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Circulate petitions protesting Consumers rate increase

Petitions supporting a petition drive started in Flint are being circulated in this area protesting a rate increase requested by Consumers Power Co.

The petition reads: "We the undersigned, residents of Clinton County, oppose any rate increase sought by Consumers Power Co and we urge the Michigan Public Service Commission to scrutinize the firm's financial records and mandate that any needed revenue for expansion and or operation be generated with the firm by eliminating all expenditures not absolutely

necessary to the generating of power or expansion.

"It is our contention that the firm holds a government sanctioned monopoly leaving users no competition. Therefore, exorbitant expenditures for promotional efforts and advertising should not be necessary and we further feel that users should not be expected to absorb costs for expansion failures because of poor management."

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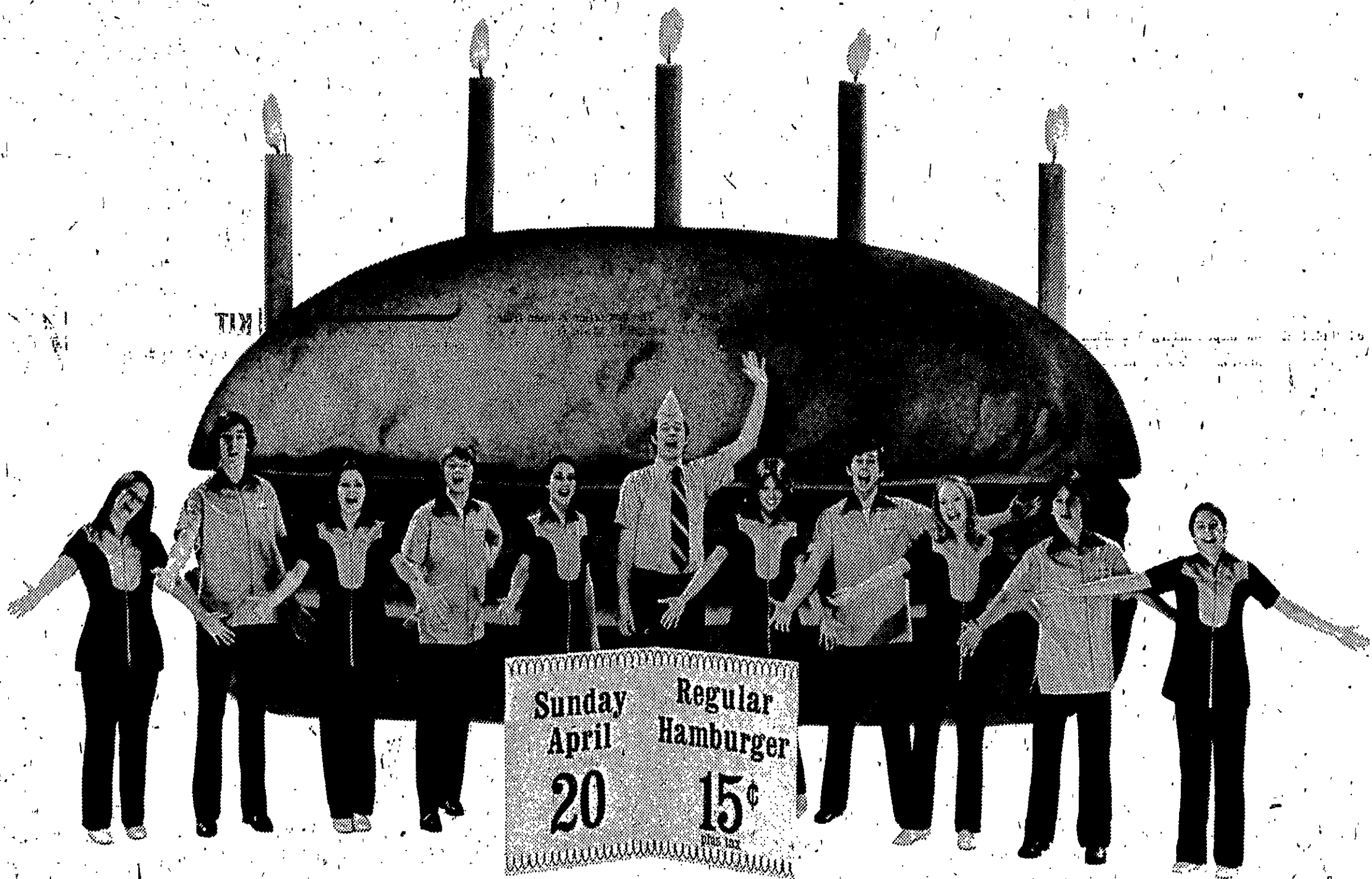
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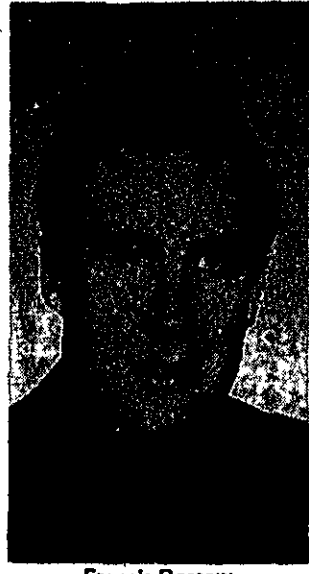
Francis Rossow named outstanding educator

