Gail Koglin, 5501 Ann Drive, Bath, was a passenger on a motorcycle driven by Gerald Hoard, 15526 Park Lake Rd, East Lansing. East Lansing Police reports indicate that the motorcycle was traveling west on M-78

through the Harrison Rd intersection when it was struck by a car driven by Dale Mattice, 2301 Harding Ave, Lansing. The Mattice vehicle was apparently turning east onto Harrison Rd at the time of the crash.

Police were still investigating the accident at presstime. No tickets were issued pending additional reports from witnesses.

"Meals on Wheels" to roll June 4

ST JOHNS -- The first general meeting of workers and board members participating in the St Johns "Meals on Wheels" program was held Thursday, May 24, in the cafeteria of Clinton Memorial Hospital and assignment of duties was made for the opening of meal deliveries Monday, June 4.

According to President Pauline Warren, announcement of the program two weeks ago has brought a number of inquiries from proposed patrons and workers and three firm delivery commitments have been made.

The "Meals on Wheels" program as announced earlier, is designed to provide two meals daily to persons in the community who for some reason might otherwise miss out on satisfactory diet routine. It is anticipated that the program will ultimately operate on its own, but presently operations are directed by the Clinton Memorial Hospital Auxiliary.

Maxine Parmelee, dietician at CMH, explained to the ladies attending last Thursday's meeting the preparation of meals and the delivery process. Meals will be prepared in the hospital and sold to the "Meals on Wheels" group at cost. Patrons subscribing to the service will pay \$1.55 for a hot meal only and ap-

proximately \$2.55 for one hot meal and a cold serving. Special diets for diabetics or other requirements will involve an additional 15 cents per day.

Delivery of the meals will occur daily at noon and both hot or cold meals will be dispensed at that time. Ordering meals can be done through Mrs Fred Ferris, Jr, Monday thru Friday at 224-4149.

Former chief turns self in on misdemeanor

DEWITT -- Charles Anderson entered a plea of guilty in District Court May 23 to simple larceny involving the theft of gasoline from the DeWitt gas pump.

Anderson is former DeWitt chief of police.

He was reported to have been observed removing gas from the city pump and the pump was placed under surveillance for 2 evenings with no

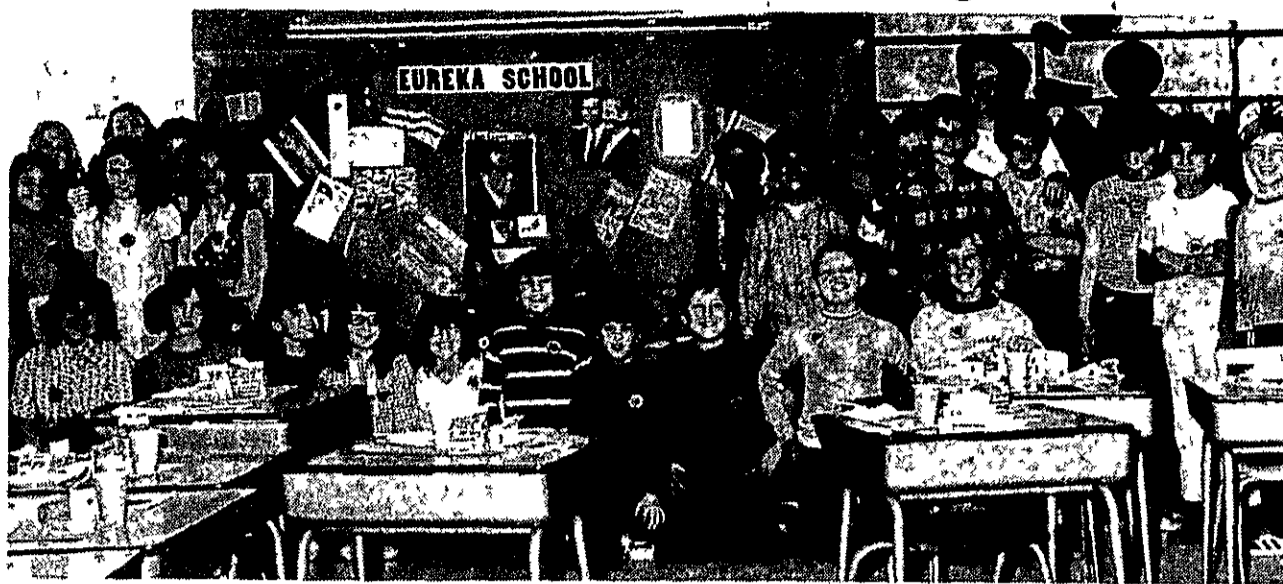

"Meals on Wheels" - - what it's all about at Clinton Memorial Hospital

WHAT IT IS - "It's a program calling for the delivery of two nutritious meals each day, seven days a week, to patrons sub-

scribing to the service. **WHO MAY SUBSCRIBE** - Any person who is apt to benefit from the service, particularly those recom-

mended by a doctor. For example, persons discharged from the hospital during convalescent period; persons needing special diets

such as low salt, low fat or diabetic; persons physically handicapped or shut in; persons who feel they cannot adequately prepare their

own meals. **WHAT ARE THE MEALS** - Regular deliveries provide a hot meal for noon consumption and a cold meal

for later in the day. Hot meals usually consist of cooked meat or fish, potato or substitute, vegetable, salad, bread, butter, milk

and dessert. The cold meal will generally consist of a sandwich, salad, milk and dessert. **WHO PREPARES THE**

MEALS - All meals will be prepared by the kitchen of Clinton Memorial Hospital under the direction of the staff dietician. Special diets can be prepared under order of attending doctor.

HOW ARE MEALS DELIVERED - Meals delivered daily at noon by volunteers.

WHAT IS THE COST - Hot meal only costs \$1.55. Hot meal and cold supper, \$2.55 and special diets are an additional 15 cents per day.

