Library to honor Michigan authors

ST JOHNS - Bement Public Library will honor 4 authors of books, 3 of which are about Michigan at a Michigan Authors' Night Thursday, May 22, at 8 pm in the library, in conjunction with Michigan Week activities.

One author is Betty Minsky, author of "Gimmicks Make Money in Retailing" published 10 years ago and recently revived. Mrs. Minsky came to St. Johns in 1965 as manager of the St. Johns Chamber of Commerce.

She was previously manager of the Chamber of Commerce in Cheboygan. A native of Green Bay, Wis., she is now a staff writer for the Lansing State Journal.

Also being honored will be James Stanford Clark, father of Mrs. Patrick Joslyn of St. Johns. Clark, who has had a long career teaching in colleges, has recently published a book of poetry about the Lake Huron area, entitled "Retreat and Return." He and Mrs. Clark live in Lansing.

Another Michigan author to be on hand is Ford Stevens Ceasar of Lansing, who, in 1974, published "The Lamp Road." It is a book about a proposed railroad which would have passed through St. Johns on its way north to Mt. Pleasant, if it had been built. Stevens, a teacher and school administrator in the Lansing area, lived in St. Johns as a youth while attending the Clinton County Normal School.

Also to be honored is Roy Dodge, a resident of St. Johns, and father of Mrs. George Seperic Jr. of St. Johns. He is author of several books on Michigan ghost towns and his latest book is "A Ticket To Hell," a book about Michigan's bad men. The public is invited.

Soapbox Derby rolls Sunday

ST JOHNS - The 13th running of the Clinton County Soapbox Derby takes place Sunday afternoon down Clinton Ave. in St. Johns.

Activities open at 2:30 pm with aerial salute over the downtown area.

Following the aerial salute, 2 aerial bombs will go off.

The invocation will be given at 2:33 by Rev. Hugh Banning and the St. Johns High School Band will play the National Anthem at 2:35.

Then, at 2:41, the 1975 parade will begin its southward route on Clinton Ave.

Following the parade, the 1974 Derby winner, Joe Weber will make the first run down the hill.

A trial run will be held at 3:17 and the 1st heat of the Derby race is to begin at 3:40 pm. The final heat will be held at approximately 5:15. A drawing for the hand-painted car given as a prize by the Derby Committee will be held immediately after the championship heat.

All Derby racers will go to Rodney B. Wilson Junior High School for the 5:30 awards ceremony.

At the awards ceremony, prizes will be awarded to the 1st 15 places.

First prize will be a \$150 US Savings Bond, 2nd prize is \$100 Savings Bond and other top finishers will receive a variety of prizes.

Twenty names of racers in the local Derby will also be selected in a drawing to win an all-expense paid trip to the All American Soapbox Derby in Akron, Ohio in August.

Hold rites for Julius Becker

ST JOHNS - Julius John Becker, 500 E. Sturgis, age 69, died suddenly on May 9 near St. Johns. He was born Oct. 22, 1905, in Kenosha, Wis.

He was the son of Frederick F. Becker and Elise Sievert Becker.

He was a graduate of Greenville High School, Greenville, and Michigan Technological University, and served as an engineering officer in World War II. He was an engineer for the State Highway Department for 41 years, retiring in 1972 as assistant to the chief of the Department's Bureau of Engineering.

In recognition of his accomplishments and long service, the State Highway Commission named the roadside park on M-37 south of Mesick in his honor.

He was a member of the National Society of Professional Engineers, American Association of Highway Officials, Board of Registration for Professional Engineers, Elks Lodge, and life member of the Greenville Lodge No. 96 F & A.M. Since retirement he had served as a consulting engineer with the Clinton County Road Commission.

He is survived by his wife Antoinette (Jollie), 3 children: Mrs. Kay Ann Hunter of Park Forest, Illinois; Robert Becker of Kentwood, MI, and Gary Becker of St. Johns, Michigan; and seven grandchildren. Also, a sister, Mrs. Ann Dean, of St. Johns; two brothers, Kurt J. Becker of St. Johns and Ernest F. Becker of Lansing, MI.

St. Johns Commission adopts new budget

ST JOHNS - A \$2,259,727 budget was approved by the St. Johns City Commission Monday night and reflects a millage rate reduction of .45 mills.

The total millage rate levied by St. Johns will be 15 with 9.5 mills for operational purposes, storm sewer general obligation bond of 2.5 mills, garbage 1.5 and 1.5 mills for general obligation bonds for the water

mills. Randy Humphrey, city manager, described the budget as "conservative."

Mayor Roy Elbert touched on a few items in the budget and explained that \$241,552 would be going into streets this year, said the water rates are remaining the same for the 5th straight year, and explained that \$13,394 has been made available for recreation. A detailed account of the budget will be published in next week's County News.

