County fails in appeal of equalization report

ST JOHNS - Clinton County officials have received word that a county-wide appeal of the county equalization report including a factor from the State Tax Commission has been denied.

In a letter to Ernest Carter, county clerk, secretary of the Tax Commission Edward Kane said the appeals from 15 townships and the City of St Johns because of a time limitation.

Kane said that state regulations require appeals be made within 5 days of the adoption of the equalization report.

According to the letter from Kane, that date would have been April 23.

The Clinton County Board of Commissioners adopted the equalization report April 23.

Appeals from the townships and City of St Johns were made in a time span from July 2 to July 9.

Appealing were the townships of DeWitt, Bingham, Eagle, Essex, Greenbush, Lebanon, Olive, Ovid, Riley, Victor, Watertown, Westphalia, Bath, Dallas and Duplain and St Johns.

A story citing the results of the state factor was published in last week's County

News, accompanied by multipliers individual units will have to apply to their tax roles.

CORRECTION

Due to typographical errors, 2 figures in last week's story about the factor in St Johns were not correct.

The amount of fluctuation the state allows in assessments is 49% 51%, instead of 40-51% as was published.

Also, a \$20,000 home in St Johns would have increased in value from 1972 to 1974 by 5% instead of 5 1/2 as was reported.

by David "Roy" VanSickle when he left to take a position as city tax assessor for Petoskey.

Woodruff first came to Bath township as a resident of the Park Lane area in 1958. He moved to Lansing in 1966 and after a 5-year stay, returned to Bath township in 1971 as a resident of Bath. In 1971, he opened a snowmobile sales and later turned it into Woody's Auto Sales, of which he is co-owner.

Health Dept expresses concern over landfill-bound litter on Watertown Twp roadsides

WATERTOWN TWP - Don Oderkirk, Mid-Michigan Health Dept sanitarian reports the Health Dept is concerned with the amount of roadside litter along the highways of Clinton County and, in particular, the 7-mile stretch of Grand River Ave (old US-16) between Airport Rd and M-100.

He said the majority of that litter falls from vehicles enroute to the Grand River Landfill.

Recent surveys, he said, indicate private individuals hauling their own refuse on a weekly or monthly schedule contribute a significant amount of the litter.

The remainder of the litter falls from commercial haulers with improperly

covered refuse. Oderkirk said that the litter could be eliminated if everyone, including all private and commercial haulers kept their refuse covered while enroute to the landfill.

Commercial haulers, who are required to be licensed, are also required to have their refuse covered in the truck. Oderkirk said the law is being enforced by local and state law enforcement agencies.

He said commercial haulers in Clinton County may apply for a license at the Health Dept branch office, 106 Maple St, St Johns, telephone 224-2195.

LITTER VIOLATION PENALTY Oderkirk added the state litter law allows

for a maximum fine of \$500 or 90 days in jail, which is applicable to individual private users of the landfill who do not have their refuse properly covered, resulting in a litter situation.

He said law enforcement agencies have been asked to "rigidly enforce" the litter law in the Grand River Ave area.

CONSIDER PROPERTY OWNERS

Aside from the legal aspects of the litter situation, Oderkirk asks those using the landfill to consider the plight of property owners in the area who find their property littered with other peoples' trash.

Banghart seeks 56th GOP spot

William Banghart of Eaton County formally announced his candidacy Friday for the Republican nomination for State Representative from the 56th District. The seat is being vacated by Dale Warner (R-Eaton Rapids).

Banghart is a legislative analyst for Republican members of the State House of Representatives, a position he has held since 1971. He is assigned to the constituent relations section, and also serves as a staff assistant to the House Republican Task Force on Taxation.

Banghart will be taking a leave from his job at the Capitol to campaign fulltime for the Republican legislative nomination.

In announcing his candidacy, Banghart stressed the importance of a full understanding

of the legislative process. "Over the next 2 years our State Representative will cast some 2,000 votes, and appropriate billions of dollars of taxpayers' money," said Banghart. "Our new State Representative must have a working awareness of the legislative process."

"Since 1971 I have written bills and resolutions, attended committee meetings and hearings, served as a staff aide to 2 task forces, and researched hundreds of requests for legislative information," said Banghart. "I believe that this practical experience can be applied during the 1975-76 legislative session."

