do this work. A great deal of training, beyond the levels which most attendants receive today, will be required. The Michigan Department of Health is presently planning a program for these people involving some 480 hours of special training.

"Physician's assistant" Actually, the person who completes the training and passes the examination will probably be the first of a new class of medical personnel in the state, that of "physician's assistant."

It is a little strange to consider how I became involved in all this. But, during my first term I was the sponsor of several bills involving ambulance service, drawing on my experience in Owosso as the Mid-County Ambulance Service was organized.

This work brought me in contact with the Michigan Emergency Services Health Council, an organization of private and public membership dedicated to improvement in the delivery of emergency

medical services. At their urging, I introduced a bill to authorize and train this new type of medical technician. Simultaneously, another bill was introduced to assist a specific service being authorized in the Southfield area by another representative.

Later, we got together, and worked both bills into a new one which accomplishes both purposes. We hope to have favorable House action within the next week or two.

Not the same as TV But, the bill itself will not provide service like you see on TV every Saturday night. The keys to the service are the training of the necessary attendants, the installation of a communications link between the emergency unit and the emergency room of a hospital and the availability of qualified professionals in that emergency room at all times to direct the work of the attendant in the field. The Mid-County Ambulance Service, incidentally, already has the radio connection with Owosso Memorial Hospital.

It is generally accepted that the sooner treatment is given to a patient, the more effective that treatment will be in bringing about his recovery. We believe this bill is a positive step in the right direction.

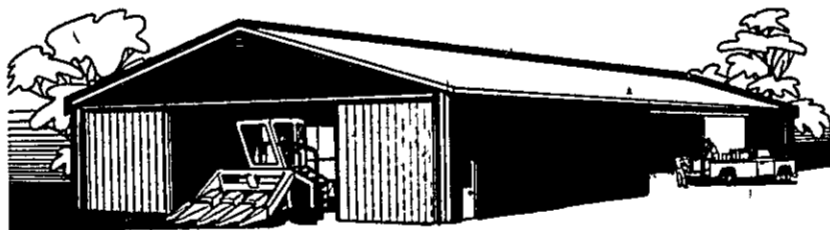

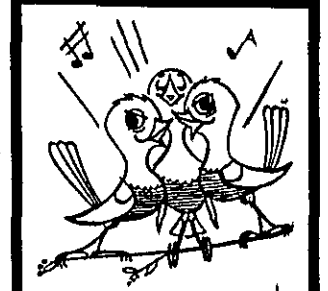

**Beef tour**

Put your traveling clothes on! There will be a tour of 3 beef farms this Saturday, April 6 starting at 9:30 am. The tour starts at the Clarence Manning farm on the corner of Cutler and Hinman Roads at 9:30 am. Next stop is the Robert Nourse farm and the third stop is the Dave Morris farm on Right Rd. Put your traveling coat on and come to the southwest part of Clinton County to see 3 good beef feeders in action.

Have the soil tested, and add fertilizer and lime if needed.

Get the seedbed in shape. Soil preparation involves grading, tilling and removing stones and debris.

Use high quality seed. Sow the seed uniformly, following the packager's recommendations.

Spread a mulch (straw or wood chips) evenly over the newly seeded lawn, using 70 pounds per 1000 square feet of lawn surface. A good watering will stabilize the mulch. You can remove the mulch when the grass is about 1 1/2 inches tall.

Water the lawn lightly (1/2 inch) every day in the afternoon to insure good surface soil moisture for the next 2 or 3 weeks.

