Mrs. Foo recently graduated from Michigan State University with a degree in social work. Mrs. Ray Peck conducted the business meeting. Plans were made to help with the bake sale to be held at the 4th of July Celebration in Bannister. Also the women volunteered to make cookies for the Bible School to be held in July. 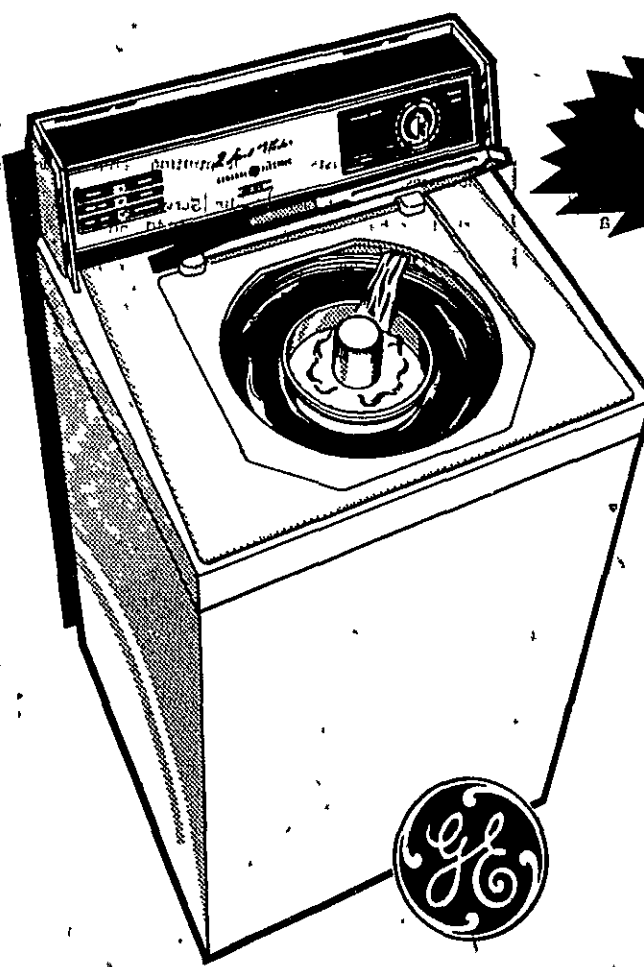

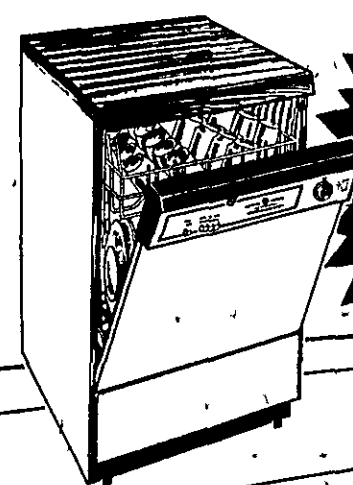

The Bakers live at 2798 Michael Drive, Corunna.

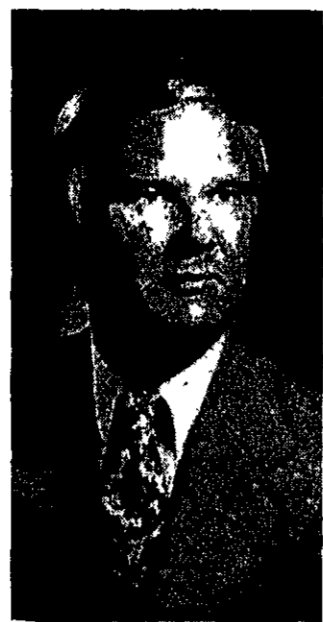

Members of Eagle Township Board met with Watertown Board to discuss adopting an Outdoor Ordinance in the very near future to curb rock concerts and other outdoor activities that might be to the dislike of the citizens. TO THE ELECTRIC CUSTOMERS OF CONSUMERS POWER COMPANY:

NOTICE OF ELECTRIC RATE HEARING and NOTICE OF HEARING ON MOTION FOR PARTIAL AND IMMEDIATE RATE RELIEF and NOTICE OF HEARING ON DEFERRED TAX ACCOUNTING FOR INDIRECT CONSTRUCTION COSTS FOR ACCOUNTING AND RATEMAKING PURPOSES

