## Police investigate armed robberies

### Two service stations

Two armed robberies, 1 Friday night and the other Sunday night, are being investigated by police agencies in Clinton County.

Bath Township Police are investigating an armed robbery Friday night at 10:15 at the Sunoco Station, 7227 E.M-78.

The station is owned by the Lansing Lewis Company.

Police report 2 men operating the station were held at knife-point during the \$68 robbery.

OPERATING the business during the

robbery were Heffel LaClear, 69, and his son Harvey LaClear, 28.

They described the individual who robbed the station as being a white male about 22 years old.

In a Sunday night robbery, \$26 in cash was taken after the operator of the Hudson Gas Station was struck on the head by an individual wielding a large piece of cement.

Sheriff's Dept deputies report that David Munroe, 47, of Lansing was closing the station at US-27 and

Sheridan Rd, when he was knocked unconscious.

His attacker took the \$26 but, apparently, didn't find more money that Munroe was carrying at the time. Most of the station money was in a safe and was not taken.

According to the Clinton County Sheriff's Dept, the station has been robbed 3 times since January of this year.

## County resists equalization

CLINTON COUNTY - County officials say they will resist a possible 7.2 percent equalization factor that the State Tax Commission may levy on all of Clinton County.

County officials say the proposed

equalization factor was not based on research done in the county, as was their equalization report. Leon Thelen, county equalization director, presented the county approved factors at a County Commissioners meeting last week. The

county approved factors for 5 townships - Bengal, 1.14; Duplain, 1.05; Greenbush, 1.11; Ovid, 1.12; and Watertown, 1.05.

## City action defeats larger lot size

ST. JOHNS - The proposed ordinance #254 which would extend minimum lot requirements in areas zoned R-2 and R-3, went down to defeat 3-2 at Monday

### FACT finder

Q-My son is nearing the time when he must register for the draft. We have heard there is no office in St. Johns. Where does he register?

A-Although the draft is not being utilized to call men to service, it is still required by law for young men to register 30 days before or after their 18th birthday. If that time falls during April, your son may participate in a "draft registration by mail" program now in progress. Draft registration application forms may be picked up at the County Courthouse, DeWitt High School, Fowler High School, Bath High School, Ovid-Elsie High School, Pewamo-Westphalia High School, St. Johns High School and St. Johns City Hall. The form should be filled out, mailed to the Lansing Selective Service Area Office and the draft board will send a registration form and instructions. The completed registration card is then returned by mail to the draft board.

night's City Commission meeting.

The ordinance would have extended minimum lot width from the present 55 feet to 75 feet, and total lot area for a single family dwelling would be 7000 square feet or 5000 square feet per family in multiple dwellings in areas zoned R-2, except for pre-platted lots.

In R-3 areas, the ordinance would have required a change from 55 feet to 75 feet along the street, and 7000 square feet minimum for single family dwellings, with a 3000 square feet requirement for multiple family units, with the exception of those lots already platted.

Commissioner Roy Ebert defended the Planning Commission's recommendation for the change, saying that those who want to deviate could still appeal. "We should protect the property owners already there," he said.

A member of the audience, Bill Richards, presented the argument that if the ordinance was passed, young couples and older people would have no place to live due to prohibitive construction costs resulting from the increased minimum size of lots.

Richards stated that many young married couples obtain financing for houses from the Farmer's Home Administration, which won't finance a 3 bedroom home for more than \$21,500. Most homes built on the larger lots cost around \$28,000 and up, he said, and would be prohibitively expensive for them.

And older people, he said, need compact housing - they can't afford to hire someone to help with the upkeep of a larger dwelling.

"If you want to control multiple dwellings," he stated, "You should restrict the size of houses on lots."

"This ordinance," Richards declared, "would squeeze young and older people out of the market."

A roll call vote was taken with Commissioner Ebert and Mayor Robert Wood in favor of the ordinance's adoption. Commissioners Rand, Hannah and Grost were opposed to the change.

In other action the City Commission approved, again by a 3-2 vote, annexation of the Sullivan Farm property, owned by the Searles family.

City attorney Paul Maples presented a report answering 4 questions posed by the Commission at an earlier meeting regarding possible annexation. His report stated that conditional annexation is not possible; the city can require construction, at the Searles' expense, a holding basin for storm water; the city can control subdivision plats, but cannot control the number of building permits.

Doug Austin, an attorney representing the Searles, reminded the City Commission of built-in economic controls contractors must abide by already. These were zoning ordinances, plat approval and ability to sell property; i.e., they could not sell houses with faulty drainage facilities.

Commissioner Jean Rand moved again to annex the Sullivan Farm, supported by Dr. James Grost. A roll call vote was taken, with commissioner Ebert and Mayor Wood opposed, and Commissioners Grost, Rand and Hannah in favor of annexation.