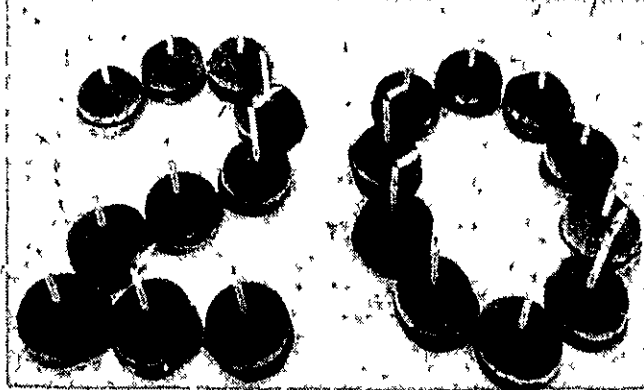

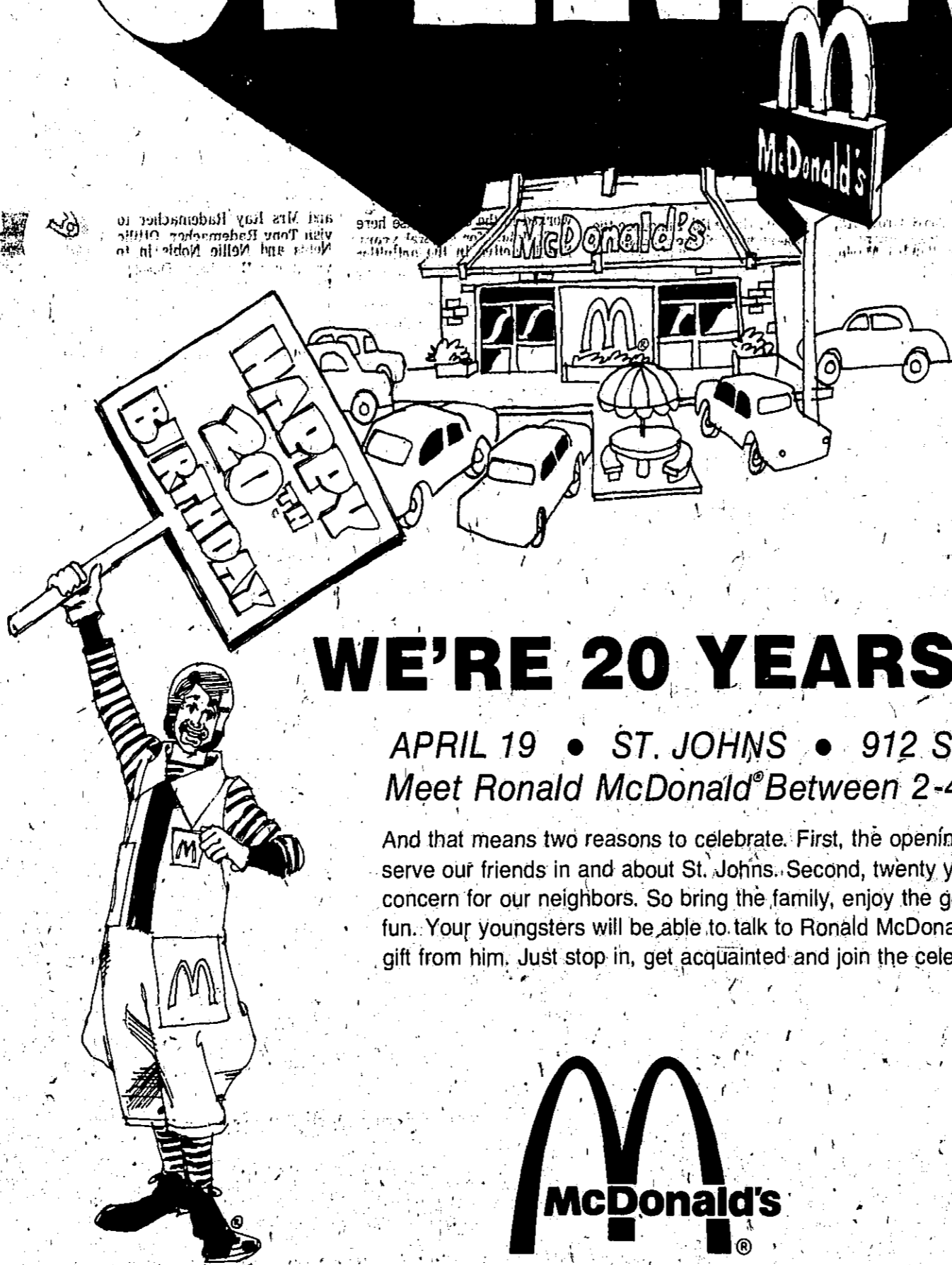

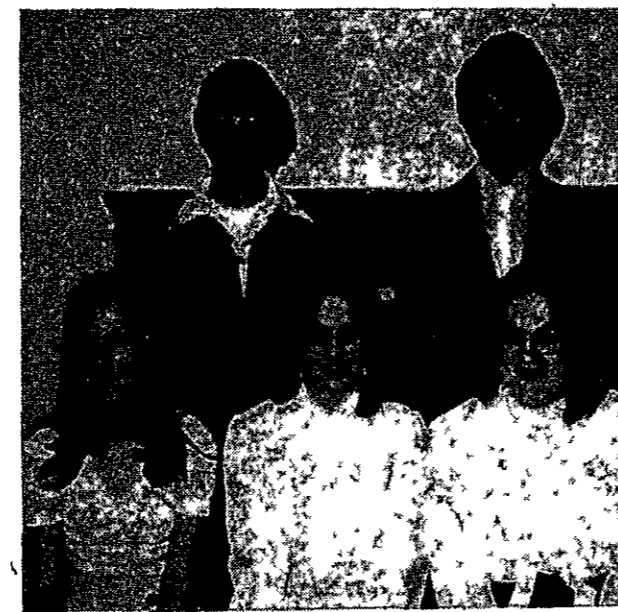

The House Labor Committee, headed by Representative Daisy Elliott (D-Detroit), is now considering the Keith committee proposal on teacher strike legislation (H.B. 4469).

The committee did not report the bill out of committee this week, but there should be some movement at next week's meeting.

Several amendments were hashed out in the meeting directed at three clauses which have been labeled repressive by chairwoman Elliott. The provisions in question are the "management rights" clause and two measures which place severe penalties on striking teachers and members of Boards of Education.

There seems to be agreement among committee members, teacher organizations and School Board Associations, that those items should be eliminated from the bill, and

the bill will undoubtedly be removed at the committee meeting next week.

A recent state Supreme Court decision in the Crestwood school case complicates the matter further. The court ruled that striking school employees can be fired without a prior hearing and without regard for tenure proceedings.

This situation emphasizes the need for fast legislative action on workable school strike legislation. If we don't act quickly now, there will be a crisis in the fall that could be a disaster for Michigan education.

In other legislative action this week, a resolution was passed creating a special committee to study and evaluate the effectiveness of the Michigan Public School Commission.

