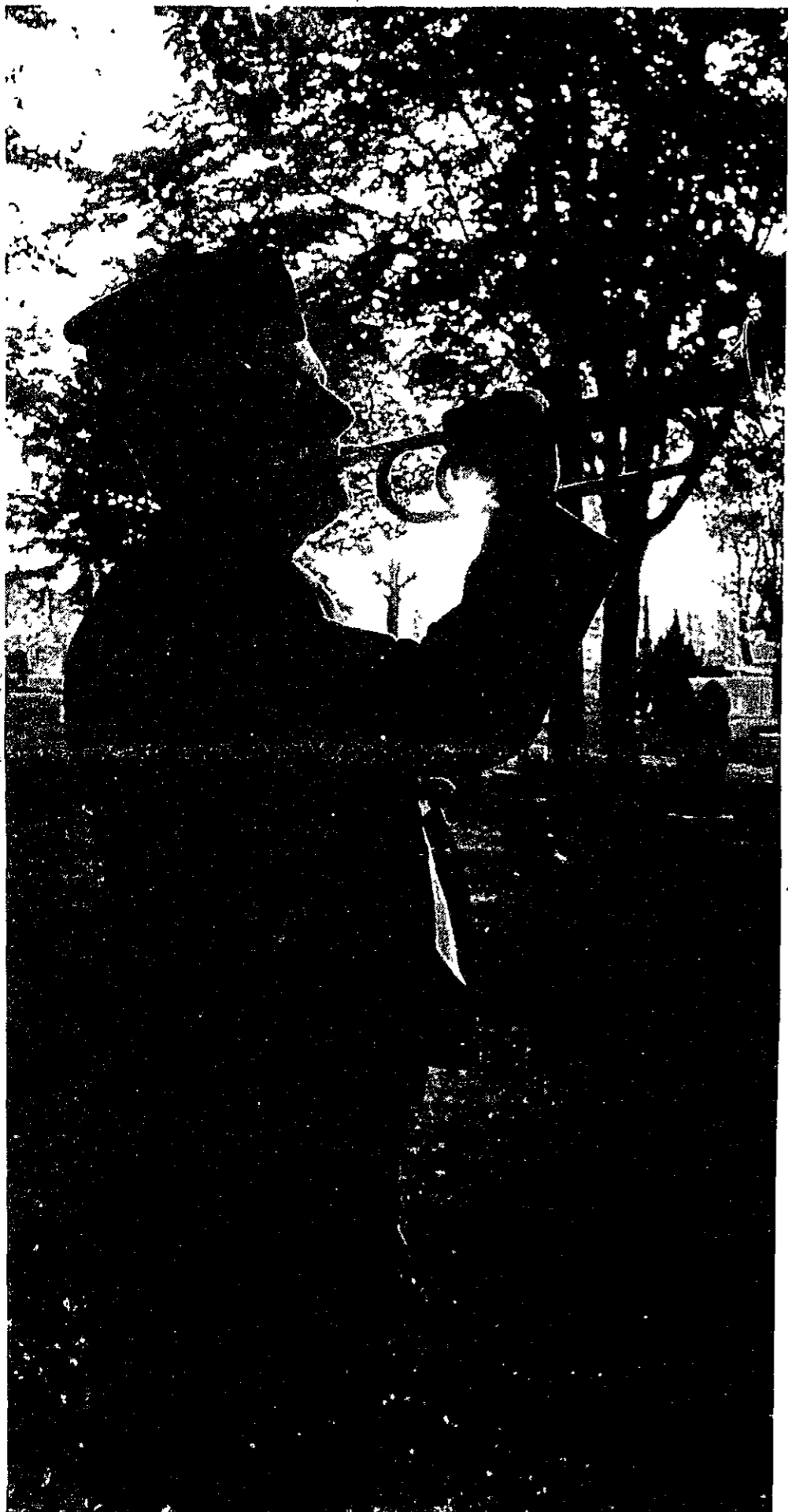

### Two cents a day — special ed

ST. JOHNS—It is worth two cents a day for residents of Clinton County to have Special Education for their children?

This was one of the many questions discussed by the Friends of Special Education Committee at their meeting Tuesday.

The committee has sent out a letter to voters in the county outlining the need for an increase of three-quarters of a mill that will be on the ballot June 14.

The letter in part stated, "Since 1960, the Clinton County Intermediate School District has been operating on three-quarters of a mill to service all the

children with special problems in our county."

Diagnosticians, social workers, a consultant for the mentally handicapped, speech therapists, a homebound teacher, 19 rooms for the educable mentally handicapped and two rooms for the trainable mentally handicapped, served 1352 children with special problems in the 1969-70 school year.

"More children need these services because today everything costs more. Schools that were operating on 8.5 mills in 1960 now average 25 mills just to keep even.

"Special Education is a vital and essential part of our total public education program in Clinton County. Ask any

parent whose child has been helped by any of these programs."