The City Attorney will check to see if they will have to go to the Boundary Commission.

Ordinance #255, prohibiting motorized vehicles off the road and parking spaces, was passed unanimously.

A public hearing on the Cass St curb and gutter was held. An attorney representing Royal and Archie Brown, who own lots 1 and 2 on Cass St, stated their concern with the water problem on their property. They would like to know, he said, if they could have private tie-ins to drain off water. The Commission authorized City Manager Harvey Weatherwax to have engineers make a study of the property.

A resolution of necessity was passed. Both the Schmaltz and Zeeb rezoning requests were sent to the Planning Commission for study.

A public hearing was set for May 29

regarding the Bowersox rezoning request, which asks for a change in zoning from industrial high performance to commercial property located on S US-27. The property is currently partially zoned commercial and partly industrial high performance.

Bowersox proposes to build a shopping center on the property. His attorney stated that they have 4 interests expressed in locating there currently. He said the A&P Tea Co, Scott's Dept Stores, a drug store and a major hardware chain have expressed interest in building at the shopping center.

Representatives from St. Johns businesses, Kurt Becker, Tom Wilson from Quality Discount, and Barry Dean expressed opposition to the proposed rezoning.

Becker said that having 4 shopping centers in St. Johns would split up the city and none would survive.

Wilson questioned the local support these businesses would provide.

Sal Ferrari, one of the developers, said the interested businesses would like to service those shoppers who currently go through St. Johns to Lansing. "Convenience is the key word," he said, and added that "Businessmen, by nature, get involved with the community."

"Don't forget the jobs that would be provided, as well as a good tax base," he said.

Commissioner Rand noted that she didn't think the center would hurt downtown merchants, because so many area residents go to Lansing already. She said she would only vote in favor of the shopping center if she felt it wouldn't hurt them.

The public hearing was set, and Maples was directed to draft an ordinance and hear the State's recommendation on resolution of possible traffic problems construction of the center would entail.

The public hearing on the Cass St Water main assessment was rescheduled for May 14 at 8 pm.

ST JOHNS -- The Clinton Area Ambulance Service is moving into its 3d month of operation, with much of the financial support of the organization coming through private donations of money, time and equipment.

Herb Brown, manager of the volunteer service, explained the importance of that support and said, "We would like to thank everyone who contributed in any way with time, donations or equipment."

Brown further explained that the service, in addition to providing the vehicle and emergency first aid service, will assist Medicare and Medicaid patients in filling out all necessary forms if

they are moved by ambulance.

The service, manned 24 hours a day by trained volunteers operating 2

vehicles, serves Bengal, Bingham, Dallas, Essex, Greenbush, Riley and Olive Townships, St. Johns and the villages of Fowler and Maple

### It's Postal Week at St. Johns

ST JOHNS -- St. Johns Postmaster Keith A. Mishler disclosed today that

customers visiting the Post Office on "Postal People Day", April 30, will be given attractive free souvenir envelopes.

US Postmaster General E.T. Klassen, in proclaiming the week of April 29 through May 5 as "Postal Week," called it "an appropriate occasion for recognition of the vital responsibilities assigned to the mail service and a valid time to take stock of the challenges which must be jointly met by postal people and by the millions of citizens throughout America who depend upon the mail as an essential part of their personal and business lives."

As part of the observance, the St. Johns Post Office will join with the nations 31,000 other post offices in issuing 10 special stamps honoring postal employees

The souvenir envelopes, to be available in a limited quantity on a "first come" basis at the local post office April 30, will be imprinted or "cacheted."

In addition, the Postmaster said a quantity of cacheted envelopes will be prepared in advance bearing all 10 Postal People stamps. These "first day" covers as they are known to collectors, will be postmarked by hand with the local post office postmark and will be sold for only the actual charge for the ten stamps, or 80¢ as long as they last.

"As the Postmaster General said in his message, we need the informed understanding, cooperation and support of every citizen. I think that we have this to an exceptional degree in St. Johns, Postmaster Mishler said.

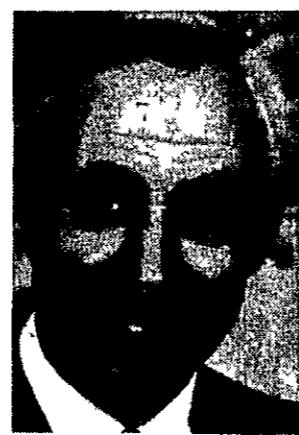

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# State Rep Dale Warner condemns possible equalization factor

LANSING -- State Representative Dale Warner (R-Eaton Rapids) has condemned as "unfair, arbitrary, and excessive" the tentative 7.2 percent equalization factor assigned to Clinton County by the State Tax Commission.

