## Youth killed Friday

ST. JOHNS -- A 12-year-old boy lost his life Friday afternoon after being struck by a car while playing in a yard beside US-27, about 6 miles south of St. Johns.

Fatally injured was William Richard Russell, 12, living with foster parents at their Rt 5, St. Johns home.

According to witnesses, the Russell youth was struck by a car driven by Dennis Earl Mosher, 27, Farwell, who was said to have left US-27, traveled 200 feet off the roadway before striking the victim.

After the youth was struck by the car, it is estimated he was carried 175 feet. After continuing on for several feet and back on to the highway, Mosher drove back to the scene, where he apparently collapsed when he got out of the automobile.

He was taken to Clinton Memorial Hospital where he was released the next day.

The accident is under investigation by the Clinton County Sheriff's Dept.

## Treize seeks Ballenger Senate office

OWOSSO -- State Rep. Douglas Treize announced Wednesday that he will be a candidate for the State Senate this year in the new 30th District.

The Owosso Republican, now completing his second 2-year term in the State House of Representatives, is the first declared candidate for the seat now held by Sen. William S. Ballenger, who is seeking reelection to Congress.

"My decision comes after weeks of talks with citizens in my House District and in most other portions of the Senate District," Rep. Treize said.

"As a resident of the district for more than 20 years, I believe my legislative record and views are very representative of those of a sizeable majority of its approximately 235,000 residents. I am looking forward to the campaign and the opportunity to present this record and views to the people."

Rep. Treize, 49, has held elective office for the past 10 years as a charter commissioner, councilman and mayor of Owosso and as a state legislator. He also served on the Shiawassee County Board of Supervisors for 4 years.

Prior to entering public life on a full-time basis in 1970, he was the central division manager for the General Telephone Company.

The 30th District includes all of Clinton County, all of Eaton County except Sunfield Township, most of southern Ingham County, the western parts of Shiawassee and Gratiot Counties, Blackman, Rives and Tompkins Townships in Jackson County, Lee Township in Calhoun County, Castleton and

party leaders and supporters, the meetings were held in Cadillac, Midland, St. Charles and Alma.

Dr Marble was formerly president of Delta College and was president of Saginaw Valley College until his resignation in January. A resident of Midland, Michigan, he has spent the past two months deciding on and planning his campaign.

Marble said: "I intend to run primarily against the incumbent (Elford Cederberg (Rep)) and his voting record, not merely against Nixon, Watergate or Republicans. I intend to campaign for better representation in Washington for citizens of the Tenth District and hope to earn the support of Independents and Republicans as well as Democrats."

"People in the Tenth District should be angry that Michigan is 50th among the United States in getting return of our own tax monies from Washington to support our local economy. It is unfortunate that the present Congressman, the ranking minority member of the powerful House Appropriations Committee, has permitted this to be . . . unfortunate for Michigan and for the Tenth District."

"Voters in the Tenth District need to know that the select voting record of their present Congressman is considered 100 percent to 90 percent "wrong" by groups as different as the National Education Association, the AFSCME (Public Employees), and the National Council of Senior Citizens. When the incumbent's voting record is made known to voters of the Tenth, they, too will find him "wrong" more often than "right."

Marble said he would campaign actively throughout the District, pledging that if elected he would fight for tax reform, election reform, and a re-ordering of Federal priorities to give highest attention to halt of inflation, increased employment, and with no increase in Federal spending. During the campaign, he said, each of these and other programs would be explained in detail.

## Board hears protests over planned rock fest in DeWitt Twp May 18

An angry crowd of 50 DeWitt Twp residents took the Clinton County board of commissioners by storm Tuesday -- only to find the board was unable to prohibit a planned rock concert they all came to protest.

Worried residents said a 7-hour concert slated for May 18 at the Northside Drive-In on US-27 would cause traffic jams, vandalism and safety hazards.

But county prosecutor John Newman said the present zoning ordinance did not give the county power to prohibit the gathering. Instead, he urged adoption of a temporary special use permit--which he admitted had dubious enforcement value-- to at least allow the county to set up some restrictions on safety, sanitation and security.

The board went along with his suggestion, but not before hearing some heated comments from the crowd.

"There are just so many problems that we recommend the permit not be issued," said DeWitt supervisor Dale Emerson.

He and a majority of residents present voiced support for Commr Virginia Zeeb's motion (later defeated) to deny the permit and use all available resources to try to prohibit the concert.

One resident's statement that "any attempt at regulation would be a farce" drew many nods of agreement.

Board president Derrill Shinabery, while stressing repeatedly that neither he nor any other board member wanted the concert to go on, said the permit was the board's only recourse.

"The crux of the matter," he said, "is this: We are informed by our attorney that there's no way we can stop the concert. The question is do we want to throw the whole thing open or issue a permit to try to control it."

At least 2 men present were hopeful that, with some restrictions, the concert would not devastate the community as residents feared.