"UNDER PRESENT circumstances it will be impossible to continue even the present level of services or even consider providing other very much needed programs."

"Special Education immediate needs are: two more social workers to work with children, parents and teachers, an additional teacher-consultant for the mentally handicapped who need vocational guidance and work experience, a program to provide for the emotionally disturbed children."

### Smith resigns

## DeWitt finally hires new city administrator

DeWITT—After two months of searching, the city of DeWitt has named a Wixom, Mich., man to fill the vacancy of Eldon Smith, resigning administrative director.

Robert Case, 43, has tentatively confirmed his acceptance of the position, pending formal appointment by the City Council on June 7.

Case has been assessor and assistant to the mayor at Wixom for the past three years.

The search for a new director began April 5, when Smith presented his resignation to the City Council with an effective date of June 1.

After screening 18 applicants for the job, one applicant was tentatively hired, but

resigned hours prior to his official appointment by the Council May 24.

Smith, who has held the job for two years, dispelled rumors that his resignation was due to pressure from the Council or any other outside forces.

"When I took the job, I agreed to work for two years," Smith said. "A pattern needed to be established in order to show that voluntary work could not handle the problems that arise."

A former Councilman and Mayor of DeWitt, Smith will resume his job at the Farm Bureau Services as a securities salesman.

During his term as administrative director, Smith noted the greatest challenge was coping with the rapid growth and development within the city and immediate area.

"Even more challenging, for the next director, will be the development of the Master Plan," Smith said.

Included in this plan are new zoning areas, growth of possible commercial businesses and a revitalizing of the business district through parking facilities and visual attractiveness.

At a dinner in his honor, May 27, town officials, Mayor Lawrence Keck and his wife and the members of the City Council and their wives, presented Smith with a fishing box and tackle.

Dorothy Keck, city clerk, said that his resignation came as a complete surprise. "Everyone enjoyed working with him," Mrs. Keck said, "and despite the problems that came up, he always looked forward to the next day."

### St. Johns compares favorably

ST. JOHNS—There are 17 School Districts in Michigan which have total enrollments in grades K-12 of between 4000 and 4499 students. St. Johns is one of them.

The table below indicates how St. Johns compares to other schools in the group. Figures were taken from Bulletin No. 1011 published by the State Department of Education and are for the year 1969-70 since figures for the current year are not yet completed.

Instruction - 75.89% (average for the 17 schools); 74.49% (St. Johns average).  
Administration - 3.97% (average for the 17 schools); 3.27% (St. Johns average).  
Health Services - .31% (average for the 17 schools); .58% (St. Johns average).  
Transportation - 4.69% (average for the 17 schools); 8.35% (St. Johns average).

### Meeting called to present Bath candidates, issues

BATH—A special public meeting has been called for June 9 by school officials to present the eight candidates running for two school board seats and answer questions about the millage proposal.

The meeting, beginning at 8 p.m. in the high school cafeteria, will center on the 18-mill operational continuation issue.

Roger Carlson, school superintendent, will introduce the eight candidates seeking election on the June 14 ballot. They are James Cramer, William Fouch, Nina Finels, Gerald Feguer, Cleo Friend Sr., Marilyn Markham, Claude Vall and Maude Martin.

### Body found in driveway

ST. JOHNS—Authorities continue to refuse the release of details surrounding the arrest of a rural St. Johns man Saturday on a charge of first degree murder.

William T. Dexter, 31, Green Road, was arrested Saturday night in connection with the death of William Joseph Herrman, 40, 7511 S. Chandler Road.

Patrick Kelly, Clinton County prosecuting attorney, said that he would rather not talk about the motive, because it is "the guts of the case". He indicated that the motive would come out in the examination to be held tentatively, June 10.

"We will be ready by that date," Kelly said.

Dexter has until Wednesday to select a lawyer to represent him. If he doesn't choose one, the court will appoint an attorney.

The Clinton County Sheriff's Department has sent a 22-caliber rifle and bags of physical evidence to Michigan State Police Crime Lab at East Lansing for analysis. Sheriff deputies said Herrmann's body was found in the driveway of the Dexter home and that he had been shot twice with a 22-caliber rifle.

According to reports, Dexter called a Laingsburg ambulance service that the man's body was in his driveway and after that police were notified. He is an Oldsmobile employee and was jailed without bond.

Judge Roland Duguay set June 10 as the tentative examination date.

Mr. Herrman had been a truck driver for the Ashland Chemical Co. in Lansing for 15 years.

Surviving are three sons, Joseph W., Robert M. and Mark A.; four brothers, Joseph M. of Ft. Wayne, Ind., Jerome B. of David, Ky., and James A. and Eugene N., both of Lansing; and a sister, Mrs. Rita Brock of Lansing.

 Operation of Plant - 10.01% (average for the 17 schools); 10.14% (St. Johns average).  
 Maintenance - 2.47% (average for the 17 schools); 2.38% (St. Johns average).