Warner, a member of the House Judiciary Committee and former ranking

Republican on the House Subcommittee on Property Assessment, said, "This factor, if finalized, would constitute an enormous and unfair burden for Clinton County property owners." "I very strongly oppose having the State Tax Commission come in to an area and assign a factor based on no first-hand information or property appraisals whatsoever," said Warner. "A 7.2 percent assessment increase could force many homeowners out of their residences and could

make the difference between profit or loss for many farmers." Warner has sponsored legislation to strip the Commission of some of its powers, including all of its power to hear appeals from its own administrative determinations.

"At the very least," said Representative Warner, "we need legislation such as House Bill 4258 which would allow a taxpayer to appeal directly if wronged by an equalization factor."

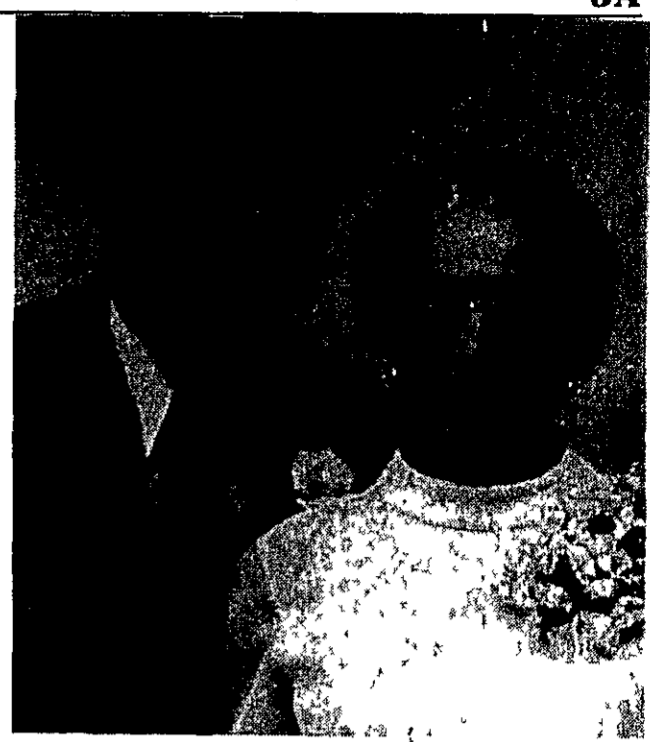

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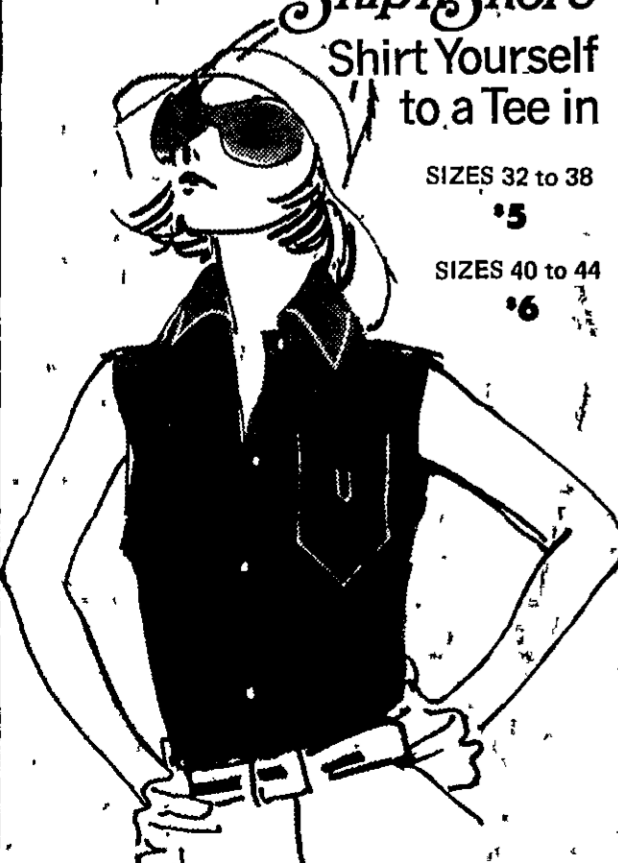