HOW ARE MEALS ORDERED - By calling Mrs. Fred Ferris, Jr., Monday thru Friday, at 224-4149. Meals may be cancelled Monday thru Friday by calling 224-2315, Ext. 236 before 9 am the day of delivery. Saturday and Sunday meals may be cancelled by calling before 3 pm Friday.

PAYMENT FOR SERVICE - Collections are made by volunteer "Meals on Wheels" workers and time of collection is arranged for at the time order is placed.

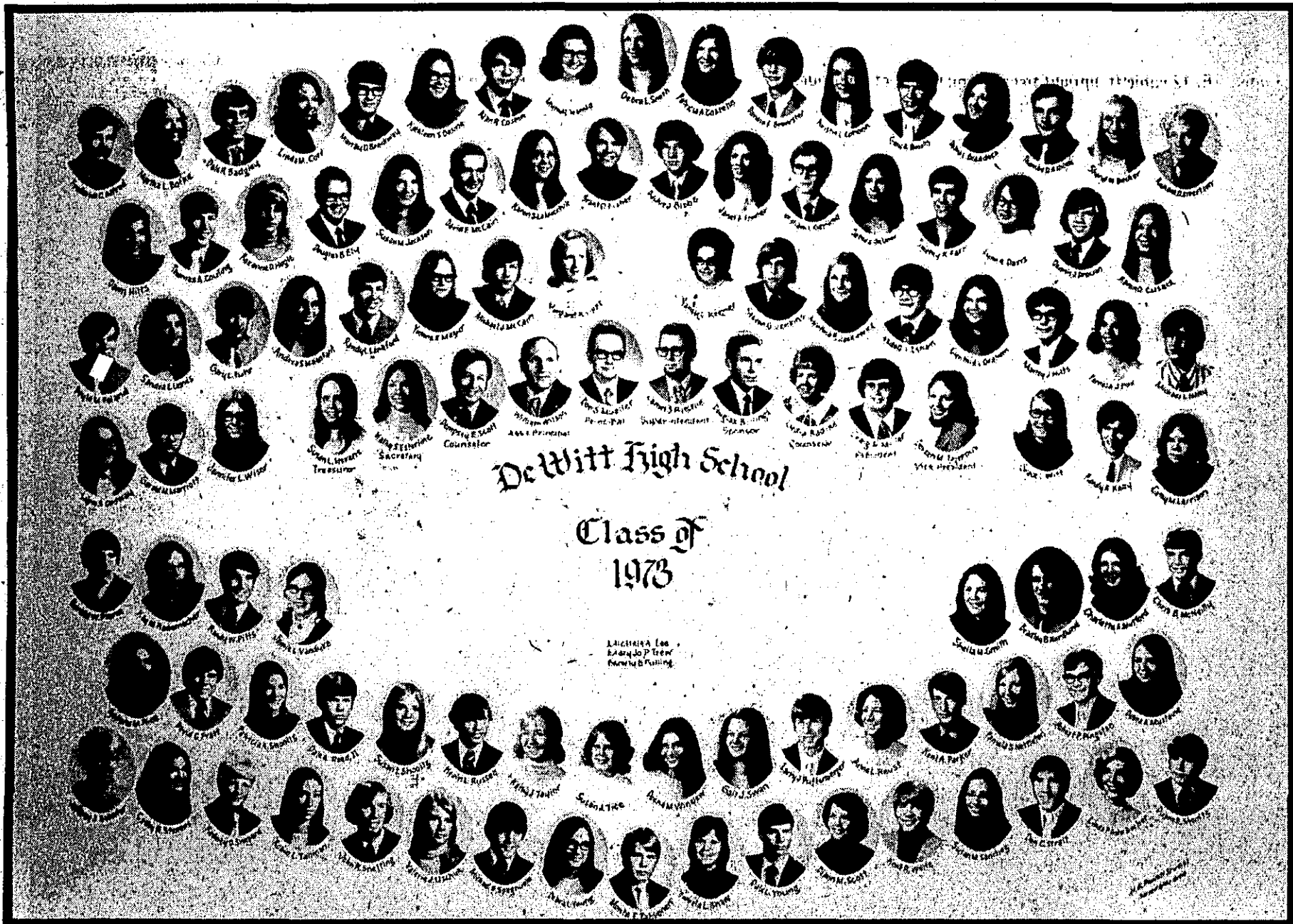

Future looks good for Michigan bean growers

LANSING -- There's an increasing demand for Michigan beans around the world, and it foretells a good future to those growers who are able to supply the expanding needs.

That's the belief of leaders of the Michigan bean industry, who have been receiving some orders for beans and increasing numbers of inquiries for the high-protein crop. While approximately one-fourth of Michigan bean production has been exported in recent years, the sudden high interest has some leaders of the industry worried that there may be an increasing

demand for beans which may not be available, and that the interested foreign countries may not be served and then turn to other areas for supply.

So they are expressing the hope that high production of white and colored Michigan beans is maintained, instead of turning large acreages over to soybean growing this year. These leaders are pointing out that soybeans can be grown in many states, and that Michigan production is a rather small percentage of total American soy crop, putting local growers into a subsidiary position, with the rest

of the country. Those areas can't produce Michigan in soybeans, so despite the high current price, Michigan growers would be at a disadvantage.

Many other states, because of a longer growing season, can outproduce Michigan in soybeans and in corn. This is not true of dry beans, and since dry beans are produced here in greater quantities, these leaders point out, Michigan growers of navy and colored beans are in a better position to control production and marketing.

What has created the sudden demand for more dry

beans is that, in part, several former exporting countries -- Yugoslavia, Bulgaria and others in the Balkan area -- suddenly turned to importing beans. Thus, their own demand for beans is added to that of European and African countries which are no longer supplied by these Balkan bean growers.

