Question banking policies

ST JOHNS -- A rather routine meeting of the St Johns City Commission was punctuated Monday night by a continued complaint by Brandon White, president of Clinton National Bank and Trust, that the city placed money in a Central National Bank construction interest account that paid less money than White claims CN&T would have paid.

Harvey Weatherwax, city manager, in a letter to the City Commission, attorney and clerk, said he felt he did "Clinton National Bank a big favor by not having their first bid thrown in the wastebasket and investing all the money in Central National Bank," quoting a "qualified bid" from CN&T, when no qualifications were included in the bid request.

Weatherwax also referred to earlier questions about letting of city money and provided information showing checking accounts between the 2 banks were about "even."

White, referring to the request for a bid, said the request was "made, not in writing, but by phone call and no specifications or limitations were given."

White went on to say he was not criticizing any city employee, but policy that required city officials to reject the bid with qualifications because Commission action previously required the checking account to be with the Central National Bank.

Weatherwax said each bank received \$725,000 accounts as a split of the \$1,450,000 bond issue monies, following identical 2d bank bids.

The interest already earned on the money was then deposited in a bond interest and redemption account at Central National, previously approved by the City Commission.

Later White brought up the point that Roy Ebert made the motion to have the construction account placed at Central National and then questioned whether it would be a conflict of interest.

He brought up the conflict of interest after asking Ebert if he or any member of his family owned stock in Central National Bank or Clinton National Bank.

Ebert declined to answer White's questions at the time, but said he would if White submitted them to him in writing.

Electrical shock takes life of St Johns resident

ST JOHNS -- An electrical shock claimed the life of a St Johns man Saturday around noon at the St Johns Egg Station on North US-27.

Timothy K. Decker, 18, 606 E. Walker, St Johns, suffered the fatal electrical injuries while washing trucks at the Egg Station. Clinton County Sheriff's Dept officials said the accident was apparently a combination of wet clothing and a wet floor and a 220-volt power sprayer, plugged into a 110-volt extension cord, which was in turn, plugged into a 220 outlet.

An apparent short sent a charge of electrical current through the leg of the deceased, who was discovered at 12:30 pm by a co-worker.

The son of Cleland Decker and the former Kathleen Ludden, he had resided all his life in Clinton County.

He is survived by his mother and father, step-father, Edward Wheeler of St Johns, brothers Robert Decker of St Johns, Dan Decker of Owosso and Dan Parmenter of St Johns, sisters, Mrs. Lura Eldridge of St Johns and Mrs. Maureen Pitkanen of Lansing, step-brother, John Wheeler of Westphalia and grandparents Mr. and Mrs. Cleveland Decker of St Johns and Mrs. Ethel Ludden of Main.

Services were Tuesday from Osgood Funeral Home.

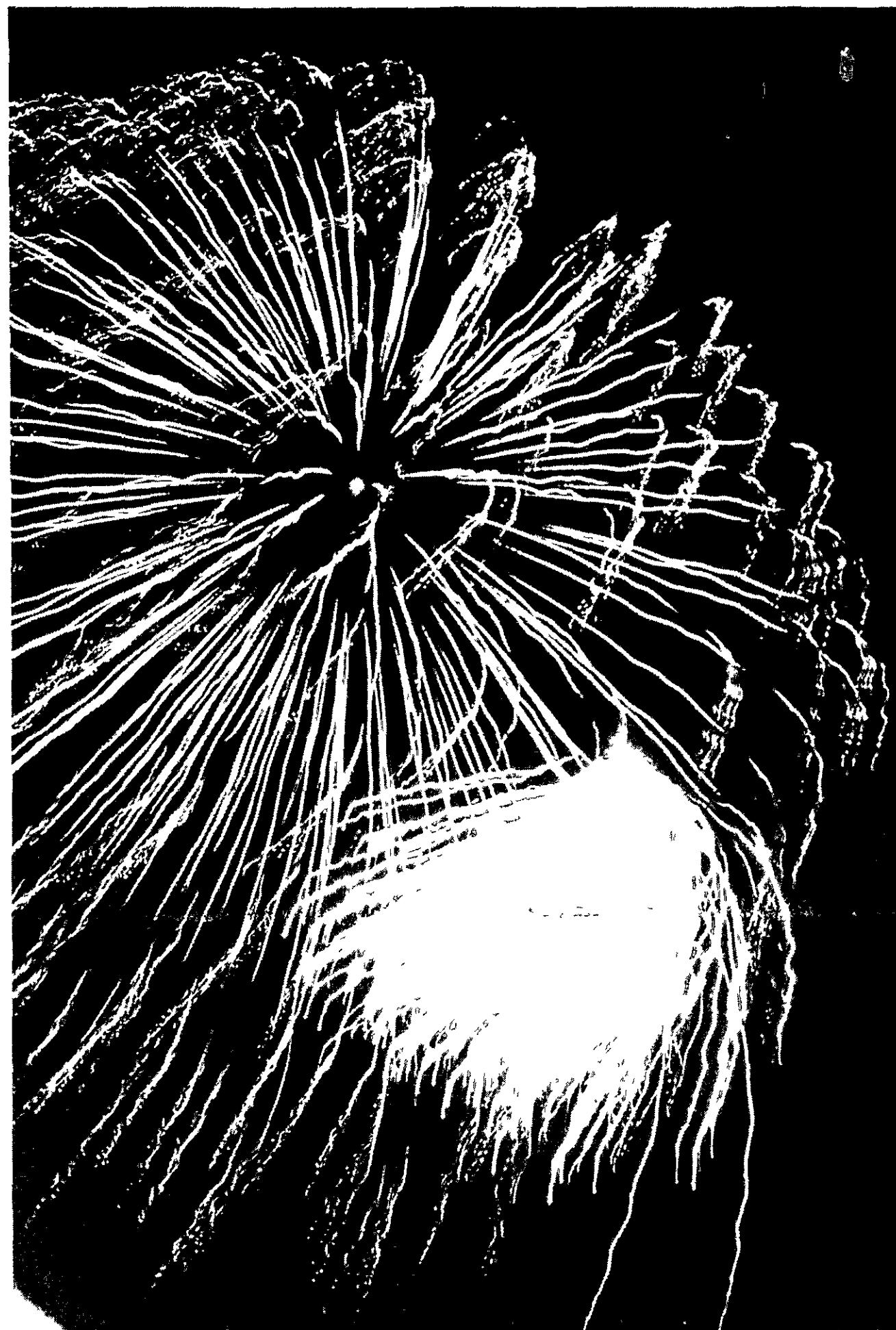
Tournament set for tennis buffs of all ages

Investigation leads to recovery of stolen merchandise

ST JOHNS -- An investigation, which eventually involved 12 police agencies, has resulted in the recovery of \$2500 worth of stolen property, believed taken in thefts ranging from St Johns to Mt Pleasant to Chesaning.

