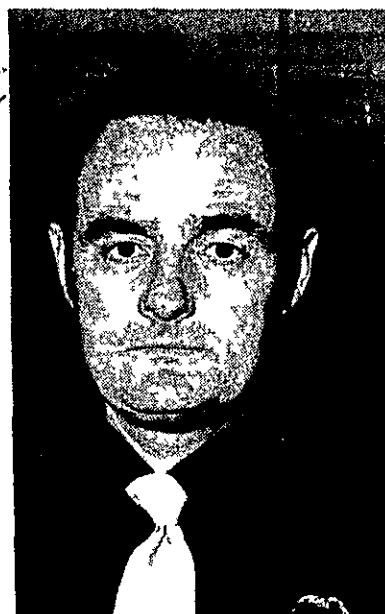
While with the Alma Dept, he advanced from patrolman to corporal and served as a sergeant at the time he resigned to move to DeWitt.

After moving to the community he was self-employed as an electrician and also worked for Michigan State University as an electrician.

A graduate of Saginaw Valley Law Enforcement training, he has received training with numerous other schools and is currently attending the Clinton County Sheriff's Dept In-Serve Training Seminar.

In addition to letters of recommendation from the Alma Dept, he was cited for his involvement in solving a juvenile breaking and entering case.

He said he plans to review the department's activities and policies and sees the most important matter now as regulating hours to provide around-the-clock coverage of the

# St Johns Commission lowers taxes a bit . . . then some more

ST JOHNS -- Although not without protest from 1 commissioner, St Johns city commissioners voted Monday to reduce general fund taxes even more than a reduction proposed by city manager Harvey Weatherwax.

Weatherwax presented the commission with a budget message recommending the present 10 mill general operating tax levy be reduced by 1/2 mill to 9-1/2 mills.

John Hannah said the city had sufficient funds to reduce the levy even further to 9 mills.

After some discussion, Comm Roy Ebert termed the proposal "financial irresponsibility."

Comms Jeanne Rand, Dr James Grost and Hannah told Ebert the city had sufficient funds through Revenue Sharing to allow the added tax cut, but Ebert argued the move should not be made because of the 1-year situation with Revenue Sharing.

Rand, Grost and Hannah all expressed the feeling that the intention of Revenue Sharing was to pass along, if possible, some savings to the taxpayer. They indicated such could be done without hampering the financial operations of the city.

THE VOTE to amend the proposed budget to allow for the extra half mill to be out drew "yes" votes from Grost, Rand and Hannah while Mayor Robert

Wood and Ebert voted "no."

A later move to make up the difference in the budget by taking the money from the storm sewer fund passed by the same vote with Mayor Wood and Ebert again casting "no" votes.

Commissioners explained money for storm sewer projects had already been provided for in Revenue Sharing allocations to come.

Ebert commented, "When their basements fill up, I'll send them to see you."

Ebert's conflict with the commission also ran into the adjournment of the meeting.

AS EBERT was expressing displeasure with County Commissioners Don Gilson and Maurice Gove about their representation concerning equalization matters, his comments were cut short by the move to adjourn by Hannah and support by Grost.

Following is the complete budget message, presented by Weatherwax to the commission:

1. General Fund  
Once again the general fund budget calls for a cut in the property tax rate. It is being recommended that the present 10 mill general operating tax levy be reduced by 1 mill to a levy of 9 mills for general operation. It is recommended that the voted general

obligation bond levy, voted at 3 mills, be set again this year at 1 mill. It is also recommended that the garbage tax be again set at 2 mills. This will make a total levy of 12 1/2 mills of city levied taxes compared to 13 mills last year and 15 mills 5 years ago. The 12 mill levy along with various state and other incomes will support the attached budget.

## DeWitt administrator second to resign

DEWITT -- At a special meeting of the DeWitt City Council, Daniel Elliott, city administrator, submitted his resignation effective at 5 pm the same day.

The resignation was prompted by a check for sick leave and vacation time authorized by Elliott to be made out to former police chief, Charles Anderson, who had resigned as of May 1.

Although the issuing of the check brought matters to a head, Elliott expressed his feelings the whole picture centered around previous conflicts with the mayor.

The mayor, Raymond DeWitt, seemed to agree there were more

# 'Meals on Wheels' to help area elderly

ST JOHNS -- A program to provide hot meals to elderly persons in the St Johns area received a target date kickoff of June 4 last week when volunteers met in an organizational session to establish guidelines and elect officers.

The committee which will direct the new "Meals on Wheels" program has been initially sponsored by the Clinton Memorial Hospital Auxillary. Once the schedule is underway, the entire operation will be administered by a volunteer board of directors, officers and members of the "Meals

on Wheels" committee. Present officers of the group include President Pauline Warren, Vice President Maxine Parmalee, Treasurer Nancy Wells and Secretary Jeanette Huard. Board members are Carol Chalmers, Joan Gentry, Dee Ferris and the Rev Hugh

Banninga. The program calls for daily delivery of food to elderly patrons subscribing to the service. Each delivery will include a hot meal for noon consumption and a packaged meal for the evening. Meals will be prepared and charged at

cost as a public service by the dietary staff of Clinton Memorial Hospital and delivered to patrons by volunteers.

The program is already in effect in a number of other Michigan communities. The local need was brought to attention by officials who felt early release from the hospital could be granted elderly patients who would be assured of at least 1 hot meal per day. In addition to the meals, the delivery also provides an opportunity for daily contact with the persons to assure that all is well.