"THERE'S SUDDENLY an acute world-shortage of protein," explained Maynard D. Brownlee, secretary-manager of the Michigan Bean Commission, who returned recently from a technical mission in Europe, which took him into

the Balkans. "Some of these countries, which formerly grew beans, are now turning to corn for feeding livestock, since people in these lands are consuming more animal proteins, like pork and beef, instead of living on plant-proteins," he went on.

Dr George Dike, of the Michigan State University Department of Economics, added that mechanization is coming to some of these countries, which will eventually eliminate "intercropping" -- planting beans between rows of corn in the same field. "When harvesting is in small quantities, by hand, then

separations are made quite easily," Doctor Dike pointed out, "but when it becomes a mechanized procedure, then crops need to be kept separate."

Doctor Dike recently received an inquiry from the U.S.S.R., where more beans are needed for a growing canning industry. Between 1969 and 1972, Doctor Dike said, bean production in the U.S.S.R. increased from 64,000 tons to 76,000, then up to 88,000, only to drop to 78,000 tons in 1972. "Apparently," he went on, "poor weather conditions which affected the Russian corn crop also reduced their

beans, when they were striving to enlarge the previous year's production."

Actually, the bean industry of Michigan has good reason to believe that "a few hundred tons" of beans have been sold into Russian channels, probably through its national buying and selling agency. Some of them may be used for a basic canning industry, in line with the improving standards of living throughout Europe, the Middle East and Africa.

One problem with exporting beans this year has been the low supply in shippers' and processors' hands, Brownlee pointed out.

It's known that the bean industry had a request for a quotation on 7,500 tons of beans for South Africa, spread over a three-month period, and not one Michigan shipper was able to quote a price, as they simply didn't have the beans on hand and weren't sure they'd be able to get them if they accepted the order.

"GROWERS HAVE done a much better job in recent years of selling their beans in a more orderly pattern throughout the marketing year. However, just as important as not dropping the entire crop on the market at harvest time, is to keep an even flow of beans coming into the market, otherwise important sales may be lost to other countries -- sales which may be sorely needed later," Brownlee explained.

Consumers Power plans extensive work in St Johns

Ed Note: The following proposal by Consumers Power was approved at the Monday night meeting of the St. Johns City Commission.

In 1970 Consumers Power Company undertook replacement of 3-inch cast iron pipe in City gas distribution systems throughout its operating territory. A great deal of this small pipe has been in

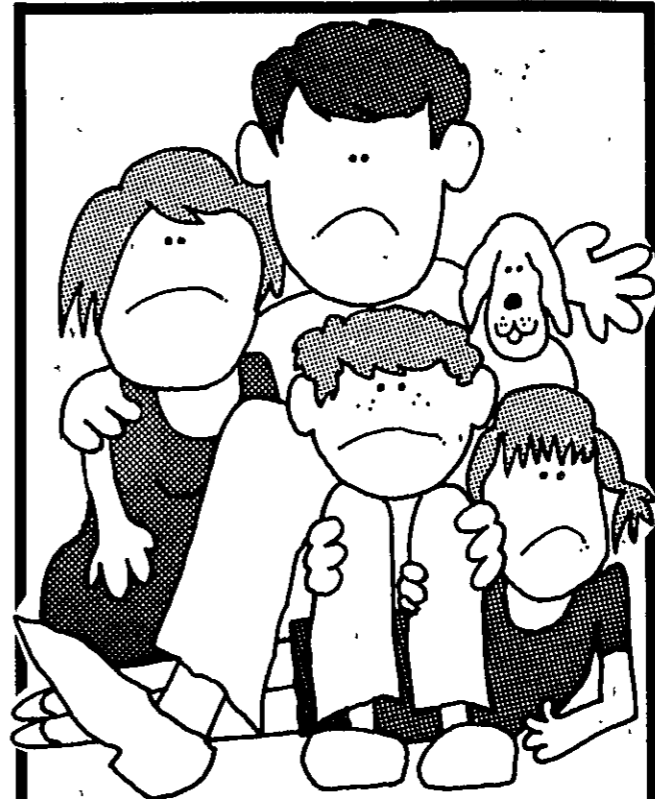
service since 1899 and was originally built for distribution of manufactured gas to homes as a source of light. Over the years gas loads have increased with the addition of gas ranges, water heating and home heating. In addition, with the introduction of natural gas in 1942 to St. Johns, pressures on the distribution system continued to increase as the demand for gas grew.

Replacement of this 74 year old pipe will permit more efficient operation of the gas distribution system in St. Johns and directly improve the system's ability to handle gas load.

Consumers Power Company is proposing to replace approximately 2.2 miles of 3-inch cast iron pipe with new, yellow plastic coated, steel pipe on various streets in the

City of St. Johns. A map marked in yellow showing the streets involved and a separate listing of those streets are attached. The new steel pipe is to be placed in the parkway between the pavement edge and sidewalk and will be installed at a depth of 24 inches minimum below the existing ground surface. Wherever individual residential gas services terminate in an

inside gas meter location the Company will relocate the gas meter to the outside of the residence at no cost to the customer. Relocation of gas meters from inside to outside will follow as closely as possible the installation of the new steel gas pipe. 210 individual gas services will be involved in the work of gas pipe replacement. In addition all residential inside gas meters in the City of St. Johns will be moved to the outside of the residence. It is anticipated that the work of gas pipe replacement will begin on or about June 1, 1973 and will be completed by October 1, 1973. Consumers Power Company will restore streets and parkways to their original or better condition on completion of this work.

"To get a prospective customer interested, and then to have to tell him you can't supply him is actually worse than not getting him interested at all," he concluded. "It would also be well to get the 1972 crop moved out before the new crop arrives, because frankly, the 1972 beans were very poor in color, not typical of Michigan quality, and if they were forced to compete in the market against a better 1973 crop, there could be a disastrous cut in price for the 1972s, based on quality," he went on. Brownlee noted that reports from elevators indicate heavy deliveries of 1972-crop beans in recent weeks.