Arrested and charged with the possession of the stolen property was Harvey Joseph Chamberlain, 17, 8261 N. Watson Rd., Elsie.

His arrest by the Clinton County Sheriff's Dept came after a search warrant was issued, following a tip that stolen transmissions were on the premises. Chamberlain was arraigned and bond was set at \$4000, which was posted.

However another search warrant was issued and the Ithaca State Police arrested once again for possession of stolen property, this time 2 mini-bikes taken from the Ithaca area.

Arrested on the 2d charge, he did not post the additional \$4000 bond and remained in the county jail.

Yet another warrant was sought by the Ithaca State Police for larceny from a building and the Mt Pleasant Police wanted

Chamberlain on a charge of larceny from an automobile.

FROM WHEELS TO PIGEONS
Recovered at the Chamberlain residence were 18 mag wheels and tires, 2 air compressors, 2 bicycles, 3 mini-bikes, 3 transmissions, a U-Haul tow bar, Sears rototiller, numerous auto parts, 2 McCulloch chain saws and 25 homing pigeons.

Richard May, sergeant detective of the Clinton County Sheriff's Dept said that most of the recovered items have been identified by the owners.

Participating in the investigation of the stolen property besides May, detective sgt Arthur Hopp and 4 deputies, were the Saginaw County Sheriff's Dept, Mt Pleasant Police Dept, Central Michigan University campus security, Isabella County Sheriff's Dept, Mt Pleasant State Police, Eaton County Sheriff's Dept, Ithaca Police Dept, Gratiot County Sheriff's Dept, Ithaca State Police, Shepherd Police Dept and Alma Police Dept.

The investigation is continuing and further arrests are expected.

Death claims traveler in St Johns

ST JOHNS -- A 28-year old New Boston woman died Saturday in her room at the St Johns Motel, apparent victim of shock caused by a cerebral hemorrhage.

Victim of the fatal attack is Mary Jane Pinson, 28289 Rogell.

Witnesses at the scene of the death were

The witnesses claim she had gone into the bathroom to take some aspirin because of a headache and collapsed.

Time of death was listed at between 7:50 and 8 pm.

Taxes high? here's why

ST JOHNS -- Ninety degree temperatures are not the only cause for many St Johns residents to be getting hot under the collar.

Recently mailed summer tax notices have prompted many "hot" calls to the city assessor's office with the most frequent comment being "why?" or more accurately, "why have my taxes gone up so much?"

Bruce Wood, city assessor, has been patiently explaining to irate taxpayers the reason, but he really isn't the one responsible.

If Wood and the City of St Johns had their way, the tax bill this year wouldn't be much more than it was last year. In fact, there would be a jump of 5%, a factor levied by the county and accepted by the city in an effort to have property levied at the proper assessment.

But, according to Wood, the State Tax Commission felt that the whole of Clinton County was not at a sufficient property tax assessment level and levied a 10% factor on the entire county.

So, instead of doling out for a 5% increase this summer, St Johns taxpayers were hit with an approximate 15% increase.

City officials went to Lansing to protest the additional 10%, but were told they could not appeal the factor as an individual unit. Instead an appeal must be made by the county as a whole. In that regard, the County Board of Commissioners has asked for a re-hearing before the State Tax Tribunal, a new group set up to hear property tax appeals.

In an effort to explain, as simply as possible, how your tax bill got from where it was last summer to this summer, Wood provided the following example:

A home bought in 1972 for \$20,000 would have an assessed valuation of \$10,000. Assessed valuation is the amount on which taxes are actually paid. A proper assessed valuation is supposed to be 50% of the actual value. The state allows a fluctuation from 40 to 60%.

Theoretically, the \$20,000 home would have increased in value from 1972 to 1974 by 5%.

That's the 5%, the city accepted as a factor from the county in an effort to avoid a state factor by having property values in the city as correct as possible.

By accepting the 5% factor from the county, the summer taxes in 1974 on the home bought for \$20,000 in 1972 would be \$162.23.

That is a figure felt equitable by the city and also reflects a bond issue voted to improve storm sewers in the city.

However, when the 10% is added by the State Tax Commission, your tax bill went from \$162.23 to \$178.45, and increase of \$16.22 on summer taxes.

The \$20,000 home figure was a simplification, but homeowners can estimate what their taxes might have been without the State Tax Commission factor by subtracting 10% from their tax bill.

Then the place to complain is the State Tax Commission and Wood says the question to ask is, "Why must individual units such as St Johns pay 10% to make up alleged low assessments in other individual units?"

Units receive multipliers

ST JOHNS -- Because of the factor imposed on Clinton County by the State Tax Commission, Leon Thelen, Clinton County equalization director, has sent a letter to all taxing units in the county explaining a multiplier must be used before spreading taxes.

The multiplier for Bengal Twp is 1.342; Duplain 1.254; Greenbush 1.166; Olive 1.188; Ovid 1.265; Victor 1.309; Watertown 1.309 and St Johns 1.155.

All other units must use a 1.10 multiplier.

DeWitt Twp asks for appeal again

ST JOHNS -- Dale Emerson, DeWitt Twp supervisor, has written to Ernest Carter, Clinton County clerk, to ask Carter to forward an appeal of the 10% State Tax Commission factor to Lansing.

Emerson said in part, "Based upon the State Tax Commission study of 1973 equalization in Clinton County, I feel that to assess DeWitt Twp an additional 10% is in clear violation of the laws of the State of Michigan. The preliminary figures of the State Tax Commission clearly indicate that DeWitt Twp is very close to the 50% level of assessments and that the 10% factor would clearly put us well over the 50% limit."