According to "Meals on Wheels" president, Mrs Warren, the St Johns program will be guided by doctors' referral. Patrons designed by their doctor to receive "Meals on Wheels" service will pay only a minimum charge for the meals they order.

Present plans call for the implementation of the program to be effected by a staff of at least 48 volunteers divided into work forces of "collectors" and "deliverers". The collectors will call on patrons each Monday to secure orders and accept payment for the week's meals and these volunteers will work only 1 month each year.

The 35 deliverers will participate in a rotating schedule which assigns each volunteer to only 1 delivery day per month. The 2 schedules have been adapted from those used in programs now underway in Owosso, Charlotte and Lansing, 3 communities to which Mrs Warren and Mrs Parmalee have travelled to gather information.

A 3rd week category, "qualifier", will initially be performed by Mrs Parmalee. The purpose of this assignment will be to determine special diet requirements so that appropriate instructions can be outlined for each patron.

## It's time to check mailbox

CLINTON COUNTY -- The condition and position of mailboxes, both rural and in towns, will be noted during the week of May 21-26, the period set for Mailbox Improvement Week, according to St Johns Postmaster Keith Mishler.

"The Postal Service designates a week during May each year when customers on rural, city motorized and contract delivery routes are encouraged to examine and improve, where necessary, the appearance of their mailboxes," Mishler said.

"The purpose of Mailbox Improvement Week is to call attention to the need for providing mail receptacles which are designed to protect mail from the weather and are neat in appearance, conveniently located, and safe to use," he said. "Neat, attractive mailboxes make a significant contribution to

the appearance of the countryside and the streets in suburban areas," he added.

He said that in areas where snow removal is a problem, the use of a semiarch or extended arm type of support is suggested. "This allows snow plows to sweep near or under boxes without damage to supports and provides easy access to the boxes by carriers and customers," he explained.

He said the height of the box depends upon the type vehicle used by the carrier. "The box should be adjusted so that as the lid opens, it falls even with the lowered window of the vehicle," he said. "This not only is for the convenience of the carrier, it increases efficiency by enabling the carrier to see clearly into the box when letters are to be picked up and helps him to expedite delivery by saving a few seconds at each box," Mishler explained.

## Irene Mead honored open house guest

ELISIE -- Mrs Orlo (Irene) Mead, Sr, of 441 West Main St, Elsie, will be guest of honor at an open house in the Elsie Junior High School, May 20 from 3 to 5 pm. The public is invited to attend.

The occasion will mark Mrs Mead's retirement after 23 years as head of the hot lunch program of the Elsie Schools. She transferred to the new Ovid-Elsie High School in Sept 1966 as supervisor of all the expanded school operation of the program. She had charge of buying, ordering and the menu planning for the entire program.

There had been no hot lunch program in the Ovid

Schools until the consolidation of the districts.

When the hot lunch program was first started in Elsie in Sept 1949, Mrs Ivah Galehouse Chadwick was in charge. Mrs Mead was the next head cook who carried on the program with help of students. Later, her sister, Mrs Alfred (Wilma) Miller was hired to assist for 14 years and is still on the staff, which has grown to 17 women in addition to the several student aides.

The open house is planned as a surprise by Mrs Miller and the Ovid-Elsie kitchen staff. She will first learn of the open house when reading this story.

MRS MEAD HAS served under the administrations of school superintendents Rex Myas, William J. Beach, Ellis Van Deventer, Earl Seybert, Robert Beauchamp and Donald Kenney.

There were many interesting and unusual events during her years of service in addition to the sea of young faces at the lunch counter, day after day, and those same hungry faces at banquets, graduation proms and other school functions during the past 2 decades.

One outstanding occasion was the banquet Dec 3, 1951 honoring Green Meadow Lily Pabst, an 8-year-old

registered Holstein-Friesian cow owned by Marie H. Green and Sons of Elsie. It was on this date that Lily Pabst broke the world's record for all breeds and classifications by producing 42,805.6 pounds of milk in 365 days. The previous record was set 10 years before by Carnation Farms of Seattle, Washington.

Mrs Mead supervised the banquet in the Elsie High School for some 400 guests, including Michigan's Governor G. 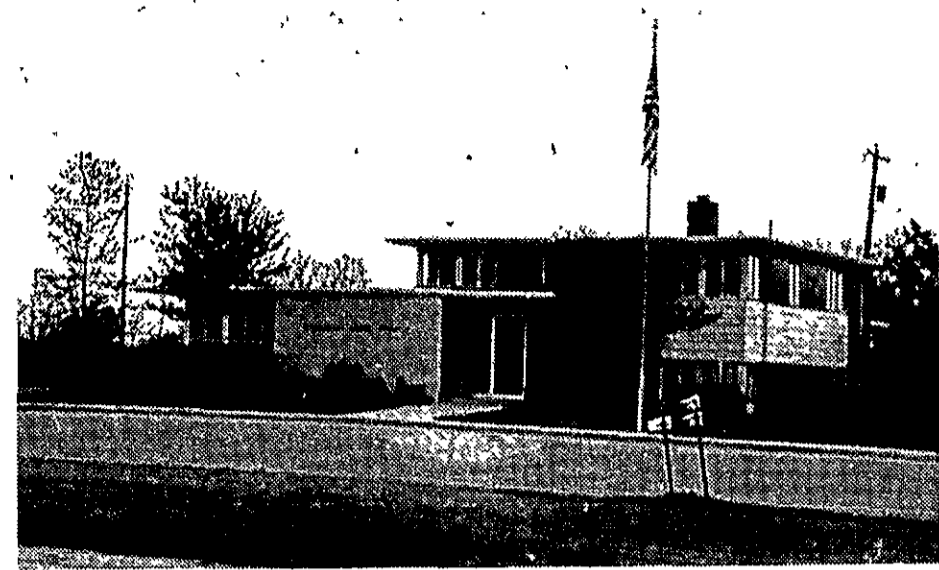

