ST JOHNS -- Seven cents spelled success Saturday at Twin Oaks Golf Course as the Memorial Cancer Golf Day brought \$1000 to meet the goal of \$1000 previously announced.

The Golf Day is sponsored by Gaylord and Gerry Crowell, owners of Twin Oaks, in memory of their daughter, Penny, who died from cancer at the age of 20.

Ed Daley of DeWitt turned in the best score of the day with a 37. Tim Travis, Greg George and Paul Sternburgh all shot 38's. They received golf hats for their top finishes.

Money prizes were awarded for scramble games for the longest drive and longest putt. "Cancer volunteers of the day" were Bob Fenby, assisted by Lloyd Welch.

Ditmer to run for County Board

ST JOHNS -- Robert D. Ditmer, 1008 Hampshire Drive, St Johns will be a candidate for the office of 5th District Clinton County Commissioner.

A Republican, Ditmer is president of Ditmer Broadcasting Company and general manager of radio stations, WRBJ-AM and WRBJ Stereo FM, St Johns.

He was elected to the Board of Commissioners in 1970 and served a 2-year term which ended December, 1972.

During this period he served on several committees and was chairman of the property management committee.

He did not seek reelection to the commission in 1972.

The 5th Dist includes the east half of the City of St Johns, taking in voting precincts 1, 4 and 5.

Ditmer said he decided to be a candidate for the board again, after being urged to do so by many friends and voters of the 5th dist.

He said he views himself as a reasonable and realistic candidate, as well as committed to representing the people, being a sounding board for complaints, and being a

person the people can come to with their problems, where the county government is concerned.

Ditmer and his wife, Beverly have four children, Renaë 16, Robert, 15, and twin daughters Judith and Jeanette, 10.

Bath Twp makes sewer priorities

BATH TWP -- Bath trustees voted Monday to set up a priority system for sewer additions once presently planned projects are completed.

The move came in response to a proposal by township resident Jack Swenson. He offered to donate a pumping station site on his property at Sleight and Tiffin if a 1000-foot gravity main extension is made to service his home and 3 others in the area.

Township engineers estimated the line would cost about \$20,000.

Treasurer Thomas Woodruff pointed out a presently planned forced main would go right past the Swenson property and added the gravity main would be a logical extension.

Most board members agreed that they put the project second on a priority list instead of first as Swenson requested.

First place went to Doris Root of 15609 Outer Drive (Whoopee Lane) who complained at the May 20 meeting that she needed a sewer hook-up although the line now stops a few lots short of her property.

Trustee Richard Bragdon voted against the priority system.

He explained he was afraid the list would grow and eventually edge out previously considered extensions, such as a 2300-foot one on Clark Rd.

"I like the idea of a priority system,"

Bragdon said, "but I think we should consider our other plans first."

Supervisor Roy VanSickle emphasized any sewer additions are contingent on how much money is left over.

"But, I think there will be enough for the extensions," he added.

The board also agreed to pay DeWitt Twp \$67,128 for expansion of sewer pipes to facilitate Bath's hook-up with the sewage treatment plant in DeWitt Twp.

The 2 units have been negotiating the payment terms for several weeks. Bath offered in 1972 to pay interest at the maximum rate DeWitt received on its bonds -- but had second thoughts when that figure turned out to be about 10%.

Woodruff said the negotiated interest figure averaged to about 7%.

The money will be transferred to DeWitt from bond funds Bath paid to the Clinton County Dept of Public Works.

Monday's meeting was the last one for VanSickle, who announced his June 30 resignation 2 weeks ago. He becomes city assessor in Petoskey effective July 1.

The rest of the board agreed to take up the matter of appointing an interim supervisor (to serve until the November elections) at their July 1 meeting.

DeWitt will draft City Council candidates

DEWITT -- The draft may be a thing of the past, but not as far as the DeWitt City Council is concerned.

According to the city charter, there must be 2 candidates for every City Council position up for election.

Well, there aren't following the Tuesday filing deadline and the charter says the Council must now draft candidates to make a contest out of it.

Only 1 of the officials, Councilman Gary Gillespie is not up for re-election.

Mayor Muri Eastman has filed to run for re-election and is opposed by Councilman William Drouin, leaving his council position also up for re-election.

Not filing to run for re-election are J. Dale Bohm, Paul Mulford, Frederick (Bill) Shaver and Arthur Newman.

Six people, in addition to Eastman and Drouin, have filed to run.

Filing to run for 2-year Council positions are Frank Deak, Lonnie Costello and Gerald Kirchen. Filing for 4-year terms are Charles Bauer, Hazel Myers and Jim Boyd.

Emergency ordinance grounds "copter"

DEWITT -- An emergency ordinance by the DeWitt City Council has grounded helicopter activity by a Lake Geneva resident whose chopper blades stirred the ire of his neighbors.

Burton Parsons, Lake Geneva resident and Lansing businessman had been taking off and landing in his helicopter at his home, an action his neighbors contend was both dangerous and a nuisance.

The City Council apparently agreed and passed an ordinance Monday night

ST JOHNS -- Two incumbent Clinton County Commissioners face opposition by Republican opponents in the August Primary and all commissioners face opposition by Democrats in November following the filing deadline Tuesday afternoon.

All but 1 commissioner, filed to run for re-election. William Hufnagel declined to run for another term in Dist 2.

That district has a Republican contest in the August Primary with Walter Nobis and Roy Westendorff on the GOP ballot.

Patricia Silvermail is the lone Democrat on the Dist 2 Primary ballot and will face Nobis or Westendorff in November.

Dist 1

In Dist 1, Derrill Shinabery, incumbent and chairman of the board, is opposed in the Republican Primary by Charles Sills. Leroy Vincent is unopposed on the Democratic ticket.

Dist 5

Fifth Dist incumbent Don Gilson is op-

posed in the GOP Primary by Robert Dittmer, a former commissioner. Running unopposed in the Democratic Primary is Elaine Brockmyre.

Commissioners in 7 other districts face no Primary opposition, but will be faced by Democratic opponents, who are also unopposed in the Primary.

Dist 3

In Dist 3 Harold Martin (Rep), incumbent, will face Democratic challenger Walter Sevanski in November.

Dist 4

Republican incumbent in the 4th Dist, Marlice Gove will be challenged in the general election by Joe Humenik (Dem).

Dist 6

The November contest in Dist 6 will be between incumbent Republican Duane Chamberlain and Democrat Richard Devine.

Dist 7

Roger Overway, incumbent Republican in the 7th Dist, will be opposed in the general election by Ruth Townsend (Dem).

Dist 8

Dyle Henning (Rep), Dist 8 incumbent, will be running for re-election against Democratic opponent George Speidel.

Dist 9

Dist 9 Republican incumbent Alta Reed is challenged by Democrat Max Calder.

Dist 10

In the 10th Dist, Democrat Milton King will run against incumbent Virginia Zeeb (Rep).

Dist 11

Richard Hawks, Dist 11 Republican incumbent will run for re-election against Charles Gutzki (Dem). Hawks was recently appointed to the board to replace Gerald Shepard, who resigned to assume the position of assistant county treasurer.