Fixed charges - 2.86% (average for the 17 schools); 2.78% (St. Johns average).  
 The only place where St. Johns is significantly higher is in transportation - 1.66% more. This is understandable because the district covers over 200 square miles and over half of the students ride buses to school.

Also, having five elementary schools to which students must be transported adds to the transportation cost.  
 Because of changes in the American way of living school curriculae and programs need to be changed and up-dated to meet

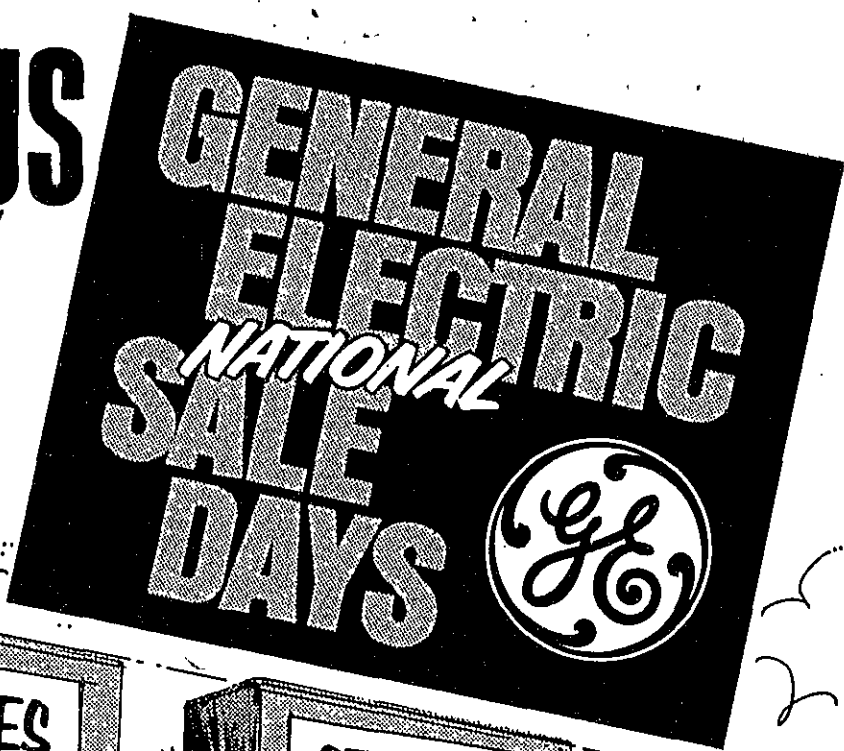
the challenges of the present and the future. The curriculum of the St. Johns Schools reflects these changes, many of which have occurred during the past two years.  
 The St. Johns Public Schools probably offers as complete an educational program

from grades K-12 as any similar community in Michigan.  
 Elementary Instruction in the elementary school covers all the basic areas of instruction. Language arts includes reading, writing, spelling and speaking. Science, social

studies (history and geography), mathematics and health are other basic classes.  
 Vocal music is taught twice weekly in grades 1-6. Art is taught once a week in grades 5 and 6 and once every 2 weeks in grades 1-4.  
 Students who wish to begin band may do so in the 6th grade while orchestra begins in the 5th grade.  
 In addition the district operates three rooms for children who find the regular school program too difficult. These rooms are called special education rooms.  
 There are also two speech therapists who work with children who have speech difficulties.

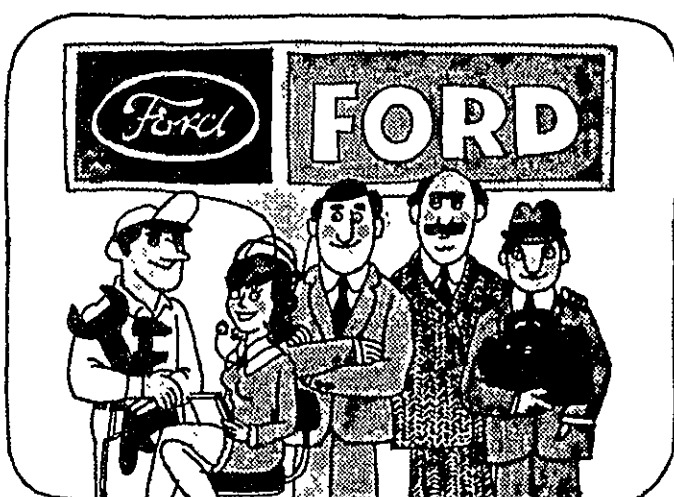

# Bean seed darkened by blight



EAST LANSING—Michigan bean growers face a shortage of blight-free seed again this year, says a Michigan State University plant pathologist.

Using final results from MSU's 1971 bean blight testing program as a basis, Dr. Axel Andersen estimates that there is enough blight-free seed to plant 400,000 acres—almost two-thirds of Michigan's 1971 projected bean acreage.

"The remainder of the state's 620,000 acres of beans will have to be planted from seed lots showing low levels of internal infection," says Andersen.