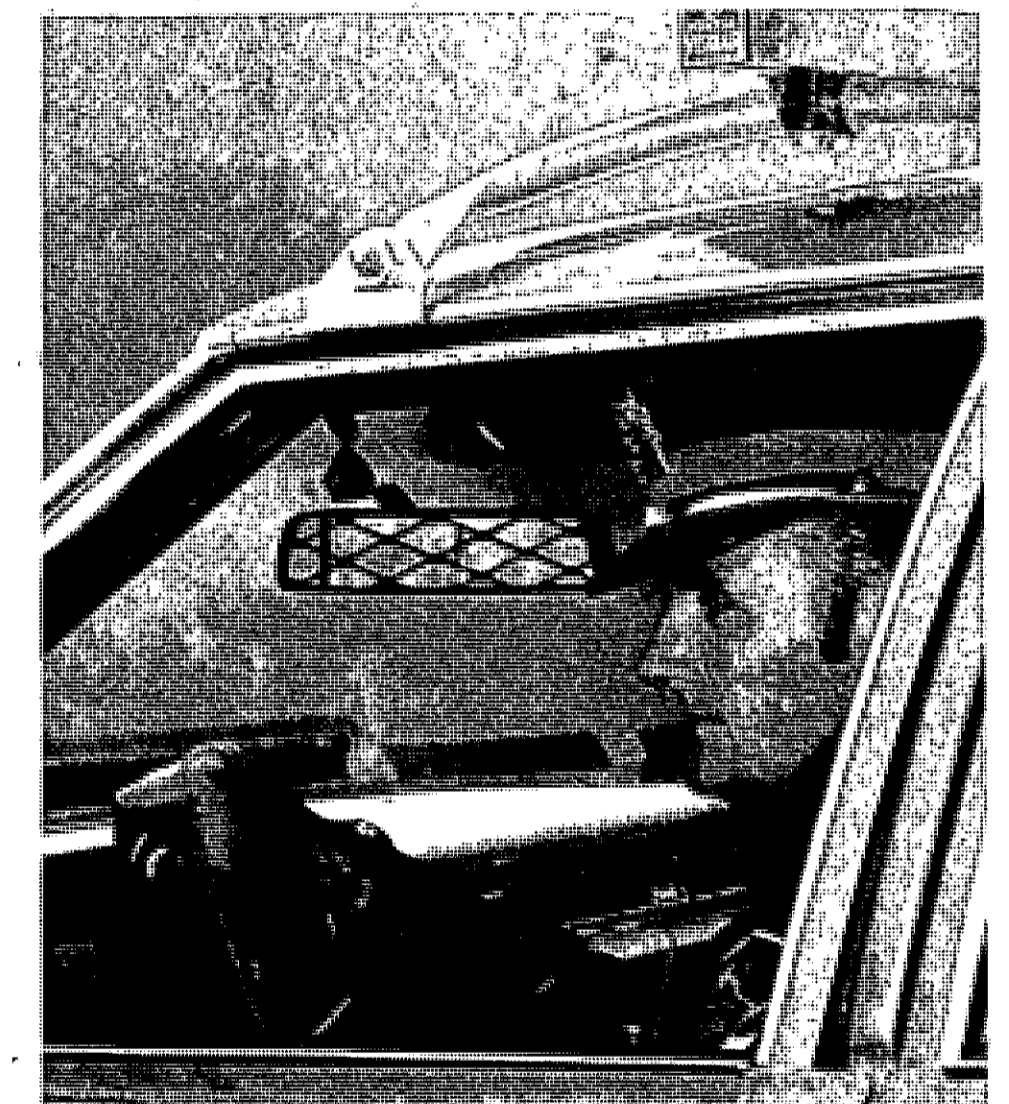

check amounted to approximately \$1200. A DeWitt resident, Thomas Clayton, defended Elliott's action and questioned the city about paying a city administrative director without allowing him to make decisions. Clayton also said "dirty politics" were involved, stemming from the home Elliott had built in the community. Clayton built the home for Elliott and said legal opinions agreed with the location of Elliott's basement. CLAYTON SAID the city indicated the location of the basement, in their opinion, was illegal and gave Elliott an ultimatum to move it or be fired. Only 2 present city council members at that time, Mayor DeWitt and Robert Ballard serve on the present council. In commenting on the conflict and resulting resignation, Councilman Gary Gillespie said, "I've heard

charges and counter charges and I cannot believe there has not been fault on both sides." Gillespie also stressed the need for an administrator in the city and said, "We're not electing a mayor to have an office in the city building. We hire a man to make day-to-day decisions. # Zoning again topic at DeWitt Twp Board meeting

DEWITT TWP -- Thomas Clayton, representing DeWitt Development Corp, told members of the DeWitt Township Board that he "resents being put in the middle" of their problems at Monday night's meeting. This statement was made following a lengthy discussion on the zoning of a 56 acre parcel in the township.

Oliver S. Angell, treasurer of the Board, said the thing bothering him is that the township has been unable to have a meeting with the city of DeWitt on the sewer issue.

Trustee Jack D. Kzeski, Jr, said that even though Clayton claimed they would only develop a portion of the area with multiple family dwellings, the fact still remained that the entire parcel has been zoned RM-1.

Clayton replied that the zoning was granted on the condition that it be developed according to the plan, part single-family and part multiple-family. Therefore, he said, they would have to comply.