District Judge

The District Court judge's post is also up for re-election in November with William Jackson, assistant county prosecutor challenging incumbent Frederick Lewis in the non-partisan election.

Judge Lewis was appointed to fill the vacancy created by the death of Judge Roland Duguay.

Other county elected officers are not up for election until the 1976 election.

Will fixed millage be on ballot?

ST JOHNS -- Two items that may eventually wind up on the ballot for voter approval were discussed Tuesday at the Clinton County Board of Commissioners' meeting.

One of the items, fixed millage, was discussed briefly by the board and will, most likely, receive more attention in the coming months.

Commr Dyle Henning said a fixed millage of 15.5 has been recommended that would include 8 mills for schools, 6 for the county, 1.30 for townships and .20 for the Intermediate School District.

Under a fixed millage system, the millage allocation would be set for a certain number of years, instead of being negotiated yearly at lengthy Tax Allocation Board sessions.

Another item that may find its way to the ballot is the question of whether or not to participate as a member of the Capitol City

Airport Authority.

Commrs Duane Chamberlain and Harold Martin both said they felt the issue should go to the voters.

Roger Overway said he felt the County Board should make up its own mind and was joined in that feeling by Virginia Zeeb and Donald Gilson.

However, County Clerk Ernest Carter advised the board the law requires the imposition of a tax if the county joins an airport authority and added he felt it would require the question to be put on a ballot.

No decision was reached on either matter and the board has until September to decide if they want the issues on the ballot in the November general election.

COURTHOUSE OPEN JULY 5

Commr Gilson expressed to the board that some courthouse employees had inquired about having Friday, July 5 off following the July 4 holiday.

In a word, "no."

An informal poll of the board was unanimous--the courthouse will be open July 5.

Denise Arnold candidate for Michigan House seat

LANSING -- Denise Arnold, 5320 Mall Court, Lansing (Delta Township), will be a candidate for the office of state representative from the 56 district. She was scheduled to file with the Secretary of State's Office Tuesday.

A Democrat, Ms Arnold is employed on the clerk's staff in the Michigan House of Representatives and as a children's supervisor at the Ingham County Shelter Home. She was graduated in 1970 from Bowling Green (Ohio) University with an education degree in journalism and speech. For three years she was employed by the Grand Ledge Schools as a substitute teacher. A former member of the Eaton County Democratic executive committee, she was a coeditor of its newsletter. She also served on the district executive committee. Elected a precinct delegate in 1972, she was chosen to chair the Eaton County Democratic Convention,

becoming the first woman to do so.

During August of 1972 she helped organize the Third District Women's Political Caucus and has served as its chairperson since. She also is a member of the Michigan and National Women's Political Caucuses.

The fifty-sixth district includes all of Eaton County except a small portion of Delta Township; Watertown and Eagle Townships in Clinton County; several townships in Ionia County, as well as the City of Portland.

Ms Arnold decided in 1971 to run for the office of state representative and has since spent approximately 40 hours each week studying the issues or in some way working in politics.

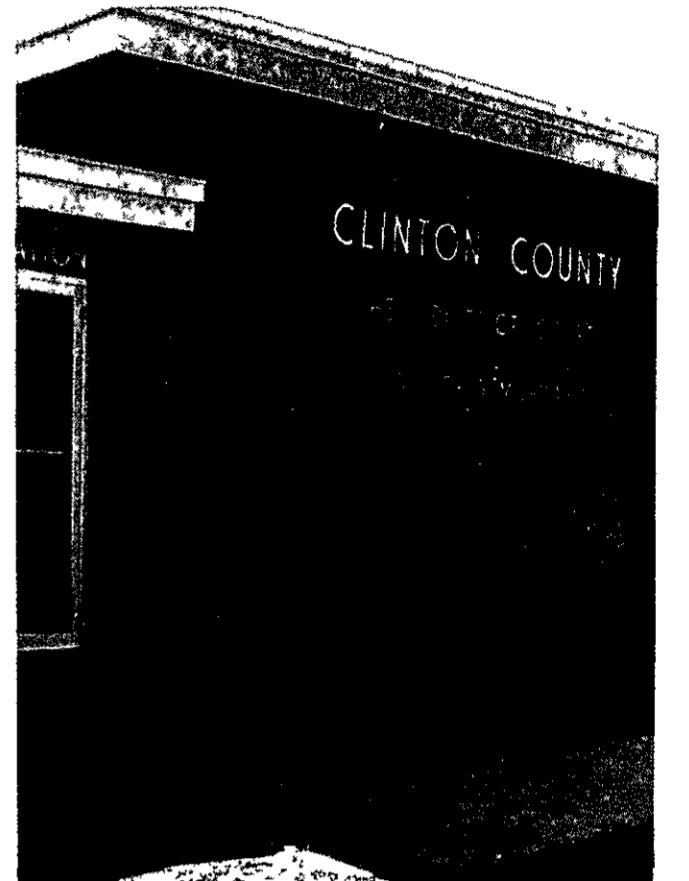
"Working at the Capitol everyday has provided me with insight into the legislature that few candidates have," said Ms Arnold.

She feels that lawmaking is only part of the job of a legislator.

"Representing the people, being a sounding board for complaints, and being a person the people can go to with their problems can be one of the most important functions of a representative," she said.

One of her priorities, when elected, would be to improve the communications between the district and the office, making government more accessible to the people.

"My background in communications will serve me well in increasing the feedback necessary to being an effective representative."

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Rotary hears about laser

ST. JOHNS -- A member of the General Telephone Company Speakers Bureau presented "The Laser in Your Future" program before the St. Johns Rotary Club June 18.

John Stupar, a training instructor on the state administrative staff of General Telephone at Norton Shores, near Muskegon, described the real and potential uses of the laser, a device which has been called the 20th century's most significant advance in the area of science and technology.

Telephone industry scientists are investigating possible uses for the laser light in fundamental telephone communications. Stupar's program will include a working laser unit.

Draft boards still classify 1-A's

Many young men are still being classified 1-A (available for service) following the annual lottery during the year of their 19th birthday, according to Mrs. Ethel M. Cassel, supervisor of the Lansing Selective Service office.

During their 20th year these young men are part of a national available pool of 100,000 who may be inducted in any national emergency declared by Congress. Most registrants in the 1974 lottery with sequence numbers 95 and below are subject to classification in 1-A. No men are currently being drafted.

All young men are required by law to register with Selective Service at age 18. Men can register at any draft office or with volunteer registrars in most high schools. Registrars in this area are: John Furry, St. Johns High School; E. Russell Pope, Ovid-Elsie High School; Robert Englander, Laingsburg High School; James Cotter, Pewamo-Westphalia High School; William Rushcamp, DeWitt; Donald Smith, Fowler.

Registration can be accomplished by mail also, with mailer cards available at most Post Offices and High Schools, or through any draft board.

