## DeWitt Twp eyes tax increase

One extra mill or a possible assessment may be levied on DeWitt Township residents if the Township Board of Trustees has anything to say about it.

At the May 27 Board meeting, board members and local citizens and the audience talked at length about the need to come up with an additional \$168,000 for next year's police and fire budget.

Eileen Corr, chairman of the Public Safety Committee, told the board the extra mill the township had levied was only bringing in \$41,940 with half going for the police and the other half for the fire department. According to Corr, \$210,000 will be needed for next year's police and fire budget.

Corr also reported that the police committee recommended that a special assessment be levied instead of holding a millage election, because, Corr said, the cost of the millage election would be about \$4,000 and if it doesn't pass the first time, another election would cost township taxpayers an additional \$4,000. In order to levy a special assessment, the Board would only have to hold a public hearing.

Trustee Jack Kzeski Jr. commented that maybe the board ought to find an alternative way of financing the police and fire departments. Dale Emerson, township supervisor, added, "If the township wants a police and fire department, we are going to have to have a millage approval."  
Emerson also said, "The two mills DeWitt Township operates on is by far the lowest in central Michigan."

At that point, the board voted to have trustee Kzeski and Township Attorney, J. Richard Robinson, do further research into the problem. In having another mill or special assessment, tax on them wasn't enough, DeWitt township residents might also be asked to pay more money for their sewers.

Emerson explained that costs, particularly for labor and energy, have gone up in the past year that a sewer rate adjustment might be inevitable in the near future.

## Voters in school districts go to polls Monday

Clinton Intermediate District's half-dozen school systems will ask voters to decide millage issues and board of education races in school elections June 9.

Three of the districts will request straight renewal of existing operating millage levies — St. Johns, DeWitt and Bath.

Ovid-Elsie, Fowler and Pewamo-Westphalia each will seek an increase in operating millage but will counter the proposal with a reduction of debt retirement levies. That action is designed to minimize the increase of total millage.

Meanwhile, school board contests range from desultory (two incumbents run unopposed at Ovid-Elsie) to active (four contestants are after a pair of seats in Bath).

Following are breakdowns on the ballot items in St. Johns, Fowler and Pewamo-Westphalia. Details for Ovid-Elsie are on this week's Ovid-Elsie Page and DeWitt and Bath are on the DeWitt area page.

**ST. JOHNS MILLAGE**  
Although the Board of Education felt there was no question operating costs will increase, members voted unanimously to hold the line on property taxes and seek renewal of the 16.5 operating millage for another

year.

If approved, that rate will mean property owners will pay the same taxes as the past year, which will total 28.2 mills including debt service. That total marks a decrease from the total levy of 29.5 which existed for three years prior, mainly because of a drop in debt service requirement.

In voting for no increase in the property tax levy, the board is relying heavily on the supposition that the Legislature, because of statewide problems with the property tax, will increase the 1975-76 state allocation under the Bursley formula.

According to school officials, by not voting additional millage, and if state aid is not increased, there is no doubt some programs would need to be reduced.

If the millage request fails to pass on June 9, officials say "it will be imperative that the board hold another election in August. In case of failure, the district would be left with only the 8 mills allocated by the Allocation Board under the 15-mill limitation act. That, with its accompanying state aid, would result in less than one-third of the revenue necessary to operate the district for 1975-76."

The same view was echoed by other school officials in the county.

Complicating the job of superintendents throughout the county are the variables in

state aid unknown at this time. In addition to inflation factors, schools face the question marks of undetermined amounts of state aid not yet earmarked by the state legislature and enrollments impossible to accurately predict before school begins in the fall.

The amount of state aid received by each school district is based on the number of mills levied in each district and on the number of children enrolled.

St. Johns officials estimate costs will be greater next school year due to probable increases of salaries negotiated with five different units, increases in nearly all facets of operation (utilities, gasoline, supplies, etc.), and several changes in educational programs.

Mandatory special education, passed by the legislature several years ago, dictates at least two additional rooms to be added to educate handicapped youngsters. Girls athletics, dramatically increased in popularity, are not as close to self-sustaining as boys sports and will need subsidizing.

**ST. JOHNS SCHOOL BOARD**  
Two seats are open on the St. Johns board of education and three candidates are running for them. Terms are four years.

Incumbents Leon Schumaker and Alden Livingston are seeking re-election while Chan Woodbury is challenging.

Schumaker, a member of the board since June of 1960, is a farmer in Riley Township on Francis Road. He has served a three-year term and a pair of four year terms.

Livingston is owner of Livingston Farms north of St. Johns and has been a board member since June of 1965. Prior to that he served on the board of the Greenwood schools before annexation by St. Johns.

Woodbury, 36, is superintendent of the St. Johns Wastewater Treatment Plant, holds a Michigan wastewater treatment operator Class B certification and is a member of the Michigan Water Pollution Control Association.

He has worked for the City of St. Johns for 15 years.

A life-time resident of St. Johns, he has 2 children attending St. Johns schools.