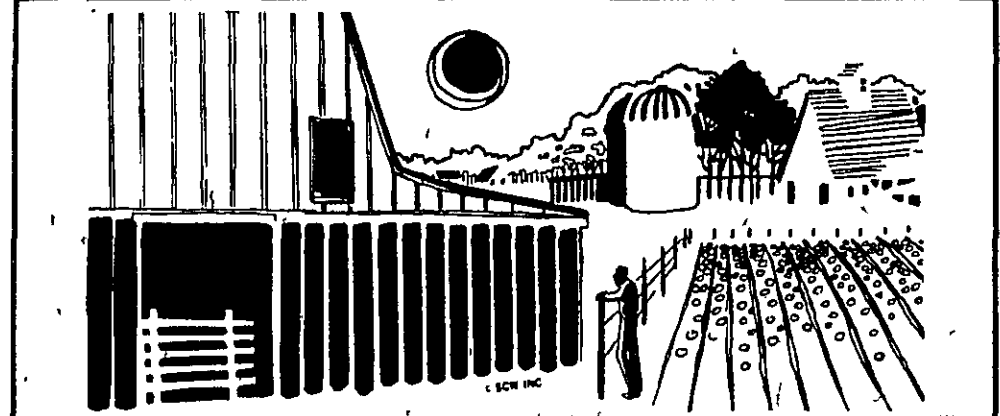

## View from the Senate

After a campaign which started a decade ago when the first such legislation was introduced in the Michigan Legislature, it appears that a move to save state farmland as well as "open spaces" may be at long last about to pay off.

A bill (HB 4244), finally was approved in different versions by both chambers last week and now awaits only Senate concurrence with House amendments or the resolution of differences by a House-Senate

conference in order to become law.

The measure offers tax breaks to land owners who agree with the state to keep their property unchanged at least 10 years.

It is designed primarily to save millions of acres of farmland from being forced into commercial development by rapidly escalating land values and increased taxes.

Under the measure, farmers can enter into farmland "development right" agreements with the state for 10 years that would limit development to improving the land for farming purposes. Such an agreement would have to be approved by state and local governments.

Under such an agreement, farmers would be eligible for credit on their state income taxes equal to the amount their property taxes exceeded 7 percent of their household income. The credit for owners of incorporated farms would be based on 7 percent of taxable, rather than household, income.

"Open space" land owners would be able to seek an open space development rights easement, subject to local governmental approval. With the state holding the development rights, development would be limited to just what was needed to maintain the property as open land.

Under the bill, open space land is defined as undeveloped historical sites; land controlled under the Natural Rivers Act or Shorelands Protection and Management Acts; and similar areas approved by the local government to save natural scenic resources.

The 3 ways to end a land agreement under the bill are natural termination at the end of the 10-year period; request by the state to the owner to take the land out from under the agreement; or request by the owner to end the agreement.

At the end of the natural termination, the farmer would pay back the last 7 years of his credit or, in the case of "open space" land, the owner would

have to pay the last 7 years of property taxes levied against the land. If termination ends by state request, no penalty or back payment would be required.

If an owner requests to be relieved, the state must approve the application and the owner would be required to pay the total amount of the credit received or property taxes at 6 percent interest compounded annually from the date of entrance into the program.

If all 80,000 farmers in the state, however marginal their operations, opted for the program, theoretically the cost would be at least \$6 million, but since it's estimated that only those farmers with full-time operations who have no interest in selling their increasingly valuable land to speculators or commercial interests are expected to apply, the actual cost is expected to be only a small percentage of that.

## Milk producers fight dairy product imports

**DETROIT** - Members of Michigan Milk Producers Association (MMPA) have urged the Michigan congressional delegation to support legislation to help protect the domestic dairy farming industry from, what they term potentially disastrous effects of repeated large-scale importation of dairy products.

The congressional support was called for in 1 of several policy resolutions adopted by MMPA, the state's largest milk marketing cooperative, at its annual meeting March 22 on the Michigan State University campus in East Lansing.

"Grossly unfair. The dairymen-delegates said it is 'grossly unfair to ask US dairy farmers to compete with products heavily subsidized by foreign governments so they can sell at prices below those of domestic (dairy) products.'"

The MMPA action was prompted by proclamations by President Nixon in the past 15 months authorizing substantial increases in the volume of

various dairy products imported in 1973 when the official import quota for that commodity was 1.8 million pounds.

The Nixon Administration in early March authorized above-quota importation of 150 million pounds of nonfat dry milk through June, with an eye to officially increasing the import quota to 265 million pounds for the year.

MMPA delegates urged the Nixon Administration to enforce existing laws requiring levying of duties equal to subsidies paid by foreign governments on dairy products sent to this country.

"Only in this way can fair competition be assured," the dairymen said.

"It is our firm belief that it would be unwise to destroy this nation's dairy production capacity and make this country dependent on foreign sources," they said.

MMPA dairymen also urged the Michigan congressional delegation to back reconsideration of dairy price sup-

port level set by Agriculture Secretary Earl Butz at 80 percent of parity—the minimum level allowed by law, MMPA and other major dairy farmer groups in the nation seek a support level of 90 percent of parity to give dairy farmers the price assurances they need to continue producing milk.