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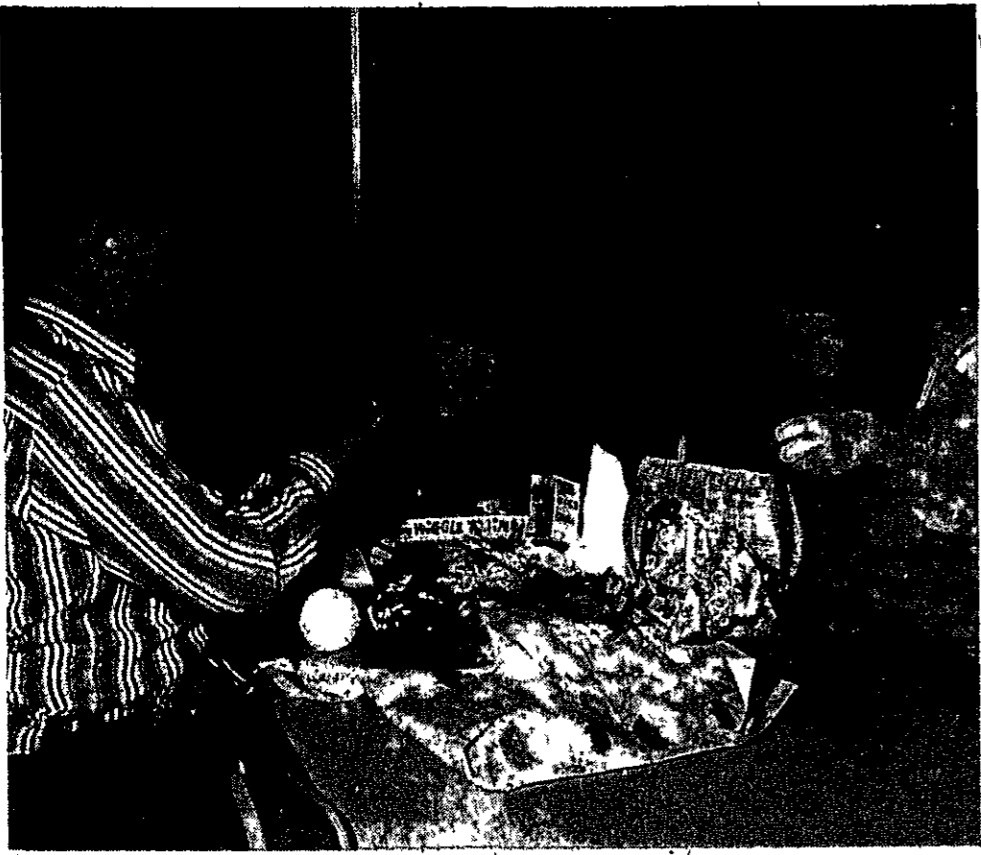
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Clinton Memorial equips to handle radio-active cases

ST JOHNS — Clinton Memorial Hospital is participating in a voluntary statewide program to equip themselves to handle emergencies involving radioactive materials.

According to Donald VanFardwe, chief of the Division of Radiological Health for the Michigan Department of Public Health, the program originated as part of the Site Emergency Plan for Nuclear Power Plants.

Hospitals most likely to receive radioactive accident victims due to their proximity to such plants were required to fully equip their emergency rooms with various materials, including a geiger counter to handle the situation.

"Although Clinton Memorial Hospital is not near a nuclear power plant", explained Mrs. Elvira Scrippler, RN director of nursing, "the hospital obtained the equipment due to its location near US 27, where radioactive materials are found in transport in increasing volume."

The procedure to handle accident victims who have been in direct contact with radioactive materials consists of:

1. Patient's clothing will be

placed in a large, covered metal container.

2. Patient will be monitored for radioactive contamination.

3. Contaminated areas will be rinsed thoroughly with water.

4. Patient is re-monitored for lingering contamination.

5. A follow-up examination is administered 24 hours later.

Mrs. Scrippler said that during this procedure the staff must wear protective aprons and gloves. Anything coming in contact with the victim during the examination must also be monitored and subsequently rinsed to eliminate further contamination.

Three young women were injured Saturday afternoon when their car went off the road and rolled over.

DeWitt Twp police reported Sandra Kay Fletcher, 18, of 201 Parkwest in Lansing lost control of the car. She was driving on a curve in Airport road. The accident occurred around 4 pm just north of Grand River Ave.

Fletcher was taken to St Lawrence hospital along with 2 passengers, Kim Janine Fowler 17, of 805 Birchwood in DeWitt and Alma K. Smith, 18, of 3452 Lehman Rd in DeWitt.

All 3 women were treated and released.

Medicare premium rates go up starting July 1

Monthly premiums on the medical insurance part of Medicare will go up starting July 1.

The basic premium rate will go from \$6.30 to \$6.70 a month, according to Roger W. Seamon, social security district manager in Lansing.

The medical insurance helps pay doctor bills and other medical expenses and is funded by individual premiums and Federal general revenues. The protection is offered automatically to people reaching 65 who are eligible for social security benefits - and to disabled people under 65 who have been entitled to social security disability benefits for 24 consecutive months or more.

"The Medicare law requires an annual review of the cost of the medical insurance program and adjustment of the monthly premium rate to cover the estimated medical expenses of Medicare patients," Seamon said.

The 40 cent increase in July is related to a rise in the cost of medical services and compares to a 50 cent increase in the medical insurance basic monthly premium rate in 1973, according to Seamon.

Medicare hospital insurance premiums will also be increased starting July 1. "The basic premium rates will go from \$33 to \$36 a month," Seamon said.

Hospital insurance protection is extended automatically, without premium charge, to people reaching 65 who are eligible for social security or railroad retirement benefits - and to disabled people under 65 who have been entitled to social security disability benefits for 24 consecutive months or more. "People 65 and over who aren't eligible for social security benefits can get Medicare hospital insurance by paying a monthly premium if they also sign up for the medical insurance," Seamon said.

The hospital insurance premium rate is based on the average monthly Medicare hospital insurance payment for patients who have the protection.

About 23 million people have one or both parts of Medicare. In 1973, the hospital insurance program paid \$7.1 billion in benefits and the medical insurance program paid \$2.5 billion.

Medicare is administered by the Social Security Administration, an agency of the US Department of health, Education & Welfare.

"People can get information about signing up for Medicare by calling, writing or visiting any social security office," Seamon said. The Lansing social security office is at 838 Louisa Street. The phone number is 372-1910.

