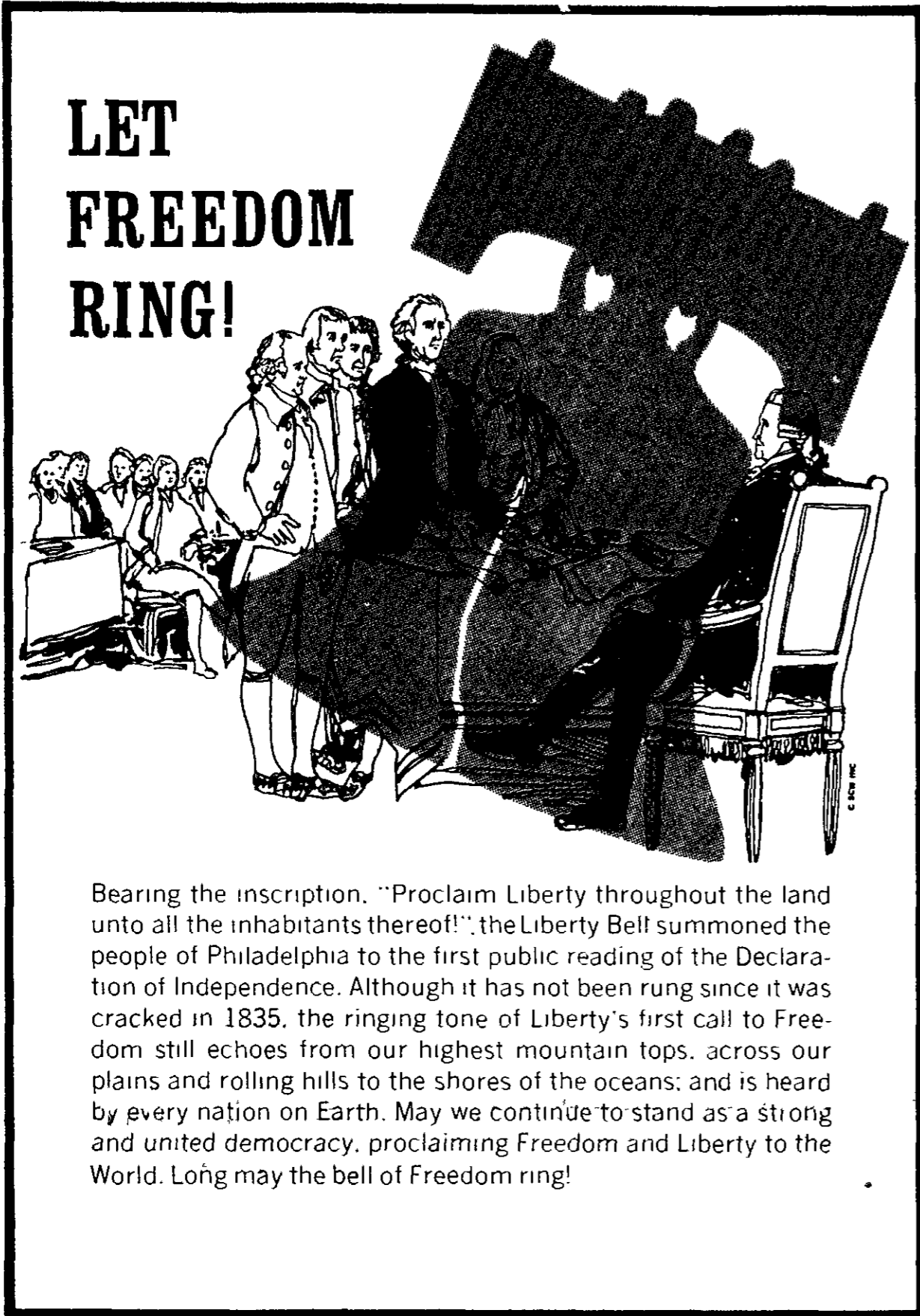

History on the move in Tri-County area

The first Ingham-Clinton-Eaton Tri-County Historical Convention was held recently at the farm of George and Geneva Wiskemann, north of Lansing. The meeting, to begin coordinating plans for the 1976 Bi-Centennial, was sponsored by the Ingham County Board of Commissioners Special Committee on County History and the Historical Society of Greater Lansing. Mrs Wiskemann is president of the Society. The program began with a salute from a

hand-made cannon, fired by the maker of the cannon, Clyde Anderson He and his assistant, Charles Lawrence, were dressed in Civil War style uniforms, made by Mr Anderson's daughter. A color guard, Richard Burns and Gordon Oliver, in French-American costumes, marched in to the sound of the ringing of a brass bell and flourishes from a pair of drums. The meeting was called to order by

Eugene G. Wanger, vice chairman of the Ingham Board of Commissioners and a past president of the Historical Society.

Howard Lancour, chairman of the Michigan Bi-Centennial Commission, presented a US Bi-Centennial flag to Alfred Wardowski, chairman of the Ingham Board of Commissioners. In his remarks, Mr Lancour said that the Bi-Centennial has become a people's program, that local projects have become more important in the celebration of the 200th anniversary of the birth of our country.

Reports were given by representatives of local history-related groups. These included: Douglas Carpenter, Clinton County Historical Society; Janet Rohrabacher, Livingston County Historical Society; Ava Kroger, Vermontville Historical Society; Justin Kestenbaum, East-Lansing Bi-Centennial Commission; Florence Hill, Friends of Historical Meridian; Fay Hanson, Dewitt Bi-Centennial Committee; Ralph Strobel, Saginaw Historical District; Mary McGuire, Alfa Kappa Alfa; Maria Thompson, Weavers Guild of Greater Lansing; Roberta Welfare, Daughters of the American Revolution; and Hal Bergen, Save Our Parks.