On May 28, 1975 Consumers Power Company filed an Application with supporting testimony and exhibits with the Michigan Public Service Commission in Case No. U-4840, which requests authority to amend its retail electric rates so as to increase its retail electric revenues by at least \$118 million on an annual basis. At the same time, Consumers Power Company filed a Motion for Partial and Immediate Rate Relief which seeks authority, on an interim basis pending final Commission action, to amend its retail electric rates so as to increase its retail electric revenues by approximately \$73.5 million on an annual basis. In addition, as part of the relief requested in this proceeding, Consumers Power Company has requested that the Commission promptly authorize it to utilize deferred tax accounting for indirect construction costs for accounting and ratemaking purposes.

The Michigan Public Service Commission has scheduled hearings in Case No. U-4840 and notice is given that:

- A. The initial hearing in this case shall be held at 9:30 AM on July 11, 1975 in the offices of the Commission, Law Building, Lansing, Michigan 48913, which hearing shall be in the nature of a prehearing conference and shall be held for the purpose of exploring and, if possible, agreeing upon matters which will expedite this proceeding, including, but not limited to, the following:
 - Determining the parties to the proceeding, the nature of their appearances and positions they are taking in the proceeding, as well as the facts they intend to controvert or give evidence of, all in accordance with the provisions of Rule 11 of the Rules of Practice and Procedure Before the Commission.
 - Simplifying and defining the issues in this proceeding.
 - Obtaining admissions to, and stipulations of, facts not remaining in dispute, the authenticity of documents, and matters of public record.
 - Determining the number and identity of witnesses.
 - Specifying the schedule for the exchange of proposed exhibits and written testimony, and the reduction of oral testimony to written form.
 - Establishing procedures for the hearing.
 - Specifying a further schedule of dates of hearing.
 - Expediting any other matters which may aid in the orderly conduct of the hearing and the disposition of the proceeding.
 - B. Public hearings shall be held at 9:30 AM and 7:30 PM on July 22, 1975, in the Auditorium of the Law Building, 525 W. Ottawa Street, Lansing, Michigan, and 9:30 AM and 7:30 PM on July 24, 1975, in the Marine Room of the L. C. Walker Arena, 470 W. Western Avenue, Muskegon, Michigan, for the special purpose of taking statements and testimony of any interested persons.
 - C. Further public hearings for the purpose of introducing the previously filed evidence and any corrections thereinto to the record and commencing cross-examination of the Company's witnesses shall begin at 9:30 AM on August 18, 1975 in the offices of the Commission, Law Building, Lansing, Michigan 48913, and shall continue thereafter from day to day or on such adjourned dates as the presiding officer may set until the matter has been fully heard.
 - D. A public hearing will be held on the Company's Motion for Partial and Immediate Rate Relief at an appropriate time during this rate proceeding according to such schedule as may be set by the presiding officer during the course of this proceeding in accordance with Section 6a of 1939 PA 3, as amended MCLA 460.6a.
 - E. The Commission, on its own motion, will commence an investigation and hearing on July 11, 1975 into the existing electric rates, charges, revenue deficiencies or excesses, services, practices, procedures and operations of Consumers Power Company, and the investigation and hearing will not necessarily be confined to matters contained in Consumers Power Company's Application but will include all matters pertaining to the reasonableness and justice of its electric rates, charges, operations and practices as may be necessary to enable the Commission to determine whether the existing or proposed rates and charges are unreasonable and excessive or inadequate and should therefore be reduced or altered.
 - F. Any person seeking to intervene in accordance with Rule 11 of the Rules of Practice and Procedure Before the Commission, shall file with the Commission on or before July 7, 1975, an original and 12 copies of a petition to intervene, together with proof of service upon Consumers Power Company, General Attorney, 212 West Michigan Avenue, Jackson, Michigan 49201.
- Subparagraph (2) of said Rule 11 provides as follows:
- "(2) A petition to intervene shall set out clearly and concisely the facts supporting the petitioner's alleged right or interest, the grounds of the proposed intervention, and the position of the petitioner in the proceeding, so as fully and completely to advise the parties and the Commission of the specific issues of fact or law to be raised or controverted."
- The Commission will require strict compliance with the above quoted rule.
- G. Consumers Power Company shall, on or before July 11, 1975, serve upon each person seeking to intervene a copy of the written direct testimony of its proposed witnesses and the proposed exhibits as filed with the Commission. Proof of service shall be filed with the Commission on or before August 18, 1975.

