All millage votes pass

Millage issues and school board incumbents had an easy time of it Monday in 6 area school district elections.

Voters approved millage questions in all 4 districts that were up for renewals or increases.

ST JOHNS

Largest turnout was in St Johns, where electors approved 16.5 mills (a 1-mill increase). There were 542 yes votes and 439 no votes cast.

Incumbents William Richards Jr and Wendell E. Waggoner captured school board seats with 618 and 636 votes respectively. Edward A. Lenon received 543 votes.

FOWLER

Fowler voters renewed a 16-mill rate by a vote of 156 to 48. They also re-elected incumbents Winifred McKean and Marvin Simon to the school board.

OVID-ELSIE

The Ovid-Elsie district won a 2-mill increase to 16 mills, with 379 yes votes and 181 no votes cast. Board incumbent David Hill won the sole board seat with 317 votes; Donna Besco received 114 and Robert White 112 votes.

PEWAMO-WESTPHALIA

Pewamo-Westphalia residents approved 15.5 mills, a 1.1-mill increase. They cast 116 yes and 51 no votes. Murdo Wood and Carl Cramer were the only candidates for 2 board positions.

BATH AND DEWITT

The Bath and DeWitt districts had no millage votes this year. Bath had 2 candidates for 2 board seats: Bernard Black and Gail Matthews.

In DeWitt, incumbent Willard Reed and newcomer Keith Davis won board seats with 145 votes each. John Allen received 88 votes; Robert Valentine got 118.

All school board members serve 4 year terms.

Allen seeks Michigan Senate office

Richard J. Allen, head of the Michigan Tourist Council and a former state representative from Gratiot County, has announced his candidacy for the state senate from the 30th district, which includes all of Clinton County, the City of Owosso and the west half of Shiawassee County, a great share of Gratiot and Eaton counties, and parts of four other counties.

In seeking the nomination for the Michigan senate seat, the 40-year-old Republican is making plans to withdraw from his position as State Travel Director and head of the Tourist Council, an agency charged with the responsibility of aiding the economy of one of the state's leading industries—tourism and travel.

FROM 1969 THROUGH 1972, Allen served as state representative from the 88th district, which was located primarily within the senate district he is now seeking.

In addition to his political interests, for the last 20 years Allen has been active in agricultural, educational, business and (See Page 11A)

ST JOHNS — Twin Oaks Golf Course is offering a full-day of golfing competition Saturday, June 15, with all proceeds going to cancer research, in memory of Penny Crowell, daughter of the owners of the course, Mr and Mrs Gay Crowell.

Penny succumbed to cancer at the age of 20. In dedication to her memory, the Crowells now sponsor 1 golf day each year with all green fees going toward cancer research.

The goal for this year, the 2d year for the event, is \$1000.

Green fees are \$2 and club memberships will be honored.

Already, over \$100 in donations have been received before the scramble golf tournament gets underway Saturday morning. All money from refreshments, above expenses, goes for cancer research.

The money will be sent to the American Cancer Society through the Clinton County Cancer Society.

Soft drinks for the event have been provided by RC Cola, with those proceeds also going toward cancer research.

Winners in the tournament will receive cash prizes with the top 4 golfers eligible to compete in state competition to benefit the American Cancer Society.

The tourney is to be held rain or shine, with card game activities and a bake sale scheduled in the club house.

Those wishing to donate, but unable to participate in the tournament may leave their donation at the Twin Oaks Golf Course, approximately 6 miles north of St Johns.

Names of those who donate goods or money to assist in the sponsoring of the tournament will be published in next week's Clinton County News.

Meals on wheels marks first year

ST JOHNS — Volunteer workers in the St Johns Meals on Wheels program marked completion of the first year of service last week by laying groundwork for an expanded client schedule and the election of new officers for the coming year.

At a board meeting held in the home of Pauline Warren, members voted only two changes in the group's officers. Maxine Parmelee will serve as qualifier and the Rev Hugh Banninga was elected as vice president. Other officers re-elected to their previous positions were: Mrs Warren, president; Nancy Wells, treasurer; Jeanette Huard, secretary and Carole Chalmers, Joan Gentry and Dee Ferris, board members.

Members learned that during 1973-74 the Meals on Wheels program provided 1,271 meals to 32 persons with average daily deliveries at six. The largest number of meals delivered in one day was 14.

Meals on Wheels was established one year ago to provide at least one hot meal each day to incapacitated persons unable to leave their homes or others recuperating from illness. Applications for such service are accepted by the Meals on Wheels board and if the applicant qualifies a delivery schedule is maintained.

During the past year delivery chairperson Carole Chalmers reported that 45 volunteers participated in delivering meals to needy persons and of that number 31 were regularly scheduled volunteers. A dozen other volunteers serve as collectors under direction of Mrs Gentry.

The meals on wheels program is available also to persons on welfare meeting the board's criteria and charges for the service will be covered through the Social Services Department.

With the completion of the first year of service, president Warren issued a call for volunteers and persons interested in participating in the program can learn full details by contacting Carole Chalmers at 224-7515.

Rock concert prompts DeWitt Twp ordinance

was no specific regulatory ordinance, the permit probably wasn't even a legal necessity.

Despite the fact that the concert drew only about half of the expected crowd of 6000, township supervisor Dale Emerson said the promoter had approached him about having another concert in the area.

Emerson said Demeter's attorney estimated the firm's losses at \$20,000 and added, "apparently they think they can recoup."

That's not what township residents are concerned with, however. Emerson said he'd received many calls from residents "who are glad the concert went as well as it did, but hope it never happens again."

Though sentiment about the concert was clear-cut, framing the ordinance was not. The board wanted to have regulatory powers but was leery of imposing rules that would burden less controversial gatherings like church socials and PTA events.