Zane Benedict--man dedicated to scouting

ST JOHNS - Zane Benedict, 8715 W Centerline, has been so busy as a Scout leader for the past 17 years, he had time to be a Scout himself for only 1 year. Benedict is Scoutmaster of Troop 515, Riley School and is an example of a man thoroughly involved in helping boys through Scouting.

Constantly active in the Scouting program for the past 17 years, Benedict has no sons still in the program, but still finds time between his job at Diamond Reo and as owner of Sno-Go Kennels to make Troop 515 one of the best in District 5

The troop at 1 time was disbanded, but Benedict got it rolling again in 1971 and now 16 boys are in the troop and have 3 Presidential Awards to their credit.

The Presidential Award is the highest scoring troop or patrol or both at the District Spring Camporee.

When the Troop took the award in 1971, no Scout was higher ranked than Tenderfoot. After taking 2d place in 1973, the Troop came back this year to take Troop top honors and also patrol honors when the Raven Patrol also won the Presidential Award. At the same time, Eagle Patrol took 1st place honors.

Justifiably proud of his Scouts, Benedict has forsaken taking on Scouting leaderships outside of the troop level he once handled, preferring to work on the local level where, "I have a better chance to work with the kids."

Benedict sees his job as a bit easier because of increased participation from parents. He said as the troop has grown, it is less difficult to find adults to

help with the program.

Although Scouting has changed in some respects during the past few years, Benedict says the idea of Scouting is the same as it always been.

One thing that's still the same is the ultimate honor of achieving Eagle Scout status. Benedict says he will be seeing one of his troop members,

Lance Gardner (senior patrol leader) earn that honor within the year.

Although Scouting takes much of Benedict's time (2 hours each Monday night and the numerous other camping and Scout related activities) he plans to stay with it for many more years.

Benedict pointed out that his job has been made easier this year through the work of Mrs

Carole Klein and commended her job as institutional representative through the school.

In his own manner of "calling 'em as he sees 'em," Benedict sees Mrs Klein as a person who pushed ahead to do a job that no one else would do.

As a matter of fact, that's a pretty good description of Benedict himself, a man devoted to Scouting.

DeWitt's St Jude's to hold first Mass in new church

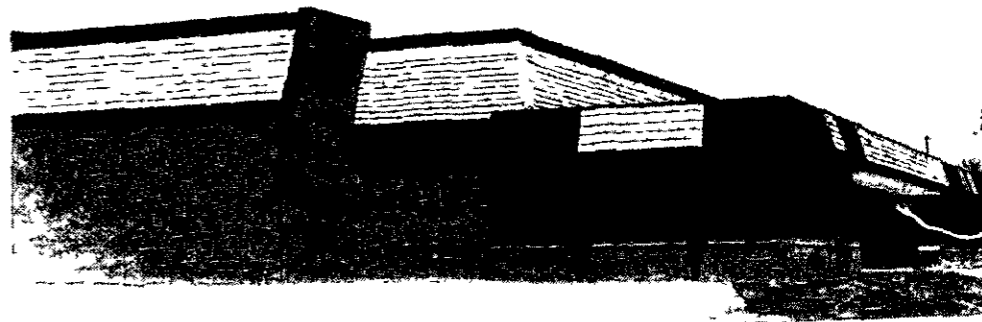

Owosso woman joins Senate race



MRS MABEL STOLZ

A well-known name in county Democratic politics, Mrs. Mabel Stolz, has filed as a candidate for the state Senate from the 30th Senatorial District. She joins five others, four Republicans and another Democrat, in seeking the Senate seat being vacated by William S. Ballenger of Williamston who is seeking a spot in the U.S. Congress. The 30th Senatorial District is made up of all of Clinton County, all of Eaton County, except Sunfield Township, a large part of Ingham,

Shiawassee and Gratiot counties and additional townships from Barry, Jackson, Calhoun and Montcalm counties.

Mrs. Stolz, long active in government and political party affairs, was chairman of the Shiawassee County Democratic Committee from July 1963 to December 1967 and from March 1970 to May 1971.

She was a delegate to the Democratic National Convention in 1964 and served on the Credentials Committee that year. In 1968 she was also a delegate to the convention in Chicago and was a member of the Platform and Resolutions Committee.

A former teacher, Mrs. Stolz graduated from Central Michigan University in 1938 and has done graduate work at CMU and the University of Michigan. While a teacher she served as president of the Owosso Education Association (OEA) three times, served as a delegate to the regional council of the Michigan Education Association (MEA) and as a representative to the state

board for the Michigan Educator's Public Affairs Council.

In announcing her candidacy, Mrs. Stolz had the following comments:

"We know our state and nation has been, and still is, very wasteful of our resources. In a world where it can be seen that our resources are not inexhaustible, that our planet has limits in size and materials, we must realize we should stop behaving as if our natural wealth is never-ending.

"We need to look at our resources with thrifty eyes. We must have legislation that will plan for the future as well as the present concerning our air, land, water and mineral needs.

"We must try to provide situations in which the people of our state and nation can best live and work, but with careful thought for the future. This means a change in levying and allocation of tax money, for it is a resource too.

"It means an emphasis on education, and to a greater degree than at present, on practical training which helps

in making a living. It means combating crime through destroying its sources such as drugs and drug abuse, joblessness and lack of skills as well as through policing.

"Various groups in our society are looking for answers to our problems. Legislators are not the only searchers for the right decisions, but legislators are often the ones who choose which actions will be tried. Do we really have to wait until we have no more oil before we make use of wind power or solar energy?"

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Mural is photo history of St Johns

ST. JOHNS - A page of history became part of the St. Johns Municipal Building recently when workmen put the final touches to a photographic mural contributed to the community by Clinton National Bank and Trust Company.

The 50-foot mural, which hung above the teller line in the bank's main office in St. Johns for 20 years, was removed during a major remodeling of the building 2 years ago and after being mounted in the auditorium of the municipal building received the addition of a plaque commemorating the bank's gift.