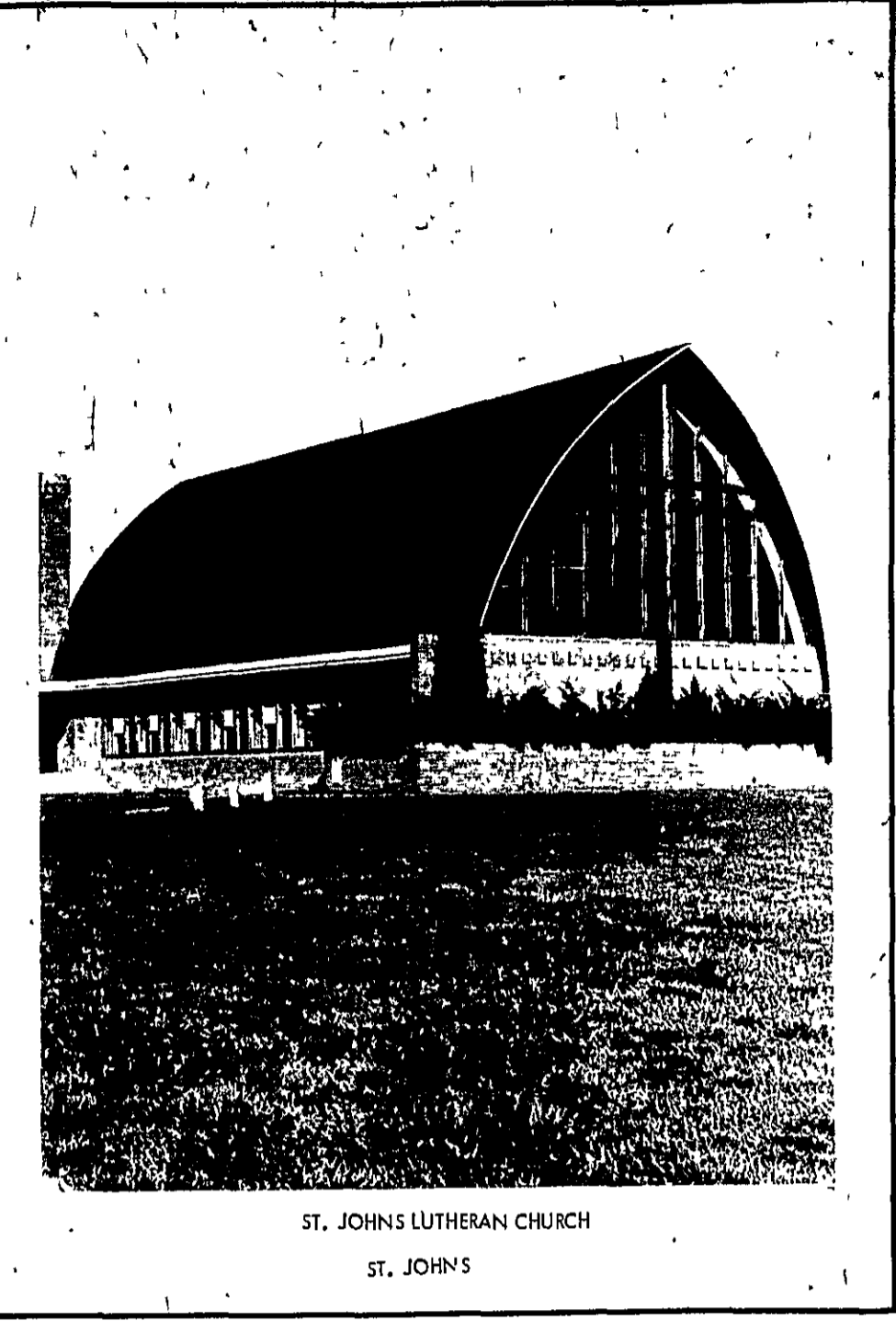

Bill designed to spell out "unprofessional yet practices"

LANSING - The Senate today unanimously concurred with House amendments to a bill sponsored by Senator William S. Ballenger (R-Ingham County) that is designed to raise state standards for veterinarians by spelling out "unprofessional veterinary practices" and giving the State Board of Veterinary Medicine more power over the profession.

The bill, which now goes to Governor William G. Milliken for his signature, also provides legal protection for veterinarians against owners animals who abandon them while in the veterinarian's care.

"The measure would also revise and clarify the Board of Veterinary Examiners' administrative and enforcement procedures and increase its efficiency and effectiveness," said Ballenger.

Under the bill, unprofessional conduct would include conviction of a felony, habitual intoxication, possession or use of drugs, legal insanity, failure to operate and maintain sanitary veterinary facilities, and fraudulent use of a meat inspection stamp.

"The bill also provides that penalties for practicing veterinary medicine without a license would be raised to a fine of at least \$500 and not more than \$1,000, a maximum of 90 days in jail for the first offense and a fine of from \$1,000 to \$2,000 and a jail term of up to six months for a second offense."

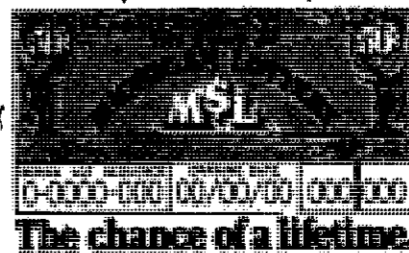

Crutches join the list of endangered species

LANSING - In this era of assorted shortages ranging from gas to toilet tissue, one never knows what the next item will be.

Well, here it is: crutches. Yes, that's right. The old, familiar wooden crutches distributed by the St. Lawrence Hospital Emergency and Physical Rehabilitation Departments, when you or a loved one injures an ankle playing company softball or breaks a bone from falling to conquer the big dirt pile near the new house being built.

Unlike other shortages with mysterious origins, the reason for this one - according to suppliers - can be traced to an oversale of plywood to Japanese manufacturers a year ago.

With the best wooden crutches being made from laminated wood, or plywood, the three major US companies which produce them have been hard-pressed to come up with the basic ingredient, and have had to periodically shut down their operations.

Added to the shortage is the had taste left in a hospital supply buyer's mouth when that person now has to pay a much higher price for a pair of crutches which haven't changed from the basic design first improved upon by civilized man.

"Two years ago, wooden crutches sold for \$3.41 a pair," laments purchasing services manager Chuck Moyer. "Now, they're up to \$4.71 a pair for wood - which we can't get - and \$8.09 a pair for aluminum ones, which we end up buying. That's a 237% increase.

Going one step further, aluminum crutches are also in short supply, as the demand has gobbled up the available wooden ones.

One proposed remedy to the shortage is to introduce "recycling" to the hospital central supply department.

By encouraging former patients to donate their used crutches back to St. Lawrence the hospital will then be able to maintain a back-up supply.

And although crutches are sold to new patients, donors will receive a certificate for the use of a loaned pair should they become patients again.

In addition, acquiring no longer-used crutches through recycling should lower the overall cost the patient or the insurance company pays when that unexpected accident happens.

A collection point has been set up at the main lobby information desk off West Saginaw Street.



The council also dealt with the problem of effective weed control in the city. Residents are advised that weeds must be cut or they may be cut by the city with the charge going to the property owner.