Clerk Donna Sverson's earlier motion to table the matter until after a meeting with the City of DeWitt was defeated, and the haggling continued.

Township Supervisor Dale S. Emerson said that he was told by Arnold Minarik that "there was too much paperwork involved to bother with zoning the area A-1 and RM-1."

Kzeski asked that since "we are shackled with" RM-1, what should the Board do now?

Emerson suggested that they approve the plat since developers could not build multiple dwellings anyway because of lot size requirements.

Trustee Roger Fline's motion to bring the issue back in 2 weeks when they

had more information carried.

Angell then questioned the accuracy of the architect's drawing.

Pline expressed concern about possible annexation by the developer of the area to the city of DeWitt.

The Board asked that Clayton check on the dimensions of the drawing and tabled the matter until their next meeting.

In other action the Board heard a letter from a township president requesting that warning signs be erected on Wood Rd, south of Stoll Rd, since he saw a woman almost get killed where the county is constructing a drain. The resident also requested a sign at the intersection of State and DeWitt Rds because of road construction.

Kzeski moved that copies of the letter be sent to the Dept of Public Works and the Road Commission because "both have mutual responsibility." Motion carried.

A resident present at the meeting said he heard Police Chief Bruce Angell "wrecked the police car again," and wanted to know what happened. The Board reported that the car had a "crinkled front end" and damage estimates were \$310.

He also wanted to know why the parents of a minor would be responsible for the damage to the car when Angell was chasing the minor.

Emerson replied that citizens are under obligation to stop for a law enforcement officer. He said their attorney advised the Board to try to collect damages from the youth's parents.

When the resident asked the Board to look into the proportion of damaged police cars from the town-

ship compared with other municipalities of their size, his request seemed to fall on deaf ears.

The utilization of a computerized tax service, Manatron, Inc, of Kalamazoo, was decided against, with the stipulation that it be reconsidered after the first of January.

Janet Everett was named the Board's recommendation for appointment to the Library Board.

John Stevenson, upon Emerson's recommendation, became the Zoning Appeals Board. Emerson said they had hoped to get somebody with more experience, but those more qualified would not consider the job.

Ordinance #24, which proposes minimum widths for fire lanes, was discussed briefly. The Police Committee tabled the proposal for further study, so the Board decided to wait for their report.

A sewer ordinance controlling the flow of storm water into the system was passed.

Other discussion centered around whether the Board should publicize in the Clinton County News and The State Journal controversial ordinances to be considered by the Board.

Kzeski stated that he felt the Board should have a chance to ask questions and offer their opinions on these matters.

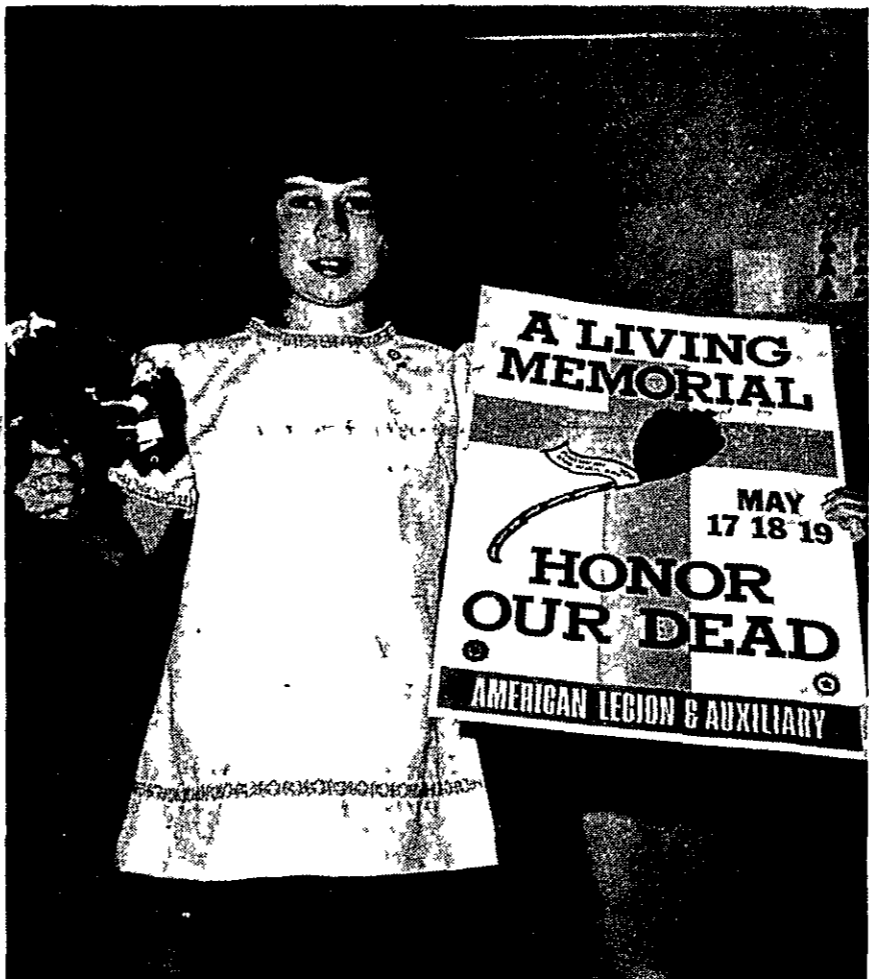
Emerson said he thought any people affected would state their views with or without publicity.

ST JOHNS -- For the past 11 years, a St. Johns resident has been in the thick of the action at Indianapolis as drivers race to qualify for the annual Indy 500.