Schuyler Marshall, a former publisher for the Clinton County News, and William Leucht, former CNB&T president, were instrumental in advancing the idea for the mural and encouraging its placement in the bank. Both men were long-time residents of St. Johns area, active in community affairs, and hoped to capture a bit of local history with the mural.

Approximately 5x50 feet, the montage depicts numerous scenes of the Clinton County area representing the various

aspects of the rural community life. Photographs of several persons continuing to reside in the area are part of the mural and visitors to the municipal auditorium will readily recognize landmarks that distinguish the area today.

In presenting a plaque for the mural, CNB&T chairman and senior vice president John Rumbaugh expressed hope that the attitudes and serene life of rural America suggested by scenes in the mural will continue to be part of the local scene. "Our intent in contributing this mural," he said, "was to encourage continued acceptance of the things that have made our community such a fine place to live. Perhaps by having this mural in a public location, it will serve as an excellent reminder of how fortunate we are to live in Clinton County."

The mural was composed by a Grand Rapids photographic firm from the negatives of film on file at the Clinton County News. Ink White, owner-publisher of the paper following Marshall, provided negatives and assistance in the development of the mural.

Persons interested in joining the Historical Society are reminded of the meeting July 18 at 8 p.m. in the DeWitt Municipal Building.

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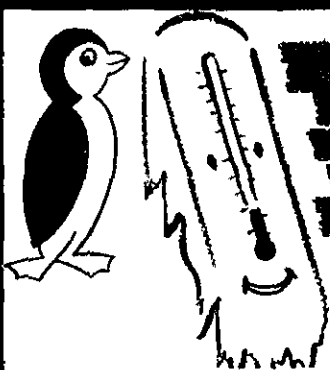
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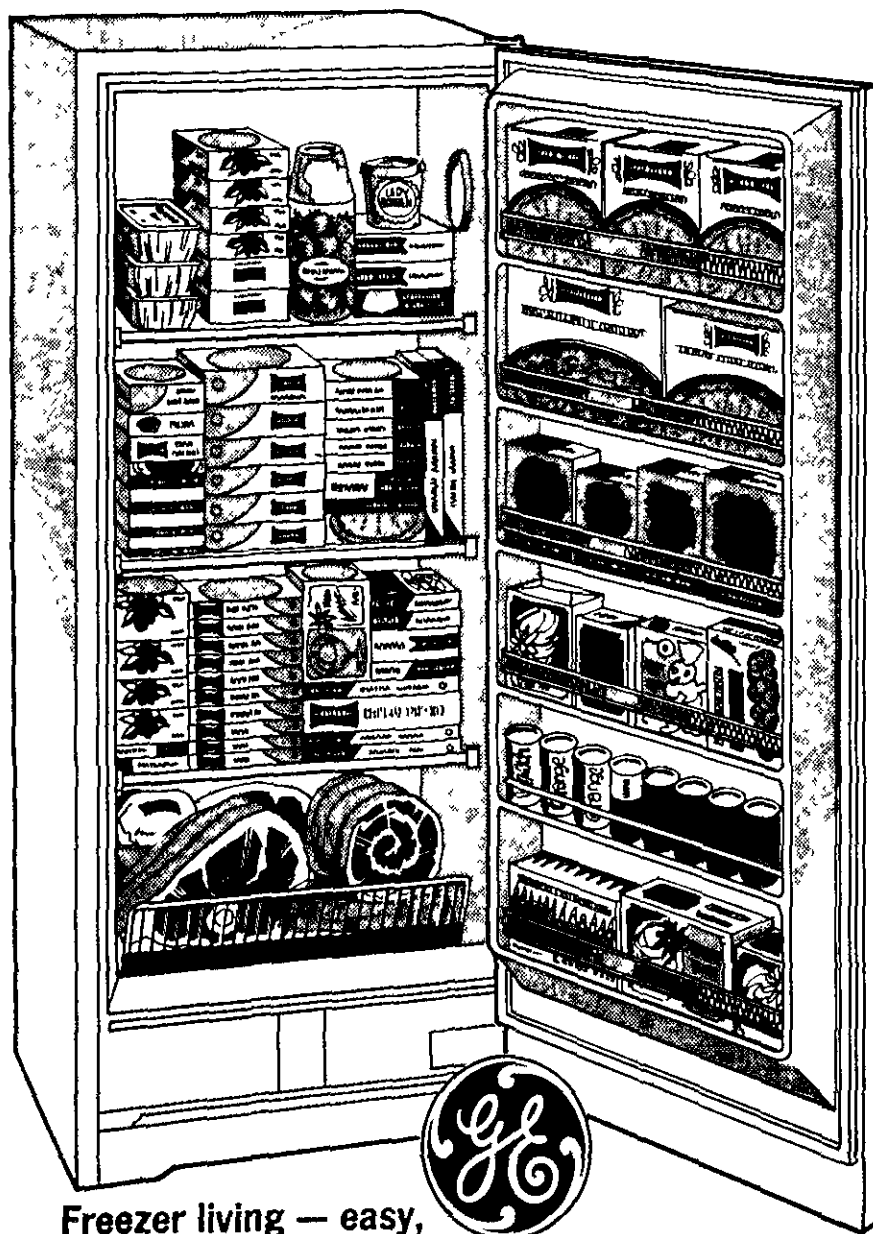

New group aids parents in time of tragedy

A small child is hit by a car and dies. The family is left shocked and grief stricken. For a short period of time the parents are flooded with letters of sympathy and visits from friends and relatives. Then it all stops.

The parents are alone, isolated, people avoid talking about the lost child. Presumably this isn't because the friends, neighbors and relatives don't care, but more likely because they don't know how to deal with the situation.

According to Gil Derath, Ph.D., director of Child and Adolescent Services of the Community Mental Health Board, "A conspiracy of silence occurs with people not knowing what to say to do."

At the present time, very little is available in the way of supportive services for parents who have lost children through accident or illness. "Mourning and grief are things that need to be dealt with, they need to be experienced."

Our society does provide some kinds of things in the way of funerals, etc. but they are very brief kinds of things."

A Lansing area couple who lost a child recently have been instrumental in attempting to form a self-help group for parents of deceased children in

Clinton, Eaton and Ingham Counties.