H. THE INCREASES DESCRIBED IN THIS NOTICE HAVE BEEN REQUESTED BY CONSUMERS POWER COMPANY, THE MICHIGAN PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION MAY EITHER GRANT OR DENY THE REQUESTED INCREASE, IN WHOLE OR IN PART, AND MAY GRANT A LESSER OR GREATER INCREASE THAN THAT REQUESTED, AND MAY AUTHORIZE A LESSER OR GREATER RATE FOR ANY CLASS OR CLASSES OF SERVICE THAN THAT REQUESTED.

Jurisdiction of the Commission in this matter is pursuant to Sections 1, 2, 6, 7 and 8 of 1909 PA 106, as amended, MCLA 460.551 et seq; 1909 PA 300, as amended, MCLA 462.2 et seq; Sections 3 and 4 of 1919 PA 419, as amended, MCLA 460.51 et seq; Sections 4, 5 and 6 of 1939 PA 3, as amended, MCLA 460.1 et seq; Chapter 4 of 1969 PA 306, as amended, MCLA 24.201 et seq; and the Rules of Practice and Procedure Before the Commission, 1954 Administrative Code, Supplement No. 54, R 460.11 et seq.

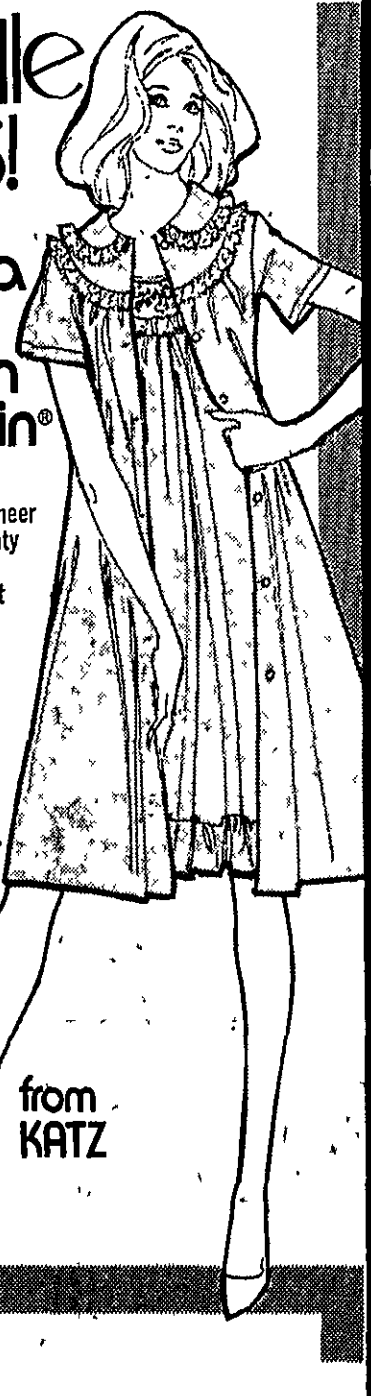

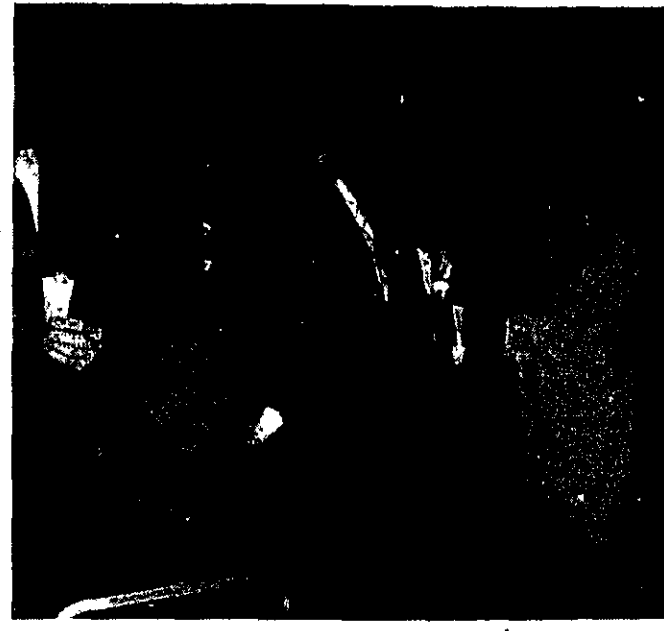

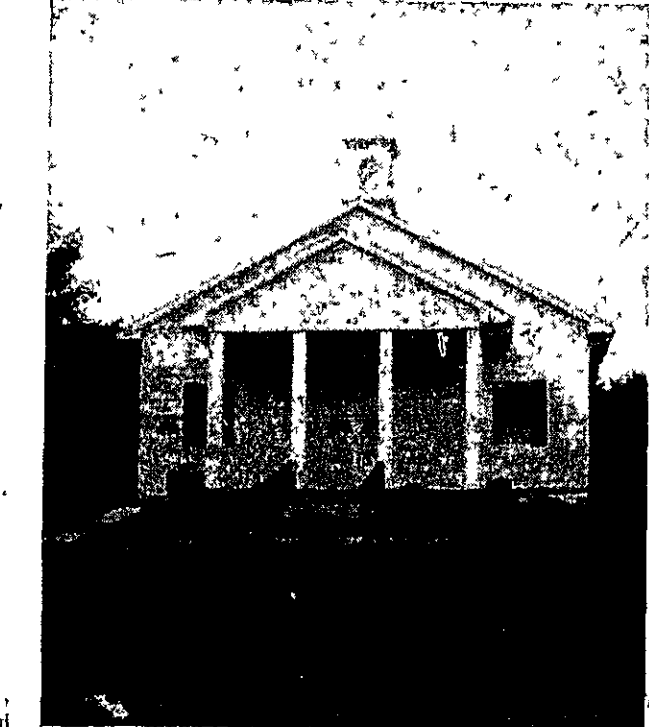

Dateline DeWitt with Faye Hanson

DeWitt City Librarian and Chairman, DeWitt Bicentennial Commission