He says that certified bean seed that has been tested "blight free" is the best bet. "Since certified seed has been through blight tests both in the field

and the laboratory, it is the best seed source. However, there are just two sources of certified seed in Michigan—the Foundation Seed Association and the Crop Improvement Association—and they only have enough seed for about 154,000 acres.

"THE NEXT BEST place to get seed is seed producers whose beans got a blight-free rating from the MSU Plant Diagnostic Laboratory," Andersen says.

County extension agents in Michigan's major bean growing areas will have lists of where to get certified blight-free, non-certified blight-free, and low-level infection seed lots. These lists will first be available May 17.

"Improving the bean blight situation in Michigan must be an

industry-wide effort," says Andersen.

"The industry might win a battle in the bean blight war if persons and organizations who plan to buy beans for resale in 1972 as seed would select their growers now instead of in the fall after the crop has been harvested," says Andersen. "This way gives growers the opportunity to follow the necessary management practices to produce disease-free seed and closely check their fields for infection as the season progresses."

MSU scientists recommend treatment of all bean seeds with a slurry containing five percent active streptomycin. This prevents blight infection caused by surface bacteria and contamination during handling prior to

planting.

Andersen cautions growers not to expect miracles from non-certified seed that has been tested and determined to be blight-free. "Just because a sample was disease-free in laboratory tests doesn't mean it came from an absolutely blight-free seed lot," he says.

### Money problems

Families have money problems as surely as the kids have mumps, bumps, cuts and scratches.

Solving money problems is not as simple as mending the cuts, but a family budget can help. Make your budget a family affair. In this way each member

has a chance to express his needs and desires. It requires that everyone be flexible, understanding and willing to sacrifice a little for the good of the family. Very seldom will every member agree on how the family income should be spent. But this

disagreement can be a learning experience if you explain why a choice is made.

Some families made a game of looking through magazines. Each person picks out something he likes then defends his choice to the others. This, of course, requires that he examine and explain the values which led him to the decision.

Isn't a competitive game. There is no right or wrong answer. It isn't a matter of pitting one team against another—the kids vs. the grownups. Instead, each person communicates his own goals, needs and values to the others.

Think about some of the usual categories included in money budgets—food, clothes, housing, transportation costs, entertainment, household expenses, gifts.

Now think about the dilemma you faced when a certain expense didn't seem to "fit" anywhere—or when it applied to more than one category. Where, for instance, do you allot money for eating out—in "Food" or "Entertainment?" How about train, bus or plane fares that come up on your vacation? "Transportation" or "Recreation?" And what do you call ski outfits or snowmobiling suits? Are they "Clothes" or purely "Recreation?"

Categories for budgeting money should be flexible and personalized. Decide what you want your money to do for you. Then spend it where it will be most meaningful.

Instead of using the usual "Food" category, for example, why not rename it to more closely fit your needs. At the beginning of the budgeting period, set aside an amount for "Holiday Meals." Or, you could combine all of your expected Christmas expenses—food, gifts, transportation, decorations—into one "Christmas" category.

And why should that Grand Canyon trip be embezzled from "Food," "Transportation" and "Entertainment?" Your family why not be more willing to give up a little in other categories if they can see the money being saved specifically for the big vacation.

If you are facing some major education costs, all the college-related expenses—tuition, room and board, books, clothes, transportation, phone bills—can be set aside as a separate budget item.

The possibilities are endless because the kinds of family needs are endless. But when you consider satisfaction as the most important goal, learning to budget your money can be fun.

The satisfaction gained through a successful, working budget is clear profit for time and energy well spent.

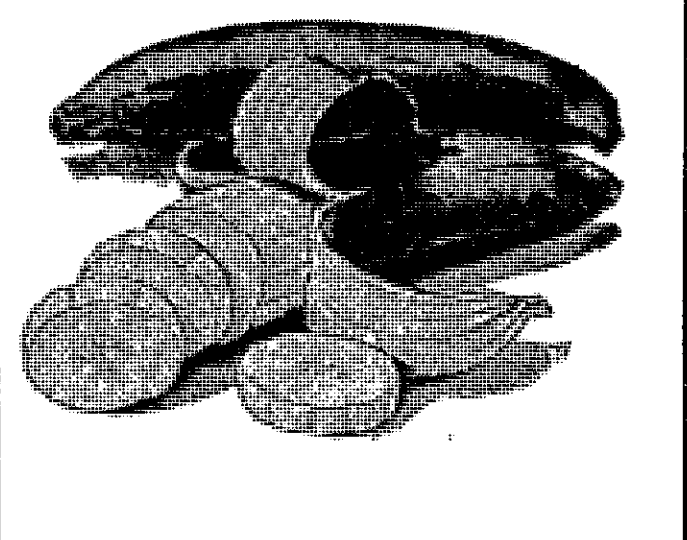

Foot-dragging

For the last two weeks, hither-to sleepy State Senate and House committees have started frantically putting in double-overtime weeding out undesirable legislation, patching up bills that need improvement, and reporting their finished products out to the floors of their respective chambers.