**FWLER ELECTIONS**  
Fowler will seek an increase of 1 mill for one year from 16 to 17 operating mills.

If approved, the increase will be the first in 5 years at Fowler. It will be accompanied by a reduction of 1 mill in the debt retirement levy, which has been steadily decreasing. The net effect will mean no increase in total millage, although operating mills will be greater.

Listed as reasons for the requested hike in operating funds are increased costs and inflation, coupled with lack of knowledge of actual state aid to come.

Seeking one seat on the school board as a trustee for four years are incumbent Gerald Pohl and challenger Lloyd Berry.

Pohl is completing his second term and is president of the board. He is an Essex Township dairy farmer.

Berry is a Fowler resident and is employed by the Michigan Department of Natural Resources in Lansing.

**PEWAMO-WESTPHALIA ELECTIONS**  
The board of education has decided to ask for 1 additional mill for 1975-76, up from 15.5 at the current rate of 16.5.

At the same time, the board will reduce the debt retirement by at least 1.5 mills, depending on the final formula of state aid when it emerges from the state legislature.

This will result in a total millage rate decrease of at least one-half mill.

Running for the one-year vacancy on the board of education are Joseph F. Arens, Louis R. Hengesbach and Richard J. Thelen.

Seeking the four-year term is Anthony J. Thelen.

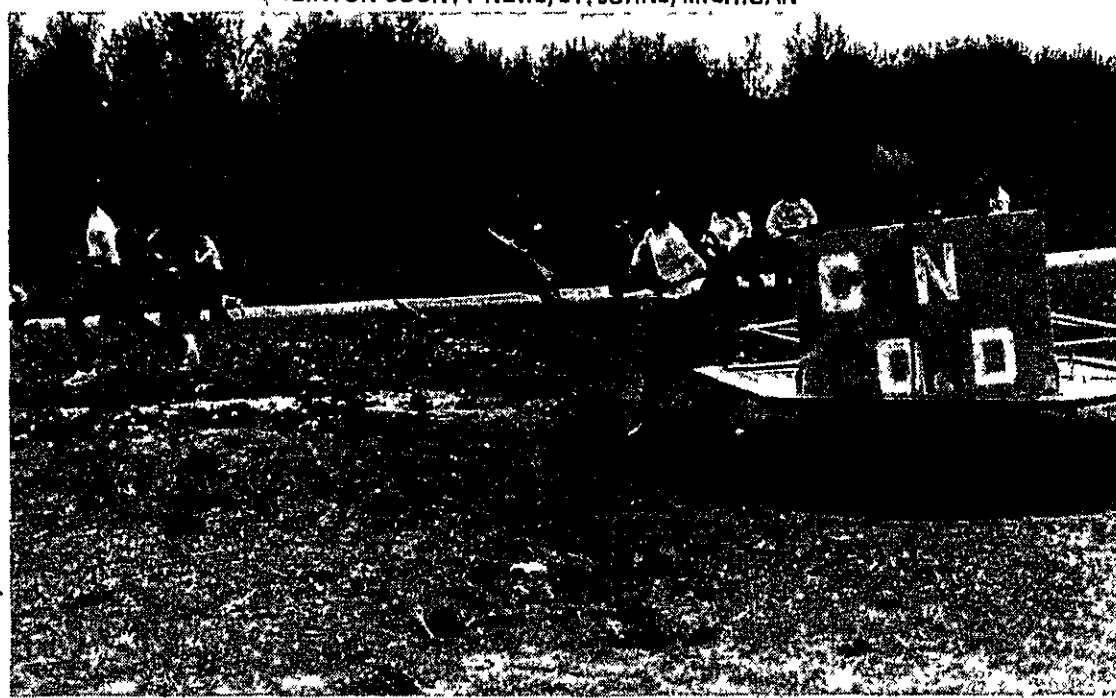

## TCRPC map details recreational facilities in Clinton, Ingham, Eaton

Would you like to find a new park for an outing, or a canoe trail nearby? Have you ever thought a park had picnic facilities, only to arrive and find none?

This information and more is available on the Tri-County Regional Planning Commission's (TCRPC) illustrated map of over 60 parks, land reserves, and recreation features within the Clinton, Eaton, and Ingham county area.

Almond B. Cressman, Tri-County chairman, pointed out that, by combining information previously found only by referring to several maps, the 37 inch. by 28 inch four color regional map shows state, county, and local parks, bikeways, canoe trails, scenic drives, golf courses, and many other recreational features.

Side two of the map depicts views of recreation sites northeast of Lansing, midway between Lansing, East Lansing, and Michigan State University, and the Bancroft Park area.

Illustrations of these three major groups of parks visually indicate how the lake and river areas could be better utilized to provide for people's growing interest in recreation facilities that are located close to home.

## He's top farmer

LANSING - David Diehl, Sr. of Dansville, Mich., was presented the Ford Farm Efficiency Award in the farm management category.

In partnership with two sons and a son-in-law, Mr. Diehl last year had about 2,500 acres planted entirely in crops, principally corn. In 1974, the Diehl operation also raised wheat, soybeans and navy beans.