Professor Dike, looking over a chart of growers' intentions as revealed in March, stated that it would appear that the '73 crop beans could go into the \$9 to \$9.40 range next fall. If growers are planning to go into greater navy and colored bean production, there may be some last-minute shortages of quality seed, he said, at the same time expressing doubt that there will be enough soybean seed if there is an unplanned rush for more soybean acres to capitalize on the present high price.

25 YEARS AGO May 27, 1948

The value of real estate and personal property in the city of St. Johns reached a new high of nearly four million dollars, according to figures released this week by City Assessor Elmer Irer following last week's session of the city's board of review.

Harold F. Millman, St. Johns druggist for the past 26 years, announced this week that he had sold his drug store on North Clinton Avenue, to Keith McDowell, of West Branch.

Mrs. Ethel Bishop, for 25 years a teacher in the St. Johns School system, was honored Monday evening at a dinner given by women teachers who had served with her in the city grade schools. Mrs. Bishop will retire at the end of the current school year. She had been principal at Perrin-Palmer for 19 years. The dinner party was held at the high school.

The Elmer B. Swagart family was host Sunday, May 16, to the family of Mr. and Mrs. Frank E. Swagart whose 58th wedding anniversary was May 18. Mr. Swagart who was 80 years old May 22 and his wife, Emma, who was 76 May 14, are enjoying average health for people of their ages. They are the parents of eight children and have twenty three grandchildren and eight great-grandchildren.

10 YEARS AGO May 30, 1963

The proposal for annexation to Ovid submitted last Friday and Saturday to voters in 10 rural school districts in the Ovid area was defeated in seven of the districts, according to Ovid Superintendent, Sanford J. Nelson.

Funeral services will be held at the Osgood Funeral Home here Friday at 1:30 pm for Lynds L. Conn, 93, of 301 S. Clinton Avenue, who died at Clinton Memorial Hospital Monday evening after a short illness. A heart condition was listed as the cause of death.

Memorial rites for 30 deceased members of the St. Johns Rotary Club were held at Mt. Rest Cemetery following the club's Tuesday noon luncheon.

Some 75 persons attended a reception at Greenwood School Sunday afternoon for Reva Ward, who will begin teaching seventh and eighth grades at East Essex next fall after 23 years at the Greenbush township school.

The US Department of Agriculture announced April 8, 1963, that the national average price for 1963 crop dry beans will be \$6.32 per hundred weight, the same as for the 1962 crop.

Clinton County is still \$1,856.75 short of its \$7,800 goal in a 39-county fund drive for an all-faiths chapel to be built at Traverse City state hospital, according to Anthony Kuntz of St. Johns, county chairman of the drive.

ONE YEAR AGO May 31, 1972

An all out effort will be made by Farm Bureau members in every part of the state to secure passage of the Agricultural Marketing and Bargaining Act now pending in the House Labor Committee. The announcement was made by Elton R. Smith, Michigan Farm Bureau president, from the organization's state headquarters in Lansing.

The first year of a non-graded reading program is drawing to a close at St. Joseph School in St. Johns, but successes of the fledgling effort have already spawned excitement for enlargement.

A native of St. Johns, Dr. Norbert A. Kuntz of Shelburne, Vt., was one of 24 recipients to receive assistance in 1972 under the New Jersey Historical Commissions annual grant-in-aid program for research in New Jersey history. The \$6,000 in grants ranged from \$100 to \$400.

The hucksters say you should buy a so-and-so model so you can split diamonds in the back seat without smashing your thumb. It's personal

Being a newspaper reporter, especially on a paper covering an entire county, entails a lot of driving. Consequently, I see a lot of scary things on the streets and highways in the area. Perhaps mentioning some of these things will make readers reconsider their driving habits.

Last week on US-27 in DeWitt Township a truck driver was unable to stop behind 2 cars slowed down to make turns. So, he plunged head-first (after crossing the centerline) into a mud-filled ditch. The thought did occur to me that maybe the turning cars didn't signal soon enough, or at all. Maybe this accident could have been prevented if they had used their turn signals sooner.

SEVERAL TIMES, also on US-27, I've witnessed residents of a house on the

west side of the road back out onto it to get out of their driveway. That highway is heavily traveled, and these residents should know better than to do something so stupid. A turn-around added to their driveway would probably be expensive, but not nearly as costly as an accident.

Another hazard I see frequently involves cars not stopping for school buses with flashers on. Not only is this dangerous, but it is also a violation of state law which requires cars approaching from either direction to stop.

Several safety organizations across the state have issued statements recommending that drivers turn on their lights whether it's dark or not. This practice makes it a lot easier to see oncoming cars, especially on nasty days. A person may find a run-down battery once

or twice until the habit of turning off headlights is firmly established, but I would certainly rather have a dead battery on my hands than a dead body. This is a must for motorcycle riders.

CAR MAINTENANCE is important to safe driving. A person can't expect to purchase a car and drive it without some occasional repairs. Areas to be concerned with include shock absorbers, brakes, steering, windshield washers and wiper, as well as undercarriage of the car.

And, please buckle your seat belts. Driving is a gamble no matter what you do, so it seems logical to me to have the odds in your favor. As the National Safety Council says, "Don't buckle your seat belt... then you can buckle your steering wheel."

Don't ignore the "plus" side

As the Watergate investigation becomes more involved much of the feeling in this area is, "I'm getting sick of hearing about it."

We suppose this could be a justified reaction from a public unable to escape the charges, counter charges, denials etc facing us from the front page and all day on television.

However, with all of the grime and implications of the hearings, let's not lose sight of the "plus" side of the investigation.

Regardless of the outcome of the hearings and investigations, the whole activity is an example of our system of government at work.