As you know, the Public Service Commission has complete power and jurisdiction to regulate all public utilities in the state, except municipally owned utilities.

Since the country's energy shortage reached a crisis situation, the public utilities have been under severe strains to provide adequate service while raising sufficient funds to continue necessary operations. There has been a constant demand by all utilities for rate increases which have also placed severe strains upon the consuming public. Particularly, the increases in energy rates have had a negative impact upon those persons living on fixed incomes and those unemployed because of present economic conditions.

The study is intended to review the operations and effectiveness of the Public Service Commission in order to firmly establish whether the present statutory duties and responsibilities of the PSC are adequate to safeguard the interests of the consumer.

"If It Fitz . . ."

Nixon needed a dummy.

It would have been a splendid thing for all involved if Richard Nixon had hired a Miami dummy instead of H.R. Haldeman.

For \$25,000, Haldeman appeared on CBS-TV to show his hope movies which revealed for the first time how fat John Erlichman looks in a bathing suit.

The 2-hour interview with Mike Wallace also provided America with its first sustained look at Haldeman's new haircut. When he testified before the Watergate committee last year, Haldeman had a tight brushcut and he looked like an army lieutenant in 1943. Today he wears his hair longish, expensively cut and blown dry. It's a good disguise, but the CIA reports he still wears khaki underwear.