"In general, we're looking for farmers who typify the best in their category. When we select the winner in the management category, we're looking for a farmer who utilizes innovative but sound business planning principles in the conduct of his farm enterprise. Winners of the Ford Farm Efficiency Awards are solid citizens who point the way to other farm operators in running efficient, productive farms."

Twelve such farmers won the Ford awards this year - for wheat farming, corn, hogs, forage, cotton, sheep, beef, soybeans, dairy, eggs, and food crops as well as for farm management.

"The Ford Farm Efficiency Awards program, by virtue of its continuity and high esteem in the agricultural community is perhaps the most prestigious recognition program in American agriculture today," Mr. Wilson said. "Winners are selected from among dozens of candidates that are submitted to (the Almanac editors) by farmers, county extension agents and other agricultural experts."

"Why do we hold such a program?" Mr. Wilson asked. "The answer is that we at Ford Tractor have long recognized that the key to success on the farms is ever-increasing efficiency. Through

those many years of low market prices and steadily rising costs, farmers had only one road to survival. That was through improved efficiency, and better productivity. Knowing this, we established the program to encourage efficiency gains, and to set goals for all American farmers to strive for."

In addition to being named farm management award winner, Mr. Diehl was asked to nominate a recipient of a Ford Motor Company Fund grant of \$2,000. On his recommendation, the grant was presented to the Cooperative Extension Service of Michigan State University to develop a 4-H leadership program.

Each of the other winners were invited to make grants to appropriate organizations or institutions for agricultural research or education.

A house is born: Students in the drafting and design classes of Terry Adams at St. Johns High School each

submitted a floor plan for consideration by the advisory committee to the building trades program.

The committee selected designs appropriate to the home lots in 3 Clinton County locations and suited to the goals of the program.

The floor plans were returned to their designers. Those chosen for the 3 building projects for 1975 went back to the drawing boards to add exterior and interior designs and details to the basic floor plans. Design of the home became virtually the sole responsibility of the draftsman whose floor plan was selected. He worked under the oversight of the instructor and incorporated zoning requirements into his plans.

Blueprints of the final drawing were reproduced at St. Johns High School and sent to the instructors whose building trades classes would construct the homes. Electronics and electrical trades students went to work on carrying out that phase of the construction. Home furnishing and management classes planned the interior decorating.

Ground was broken in September, with work proceeding on each site throughout the school year, culminating in a finished product for open house in June.

And it all began in the mind's eye of Wayne Fedewa (Swegles Street), Russ Waggoner (Ovid-Elsie-Fowler) and Bill Bailey (Pewamo-Westphalia), all St. Johns High students who had a better idea.