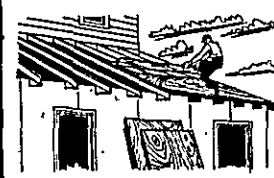

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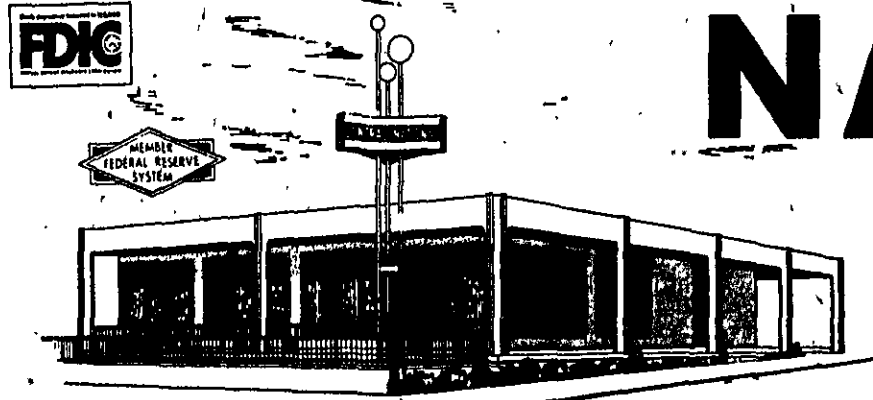

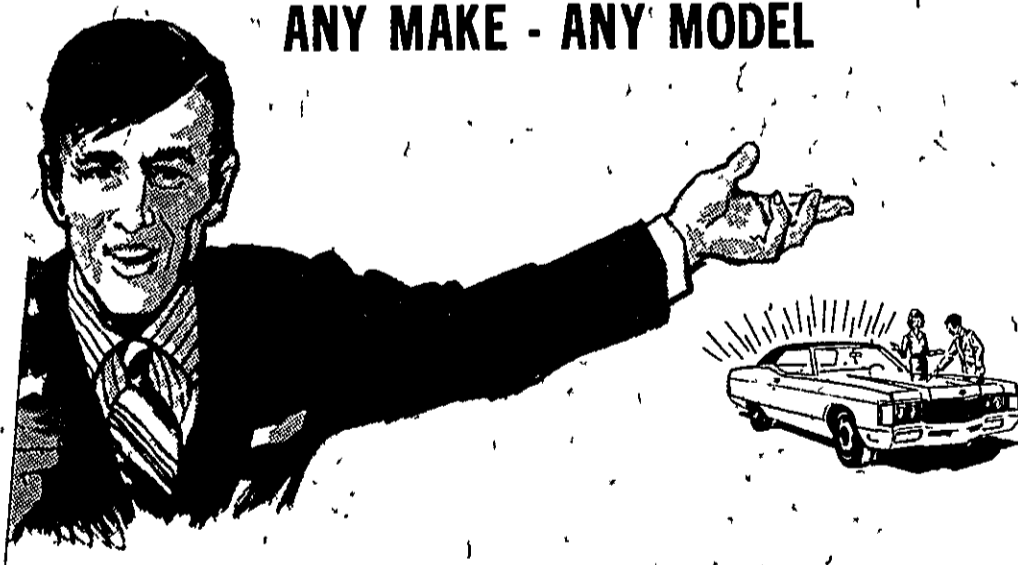


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July 1 deadline for wheat, feed grain program

EAST LANSING - Michigan farmers are urged to contact their local county ASOS office and enroll in the 1974 Wheat and Feed Grain Program, according to Dorn Diehl, state executive director of the Michigan State Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Office.

Producers with wheat or feed grain allotments are eligible to enroll. The deadline is July 1.

Diehl said participation in the 1974 Wheat and Feed Grain

Program qualifies a producer for government price support loans and deficiency payments if the average market price for wheat and feed grains falls below the target prices set in the new farm law.

Enrollment in the 1974 program also provides an insurance feature which assures some income protection for the farmer who, because of a natural disaster, may be prevented from planting his allotment acreage of a planted crop fall or produce

abnormally low yields at harvest.

Diehl said enrollment only requires signing of an application and report of acreages being grown. An acreage report is essential to protect farm allotments are subject to a 20% reduction if no crops are reported. No land has to be set aside or retired from crop production to qualify for program benefits.

There are no acreage restrictions in the 1974 program.

Jim's Column

Alfalfa weevil

Until about 6 years ago the alfalfa weevil was unheard of in Michigan. This year his bill for damages will exceed a million dollars.

The best hope we have for permanent eradication of weevils is through biological control.

To do this on a practical basis, weevils infested with a parasite which is sure to be deadly to them have been released in strategic locations all over Clinton County by your county agents. Within a couple of years we should see the effects of this control.

Meanwhile the weevil has an insatiable appetite for alfalfa leaves, which are by far the most valuable portion of the alfalfa plant.

One of our most effective steps to control is early harvest, but this was impossible this year with the late spring and resulting delay in planting other crops.

This year planting was in direct competition for farmers' limited time. Late harvested alfalfa is always lower in protein than earlier harvested forage and with the weevils stealing a part of most of the leaves; protein content will be lower yet.

Following harvest of first cutting farmers should immediately spray field with a mixture of malathion and methoxychlor, imidan, guthion or alfa-tox.

This is often omitted as little damage can be seen in second cutting alfalfa.

However, most of the damage is in the early stages of regrowth, and through inconspicuous, it delays regrowth and quite often kills or greatly weakens the alfalfa plant.

At harvest there is little evidence of leaf feeding, but the damage done earlier reduces yield.

Observe Farm Safety Week

CHICAGO - President Richard M. Nixon has proclaimed that July 25-31, 1974 shall be dedicated to the observance of National Farm Safety Week. This marks the 31st consecutive year in which this annual national safety activity co-sponsored by the National Safety Council (NSC) and the US Department of Agriculture (USDA) has been observed.

Farm Safety Week was initiated during World War II to attack accident losses that were impairing crucial agricultural production. Thus, the two-fold purpose of Farm Safety Week is to call attention to major accident problems that drain human and economic resources in agricultural production, and to suggest preventive measures which can be applied to reduce these losses.

Accidents claimed the lives of about 6,000 farm and ranch residents last year. Approximately half of these were victims of motor-vehicle mishaps. Another one-fourth were accounted for in accidental agricultural work deaths. About 500,000 farm residents suffered disabling injuries last year.

The cost of these accidents, including farm fires, totaled \$2.75 billion in 1973 - losses that farm and ranch people can ill-afford.

About one-fourth of all work-related injuries reported in a recent NSC ten-state farm accident survey were attributed to falls. Work falls often occur in the use of farm equipment - especially tractors, wagons, and combines. But not all falls are work-related. Many additional falls occur right around the house and yard - on ladders, down stairs, or 'slippery' surfaces, and over hidden obstacles.

Consequently, NSC and USDA are emphasizing prevention of farm falls in this year's observance to help reduce farm deaths and injuries. And agricultural communicators, farm and rural youth organizations, rural safety leaders, agri-business, extension, and other community leaders are being asked to cooperate in this year's effort to reduce farm falls.

You've probably heard the story about the husband who was flat broke because his wife "saved" him so much money on "bargains."

An old Swedish adage says it another way: "He who buys what he does not need steals from himself."

The point is the same: A bargain is only a bargain if you need the item.

The real danger of sales is letting yourself buy something you don't need, won't be able to use, or can't afford right now - just because it is marked down.

But if you watch for real bargain, you can save as much as 10 percent on groceries. And because you can usually wait longer for clothes and similar items, you can probably save 30 percent on clothing, 10 to 20 percent on appliances, and up to 50 percent on seasonal merchandise.

A wise shopper plans what she and her family need, looks some money in a savings fund and waits for honest-to-goodness bargains.