A familiar sight at the "old brickyard" is Milo Rowell of 306 S Morton.

During those 11 years, Rowell has been working with Roger Huntington of Lansing, a free lance automotive writer for several racing and auto publications.

Rowell travels with Huntington to Indy each year during the time trials, recording technical data in photographs and reports.

Although, Huntington's forte is the nuts and bolts technical angle of racing, Rowell says he finds his interest "inclined to look more toward the personal side."

Typical of their schedule during the time trials is their start at the Firestone Garage checking the industry's tire changes and improvements. And after that, they visited the



Goodyear people for the same reason.

Although Rowell said they usually pass out the same facts from year to year, he explained that Firestone has increased the diameter of their tires this year, an unusual change for the Indy qualifications and race.

The largest tire change, Rowell said, in the past years has been the conversion to "absolutely no tread" in last year's and this year's competition. He said the smooth tires offer more rubber gripping surface and absorb obstacles that previously would rest on the tire surface creating a ball-bearing effect that would sustain skids.

Greater traction over the track also is a result of the tire. At the speeds attained at Indy, Rowell said the tires actually leave a sticky substance on the track after a few runs around the oval. "If the tire is stopped at racing speed," he said, "and a hand was placed on it, the adhesiveness of the tire would cause the hand to become permanently attached."

As Rowell said before, his interest turns to more than tire specifications and engine talk.

He spends much of his time talking to the crews and drivers and told of a prediction by Gordon Johncock, an Indy veteran formerly of Hastings and Mt Pleasant.

Johncock told Rowell he predicted it would take a speed of 202.8 miles per hour, weather permitting, for a driver to qualify for the treasured pole position.

When talking to the County News, Rowell said he didn't entirely agree with the prediction and Saturday, Johnny Rutherford proved Rowell correct. Rutherford qualified for the pole position at 199 miles per hour.

Rutherford explained to Rowell his method of driving the track. He said he drives with his "foot on the floor" until the 1st turn. He then eases up slightly and floors it through the 2d turn and all the way down the back straightaway. At that point the engine begins to peak and Rutherford eases off again and starts the whole system all over again.

Rowell also heard Dan Guerny discussing some problems Al Unser ran into attempting to qualify at 200 miles per hour. After hitting laps of 197 and 198, Unser felt he had a good shot at the 200 mark, but, when he hit the back straightaway, his rear wheels started spinning. At that point he had to let off or run the risk of a dangerous skid.

Ironically Rowell said faster curve speeds are accounting for the increased speeds at the Indy 500. "The straightaways are really not getting any faster because the engines are peaking and won't turn out any more speed."

"To hit a 200-mile-per-hour lap, a driver must be hitting about 205-210 in the straightaway and 180 in the turns."

Rowell has some interesting tales of drivers and their crews with 1 relating how he interrupted Andy Granatelli of STP fame while installing tile in a garage.

"He was putting tile down," Rowell related, "but he was doing such a bad job, I told him to do something else and I'd finish it for him."

Rowell said Grantelli is "like a circus," and is known for antics such as sitting on a table during a night gab session and imitating the sound of his cars making their laps around the track.

Although the qualifications and Memorial Day 500 mile race around the 2-1/2 mile oval provide days of interest for Rowell, he admits the times when tragedy appears take away a lot of the enjoyment.

This year a fiery crash claimed the life of a veteran Indy driver, Art Pollard, and 2 years ago Rowell witnessed the pace car crashing into a press stand, an accident that

sent several persons to the hospital. Rowell indicated he has problems putting such happenings out of his mind.

Regardless, St. Johns' Milo Rowell is a participant in a facet of automobile racing that race fans all over can only dream about.

## School aid to dominate remainder of state legislative session

LANSING -- State Senator William S. Ballenger told the Lansing-Waverly Rotary Club May 8 that since the main achievement of the 1973 Legislature -- a \$380 million tax cut -- has already been accomplished, practically all remaining legislative time before a summer recess would be spent wrapping up a 1973-74 State School Aid bill and balancing the budget.

Speaking at the Lansing Elks Club, Ballenger said that with less than 2 months remaining before July 1, "time is already running out" on any chances the Legislature might have of enacting major bills in other critical areas such as Health

and Social Services, Judiciary, and Environmental and Consumer Protection.

The 32-year-old lawmaker said one of the principal reasons the Legislature is so far behind in its 1973 timetable is due to its misguided attempt to establish its own printing operation, which "quite clearly has been a bust."

Ballenger said that it is costing the state far more to do its own printing and that the state's print shop has fallen a month behind in printing bills. He said "there are fears that the whole system may break down in the legislative home stretch in June and that the new

printing system may foul up the entire legislative process."

Ballenger reiterated his support of Senate Bill 110, the Senate's 1973-74 School Aid bill, and his opposition to building a new State Capitol.

BALLENGER NOTED that SB 110, the so-called "Bursley bill", is based on a new principle of "equal yield" in which one mill of local taxing effort will bring in the same number of dollars per pupil in virtually every school district in the state.

Under SB 110, even the Waverly School District -- which Ballenger noted was by far the wealthiest school

district in mid-Michigan and hence less needful of state help -- would get a \$16 hike per pupil in 1973-74 if it levies the same number of mills for school operations in 1973-74 as it does this year.