We can be thankful we don't live in a country where the entire situation would not be allowed to become public knowledge.

For we do live in a nation where the press is not controlled to the extent that it is merely a mouthpiece for the controlling powers.

We are also fortunate to be citizens of a country where the entire hearings and their unknown revelations are allowed to be aired on nationwide television.

If other nations may look at us with that, "It's a fine mess you've got yourself into" attitude, we can take heart in a government with the ability to recognize and face a flaw in the system.

While we shake our heads thinking, "what's this country coming to?" let's also be encouraged to know it's a nation where the government hasn't grown so powerful as to become out of reach of the governed.

View from the Senate

You can do almost anything with statistics.

For instance, you might think that Michigan's highway traffic record last year was excellent, since the 3.9 death rate per 100 million miles of vehicle travel equaled the state's all-time low set in 1971.

But that assumption isn't exactly true when you look at some other statistics.

The death toll of 2,258, up 106 from 1971, was the fourth worst annual loss in the state's history, according to a report just issued by the Michigan Department of State Police.

Furthermore, 178,929 injuries were recorded, an increase of 13.5 percent over the previous year, and the 359,745 accidents recorded represented an increase of 14.5 percent.

Which amounts to somewhat of a paradox—and how can we explain it?

Well, the answer appears to be simply that more vehicles and more drivers in 1972 traveled a record high of 57.7 billion miles, for a four percent gain over 1971.

The State Police booklet is

filled with hundreds of interesting—and, unfortunately, sad—facts about Michigan traffic accidents last year.

For instance, a traffic accident was reported every one minute and 28 seconds somewhere in Michigan in 1972—and one person was killed as a result of a traffic accident every three hours and 53 minutes.

One person was injured every two minutes and 56 seconds, or a ratio of 79.2 injured for every person killed.

Some hard-working statisticians somehow determined that the economic loss in Michigan traffic accidents last year amounted to \$632 million.

Recognizing again that anything can be read into statistics, it nevertheless seems reasonable to assume that if drinkers and speeders could be removed from Michigan highways, the number of traffic fatalities would drop precipitously.

Statistics show that alcohol was a factor in 46.4

percent of all fatal accidents where drinking had been determined, and excessive speed, or speed too fast for conditions, was blamed in 44.2 percent of all fatal accidents.

Of all fatal accidents, 22.9 percent occurred at intersections.

It is especially interesting to note that while more accidents—66 percent—occurred in city areas, more fatal accidents—67 percent—occurred in rural areas.

All accidents involving deaths or injuries are sad, of course, but it seems especially tragic that 19 percent of all drivers involved in fatal accidents were under 20 years of age and 37.8 percent under the age of 25.

One of every 3,942 persons living in Michigan was killed in traffic accidents last year, one of every 49.7 persons injured, one of every 14.3 registered motor vehicles and one of every 9.0 licensed drivers in Michigan was involved in a traffic accident.

With Memorial Day weekend coming up, all of this seems to say: Drive Carefully!

The appointment of 2 women to new positions at Clinton National Bank and Trust Co was announced this week by vice president Gayle Desprez, personnel director.

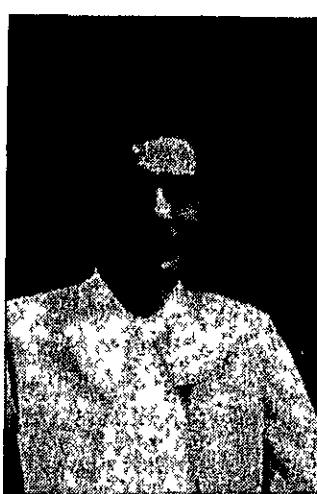

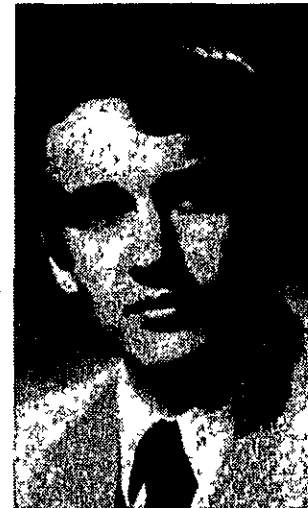

Farm Tips

Now is the time to check your fields for Alfalfa Weevil, in fact, yesterday would have been a better time.

The Alfalfa Weevil overwinters as adults in Alfalfa fields, fence rows or woodlots. They become active on the first warm days of spring and are most active on warm nights and cloudy, windless days. These adults lay eggs inside the hollow stems of Alfalfa or other plants. The young grubs that hatch from these eggs move out of the stems and feed on the tips of Alfalfa. As they grow larger, they begin eating the leaf tissue leaving only the veins which gives damaged leaves a skeletonized appearance. Weevil grubs have a block head and a legless, cylindrical, wrinkled body. They are nearly white just after hatching but become green with a prominent white stripe down their backs as they grow larger. When full grown, they are about 3/8 inches long.

There is considerable variation in the abundance and development of the Weevil in different parts of the state and in different

fields, so you must check each of your own fields.

After Alfalfa is six inches high, check every few days for grub damage during normal weather, and more often when temperatures reach 60 degrees or higher.

The critical point for the first cutting is reached when about 1/4 of the tips show grub damage. You can determine this damage by cutting a handful of about 20 tips in several parts of the field and counting the of damaged tips. A tip that shows any feeding should be counted as damaged. The stubble and regrowth following the first cutting should also be checked for Weevils, whether the first cutting has been sprayed or not.