Among other issues acted on by MMPA dairymen were: Fuel and fertilizer—Called on government to weigh serious agriculture's unique importance to the nation's economy and to do everything possible to assure farmers they'll have adequate fuel and fertilizer for production levels set by the government.

Lansu planning—Asserted that local governmental agencies, with state financial help if necessary, should be given primary responsibility for developing and implementing effective land use programs that preserve agricultural and open space land that might otherwise be consumed by commercial, residential or industrial development. MMPA

urged its members to become active in local land use planning efforts.

Rail transportation—Urged the federal Department of Transportation to re-evaluate plans to abandon certain rail lines in Michigan and several other northeastern states. "We firmly believe that a strong and dependable network of rail transportation is vital to the agricultural industry, and therefore, to the nation's economy as a whole. In Michigan a majority of the rail lines proposed to be abandoned are those serving rural and agricultural areas.

Environmental quality—Urged careful consideration of the economic impact of regulations established in the name of improving environmental quality. Optimum production, cannot be achieved if farmers are forced out of business by excessive investments required to meet certain environmental standards whose benefits are questionable, the dairy farmers said.

## Milk producers' leader levels blast at Nixon administration

**DETROIT** - The leader of the state's largest milk marketing cooperative has leveled criticism at the Nixon Administration and the Cost of Living Council for insensitivity to the plight of dairy farmers.

Glenn Lake, North Branch dairy farmer and president of Michigan Milk Producers Association (MMPA), recommended dismantling the Cost of Living Council on April 30 when the agency's authority expires.

"Fumbling and bungling of the American economy recommends a deep and permanent burial," Lake said in his address at the Association's annual meeting March 22 on the Michigan State University campus in East Lansing.

Termination of the council by "natural death" would be in the best interest of dairy farmers and all other Americans, he said.

Lake accused the federal government of attempting to control the destiny of the domestic dairy industry.

And he took issue with a statement of President Nixon's during a recent nationally televised press conference in Houston, Tx in which Nixon said farmers "have never had it so good."

Raps Nixon  
The dairy leader also rapped the Nixon Administration for

trying to "squeeze the economic life out of the US dairy farming industry by allowing importation of large quantities of dairy products heavily subsidized by foreign governments."

Lake said the Administration refuses to enforce laws authorizing levying of duties on subsidized dairy imports equal to the foreign government subsidies.

"We say to our consumers: We will compete with any dairymen anywhere, but not with the federal treasuries of foreign countries. And don't blame us for the high prices that will prevail after the US dairy farming industry has been decimated and the US consumer is dependent of foreign suppliers."

"We say to Congress: Give us legislation which has teeth in it and which neither this nor any other Administration can ignore." Present attitudes and policies "spell ultimate disaster for the consuming public and the domestic dairy industry," Lake said.

Delegates at the MMPA annual meeting urged Congress to reconsider the dairy price support level recommended by Agriculture Secretary Earl Butz at 80 percent of parity—the lowest allowed by law. MMPA and other majority dairy farmer groups throughout the nation seek a support level of 90 percent of parity.

Labels policies "bad" Lake said current inflationary economic trends are caused by bad fiscal policies of the federal government.

Each category—except agriculture—in the federal government's proposed \$304 billion budget for fiscal 1975 reflects substantial increases.

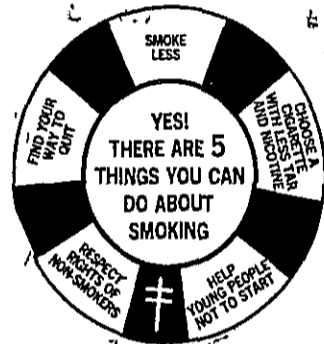
"It is our belief that as Americans we must fight to waken our national leadership to the essential character of our dairy farming industry in the national welfare," Lake said. On another issue facing dairy

farmers Lake had these comments:

"The public is highly irritated by the cost of food. In this era of extreme shortages and rising prices, we must put more effort into telling the milk consumer what she should know about our product and our industry. And we must do it in a manner that will be listened to and that is believable."

"We must begin to put wheels in motion to expand our investment in milk promotion programs."

"Somehow we must put across the message that our 5,600 members are dedicated, professional people, using efficient production methods, committed to overcoming elements over which they have little control in order to provide a nutritional and essential food on a seven-day-a-week basis. And that, in return for these efforts, they are entitled to a livelihood for their families."