The reports were followed by an auction of donated items that brought in \$780 for the Historical Society.

Next was a pot-luck supper on the lawn. The meal was supplemented by popcorn from a steam-driven popcorn machine which was built by Clyde Anderson and was operated by Charles and Mary Parker. Dinner music was supplied by a 50 year old band-organ owned by Darold Rice. It had originally been on a large carousel in San Francisco's Playland Park.

The evening was supposed to have ended with a grand balloon ascension by David Claggett of Ypsilanti. But, because of the wind, the balloon never got off the ground. Mr Claggett lit the burners of the balloon and allowed the guests to pull the cord which sent a blast of hot air toward the uninflated bag.

Some of the guests remained until after dark, roasting marshmallows. Almost 300 people attended the convention.

Mrs Wiskemann said that a second Tri-County meeting is being planned. She said that plans are also being made to publish the proceedings of the convention.

St Johns takes factor fight to Lansing Monday

ST JOHNS -- A delegation of St Johns city officials traveled to Lansing Monday to present their case to a representative of the governor.

Their "case" is a 10% tax factor levied on the entirety of Clinton County by the State Tax Commission.

Because of past efforts to align the city's assessment rolls with the requirements of the State Tax Commission, St Johns officials feel the added factor is unfair so they took their case to the governor, where it was turned over the Office of Intergovernmental Relations and Special Units.

Meeting with the St Johns officials Monday was to be Gerald Miller, director of the above-mentioned office.

Following is the text of a letter presented by Bruce Wood, city assessor. He was accompanied to Lansing by Mayor Robert Wood, Roy Ebert, vice-mayor, John Hannah, city commissioner, and Harvey Weatherwax, city manager.

"Since 1971, the City of St Johns has continually tried to keep in step with the requirements of State Law and the directives set forth by the State Tax Commission. In doing this the following steps were taken by the City Commission:

"1. In 1971, a complete reappraisal of all residential and industrial property was authorized by the City Commission. This was completed in time for the 1972 tax year by Allied Appraisal Co. At the same time my office reappraised the commercial property. The end result was a 30.47% increase in the total assessed value for the City of St Johns.

"2. In 1972, based on sales studies of the area; no further action was taken other than a few minor adjustments and picking up of all new property.

"3. In 1973, we could see by sales studies that the assessments were beginning to slip below the 50% level, especially on residential property. At that time the City Commission authorized the City Assessor to hire additional help over the summer to begin a reappraisal of residential property. At that time approximately 2/3 of the residential property was appraised. We did not adjust the 2/3 that were completed at that time. My reasoning was simply equity. How can you justify increasing 2/3 of the property and leaving as is the other 1/3? It just wasn't fair to the taxpayers. Instead I chose to accept a 5% factor by the County, at least that way everybody would be increased uniformly and by an amount which I felt was fair.

"4. In May of this year the City Commission again authorized me to hire additional help to complete the reappraisal started in 1973. We are now in the process of completing this reappraisal.

Guesstimate

"In early summer of 1973 the State Tax Commission began a study of property values in Clinton County because of an appeal of the State Equalized Value of DeWitt Township. DeWitt Township started their appeal not because of county

equalization, but because the State Tax Commission had threatened to arbitrarily increase the value of Clinton County approximately 8% based on a guesstimate. The City of St Johns began an appeal at the same time but dropped it when the State Tax Commission backed off. DeWitt Township refused to drop their appeal for reasons known only to themselves.

"This year the State Tax Commission gave no warning of an increase until long after it was too late for the individual units to begin an appeal.

"At the final equalization session held on the fourth Monday in May of 1974, the Tax Commission tacked an additional 10% on Clinton County based on some preliminary figures which had been submitted by their field staff making the study of Clinton County; a study which had not even been completed. Their staff had not even started a study of the City of St Johns.

"The end result was that instead of having a 5% factor, the City of St Johns ended up with a 15% factor. There is no way that we can justify this increase to the taxpayer of St Johns.

"The methods used by the State Tax Commission in making their studies are certainly questionable.

"What better way to determine value than by sales, especially in areas like St Johns where there are any number of residential sales available?"

"The County Equalization Department in computing our sales ratio used a three year average. A method which is recognized and accepted by the State Tax Commission.

"The staff of the Tax Commission used only the year of the appeal (1973 appeal, 1972 sales). Instead of using the 90 or 100 good

sales we have each year, they would use only a few (20 or so).

"In doing an appraisal they again used only about 20 properties for our residential. Our residential is the largest portion of our tax base (\$18,521,400 out of a total value of real property of \$24,966,900). Total residential property totals approximately 2200 parcels. This represents a study of less than 1% of the residential properties.

"We feel that the State Tax Commission should follow their own recognized practices when doing a study of a unit.

"Their sales should be run on a 3 year average instead of just the year being studied. If appraisals are going to be done, there certainly should be a larger sampling than less than 1%.

"What justification do we, the City of St Johns, have in trying to maintain the mythical 50% level if the State Tax Commission won't abide by their own recognized practices?

"Why shouldn't we, as a city, set back and accept a factor rather than adjust our values to the spiraling property values. The City of St Johns in trying to stay with today's trends have increased assessed property values from \$22,525,600 in 1971 to \$29,388,600 in 1972, \$31,187,000 in 1973 and \$2,241,200 in 1974.