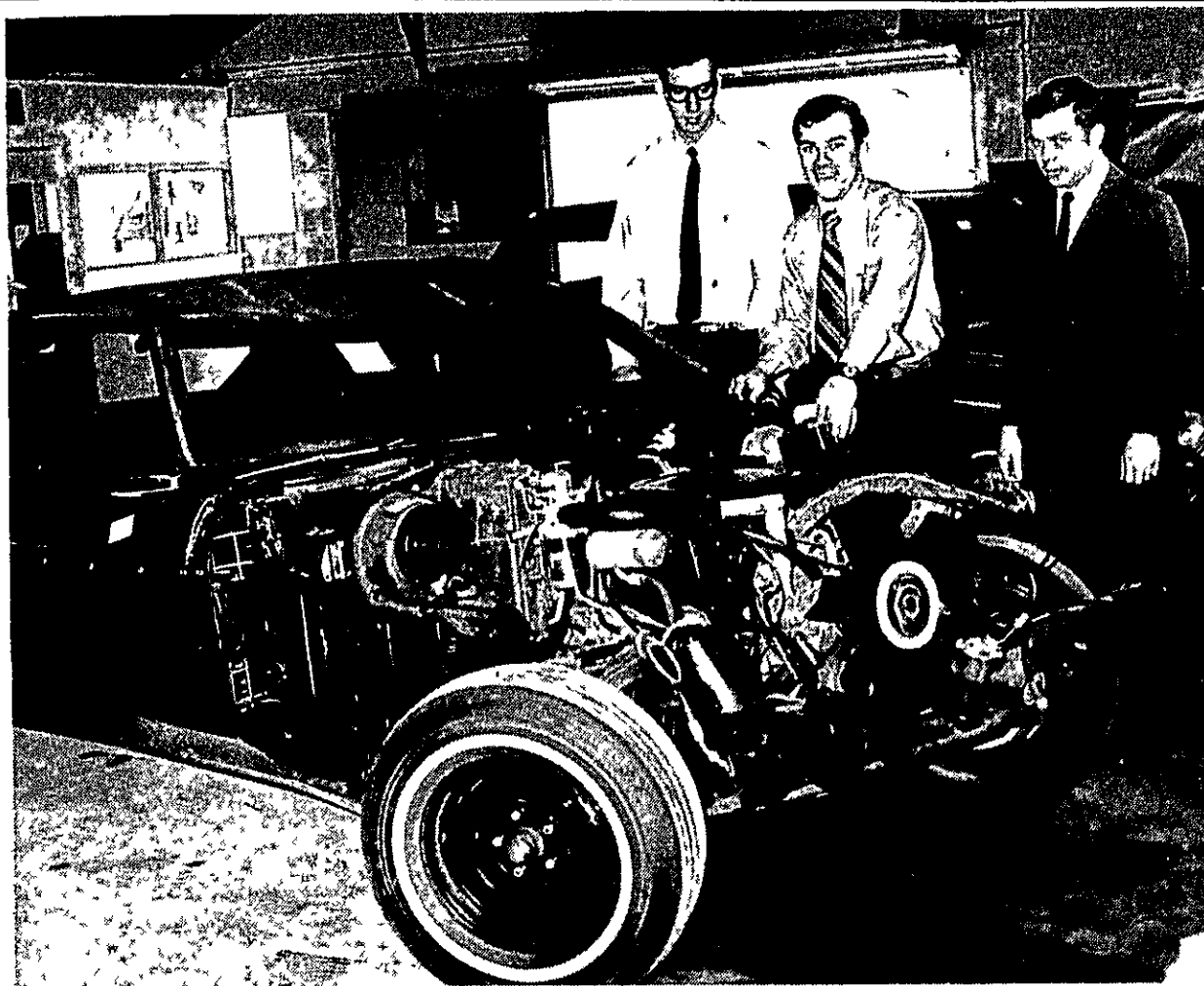

**Ordinance No. 255**

AN ORDINANCE TO REGULATE THE USE OF AUTOMOBILES, MOTORCYCLES, MINI-BIKES, AND OTHER MOTOR DRIVEN VEHICLES WITHIN THE CITY OF ST. JOHNS CITY PARK.

THE CITY OF ST. JOHNS ORDAINS:

Section 1. No person shall operate a motor vehicle, automobile, motorcycle, trailbike, mini-bike or other motor driven vehicle within the limits of the City Park except on roadways designated for vehicular traffic or designated parking areas.

Section 2. Snowmobiles are not included in the above definition of motor vehicles and may be operated within the City Park of St. Johns but only in those areas specifically designated for the operation of snowmobile vehicles.

Section 3. Penalty. Any person who shall violate the provisions of this Ordinance, upon conviction thereof, shall be punished by a fine not to exceed \$100.00 or by imprisonment not to exceed ninety (90) days or by both such fine and imprisonment.

Section 4. Severance Clause. The provisions of this Ordinance are declared to be severable and if any section, sentence, clause or phrase of this Ordinance shall, for any reason, be held to be invalid or unconstitutional, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining Sections, sentences, clauses and phrases of this Ordinance but they shall remain in effect, it being the legislative intent that this Ordinance shall stand notwithstanding the invalidity of any part.

Section 5. Effective Date. This Ordinance shall take effect from and after the 20th day after its passage and publication as required by law.