Consumers to close St Johns office

LANSING — Consumers Power Company will close its St Johns office at 110 N. Clinton, Ave, effective June 21.

Paul M. Gardner, Lansing Urban Manager for the utility, said all phases of operation including customer contact and bill payments will be consolidated at the Company's Service Center, 530 W. Willow St, Lansing.

He added the Company plans to locate a pay-station in the Clinton National Bank, 200 N. Clinton Ave, to receive payments for Company service bills.

The closing is prompted by the Company's soaring costs and depressed earnings.

Gardner said consolidation of departments, records and personnel would allow the Company to continue efficient service to its customers.

Many customers, he noted, pay utility bills by mail and most Company contact, including requests for service turn-on, service turn-off, and account information, is done by telephone.

The St Johns office has been staffed by one full time employee, who will be transferred to the Lansing office, and two part-time employees.

St Johns takes case to governor

ST JOHNS — They want to talk to the governor.

That was the decision reached by the St Johns City Commission Monday night during a discussion about the 10% factor placed on the County by the State Tax Commission.

Harvey Weatherwax summed up the feeling the factor is unfair when he said, "In the past only a few units re-appraise and then the state comes along and gives a factor based on the overall county."

The city's contention is that it is unfair for St Johns and only a few other units to re-appraise to reach an assessment level required by the state. They feel St Johns and the few units who have re-appraised are paying the penalty right along with those who have not set their assessment levels at the rate required by the State Tax Commission.

Roy Ebert kicked off the protest ball by proposing a resolution supporting the County Board of Commissioners in their efforts to appeal the factor. Copies of the resolution are to be sent to the County Commission, State House of Representatives and the State Senate.

Commr John Hannah carried the protest a bit further by recommending a trip to see the governor.

Hannah said he is familiar with a similar situation in the northern part of the state where the city of Petoskey and Emmet County sent a delegation to confer with the governor.

"They felt something was gained," Hannah said, "if nothing more than bringing it to the attention of the governor." Hannah added he felt such action may be a way to combat "bullying tactics" of the State Tax Commission.

It was moved by the Commission to write requesting a meeting between Governor William Milliken, Mayor Robert Wood, City Manager Harvey Weatherwax and City Assessor Bruce Wood.

In a related matter, the Commission voted 3-2 to have Bruce Wood arrange for completion of a city re-appraisal, now about 2% completed.

Voting for completion was Mayor Wood, Gerald Wilcox and John Arehart. Hannah and Ebert voted against the motion.

Ebert opposed because, "it seems we're doing a lot of hoping." He was speaking of a county-wide re-appraisal that has been tentatively approved.

He did not want to complete the re-appraisal if it would not be accepted by the county, who then would have the power to have the city re-appraised again.

Ebert added, "I can't see going ahead. I can't see taking a factor, then re-appraising."

APPOINT TO BOARD OF APPEALS

In other action the Commission appointed 3 members to the Zoning Board of Appeals to fill the vacancies created by the resignations of Walter Pierce, Dr W.F. Stephenson and Leon Brewbaker.

The 3 resigned when the City Commission requested the Board of Appeals meetings be held in the evening instead of at 12:30 pm.

Names nominated for the positions were Rollin Huard, Cecil Smith, Mary Hutton and Lucille Boak. Huard and Smith received 5 votes apiece, Boak 3 and Hutton 2, with Huard, Smith and Boak named on the board.

BUILDER WANTS DITCH COVERED

Present at the meeting was local builder Joe Mesh, who asked the city what they planned to do about an open storm drain between Baldwin and McConnell Streets.

He was told city officials could find no documents stating that the city had guaranteed to put in a pipe and fill the drain, following the granting of an easement.

Mesh disagreed and said the matter has not been settled in 14 years.

"This is the 3d time I've been here," he told the Commission, "and it's the last time." He then said, "if nothing was done about the drain, 'I'm going to push it shut.'"

Two other matters brought up by Mesh concerning water and sewer hook-ups were approved by the Commission.

COMPLAINT ABOUT FAST FIREMEN

Complaints by W. Walker St residents about fast firemen was relayed to the board by Hannah. Hannah said the complaints involved 3 firemen responding to fire calls on W. Walker. He said the complaints were

about the speed at which they drive and he agreed, saying, "I believe I more minute will not mean that much more" in stopping a fire.

Hannah emphasized the Commission's appreciation of the efforts of the fire department, but expressed his concern for the danger to pedestrians.

The matter is to be referred to the fire chief.

RESIDENT COMPLAINS ABOUT "DRAGGING"

Speeding of another type was the complaint of St Johns resident, Carole Johnson, who complained of "drag racing" in front her home.

Members of the Commission agreed that it was a problem throughout the community and asked the city manager to discuss the matter with Lyle French, chief of police.

Adult foster care, "normal way of life"

ST. JOHNS - A recent "May Celebration" was held at the Knights of Columbus Hall in St. Johns, with the guests of honor including area foster care residents, senior citizens and disabled adults.

Many of those enjoying the exhibits, entertainment, bingo and guests were foster care citizens.

Foster care for adults in Clinton County is a program that provides family environments for the adults unable to live independently because of age or other reasons.

There are now approximately 20-25 adult foster homes in the county, providing home-like atmospheres for about 75 adults unable to reside by themselves or with other members of their family.

Reasons for an adult to reside in a foster home may include illness, age, inability to fix their own meals, and care for themselves in other ways or recent release from a hospital or other institution.

The foster care program, administered locally by the Clinton County Dept of Social Services emphasizes "allowing foster adult citizens to live a life as close to normal as possible."

The freedom and opportunity to participate in activities is an important part of the adult foster program and is designed to eliminate the concept of "sticking old persons away until they die."