One was zoning administrator Arnold Minarik; the other was former DeWitt Twp police chief Bruce Angell, who said he'd been hired to direct security operations at the concert by the promoters, Kosmic Cowboy Productions.

Minarik reported several meetings had already been held with area law enforcement agencies to coordinate security for the concert. He said the promoters had agreed to meet certain standards regarding audience size, duration of the concert, sanitary facilities, internal and perimeter security, emergency health services and fire protection.

Angell further detailed planned security measures. Both plainclothes and uniformed guards would be present, he said, as well as 10 doctors and 30 medical assistants.

"The best we can do is try to control a potentially bad situation," said Angell, who later explained he did not favor the concert but felt obligated to help the operation run as smoothly as possible.

But the crowd of residents had just one goal in mind: no concert, period.

They left slowly after the permit vote, some protesting the board had ignored them and others accusing Shinabery and Newman of possessing concert tickets themselves.

Emerson said he would consult with township attorneys about seeking an injunction against the concert promoters. The issue is certain to come up at the township board's meeting Monday night, according to him and trustee Eileen Corr.

A total 4000-6000 persons are expected at the concert.

The county board discussed some possible restrictions to accompany the permit in its afternoon session, but a backlog of business forced postponement to an unusual Wednesday session. Other issues expected to come up at the Wednesday meeting--which fell beyond County News deadlines-- were committee reports and a tabled motion for county-wide reassessment.

In other action at Tuesday's meeting, the board approved a Bath Twp resolution granting sewer hook-up to developer Paul Grattarola's planned mobile home park at Upton Road and M-78.

The plan calls for Grattarola's firm, Management Resources Inc, to build a force main from the sewer line to his property, pay 1 direct sewer tap-in fee of \$1,500 as well as regular debt retirement fees.

A major reason for the Bath board's support of the plan was that hook-up of the 300-unit park would lower debt retirement fees from \$9.75 to \$7.50.

Bath trustees rejected, however, Grattarola's proposal to collect the fees from mobile home residents based on the amount of metered sewage they put into the system. Trustees said that would be unfair to other township residents, who were not given the chance to install meters of their own.

The county board made a similar decision. Township officials had stipulated while they condemned the meter method for determination of debt retirement fees, they would not object if the county chose to let park residents pay monthly maintenance costs according to that method.

On the urging of their department of public works, commissioners rejected the idea.

Because the Bath resolution had to be changed to eliminate the provision for metered determination of county maintenance costs, the decision stretched into a 2 hour one subject to approval by both the Bath board and the department of public works.

Commr Duane Chamberlain cast the sole vote of opposition to the resolution.

"I thought the original resolution was adequate," he explained, adding his opposition represented a protest against time-consuming "red tape."

The county board also acted on some 24 proposed revisions to the county zoning ordinance, which was last revised in 1971. Most of the actions involved updating various regulations. The changes all involved updating provisions relating to mobile home parks, including regulations of park sites, signs, sidewalks, spacing and safety provisions.

He lives with his wife and 4 children at 14275 Chandler Rd.

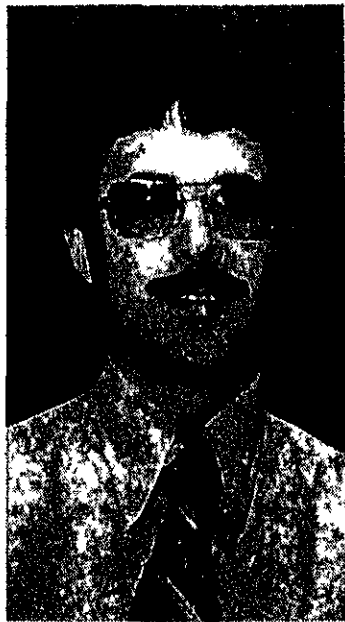

## Congregational Church breaks ground

ST JOHNS — "May this building now to be built ever serve the high aims and purposes for which it is intended." So affirmed the congregation of St Johns First Congregational Church standing in prayer in a light Spring rainfall at Sunday's ground-breaking ceremony.

The occasion marked the start of construction of the church's new Christian Education wing which will extend to the south of the present edifice.

With a brand new brightly-painted spade provided by

parishoner Alan Dean, Pastor Averill M. Carson turned over a spadefull of earth from the front yard of the former manse building to mark the long-awaited culmination of the church's building program campaign. This activity had been coordinated by member William Richards, Jr and the Christian Education Building Committee.

The new 2-story addition, to be ready by fall, will provide needed classroom and youth activities space for both the church school and community youth functions.

Local architect St Clair Pardee has designed a building which harmonizes with the present field-stone walled main church building while providing a functional capability to serve the church's expanding membership in the future.

Church Board of Trustees' chairman, Almond B. Cressman, as he turned over a spadeful of earth in the brief ceremony, related how the present field-stones had been hauled by horse-drawn wagons

from the country north of St Johns.