"Legislation is needed allowing the assessor to deduct interest points, broker fees, etc to come up with a true value of property instead of the inflated figures now used.

Results of the meeting were unavailable at press time due to the early holiday deadline.

St Johns names Gonzales head football coach

ST JOHNS -- Joe Gonzales, assistant St Johns varsity football coach for the past 4 years, has been named by the St Johns Board of Education as the new varsity grid coach.

Gonzales replaces Ernie Becker, who has resigned to accept a coaching job with another school system.

Gonzales is a 1966 Michigan State University graduate.

Following his graduation from MSU, Gonzales coached in the Pontiac suburb of Lake Orion. He was a freshman and junior varsity football coach, freshman and junior varsity baseball coach and freshman basketball coach.

In addition to his duties as head football coach in St Johns, Gonzales is varsity baseball and freshman basketball coach.

Hired as his assistant is Jan Szymczak, a coach for 4 years at Austin High School. Szymczak is a graduate of Eastern Michigan University where he was a varsity football player.

Former Clinton man writes railroad history

Ford S. Ceasar of Lansing, and a former teacher of Clinton County, has written a railroad history of a Central Michigan project that was active during the years 1883 to 1885.

Ceasar was a graduate of Michigan State University, and attended the Clinton County Normal School at St. Johns, 1931-32. He taught at the Fairview School in Essex Township and at Eagle Village School. He retired from the field of education last July, after serving 23 years with the Lansing schools as a teacher and administrator.

His history, "The Lamp Road," is a 100-page documentation of the Lansing, Alma, Mt. Pleasant and Northern Railroad, often referred to in early Clinton papers as the "Great Northern Ghost."

It contains a great deal of Clinton County history as it reveals the joys, excitement, apprehension and indifference as the project unfolds.

The villages of Maple Rapids and DeWitt as well as the town of St. Johns, with their political and financial leaders of that day: John Hicks, Robert Steel, Gen. Spaulding, H.M. Perrine, David S. French, VanScoy and

others of the county went all-out to get a north-south railroad through their communities.

Ceasar says his interest in writing this history resulted in his research for material on the old electric interurban line between Lansing and St. Johns. He is now writing a history of Ingham County for the Bicentennial.

Ceasar will be at Clinton National Bank on the afternoon of July 12, and at Maple Rapids on July 20 to autograph copies of his book. He is a member of the Clinton County Historical Society.

Baptist gains \$.01 honors

ST. JOHNS - The First Baptist Church of St. Johns was the first organization to become eligible for recognition by the director of the mint for participating in that bureau's effort to regenerate circulation of US pennies.

The effort, as announced by Mrs. Mary Brooks, mint director, and administered locally by Clinton National Bank & Trust Company, began in early June.

Persons depositing a minimum of \$25 in pennies at CNB&T become eligible for a

printed certificate from the US Mint recognizing them for participation in the program.

According to Gayle Desprez, executive vice president of CNB&T, First Baptist Church of St. Johns recently deposited \$85 in pennies and became eligible for honors. The name of the church has been forwarded to Mrs. Mary Brooks, who will issue the special certificate.

Desprez said that many penny deposits have been made since the program began but First Baptist Church is the first to meet or exceed the \$25 requirement.

The Parks Commission minutes were reviewed. They are checking into several properties in the Turner and State Roads area for another park. Arts and crafts will be Monday, Wednesday and Friday starting at 11.

The Fire Committee minutes and the fire report were reviewed.

NOTICE TO TELEPHONE SUBSCRIBERS

On May 31, 1974, General Telephone Company of Michigan filed an application with the Michigan Public Service Commission for authority to revise its Tariff M.P.S.C. No. 8 so as to conform fully to the Tariff of Michigan Bell Telephone Company for interexchange private line service. The company alleged that it is presently furnishing private line telephone service jointly with Michigan Bell Telephone Company under the tariff of that company and that it would be in the public interest for all interexchange private line service in the state of Michigan to be governed by the one tariff as is the situation for message toll telephone service.

If interexchange private line service is governed by the tariff of Michigan Bell Telephone Company, those private line customers whose service is not being provided jointly with Michigan Bell Telephone Company will experience a rate adjustment. Listed below is a comparison of the existing and proposed rates.

The proposal will also increase the interexchange foreign exchange mileage charges from \$4.25 per mile per month to \$4.75 per mile per month.

Applicant further represents that Michigan Bell has on file with the Michigan Public Service Commission an application requesting authority for increased rates which, if approved, may further change the rates for certain interexchange services.

The Michigan Public Service Commission has scheduled a public hearing on this matter on July 19, 1974 at 9:30 a.m. at the office of the Michigan Public Service Commission, Fifth Floor - Law Building, 525 West Ottawa Street, Lansing, Michigan. Any interested parties may attend the hearing and participate subject to the provisions of the Commission's Rules of Practice and Procedure, 1964 Administrative Code, Supplement No. 54, R 460.11 et seq.

St Johns Co-Op breaks ground for new grain processing plant

ST JOHNS - St. Johns Co-Op has broken ground and begins construction this week for a \$340,000 high speed grain receiving and processing plant to be located adjacent to existing silos at the co-op.

The addition to St. Johns Co-op increases the total capacity from 270,000 bushels to approximately 500,000 bushels. Also included in the new facility will be a 60-foot tilting platform, hoist and scale.