The program deals greatly with the human needs of the foster adults and the fact that many adults may eventually be able to live independently or return to their families as a result of their foster care experience.

Those persons providing foster adult care must have their homes licensed and a maximum of 6 foster adults are

allowed in a home.

Pay for being a foster adult may come from the individual or, if the individual is unable to pay, money can be provided through Supplemental Security Income.

Persons interested in opening their homes to foster adults may obtain more information from Carolyn Wharton or Julia Jury at the Clinton County Dept of Social Service.

They may also be contacted by persons wishing to be volunteers to visit the homes to read to foster adults, write letters, provide transportation for shopping trips etc.

Historical Society plans 2 activities

The tour will feature the "Mann House" in Concord. The historic old home has been carefully restored to its early Victorian atmosphere. The house, which has stood for more than a century, is an original homestead farmhouse in Jackson County.

A box picnic lunch, prepared by Jeanne's Beans, will be eaten on the grounds of the Mann House before returning to St. Johns. Persons interested in going on the tour may call Jan Seperic at 224-4473 or Doug Carpenter at 224-7390.

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Announce schedule for St. Johns pool

Swimming season begins June 17 at the Clinton County Memorial Pool. Classes catering to preschoolers, adults and everyone in between will be offered, as well as small group lessons, recreational swimming and lifesaving.

Registration for lessons began June 12. Applications may be brought to the YMCA physical department in Lansing or the pool. Bath, Fowler and Pewamo-Westphalia residents register at school. Fees are \$8 per session (10 lessons). Fees for recreational swimming will be 25 cents for children, 50 cents for adults and \$1 for the entire family.

Small group sessions for children who need some extra attention will be offered at \$7.50 for 5 lessons. Starting June 24, there will also be a preschool program where a parent accompanies a child in the pool to help with instruction.

Junior and senior lifesaving will start that week too, with both YMCA and Red Cross certificates available.

Fees for adult swim instruction, which starts June 24, will be \$7 for 9 lessons.

Clubs and groups can rent the pool for \$12 an hour, with the pool providing a certified lifeguard.

Non-swimming children must be at least 36 inches tall at the shoulders and preferably at least 6 years old. Lesson schedules are as follows:

Del DeWitt received a prize for the longest putt (19 ft.) on hole No 2. The prize for best

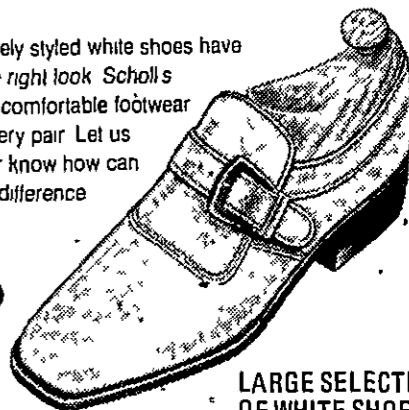
joker hand went to Barb MacKinnon, and JoAnne Gentry won for highest total on holes No 5 and No 7.

Guest Day will be June 26. Members should sign-up and pay for this event by June 19.

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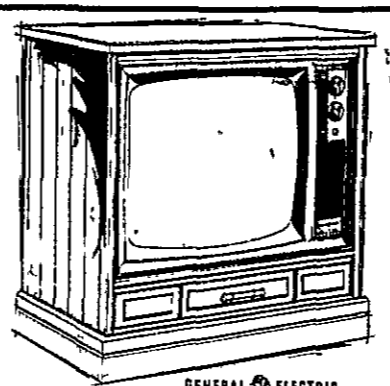


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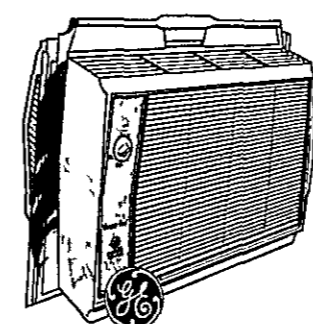

An assortment of health foods is there, such as sunflower seed soup, sea-salted soybeans, or safflower mayonnaise. A special wine department offers both imported and United States wines.

Mouthwatering sights and scents beckon shoppers to the delicatessen and the nearby Sanders Bake Shop.

DELICATESSEN
In the delicatessen, which is topped by a wood-shingled roof and accented with the golden glow of lighted panels, prepared foods of all kinds are ready to carry home. There's traditional cole slaw or chopped liver. There are luncheon meats of every variety, tenderly pink-centered slices of roast beef, succulent sausages, cheeses to suit every taste, from the mildest to the most aromatic and pungent. Ribs and chicken turn lazily on a barbecue spit,

sizzling as they brown.

The wider variety of products reaches into every section of the store, from Kroger's own "People's Choice" Beef - US Department of Agriculture inspected and graded - to fresh fruits and vegetables to canned goods.

Rev LaVern Bretz

Minister's career spans 40 years

Sunday, May 26, culminated forty years of service to two Baptist Churches and one Community Church in the southern part of Clinton County.

The Reverend LaVern A. Bretz went to the Bath Baptist Church July 22, 1934 and served there until April, of 1938. The Bath Church had been closed and the property given away. Under Rev Bretz' leadership the Church was revived and

many added to the membership. While serving in Bath Rev Bretz was asked to assist at Valley Farms. He ministered to both churches from 1938 to 1938 when he resigned in Bath and moved to Valley Farms.

The Church at Valley Farms was organized in January, 1938, a parsonage built and a Sunday School unit added to the Church. Rev Bretz served until December 1944 when he resigned to give his full time to the DeWitt Community Church.

During 1944 he had pastored both the Valley Farms Baptist Church and the DeWitt Community Church.