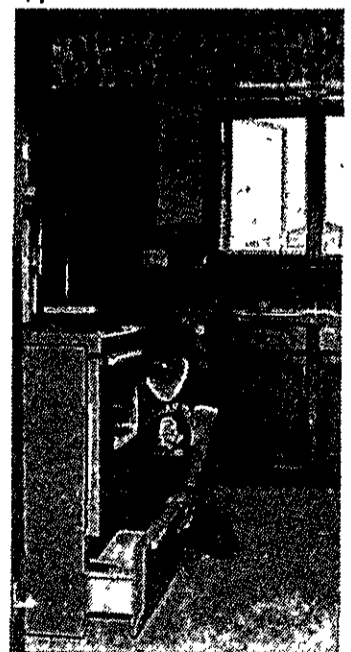

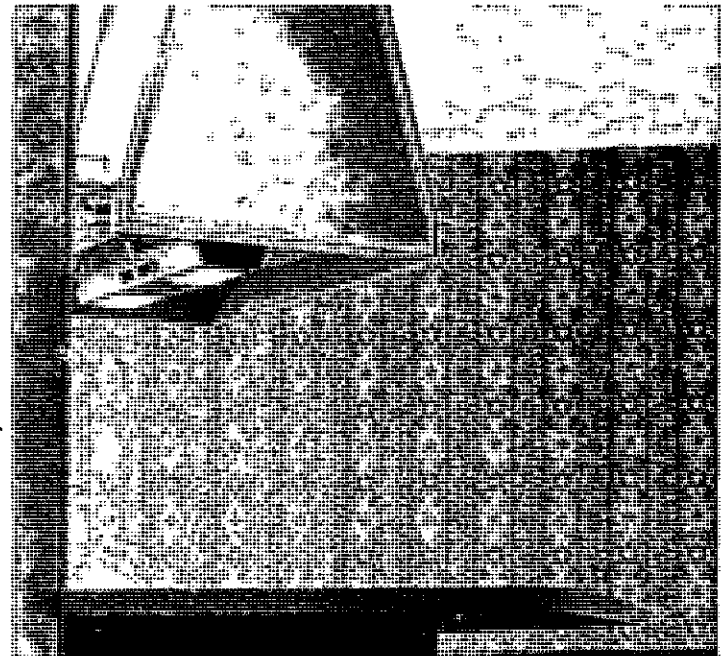

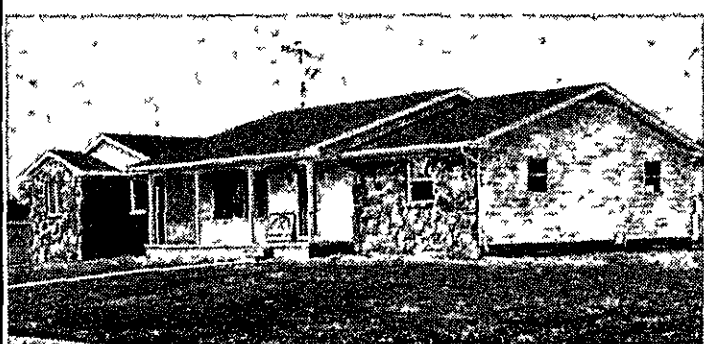

## Commerce official address hospital board

Michael A. Dively, deputy director for Consumer and Legislative Affairs of the Michigan Department of Commerce, spoke at the recent annual meeting of the Clinton Memorial Hospital Association Board of Trustees.

Speaking on "The Current Malpractice Crisis in Michigan," he explained that Governor Milliken has provided a great deal of leadership and is working with the Legislature in developing appropriate legislation to ease the traumatic crunch being experienced by physicians and hospitals in coping with the malpractice problem. He indicated that the problem takes two forms:

1. The 300 to 800% increase in the premium cost for physicians and hospitals for malpractice insurance.
2. The unavailability of malpractice insurance.

He felt that the Supreme Court's action in limiting the fee attorneys would receive in malpractice cases was appropriate and would be helpful. He also stated that the legislature recently passed to set up an insurance fund by state law would also ease the burden. Several other things must be accomplished, he said, to insure that the malpractice crisis is properly taken care of.

Dively is a graduate of the University of Michigan Law School and practiced law until his election to the Legislature in 1968. Representative Dively was elected to the 104th district including Traverse City, Cadillac and all of Benzie and Leelanau Counties on November 5, 1968. He was re-elected in 1970 and 1972. In 1974, he chose not to run for re-election but went to work for the Commerce Department.

He has been working quite closely with Governor Milliken in developing solutions to the malpractice program.

In addition to the program, the hospital association conducted its business meeting, receiving reports from Bruce Fowler, chairman of the Board of Directors; Charles Huntington, secretary - treasurer of the association; J.M. 



## Consumers Power explains reasons for rate hike request

LANSING — Citing urgent needs to bring revenues in line with constantly increasing costs, Consumers Power Company has applied to the Michigan Public Service Commission for authorization to raise its electric rates by at least \$118 million annually.

The proposed increase would raise total revenues from residential customers by 11.6 percent, secondary commercial and industrial customers by 30.4 percent and primary commercial and industrial customers by 15.3 percent.

The proposed rate increase would add \$2.18 to the electric bill of a residential customer who uses 500 kilowatt-hours of electricity monthly.

For a customer who heats his home by electric heat and uses 1500 kilowatt-hours monthly, the proposed increase would add \$4.93 per month or about 10.1 percent to his electric bill.

Consumers Power also asked the Public Service Commission for partial and immediate electric rate relief of \$73,500,000 annually. If the interim request is granted, this would be deducted from any final rate increase authorized by the commission.

"I am aware, and the entire management of Consumers Power Company is aware, that

higher costs for energy are unpopular," said A. H. Aymond, chairman of the board of the company.

"This is a very large amount of money," he added. "It is, by far, the largest amount ever asked by Consumers Power in a single rate case. But, I must emphasize that it is needed if this company is to provide reliable electric service in Michigan in the foreseeable future."

The proposed rate increase has been requested because spiraling inflation in 1974 and 1975 and expenditures for environmental purposes have resulted in greatly increasing the company's costs.

In addition, the company has requested that its return on common equity be increased from 12.12 percent to 14.5 percent in order to be competitive with other industry raising funds. The present rate of return of 12.12 percent allowed by the commission is based on costs in 1968 and does not represent the true cost of obtaining financing at today's market prices.

The company has also requested that the commission include in the company's cost of service all taxes applicable to rendering service to its customers. Present practices

have the effect of passing on certain taxes to future customers.

The company has been forced to cancel or delay construction at four of its generating plants. Depressed earnings also forced the company to reduce its 1975 construction budget from \$484 million to the presently authorized \$241 million. The cutbacks have revised by several years in-service schedules of needed generating plant.

The Public Service Commission authorized Consumers Power to increase its electric rates in January 1975 by \$38.6 million and in September 1974 by \$27.6 million for a total of \$66.2 million. This was in response to the \$72.2 million requested by the company in April 1974. The rate increases were based on operating statistics and company costs during 1973 and selected figures for early 1974.

The commission's new regulations covering filing for rate increases now permits inclusion of financial information and projected costs, as well as past costs. The rate filing today included present and projected costs of providing electric service to the company's 1.2 million electric customers in Michigan.

The commission in the past has authorized Consumers Power to earn a return of 12.12 percent on common equity. The company has not earned this authorized return since 1967. Had it achieved that rate of return over the last 12 months, the company's earnings per share on common stock outstanding would have been \$3.40. In fact, earnings as of April 30 were only \$1.82.