MANY THOUGHTFUL journalists, electronic and hand-propelled, have criticized CBS for "buying news." There is great fear that an alarming precedent has been set. If an interview with Haldeman is worth \$25,000, how much would Walter Cronkite pay for a few words with Richard Nixon?

When the last domino falls, the world may never hear it because Mike Wallace didn't have anything smaller than a \$100 bill and Henry Kissinger didn't have change.

But back to Haldeman. The most interesting thing he said for \$25,000 was that an important part of his White House job was to sometimes NOT do what Nixon ordered him to do.

Haldeman explained that Nixon sometimes wanted some weird things done (the noise you did not hear was the sound of millions of TV viewers not falling off their chairs upon hearing this non-news). Nixon would insist that Haldeman do this dumb thing immediately and Haldeman would say "Yes sir, right away."

BUT THEN HE wouldn't do it. Haldeman deliberately disobeyed orders from the commander in chief. "I knew he was just letting off

steam," Haldeman said for \$25,000. A few days later Nixon would ask him if the dirty deed had been performed and Haldeman would say no and Nixon would say, "Good, I knew you wouldn't do it."

Haldeman did not say what he refused to do for Nixon. He probably figures such information is worth more than \$25,000. In view of what he DID do for his leader, he is right. Some publisher would probably pay \$2 million for blueprints of Nixon's aborted plan to drop a nuclear bomb on the Washington Post.

But I cannot help but ponder how differently history would read if Haldeman had disobeyed EVERY Nixon order. Better yet, what if Nixon had left Haldeman in Disneyland and instead installed a Miami dummy as his chief aide?

On a few Miami freeways, they are adding outside lanes reserved strictly for cars with at least 3 occupants. The idea is to encourage car pools and save gasoline. Policemen count the bodies as they speed by. Sneaky motorists who don't have 2 friends are using inflation to drive in the express lanes illegally. They inflate 2 life-size rubber dummies, put hats on them, and put one in the backseat and one in the front.

IF ONE OF THOSE dummies had been anchored at H.R. Haldeman's desk, none of Richard Nixon's orders would have been obeyed. There would have been no Watergate coverup. Nixon would still be in the White House, spouting harmless steam at a rubber dummy, and Gerald Ford would still be playing football without a helmet. It would be a far, far better world for all. But . . .

Haldeman says he needs a job so he can pay his lawyers. His sad experience with Nixon has obviously taught Haldeman the great value of just sitting and doing nothing. Maybe there's a Miami driver with an opening for a dummy in khaki underwear.

April 13, 1950
A drink-crazed Valley Farms man killed State Trooper George R. Branney, 26, late Wednesday afternoon and then killed himself after a gun duel with other State Police.

Roger Davarn, 49, well-known Fowler businessman and manager of the Davarn Elevator for the past 10 years, passed away at his home there today at 11:30 am. He had been in ill health for the past 5 months.

Michigan townships, blessed by \$26,798,834 in sales tax diversion money to date are going to the rescue of mud-mired rural roads. During 1949, in 68 of the 83 Michigan counties, township boards transferred to county road commissions a total of \$3,150,000 under provisions of Public Act No. 34, 1948 special legislative session.

10 YEARS AGO

April 15, 1965
A plan for a huge recreation area, including a 552-acre lake in Ovid and Victor Townships was presented to the Clinton County Board of Supervisors Tuesday by the State Conservation Department.

One child died and four others were injured Sunday night as the tornado season's "first twister" slashed across central DeWitt Township. It destroyed at least five homes and caused extensive property damage, mostly in the Turner-Clark Road area about 2 1/2 miles south

of DeWitt. The approval of annexation to the St. Johns School District by four rural districts Saturday brings to 17 the number which have joined St. Johns in the last few weeks. Fifteen other districts are scheduled to vote on the question in the next three weeks.

DeWitt Township voters Monday soundly rejected a proposed \$730,000 bond issue to help finance a new sewer system. The issue was beaten 650 to 298.

St. Johns should have no trouble in selling \$200,000 in water revenue bonds to meet the cost of the current water improvement program.

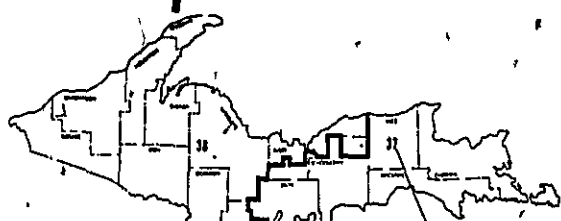
One hundred thirty St. Johns area residents took a few minutes out of their days recently to donate blood at the Red Cross Bloodmobile.