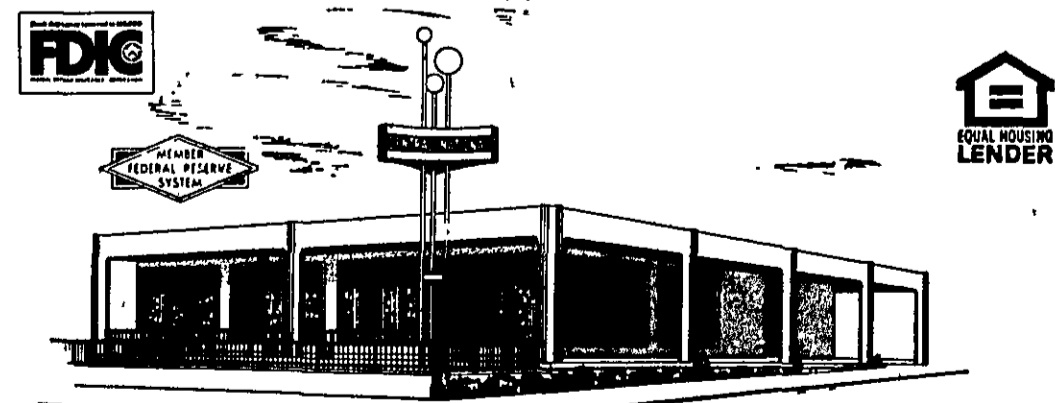

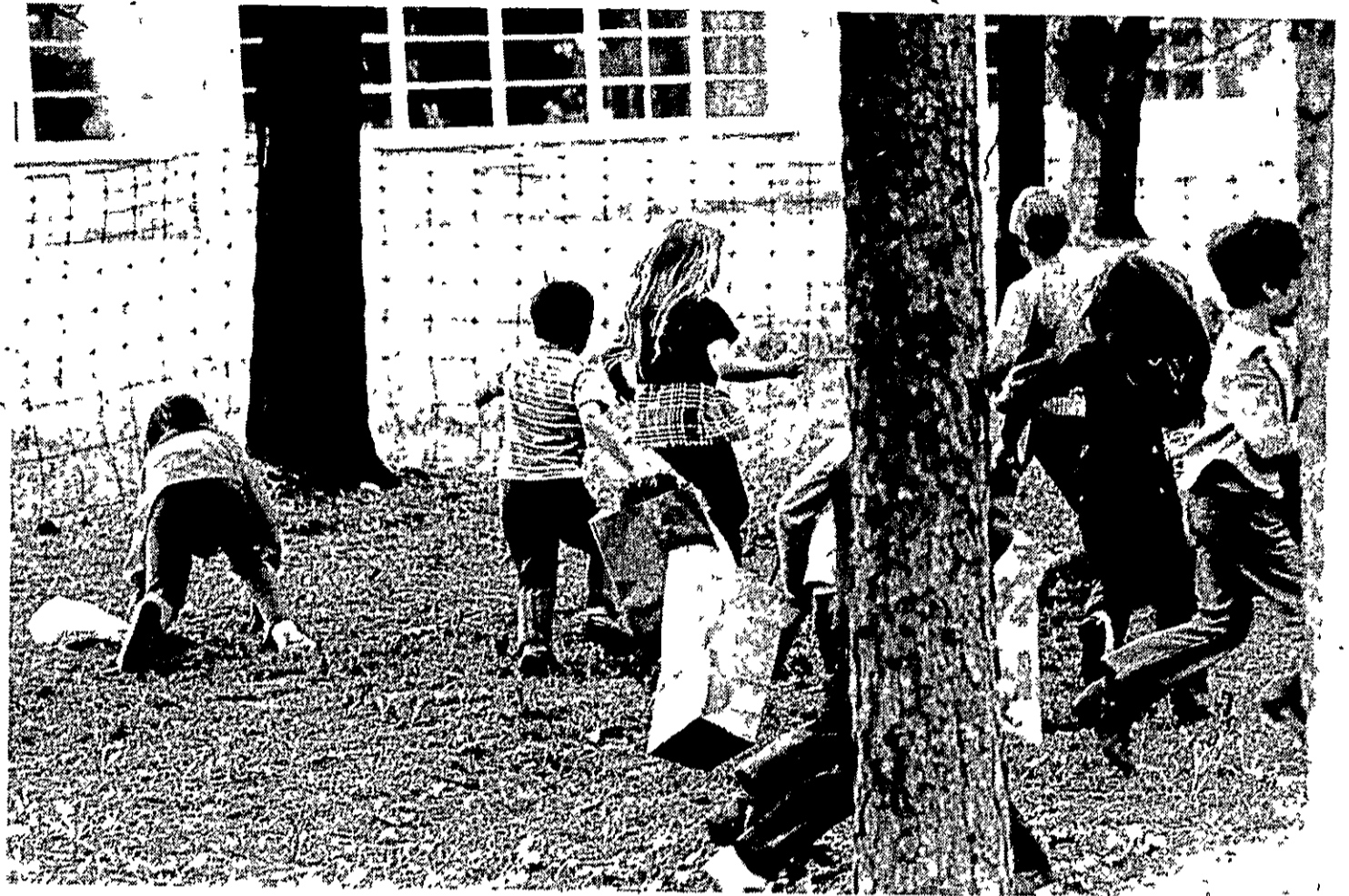

View from the Senate

homestead that exceeds 3.5 percent of their income up to a relief of \$500. A sliding scale provides additional reimbursement for those who earn less than \$6,000.

property) for both incorporated and unincorporated businesses. The Senate amendment also would allow a refund where the credit exceeds the liability.