You can take the first cutting without spraying if (A) Most of the tips show damage when the field is examined. A lot of damage has already occurred and the costs for insecticides cannot be justified. Also, insecticides do not give good control on tall plants in heavily infested fields and an additional stubble spray is needed in such fields. (B) 1/4 or less of the tips show

Weevil damage and the first cutting will be taken within 7 but not more than 10 days. You should spray the field if: (a) About 1/4 of the tips of the first crop show Weevil damage and the field will not be cut for at least 7 to 10 days. (b) If grubs can be readily found in the stubble following the first cutting. This is a common situation when the field was cut late or was heavily infested when cut. Grubs can severely damage the young regrowth. Do not delay in applying an insecticide to the stubble if the grubs are abundant. (c) If about 1/4 of the regrowth after the first cutting shows Weevil damage and the new growth is less than 4 to 6 inches high.

Insecticides are poisons; handle, store and apply them with great care. READ THE LABEL before buying any insecticide. The label has full instructions for the safe, effective use of that insecticide.

The Home Economist

EAST LANSING -- Spring has sprung. And the activity of your children may seem to have sprung also. Give them some interesting spring projects to grow. Children can grow many plants from food items normally kept in the kitchen cupboards or refrigerator. Root crops will provide a variety of foliage from lacy to bold in all shades of green. Try carrots, beets, turnips, rutabagas and parsnips. Cut off the root, leaving an inch and root them in sand. Sweet potatoes will grow lovely vines. Select a sweet potato with signs of life in the eyes. Place toothpicks in the sides of the potato and rest them on the rim of a glass containing water, so that the tapered end of the potato is down and about a third is in water. A hyacinth glass is recommended for rooting and growing the vine, but any glass will do.

An avocado seed will grow into a lovely house plant. Treat it the same as the sweet potato with the lower part in water or place directly in a pot of soil, covering only half of the seed. In about 2 months when roots have formed on the seed germinating in water, add soil to the water to about half-and-half proportions. After two weeks, carefully pot the avocado plant.

Little trees can be grown from seeds of all citrus fruits by planting in soil. Keep the seeds moist until planting. Growth will be increased if a little liquid fertilizer is added after the seeds have sprouted.

Create your own Jack-in-the-bean-stalk. Lentils from the grocery store can also be planted in soil and will soon sprout.

The next time you purchase a pineapple, slice off the top, leaving about two inches of the fruit on it. Let the cut heal for two days before planting. Place the top in sand to rot. When a strong root system has formed, plant the pineapple in good moist soil. You now have a bromeliad.

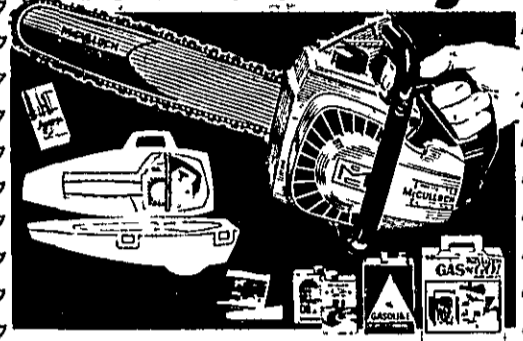

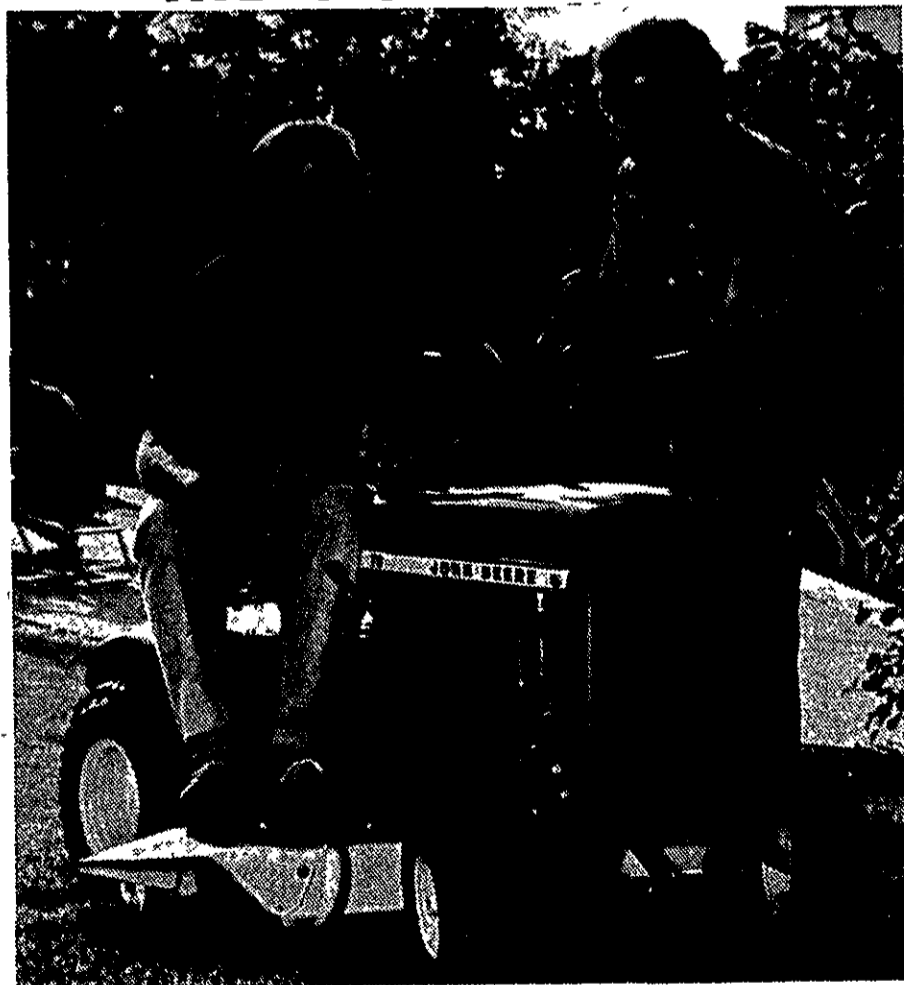

Applications for personalized license plates now available

LANSING--If you've always wanted a special type of license plate... one that reflects the real you... you may now apply for personalized license plates.