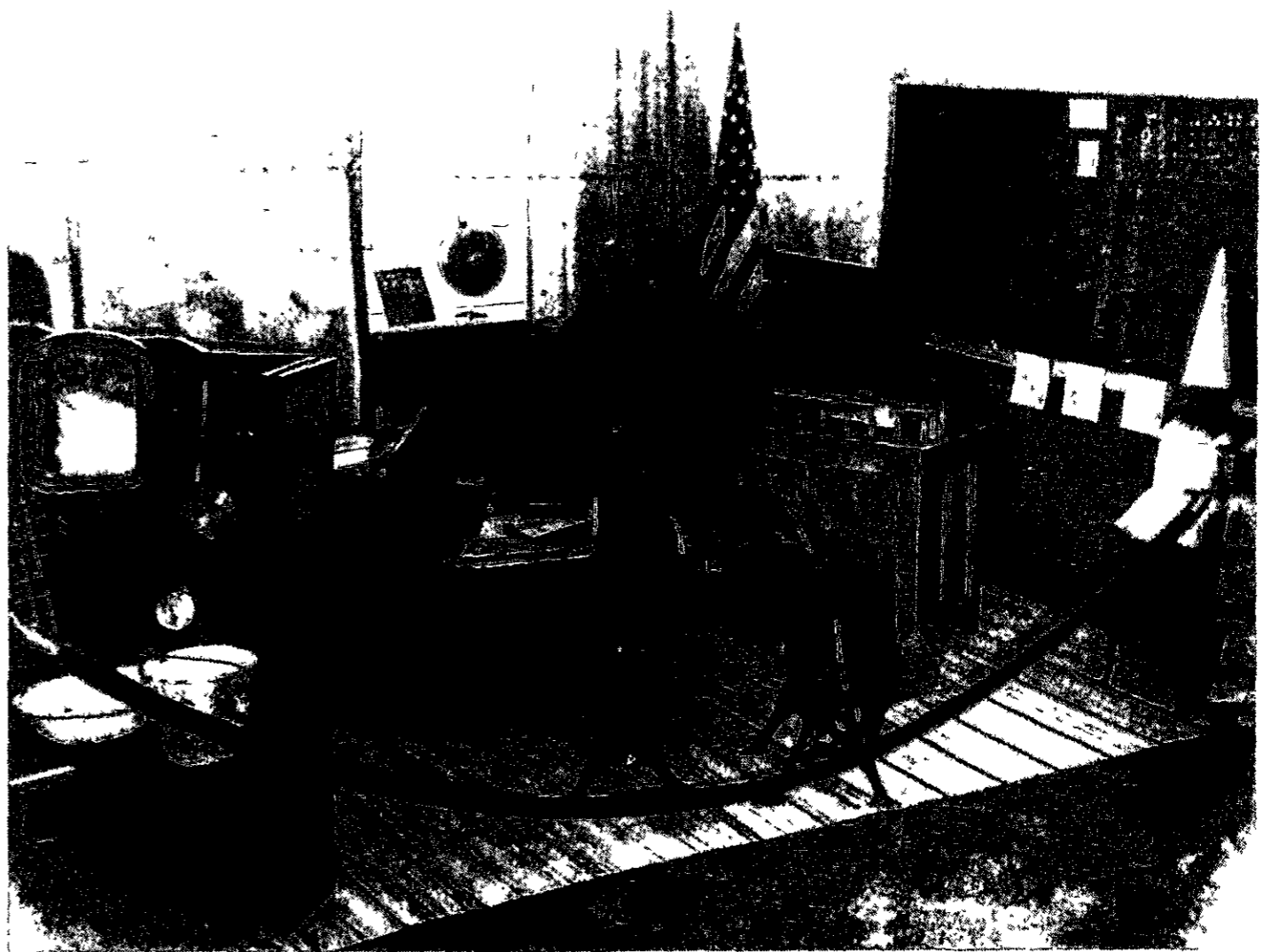

in St. Johns on Monday, July 8, from 11 am to noon.

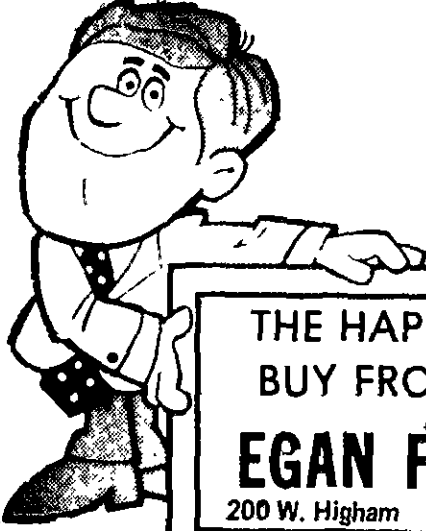



City Engineer Vermette reported to the Commission that he had examined the three requests made by Mr. Joe Mesh. Discussion followed concerning the request.

Commissioner Ebert asked that the engineer's report concerning the three requests be put in written form to the Commission for further consideration.

The Commission assented to Commissioner Ebert's suggestion and discussion was terminated.