WORK STARTS ON STEEL HOTEL
In other business, Paul Manles, city at-

torney, told the Commission that a sale on the Steel Hotel has been made to William Searles, a local developer.

He said work had already started in removing hazards left by the March 28 fire.

Manles was directed by the Commission to bill the estate for portions of the amount spent by the city in providing around-the-clock police guards between the time of the fire and the beginning of work to remove the debris.

INCREASE CHAMBER DUES
Following a request by Rollin Huard, representing the St. Johns Area Chamber of Commerce, the Commission moved to increase their Chamber annual dues from \$42 to \$500. Huard had asked the Commission to approve \$500 to help to support the downtown Christmas lighting project, previously financed solely by the Chamber.

He said the total project costs about \$1500 annually and that the Chamber would supply \$500, the county \$500 and the city's contribution would help the Chamber meet the annual expenditure.

The Commission passed the motion to raise the dues to \$500 and left the use of the money to the discretion of the Chamber of Commerce.

Professional instruction will be offered for 8 weeks to prepare the golf beginner and re-learner both physically and mentally for the up-coming golf season.

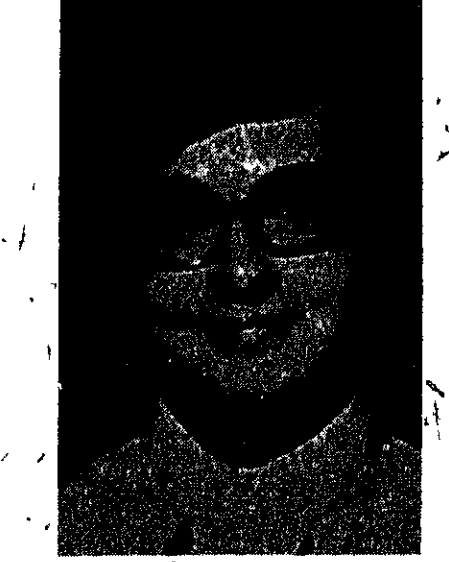
Specifically, it will cover the basics of grip, stance, address, swing and the fundamental shots involved in playing golf as putting, chipping, pitching and full swing

ST JOHNS - David Darnell, 25, of St. Johns has been named the 1975 summer recreation program director for the City of St. Johns.

Darnell, a resident of 609 N. Morton in St. Johns, is a teacher in the DeWitt School system, teaching 7th and 8th grade math and 8th grade physical education.

He also coaches 8th grade football and several intramural sports.

Darnell was the director of the most recent winter volleyball league in St. Johns. A 1972 graduate of Ferris State College, he is currently completing work for a masters degree at Central Michigan University.

The St. Johns summer recreation program this year will include men's slow-pitch

VFW announces 1975 Poppy Sale

On May 15, 16 and 17 the St. Johns VFW Post 4113 and the Ladies Auxiliary will be selling Buddy Poppies.

The Buddy Poppy is the memorial flower for the American War Dead. It is a tradition which began in the years following the First World War.

Veterans returning to their homes in this country remembered the wild poppies which lined the devastated battlefields of France and Flanders. The flower soon took on a sacred significance.

This little red blossom became the Flower of Remembrance for the men whose lives had been lost in the defense of freedom. As a memorial emblem for the war dead, it underlined the plight of those men who did not die, but returned permanently disabled. Poppies have been sold since May of 1922.

Court dismisses charges against Phillip Greer

ST JOHNS - Three marijuana related charges against Phillip E. Greer, a former St. Johns school teacher, were dismissed in 65th District Court Tuesday morning due to a recent Michigan State Supreme Court ruling.

Greer, 32, had been charged with knowingly keeping or maintaining a dwelling where controlled substances were stored or used, possession of marijuana with intent to deliver and delivery of marijuana to a minor.

During the preliminary examination Tuesday, Greer's attorney Stuart Dummings of Lansing claimed abuse of his client's rights, citing an April 7 decision by the

Supreme Court declaring the use of a radio transmitting device to obtain evidence unconstitutional without a properly issued search warrant.

In accordance with that ruling, District Judge Frederick Lewis dismissed the charges against Greer because such a device had been used at his residence prior to his arrest.

Clinton County Prosecutor Jon Newman said to use such a device, it is necessary beforehand to obtain a search warrant.

Newman said the Beavers (the case in which the Supreme Court made its ruling) is prospective. "My argument," he said, "was that, since we're talking about the rule

excluding evidence from a jury or finder of facts, that you have to look at the purpose of the exclusionary rule in deciding what the Supreme Court meant by prospective.