As a result, legislative action has speeded up considerably. When the Legislature convened Monday night, there were 63 measures on the two calendars awaiting floor action—22 in the Senate (including two of mine) and 41 in the House.

More made their way to the floor during the week as committees labored in extended meetings between sessions of the full Senate and House of Representatives.

As yet, calendars have not reached the "bed-sheet" stage they'll achieve a little later on when the bills on the floor number more than 200 during the long,

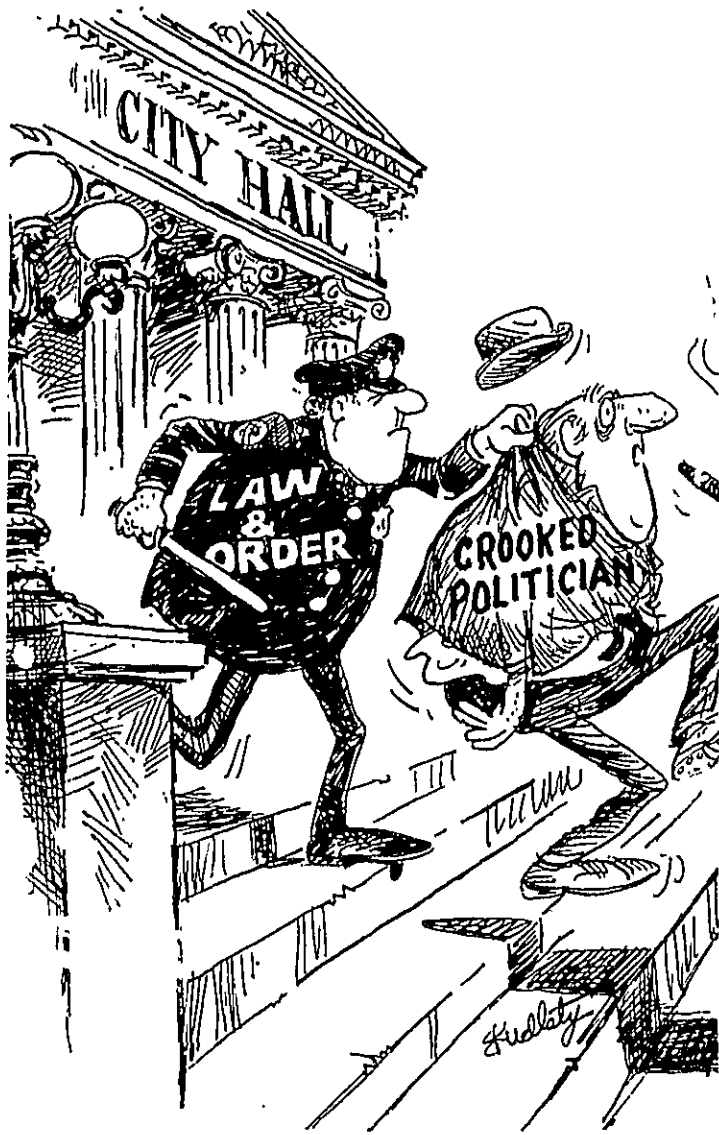
hot fan-swept nights of June and July. But much of the preliminary work has been done.

BECAUSE OF FOOT-DRAGGING and the difficulties encountered in recent weeks in trying to slash earlier budgets to meet the reduced income resulting from unexpected economic setbacks, it appears unlikely that all appropriation and taxation bills will be finally passed before the current fiscal year closes June 30.

But attempts are being made by the House and Senate leaders to work out a schedule so that the major portion of the important fiscal and taxation bills will be out of the way within a few days of the June 30 fiscal year-end.

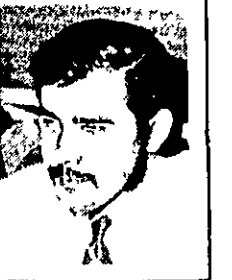
With the economic outlook for next year still uncertain, the task of setting up the budget and providing the necessary finances to balance it for next year will be every bit as difficult as it's been during 1970 and 1971.

But to assume they were and act as if they were guilty, would be backstabbing our legal heritage. We know, for example, that countless numbers of gangsters and Mafia members are freed from prison and guilt simply because there was no real case against them. It's hard to swallow, sometimes, but no one calls it a commie plot either. With 200-plus million Americans living under the Bill of Rights and the Constitution, it is to be expected that a certain number will hide behind the law and use the loopholes that exist. It's done every day by big business evading the tax rules, mislabeling or misrepresenting products or bilking an unsuspecting public of hard earned money. No one gets hysterical about that. That's the way our judicial system is run, Arch. To restate a much-used slogan found on car bumpers "Love it or leave it."

Contrasts

The 4th chapter of the book of Acts begins with these words, "They were still addressing the people when the chief priests came upon them together with the Controller of the Temple and the Sadducees, exasperated at their teaching the people and proclaiming the resurrection from the dead—the resurrection of Jesus." (NEB).