DeWitt City is the oldest permanent white settlement in Clinton County and soon the DeWitt bicentennial Commission will be erecting a bronze plaque confirming the fact; it was put up by the now defunct Clinton County Pioneer Society in 1913, a forerunner of the present Clinton County Historical Society. The plaque used to stand on the south side of the 100 block of West Main St. but was removed some 30 or 40 years ago.

It is now in the custody of Howard Courtland who has agreed to let us re-erect it on his property in the 200 block of South Bridge St. just north of the Looking Glass River. It will be so located that people will be able to drive up in their cars and read the inscription from there. The plaque states that Capt. David Scott made the first permanent white settlement in Clinton County at DeWitt on Oct. 4, 1833 and that the plaque was erected in his memory by the Clinton County Pioneer Society.

At a later date this same Society erected a bronze plaque on a huge boulder on the grave of Capt. Scott in the DeWitt cemetery. The die for this plaque which bears the date of erection of 1918, was given to the DeWitt Public Library by Mr. and Mrs. Neil Cutler. Mr. Cutler is the direct descendant of the first settlers of Riley Township, Mr. and Mrs. Atwell Simmons and Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Cook.

The bronze plaque of 1918 may still be seen in the DeWitt Cemetery and soon the 1913 bronze tablet will be back on the street in DeWitt.