"The purpose of the exclusionary rule is to punish policemen for violating peoples' rights, the rationale being courts will not allow policemen to profit by gathering evidence improperly. How can we say the police acted improperly when the Supreme Court decision came well after the evidence was gathered?"

Newman said "I will seek appellate review of the court's ruling."

Greer was arrested April 2 by the Clinton County Sheriff's Dept.

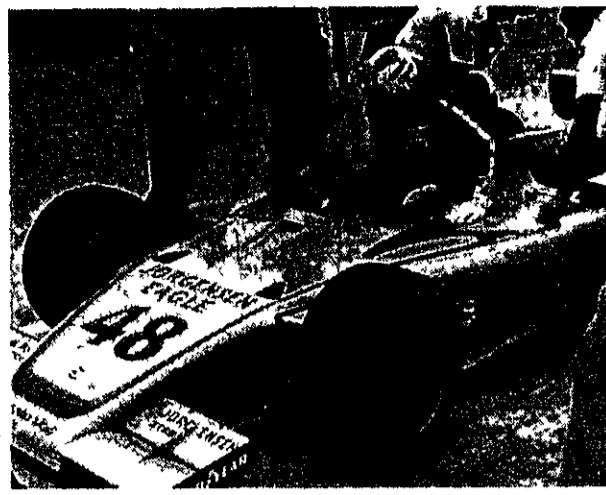
Darling attends Land Bank seminar

REGULATION AND TRUCKING.

Some people feel the regulated transportation system of the United States should not be regulated. They argue, the industry which approves of regulation, must be lining their pockets because of it. And for those reasons, they argue the Interstate Commerce Commission should be abolished.

We have regulation for one prime reason, to insure transportation service and standardized rates for communities located away from major shipping centers such as Detroit. Here, there is no cutthroat competition or biased rates. A shipper in Alpena can send his freight for the same rate as a shipper of similar freight in Detroit.

Shippers and merchants in places like Muskegon, Jackson, Petoskey and Midland can count on regular service and standard rates that do not change daily or hourly because of ICC regulation.

The way we see it, without regulation, Michigan communities would have little to depend upon, except extremely poor service and a very unfair rate system.

A regulated transportation system is not the best of all possible worlds. But it is far better than no transportation system at all. Or worse, a government-run system.

DeWitt Twp Board passes motions

DEWITT TWP -- Five motions including 2 recommendations by the Planning Commission and 1 proposal by the police chief were approved by the DeWitt Township Board of Trustees at Monday night's meeting.

With all 7 trustees present, the board before an audience of 10 local citizens voted on a recommendation of the Planning Commission to retain zoning ordinance 6.30 (E) as it is in the present ordinance.

This ordinance give the zoning administrator Ray St Pierre discretionary power in cases involving the altering of non-conforming property.

The board approved another Planning Commission recommendation setting up a schedule of fees for special meetings for petitioners for licenses. The fees will be \$100 for a zoning amendment, \$35 for an appeal to the Township Board of Appeals and \$100 for a special use permit.

Roger Pline, Planning Commission chairman, said special meetings should be discouraged and they can only be held on the approval of the Planning Commission chairman for 2/3 approval of the commission members.

A proposal by Police Chief William Nash to allow Lansing Twp Police Dept to use the radio assigned to the DeWitt Twp Police Dept was also approved by the board.

This, when put into effect in July or August, will give DeWitt Twp 24 hour police dispatch service. The township had been getting their service from the Michigan State Police, but

according to Nash, "They can no longer physically handle their dispatches as well as ours."

No amount of money was approved at this time and township attorney J. Richard Robinson recommended that the Federal Communications Commission be contacted to iron out any legal problems.

In other action the board approved the letter from zoning administrator St Pierre to the State Plumbing Board asking the state to continue inspecting all uncodded areas in DeWitt Twp.

The board gave further approval to an amendment to the policy manual adopted last July, which will authorize punitive measures to be taken against careless township employees.

A Zoning Appeals Board appointment was tabled until the next meeting.

Ovid accepted into Flood Insurance program

The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development announced today that effective now, Ovid has been accepted into the National Flood Insurance Program.

This means, said Acting Federal Insurance Administrator, J. Robert Hunter, that individual property owners here are now eligible to buy flood insurance protection at affordable, federally-subsidized rates, offering more extensive coverage under the expanded program authorized by the 1973 Flood Disaster Protection Act.

"We think the new, expanded National Flood Insurance Program offers the best way of protecting property owners from the ravages of floods, while easing the burden on the general public," he said.

"Since flood insurance is now available," he added, "the law requires that it must be purchased by owners of property in areas identified as flood-prone by HUD, in order to be eligible for virtually all forms of Federal or federally-related financial assistance for building purposes in these areas."