## Senator Richard Allen From the Senate

I'm willing to protect you from shysters, hucksters, fast buck artists, and shady dealers in general. No matter that they ply their trade in an alley or your friendly bank. But I draw the line at protecting you against yourself. That's your job — or maybe your wife's or your mother's. But in my opinion it isn't the job of the State of Michigan.

Herein lies the difference between legitimate consumer protection and big brotherism. We are working on a large number of consumer protection measures this session. A major one, no doubt on its way to final passage, is called the Consumer Protection Act.

IT PROHIBITS and has heavy fines for merchants and others engaging in a wide-range of deceptive practices. I support most of these provisions. People have a right to know what they are being sold. We have always had the civil right to sue for damages if we were defrauded. This has worked in major frauds but has no effect on the minor ones since one cannot afford to go to court to recover for having been sold a ballpoint pen that doesn't write.

Under this law a ballpoint pen has to write even if the merchant has not so guaranteed. The mere fact that it looks like a pen is an implied warranty that it writes. To consistently and knowingly continue to sell such pens will be a criminal act. Unless of course it is explained that these pens don't write. Not just a pen . . . a car has to run and a dryer has to dry.

beans bought in Ethiopia as "Michigan Beans" just because the seed originally came from Michigan or you named the product after your great uncle whose middle name was Michigan.

IF A MERCHANT advertises a product at a certain price he has to have a reasonable supply and sell them at that price.

So on and so on through 25 or so common abuses. Many of them minor but irritating and while not previously criminal at least generally regarded as unethical.

But let's take a look at what I think is going a step too far. The original bill made illegal representing something as "without charge or words of similar import if there are

conditions, terms, or limitations attached" etc. When you see a "One tire free" sign you know the print below is going to say "with the purchase of three." This provision would make the "one cent sale" illegal as there is always the "limitation" that you have to purchase another at the full price.

IT SEEMS to me that about half the bills and provisions in the name of Consumer Protection are legitimate. But the other half are either big brotherism or over regulation of legitimate business.

If you read a legislator has only a 50% rating on consumer protection that's probably about right. If its 100%, look out for 1984!

## Ovid-Elsie Schools seek 3/4 mill increase

"We anticipate not being fully funded by the state due to undetermined aid actions by the legislature," cautioned Ovid-Elsie school superintendent Donald Kinney as he reported the school board would seek a 2.75 mills increase in operating levies June 9.

"However, we are lowering the debt retirement by 2 mills, which will bring our anticipated total millage increase to just three-quarters of a mill," he added.

"We're basing our estimated funding needs on state aid. Last year the state withheld three-quarters of one per cent and this year we estimate it could withhold as much as 2 per cent of the aid due us," said Kinney. "Some \$200 million was lost to schools in the state when the 4 percent sales tax on food was rescinded. And with a high rate of unemployment, state tax revenues have decreased quite a bit. So the schools of the state

will suffer, too."

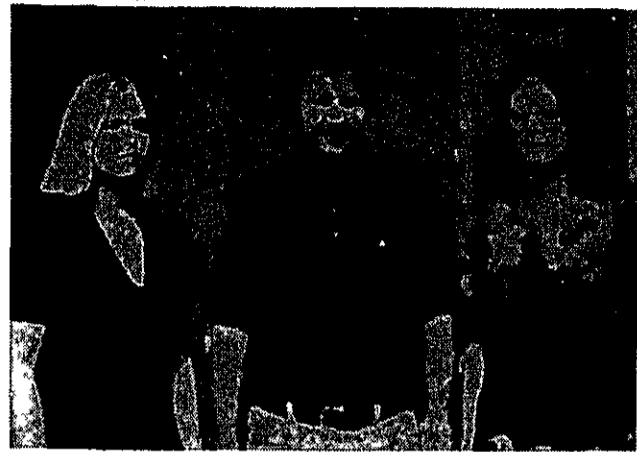
The request for a one-year hike to 18.75 operating mills coupled with the decreased debt retirement rate would bring the total levies at O-E to 26.75 including the allocated 8 mills from the allocation board.

Previously, the operating millage rate went up from 14 to 16 while the debt retirement millage dropped 2 1/4 mills for 1974-75.

Board of education terms of Merle Green and Thomas Winkler expire this year, and the two seek to be re-seated unopposed.

Green has served for 2 four-year terms and is owner of Green Meadow Farms of Elsie. Winkler was appointed to the board in January to fill the term of Richard Semans, who resigned to become a township supervisor in Shiawassee County. Winkler is a resident of Ovid and is employed by Wiley Oldsmobile in Owosso.