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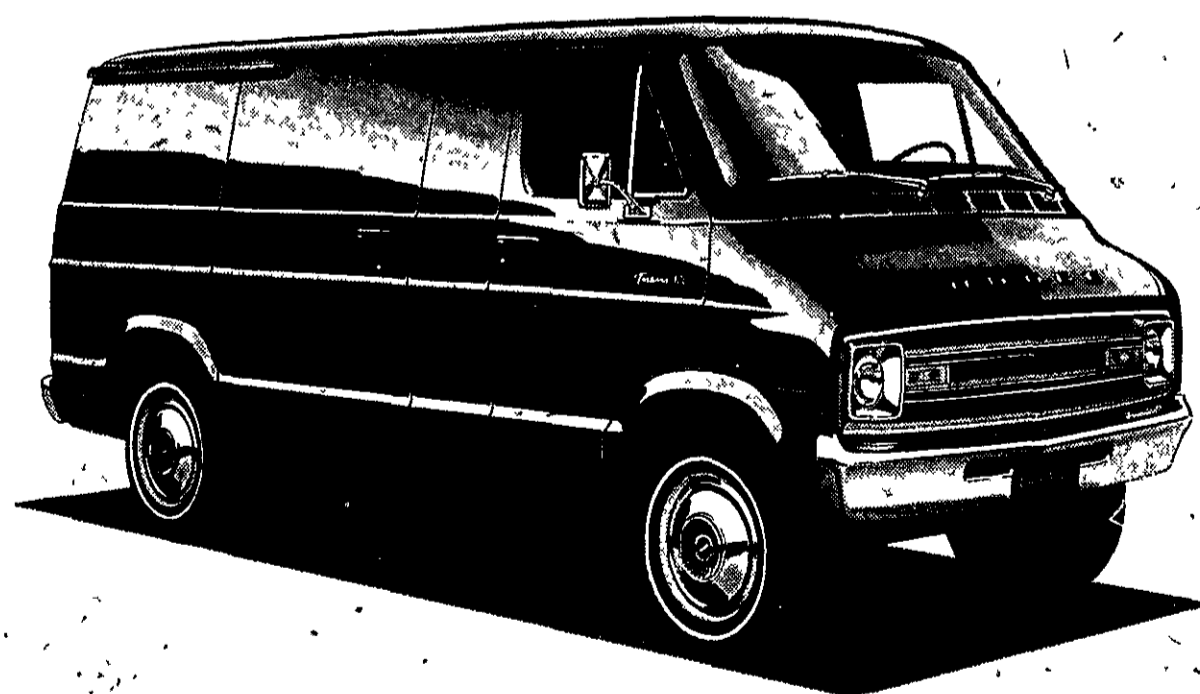

County won't appeal

Now, however, Nobis said he won't file because the County is also appealing the 4.8 per cent tax factor to the Tribunal and he wants to see how other counties make out with their appeals of

allocation board decisions.

"We want to wait and see what we have to have to appeal to the Tribunal," he said.

"We feel we can wait until next year to go through the appeal process."

The County Board of Commissioners won't be appealing a recent decision by the County Allocation Board to reduce the County's tax share according to Commr. Walter Nobis, chairman of the Finance Committee.

The Allocation Board cut the County millage share to 5.8 (down from 5.85 from last year) and now the County is out \$12,000.

Board members were upset and at their June 3 meeting they decided to let Nobis check with County Prosecutor Jon Neuman to see if an appeal to the State Tax Tribunal was plausible. Commr. Nobis was told if that was the case, to go ahead and file.

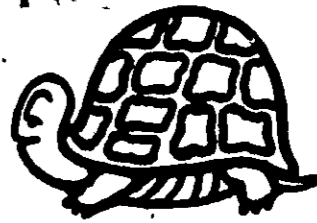

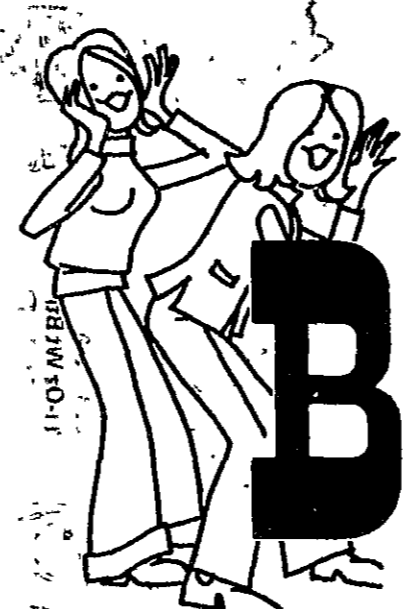

Make hay while the sun shines is true, not just a bunch of words.
A crock pot comes in handy now. When they want an early

meal or one delayed or taken to the field it is a wonderful invention.
On a nice note... it does seem that the flowers this spring are better than any time I can remember. Roses, peonies and mock orange are just beautiful and abundant with blossoms.
Now if I just remember to keep smelling the posies - and remember which field I was supposed to go to in half an hour - or was it fifteen minutes?
Later.
I laughed because I felt like crying. Really there is no or little difference between the two. And it was funny.
Farm Bureau is tonight at Frank Rivest's. I dashed home from a long wait at the farthest field on Sam's place, picked the biggest strawberries I could and made a strawberry pie. Had chilled the pie shell and filling before I went. As I cut the luscious berries in half and admired the concoction I sang a happy tune. THIS was the best one yet. Piling whip cream on it and putting it on top of three tall pitchers to cool further... then a shower... then Farm Bureau meeting.