Ballenger also said he based his opposition to the erection of a new State Capitol on 5 basic factors:

1) Any extra revenue that the state might have during the next 2 fiscal years should be spent on essential state services such as newly-mandated Special Education;

2) The need for more space for expanding state government can be filled far less expensively by erecting a series of new office

buildings in the same general area;

3) The present Capitol is probably more structurally sound than any new edifice that might be built to replace it and should easily last another century;

4) The present Capitol possesses irreplaceable historical, architectural and psychological value for millions of Michigan citizens; and

5) An overwhelming majority of his constituents oppose such a move.

"I concur with the argument that a new Capitol is inevitable," noted Ballenger. "Sometime in the 21st Century such an idea deserves serious consideration."

Building codes are set up for general health and safety. When they involve a house, let's say, the walls in the house, the code is set up to make sure that the walls are well constructed and safe. ## "If It Fitz . . ."

A lazy man for all jobs

I hope there is a secret FBI report somewhere that says Richardson does no constructive work on Saturdays but instead goes to baseball games or simply sits in the woods and watches the squirrels squirrel around.

I am particularly concerned with Richardson because of a unique employment technique recently instituted by President Nixon. Whenever there's a big job open, Nixon hires Richardson. Within the last 5 months, in this order, Richardson has been secretary of health, education and

welfare, secretary of defense and attorney general. These are 3 of the most important positions in the United States, which certainly makes Richardson an important man, possibly even 3 times as important as Haldeman.

Through his use of Richardson, Nixon is putting the lie to the old bromide which says you shouldn't judge a man's performance until he's had time to learn his job. Or sometimes it is put this way: "Wait until he gets his sea legs."

Richardson was secretary of defense for only 3 months. This is hardly enough time to locate the pencil sharpeners and to learn which stenographers welcome a little leering. In the parlance of the sea, Richardson was still up-chucking over the rail.

But Capt Nixon spotted something about Richardson's short performance as defense chief. It made Nixon think Richardson would make a good attorney general. Good enough to justify the sudden loss of leadership to the defense dept, just as the generals were beginning to learn what time Richardson liked his coffee served and his bombs dropped.

Politics works in wondrous ways. I don't pretend to know what Nixon knows about Richardson. But I think our president is on the right track. Perhaps Richardson should be appointed to ALL of the administration's top jobs at the same time.

Then he should be instructed to take it easy. Stay home 6 or 7 days a week and go fishing a lot.

What this country needs is more sloth in the White House.



## View from the Senate

With Senate and House action completed, what is unquestionably the biggest and most comprehensive tax cut in Michigan history is expected to be signed into law soon.

The two-bill package is scheduled to take effect in 1974 and, over a two-year period, is designed to give tax reductions totaling \$300 million to individuals and an estimated \$80 million to business.

The tax cuts are in two principal packages -- one on income and the other on property.

Each individual will be affected in his own way, depending on his taxable income and on his property taxes as they relate to a percentage of his family income.

As finally agreed upon by both the House and Senate, the bills provide for increasing the personal income tax exemption from \$1,200 to \$1,500.

For a husband and wife, this will mean they will be able to deduct \$3,000 from their gross income rather than the present \$2,400. The income tax relief for a couple will be \$23.40, based on the increased exemption

of \$600 for the couple and the income tax rate of 3.9 percent.

To determine whether you will receive a property tax deduction, multiply your gross income by 3.5 percent. If the result is less than the taxes you pay on the house where you live, you will receive through an income tax deduction an amount equal to 60 percent of the excess over your taxes.

The current property tax deduction formula on your state income tax is repealed under the legislation just passed. So if 3.5 percent of your gross income is more than the property taxes you pay on your home, you will receive no relief on your property taxes.

Renters may claim 17 percent of their gross rent as property taxes and special benefits are provided for disabled veterans, senior citizens, and the blind.

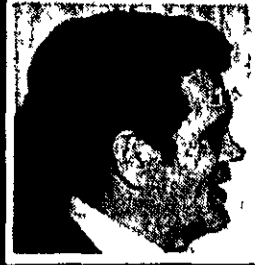
The senior citizens' present homestead exemption will be repealed and the state, under the new legislation, will credit or reimburse all property taxes exceeding 3.5 percent of the person's income up to \$500. A sliding scale provides additional credit or re-

bursement for those earning less than \$6,000.

The new legislation also repeals the present veterans homestead exemption and replaces it with a formula in which the state credits or reimburses a percentage of the property taxes determined by the ratio of the veteran's individual allowance to the homestead valuation up to \$500. The veterans' state equalized valuation is to be eliminated.

The tax-break package also gives incorporated and unincorporated businesses a 25 percent reduction in the property tax on inventories. Businesses without inventories may instead take a 20 percent reduction in their franchise tax. Taxes on intangibles (stocks, bonds and bank deposits) will be reduced by 20 percent under the new law.

A budget expert says the average person in Michigan will get about \$100 in tax relief. Some people will get more, some will get less and a very few will get tax increases, depending on their income, their dependents and the property taxes they pay.



**Proposal "C" presentation lousy**

If there's one conclusion to be drawn from my recent legislative questionnaire it would have to be that a lousy job of presenting Proposal "C" to the voters was done last fall. Very few people understood it.

Maybe it was the emotion surrounding the abortion question on the same ballot that kept people's minds off the property tax question. There certainly was, and still is, a lot of emotion on that subject as revealed in another section of the questionnaire.

Maybe it was a question of just voting "No" on all tax questions. There seems to be considerable feeling like that today.

But whatever the reason, I am convinced there was a lot of misunderstanding on Proposal C. Perhaps the vote would have been the same had everyone understood it but it would have given us in the Legislature a better picture of voter sentiment.

You will recall in my questionnaire, I tried to find out why people voted "no" on this question. I listed several of the most commonly given reasons for rejecting it in the hope of finding some clear course of action for me to follow in future legislative discussions on the same subject.