During the 13 years he served in DeWitt the Church was raised and a basement put under it. It was modernized and the sanctuary converted into the style of a Martha Washington Chapel. A parsonage was built and when the Reverend Bretz left the DeWitt Church in 1957 there was an active membership growing in numbers and ministering to the spiritual needs of the community.

He returned to Valley Farms in the fall of 1957 where he has since served. Valley Farms

Baptist is now housed in a brick building which will accommodate four hundred people with ample parking space. There is a strong membership dedicated to the spread of the gospel around the world.

Rev Bretz began his ministry as a lay pastor with no salary. He was ordained to the ministry December 15, 1939 and since that time has officiated at well over fifteen hundred funerals and has performed more than a thousand weddings.

Blood analyzer extends services at hospital

ST. JOHNS - Cardiac patients and persons with respiratory disorders, such as emphysema, asthma and bronchitis, in the Clinton County area can now be treated with much greater accuracy due to the recent acquisition of a Blood Gas Analyzer at Clinton Memorial Hospital in St. Johns.

According to Dan Parsons, MT (ASCP), chief lab technologist at the hospital, the Blood Gas Analyzer is the first machine available that can determine whether the cause of the disorder is a pulmonary or a metabolic malfunction.

"The machine discovers the cause by determining the degree and direction of fluctuation in pH (alkaline-acidic factor) in the patient's blood, which then permits the physician to accurately prescribe medication," said Parsons.

He added that the pH in blood has an extremely short range of variability and if it were to exceed this narrow limitation, the patient could experience coma or death.

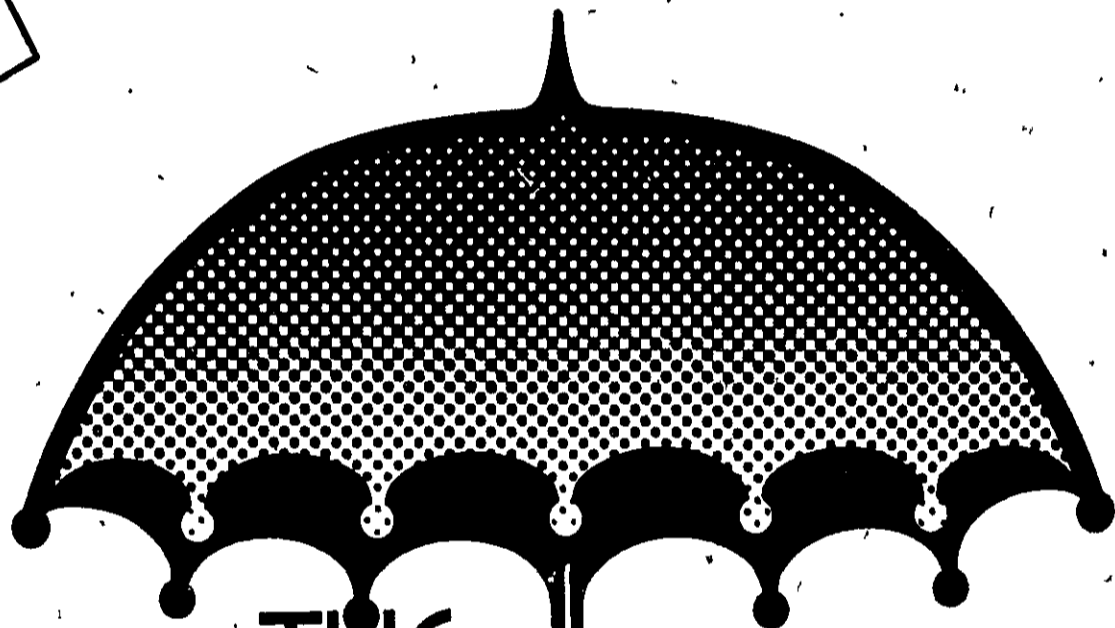
Parsons stated that the Blood Gas Analyzer, the most modern instrument of its kind, is also able to measure carbon dioxide and other respiratory waste products. In addition, it is highly useful in the treatment of extensive pulmonary oxygen therapy patients.

"We are particularly fortunate," he said, "to obtain this machine because it deals with one of the most critical areas in the life process and usually only the larger hospitals are able to fund such a purchase."

The machine eliminates the need for patients to be admitted to other hospitals for tests.