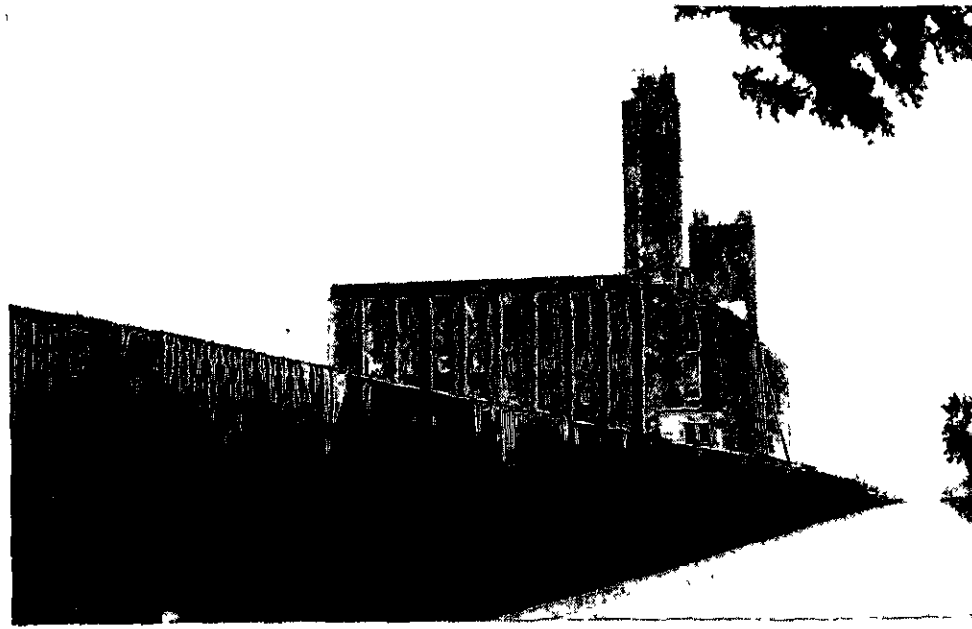
Comm. Hannah expressed his concern of the speed of firemen, down West Walker Street when answering a fire call. Discussion followed.

Michigan Elevator Exchange gets ready for record wheat harvest

LANSING — Michigan Elevator Exchange, a division of the farmer owned cooperative Farm Bureau Services, Inc., has begun clearing grain storage facilities in anticipation of handling Michigan's share of an expected US record wheat harvest.

At MEE's Ottawa Lake facility, 7,000,000 bushels of corn and soybeans were moved out to shipping ports in Baltimore and Philadelphia in 41 days, setting a record for speedy loading at the Ottawa Lake terminal. Two 100 car trains transported the products, the corn went to Baltimore, the soybeans to Philadelphia. The Saginaw Terminal too, has exported several boatloads of corn already.

According to Herm Geers, on the grain desk at MEE Headquarters in Lansing, the Michigan grain will join its counterparts from other areas of the US at those ports, to be

exported eventually to foreign markets.

Geers is "optimistic" about this year's wheat harvest, which he says may get started as early as July 1 in lower Michigan. "The crop looks good," says Geers, with very little lodging in most Michigan areas. He noted the price of wheat to farmers as of mid-June was around \$3.27 per bushel, as compared to \$2.60 a year ago. But, he cautioned, the expected record-breaking harvest may influence this year's prices.

The USDA is predicting an all-time record fall and spring wheat crop of 2,100,000 bushels. Michigan Elevator Exchange is well equipped to handle the volume of Michigan wheat. The Ottawa Lake terminal has a capacity of 4,000,000 bushels of grain. The Saginaw terminal can provide storage for 2,000,000 bushels.

MEE, as part of a farmer-owned cooperative, accepts shipments from small "country elevators" and markets grain on behalf of farmers.

ORDINANCE NO. 74
CITY OF DEWITT
CLINTON COUNTY, MICHIGAN
AIRCRAFT CONTROL ORDINANCE
An Ordinance controlling and regulating the use of the air above the City of DeWitt, and the land and other surface situated in the City, by aircraft of all types, for the purpose of promoting and preserving the public peace, safety and welfare, and for prescribing penalties for violation of its provisions.
THE CITY OF DE WITT ORDINANCES
Section 1 Aircraft defined. The word "aircraft" wherever it appears in this Ordinance means: Any contrivance now known, or hereafter invented, used or designed for navigation of or flight in the air, including, but not limited to airplanes, helicopters, rockets, and all other such devices.
Section 2 Unlawful operation of aircraft in air space. It is unlawful for any person to operate aircraft at less than 500 feet over any inhabited residential area, any school building, playground, park, sports stadium, health care facility, swimming area, bathing area, street, road, highway, or parking lot situated within the City of DeWitt.
Section 3 Unlawful landing and take-off of aircraft. It is unlawful for any person to land, taxi, take-off or in any other manner operate aircraft on land or upon any surface situated in the City of DeWitt within 500 feet of any of the places enumerated in Section 2.
Section 4 Permissive operation of aircraft. It is unlawful for any person to land, taxi, take-off or in any other manner operate an aircraft within the City of DeWitt on land or other surface without having first obtained the

written permission of the City Council or its authorized designee.
Section 5 Official uses. This Ordinance shall not prohibit the operation or use of aircraft above, and/or upon the land and other surface within the City of DeWitt by official public agencies engaged in promoting and preserving the public peace, safety and welfare.
Section 6 Penalty. Every person convicted of a violation of any provision of this Ordinance shall be punished by a fine of not more than One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) and costs of prosecution, or by imprisonment for not more than ninety (90) days or by both fine and imprisonment. Each act of violation shall constitute a separate offense.
Section 7 Separability. If any section, subsection, clause, phrase or portion of this Ordinance is for any reason held invalid or unconstitutional by any court of competent jurisdiction such portion and such holdings shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions hereof.
Section 8 Ordinances repealed. All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict with the provisions of this Ordinance are hereby repealed.