Land use film available

Community Groups and other interested persons may obtain information about P.A. 116 the Farmland and Open Space Preservation Act of 1975 through a slide-tape presentation available from Michigan Farm Bureau. The county office will arrange meetings which will be led by Regional Representative Harold Scharp. Agreement forms for applying to place farm land into the program are available at the office. The County Farm Bureau will be naming a Land Use Committee to be responsible for program in the area of future land use in the County.

County Board has busy session

At the June meeting of the County Farm Bureau Board of Directors several important matters were on the agenda.
County Annual meeting is set for October 14 at Smith Hall. It will be a dinner meeting and the Committee is presently accepting bids from groups interested in preparing and serving the meal. Four director positions will be up for election - Bath DeWitt, presently held by Doug Brook; Duplain Greenbush, held by Wayne Peck; Director at large - Ray Moore the present director. All 3 of these persons are eligible for 1 more three year term. David Pohl presently serving the Dallas-Westphalia area has served one year which was the remaining portion of the expired term made open by the resignation of Duane Platte 1 year ago. Community Groups in the eligible districts may make nominations for these posts and the nominating committee will nominate for director at large.

Reports were received from Mike Borton chairman of the Young Farmer Program in the county and from Harold Scharp, Regional Representative who advised board of current issues in Washington affecting farmers and of the recent evaluation done at the County Office.
The 3rd annual Rural Urban tour plans were announced with stops at the Harold and Lewis Lonier swine operation in Watertown township, the Norm and Tom Irer beef setup in Bengal and the dairy farm of Bob and Ed Grams in Bingham township. The date is July 12 and following the tour a picnic will be held at the city park in St. Johns.
Board members and members of the Young Farmer Committee will invite guest families from non farm occupations. The special delegate session June 28 was discussed and recommendations were made regarding the State Study

Committee report. The meeting is open to all Farm Bureau members and will begin at 10:00 a.m. at the Hilton Inn in Lansing with a special bi-centennial observance. The delegate session will get underway at 12:30. The main topic of discussion will be the proposed changes in the dues structure.
Other items included on the agenda were Roll Call Manager for 1976 and other County Committee selections due August 1. An insurance report by Don Keim was received and the finished recommendations resulting from the Power in the People Program were accepted. The latter was approved so that many areas of program could be started within the next few weeks.

Action requested on "night to plow"

A proposed regulation has recently been issued by the U.S. Army Corp of Engineers which could have a significant impact upon agriculture.

In 1972, Congress mandated that the Corps of Engineers establish a permit program to regulate work and structures in navigable waters of the United States. The Corps published regulations in 1974 to meet this mandate.
However, the Natural Resources Defense Council (a New York based environmental group) and the National Wildlife Federation filed suit against the Corps to expand the scope of the regulation. The suit charged that the permit program should include work and structures in all waters of the United States rather than just navigable waters. On March 27, 1975, a U.S. District Court ruled in favor of the suit. The Corps was ordered to revise its permit program to include all waters of the United States. As a result of this ruling, the Corps has published four alternative proposals for public comments.

Although each of the four alternatives would affect agriculture, some are more serious than others. As an example, the following is a direct quote from a Corps news release dated May 6: "Under some of the proposed regulations, federal permits may be required by the rancher who wants to enlarge his stock pond, or the farmer who wants to deepen an irrigation ditch or plow a field, or the mountaineer who wants to protect his land against stream erosion." Furthermore, in the proposed regulation, the Corps notes that the average permit now requires about four months to process provided it is minor in nature and noncontroversial but may be increased as well over a year if an environmental impact statement or public hearing is required. The im-