"For your own mental health it helps to know that your feelings are not that different from those of other people that have gone through the same thing." These groups have been formed in other cities and have proven to be an effective aide to helping people share their grief and adapt more successfully.

The groups are based on the premise that parents who have suffered a similar loss will be able to help each other in a way that no friend, neighbor or relative could ever do. The goal is to work through the grief to the maximum extent possible.

The Community Mental Health Board has offered their facilities as a meeting place and will provide back-up services wherever needed. It is important to note, however, that this is not a mental health program.

It is a group of parents attempting to help each other through a difficult time. All meetings will be conducted by the participating parents in whatever way they see fit.

EAST LANSING - Pamela Darling of Ovid has been named among the 50 outstanding senior women at Michigan State University.

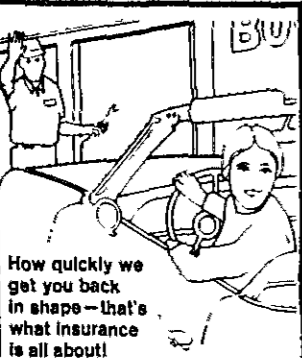
The women were nominated by students or faculty on the basis of their service, leadership and scholastic qualities. Mortar Board, a national women's honor society, chose

Michigan National receives help in affiliation battle

Michigan National Corporation announced today that the Comptroller of the Currency has taken action to intervene in favor of Michigan National Corporation in its battle with the Justice Department. At stake is Michigan National Corporation's proposed affiliation with Central Bank, N.A., Grand Rapids and Valley National Bank, Saginaw.

The Justice Department has filed civil action in U.S. District Court to prevent the affiliation of the two banks with Michigan National Corporation. Both of these affiliations have been approved by the Comptroller of the Currency and the Board of Governors of the Federal Reserve System.

The Comptroller, as a part of the U.S. Treasury Department, is responsible for the administration of bank charters. Specifically, the office grants authority to commence banking business. This includes approval authority of new banks and proposed branches of existing banks.

The US Treasury Department's recent campaign to recirculate copper pennies has met with broad support across the country.

So much so, in fact, that director of the Mint, Mary Brooks, has lowered the requirements for awarding the special citation for participating in the plan.

According to Mrs Brooks, vacation time has brought on a number of inquiries from youngsters who felt the original \$25 was high.

As a result of this, anyone

depositing a total of \$5 worth of copper pennies at any participating bank will become eligible to receive a printed plaque honoring them for their patriotic gesture toward recovering pennies for circulation.

Persons wishing to participate in the program and earn their special citation plaque may deposit their pennies with Clinton National Bank and Trust Company, an area bank participating in the program.

larceny in a building. He was given credit for 39 days already served and parole was continued on a previous conviction.