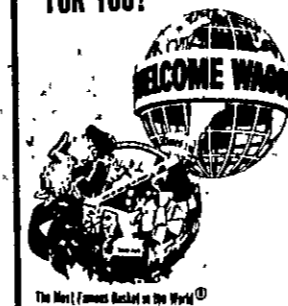

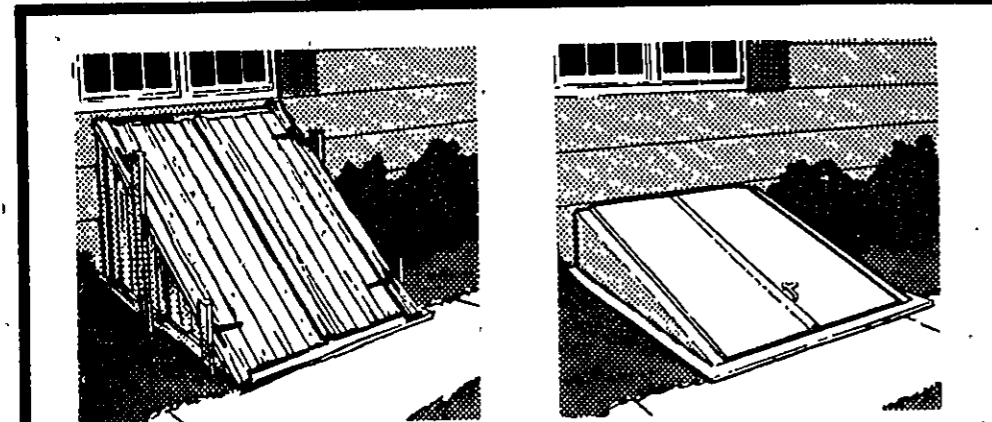

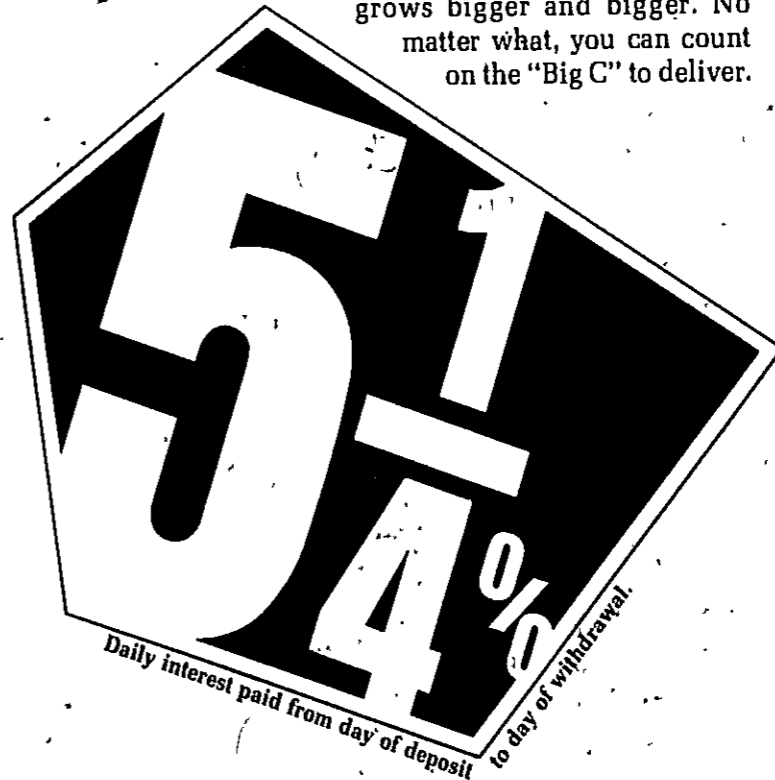

"But the regulations have to apply uniformly," admonished township attorney Dick Robinson.

The ordinance adopted Monday was similar to a model one put out by the governor's office and took immediate effect. Trustees bypassed a 30-day delay by deleting a penalty provision, which will probably be added to the ordinance at a later meeting.

Discuss sewer suit Board members also discussed the suit they filed recently against Clinton County and Bath township. They say

the suit was a last resort to determine ownership of the sewage treatment plant in their township and claim the county just stalled the issue too long.

"We've had more interaction with the county since that suit was filed than we have had in a long time," said trustee William Purves.

Emerson agreed, but pointed out legal action could still be avoided if planned negotiations with the county get results.

"We can still meet with the negotiating committee," he said, "and hopefully we can get worked out without ever going to court."

professional activities in central Michigan. He and his wife JoAnn, with their two children, Lester 8, and Carl 5, live on their own farm in Gratiot County. In addition to their own farm, he has been active in the management of the Allen family farm -- a centennial livestock farm located between Ithaca and Alma. His children are the sixth generation to have lived on the family farm.

Allen holds the Bachelor of Arts and Doctor of Veterinary Medicine degrees from Michigan State University, and has done graduate work toward an advanced degree in Agricultural Economics. He served on the staff of Alma College in the biology department for nine years, and he is a partner in the State Road Animal Hospital, just east of Alma, where he established a veterinary practice in 1958.

While in the House of Representatives, Allen was a prime sponsor and chief advocate of a number of successful measures. He feels his major accomplishments were in the area of property tax credits, mobile home financing, mobile home parks, and welfare reform. Other successful issues include banking, fabric flammability, alimony law, and road and trails for bicycles, horses, and pedestrians.

ASKED WHY HE would leave a secure,

well paying position as head of a state agency for the senate seat, Allen said, "My present position is interesting and challenging. However, I am one of those Americans who still believes in our system of government. Allen's father, Lester Allen, served several terms in the House of Representatives and is well known in Michigan agricultural circles. He is now retired and lives on the family homestead.

In its entirety the 30th senate district includes the basic area now served by Bill Ballenger, although the state-wide reapportionment two years ago, that becomes effective with the forthcoming election, changed some of the outlying boundaries. Senator Ballenger is now running for the US Congress.