In the first place, the way the bill (HB 4207) went from the Senate to the House may not be the way the bill will finally come out.

Also under the House version of the bill, blind persons would be entitled to payment of their homestead taxes if the homestead valuation was less than \$3500.

While all the figures aren't yet in for me to be able to "guesstimate" how much this tax relief package will cost the state, it's estimated that, as presently written, the package may rebate as much as \$400 million in taxes over the next two years.

In the second place, it takes a combination of a Philadelphia lawyer and a certified public accountant to figure out what your "relief" will be.

Under such a program, present property tax exemptions are eliminated from the local governmental units' tax bill.

Most knowledgeable financial experts in the Capitol, including the Governor who proposed the idea in the first place, feel this is too much if the state is to avert a fiscal crisis two years from now.

Let's take simple things first. At present, you're allowed a personal exemption against your state income tax of \$1200 per person. The House raised that to \$1700 - reducing your tax base so that you'll pay less taxes. But the Senate version cut that exemption to \$1500 - still a reduction in your tax base but not so large a one as the House had in mind.

Those now receiving the homestead exemption will have to file a Michigan income tax form to receive the property tax credit (relief).

In other words, the legislative tax "give away" Christmas tree may have to be trimmed and pruned a little in the next few weeks before it finally becomes law.

Under Governor Milliken's original bill, the present credit allowed against your income tax for a percentage of the property taxes you pay was wiped out. In the House version, this was replaced by a complicated formula under which the state would reimburse you for 60 percent of the taxes you pay on your homestead (the place where you live, but not other property you own) above four percent of your personal income. There would be a "relief" limit of \$400.

The Senate retained both House provisions involving senior citizens and the blind, and, in addition, improved the bill for veterans by completely removing the present state equalized valuation ceiling for all veterans.

In other words, the legislative tax "give away" Christmas tree may have to be trimmed and pruned a little in the next few weeks before it finally becomes law.

Because it was reducing the exemption figure mentioned above from \$1700 to \$1500, the Senate decided to enrich the House credit formula by granting relief on all property taxes above 3.5 percent of income, rather than 4 percent. The Senate also added a provision that those whose property taxes do not exceed 3.5 percent of their income still are entitled to relief on the amount of property taxes they pay above 4% of their income.

So much for property tax and personal income tax relief as presently encompassed in HB 4207.

At great inconvenience to myself, this year I made it a point to purchase the plates for my two cars in St. Johns. I stood in line for over an hour, just waiting for the place to open, when I could have simply walked into any Lansing office, spent five minutes, and picked up my plates.

This, in fact, was an amendment I added to the bill on the Senate floor. I believe the language I inserted will substantially increase the amount of property tax relief for those who really need it most - particularly farmers. This provision also applies to renters, with 17 percent of rent paid representing taxes just as it is the case now.

I should also mention that, in addition to HB 4207, the House, in a companion measure (HB 4323), provided for a reduction of intangibles taxes from 50 cents to 40 cents per \$1,000 for bank deposits and shares of savings and loan institutions. HB 4323 also increased the intangibles tax credit from \$100 to \$125 for an individual and from \$200 to \$250 for a joint return.

And the side roads? They are horrible. Never, have I ever seen roads in such poor repair. Even the roads in Wayne, Oakland and Macomb counties are in better shape than these. And the road commission can't come back with the weak excuse that it's been a bad winter. Roads don't get this bad unless there has been a concerted effort of benign neglect.

The Senate version of the bill retained the reduction from 50 cents to 40 cents, but increased the intangibles tax credit from \$125 to \$175 for individuals and from \$250 to \$350 for a joint return.

But now, I feel I have a right to complain. Before my plates were purchased elsewhere, now I want to get my money's worth.

I suggest our road commission get off of their Republican backsides and do something about these rotten roads and do it soon. If they don't, I'll be happy to volunteer to lead a broom swinging band of county highway users into that commission and clean them out.

Perhaps it would be wise for the citizens of the county to ask the State to audit the commission books - just so we know what happened to the \$1,143,999.39 highway users donated through their taxes to the road commission to provide us with good roads.

## Farm Tips

### Give pesticides their credit

Mass hunger and disease still exists in the world and in some places the outlook is bleak. Despite improved farming practices, including the application of pesticides and fertilizers, world food production has barely kept pace with population growth in this century and half the world's population has an inadequate diet.