It was the priests, the Captains of the Temple, and the Sadducees who were exasperated at the disciples for teaching the people about Jesus' resurrection from the dead. They were exasperated because these two men (Peter and John) were upsetting the established religion of the Jews. Peter and John had a new idea. It was that Jesus was the Messiah.

It was the idea that the future to which the Jews had looked and for which they had longed for so many generations, was now upon them. The new age had already begun and Jesus was the heart and center of it.

Yes, this new idea really upset the priests and the Sadducees, because they represented the established religion. To them strict adherence to the Law of Moses was the only way of life. To them religion meant the proper performance of the religious ceremonies inside the great and magnificent Temple.

What we see here in this situation is a vivid contrast between official religion and real religion. Official religion was encased in a code of laws and in a great building, but the real religion was out on the steps where men and women were struggling with the problems and pains of everyday life.

This is one of the major criticisms of the institutional today,

Many people are saying that the Church is spiritually dead and that real religion is found outside of the organizational structure. Monica Furlong, one of the contributors to a book entitled "The Restless Church", speaks about this criticism of the Church. She says, "Until a few years ago, it seemed unbelievable that TB or typhoid, or diphtheria could be controlled, but the upsurge of confidence and belief in medical advance made such a victory possible.

"WHAT IS NEEDED now is a new understanding of love; the love that casts out fears and enables men to face the realities of the condition. As there is a hygiene of the body which, properly carried out, strengthens its resistance to disease, so there is a hygiene of the mind and spirit.

"We know more and more about the emotional environment that a child needs in order to grow up fearless and outgoing, able to give love and receive it. To my surprise, the Church talks little about these requirements, but far too much and far too critically about the adolescents and adults whose lives have already been irreparably damaged by emotional impoverishment.

"To learn this hygiene, however, is a task which will take several generations. In the meantime, we all have to recognize our own emotional inadequacies and the way these interact upon our children and our friends."

Now here is the meat of Monica Furlong's criticism. She says, "Some of the loneliest people in our community are those

who have failed in one way or another in the ideal code of behavior we have laid down; the unmarried mother, the young man who has discovered that he is a homosexual, the divorcee, the man or woman who is haunted by thoughts of suicide and may have made more than one attempt at it, the middle-aged man who has committed adultery.

"Would any of these people turn automatically to the local Christian community, in the confident expectation that they would receive love and understanding?"

Now you and I know the answer to that question. None of those people would turn to the organized Church and expect love and understanding — except perhaps from a clergyman, and that's even doubtful.

I would have to agree that the Church—both clergy and layman—has not been as loving and as understanding toward people and their "scandalous" problems. The usual response of people when they hear about a divorce, or a homosexual, or a suicide attempt, or a love triangle, is to gossip about it. They say, "Did you know that so-and-so . . . ?" and the result is another person condemned to a life of unresolved guilt.

So, if the organized Church is to be a vehicle of God's love and understanding, then you and I must carry that love and understanding to ALL people—not just a select few—in their times of need.

Let's not be "exasperated" at Jesus' teaching about God's love. Let's be the channels of God's love.

## Washington Reports

### Rail strike

WASHINGTON, D.C.—The following is a summary of legislative action in Congress last week and scheduled action this week.

Emergency Railroad Strike Legislation: With a major national tie up of freight threatened, the Congress acted on the President's recommendations to provide for a temporary prohibition of strikes and lockouts in the current railway labor-management dispute, and set October 1, 1971 as the date such temporary prohibition shall expire.

A 13 1/2% pay increase for railway signalmen was also approved.

Supersonic Transport (SST): Acting on the Second Supplemental Appropriation Act for fiscal 1971, the Senate struck from the bill an appropriation of \$85.3 million for continued development of the SST—thus rejecting House action of the previous week—and approved appropriating \$155.8 million for termination of the SST project.

Later in the week, the House reduced the \$155.8 figure to \$97.3 million. This week, the Senate will consider this House action.

Emergency Employment Act of 1971: In the House, the action of the Rules Committee to prohibit introduction of a substitute bill incorporating the President's special revenue sharing proposal for manpower training during floor debate of the Emergency Employment Act was rejected and provision made for introduction of the substitute.

The Emergency act would at best provide approximately 150,000 jobs for the 4.8 million unemployed at a cost of approximately \$6,000 per job. The substitute bill is more comprehensive in its approach to manpower training and provides initially larger funding for public service type employment. It also allows local governments to decide what their greatest manpower training needs are and how to spend federal funds to meet them.

Actual debate and a vote on the act will probably not take place for several weeks.

Selective Service Act: In the Senate, the Mansfield Amendment to the Selective Service Act barring funds for use after December 31, 1971 for support of U.S. military personnel in Europe in excess of 150,000 troops was rejected 36-61.

The Administration had vigorously opposed the amendment. Currently, there are an estimated 300,000 U.S. military personnel in Europe with 200,000 plus dependents.