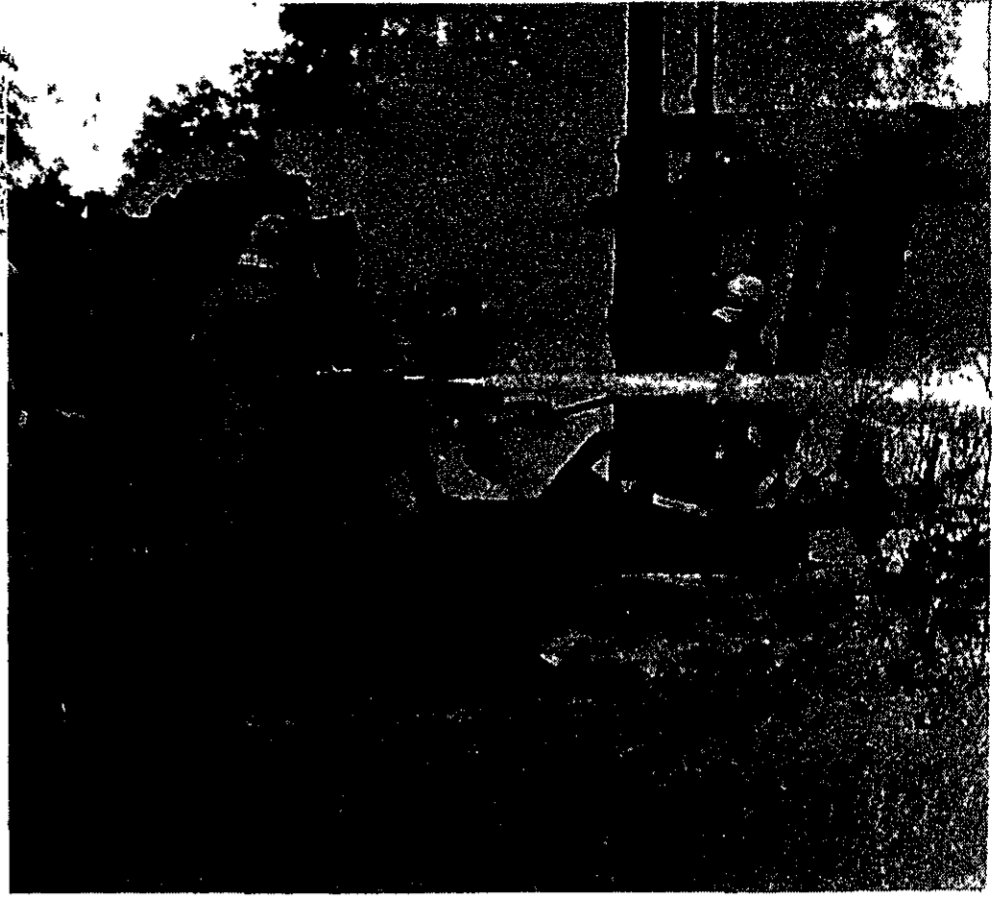

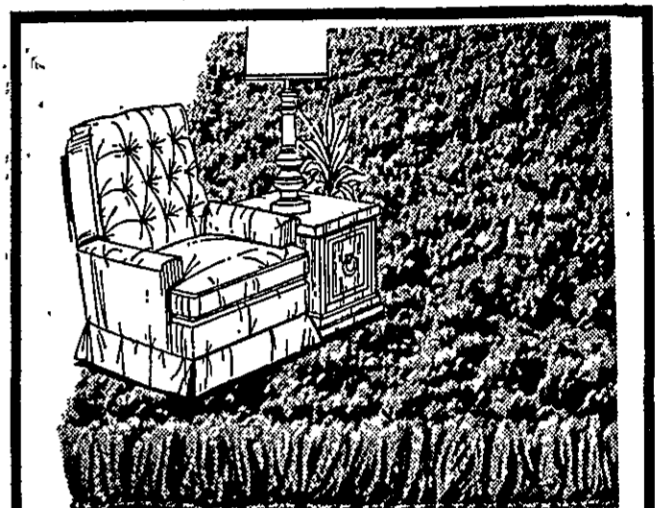

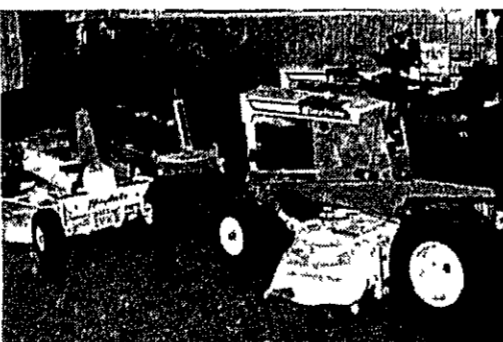
has withdrawn from the race.

## Bills Column

Check fields for alfalfa weevil

Now is a good time to check your fields for the Alfalfa Weevil.

The Alfalfa Weevil overwinters as adults in alfalfa fields, fence rows or woodlots. They become active on the first warm days of spring and are most active on warm nights and cloudy, windless days. The adults lay eggs inside the hollow stems of alfalfa or other plants. The young grubs that hatch from these eggs move out of the stems and feed on the tips of alfalfa. As they grow larger, they begin eating the leaf tissue leaving only the veins, which gives the damaged leaves a skeletonized appearance. Weevil grubs have a block head and a legless, cylindrical, wrinkled body. They are nearly white just after hatching, but become green with a prominent white stripe down their backs as they grow larger. When full grown, they are about 3/8 of an inch long.

There is considerable variation in the abundance and development of the alfalfa weevil in different parts of the state and in different fields, so you must check each of your own fields.