But for the first time in history, there is promise, at least for large numbers of people in some parts of the world, of enough food and an environment virtually free of pest-transmitted diseases. And chemical pesticides have helped accomplish this.

Here in the United States, consumers spend less of their income for food - about 15% - than any other people anywhere. The chief reason is more efficient food production. Here, too, chemical pesticides make important contributions.

Despite the fears and real problems they create, pesticides clearly are responsible for part of the physical well-being enjoyed by most people in the United States. They also contribute significantly to the existing standard of living in other nations.

Pest control of some kind is essential because crops, livestock and people live in a potentially hostile environment. Besides protecting for our food supply, pests may be disease carriers or nuisances. Man co-exists with more than 1,000,000 kinds of insects, many of which are pests;

with bacteria and fungi that cause 1,500 plant diseases, and with many hundreds of weed species - not to mention rodents and other vertebrate pests.

The United States still loses up to one third of its potential crop production to various pests. Without modern pest control, and that includes chemical pesticides, this annual loss in the United States would probably double. If that happened, it's probable that:

Farm costs would increase considerably (by as much as 40%).

The average consumer family would spend much more of its income on food (34% vs. 15%).

The number of people who work on farms would have to be increased.

Pesticides are used not only to produce more food, but food that is virtually free of insects or damage from insects or diseases. Particularly in the United States, pesticides are often used because of public demand, supported by stringent government regulations, for uncontaminated and unblemished food.

It is not an overstatement to say that pesticides have contributed greatly to the high quality of the food which we enjoy today and that they have saved countless lives, especially in tropical countries, and that pesticides have generally contributed to a higher standard of living for man in many countries of the world.

Pesticides, like automobiles, can create environmental problems, but in today's world it is difficult to get along without them. Many pesticides can be a hazard to living things other than pests, sometimes including people. This is especially true if they are not used or disposed of properly. However, modern techniques of food production and control of disease-carrying insects require pesticides.

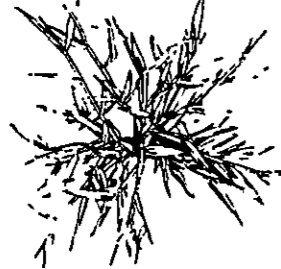
The concerned citizen can be sure of one thing; all-or-nothing answers won't work. At our present stage of technology, banning all chemical pesticides would be disastrous. So would the opposite - completely uncontrolled use of pesticides.

Few persons in the scientific world, or government, or agriculture favor such extreme answers. Instead they suggest more effort on:

(1) Continued development of new and better methods of pest control, including pesticides.

(2) Effective regulations of pest control, based on scientific facts and broadly based social values.

There is another requirement; recognition by the public of the need to accept some risks, after carefully balancing them against benefits. This calls for more understanding by everyone of both the contributions made by pesticides and the possible problems that accompany their use.

Develop your plan around the activities you like to do now. Then add some on-going projects, visits, volunteer activities, trips, books or whatever to that.

You'll have more time to plan for, so you may even want to take some lessons and learn a new skill or hobby, even a new job.

Look back to your childhood and young adulthood, think of that other career or hobby you wanted to learn, or work at that you just didn't have the time to do.