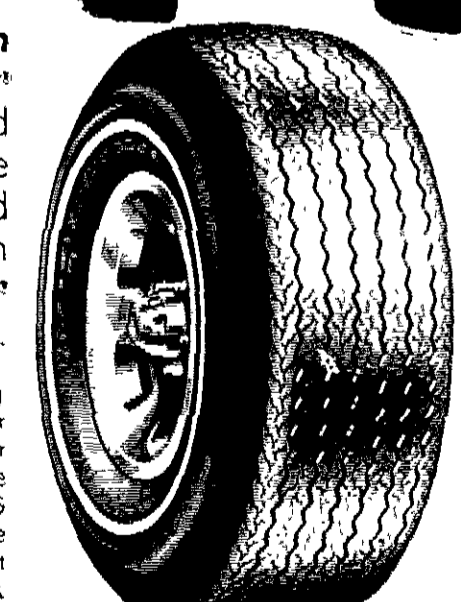

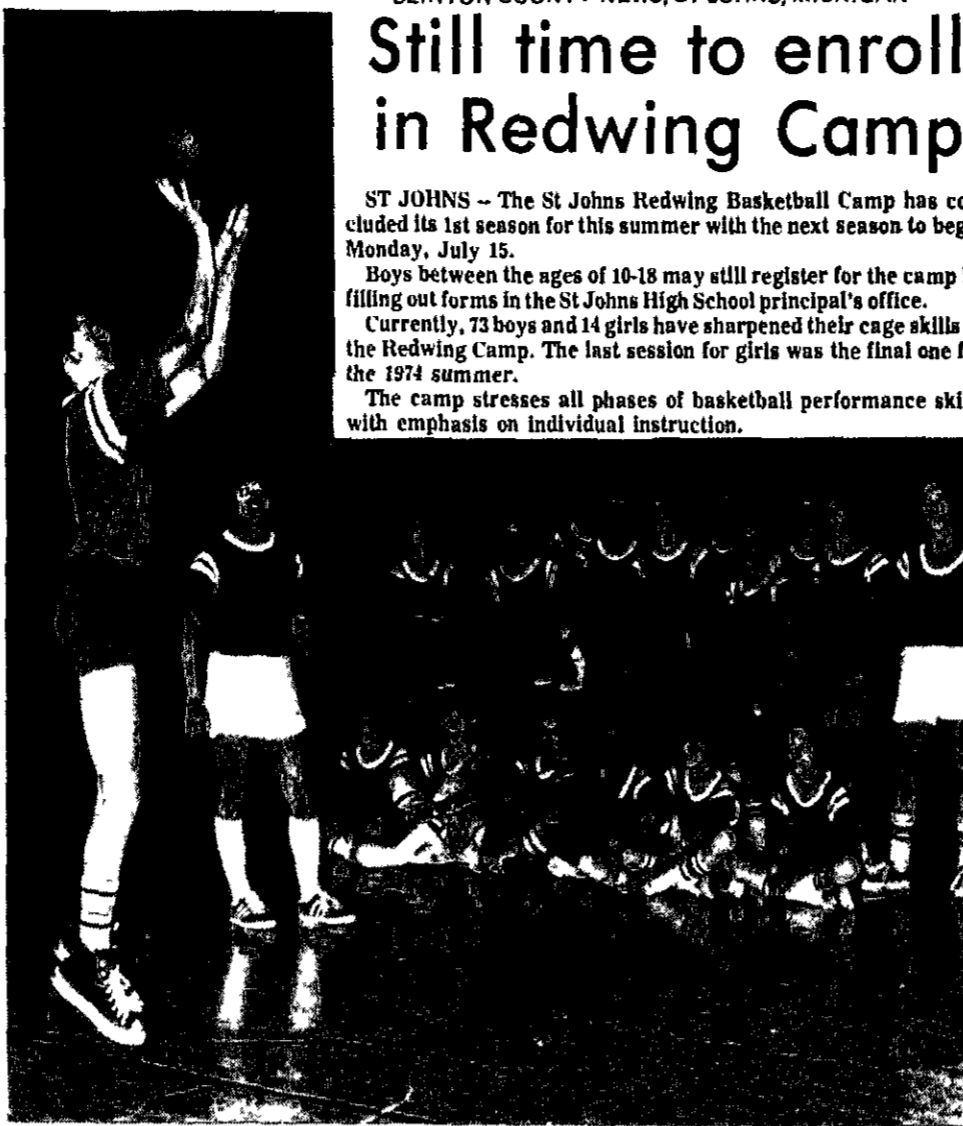

Sports vs books

While Jim Fitzgerald is on vacation, we are repeating some of his all-time favorite columns by popular request of his mother and Aunt Madeline.

After exhaustive study, 2 psychologists have reported that sports do not build character. Being a football star does not make Johnny a better person.

20,000 high school coaches just slit their jockstraps.

But I am laughing. I am remembering a basketball coach who was also a history teacher. He couldn't understand how I could be 5 foot tall and not want to play basketball. Every time he graded my history assignment, he subtracted 10% because I was a sissy and 15% because St Stephen High was in last place in the St Clair County League and it was all my fault.

HE WAS ONE of those coaches who insisted Lincoln would never have been elected president if he hadn't been a little leaguer. World War 2 would be won on the West Point football field, he said, and France fell to Germany because French kids never learned how to play shortstop.

If that coach is still alive today, he probably thinks the world's greatest sissies are Dr Bruce Ogilvie and Dr Thomas Tulko, psychology professors at San Jose State College in California. For 8 years they tested 15,000 athletes, worked with 27 professional teams and hundreds of high school and college teams. And they concluded there is nothing to support the traditional idea that sports build character.

"Indeed," they said, "there is evidence that athletic competition limits growth in some areas . . . athletic competition has no more beneficial effects than intense endeavor in any other field."

So there, coach. 30 years later, my judgment is vindicated by experts. I never could understand how running around in public in my underwear would make me editor of the New York Times.

IT'S NOT THAT I don't like sports. As a boy, I went to all the games and crawled around under the bleachers, looking for dropped money. That's how I became a fan. I still attend more games today than most normal men. I take my son along to pick up the money although I get half if I see it first.

The other day my mother came visiting and got her first look at the recreation room recently installed in my basement. Dear old mom remembers my hyper-relaxed boyhood better than anyone. She remembers when I delivered newspapers on foot and my dad looked out the window and swore he had to line me up with some trees to see whether I was moving.

"You have finally achieved your boyhood ambition," mother said. "You have your own pool table and your own bar with running water and cold beer. I am so proud of you."

I explained to her that it was, shucks, really nothing. And I asked her if she had been worried, those many years ago, about a son who never went out for school sports.

"YOU WERE always sitting around the house reading," she remembered, "while the other boys were out playing ball. I asked you once if you thought you'd grow up to be a great man and you said you'd rather grow up to be a great reader."

Hmmm. I wonder if books build character? I don't remember any teacher ever saying so. I never won a letter for my sweater for reading. There were never any pretty cheerleaders chanting: "Go man, read that sentence, understand that paragraph. Rah rah."

"I'll bet you're glad I built my character with books instead of sports," I told mother.

"You bet," she said. "All you ever read were comic books."

Fishing the "dog days"

ALMA - July and August are commonly called the "dog days" of summer.

Fishing, during these two months, is generally agreed to be the toughest of all the year. Excuses for not catching fish, at this difficult time are countless. "Waters too hot", "The fish all lose their teeth at this time of year and as a result their mouths are sore"

These commonly held excuses are not correct, of course, but with so few fish being taken something must be wrong. We'll attempt to explain why light stringers are the rule for these hot days of summer.

First of all, most fishermen have fair success in the Spring Casting the shorelines produces very well at this time of year. In the Spring the fish move into the shallow shorelines for this is the water that warms first. Later on the fish spawn in these same shallows.

When the temperature of the lake water begins to climb, the fish complete their spawning activity and begin a mass movement toward the deeper water in the lake. Each fish has a particular temperature preference or comfort zone.

As the hot sun of July and August heats the shallows this preferred water temperature is found only in the deep water. The fish will now spend most of his time in the very deep water until the lake cools again in the Fall.

The fish will move from his deep water "home" toward the shallows to feed even during the hottest days of summer. He will usually not stay away from the comfortable deep water for any extended periods. Once he has fed, he will spend very little time returning to the safety of the deep water.

Therefore, if we understand that these fish spend a very small part of the day in shallow

waters, (less than 10 feet deep) it would seem futile to cast the shorelines hour after hour. Yet many fishermen, remembering their Springtime success, continue to fish the shorelines all summer! They should turn around! 90% of the fish are behind them!

Don't misunderstand. Sometimes when the fish are actively feeding, the shallow water fisherman may find the fishing great. More often than not the fisherman who is fishing deep running or bottom bumping baits will out-fish the shallow water one many times over.

If you insist on casting the shorelines, I would suggest you do it at night or on windy or cloudy days.

In addition to seeking comfortable water temperatures, fish tend to avoid bright sunlight. On those beautiful sunny days of July and August the light penetrates very deeply into the water. Fish have no eyelids and therefore they avoid light whenever possible.

A dark and cloudy day at this time of year might provide you with an excellent opportunity to limit out.

Because the water temperature and the temperature of the fish's body are the same it follows that warm water means warm fish. Warm fish means an increase in its metabolism rate. (That means all body functions speed; any increase in this metabolism rate means the

fish needs more food to fuel its body. So, contrary to popular beliefs, a fish actually feeds more in the summer than in colder weather.

In addition to fishing deep at this time of year, try night fishing.