The new stone will come from Minnesota as a result of the architect's search for well-matched material of construction.

Earlier in the year, based on the vote of the congregation and the comprehensive plans in hand, the Board of Trustees signed a contract with Construction Designs, Inc of Lansing and Mt Pleasant. Excavation work will be commencing shortly after the manse building is taken down, a project now underway.

Despite the spring shower most of the congregation gathered to observe and participate in the ground-breaking ceremony.

In unison the congregation and Pastor Carson prayed that the new building would help accomplish "... the program of religious education that has as its purpose the enlightenment of the minds and the enrichment of the souls of our boys and our girls." The continuing need for all involved, the

Approximately 600 bicycles were ridden to school that day. A kite flying contest was held Friday, preceding an Earth Week dance.

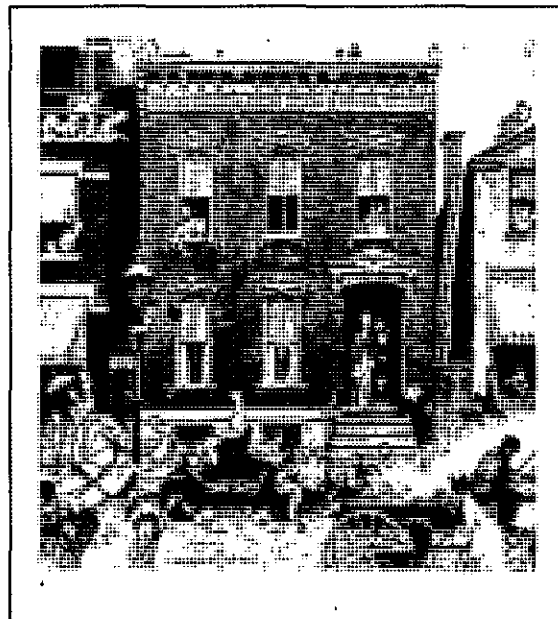

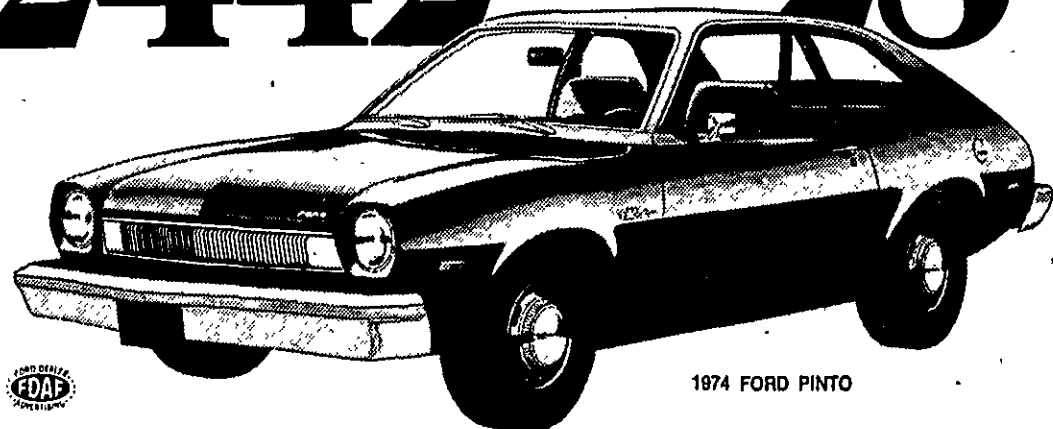

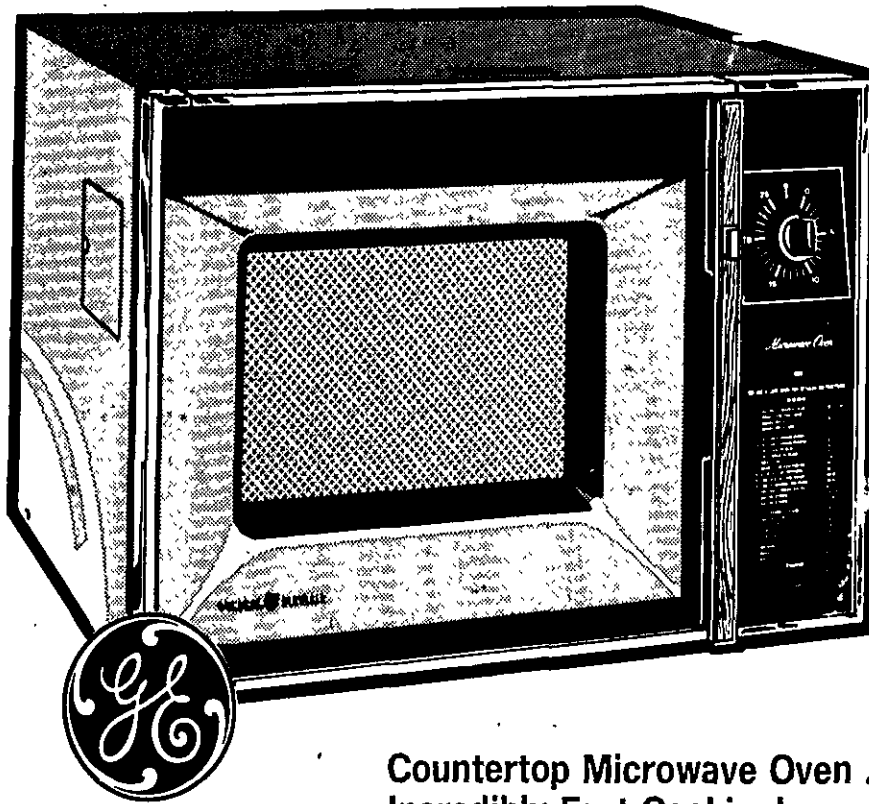

## Spaniola campaigns for House office

**DNR pays Clinton \$37,857**

LANSING -- A total of \$37,857.22 has been mailed to Clinton County by the Dept of Natural Resources in lieu of tax payments for state conservation lands purchased after 1933.