The 56th District includes Eagle and Watertown Townships from Clinton County. Banghart indicated that he regards Eagle and Watertown Townships as very important parts of the 56th District, and that he will be in Clinton County many times between now and Aug 6th.

Long active in the Republican Party, Banghart has served as a delegate to Eaton County Republican conventions and as a member of his County Republican Executive Committee. In 1970 he served as Chairman of the Republican State Convention Delegate Apportionment Committee.

Bath Twp updates fire dept communication system

BATH TWP -- The Bath Twp Board of Trustees meeting was opened Monday night by the new township supervisor Thomas (Woody) Woodruff.

The business began with the purchasing of 30 radios for the Township Fire Dept.

With the present phone system becoming obsolete, the new radios will increase efficiency, according to trustee Daniel Carlton.

At present DeWitt, Maple

Rapids and St. Johns uses the system, known as Plectron.

The cost for the program will be \$4821.61.

PLANS FOR NEW OFFICER -- During the meeting, it was announced the township was planning on hiring a new full-time policeman with the county funding the 3d officer through a federally funded program.

The township will receive a minimum of \$8500 and is eligible for a maximum of \$10,000.

POSSIBLE TAX FACTOR -- It was announced that Bath Twp's appeal to the State Tax Commission in reference to a 10% factor has been denied.

Richard Hawks, county commissioner, stated the Tax Commission has been studying the 1973 property taxes in Bath and the township may have to have a 25% factor placed upon them for last year's taxes.

The final figures are still tentative.

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Shinabery campaigns for Board re-election

A Greenbush man long associated with county and township government has announced his intention to seek reelection by entering his name in the Republican primary election set for Aug. 6.

Derrill M. Shinabery, former Greenbush Township Supervisor and now chairman of the Clinton County Commission, announced his candidacy this week emphasizing his concern for continued streamlining of government along with careful consideration of finances. Shinabery, who has been associated with township or county levels of government for the past 17 years, was recently instrumental in the acquisition of the building which now houses district court, a move he feels will continue to reflect savings to taxpayers.

"During my years in local government," Shinabery commented, "the previous board of supervisors and now the commission has accomplished a great deal without asking the taxpayers for special funds. We have very good facilities in Clinton County and

it will continue to be my goal to maintain this record for our people."

Shinabery was a member of the former county board of supervisors for 11 years, leaving only when, by law, that body was obliged to reorganize

itself from a membership of 22 to 11. For three years, he served as township supervisor until he was appointed to the commission post vacated by Andrew Cobb. That appointment came in 1972 and was followed by his election that fall.

During his 14 years on the county level, he has served 4 terms, including his present, as chairman of the county board, and under his encouragement, committees of the commission have been cut from 21 to 5. "This has brought about a greater level of efficiency in our county government," Shinabery commented, "and has centralized a lot of activities that previously were a bit too widespread."

The committee cut resulted in categories devoted to finance, government and personnel, land use, health, and property management. Shinabery said his direction in the cut came from past experience for during his years of service he had served on all of the 21 former standing committees.

Shinabery was instrumental in forming the County Association of Assessors which was the first group of its type in the state. "With the restructuring of the board of supervisors to the board of commissioners," Shinabery explained, "there was little reason for the township supervisors to get together. I felt there was a need for their meeting periodically and so we formed the association." Similar groups have since sprung up in virtually every county throughout the state.

In addition to his local activities, Shinabery has been working on matters pertaining to the tri-county area of Clinton, Eaton, and Ingham. He is currently serving as vice chairman of the Tri-County Manpower Consortium, an activity designed to extend training opportunities to persons lacking work skills.

Shinabery and his wife, Laura, reside in Greenbush Township where he previously farmed 200 acres for many years. The couple have 4 daughters and one son, none of whom are living at home.

Don Gilson opens campaign for County Board election

ST. JOHNS - A life-long St. Johns resident is seeking nomination for a 2d term as a county commissioner at the Republican primary election to be held Tuesday, Aug. 6.

Donald A. Gilson, 5th district commissioner representing the eastern segment of St. Johns, is nearing completion of his first term of office which also included serving as vice-chairman of the board of commissioners. Along with this dual role Gilson has served as chairman of the personnel and government committee and has had a number of other com-

Gilson entered local political activities 3 years ago following retirement from Federal Mogul Corp where he was employed for 22 years as personnel director. Previous to that position he was in the retail field for 18 years associated with A&P Food Stores.