The period between 10 pm and 2 am seems to be a prime time to take lunker bass. Try fishing over sunken islands. You can fish much shallower at night than you might during the day. Most importantly, fish faster (lure speed) when the water warms.

County to receive funds for two safety programs

LANSING - State Senator William S Ballenger has announced Clinton County will receive almost \$1000 as the state's share of the cost of conducting its marine and snowmobile safety programs.

The payments represent two-thirds of the approved expenditures for the 2 programs conducted last year, Ballenger said.

The payments include \$524.62 for conducting the marine safety program and \$399.24 for conducting the snowmobile safety programs.

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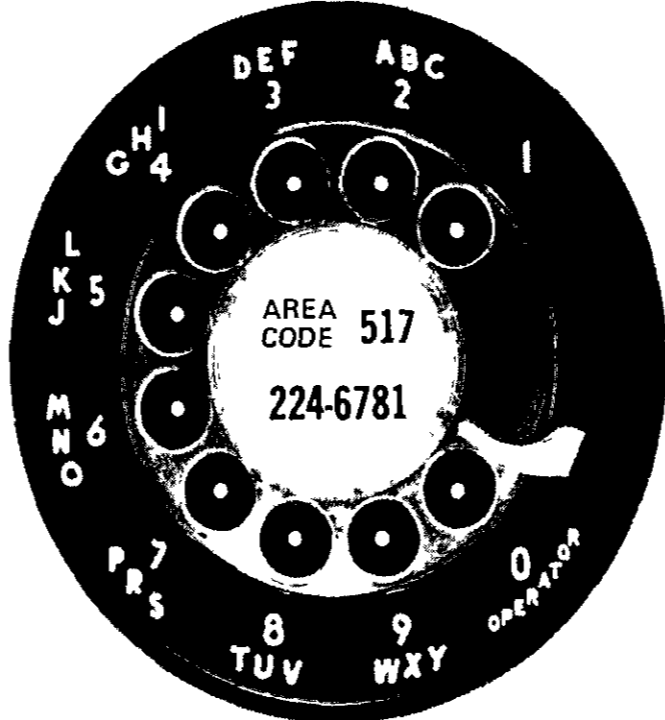
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Chloe's Column

"Some of the best toys are free"

We may not all agree with the song, "The Best Things in Life are Free," but there are a lot of free or very inexpensive items around your home that would make excellent toys for your children. Maybe there's an idea here you can use for summertime fun at your house.

A is for Acoustic Tile — used with colored gold tees for a peg board.

B is for Blocks — make by putting two milk cartons together.

C is for Coffee Cans — make into drums by using a plastic lid on each end. Various sizes of cans can be fun to stack.

D is for Dough — 2 cups flour, 1 cup salt, and enough water to make it easy to use. This should be stored in a coffee can or other air tight container.

E is for Egg Beater — used with soap flakes and water. The soap can be used to finger paint, to frost old tree branches, or to just enjoy with the egg beater.

F is for Findings — buttons, beads, feathers, pieces of pretty paper, and anything to sort, string, and paste.

G is for Grocery — empty boxes, cans and bags to use in stores and play houses.

H is for Hats — Mom's and Dad's old ones to use with other old clothes for dress-up.

I is for Inner Tubes — they

make ponds to fish in, baskets for balls and bean bags, boats, etc. It's fun just to roll on them, tug them, and bounce on them.

J is for Jello — and other things the children can help cook.

K is for Keys — the old ones left from no longer used locks. These are used to just carry in a purse or a pocket.

L is for Lotto Matching Games — made with magazine pictures.

M is for Macaroni — with different kinds of cereal shapes. Paste these to a paper plate, board, box or paper. Macaroni can be painted, dyed with dye, or food coloring.

N is for Nutshells — walnut halves, especially, for making boats. Add a toothpick mast and a paper sail.

O is for Old Boxes — which become a doll house, car, boat or plane, or a cage for toy animals, or lots of other things.

P is for Plastic Bottles — used to fill with sand outside or for pouring water at the sink. Two plastic milk cartons put together make good blocks.

Q is for Q-tips — used with toothpicks or other things to make pasted collage pictures.

R is for Ribbons — those left from packages, etc. These can be used for pasting, cutting, stringing, or to wear for dress-up.

S is for Spools — Dyed with dye. String them, hammer them, or use them to paint with.

T is for Tin Cans — to fill with sand, use in a grocery store, or to make a container for blowing bubbles with soapy water and a straw.

U is for Utensils — from the kitchen, the measuring spoons, metal cups, wooden spoons, cookie cutters, etc. Some make a rhythm band. Others make painting tools. Still others are fun to use with the flour and salt dough.

V is for Vinegar — added to Easter egg dye, used to dye egg shells for pasting, or used to dye spoons for stringing.

W is for Wood — scrap pieces for hammering and sawing.

X is for X-mas cards and other greeting cards cut up for puzzles, or used for cutting and pasting.

Y is for Yarn — to paste or use for stringing.

Z is for ZBT baby powder cans or other cans with a screw on lid to use for a rhythm band shaker.

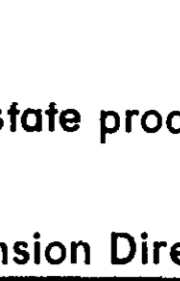

FOLIAR FEEDING CUES
If foliar feeding isn't done correctly measurable damage to the crop is possible. Some suggestions to increase nutrient intake and reduce possible crop damage are: (1) apply foliar sprays on a cloudy, cool day early in the morning or late afternoon. (2) apply sprays when plants are not wilted. (3) apply foliar sprays with a wetting agent (sticker-spreader). (4) use a minimum of 30 gallons of water.

Jim's Column

Milk--1 of purest state products

When mother pours her family a glass of Grade A milk, she can depend on it being one of Michigan's purest products.

Even though 34 of the state's more than 12,000 dairy herds have been quarantined due to feed contamination, the consumer public need not doubt the quality of milk they are drinking.

This is attributed to the wide variety of regulations placed on the producer and milk manufacturer.

"No food item that I know of has as many safeguards as milk," says Dr. C. A. Lassiter, chairman, MSU dairy science department. "In fact, it is to the point that sometimes producers feel they are discriminated against."