Warner sees bill aimed at media as death knell of free press

LANSING — Rep Dale Warner (R-Eaton Rapids) announced today his opposition to House Bill 6175, a legislative proposal which labels as a misdemeanor all activity by "any commercial media which assails, criticizes unfairly, demeans or attempts to demean, directly or indirectly, the personal character of a candidate for, or holder of, any public office, by the use of information not factual or capable of documentation, or charges any candidate for, or holder of, a public office with malfeasance, misfeasance or other misconduct of a civil or criminal nature, or otherwise attacks the person's official record, or grants free space or time for such purpose by another."

Such activity is not criminal under another proviso of the bill if the so-called "commercial media" makes available "forthwith" available equal space or time for any reply the person attacked may make upon the request of the candidate or holder of the public office.

Introduced on June 18 by Representative John P. Smeekens and fifty-eight (58) additional State Representatives, House Bill 6175 was referred to the Standing House Committee on Judiciary of

which Representative Warner is a member. However, only 5 sponsors of the bill are members of the House Judiciary Committee out of a total of 15 committee members. Thus, while the bill has enough supporters to pass the House (56 needed), it does not have enough to be reported out of committee (8 needed).

"The purposes of the bill are praiseworthy," Warner said, "but the method outlined by the bill will not accomplish the goals and will, in fact, call forth an unending stream of complex constitutional, political and journalism problems."

"During the last 10 months I have faced the problem of fair and unfair (and always intense) media attention," Warner said, "and thus I have an understanding of present professional standards among reporters and publishers."

"I am solidly and thoroughly convinced that our constitutionally protected free press and electronic media demand an absolute 'hands-off' posture by all agencies of the government except in special cases of defamation, obscenity, or grave and immediate social danger to public health or safety," Warner said.

"And these special cases must be carefully and

deliberately restrained and narrowly defined to avoid encroachment and not-so-subtle destruction of the principle of a free press," Warner added.

"After much thought and study, I am convinced that all responsibility for fairness, accuracy and balance must reside within the media establishments themselves," Warner said. "High professional standards among reporters and high goals toward honesty and uprightness by publishers and editors are the only acceptable methods."

"Our society presently has legal methods for responding to criminal or unethical publications," Warner said, "and the method outlined in this bill to redress felt wrongs is too drastic, too far-reaching and too destructive of the principle of a free press because it grants control to interested parties over the content and substance to be published."

"Thus, I will oppose the bill in committee and on the floor of the House. If it should pass, I would urge the Governor to veto it," Warner stated. "Although it sounds fair and appears to seek laudatory aims, in practice it would sound the death knell of our free press."

More on homestead tax credit

Farmland owners who received a refund or credit of less than \$500 may be entitled to an additional tax credit, State Representative R. Douglas Trezise (R-Owosso) announced today.

Under the terms of a House Concurrent resolution adopted by the Legislature last month, farmland owners may now claim taxes for all adjacent and contiguous farmland regardless of the amount of income from the land under the Homestead tax credit. The maximum amount of a credit is still \$500, however.

Formerly, the law permitted

a credit for taxes paid on unoccupied land used for agricultural or horticultural purposes only if the gross receipts of the agricultural or horticultural operations exceeded the household income. Household income was defined as "all income received by all persons of a household in a tax year while members of a household."

With the adoption of House Concurrent Resolution 402, the Legislature re-defined the farm homestead taxes which are eligible for the homestead tax credit. Persons who have lived on their farm for 10 years or

more may now claim taxes for all adjacent and contiguous farmland regardless of the amount of income from the land.

Persons who have lived on the farm less than 10 years and have no income from the land or the income from the sale of farm products does not exceed the household income, may claim taxes on up to and including 5 acres of adjacent and contiguous land as part of the homestead.

According to Representative Trezise, persons who did not qualify for a credit under the

original definition of a homestead, but now qualify, should file their claim with the Michigan Department of Treasury on Form MI-1040CR.

Those who did receive a credit but are now entitled to a further credit should contact their local township supervisor and request Form C-4456. Copies of this form may also be obtained by contacting the Individual Income Tax Section, Department of Treasury, Treasury Building, Lansing, Michigan 48922.

The deadline for filing these returns has been extended to Sept 30, 1974.

"This re-definition will be especially beneficial to senior citizen farmland owners," Rep Trezise noted. "Those who have elected to retire on the land which they have farmed for many years but are no longer farming or are farming only a portion of it were not able to take full advantage of the Homestead property tax credit because of their lack of income from this land. Yet, they were still carrying the heavy burden of property taxes on all the land. Under this new definition, they will be able to claim a credit for all of their farmland property regardless of their homestead income and regardless of how little income they are now obtaining from the land."

TCRPC supports LEAA moratorium

At their Wednesday night meeting, June 26, Tri-County Regional Planning Commissioners supported the Region 6 Criminal Justice Coordinating Council's recommendation to put a moratorium on reviewing all Law Enforcement Assistance Administration grant applications until Sept 27.

This action will allow time for regional priorities to be adequately assessed, as limited LEAA funds have put the squeeze on the number of programs that can be implemented, said Richard Liles, criminal justice planner from Tri-County.

Liles explained that the Region 6 Council is currently in the process of developing a comprehensive criminal justice plan for the Tri-County region.

Included will be a list of program areas rated as top priorities by Council members. All grant applications received in July, 1974 or thereafter will be weighted against these regional priorities and funded as monies become available.

"It is essential that criminal justice agencies in Clinton, Eaton, and Ingham counties know that applications can still be submitted."

The deadline is Aug 15, 1974 for agencies seeking LEAA funding for Dec 27, 1974. He added that applications received after Aug 15 may not be funded until July, 1975.

For planning purposes the Region 6 Council split into two subcouncils — Greater Lansing

and the Out-county. Each group is responsible for the preparation of a mini-plan. The two will be combined into one overall plan for the entire region. Completion is expected by Oct 1, 1974.