Here is a general guide for

sales. With careful shopping you may find the same items on sale at other times.

January - shoes, clothing, white goods - blankets, small appliances and sports equipment, storewide clearances, Christmas cards and decorations.

February - furniture, rugs, mattresses, china, glassware, housewares, curtains, women's coats, notions.

April - Women's dresses and hats, men's and boy's clothing.

May - white goods, television, soaps and cleaning aids, lingerie, handbags.

June - women's dresses, television, refrigerators, fabrics, rug cleaning, lumber, storm windows and screens.

July - shoes, clothing, hosiery, swim suits, refrigerators, washing machines, toiletries, floor coverings, summer furniture, garden supplies, used cars.

August - furniture, tires, coats and furs, curtains, garden and lawn equipment, paint hardware, cameras, camping equipment, white goods.

September - clothing, back-to-school specials, housewares, fabrics.

October - cars, coats, lingerie.

November - women's coats and dresses, blankets, fabrics.

December - After Dec 21: toys and gift items, women's and girls' coats and men's and boy's winter suits and coats.

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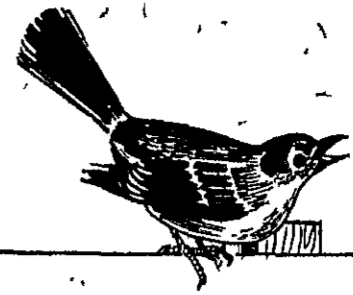

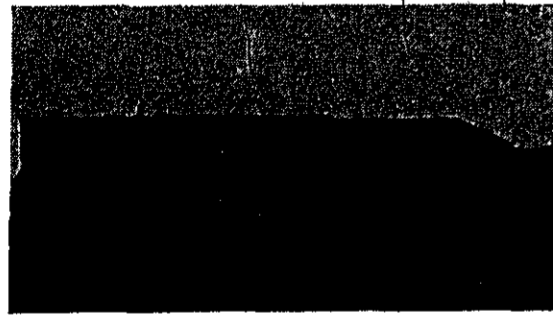

Clinton County Board of Commissioners proceedings

April 23, 1974

The Clinton County Board of Commissioners met Tuesday, April 23, 1974 at 9:00 a.m. Prayer was offered by Ernest Carter. A pledge of allegiance was given to the flag. Roll was called and quorum reported. Present were Derrill Shinabery, William Hufnagel, Harold Martin, Maurice Gove, Donald Gilson, Duane Chamberlain, Roger Overway, Dyle Henning, Alta Reed, Virginia Zeeb and Gerald Shepard. Also present were Betty Minsky, State Journal, Herbert Maier, T.C.R.P.C., and Linda Heyboer, Clinton County News.

Minutes of the April 9, 1974 meeting were presented. Corrections were made. Zeeb moved, supported by Shepard, to approve the minutes as corrected. Voted and carried.

Communications:
1. A resignation from Gerald Shepard as County Commissioner of District #11 was read. Mr. Shepard expressed his pleasure at having served as a member of this governing body for 18 years. He has accepted the position of Deputy County Treasurer effective May 1, 1974. Henning moved, supported by Gilson, to accept with regret Commissioner Shepard's resignation. Voted and carried.

Chairman Shinabery appointed Virginia Zeeb to replace Shepard as a member of the T.C.R.P.C.

He also appointed Harold Martin and Alta Reed to represent the County on the Consortium for the Aging.

He appointed Donald Gilson to represent the County on the Manpower Commission.

He will also ask M.A.C. to appoint Dyle Henning to replace Shepard as a member of M.A.C. Legislative Committee.

Martin moved, supported by Overway, to approve the appointments as made by Chairman Shinabery. Voted and carried.

2. A request by T.C.R.P.C. to adopt a resolution indicating intent to join with other General Purpose Units of local Government in the Tri-County Area to develop and implement a plan resulting in a Coordinated Waste Treatment Management System for the area. Discussion followed. Action was deferred.

The Board recessed at 9:50 a.m.

Upon resuming session, Leon Thelen, Equalization Director, and the following Township Supervisors were present: Walter Nobis - Lebanon, George Martin - Dallas, Russell Howe - Eagle, William Cox - Greenbush, Carol Bashore - Ovid, Norman Thelen - Riley, Herman Opender - Watertown, Bruce Wood - City of St. Johns, George Moore - Duplain, Harold Benson - Bingham, Dale Emerson - DeWitt, Roy VanSickle - Bath, and Robert Remus - Victor.

Chairman Shinabery called on Commissioner Henning who presented the County Equalization report for 1974.

Shepard moved, supported by Hufnagel, to take from the table the Equalization report. Voted and carried.

Commissioner Henning stated the Equalization Committee has reviewed and spot checked representative parcels in various assessing units. They feel the report represents and equitable apportionment. He called on Leon Thelen to further explain the report.

Overway moved, supported by Martin, to accept the Equalization Report as it pertains to real property. On a roll call vote those voting aye were: Shinabery, Hufnagel, Martin, Gilson, Chamberlain, Overway, Henning, Reed and Shepard. Those voting nay were: Zeeb. Absent - Gove. Nine (9) aye - one nay - one absent. Motion carried.

Duplain, Lebanon and DeWitt Townships do not favor a re-appraisal. Costs of the re-appraisal were discussed. The suggested participation of the Townships, being 15% of the total cost. Emerson of DeWitt Township objects to the Twp's paying any costs. Berison of Bingham Township also objects to the Twp's paying any of the cost.

Voted and carried.

Communications:
1. A resolution from Eaton County Board of Commissioners approving the Tri-County Consortium agreement was read and placed on file.

2. A notice from the Zoning Administrator that application for rezoning of property adjoining county owned property (Sewage Disposal Plant 18, DeWitt Twp.) was also read and placed on file.

3. A communication from Clinton County Democratic Party by Richard D. Warren, Chairman, in reply to Chairman Shinabery's request of April 25, 1974, submits the name of Garnett B. Case for appointment as County Commissioner of District No. 11. A resume of Mr. Case accompanied the letter.

Henning moved, supported by Gove, that Richard Hawks assume the appointments held by Gerald Shepard unless otherwise stipulated. Voted and carried.

The Board recessed at 9:55 a.m.

Upon resuming session, Linda Heyboer, Clinton County News, Jon Newman and Arnold Minarik were present. Also Dale Emerson, Donna Syverson and Bruce Angell and a number of interested persons from DeWitt Township (approx. 50 or more) to express their concern over a Rock Concert to be held at the Northside Drive-In Theatre.

Hawks moved, supported by Reed, that bills for the month of April in the amount of \$25,718.81 be paid as approved by the Audit Committee. Voted and carried.

Dale Emerson briefly outlined the Townships position. They are opposed to the holding of such an event. Eileen Carr also spoke in opposition to the Concert. Other persons speaking in opposition were Geraldine Munk, Marjorie Graham, Nancy Cheney, Mr. Fairbanks, Karen Williams, Ted Jamieson, Mrs. Dale Martin and Chuck Manning (Eberhard Stores).