"This would include FHA or VA mortgages, loans from the Small Business Administration, or loans from any federally regulated or supervised banks, and savings and loan institutions."

While flood insurance is available to all residents of the community, Hunter emphasized that the Federal economic sanctions against the building assistance will not apply to property outside the danger zones.

Under the expanded program, broader coverage can be obtained for all buildings and their contents. The limit of

insurance for single-family homes is now \$35,000, and \$100,000 for other residential and nonresidential buildings, at the subsidized rate of 25 cents per \$100 of coverage. The rate goes to 40 cents per \$100 for non-residential buildings.

The contents of all residential buildings can be insured up to \$10,000 per unit at 35 cents per \$100 of coverage, and the rate goes to 75 cents per \$100 for the contents of all nonresidential structures up to a maximum of \$100,000 in coverage per unit.

Policies are effective immediately during the first 30 days the insurance becomes available. After the first 30 days, there is a 15-day waiting period.

The policies can be purchased from any licensed local property insurance agent or broker. The Insurance Company of North America, Room 300-Buhl Building, Griswold & Congress Streets, Detroit, Michigan 48226 has been designated as the flood insurance servicing company for this area. Agents and brokers may obtain policy forms, rates, flood insurance manuals, and any other necessary information from this company.

The FIA, Hunter explained, is in the process of publishing maps showing the special flood hazard areas in approximately 20,000 communities across the country. He congratulated the local governing body here for taking action before the July 1, 1975 deadline imposed under the Act for enrolling in the program.

The program is designed to stimulate individual participation in it as protection against natural disasters, and to help promote sound flood

plain management on the part of local governing authorities.

In becoming eligible under the program, a community must submit an application in which it certifies that it has adopted certain minimum flood plain management measures for the flood-prone areas of that community which conform with Federal requirements. These measures vary according to the

characteristics of the community and the nature of specific flood threats. But they are generally designed to regulate the future development of flood hazard areas, and ultimately require minimum elevation and construction standards for floors and foundations of any new construction in these areas.

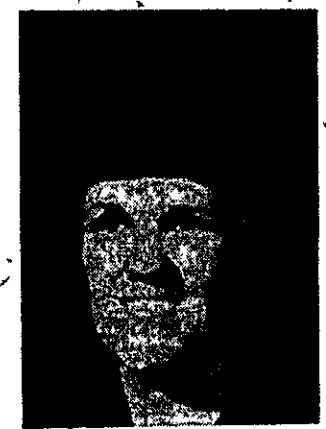

The rubber tomato

President and Mrs Ford may not be among the 25 million Americans putting in home vegetable gardens this year--somehow, they confessed, they never quite got around to carrying out the White House's own inflation-fighting advice. But at least five or six million other Americans will be laying spade to sod as first-time gardeners.

All the home-ground tilling has only partly to do with inflation and the higher cost of food, or recession and the emptier wallet to pay for it. True, there is a trend for Americans to do more with their own hands, to be outdoors, and to value the ways and products of nature.

However, if we read a recent Department of Agriculture survey of consumer attitudes correctly, the big impulsion behind gardening may be the "rubber" tomato.

On all grounds--taste, texture, ripeness, price--the supermarket tomato is the most disliked product of the American agricultural industry. The commercial tomato has been bred to be picked green by machine and ripened in gas ovens. It is largely useless for cooking or eating out of hand. It lacks the extraordinary flavor, juiciness, aroma of any number of varieties of tomato that can be grown easily in a small corner of the family yard, or even discretely staked in flower beds.

As with the superiority of homegrown tomatoes, so with homegrown strawberries and corn. And while you're at it, you might as well set out lettuce seedlings and herbs you can't buy fresh like basil and thyme.

The Agriculture Department survey indicated that Americans are largely satisfied with what food stores sell. But there are some foods that can be grown better in one's own yard. And many Americans simply don't want their children to grow up never having tasted a real tomato.

Back Through the Years



From the Clinton County News Files of 1974, 1965, & 1950

25 YEARS AGO

May 11, 1950

High winds which ranged up to more than 70 miles per hour here Friday and Saturday caused damage that ran into the thousands of dollars in Clinton County.

Clinton County's board of supervisors voted unanimously Monday to oppose the Maple River drainage project if, it seems likely, that a court injunction against the drain will be forthcoming from Ionia or Western Clinton County residents.

Miss Viola Dyer is the new supervisor of nurses at Clinton Memorial Hospital, St. Johns. Miss Dyer took over her duties on May 1, relieving Miss Fern te Groolenhuis, acting supervisor. County Zoning Administrator S. E. Ewing, of Bath was given the "go ahead" signal in a drive to clean up trailer parks in Clinton County at Monday's session of the board of supervisors here.