The critical point for the first cutting is reached when about 1/4 of the tips show grub damage. You can determine this damage by cutting about 20 in several parts of the field and counting the number of damaged tips. A tip that shows any feeding should be counted as damaged. The stubble and regrowth following the first cutting should also be checked for weevils, whether the first cutting was sprayed or not.

Proper timing of the first cutting is the first line of defense. The highest yield and best quality hay is obtained

when alfalfa is cut in the late bud stage. Late bud stage is also the best time to cut to kill the most alfalfa weevil eggs and grubs and avoid spraying.

You should spray the field if: (A) about 1/4 of the tips of the first crop show weevil damage and the field will not be cut for at least 7 to 10 days; (B) if grubs can be readily found in the stubble following the first cutting. This is a common situation when the field was cut late-on, was heavily infested when cut. Grubs can severely damage the young regrowth. Do not delay in applying an insecticide to the stubble if the grubs are abundant.

Insecticides are poisons! Handle, store, and apply them with great care. READ THE LABEL before buying or using any insecticide. The label has full instructions for the safe, effective use of that insecticide. For proper insecticides to use, get a copy of Extension Bulletin, "Management for Alfalfa Weevil Control," free from your Cooperative Extension Office, 1003 South Oakland Street, St. Johns.

Roadside clean-up results

Final results of the Clinton County Youth Roadside Beautification project "Keep It Green" showed 272 miles of county roadways cleaned up during April and May. A total of 31 4-H groups and 15 Scout groups provided 605 youth and 159 adults who worked a total of 2,982 hours cleaning up over 122 pickup loads of trash and litter. The groups found 714 returnable bottles. Most of the groups reported that 75-90% of the litter was non-returnable beverage bottles and cans.

Four groups reported they found one dollar bills along their roads. The Eagle Border 4-H members found it pays to clean up their roadsides as David Morris, a local farmer who appreciated their efforts, has offered to give the members an airplane ride. The members are looking forward to this exciting opportunity. Other items found by groups besides bottles and cans included many car parts, kitchen table and chairs, swing set, dead animals, fishing reels, aluminum extension ladder, milk cans and paper. Many of the glass non-returnable bottles were brought

to the glass project at the fairgrounds and were put in the glass recycling project.

The youth received cooperation from the County Road Commission who provided trucks throughout the county for disposing of the trash, Grange Land Development who allowed free disposal at their landfill in Watertown Township of litter picked up in the southern part of the county, Michigan National Guard who provided trucks at Bath and DeWitt for hauling litter brought in by groups in that area, City of St. Johns, Greenbush and Duplain townships who allowed the groups to dispose of trash and litter in their landfills.

This is the eighth year the youth groups have been working on cleaning up the county roadsides involving 4-H and Scout youth. The youth work hard on this project every year because they are proud of their community and want to keep it beautified. However, it seems to be a losing battle as many people throw out bottles, cans, junk and paper containers from fast food restaurants the

next day after the roads are cleaned. One youth group sent a letter to their legislator telling how much effort they put in cleaning up the road of non-returnable bottles and cans. Maybe if more people contacted their congressman on this matter something would be done. If they pick up bottles and cans, let's have deposit on them so it will be worth their time. If there was a charge on all beverage bottles and cans, people might be less apt to throw them out along the roadside.

The youth have learned how much effort it takes to clean up the county roadside area. Let's all help the youth keep Clinton County beautiful by doing our part in disposing of litter in proper containers. A little help from everyone would go a long way in accomplishing the project theme this year, "Keep It Green."

Sixty-one 4-H members, parents and leaders attended the rabbit training program Tuesday evening at Smith Hall in St. Johns. Mr. Robert Vitek, a local 4-H rabbit leader and owner of Vitek's Rabbitry, demonstrated what to look for in selecting rabbits; how to show rabbits, type of equipment recommended for feeding and housing, what to feed rabbits, disease control. It was an excellent meeting for members and parents who are starting to raise rabbits as a project. Mr. Vitek told the group about a year round market for the meat rabbits. A representative will visit St. Johns every two weeks to buy any meat rabbits ranging from 4 1/2 to 6 pounds in weight. Anyone interested in finding out more about this program should contact Mr. Vitek. Door prizes of rabbit feed were won by Mike Martin, Riley Ramblers 4-H Club; Rick Martin, Westphalia 4-H Bunny Folks Club; and Jo Anne Slocum, Bath All Purpose 4-H Club. Dr. Sam Varghese, Extension Poultry Youth Specialist from MSU, showed slides and discussed 39 breeds of rabbits out of a total of 105 known rabbit breeds.

**Chloe's Column**  
 Parents, pre-schoolers, mealtimes... problems  
 Clinton County Home Economist Chloe Padgitt.

One of the most frequently expressed concerns of parents with pre-schoolers is mealtime - children that will not eat. In many homes, mealtime is often a frustrating experience for both parent and child. Here are a few factors and suggestions that can serve as guidelines to more pleasant mealtimes.

Small portions. Adult size servings may be overwhelming for a child. Serve a small amount. It gives a child a feeling of success when he eats it all. He will ask for more when he wants it. Child size servings are 1/4 cup of milk, a piece of meat 1/2 to 3 inches across, 1/4 to 1/3 cup of vegetables and fruits, and 1/2 slice of bread or 1/4 to 1/2 cup of cereal.