Applications for these special plates being offered at Michigan for the first time are available at all branch offices of the Secretary of State, according to Secretary of State Richard H. Austin.

Those who apply now will receive Michigan's first vanity plates for the 1974 year. Deadline to apply for the new plates, which will cost \$25 plus the normal license plate fee, will be midnight June 30, according to Austin.

"The new plates may carry no less than two letters, and no more than six numbers and/or letters. There are a few restrictions as to what cannot be used on the plates, and these are listed on the applications," Austin said.

"Because the applications will become available at our offices on different dates, we are going to treat all requests received up to May 14 as one group," Austin said.

"All of the applications will then be sorted, and all duplicate requests will be placed in a lottery with the winner being chosen by drawing," he said.

"We feel this will give the individual in Ironwood the same chance of getting the plate he wants as the man in Detroit who may have been able to get his application two days earlier," Austin said.

Duplicate second and third choices will also be processed by lottery. These left from the drawing, provided they are not also duplicates will be awarded their second or third choices.

After May 14, applications will be filled on a first come first serve basis, Austin indicated.

"If all three choices have been taken, then we will contact that individual and determine if they wish something else," he said.

The Department of State will begin returning the blue and white "vanity" plates, stamped 1974, to their new owners on November 15, the same day regular passenger car license plates go on sale.

The money received for the personalized plates will be placed into the Highway Motor Vehicle Fund and will be used for litter pick-up and highway clean-up.

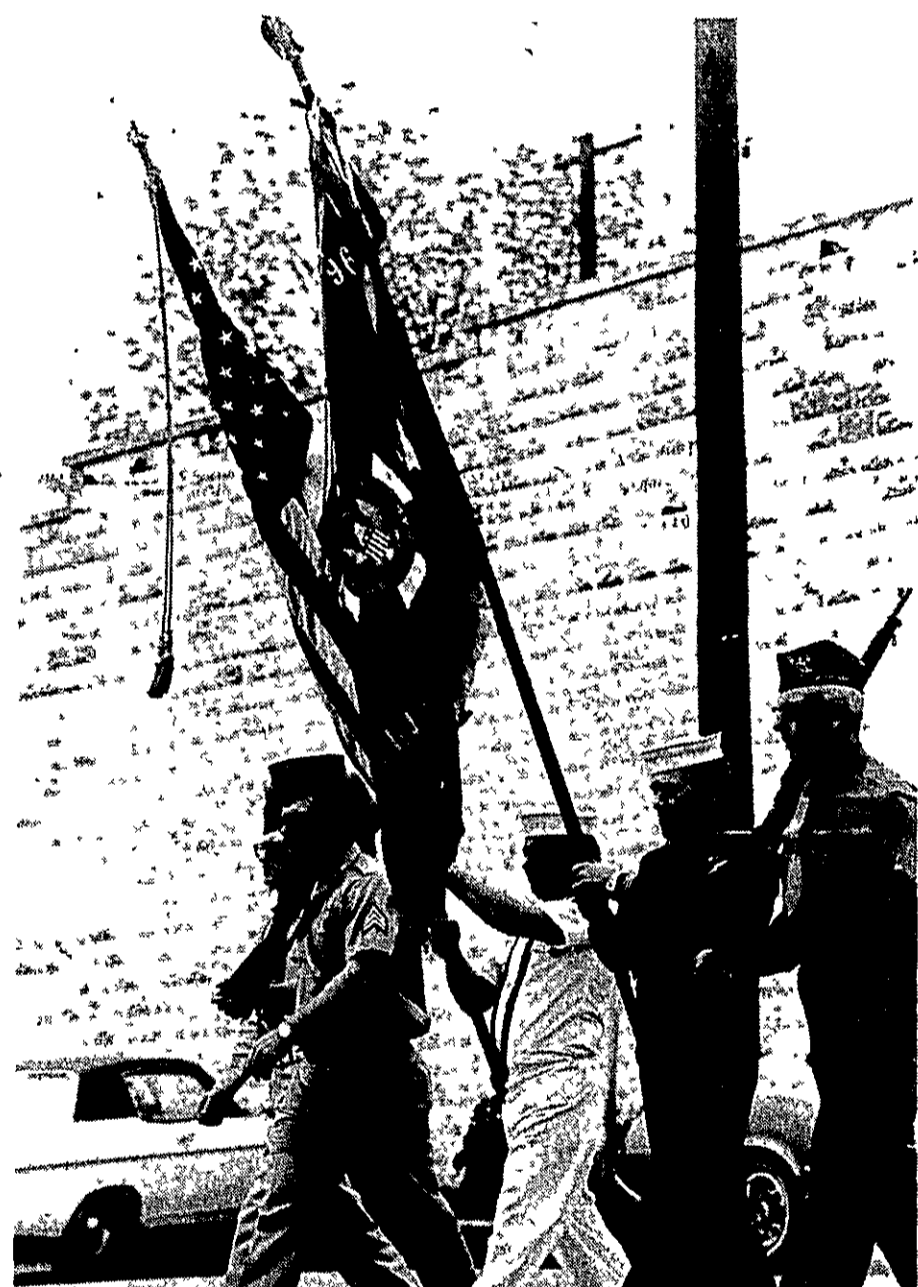

Elsie man relates experiences as teacher in African nation

ELSIE - In checking over my mail I found this envelope that looked quite intriguing with its postmark "Maseru, Lesotho, Africa" and various stamps that pictured the Lesotho flag, Basotho pony, Basotho hat, maize, wheat and mohair, products of that small country.

Opening the envelope, I found an interesting letter about that country from Michael Slagh, son of Dr and Mrs E.M. Slagh of Elsie. He is currently teaching history at the Lesotho High School in Maseru.