Council members include representatives from the courts, police and sheriffs' departments, corrections, probation, and other disciplines within the criminal justice system.

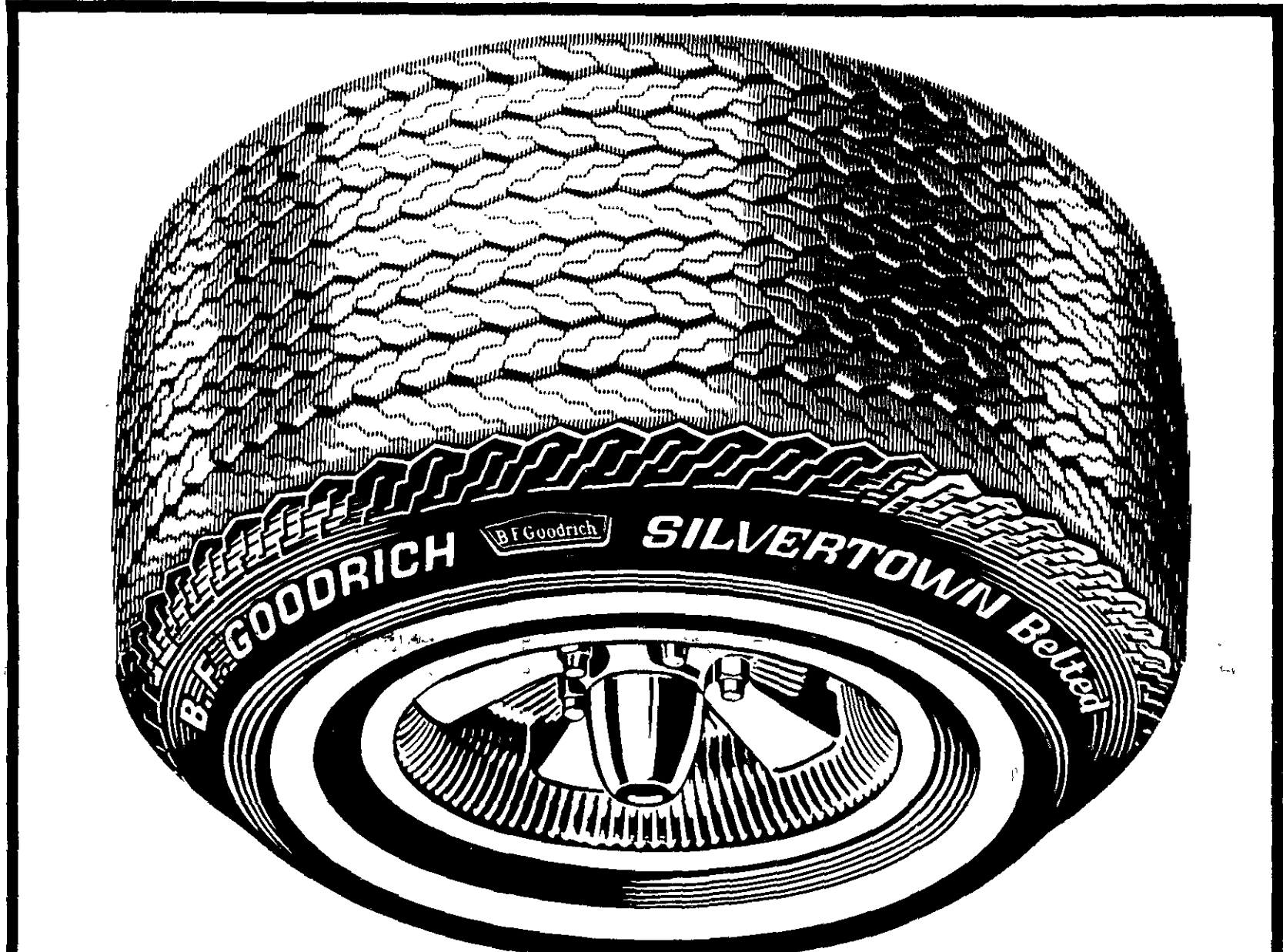

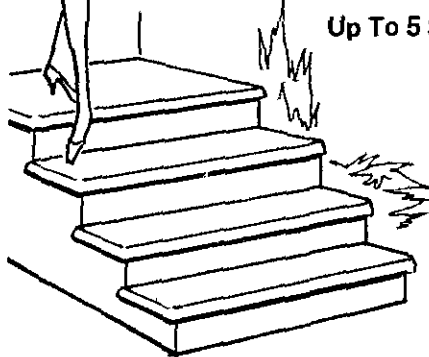

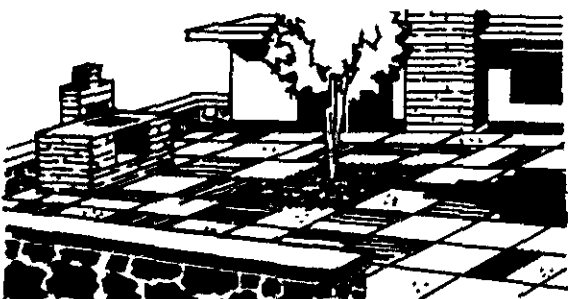

Chloe's Column

"Dear Sir:

I have a complaint

You open a can of food and find a dead cockroach in it. Yech.

You buy a new appliance that refuses to work.

After you wash a "completely washable" sweater, the arms hang all the way to your ankles. What do you do?