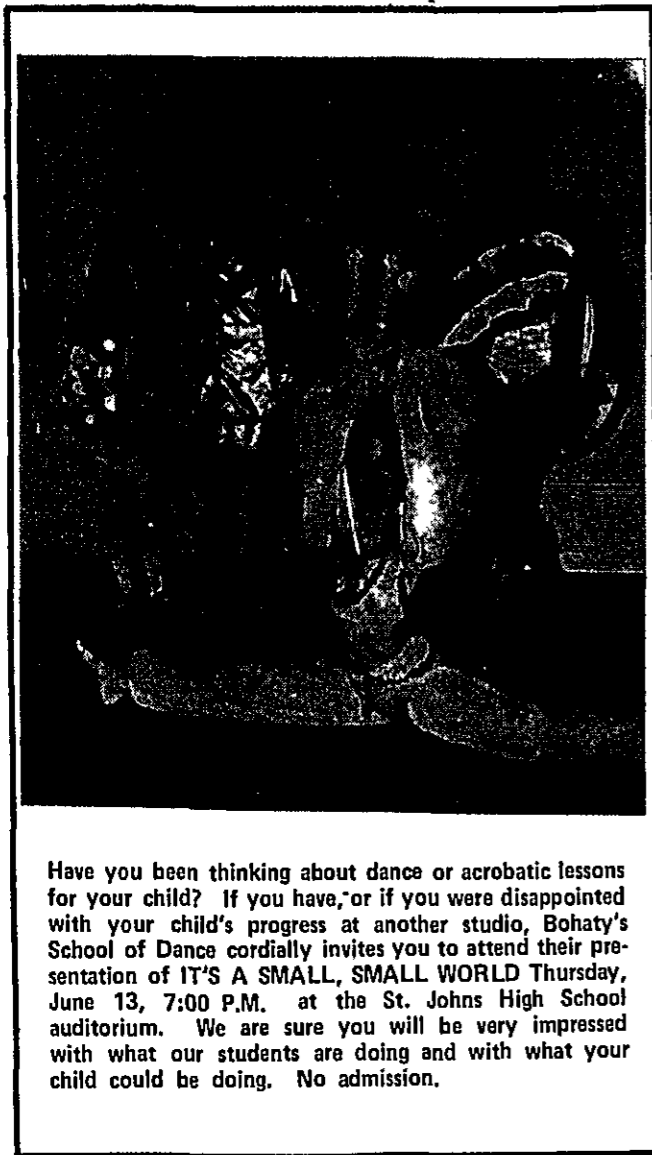

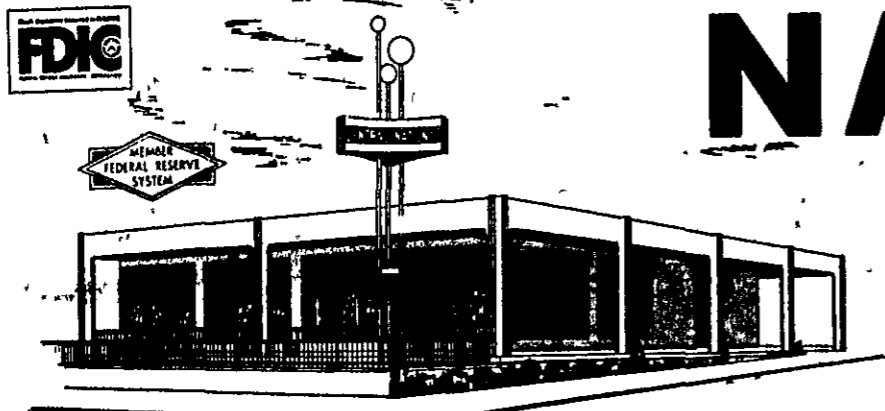

Happy mails to you

These tips to help vacationers enjoy trouble-free mailing of letters and post cards while on their holiday were offered this week by postmaster Keith A. Mishler of St. Johns.

"Mail as early as possible in the day, preferably in the morning," he said. "Avoid mailing on weekends when many post offices are closed. And try to deposit cards in mailboxes that indicate an early pickup."

He also suggested: Buy enough stamps before leaving home to prevent running out far away from the nearest post office. Keep in mind that stamps are more expensive when purchased from commercial vending machines.

Always use sufficient postage. For first-class cards, use an 8-cent stamp if the post card is not larger than the standard 4 1/2 x 6 in. size. For "jumbo" cards, 10-cent stamps are required. For airmail, use an 11-cent stamp on standard post cards and 13-cents for "jumbo" cards. As a general rule, use airmail stamps only when the mailing distance is 600 miles or more.

Remember to use Zip Codes. Many times cards are addressed hurriedly while riding

in cars, trains or planes. Legible Zip Codes will help speed mail to its proper destination.

Keep this trick in mind: Type the addresses of friends and relatives on self-adhesive labels before you leave home. It is surprising how much time this saves on the road and how much neater those cards will look.

Another note: Don't forget about your personal mail back home.

Remember to ask a friend or neighbor to empty your mailbox daily and to hold the mail until you return. An overstuffed box in your absence is an open invitation for thieves to enter your temporarily unoccupied home.

However, if you prefer, you can fill out a form available from the post office and request that your mail be held for any period up to 30 days. If you choose this method, be sure to stop in and pick up your mail when you return and specify that you want your mailman to resume home delivery.

"The best way to insure a relaxing vacation comes from taking the necessary steps to make certain that everything -- including the mail -- is in good order, back home," Mishler said.

We say again--State Tax Commission factor is not fair

Once again the Michigan State Tax Commission has thrust its heavy hand into the local assessing of taxes with little regard for the problems caused.

This year, the State Commission has decreed a 10 percent factor will be placed on Clinton County. In our opinion, a county-wide basis is in no way a fair procedure to levy such a factor.

The unfairness again came to light at Monday night's St Johns City Commission meeting. The city is in the midst of another reappraisal, which may go for naught if the county goes through with a proposed county-wide appraisal.

A county-wide appraisal would, hopefully, set property evaluations equal through the borders of Clinton County. As it stands, however, despite judicious efforts by St Johns and other units of governments, the citizens of those units are paying the tax bite caused by other units not being assessed at a high enough level.

To put it in more simple terms, let's use this example: You live in a \$24,000 home. You are paying taxes on an equalized valuation of \$12,000. However, your neighbor lives in an identical home with an identical price tag, but is paying only \$5000.