lications of such a permit program are obvious to farmers. Farm Bureau has vigorously protested any expansion of the Corps permit program and called for an appeal of the court decision. Presently the Corps is using numbers with respect to public comments field on the alternative proposals. As of June 9 about 350 of the nearly 1000 comments received by the Corps have opposed all four of the alternatives.
If farmers are to remain exempt from such an unrealistic permit program they must take action. Two letters are needed: 1 to the Office of the Chief of Engineers, Department of the Army Attn: DAEN-CWO-N, Washington, D.C. 20314. Letters should be written before June 30. Express your opposition to all four of the alternatives that would expand the Corps permit program as published in the May 6 Federal Register.
Persons could point out that an estimated 75% of Michigan's agricultural land requires drainage or land treatment and that the added permit requirements and review process would seriously restrict the State's 2 billion dollar agricultural industry. Also it is estimated that annually some 1500 county or inter county drain projects and 2200 soil conservation activities would be affected.

The second person to write is Robert H. Bork, Solicitor General, United States Dept. of Justice, Washington, D.C. 20530. Persons should express their opposition to further expansion of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers permit program. Persons should strongly request that Mr. Bork appeal the NRCD v. Callaway court ruling and urge him to do so promptly. This is an important issue involving a major department of the Federal government and expansion of its authority into agricultural activities.

Fruit sale to be held in August

Orders for fruit will be taken during July for delivery in August. Available this year will be strawberries, dark sweet and tart cherries and blue berries. No prices are yet available

but will be in the very near future. Persons interested are asked to watch for further announcements early in July in the County News.

Chloe's Column

Automatic dishwashers

The automatic dishwasher usually self-cleans its tub. However, after a time, the white film in the tub from hard water may need to be removed by wiping with a damp cloth and a mild cleansing powder.

Remove any sediment or objects found in the bottom of the tub. Clean enamel exteriors with a warm, damp, sudsy cloth; rinse and wipe dry.

Keep the brushed stainless-steel bright by using a solution of two tablespoons packaged water softener dissolved in warm water and drying with a soft cloth. A soft cloth saturated with rubbing alcohol compound wiped over the surface also cleans stainless-steel effectively.

If you have a wood cutting board on the top of the dish-

washer, wash it with a sudsy cloth and rinse with clear water. To keep it in good condition, apply a light coat of mineral oil.

If you run out of automatic dishwasher detergent, wash dishes by hand or rinse them and hold. Hand-dishwashing and laundry detergents cause excessive sudsing. Excessive suds may cause an overflow that can short and ruin the motor. Furthermore, excessive suds cushion the jetting water and prevent it from hitting the dishes with enough force to make a scouring action.

Store automatic dishwasher detergents in dry places. Automatic dishwasher detergents stored in a damp area - under your sink - may leave deposits on your dishes. After the box has been

opened, the detergent may not dissolve during the wash cycle, leaving usually tan or white sandy deposits. Therefore, store the automatic dishwasher detergent in a dry place.

Etching - a permanent film - looks frosted or iridescent on scratched or pitted glassware. It cannot be removed, but you can try to prevent it.

Etching is caused by the removal of metallic ions from soft glass by alkaline wash solutions. It can be caused by the use of excess detergent in soft water or with pre-rinsed dishes that leave no fat or acid to counteract the alkalinity of the detergent.

To prevent etching use a minimum amount of detergent and load the machine to insure adequate rinsing.

A farm owned by John Lewis Brown of Rt. 1, St. Johns, has been designated as a Centennial Farm by the Division of Michigan History.

The farm, located in Essex Township, Clinton County, has been in the possession of the family since 1871. It was originally purchased April 6, 1871 by Hiram W. Brown, grandfather of the present owner, from Stephen M. Boyle, Secretary of State Richard H. Austin, whose Department administers the Centennial Farm program, said the program was inaugurated in

1948. Since then, more than 3000 Michigan farms have been certified as Centennial Farms.

Certificates are provided by the Division of Michigan History. Large metal markers are provided by the Detroit Edison and Consumers Power Companies.

Explains Austin, "A Centennial Farm is one which has been in the continuous possession of the same family for 100 years or more." For this purpose, the Michigan History Division

considers a farm to be either 10 or more acres having estimated

farm product sales of more than \$50 yearly, or less than 10 acres having estimated sales of at least \$250 yearly. A centennial farm comprises only the land and not the farm buildings, which may be remodeled or even new.