The Senate also acted to guar-

antee that debate and a vote on the Selective Service Act would be terminated prior to the expiration date of the present act, June 30th. The schedule for vote on amendments is as follows: This week to vote on: —Nelson Amendment barring service draftees in Vietnam after December 31, 1971

—Kennedy Amendment barring payment of bonuses for enlistment or reenlistment in the Armed Forces

—Dominick Amendment limiting extension of the draft to 18 months

—Hughes Amendment relating to pay increases for the military

Next week to vote on: —Hartford Amendment terminating authority to induct persons involuntarily into the armed

forces after December 31, 1971 —Schwelker Amendment extending the draft for one year instead of two

In addition, the House will this week consider the President's Reorganization Plan No. 1 which includes merger of the Peace Corps and Vista. If the House and Senate do not disapprove of the proposed reorganization, the plan will automatically go into effect.

Other matters include providing for a Select Committee on Energy Resources and a Joint Committee on the Environment. Monday is District Day in the House, where matters pertaining to the government of the District of Columbia will be acted upon.

# Living showcase ready

Instead of taking grades home to their parents, 19 vocational building trade students will be proudly showing their parents the

house that they built.

The final assignment has been completed on the house that they started last fall. What was once just a hole in the ground has now grown into a home that is ready to be occupied.

The open house ceremonies will start Friday at 6 p.m. until 9 p.m. Saturday's hours are set at 2 p.m. to 6 p.m. and Sunday's hours are 1 p.m. to 7 p.m. at the house, 406 W. Sicksels, across from the high school.

When asked if the house will be completely ready in time, Terry Seybert, vocational instructor at the high school indicated that everything will be in perfect order.

"Even if we have to work all night to make sure everything is in perfect shape, it will be done on time," he said.

The house building project represents a new concept in vocational training at the high school level. Most of the work was done by the students with technical assistants from area sub-contractors in masonry, electrical, plumbing and heating.

One contractor leaving the house after completing his work told the student working with him, "You look me up in a couple of years, we could use you."

Students in the vocational building trades class did the majority of the construction work, including the basement which was sub-contracted out last year. Supervised by "Boss" Seybert, the 19 students worked an average of three hours each day since September, receiving regular high school credit, just as they would in the classroom.

This is the second year that this program has operated in St. Johns as part of the new high school's curriculum expansion program.

"The program has been very successful," Seybert said. "Last year we had 15 in the program, this year we have 19 and next year we will have around 28 enrolled."

This type of vocational training is relevant to the students because it offers on the job experience instead of classroom work said Ken Lashaway, vocational training director.

Seybert said that the basis of the program is to familiarize the students with the different aspects of building a house. "They won't finish this course an expert, but they will have some skills that they can use in the future. Also there is the added factor that they find out areas that they are interested in learning more about."

The three seniors that are taking the class are planning on working in the construction area. Two are going to Lansing Community College to take courses and the other is planning on finding a job with a construction company.

This is the basis of the program, to expose the students to this type of work so that when they graduate they will be able to decide on an area to work and train for the future. "All these boys would make someone a good worker," Seybert said.

A building trades advisory committee is established to guide the students and aid in the project's development. The committee helps select the land and to aid in the inspection and final appraisal upon completion. Briggs Realtors contacts all the other Realtors in town to list on show the house.

Other members of the committee besides Lashaway and Seybert are Ken Munger of R. C.

Benson Plumbing and Heating, James Moore, attorney for the Clinton National Bank, Edward Schmitt of Schmitt Electric, Tom Hundley, City building inspector, Roy Briggs of Briggs Realtors, Norman Rademacher of Rademacher Construction Co., Earl Lancaster, Superintendent of Schools and Milo Rowell of E. F. Boron Co.

Lashaway said that they have had very good cooperation with the local merchants in purchasing supplies and materials by giving discounts and by spending time with the boys and talking with them.

"Things should be bigger and better next year," said Seybert. "We have 13 students coming back into the program. With their experience and knowledge we should have no trouble at all. The 13 seniors will help the juniors who

will enroll in the program next year."

When asked what the students think of the house, Seybert said, "When you got kids working nights, Saturdays and Sundays and they could be doing something else, sorta shows you what they think of this house." They have a lot of pride and feeling of accomplishment in this house.

"I run this just like I was a general contractor and they were the workers and they like it that way," he said. Most of the students call him "Boss" and they say it with obvious respect.

"The project is the ultimate in cooperation, everyone must do their share of the work or things will get held up. Needless to say, there is a lot of peer pressure.

If someone is goofing off, I don't have to say anything, they will take care of it," he said.

Besides the building trades class, other students participated in the project. The vocational agriculture classes worked on the landscape by sodding the front and seeding the back. Students in the home economic classes selected interior colors for the rooms and carpets. The electronics classes wired the house, including three television hoopups and the rotor antenna.

The three-bedroom house comprises an area of 1,250 square feet and is completely carpeted. It has a two-car garage, full basement, upstairs laundry room and fully equipped modern kitchen.