Chairman Shinabery called on Prosecuting Attorney, Jon Newman to explain the legal aspects and the County's position on the matter. His opinion being the County cannot prohibit but can regulate the activities.

A majority of the people are fearful the concert cannot be controlled and that it will overflow onto surrounding areas and private property. Arnold Minarik explained the conditions and restrictions which County Zoning can impose.

Chairman Shinabery explained according to the best information available the county cannot prevent the holding of the concert but will make every reasonable attempt to control it.

Bruce Angell stated that he has been authorized to speak for Mr. Semery (Attorney for Northside Drive-In). He has been hired to provide police security for the event. Waste disposal, Doctors, Ambulance Service and Fire protection will be provided by the management.

Zeeb moved, supported by Reed, that the County instruct the Zoning Dept. to deny the permit and to use every available resource, County & Township, to prevent the holding of the concert and to protect the rights of the local people. On a roll call vote, those voting aye were: Martin, Gove, Reed, and Zeeb. Nay were: Shinabery, Hufnagel, Gilson, Chamberlain, Overway, Henning and Hawks. Four (4) aye - seven (7) nay. Motion declared lost.

The Chairman declared a recess at 12:00 noon.

PM. SESSION

On again coming to order, Paul & Janet Grattarola and Paul Thompson, Eng., were present. Dale Chapman, Chairman D.P.W., called on Ray Stauder, Bonding Consultant. He presented a proposed agreement with Management Resources Inc. to connect a Mobile Park to the Clinton County Sanitary Sewage Disposal System No. 4 (Bath Charter Twp.).

Bath Township Board have agreed to approve the agreement and it should now be approved by the D.P.W. and the Board of Commissioners. This represents an extension of an approved disposal system and requires approval by the Clinton County Board of Commissioners. Discussion followed. Dale Emerson feels the County does not at this time have the authority to approve the agreement.

The Chairman declared a recess at 2:45 p.m. Upon resuming session, Martin moved, supported by Hufnagel, to approve the following Resolution subject to approval by Bath Charter Township and Clinton County D.P.W. Voted and carried.

RESOLUTION

Be it resolved that the Clinton County Board of Commissioners accept the offer of Management Resources, Inc., as it relates to the construction of a force sewer main from the sewer being constructed and known as the Clinton County Sanitary Sewage Disposal System, No. 4 (Charter Township of Bath) to their properties in Section 34 and 35 of the Township as follows:

1. Management Resources, Inc., will pay to the Township one direct sewer tap fee in accordance with the charges in force at the time of connecting.

2. Management Resources, Inc., will at their expense, pay all costs of constructing the proposed force main extension under plans and specifications approved by the County Department of Public Works. The Township agrees where needed and possible, to assist in the acquisition of right-of-way at the developer's expense.

3. Management Resources, Inc., agrees to pay to the Township monthly, one debt service utility charge, for each mobile home unit hooked up to the system in the mobile home park in accordance with the charges then in effect.

4. Management Resources, Inc., further agrees to connect its mobile home park to a future gravity sewer, when, as and if constructed and pay an indirect tap fee for each mobile home connected to the system after the construction of the aforesaid gravity sewer or after December 31, 1975, whichever is later.

5. It is expressly understood by all parties that this agreement covers only the 48.22 acres presently approved for 300 (maximum) mobile homes and does not exempt Management Resources, Inc., from an obligation to pay sewer fees on other properties that it may in the future connect to the proposed sewer. The discussed property is described in a legal description attached hereto and made a part thereof.

Arnold Minarik presented proposed amendments to the Clinton County Zoning Ordinance. (Mobile Home Park Development). Item I, Sec 8.32, Subsection (4) (a) (1) Zeeb moved, supported by Gove, to adopt. Voted and carried.

Section 8.32
On major roads as designated by the Zoning Commission a permanent sign shall not be larger than 25 square feet in size. A temporary sign up to 100 square feet could be allowed during construction and initial fill-up period for a designated period of time approved by the Zoning Administrator not to exceed three (3) years.

Item II Section 8.33 (1) Martin moved, supported by Zeeb, to adopt Item II. Motion failed.

Item III Section 8.33 (2) Henning moved, supported by Zeeb, to adopt. Voted and carried.

Section 8.33 (2)
Park Location: The mobile home park shall be located so that all ingress and egress driveways or roadways within the park development are connected to a major paved thoroughfare, except for restricted emergency exits.

Item IV Section 8.33 (3) Henning moved, supported by Martin, to adopt. Voted and carried.

Section 8.33 (3)
Side Yard Dimensions: All Buildings and mobile homes within

the mobile home park site shall be no closer than fifty (50) feet from any public street line or residential district. Also, there shall be a setback of 50' on any side or rear property line of the mobile home park site. This setback may be reduced to minimum of twenty (20) feet if approval is given by the Zoning Commission and the area gained through reduction is put into open space. Such setback space shall be adequately landscaped.

Item V Overway moved, supported by Gilson, to adopt. Voted and carried.

Section 8.33 (4)
Site Screening: The mobile home park shall be screened from adjacent residential districts by the use of obscuring fencing, walls, earth forms, plantings, or any combination thereof. All structural screening shall be at least 4 feet but not more than 6 feet in height. The plans and specifications for the mobile home park development shall include the proposed, arrangement of such plantings and screening structures and shall be subject to the approval of the Zoning Commission.

Item VI Section 8.33 (6) Martin moved, supported by Overway to adopt. Voted and carried.

Section 8.33 (6)
Space Requirements: The minimum lot area used or occupied by each mobile home shall be four thousand five hundred (4,500) square feet, exclusive of park drives, parking area, service facilities, and required recreation area.

Item VIII Section 8.33 (7) Reed moved, supported by Overway, to adopt. Voted and carried.

Section 8.33 (7)
Yard Requirements: The sum of the side yard at the entry side and nonentry side of a mobile home shall be not less than thirty (30) feet. Provided, however, there shall be a side yard of not less than fifteen (15) feet at the entry side of the mobile home and of not less than five (5) feet at the non-entry side of the mobile home. For irregularly shaped side yards the sum is determined as the sum of the average width of each side yard, provided that a minimum separation of twenty (20) feet is maintained between all mobile homes. There shall be a minimum of ten (10) feet between the end of the mobile home and the rear lot lines.

Item VIII Section 8.33 (8) Reed moved, supported by Martin, to adopt. Voted and carried.

Section 8.33 (8)
Setback: No mobile home shall be located closer than fifteen (15) feet to any private street or roadway nor shall it be located closer than fifty (50) feet to any public right-of-way, nor closer than five (5) feet to any common sidewalk.

Item IX Section 8.33 (9) Hufnagel moved, supported by Zeeb, to adopt. Voted and carried.

Section 8.33 (9)
Park Roads: Each mobile home shall have access to a park driveway, roadway, or street which shall be paved to a minimum width of 22 feet, and have a cross section as approved by the County Road Commission, provided that no parking shall be permitted on said roadway. No park shall provide or have direct access through any recorded single family subdivision. The required paving width for said streets, roadways, or driveways may be adjusted if a one-way street pattern is proposed as part of the proposed site development. Said one-way streets shall be paved to a minimum width of twenty (20) feet and no parking shall be permitted on said roadway.