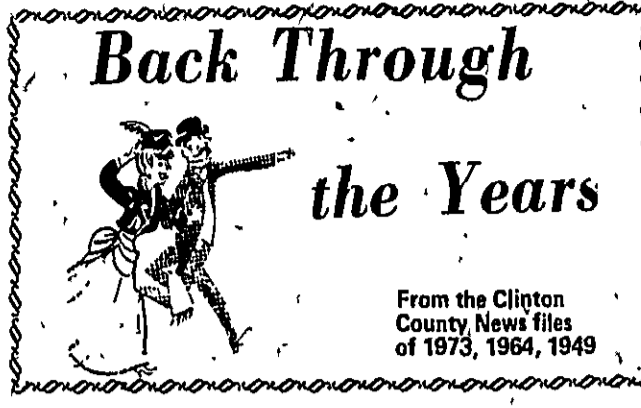
By recent State Tax Commission actions, it would be possible for them to determine you would make up the tax deficit caused by your neighbor being assessed at a lower rate. Although simplified, that is what happens when units with correct assessments are forced to levy more taxes because other units in the county have not correctly set their tax assessments.

It's not fair, pure and simple. Although many sit around and complain or appeal to the State Tax Commission (remember, they're the ones who started it in the first place), the city of St Johns is sending a delegation to express their protest to the governor.

What success such a protest will have in the governor's office will be difficult to forecast. However, it will be one more instance in a history of many protesting the heavy-handed tactics of the State Tax Commission, which has, in the past, seemed content to let complaints, objections and protests fall on deaf ears.

We have editorially asked before that a study be made of the State Tax Commission to determine if "it's the best way of doing the job."

We're asking again.

St Johns sale marks end of grain-storage era

ST JOHNS -- Thursday, June 10, in St. Johns, will mark the end of an era of US Government owned grain storage in Michigan, according to Walter Wittenbach, Chairman of the Michigan State Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee.

The Clinton County ASCS Committee will offer for public auction, at St. Johns, the balance of the surplus bins and equipment.

The sale will include 115 round bins with aeration fans and tubes as well as a 40'x100' quonset structure and a 20'x40' storage shed.

Wittenbach stated that all the equipment that has been used in the past by the State bin crews to maintain grain bins and sites

and for the dismantling of grain bins will be sold.

Included will be three 2-ton International trucks with hydraulic dump bodies, 1 International 2 and a half-ton truck equipped with a 10-ton boom and power winch, 1 Chevrolet 2-ton boom truck with power winch, 2 three-quarter ton late model pickups, and a John Deere 40 tractor.

Smaller items include an implement trailer, welder, air compressor, paint sprayer, impact wrenches, hand tools, and many more articles all in good condition.

This sale will be held at the St. Johns binsite located in the northeast city limits of St. Johns, on East Steel Street, Clinton County, Michigan. Details of the

sale may be obtained by contacting the Clinton County ASCS Office, 100 South Ottawa Street, St. Johns, phone 517-224-3720, or by contacting the nearest county ASCS office.

Only producers (farmers) will be eligible to purchase bins. Each purchaser of a bin will be required to certify that the bin will be used in connection with the storage or handling of agricultural commodities.

Except for the bin requirement, all the equipment is for sale to any person wishing to bid at the auction. The terms are cash on the day of sale except that bins may be financed under the Farm Storage Facility Loan Program.

Using insects to control insects

Biological control of a pest is using one living thing to eliminate or control another. If you have mice problems getting a cat to control them is biological control.

Using a parasite insect to control another insect is an area where biological control shows great promise. A parasitic wasp is used to control the cereal leaf beetle and it has worked very effectively. In using biological control, you don't eliminate the insect you dislike, but control him so he does minimal damage. If the undesirable insect was eliminated from the area so would the parasite (the biological control). Perhaps at a later time the undesirable insect would return to the area and there would be no parasites to control it.

Using biological control with harmful insects means there will still be some around but not enough to cause much damage.

There are two insects we are using parasites to control in Clinton County, the cereal leaf beetle and the alfalfa weevil.

The cereal leaf beetle parasite nurseries were started in 1971 and have been successful. Cereal leaf beetle population has been much

reduced since the nurseries were established. There are six cereal leaf beetle nurseries spread throughout the county now.

The parasite program for the alfalfa weevil has just begun. Two nurseries were established last year with five more started this year.

Within two years the parasites of the alfalfa weevil should be having an impact on controlling alfalfa weevils.

There are 25,000 more acres of hay than oats in Clinton County so the impact of the alfalfa weevil parasite will not be felt as dramatically as the cereal leaf beetle parasite.

From both an economic and environmental standpoint, using biological control methods on these two insect pests is a far better way to do it than using sprays.

We are releasing parasites as rapidly as they reproduce at the parasite nurseries at the MSU Kellogg Farm near Kalamazoo.

I think using parasites to control the alfalfa weevil shows great promise, but it will take a year or more of increasing the parasite numbers to make an impact on controlling the alfalfa weevil.

4-H Chatter Challenge

"CHALLENGE" is a new 4-H project being tried in three counties (Clinton, Allegan & Marquette) on a pilot basis. This new program offers youth and adults in these counties an opportunity to experience outdoor adventures like staying in the woods overnight, explore caves, rappelling or climbing a cliff, live off the land for several days, hike 25-30 miles in a day and other wilderness adventure activities.

The volunteer leader and teen leader after being trained will work with young people who are interested in high adventure and stress oriented wilderness activities.

So far the leaders have received training in completing the obstacle course, some basic survival considerations, rappelling and climbing the ledges and water survival. The next 3 training sessions will be on first aid June 13, 16, & 20 at Smith Hall in St. Johns starting at 7:30 pm. Another session on rappelling the ledges will be scheduled for June 25 at Grand Ledge and a weekend survival campout on July 19-21 is being planned.

Presently five Clinton County clubs are offering this new 4-H project called challenge: 4-H Wonders, Fowler Busy Bees, Bengal Community, Wilderness Challenge and a new club unnamed yet under the leadership of Gary Larsen in St. Johns.