You could buy another brand of beans from now on, give the appliance a swift kick and take up knitting. Or you could invest a few minutes in constructive consumer complaining.

Before you dash off a hasty letter, be sure you're not the one responsible for the problem. You had nothing to do with the bug in the beans, of course, but what about the appliance and the sweater? Were you using the appliance according to the instructions? Was it plugged into a dead socket? Did you wash the sweater according to the directions on the label or, if the directions were incomplete, following a procedure you considered reasonable for the type of fiber involved?

If you can clear yourself of any blame, you probably have a legitimate complaint. Take it, first of all, to the retailer who sold you the product. A justifiable complaint made to a reputable dealer should yield results - either repairs, a replacement, or a refund, depending on the situation.

If you get no satisfaction from the seller, or if the product was not purchased locally, a letter to the manufacturer is in order.

Include in your letter as much information about the product as you can - a description of the

product, including model or stock number, details of purchase (where you bought it, when, how much you paid for it), the procedure you followed with it and a description of the unfortunate results. Keep the tone of the letter friendly and non-threatening. Assume the manufacturer is a reasonable person who will appreciate your bringing the problem to his attention.

An honest, straightforward letter will usually yield satisfactory results. If it does not, you may seek assistance from several government agencies.

Both the Michigan Consumers Council and the Consumer Protection Division of the Office of the Attorney General investigate consumer complaints. Unlike the council, the Consumer Protection Division can bring legal action on matters of

public interest, including consumer concerns. The council can refer individual cases to other agencies for legal action.

Complaints on food quality and weights and measures should be directed to the Michigan Department of Agriculture, Food Inspection Division.

To question the safety or effectiveness of drugs or cosmetics, contact the federal Food and Drug Administration.

To comment on network television programming, write to the Federal Communications Commission, the federal licensing agency for television and radio stations.

So if you have a legitimate consumer gripe, don't be afraid to say "Dear Sir: I have a complaint."

Bill's Column

Do yourself a favor - clean your combine

It's the time of year to get the brooms and dust mops out to clean things up for grain harvest. Do yourself a favor and clean the dust and junk out of your combine and grain bins before you put clean grain into them.

The grain elevators surely don't want your wheat if it's corrupted with rat droppings or bird's feathers. A good cleaning of the ole combine will save you grief later.

There's more wheat planted in the county this year than last and it stands to reason there will be more placed in storage than last year.

The Food and Drug Administration (FDA) requires that farmers protect wheat from contamination by birds, insects, rodents and other animals that could result in loss in weight of grain and spoilage. Wheat must be clean to be sold for food purposes. The best

milling process can't make clean flour from unclean wheat. Wheat unfit for food can only be sold for animal feed, at a considerable discount on every bushel.

After you have "spring cleaned" the combine look after the bins. Sweep the grain bin and all buildings adjacent to it, disposing of all bags and material that may contain insects. Vacuum cracks and crevices and repair all holes.

Treat bins with Malathion use only 57% premium grade unusifiable concentrate liquid. Apply to bins, wall, equipment, etc.

After the wheat is in the bin, check it every week for 6 weeks to make certain it doesn't go out of condition.

Farm program sign-up extended through July 15

July 15 is now the final day county ASCS offices will accept 1974 Wheat and Feed Grain Program applications. This date has been extended from the July 1 deadline originally publicized.

This announcement was made by Dorn Diehl, State Executive Director of the Michigan State Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Office.

After a slow start, interest in the program has been increasing daily. However, because of the recent weather conditions which have prevented many farmers from completing their 1974 plantings, some farmers have delayed contacting their ASCS offices to report their 1974 crop acreages and indicate their intentions to participate in the 1974 program.

It was to accommodate these farmers that the deadline dates was extended.

Diehl emphasized the need for all farmers with wheat and feed grain allotments to contact their ASCS offices before the July 15 deadline. With the changes made in the program, many farmers may not yet be

aware of what the program has to offer and the consequences for failure to participate.

Because of the new target price concept, it cannot be stated positively that any direct payments will be made. Payments will be made only when the price of feed grains and wheat drop below the target prices established by Congress.

With the inclement weather that we have been having throughout the State with some disastrous results to the acreage already planted, all farmers should enroll to gain the advantage of the insurance feature of the program which does provide some payments where weather conditions prevent the planting of a producer's allotment acreage or where planted crops may fail.

Diehl said the most unfortunate consequence of a producer failing to report his acreage is the reduction or loss of his wheat and feed grain allotments in 1975.

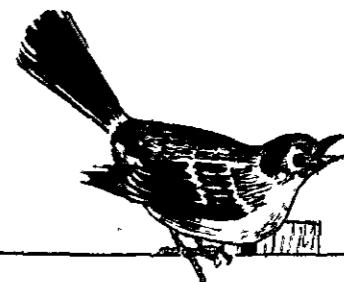

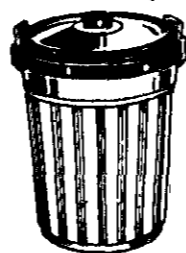

Kurt Becker, owner of Kurt's Hardware in St Johns, bought it several years ago from a Grand Rapids dealer and hauls it out for display every year during "refrigerator season."

The appliance weighs about a ton and has a capacity of 52 cubic feet. Unlike its modern counterpart, it has a cooling unit on top rather than inside.

Becker figures some family must have taken very good care of the old refrigerator -- most modern ones last from 12 to 15 years, he said.

But he pointed out prices have gone down over the years. Today, for example, you could buy a frost-free refrigerator 3 times as big as the 1935 model for about \$20 more.