Item X Section 8.33(10) Zeeb moved, supported by Martin, to adopt. Voted and carried.

Section 8.33 (10)
Walks and Curbs: A 36" wide concrete walk shall be provided on both sides of all collector roads. Curbing shall also be provided and may be in the form of a one-piece curb, gutter and sidewalk installation where applicable.

Item XI Section 8.33 (11) (a) Overway moved, supported by Martin, to adopt. Voted and carried.

Section 8.33 (11) (a)
Each mobile home site shall be provided with a minimum stand consisting of a solid concrete apron 10 feet wide by 50 feet long. The concrete apron shall be constructed of reinforced concrete to a depth of 4 inches, and shall be at least equal in area and dimension of the mobile home occupying the site. In lieu of the above, concrete piers to a depth of forty two (42) inches may be provided as follows: For single units, fourteen (14) piers. For double units, twenty-eight (28) piers. The area beneath the mobile home shall be graded in such a fashion as to eliminate the accumulation of water under the homes.

Item XII Section 8.33 (11) (b) Overway moved, supported by Martin, to adopt. Voted and carried.

Section 8.33 (11) (b)
An outdoor patio area of not less than 120 feet shall be provided each mobile home site, conveniently located to the entrance of the mobile home and appropriately related to open areas of the lot and other facilities.

Item XIII Section 8.33 (11) (d) Martin moved, supported by Reed, to adopt. Voted and carried.

Section 8.33 (11) (d)
Skirting shall be required and should be uniform throughout the park and adequately ventilated.

Item XIV Section 8.33 (11) (e) Henning moved, supported by Reed, to adopt. Voted and carried.

The down facilities shall be incorporated into the concrete apron or piers so that guy line shall be installed under the mobile home at sufficient intervals to prevent upheaval of mobile homes during severe winds and storms.

Item XV Section 8.33 (12) Zeeb moved, supported by Gove, to adopt. Voted and carried.

Section 8.33 (12)
Building Heights: No buildings or structure shall exceed 15 feet in height, except that the one permanent building for conducting the business operation and one permanent building for recreation may exceed said height, but said buildings shall not exceed two stories. On central T.V. Tower to service the mobile home park may also exceed this height restriction.

Item XVI Section 8.33 (13) Martin moved, supported by Gilson, to adopt. Voted and carried.

Section 8.33 (13)
Lighting: No permanent spot or flood lights shall be used for lighting or advertising purpose except during the construction and fill-up period for a designated period of time approved by the Zoning Administrator not to exceed three (3) years. No other lighting for identification or advertising purposes shall have a visible source of illumination. No lighting shall shine on adjacent properties. All other lighting shall be in accordance with Act 243, Public Acts of 1959, as amended.

Item XVII Gove moved, supported by Martin, to not approve Items 17 & 19. (Send back to Zoning for clarification.) Voted and carried.

Item XVIII Section 8.33 (14) Henning moved, supported by Reed, to adopt. Voted and carried.

Section 8.33 (14)
Utility Cabinets: (a) Each mobile home park shall permit one enclosed waterproof structure suitable for storage of goods and usual effects of the inhabitants of such park, not to exceed eighty (80) square feet of storage space and not to exceed the height of the mobile home at each mobile home site, or shall provide other adequate structure or structures for such storage elsewhere in said park.

Item XX Section 8.33 (24) Martin moved, supported by Overway, to concur with Zoning Commission and eliminate in its entirety. Voted and motion failed.

Item XXI Section 8.33 (25) Reed moved, supported by Martin, to adopt. Voted and carried.

Section 8.33 (25)
Mobile home sales: General Sales of mobile homes as a dealership or franchise, new or used, shall be prohibited within mobile home parks, except during initial fill-up period for a designated period of time approved by the Zoning Administrator not to exceed three (3) years.

Item XXII Section 8.33 (26) Henning moved, supported by Zeeb, to adopt. Voted and carried.

Section 8.33 (26)
Occupancy: No permit for occupying any completed mobile dwelling unit shall be granted until all utilities, parking, access drives, walkways, and all appurtenances such as landscaping, recreation areas, and swimming pools indicated on the Approval plan have been inspected and approved or a performance bond equal to the estimated cost of these items has been posted, with the Zoning Administrator. No mobile home dwelling unit shall occupy any site until at least 25% of the sites are prepared and approved for use.

Item XXIII Section 8.33 (27) Gilson moved, supported by Zeeb, to adopt. Voted and carried.

Section 8.33 (27)
Off-Street Parking Facilities: Off-Street parking shall be provided within 300 feet of all mobile home lots or sites that they are intended to serve and may be of a bay type design and each lot or site shall have parking space for 2 vehicles. All parking areas shall be of paved material. No parking shall be permitted on any street or access way. No visitor vehicles shall be permitted to be parked or stored within any required open space between mobile homes or on any drive or street within the mobile home park, between the hours of 12:00 p.m. and 6 a.m. All paved surfaces shall be maintained in good repair by the park management.

Item XXIV Section 8.33 Planned Mobile Home Unit Developments: (2) Martin moved, supported by Gilson, to adopt. Voted and carried.

Section 8.35
A ten percent (10%) reduction in the side and rear yard requirement is allowed provided however, that the 20 feet home-to-home separation is maintained. The front yard setback shall remain uniform throughout the development.

Overway wishes it to be made a matter of record that he and the entire Board of Commissioners are opposed to the holding of a "Rock Concert" scheduled for May 18, 1974 in DeWitt Township. Discussion of the "Rock Concert" continued.

Reed moved, supported by Gove, to adopt the following resolution and to send copies to our Legislators. Voted and carried.

RESOLUTION

Noise "pollution" must end says Parks chief

LANSING -- Small, portable
hifi equipment, radios and
stereo tape decks may make it
easy to have music "wherever
you go," but they make it dif-
ficult for campers who expect
peace and quiet in Michigan's
state parks and recreation
areas.
"Our intention is to enforce
present rules vigorously when it
comes to disturbances in our
parks," says O.J. Scherschligt,
parks division chief for the
Michigan Department of
Natural Resources.
"Young people and others
who operate loud, noise-

producing equipment in state
parks should be aware they can
be arrested or ejected from the
area if they are violating Rule 1,
Section 5 in parks and
recreation areas," Scherschligt
said.
Rule #1, Section 5, states it is
unlawful "to use a loudspeaker,
public address system or sound
amplifying equipment of any
kind without written per-
mission. Permission will not be
granted if such system is
capable of interfering with the
use and enjoyment of the park
by others. No person may
operate any motor, motorboat,

motor vehicle, radio, television
or any device in such a manner
that it produces excessive
noise."
Any campers who are
disturbed should report the
incident to the park ranger
immediately, giving a
description of the violator and
the equipment being used.
"If other campers are being
disturbed, we are empowered to
arrest the person operating the
offensive equipment," explains
Scherschligt. "We would prefer
it if all campers took one
another into consideration while
they enjoy our parks."