He sent "Greetings and Best Wishes" from Africa, especially to his family and friends here. Previously he had been teaching in Australia.

Following is the content of his description of the Kingdom of Lesotho, a black controlled sovereign nation located in southern Africa. In 1966, Lesotho changed her name from "Basuto-land" and ceased to be a British Protectorate. That same year Lesotho was admitted to the United Nations.

Lesotho has a population of 1.2 million and an area of 11,700 square miles. The capital is Maseru and the present monarch is Mosheshoe II. However, a coup in 1970 stripped the king of most of his power and the real power is concentrated in the hands of the prime minister, Chief Lesbua Jonathan.

Lesotho is a mountainous country (nicknamed the Switzerland of southern Africa) with a healthy, temperate climate. It is now winter with cold, frosty nights but warm, dry sunny days. The majority of the people live in mountain villages in one room circular houses called rondavels. Television is totally non-existent and electricity and telephones are rare. In spite of the fact that Lesotho has the highest literacy rate (about 70%) in all of Africa, the average annual per capita income is only \$6 Rand (about 709 dollars).

This small country is basically an agricultural nation with the main products being wheat, and other grains, livestock, minerals, wool and mohair. Unemployment is a major problem and thousands of the citizens are forced to

seek jobs in the mines of the Republic of South Africa.

The Republic of South Africa consists of 472,349 sq miles and has a population of 17 million blacks and 4 million whites. The whites have control of the government and practice the policy of "apartheid" or as they define it - separate but equal development. But government statistics on wages in the public sector, for instance, show that whites in 1972 earned an average of 422 US dollars a month and blacks, 64." (quoted from March 19, 1973 US News and World Report)

Rep Charles C. Diggs (D-Mich) has introduced House Joint Resolution 1139 in Washington, D.C. Diggs' legislation would require all South African subsidiaries of US firms (more than 350 are involved) to apply fair employment practice - equal pay for comparable work, equal fringe benefits, hiring, training and advancement opportunities without regard to race in their South Africa installations before they would be allowed to qualify for US government contracts anywhere in the world.

Rep Diggs' bill has not received top priority and has been shelved for the time being.

Lesotho High School has an enrollment of 328 students, all black with the exception of one white Canadian girl. The staff consists of 14 teachers - 8 Basotho (blacks), 3 Americans and 3 Britons. All of the classes are conducted in English with the exception

of the Lesotho language classes. Classes begin at 8:05 a.m. and end at 1:15 pm with the school day being divided into seven 40-minute periods.

The students are also required to attend afternoon and evening study halls.

Sports are popular at LHS and include softball, tennis, boxing, volleyball, track and soccer.

After his stay in Lesotho he plans to travel over land all the way back to Europe and said he will write again about some of his experiences. Censorship by the Republic of South Africa is rather tight on the outgoing mail.

The East Essex Parents Club has a new look. The name has been changed from Parents Club to the P.T.O. (Parents Teachers Organization).

At a May 14 meeting it was voted on to make some

major changes in the club. Besides the name change there will be an administrative board of 4 persons of equal power.

The board will replace and be responsible for the duties of the previous officers.

(president, 1st vice, . . .) A member of the board will be responsible for each monthly meeting on a rotating basis. There will also be a secretary-treasurer to make a total of 5 executive members instead of the present 4.

Another major change is that parents of students and full time teachers of East Essex school are automatically members of the PTO with full privileges and responsibilities. Teachers are eligible to run for office.

Elections of Officers: In order to insure that the administrative board always has experienced members: Two board members will be elected in May-June to serve a one year term. . . .

Two board members will be elected in Jan-Feb for a one year term. . . .

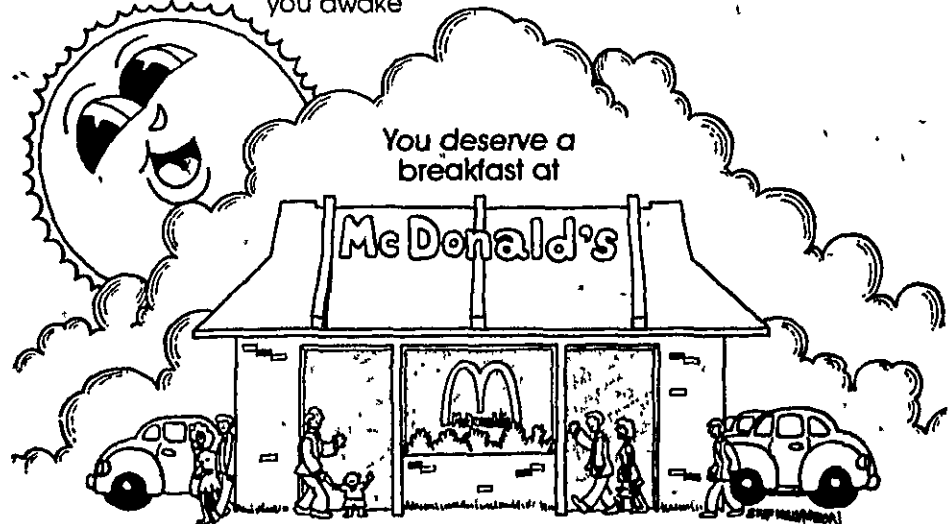

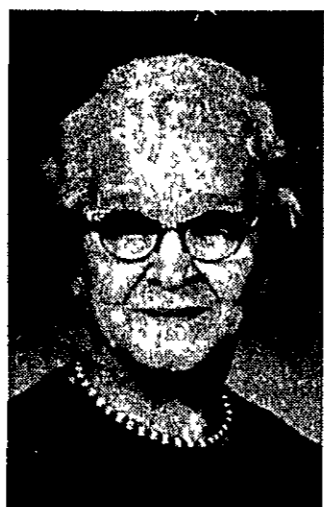
Friends and relatives met for an open house honoring her birthday.