According to a release from the DNR, the payments are in line with the local millage rates covering state property.

Washington, Lansing, DNR wildlife officials will present in-depth reviews of herd and range conditions, trends in hunter participation and other factors the Department considers each year in making its deer season recommendations to the

Natural Resources Commission.

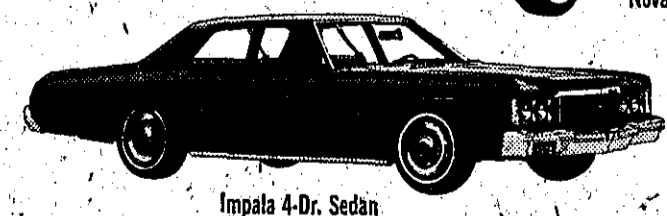

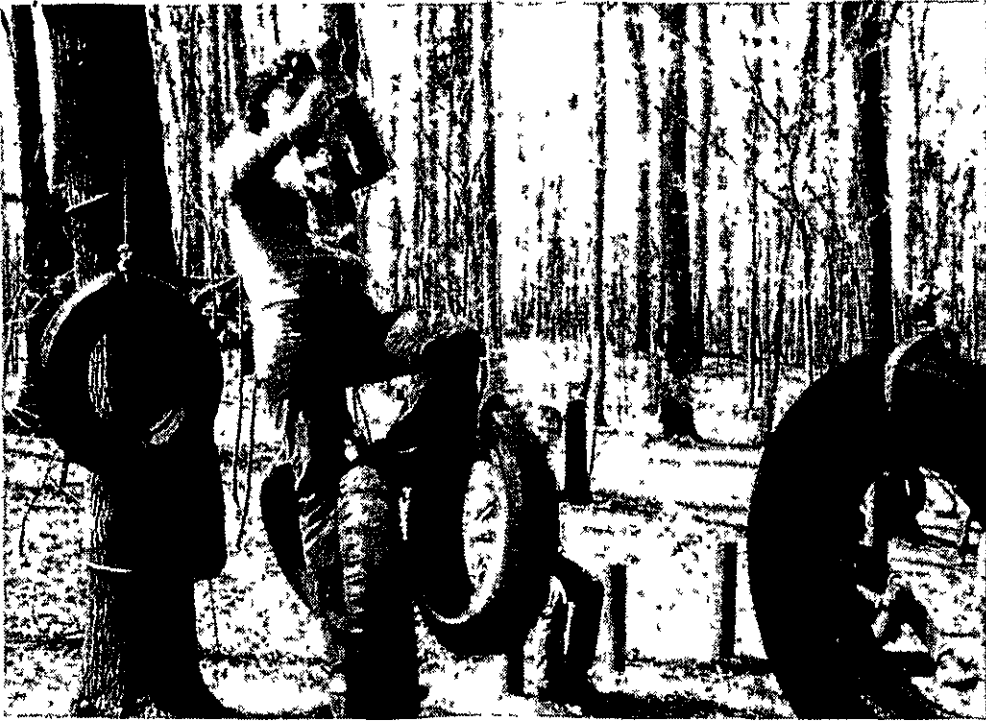

### Bath approves road projects

BATH TWP -- Bath trustees kicked off their 1974 road repair plans Monday by approving 4 projects recommended by the township road committee.

The board approved a \$3,500 plan to raise the road level on a segment of Peacock Road, a \$1,300 ditching and graveling project on segments of Robson Road and 2 similar \$500 projects on Center Road.

In other road-related action, the board voted to sign an agreement with the Clinton County road commission for 2 chloride applications on dirt roads at a total cost of about \$2,116.

Supervisor Roy Van Sickle explained the applications would cost about \$1,558 each, minus \$1,000 in county-supplied funds. Some spot applications might be requested later in addition to the 2 full applications, the board noted.