Although government officials have not yet released any 1950 census figures, an unofficial report from a reliable source shows St. Johns' present population is 5,377. This represents a 25 per cent increase over the 1940 census figure of 4,422.

10 YEARS AGO

May 13, 1965

The largest school annexation in the history of Michigan was completed Saturday when the last of 92 area rural school districts annexed to St. Johns. City Clerk Jessie A. Finch looked back on her more than 23 years in city government last week and recalled some of the many changes that have taken place in the city and in her duties. Mrs. Finch officially retires from service with the city June 30, but she is taking advantage of accumulated vacation time and so this week is the last she will work for the city as clerk. She looks at her retirement with mixed emotions.

Forty-eight years ago Mrs. Cereida Hicks joined the St. Johns Public School system as an office worker. At the end of June she will retire as the school's business manager after 39 years of service to the system.

Removal of the cornerstone of the Clinton County Courthouse--dated 1869--to make way for a new addition to the building rifled the history pages of county government last week. County Clerk Paul Wakefield's research showed that the problem of financing the original courthouse 96 years ago was not any less of a problem than the financing of the new wing is today.

ONE YEAR AGO
May 16, 1974
Everett Glazier, police chief of St. Johns for 26 years before his retirement last June 1, died Wednesday.

Approximately \$2600 was taken and another \$1000 in damage was reported following a Monday night breaking and entering of the Wacousta General Store in Watertown Twp.

This past week I introduced two bills which could do a great deal for election and campaign reform.

The first proposal would limit a member of the Legislature to not more than \$10 per week for postage expense after filing for re-election or election to another office. This formula would allow a legislator to mail 100 letters (as long as stamps remain at 10 each) per week, an amount which should certainly provide for the correspondence necessary to perform one's job in Lansing.

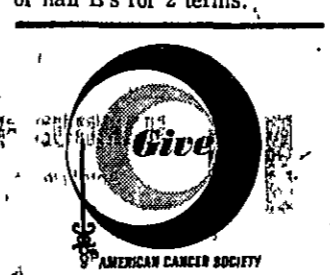
The whole area of mailing privileges for legislators is an often controversial one that crops up every two years during elections when invariably some legislators will be accused of abusing this privilege for political campaigning. I think few would argue that a regular means of communication with constituents is a vital part of a legislator's job, and that the mail is the most convenient and personal method. Thus, rather than "throwing the baby out with the bathwater," my proposal would merely eliminate some of the worst abuses. I believe that it would also lessen the advantage of incumbents in legislative campaigns, and therefore, help

to open up further the political process for those that want to be involved.

THE SECOND BILL would change the date the State Officer's Compensation Commission would file its determination of salaries. Presently, the State Officer's Compensation Commission determines the salary levels of elected state officials in each even numbered year and files it on December 1. Consequently, candidates for the legislature must run for office not knowing what their salary will be. My proposed legislation would change the date of filing from December 1 to two weeks before the deadline for filing as a candidate for either House of the Legislature. Certainly in private business a determination of salary level is an integral part of hiring, and so it should be with the Legislature. Although these may appear to be less than profound alterations in our election laws, I think they are adjustments which could balance our electoral process.

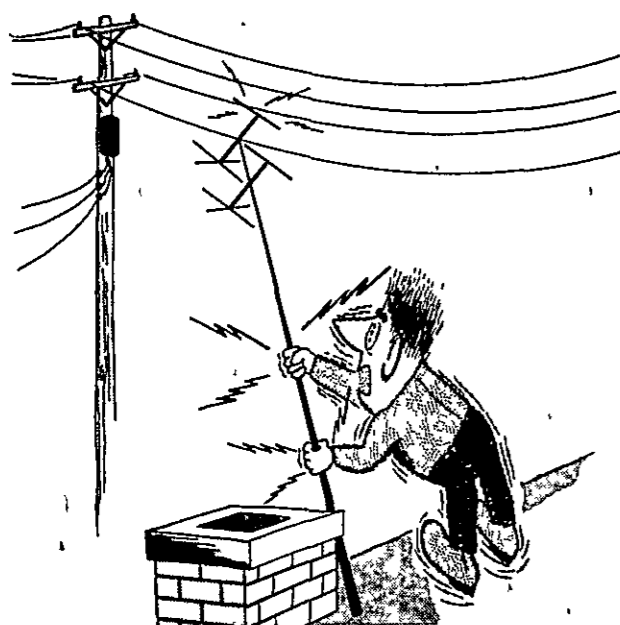
Pilgrim United Methodists break ground for church

"Easy does it" is the key to safe antenna installation



LANSING -- Correctly installing a television or radio antenna can put you in tune for better reception, but the unsafe installation can be disastrous, warns Paul Gardner, urban manager, of Consumers Power Company's Lansing Division. Tragedy can occur if a metal antenna comes in contact with an overhead energized electric line, he cautioned.