The house sits in front of a 103 by 239 lot with the nearest neighbor more than 75 yards away.

The living area is situated in the back of the house to insure complete privacy.

Seybert said, "You won't be able to find a better house in St. Johns," and he added, "If anything goes wrong, which it shouldn't, we are just across the street.

Persons interested in buying the house can talk to representatives from the St. Johns Realtors and Brokers officers who will attend the open house.

Among the students enrolled in the program are three students from Bath and one from Fowler who receive credit at their schools for the classes. Those from St. Johns are Dave Rademacher, Ernie Steffer, Kurt Parks, Mike Bearup, Steve Doty, Rick Flegel, Keith Foote, Randy Davey, Ralph Bailey, Harry Lance, Bruce Burgess, Tracy Roberts and Ed Harr. 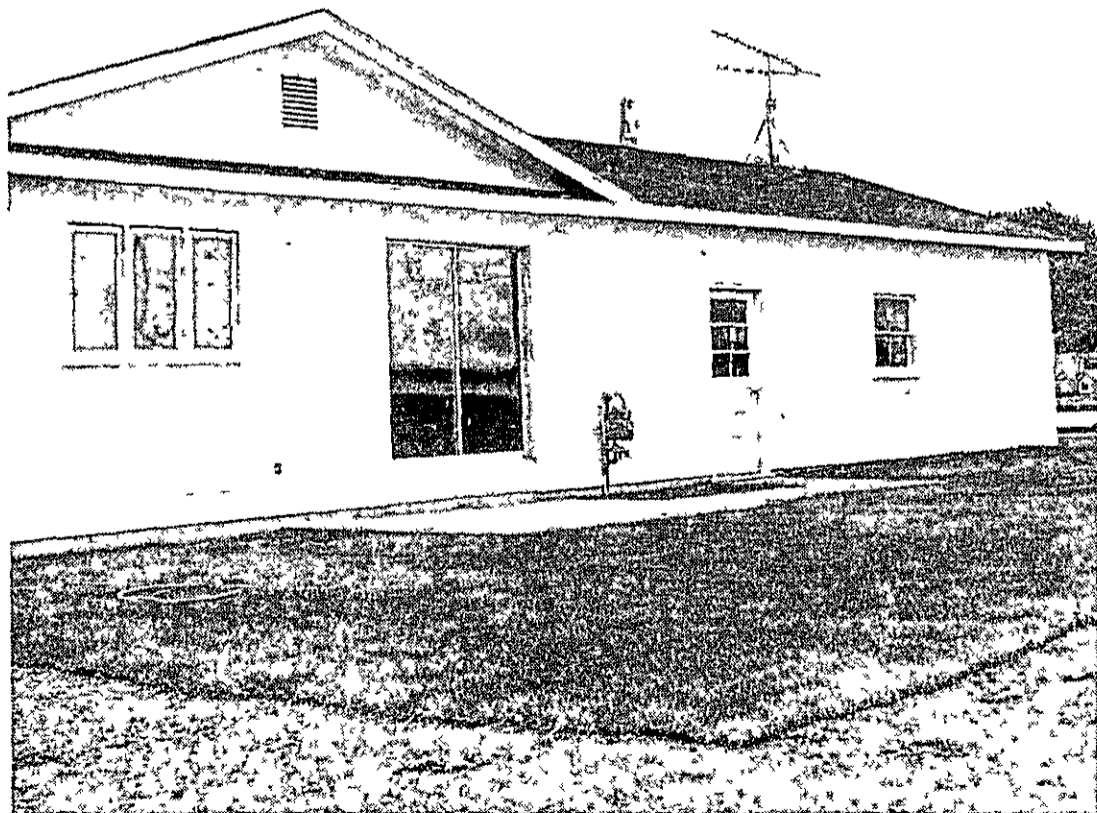

# Tom Seybert: new man on the scene

It took over 10,000 manhours for one instructor and 19 students to complete one project, a house. "I believe that is one of the best ways to communicate with the kids," said Terry Seybert, vocational instructor and construction boss for the high school building trades class.

"This is my first year teaching and I really don't believe I will teach anything else. This is what I know and this is what I can teach the kids best, practical experience," he said.

Seybert was graduated from Central Michigan University last spring with a B. S. in industrial education, with a minor in mathematics and a vocation certificate. He is a resident of Elsie.

Seybert runs the class similar to a construction business. The students call him "boss". Each student approaches his particular job with the same attitude he would as if it was a job.

The students are graded on their attitudes, attendance and performance, the same as a job, but without the pay. "The only trouble," he said smiling, "is that I can't fire them."

They all know they have a responsibility to themselves and the other students. It is obvious that they all have lived up to that responsibility.

He said that many had no idea what went into building a house before they enrolled in this class. Now they have learned basic skills in the area of construction that they can use when they graduate from school.

"Every one of these students will make someone a good worker," he said.

"That is the main objective of this class, to expose students to areas of interest that they