Trustees also approved a 360-foot extension of the sewer line along Tiffin Road to service lots 41 and 42 of the Nelson subdivision east of Watson Road. An extension was previously planned to lot 43, owned by Roger Kindly. Van Sickle said

Fishbeck, Thompson and Carr, township engineers, estimated the further extension would cost \$7,800.

Van Sickle, along with treasurer Thomas Woodruff, reported little progress in recent meetings concerning the township's hook-up and use of the sewage treatment plant in DeWitt Township.

"There is no problem as I see it between Bath and DeWitt Townships," said Van Sickle, "but there is disagreement between DeWitt and the county about who owns the sewer system."

He added he thought DeWitt and the county would have to resolve their dilemma before an agreement could be reached between Bath and either of the other parties.

Board members voted to recommend 3 township residents to the county board of commissioners as possible replacements for resigning 11th district Commr Gerald Shepard.

Recommended were Maud Martin of 6387 Ocha Dr, East Lansing; Richard Hawks of 14275 Chandler Rd, Bath; and Garnett Case of 14358 Watson Rd, Bath.

Hawks was awarded the appointment Tuesday morning.

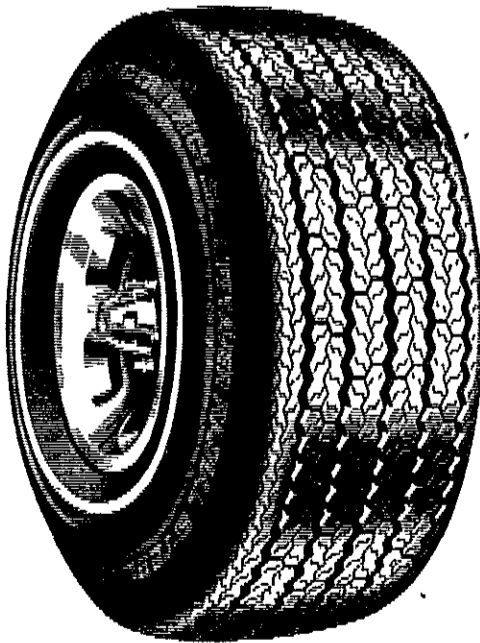

The Police and Fire Board approved sending four volunteer firemen to Lansing Community College for training in Emergency Medical Treatment.

Moved by Treasurer Woodruff to concur with the Supervisor's recommendation to appoint Carl Otto to the Planning Commission with term expiring December 31, 1974. Seconded by Trustee Carleton. Carried unanimously.

A cost estimate was requested of the Clinton County Sheriff to determine the feasibility of obtaining police coverage for Bath Township at a lower cost than it is currently costing us. Sheriff Huinagel stated cost as being \$5.46 per hour per man for a 42 hour week plus 11.7 cents per mile per police vehicle. This comes to \$194.16 per day for 3 men, or a

total of \$61,877 annually for 3 men 24 hour daily service and \$73,914 annually for 4 men (one man per shift with an extra man daily during high crime hours). Bath Township currently has coverage 21 days a month at 23 hours per day and the rest of the days we have 18 hours a day coverage. The extra cost of benefits was also discussed.

Moved by Trustee Snider to raise the charge of opening graves as requested by the Sexton Marvin Morrison from \$55. to \$65. effective immediately. Carried unanimously. Moved by Treasurer Woodruff to authorize Marvin Morrison to purchase the Allis Chalmers 42" cut tractor and mower from Patterson of St. Johns at a cost of \$1,180. Seconded by Trustee Snider. Carried unanimously. Moved by Trustee Bragdon that cost of cemetery graves be increased from \$10 to \$25 per grave effective immediately. Seconded by Clerk Burnett. Carried.

Supervisor Van Sickle read a letter of request from the Clinton County Drain Commissioner Dale Chapman that an advisory committee be organized by appointing two members. Purpose of the advisory committee is to coordinate regional planning for the use of the South Clinton Wastewater Treatment Plant. Supervisor Van Sickle recommended he and Treasurer Woodruff be appointed. Moved by Trustee Carleton to concur with the above recommendation. Seconded by Trustee Morrill. Carried unanimously.

Petitions were received calling for the recall of Supervisor Van Sickle and for the disincorporation of the charter of the township. Discussion followed with Attorney Berardo relative to proper time for election. Moved by Clerk Burnett to hold a Special Election April 22, 1974 for the recall of Supervisor Van Sickle and for the disincorporation of the charter. Carried unanimously.

Supervisor Van Sickle advised of new cost figures from Stauder, Barch and Associates relative to tap in fees and debt retirement charges on the sewers. If 72 houses do not hook up to the sewers due to destruction and with no trailer park (as is pending), tap charge to be \$1,500 with 25 years to pay at 6 1/2 percent interest; indirect tap charge to be \$500. If the

trailer park becomes a reality, the monthly debt retirement cost to drop from \$9.75 to \$7.50 per month.