Last Thursday evening the Challenge leaders and teen leaders were given water survival training. Members given an opportunity to try out different clothing that could be used for floatation. Jim Martindale from the State Department of Natural Resources gave the training. Also the group was trained in what happens when a canoe upsets and how to get in while the canoe is still submerged.

This past weekend proved to be a wet one for the members of the 4-H Wonders taking the challenge project. The group was to camp out in the Sleeping Hollow Park. Although they got soaked they stayed the night and are looking forward to another weekend of camping out.

Ballenger battles for 4 reforms

LANSING -- State Senator William S. Ballenger (R-Ingom County) said last week he is preparing language to be used on initiative petitions to enact strict new state laws on campaign finance reform, lobbying disclosure, open meetings, and conflict of interest.

"With only 3 weeks remaining in the regular session of the 1974 Michigan Legislature, it's become obvious that the Legislature is never going to achieve final success on these 4 explosive issues," said Ballenger. "Even if a campaign finance reform bill and possibly an open meetings measure make it to the Governor's desk, it is questionable whether either or both will be acceptable reforms."

Ballenger said that the need for a tough conflict of interest or public disclosure statute is more imperative than ever in light of recent exposure of a state legislator who has been lobbying in behalf of an industry

in which he held a substantial interest.

"Moreover, a lobbying disclosure bill has never gotten off dead center. It is probable none will ever be reported out of committee this year, much less pass. We've got to stop kidding ourselves," said Ballenger.

"Accordingly, I have instructed my staff and the Legislative Service Bureau to begin immediately to prepare language to be used on petitions

to bring these issues to a vote of the people. We'll need more than 212 thousand signatures, but even if we don't get on the ballot until 1975 or 1976, we will make it and we will get an overwhelmingly favorable vote, just as in the states of Washington, and California."

Ballenger said he hoped Common Cause, Governor Milliken, and other interested legislators would join him in a unified effort to achieve reform by way of a vote of the people.

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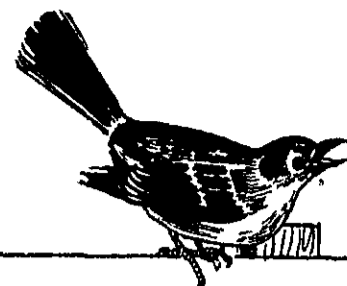

Sections 2(g)
(g) Setback: No mobile home shall be located closer than Fifteen (15) feet to any private street or roadway nor shall be located closer than (20) feet to any public right-of-way, or closer than twenty (20) feet to any park boundary line abutting to property zoned single family residence nor closer than five (5) feet to any common sidewalk.

Section 2 (U)
(u) Storm Shelter: The requirement that a storm or tornado shelter be required is hereby eliminated.

Section 2 (w)
(w) Occupancy: No permit for occupying any completed mobile dwelling unit site shall be granted until all basic elements such as utilities, parking, access drives, walkways; and all appurtenances such as landscaping, recreation areas, and swimming pools indicated on the approved plan have been inspected and approved or a performance bond equal to the estimated cost of these items has been posted. Further, no mobile dwelling unit shall occupy any site until at least twenty (20) percent of the sites are prepared and approved for use.

In all other respects, except as amended by this Ordinance, Ordinance No. 44, passed by the Village Council of Maple Rapids, Michigan, on January 2nd, 1974 shall remain in full force and effective.

All ordinances, resolutions or orders, or parts thereof, in conflict with the provisions of this ordinance, to the extent of such conflict, are hereby repealed.

This ordinance shall be published once, in full, in the Clinton County News, a newspaper of general circulation within the boundaries of the Village and qualified under State law to publish legal notices, with one (1) week after its adoption, and the same shall be recorded in the Ordinance Book of the Village President and Village Clerk.

This ordinance shall become effective twenty (20) days after its adoption.

The following preamble and ordinance was offered by Councilman Wright supported by Councilman Floate.

WHEREAS, it is deemed necessary to the public interest that Ordinance No. 44 of the Village of Maple Rapids passed on the 2nd day of January, 1974 be amended in certain aspects, the following Ordinance amending Ordinance No. 44, which shall be numbered Ordinance No. 46 is hereby offered.

ORDINANCE NO. 46
An Ordinance to Amend Ordinance No. 44 passed by the Village Council of the Village of Maple Rapids on January 2nd, 1974 which Ordinance is an ordinance to amend Ordinance No. 28 the Zoning Ordinance of the Village of Maple Rapids.

The said Ordinance No. 44 is hereby amended to read as follows:
Section 2 (Page 4)

In all mobile home parks where less than one hundred (100) sites are planned, Twenty (20) percent of all sites shall be prepared and approved for use prior to human occupancy of any sites. In all mobile home parks where more than one hundred (100) sites are planned, at least Twenty (20) percent of all the planned sites shall be prepared and approved for use prior to human occupancy of any site.

Section 2 (a)
(a) MINIMUM AND MAXIMUM PARK SIZE: A Five (5) acre site accessible to a major thoroughfare with Village sewer and water facilities shall be required as the minimum park size. There shall be no maximum limit on the number of sites in a mobile home park except that all lots in the park shall be in accordance with Site Yard Dimensions, Space Requirements, Setback, and other applicable mobile home park facility requirements of Ordinance No. 44.

Section 2 (d)
(d) Site Screening: The exterior, boundaries of the mobile home park site shall be planted with trees and shrubs so that the outer boundaries of the park present an attractive appearance. The plans and specifications for the mobile home park development shall include the proposed arrangements of such plantings which shall be subject to the approval of the Village Council.

Section 2 (f)
(f) Space Requirements: The minimum unit area of premises used or occupied by each mobile home shall be Five Thousand (5000) square feet, clearly defined on the ground by stakes, posts or other markers.