Among the possible reasons for a "no" vote were:

a) the property tax would still be too high

b) loss of local control of schools  
c) there would be an increase in total taxes

The results show an almost even split among the three answers with 38% saying the remaining property tax would still be excessive, 34% fearing an increase in total tax burden and 28% concerned primarily about loss of local control.

In almost every case, however, comments were added. The most common was that "property taxes should not be used for the support of schools" given as the reason for voting against the proposal.

And that's what convinces me that the sales job was lousy. Because if there's anything Proposal "C" did do, it was to remove the property tax as a basis for normal support of schools. It may have had other drawbacks, but that was the main purpose of the plan in the first place.

To further convince me of the lack of understanding of Proposal "C" I find that when asked what method of financing public education they did prefer, most people said they wanted the state income tax. Again, that was the intent of Proposal "C".

I am not being critical of the voters when I say the question was not understood. It was a complicated proposal and probably no one could foretell all the future effects of it and the

implied connection with Proposal "D", the graduated income tax, didn't help. But any plan to amend the Constitution to provide state funding of education, restrict property taxes, assure local governments of the revenue they need and still give the voter a voice in the raising of the money and the setting of local priorities is going to be complicated.

It's because of this I don't hold out much hope for further constitutional action on the question. People, when they see a complicated issue on the ballot, are inclined to vote against it and I am becoming convinced that whatever solution is found to our education financing system will have to be worked out by the Legislature.

We are making a start this year, not be eliminating property tax, but by increasing the amount of credit for property taxes paid against the state income tax for a large portion of the state's taxpayers. We are also straightening out the inequities in the present property tax by equalizing the yield in every district.

I hope this is only the beginning. In all my questionnaires, one message comes through loud and clear. "We want relief from property taxes", it says and I hope we are able to come through with a plan which will do just that.

**88th District Report**

All of us in the Legislature are concerned about the passage of the state budget which is due to go into effect on July 1, 1973. Passage of the budget constitutes the major action of the Legislature annually.

Now we are faced with the fact that we have only about six weeks to finalize the budget before the beginning of the new fiscal year. At this writing most of the House appropriation bills have moved out of committee and will soon be considered by the total House membership. Only one budget bill, Senate Bill 110, the School Aid Bill, has received final approval in the house of origin. That measure was passed in the Senate and is now in House Appropriations Committee. It is now approximately 60

million over the Governor's recommendation as a result of Senate and House Education Committee action. Amendments by the House would send it back to the Senate or into a conference committee.

The Department bills considered by the House Appropriations Committee are pretty close to Governor Milliken's budget recommendations. The one exception is the Social Services bill which, as currently being considered, runs some \$27 million of state money over the Governor's recommendations.

It looks as though we will have trouble getting the budget completed by July 1. Some fast action on the School Aid Bill could have a lot to do with getting the total budget done by then.

It is fair to believe that the budget as it is now being considered is going to be too high. This budget should be kept close to the Governor's recommendations. Governor Milliken has told us that he will not stand for tax increases, and has cautioned us to live within existing revenues.

Milliken's special messages, promised earlier this year to deal with specific subjects, was issued last week. The Governor put forth a number of important proposals dealing with consumer protection and vowed his support for several bills presently before the Legislature which he feels will benefit Michigan consumers.

Governor Milliken emphasized throughout the message that, "the consumer movement is not-- and should not -- be a rallying cry for the dismantlement of an economic system that has served our citizens well for nearly 200 years".

Rather, Governor Milliken said, "it is a repudiation of misleading advertising, empty promises, deceptive practices, and anti-competitive conduct. And it is a healthy battle for quality in goods and services, for fairness and for honesty in the marketplace."

It must be made very clear that by advocating consumer protection measures we are not indicting business in general. The majority of responsible companies recognize that there is no better business foundation, than insuring that a product or service is worthy of public

acceptance, and they set corporate policy accordingly.

Governor Milliken also called for more stringent legislation to prohibit unfair and deceptive trade practices and to provide recourse for Consumers who are made the victims of such action. In line with this he said he would urge legislation to make the Department of Licensing and Regulation responsible for investigating violations; authorize the Attorney General and local prosecutors to prosecute violators; allow victimized citizens to bring individual or class action suits and provide adequate enforcement mechanisms and penalties including revocation of authority to do business.

The Governor also advocated new and amended legislation to improve the real estate license law; protect mobile home owners; protect purchases of automobiles; expand public representation on state regulatory boards; establish a new debt management act; strengthen state law dealing with franchises; protect citizens from abuse from collection agencies; and grant additional authority to credit unions.

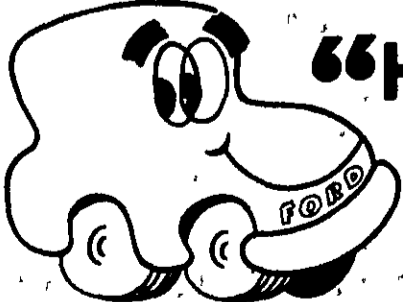

## How farmers earn agricultural payments

Producers who enrolled in the 1973 Feed Grain and Wheat Programs must divert regular rotation cropland from production or sacrifice any program payments, according to Dorn Diehl, State Executive Director, Michigan ASC Committee.

Diehl explained that land retired from production must equal a minimum of 10% of the feed grain base for the farm. That is, a 100-acre base - ten acres must remain idle, except that a producer may, with prior approval, use this acreage for the production of hay or graze livestock by sacrificing a portion of the program payment.