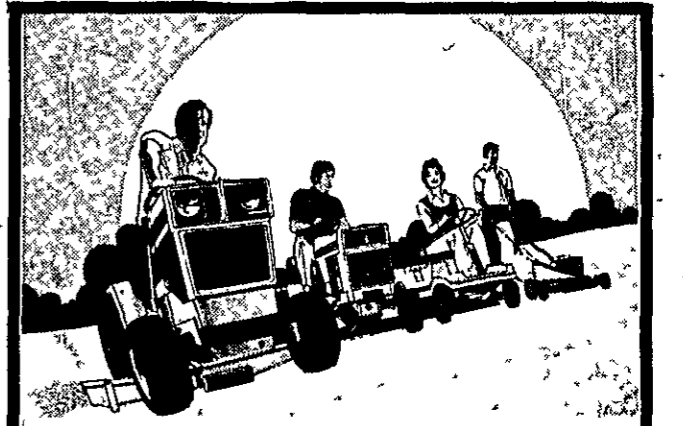

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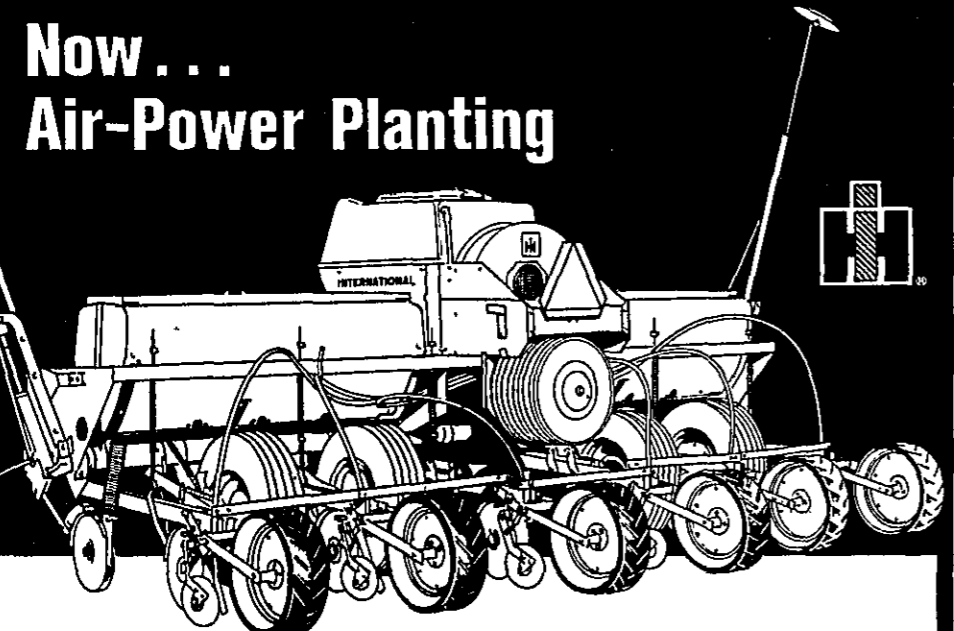

## Record sign-up in 1973 farm program

Enrollment in the 1973 Feed Grain and Wheat Program surpassed the record enrollment in the 1972 program. This announcement was made by Walter Wittenbach, Chairman of the Michigan State Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) Committee. In Michigan over 61,500 are signed up in the Wheat Program and over 64,000 farms in the Feed Grain Program. The farms enrolled in the Wheat Program represents 72 percent of all Michigan farms with wheat allotments. These farms have over 87 percent of

Michigan's wheat allotment acreage. About 64 percent of farms with feed grain bases enrolled in the 1973 Feed Grain Program. These farms have close to 90 percent of our State's total feed grain base.

Nationally, a new record sign-up was set in the 1973 Feed Grain Program. The number of farms enrolled exceeded 1.8 million which is over 78,000 more than enrolled in 1972. The base on enrolled farms totals 113 million acres and represents 87 percent of the total national feed grain base. Because of the liberal set-aside requirements, there will be a little over 9 million

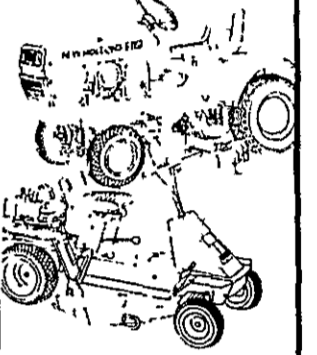
acres set-aside in 1973 as compared to 37 million acres set-aside in 1972.

Over one million farms signed up to participate in the 1973 Wheat Program. This is over 36,000 more than enrolled last year and represents 79 percent of the total eligible farms. These farms have over 94 percent of the total national wheat allotment. Participants in the 1973 Wheat Program were not required to set-aside any acreage.

HOWEVER, UNDER an option available, they could set-aside some acreage for an additional payment. Of the one million farms enrolled, only about 140,000 elected to set-aside any acreage. Farmers are now being notified what their total 1973 program requirements are. Wittenbach said.

In closing, he stated that farmers must certify compliance with program requirements no later than June 30, 1973. Preliminary payments will be made as soon as possible after July 1, 1973.



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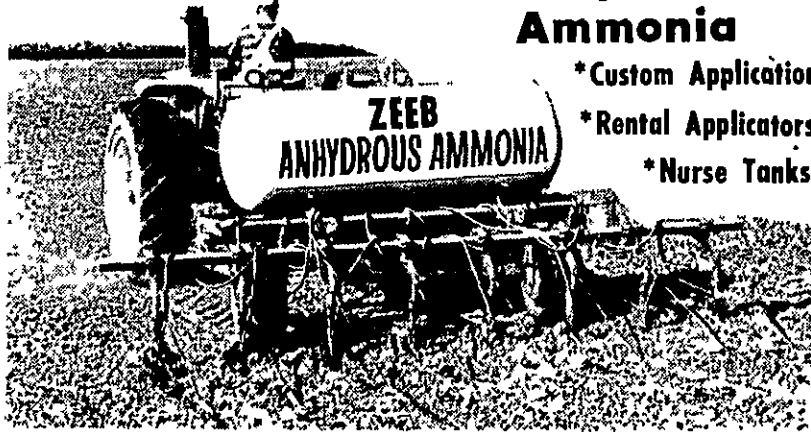
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