Lassiter said that the Michigan Department of Agriculture (MDA) maintains stringent requirements for herd health and milk production. Herds are kept under strict regulation for such communicable diseases as TB and brucellosis, which for all practical purposes are no longer present in Michigan.

An example of the type of health program is brucellosis control. Every cow kept for herd purposes must be vaccinated. Careful records are kept for vaccination, and every two years all Michigan cattle undergo a blood test. Every six months, every cow is given a brucellosis ring test.

The milk supply is almost constantly watched from the cow to the display case in the grocery store.

State inspectors maintain a constant check on the cleanliness of milking equipment at the farm the bulk storage equipment, and the trucks that haul the milk to the plants and the plants themselves.

Every Grade producer in Michigan is subject to thorough inspections. He must meet all the qualifications for sanitation and milk quality to keep his permit to sell milk. Milk at the farm level is checked for antibiotics, water content, butyrate and solids (nutritional quality). In areas where there is pesticide spraying, herds and milk are checked for possible residue.

This is particularly frequent at this time of year in counties with heavy fruit production where inspectors constantly watch for contamination. At some milk plant manufacturing locations, MDA inspections are augmented by Federal Drug Administration (FDA) tests. "The FDA monitors all milk shipped interstate, and we have a lot of milk trading between Ohio, Indiana and Wisconsin," Lassiter related. He cites the Livonia Kroger plant which sells milk in Ohio and Pennsylvania. This type of trade comes under interstate regulation. "The federal inspectors are in the Livonia plant all the time. The milk is kept under constant surveillance to insure purity of

the product leaving the plant," Lassiter said. He added that inspectors frequently buy bottled milk at the retail level to check for heavy metals (mercury or lead). If a trace element does appear in the sample bought, it will be backtracked through the milk plant to the hauler and to the single producer. "Because people of all ages drink milk, very low tolerances are allowed in milk. Nothing harmful to human health is going to be allowed in milk," Lassiter emphasized.

He added that the milk industry itself maintains programs which help insure good quality of their product. There isn't much that anyone can do to milk and get away with it and consumers can rest assured that the product bought on the shelf is going to be safe to drink.

Carefully structured network of checks and surveillances by the MDA, FDA and the milk industry can immediately detect when something is wrong with milk quality.

And though news is made when a problem is found, it is those safeguards that insure a continually safe flow of milk to Michigan families.

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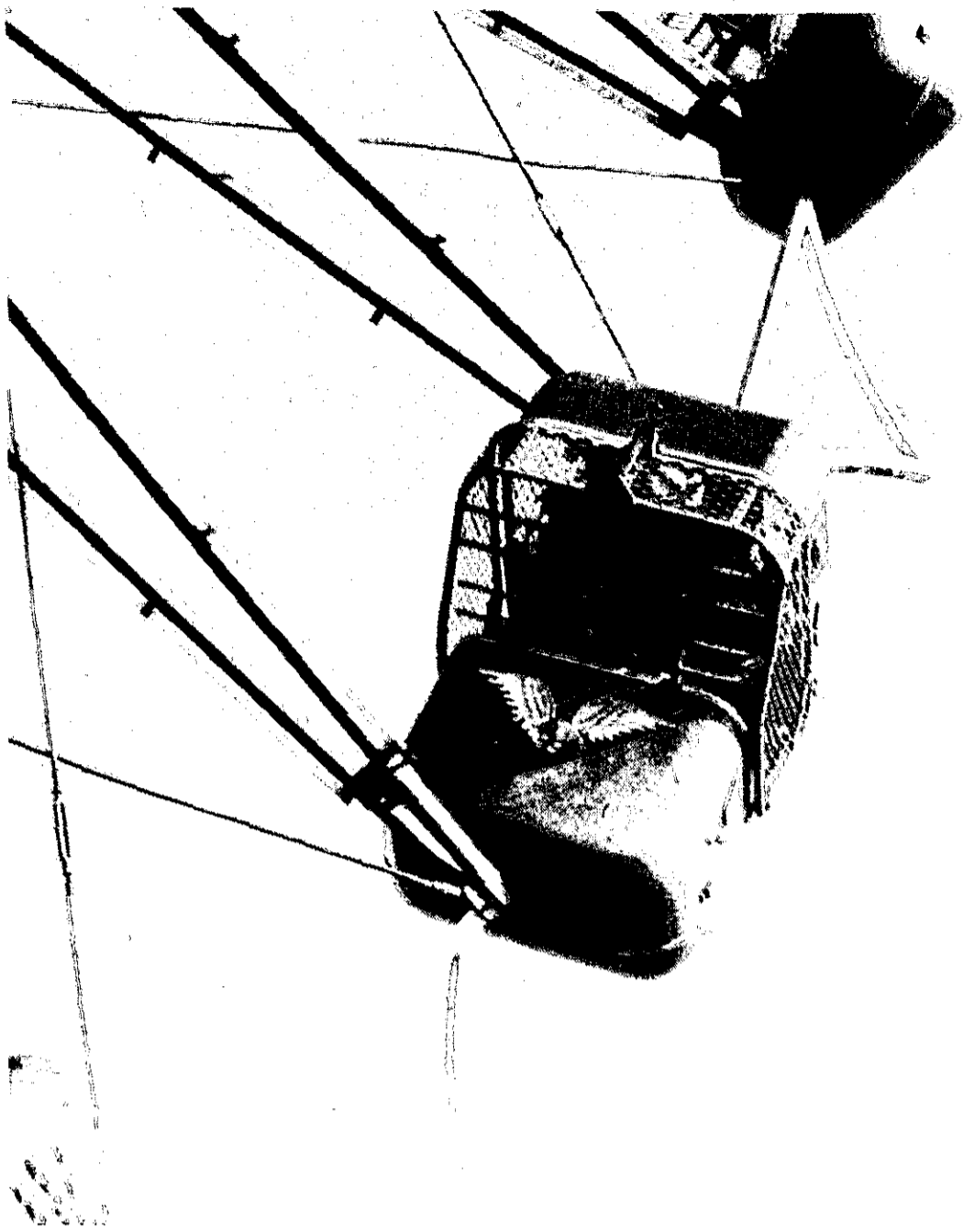