The Clinton County Board of Commissioners approved a tentative 1975 budget April 9 of \$2,553,816, about half a million dollars from the 1974 figure.

DeWitt's City Council voiced their support at their most recent meeting for a county-wide property appraisal. Told of their support of county-wide reappraisal, County Commissioner Roger Overway said he would bring up the matter at the next Commission meeting (April 23) to get it on the floor, but could not say whether it would pass or not.

Results of Automobile Club of Michigan's "Ban Topless Trucks" campaign were delivered to members of the Senate Highways and Transportation Committee in Lansing. The state map (above) shows the distribution by Senate districts of more than 120,000 motorists' "Topless Truck" complaints gathered by Auto Club in a five-month period last year. A total of 1040 complaints were registered from Clinton County. Auto Club Executive Vice-President Richard R. Dann stated that the campaign began in January, 1974, and the public response resulted in the most successful public-appeal program in the organization's history. He added that Auto Club is still receiving 25 to 30 unsolicited cards and letters of complaints about "Topless Trucks" from the public weekly. Legislation now before the Senate Highways Committee has already cleared the House with Auto Club's support. Dann told Senate Highways Committee members that although the proposed legislation is not as strong as originally requested, it is a much more effective law than now exists for helping insure that trucks hauling loose cargo do not litter, damage autos and endanger the lives of motorists. Auto Club states that uncovered trucks carrying loose material are the cause of \$11 million worth of broken auto windshields annually in Michigan, not counting untold millions of dollars damage to car bodies, tires and headlights.

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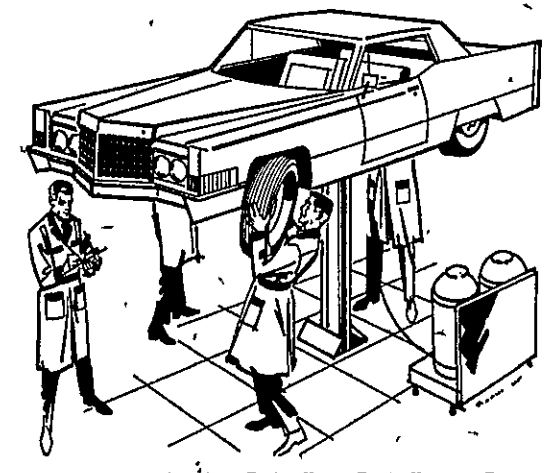
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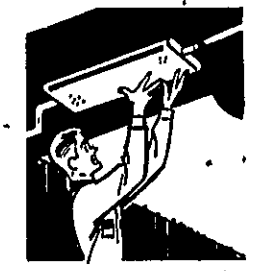

"Time is money." We've all heard that old saying. And it's true - time is money in many ways. Your time - plus your special skills, knowledge and experience - is what you trade for those paychecks you use to buy the goods and services you need to live.

A layoff or unemployment means time on your hands and no paycheck coming in. Time is still money, however, because you can use the time you have to make or fix up, make do or do for yourself what you would ordinarily pay money for. Here are a few ideas:

- Cook more of your meals "from scratch." Try some of these money-saving recipes you've been clipping and saving. Improve your cooking with the help of a friend or relative who's a good cook.

- If you have the necessary skills, make or make over clothes for you and your family. Recycle hand-me-downs into

usable clothing by changing trim and other details, finding new ways to put old things together or remaking garments entirely.

It's time to give your budget a once-over to find out where your money is really going and to sharpen your managerial skills to get the most satisfaction out of what you have to work with.

It's time to be a more careful shopper, to read labels more closely, to become acquainted with shopping aids like unit pricing and open dating and to develop smart shopping habits. It's more time to spend with your spouse and children; time to give to community concerns; time for yourself - to do, to be, to explore, to develop.

Time on your hands? Don't just pass it - spend it.

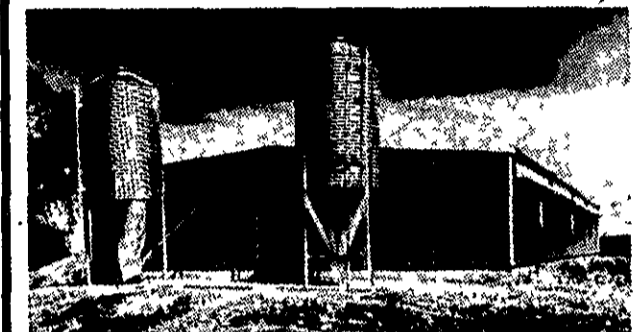