Flavor. Mildly seasoned and flavored foods are preferred to highly seasoned, strong flavored foods. Use less pepper, spice and condiments during food preparation. Adults can add these at the table.

Snacks. Discourage snacks within an hour before mealtime. A child who snacks all the time may simply not be hungry at mealtime. Does your child get snacks from neighbors or friends you may be unaware of?

Consider snacks as part of the daily food intake. When nutritious foods are provided for snacks, the main meals need not provide all of the child's daily food requirements. Temperature. Food a little warmer than lukewarm is liked. Hot food is frightening to young children.

Color. A variety of color ir foods and brightly colored dishes invite children to reach out for them - and eat. Texture. Children like the sound and feel of crunchy foods. Slices and pieces of raw vegetables such as carrots, celery, cauliflower, broccoli, radishes, and cabbage are preferred to these same foods when cooked.

Gardening. Children are much more willing to eat vegetables they have grown in their very own garden. Help your pre-schooler start a vegetable garden. Helping. Children are more likely to eat foods they have helped prepare. Let your child do some of the pouring, dumping, stirring, opening of boxes and other small tasks.

Time. Unless there is a real reason to hurry him, it is best to let a child feed himself at his own pace. Some dawdling can be expected with the pre-schooler. His attention span is short. Urging him to eat may only spoil his appetite, or he may decide to dawdle as a way to win attention. You may wish to use a timer set for ample time (half hour to 40 minutes). Your children may play a game of trying to beat the timer.

Playing. If a child consistently plays with his food at

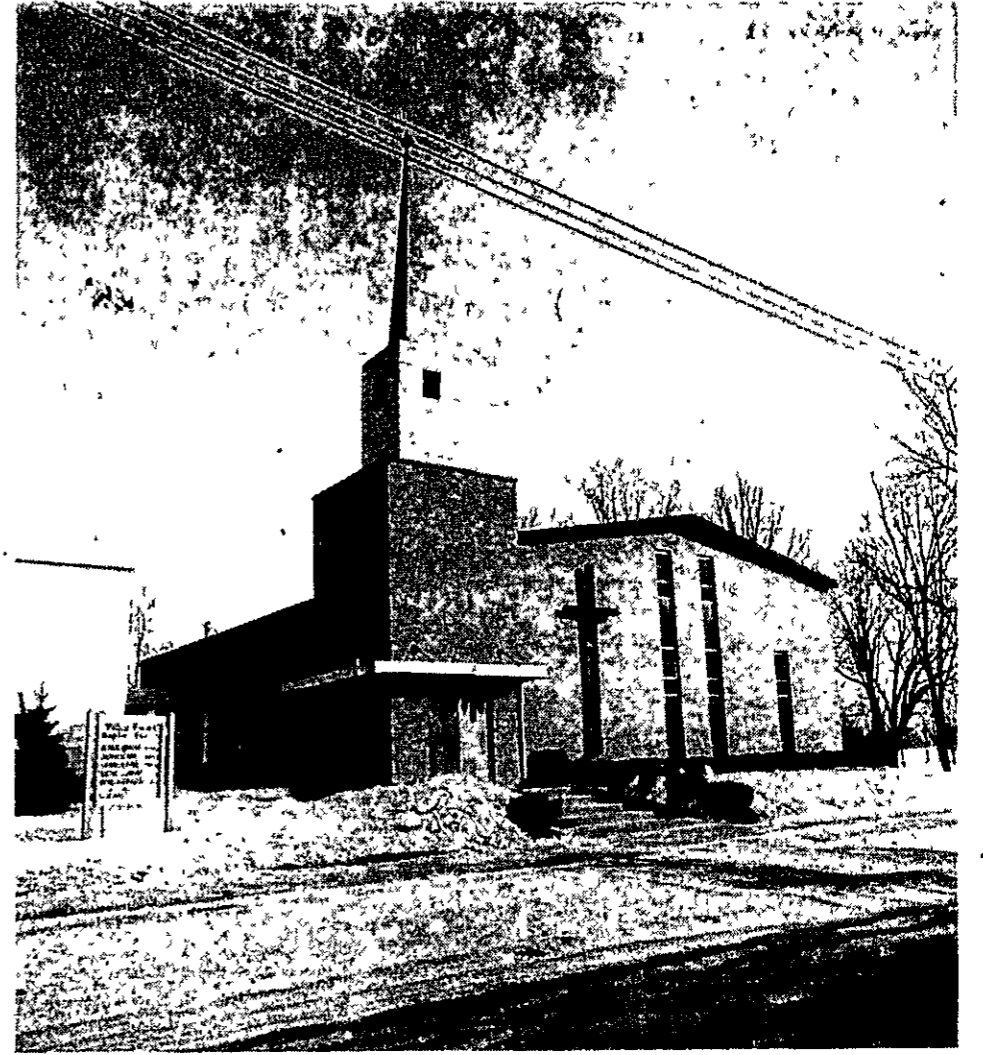