These set-aside acreages in addition to being equal to 10% of the feed grain base, must be areas of regular rotation cropland that must meet minimum size requirements such as not less than 5 acres or two chains (132 feet) in width when designated as strips. The only exceptions to this are that if the areas are in a special conservation use, promote highway safety, or are established for the propagation of wildlife or such areas might be less than the minimum if they meet the total set-aside requirement.

The Nimble Fingers 4-H club members learned about the 4-H Youth Exploration Day June 21-23 at Michigan State University. The members discussed the vegetable sale at the 4-H Fair in August and other summer activities. Becky Barnes was elected News Reporter and Brenda Bancroft was elected Secretary for the summer program. Other officers were retained from the winter program. Members enrolled in their summer projects following the meeting. Demonstrations were given by Rodney Lounds on Wood Sanding and Colby Thompson on "How to Sew on a Button".

Diehl said this will help encourage the maintenance of a larger number of beef and sheep herds to help meet our increased demands for beef and mutton products.

The set-aside requirement for 1973 is the smallest percent of the allotment or bases for the farm since any year of our programs but the restrictions for the complete compliance are just as strict and will be just as closely observed.

**Seven Steps to Savings**  
Are you beating the high cost of living by beating the bushes for low cost meals? Or do you feel beaten down after several months of scraping, scratching, and pawing for workable plans and menus? Drive the depression blues, maybe your efforts are paying big dividends.

A study has shown that weekly food costs for families are averaging from \$17 to \$52 depending on number and ages of family members. The following estimates are based on Feb 1973 averages, and assuming families buy and prepare all foods at home.

- Elderly couple \$17.
- Young couple \$21.
- Family of four, 2 preschoolers \$30.
- Family of four, 2 children in elementary \$35.
- Family of four, 2 teenage boys \$42.
- Family of six, 2 preschoolers; 2 elementary age \$42.
- Family of six, 2 in elementary school; 2 teenagers \$52.

Are your averages ahead or behind? If some family members eat meals away from home, your food bill should be lower than the estimate. Also, if you are a

careful shopper your costs might be lower. On the other hand if your costs are higher you may wish to employ the Selective Shopper's Seven Steps to Savings.

1. Scheme meals using inexpensive easy-to-prepare foods. (Instant potatoes, dried soups, nonfat dry milk, and prepared mixes for biscuits, muffins, and cakes.)
2. Select cuts of meat with more cooked servings for money spent. (Ground beef, liver, pork shoulder, whole and parts of chicken, and turkey and some fish.)
3. Substitute eggs, dry beans, peas and peanut butter for a meatless main dish.
4. Season and prepare sauces yourself.
5. Select foods in season and least expensive processed forms from all food groups. (Plentiful foods, canned corn in winter, nonfat dry milk.)
6. Serve cereals, bread, and pasta, (spaghetti, macaroni, and noodles) every meal.
7. Shop and compare labels, brands and weekly specials.

If you save \$1 for each step you've followed, you'll gain \$7 for your efforts.

### Five complete tractor course

Five Clinton county youth passed the 4-H tractor course given May 9 at the fairgrounds in St Johns. "The Youth Employment in Hazardous Occupation in Agriculture Act" requires any youth between 14-16 years of age to pass the exam if they wish to drive a tractor for anyone except on their own farm.

In order to qualify for this exemption the youth must complete a training program of a minimum of ten hours dealing with the 4-H tractor program units, pass a written examination plus pass a practical tractor exam of backing a two wheel trailer through an obstacle course.

Any person who hires a youth under 16 years of age to drive a tractor, other than the youths home farm, is liable for a potential \$10,000 fine and possible lawsuit if the youth is injured. Any person having any questions regarding the law or tractor program should contact the County Extension Office.



### Farm Tips

#### Avoid camping tragedy

**Avoid Camping Tragedy**  
The camping season is here again as you can readily see by watching the traffic on the north-south highways each Friday or Sunday evening. Follow these tips to avoid camping accidents.

A short in the wiring of a trailer or camper that isn't grounded can be dangerous. If possible, use a three prong outlet to hook up trailer electricity. If you must use a two prong outlet, ground the trailer with a metal rod.

Be sure to use a cord large enough to support the trailer's electrical needs. A small household extension cord may start a fire or burn out appliance motors.

Avoid contaminating trailer or camper water tanks. Bacteria thrives in a tank filled through a dirty hose. If you want to drink lake or river water, boil it for

15 minutes. Even the clearest fresh water should be boiled. Or add three drops of chlorine bleach to each gallon of water and let it stand for half hour.

Food poisoning is another potential camping hazard. To inhibit growth of harmful bacteria, keep hot foods hot and cold foods cold.

Use common household safety precautions around cooking fires, and keep children at a distance.

In some camping areas, wild animals are attracted to camper's food. Check with a park ranger about safe food storage.

If you're towing a trailer or boat, leave early enough so you aren't rushed. When small wheels of towed vehicles are overtaxed, they may jam or blow out. Check trailer lights, wheel bearings and tires before setting out. Don't build an enclosure

around propane gas tanks on trailers. Without proper ventilation, gas tanks could explode. Also, check ahead for tunnels on your driving route. Trailers with propane gas tanks are banned from some tunnels.

When pitching a tent or tent camper, check trees for overhanging, dead branches that could be dangerous in a storm.

Warn children to avoid strange pets in camping areas. A dog tied in an unfamiliar environment may bite.

Comply with boating safety laws and carry a Coast Guard approved life preserver for each passenger.

Avoid overexertion and always let someone know where you are hiking, boating or swimming.