Attorney Berardo presented a resolution to be adopted by the Board relative to the condemnation of the Kenneth LaCourse property on Drumheller Rd. Moved by Trustee Bragdon to adopt the Resolution as presented. Seconded by Trustee Snider. Carried.

Moved by Clerk Burnett to approve vouchers No 538 through No 560 for payment. Seconded by Treasurer Woodruff. Roll call vote 7 yes votes. Carried unanimously. Meeting adjourned at 10:00 pm. Respectfully submitted, June Burnett, Clerk

The following is a synopsis of the Bath Charter Township Board's regular monthly meeting of March 4, 1974. Meeting called to order at 8:00 pm by Supervisor Van Sickle with all Board members present. This not practical as road slopes to the north and sewers would be quite deep; further the sanitary sewer route across school property has been revised and the additional cost to be about \$30,000. 2) the re-routing of the sanitary sewer south of Drumheller road was investigated. Instead of crossing the LaCourse property, it will go directly north across the Nischke property to Drumheller road with the pump in station on north side of Drumheller. The re-route to cost about \$700 less in construction costs compared to original route. 3) The proposed route of the new 1-69 in Park Lake area in relation to sewer system, existing homes will be affected on Webster road, Ann Drive, 250 feet on north end of Rickard Lane and Josephine Street.

It was decided by the Board to get cost study on proposed extensions to determine if there is sufficient funds to cover same without additional expenditures. No objections presented to the Drumheller re-route so permission given to Mr Thompson.

Gary Hull was appointed to replace Carl Otto on the Zoning Planning Committee. Mr Otto previously had been appointed to the Planning Commission. ## "If It Fitz . . .

### A job for body counters

You have probably worried about the employment problem faced by the US military specialists who used to count dead enemy bodies in the Vietnam war.

It is only natural that the American public has lost interest in the number of North (or was it South?) Vietnamese killed. The war continues but, after all, we are no longer doing the killing in person. We still supply the guns but somehow it's just not the same thing when you don't pull the trigger yourself. Did John Wayne conquer Iwo Jima by parcel post?

But remember, Lest We Forget. Just because we no longer care how many enemy are killed, we shouldn't forget the heroic job of arithmetic done for us during those precarious days when it had to be done. We at home awake every morning secure in the knowledge we would learn today exactly how many enemy were killed yesterday. And it was never a sloppy job. General Precise never announced "around 1,000 enemy died yesterday." He said "today's body count was 1,563 enemy soldiers, 543 unfriendly civilians who got in the way, and 15 Communist arms and legs not otherwise identified."

NO PATRIOTIC American could help but admire the precision of General Precise and his counters. It was not easy to go into battle with a hand calculator instead of a rifle. It was not easy to make certain an enemy body, no matter how limp, was not recorded as dead until it really was.

Just because the body count is no longer necessary to our national survival, patriotic Americans should not forget the counters. We should be concerned about how they are getting along today. Other than working for the Auto Club on holidays, there's not a big demand for body counters in civilian life.

That's why I was so tickled to learn about Operation Sanguine. That's the Navy project that aims to bury a vast antenna under 3,000 square miles in northern Michigan. The antenna would be part of a radio communication system that would send messages to our nuclear missile submarines sailing at great depths anywhere in the world.

The idea behind Sanguine is beautiful. If the Russians push the big button first, they could wipe out the entire US before we could push back. Our only survivors would be our submarines but they'd be so far underwater they wouldn't know what the dirty Russians had done. The problem is how to notify the subs so they can push their nuclear buttons and destroy Russia. Thus 2 nations would be razed for urban renewal. Planned Parenthood chapters could cancel all meetings, and the world would be safe for Democracy.

OPERATION SANGUINE is the answer. Right now the Pentagon is having problems with citizens who don't want the antenna grid buried in their neighborhood. Tests have shown that Sanguine waves cause mutations in fruit flies. No one wants hunchbacked fruit flies buzzing around his bananas.

But the Pentagon insists it will prevail. \$60 million has already been spent on the project and it would be a crime to spend that much money without ever blowing up even one nation.

Naturally, General Precise and his communication counters have been active in Operation Sanguine. If the project is a success, there is going to be a mess of bodies to count. A job that size takes a lot of advance planning. It requires the same sort of precise logic that went into naming the operation.

# 88th District Report

## by Stanley Powell

### State Representative

The House continued to attempt to wade its way, tediously, through the mass of work which now confronts it. Unhappily, it does not seem that the Democratic leadership has really serious intentions of solving some of the pressing problems of the state prior to the summer adjournment.

Less than 2 months remain before the beginning of the new fiscal year, and not one budget bill has yet been presented for general consideration by the membership. The closer we get to this deadline, the less the chances are of completing other important work.