Metal television and radio antennas are conductors of electricity. If they come into contact with a power line, electricity will flow to anyone touching the antenna, or to television or radio sets possibly resulting in fire or damage to the set.

The overhead hazard can present itself in different circumstances, including lightning. A Roscommon County man recently was helping his neighbor put up an antenna when it accidentally came in contact with an overhead electric distribution line. The charge electrocuted one of the men.

Mr Gardner said that company records show where a man was electrocuted while adding lengths to a citizen's band radio antenna when the mast touched an overhead 4800 volt line. Another incident occurred when five men were attaching a 60-foot antenna to the side of a house and a sudden gust of wind blew the structure against two high voltage power lines. Two men were electrocuted and the other three hospitalized with electrical burns.

Mr Gardner lists the following safety rules to observe for installing an antenna.

1. Most important of all, place your antenna mast so that no part of it can come closer than ten feet to electric power lines.
2. Install the antenna when weather conditions are clear and winds calm.
3. If the mast is fastened to a house or other structure, make sure that the structure is strong enough to carry the added weight. Allow for wind, ice and vibration.
4. The mast should be securely anchored and not lean in any direction.
5. If your antenna mast is more than ten feet high, strengthen it with at least three equally spaced guy wires or rust-resistant cable. Stranded, galvanized steel is recommended. Add a set of guy wires every ten feet on taller masts.
6. To prevent lightning accidents, place a lightning arrester — one approved by the Underwriters' Laboratories for TV leads — on each conductor of a ribbon-lead.

Bath sweeps Clinton County Track Meet

Sports records, it is said, constitute an endangered species, doomed by nature to a precarious existence.

Well, sir, Clinton County's boys in shorts proved that, all right. They wiped out 9 of the pesky things in one of the best Clinton County Track and Field Meets in the event's history Monday night at Ovid-Elsie High School.

Bath High ran away with the meet, outscoring O-E 95 to 48 1/2 to capture its second straight County title. The Fighting Bees' victory last year had snapped a 5-year string of County crowns held by Ovid-Elsie.

The Bees, paced by double winner Joe Geiger, took the Clinton County News team trophy and a hefty stash of individual medals supplied by co-sponsors from Lions Clubs of Ovid and Elsie.

Bath won 8 of the 15 events on the card, 5 of them in record, breaking or tying times.

Ovid-Elsie got a pair of runner-up victories from Ted Geiger and finished with 5 firsts. Four of them broke records.

Third-place DeWitt (39 points) and St. Johns (37 points) finished the other two first places. Warren Willits of DeWitt tossed the shot 47 feet to win that event; Redwing Wayne Fedewa captured the long jump by leaping 19 feet, 3 inches.

Fowler placed 5th in team scoring with 12 points, followed by Pevamo-Westphalia with 7.

"This was the most competitive County meet we've had," said O-E coach and meet director John Oberlin. "Bath had more overall depth than the rest of us, but we had a good battle for 2nd place and some outstanding individual performances."

Not the least of the records was a weather development that the meet actually finished in sunlight, quite possibly a first in recent memory for the normally rain-soaked meet.

Bath's Jeff Mosley got it off the ground, so to speak, by tying the pole vault mark of 12-0 in the afternoon field events. Tom Doyen of Ovid-Elsie recorded a new mark of 10-0 in the high jump by leaping 10 feet, 10 inches.

Then Bath's 880 relay team blitzed the field in 1:33.1 for the

first track record of the night—a first for the school as well as a first for the result to follow.

Geiger of Ovid-Elsie outkicked Bath's Steve Skorkir for a new mark of 15:06 in the high hurdles and later sprung for a record-setting 32 1/2 in the low jumps, again outperforming Skorkir in the tape.

Other records went to Richard Alward of Bath in the mile (4:39.5) in a close finish against St. Johns' Steve Sullivan in the 400 (5:0), Mark Hanson of Bath in the 2-mile run (10:10.8), Ovid-Elsie in the mile relay (3:33.4) and Bath in the 400 relay (45.4).

Bath's 400 relay victory also set a Bath school record, while Mosley's pole vault tied his own school mark.

Ovid-Elsie school standards for the day included Geiger's high hurdles win for a record and Doyen's high jump for a tie of his previous school high.

"Mentally we needed a good performance like this," said Bath coach Mel Comeau. "It was pleased with our balance, team effort and mental attitude."