For the past 2 1/2 years he has dealt in real estate with the Houghton Agency in St. Johns. Gilson said his background and current work has provided experience that has been valuable in his role as county commissioner and chairman of the personnel committee. "The work as a county commissioner has been, for the most part, quite enjoyable," Gilson commented. "I have found much satisfaction in serving as a commissioner and being a part of our county government. I am looking forward to continuing in the post."

Gilson and his wife, Muriel, reside at 601 S. Oakland. The couple has 1 son, Kenneth, a resident of Bingham Township.

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Cropsey campaigns for State Senate

DEWITT - Harmon Cropsey, RR 3, DeWitt, has announced his candidacy for the 30th Senatorial District which includes all of Clinton County, and parts of 8 other counties in South central Michigan.

In announcing his candidacy, Harmon Cropsey emphasized four points of major concern: "1. Insuring a fair deal for the farmers of Michigan so they will be rewarded for their efforts and not be harassed with bureaucratic red tape and confiscatory taxes."

"2. That young people might have a sound moral education that would prepare them for a lifetime of service. The drug blight must be eliminated by putting pushers out of business."

"3. Taxes and state expenditures must be effectively dealt with to bring Michigan in line with other industrial states to encourage business to stay and expand so our young people will have employment."

"For example, On July 5 at 3:30 pm the last six employees of the John Bean Company in Lansing checked out for the last time. The six had spent the last few months crating machinery for shipment to the new plant in Arkansas. Just a year ago 230 people were employed at the Lansing plant. This trend must be reversed or Michigan will become an industrial wasteland."

"4. Keeping tax dollars at home. 25% of the recent gasoline tax increase is being diverted to mass transit so Detroit residents can have Dial-A-Ride bus service at our expense. It is time to call a halt to this tax drain! Every county in the 30th District needs all its road funds for local improvement."

Cropsey was reared on a livestock farm in SW Michigan where he was active in 4-H and FFA. He was awarded a 4-H

scholarship to MSU where he majored in animal husbandry and was a member of the livestock judging team in 1937. After three years at MSU he transferred to Iowa State University to get specialized training in agricultural extension work. After graduation Cropsey taught animal husbandry at MSU for the 1939 winter short course. He then returned to Iowa to serve as a 4-H Club agent and later as farm manager for the Iowa Canning Company.

During World War II Cropsey was a pilot and navigator in the Navy Air Corps. His overseas assignment was a tour of duty in England flying 43 missions for which he was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross.

Following the war, Cropsey served temporarily as a County Agricultural Agent in Wapello County, Iowa. Starting in the spring of 1946 he spent the next 16 years as a livestock farmer - 5 years in Iowa and 11 years in Cass County, Michigan.

Because of his concern about

the encroachment of bureaucratic control of our educational system, Cropsey discontinued farming in 1962 and has since served as Executive Secretary of Friends of Michigan Schools, the watchdog at the State Capitol for school boards and parents who cherish local autonomy for their schools.

Harmon and Marian Cropsey have 6 children. Robert is a navy doctor, David is a teacher, Alan is a senior in college and Carolyn, George and Lindsay are all at home and involved in school and church affairs.