In addition, they continue to stall on campaign reform in their stubborn insistence that the laws governing the reporting of contributions be weakened rather than strengthened. It seems a rather safe bet that the average citizen has far less concern over the fact that his \$5 contribution (or whatever small amount under \$25) would be reported if Republican amendments were adopted to the bill than does the Democratic leadership which contends that it is looking out for "the small contributor's" interests. I seriously doubt that any of you would donate to an individual's campaign if you were ashamed or fearful to have it become public knowledge—and yet that is what the Democratic leadership contends.

I WILL CONTINUE to hold firm in my insistence that all contributions should be reported, and that contributions of materials and goods should also be reported for public inspection.

At the same time, it appears that several Republican bills which are ready for discussion and a vote by the House membership are being held hostage by the Democrats until bills which they support receive House approval. This is obviously the fate of House Bill 4208 which would provide further tax relief for Michigan citizens and businesses. On a strict party line vote this bill was again laid over without consideration for another week. There were, however, several less controversial bills passed

by the Legislature last week, including a bill to regulate franchise investments and a bill to put the question of a bonus for Vietnam veterans on the ballot.

#### MICHIGAN FRANCHISE LAW PASSES HOUSE

The House of Representatives last week passed a bill to create a Michigan franchise law which, if passed by the Senate and signed into law by the Governor, would enable the state to crack down on fraudulent franchise schemes.

This bill, introduced by my Republican colleague, Representative James J. Damman of Troy, received unanimous approval in the House on a 79-0 vote.

Representative Damman's bill, which took 3 years to work to bring to the House floor, requires all franchisors proposing to do business in Michigan to register with the Department of Commerce and specifically defines prohibited abuses and prescribes penalties for violation.

EVERY YEAR YOU and I learn about many people losing their life savings because they invested in a franchise that just didn't work out the way they had expected, or as they had been led to believe it would by the franchisor.

This legislation would guarantee that the prospective purchaser will be provided with full disclosure about the operation such as background, business, experience, any past criminal convictions, any past administrative procedures by the state or federal agencies, recent financial statements and much more.

The practice of franchising sets up a special relationship where a franchisee may become highly dependent on the performance of the franchisor. If a franchisor does not make good on his promises, he may cause the franchisee to fail even though the franchisee may do everything he might reasonably be expected to do.

We have all seen the newspaper articles on recent franchise abuses and also advertisements promising that fabulous wealth awaits those with no experience who are

willing to work part-time, operating their own franchise outlet. Representative Damman said that most of this advertising is patently false.

FRANCHISING is a practice fraught with great abuse both experienced and potential. We have seen abuses like the pyramid schemes, which fill basements, attics and bedrooms with useless cleaners, cosmetics and engine additives for which no reasonable market exists.

Even the legitimate franchisor is being hurt by the reputation all franchisors are given by the fly-by-night, the con man, and the inept franchisor.

An attorney who represents the International Franchise Association recently commented that passage of the Damman bill would give Michigan the best franchise law in the nation.

This legislation is urgently needed as pointed out by the House Republican Task Force on Consumer Protection and by Governor Milliken in his special message to the Legislature on consumer protection.

I am pleased that my colleagues recognized the need for this legislation and gave it their unanimous support.

## View from the Senate

Michigan's 77th Legislature appears likely to go down in history in at least respect.

Longtime Capitol observers cannot remember a time when changes -- and potential changes -- in legislative personnel have been so frequent as in the current Legislature, which took over in January, 1973.

#### 15 CHANGES IN SENATE

By the time the new Legislature convenes next year there may be at least 15 changes in the Senate alone, due to a combination of factors including death, retirements (voluntary or otherwise) and resignations (also voluntary or otherwise).

Already, three Senators who answered the roll call a year ago no longer are here. They are: Sen. Anthony Stamm of Kalamazoo, who died earlier this month after suffering a stroke last September; Sen. Coleman Young of Detroit, who resigned after being elected mayor of Detroit; and Sen. Charles O. Youngblood of Detroit, who also resigned after being convicted of bribery.

Last week three more names were added to the list of those who will not answer the roll call in January, 1975. They are: Senator Robert Richardson of Saginaw, who announced that he would not seek re-election; Sen. Jack Faxon of Detroit, who

announced he would seek the Democrat nomination for Congress from the 17th district; and yours truly, who indicated he would seek the Republican nomination for Congress from the 6th District.

BRICKLEY ALSO TO LEAVE

While he is not a Senator, Lt. Gov. James Brickley does preside over that body and he previously announced that he would not seek re-election this fall.

So at least seven familiar faces will not be in the 78th Legislature.

Due to reapportionment, two incumbent senators, veteran Stanley Roxycki and newcomer John Hertel, both of Detroit, will be pitted against each other in a Democrat primary. This virtually assures another new face since one or the other will drop by the wayside.

A somewhat similar situation may develop in the Flint area where veteran Democrat Senator Garland Lane may be opposed by Rep. Dale Kildee in the primary. There are reports that Lane is considering moving into the adjoining district where he might wind up running in the

general election against incumbent Republican Senator Gordon Rockwell of Flushing.