Comeau's undefeated troops came into the meet with several significant invitational titles under their belts. The most recent was the Class C division of the Marysville Relays. Bath also finished 2nd overall to Eorse, the Class B champ.

Next big goal for the Bees is one of the most important meets of the season—Saturday's Class C regional at Haslet. Bath hopes for a state championship ride on solid qualifying performances across the board in regionals.

Depth, always a Bath strong point this year, is the key to that goal. The Bees' lineup in addition to the 8 wins, Bath captured 7 vital 2nds and 4 3rds. Scoring went through 5 places and Bees scored at least one point in every event.

Mark Graham led a 1-2-3 finish by the Bees in the 100 yard dash—in his first competitive 100 ever. Dan Bass and David Kloockner were the other two.

Tarrant went 1-2 in the 2 mile and Green picked up his 2nd win in the 220, with Ed Osenga and Green also finishing in the top 5.

Green and Doyen were 5th and 6th, respectively, for Bath in the 400 and 800 relays. The 800 relay team, which included Doyen, Tarrant, Green and Doyen, anchored the winning 880 relay team and

3. Fowler got a 2nd from Dale Koocknecht in the shot put (45-4) for his highest placement. Dave Schmidt took 3rd in the long jump (18-5) just behind Kloockner (18-3 1/2).

Kloockner was another active Bee, combining that finish with a pair of 3rds in the high hurdles and 100 yard dash.

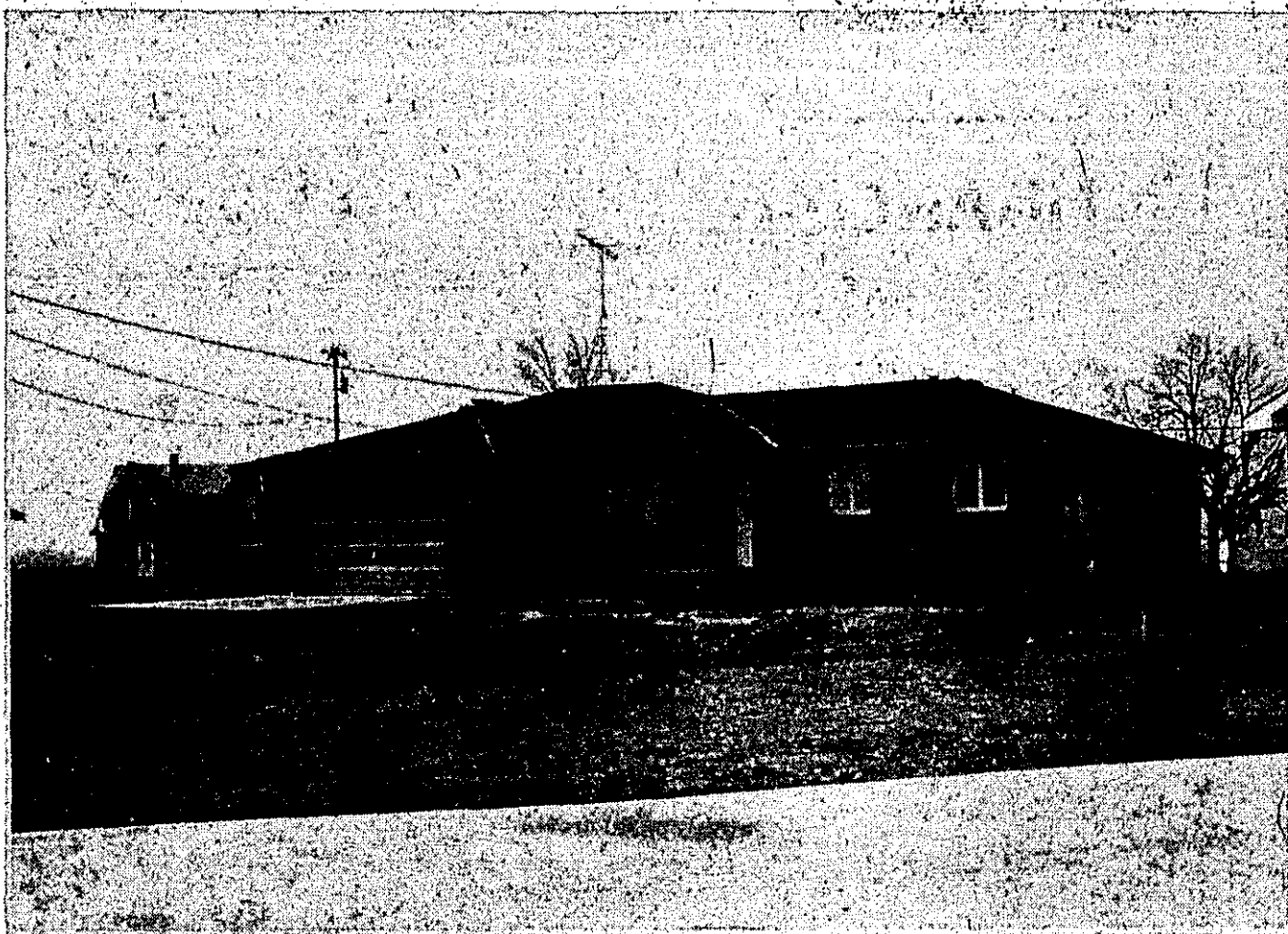

Surviving Mrs Lyon are a sister and nieces and nephews.