Sen. Robert VanderLaan of Grand Rapids is reported considering again seeking the Congressional seat recently vacated by US Rep. Jerry Ford when he became Vice President. If he does, his Senate seat will be up for grabs.

Around the Senate chambers in recent months there has been speculation that Senators Charles O. Zoller of Benton Harbor, and Michael O'Brien and Stanley Novak, both of Detroit, may wind up long careers by not seeking re-election.

Some other Senators -- notably Philip O. Pittenger of Lansing; Harvey Lodge of Waterford; Gilbert Bursley of Ann Arbor; Milton Zaagman of Grand Rapids, and Carl Pursell of Plymouth -- are facing formidable opposition in next November's election, if not sooner, largely because of a Democratic gerrymandered apportionment plan.

The way things are going, one almost needs a scorecard with names and numbers of Senators these days.

## New farm law protects prices

EAST LANSING -- Michigan farmers are being requested to report their crop acreages to county ASCS offices as soon as they have completed their plantings but no later than July 1.

The request was made by Dorn Diehl, state executive director of the Michigan State Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Office.

He stated that to be eligible for any 1974 farm program benefits farmers with wheat and feed grain allotments must certify their crop acreages and indicate intentions to participate in the 1974 program no later than July 1.

Under the Agriculture and Consumer Protection Act of 1973, participants are eligible

for payments if the average market prices for wheat and feed grain allotments must certify their crop acreages and indicate intentions to participate in the 1974 program no later than July 1.

Under the Agriculture and Consumer Protection Act of 1973, participants are eligible for payments if the average market prices for wheat and feed grains fall below the target prices designated in the new law.

These prices are \$2.05 a bushel for wheat; \$1.38 a bushel for corn; \$1.31 a bushel for grain sorghum; and \$1.13 a bushel for barley.

It is only when the average market price drops below target levels that a farmer's cash price is supplemented and

then it is only supplemented on the normal production of his allotments.

Diehl said enrollment in the 1974 program also provides some protection or insurance for the farmer who, because of a natural disaster, may be prevented from planting his allotment acreage or have a crop subsequently fall or produce abnormally low yields at harvest.

Any farmer with failed wheat acreage should contact the county ASCS office immediately and apply for disaster credit before he plows up the failed wheat acreage and replants it to another crop. Weather conditions preventing planting of spring crops should also be reported.

### Chloe's Column

Focus on clothing recycling

Clothing recycling may soon become a significant consumer issue as increasing world demand for fabric fibers meets with decreasing supplies.

The price of wool has risen and may go higher. The combination of high prices and wool's durability will very likely motivate consumers to try to get the most out of their clothing dollars by wearing wool garments longer or updating them to get the most possible wear from them.

Recycling doesn't have to mean tearing a garment apart and reconstructing it. You can often extend the usefulness of a garment simply by combining it with other items in a new way.

The popularity of the layered look, the use of several garment pieces together and the increase in dress options resulting from the decreasing dominance of dress by one fashion trend or color mean more freedom for clothing consumers to wear garments longer and put them together in new combinations.

You may have neither the time nor the skill to invest in tearing a garment apart and reconstructing it, but you can often extend its wearability by making minor changes.

Braids and trims and patch pockets, a crocheted edging for sleeves or collar, a smock top to wear over an old outfit -- all can give old clothes a new look. A few snips of the scissors and a quick hem turns a long sleeved shirt into a short-sleeved one. And a little dismantling can transform a sweater with worn elbows into a sleeveless vest.

For recycling ideas, look at the clothing in the stores. See how you can use things you have differently or change them out slightly to get more use out of them.

When buying new clothes, plan for multiple-use garments that can be worn in more than one season. Using separates is just one of the techniques you can employ to make seasonal transitions without making large adjustments in your wardrobe.

The near future may see another sort of clothing recycling. Like the makers of gasoline, heating oil and other petroleum products, the manufacturers of synthetic fibers are feeling the energy squeeze. About 10 percent of each year's petroleum yield goes into the manufacture of synthetic fibers. A reduction here would mean a cut in production of synthetics without a corresponding drop in demand.

One result, aside from higher prices, could very well be industrial recycling and reuse of synthetic fibers.

There has already been some pressure exerted on the fabric industry to recycle synthetics. They are not biodegradable and, when discarded add to environmental pollution. If the industry's source of raw materials is cut down or cut off, recycling may be the only alternative.

After the show, Mrs Murton invited the audience to the basement for refreshments and prizes.

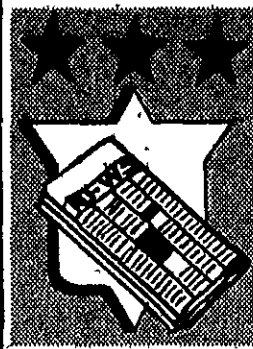