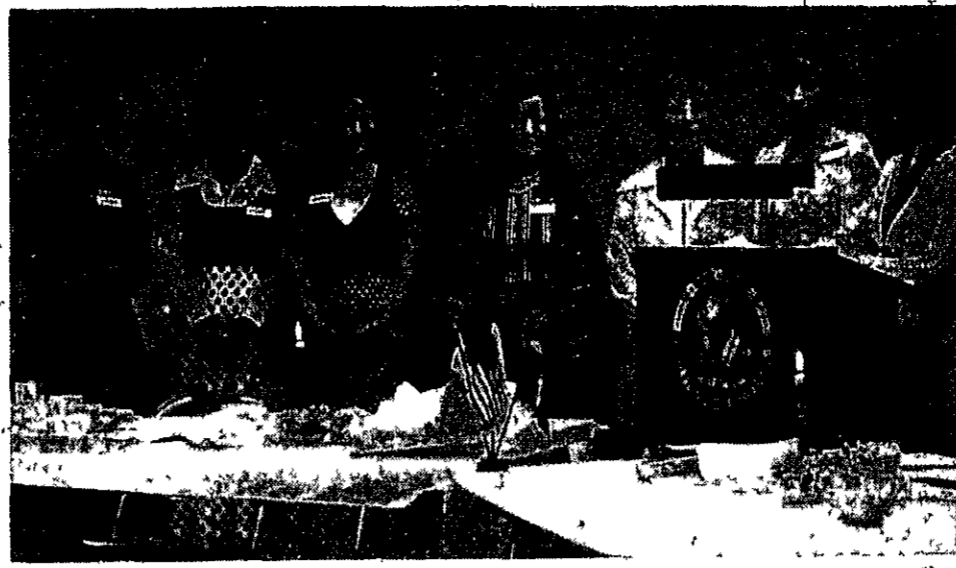
Everett French

Under this program, Clinton County woodlot owners can sign a long term agreement for 3 to 10 years for woodlot improvement practices and be assured of cost share for the term of the agreement. Extension re-elects Graham to council

Kenneth O. Graham of Breckenridge has been re-elected to a second three-year term on the Agricultural Advisory Council of the Michigan State University Cooperative Extension Service.

The purpose of the council, said Caul, is to advise Extension administrators concerning those Cooperative Extension Service programs that relate to the agricultural segment of society.



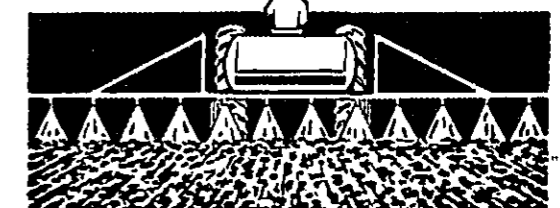
Disaster payments available for winter killed wheat

Dorn Diehl, State Executive Director of the Michigan State Agricultural, Stabilization and Conservation Service Office, urges farmers that have suffered wheat loss due to winter kill or excessive flooding to inform themselves of the payments that are available by contacting their local county ASCS office.

Diehl further emphasizes that anyone who has suffered a loss must file a request with their local county ASCS office prior to the 15th day of June to be eligible for payment, provided they have established to the satisfaction of their county ASC committee that the prevented planting was due to natural causes.

destroying the wheat or devoting the land to any other use. The crop will then be appraised by a certified appraiser. Farmers that have suffered loss from natural causes are eligible for a payment of 66¢ a bushel on the normal yield on their allotment acres for the farm.

Diehl further states that farmers that were prevented from planting their normal winter wheat crop may also be eligible for payment, provided they have established to the satisfaction of their county ASC committee that the prevented planting was due to natural causes.



Section 7. The invalidity of any section, clause, sentence or provision of this Ordinance shall not affect the validity of any other part of this Ordinance which can be given effect without such invalid part or parts.

Section 8. This Ordinance is hereby declared to be immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health or safety, and therefore is adopted as an emergency ordinance in compliance with the Charter of the City of DeWitt.