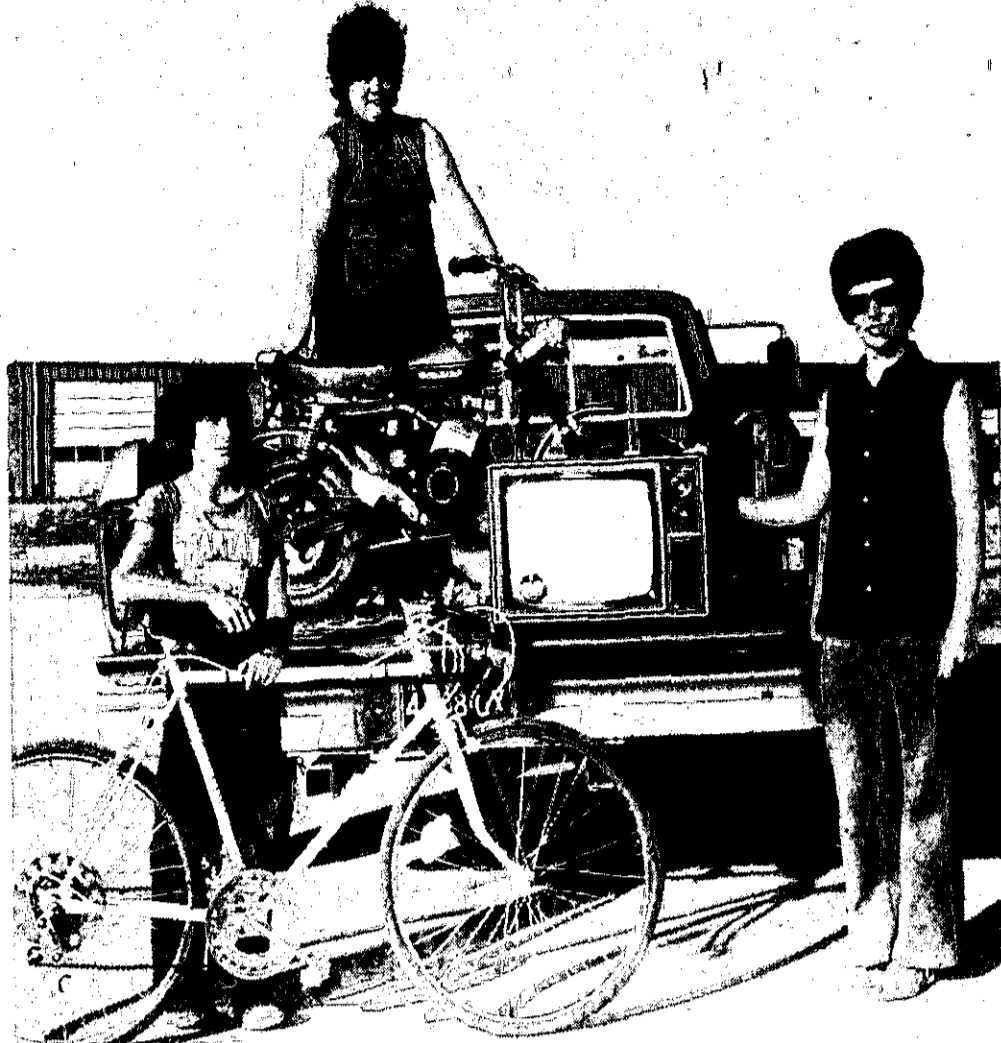

City of St Johns Commission meeting proceedings

CITY COMMISSION MINUTES June 24, 1974

Mayor Wood called the regular meeting of the St. Johns City Commission to order at 7:30 pm.

COMM PRESENT: Arehart, Ebert, Hannah, Wilcox, Wood
COMM ABSENT: None
STAFF PRESENT: Maples, Humphrey, Vermette

Motion by Comm Ebert, supported by Comm Wilcox to approve the minutes of the special meeting of June 6, 1974, and the regular meeting of June 10, 1974. Motion carried.

Mayor Wood asked for additions or deletions to the agenda as presented.

The City Clerk asked for several additions.

Motion by Comm Arehart, supported by Comm Ebert to approve the agenda as amended. Motion carried.

Motion by Comm Ebert, supported by Comm Arehart to approve the revised warrants. Motion carried.

Cecil Smith of 718 S Lansing appeared before the Commission to ask that the Weed Ordinance be amended to include more severe penalties for those persons failing to comply with its provisions.

Discussion followed. Motion by Comm Hannah, supported by Comm Wilcox to authorize the review of the Weed Ordinance and to consider the possibility of rewriting its provisions to be more responsive to the problems. Motion carried.

Mr. Braxton White, President of Clinton National Bank appeared before the Commission and presented a written communication concerning the recent awarding of an account connected with the storm sewer project.

Discussion followed concerning the investment policy of the City Commission.

Motion by Comm Hannah, supported by Comm Wilcox to accept Mr. White's communication and further that it be placed on the table for reconsideration at the July 8 meeting and further that it would be discussed with the City Manager in anticipation of said meeting. Motion carried.

Mrs. Lorraine Smith of 609 S Morton Street appeared before the Commission to again discuss the Fourth of July celebration. She stated she had contacted County Extension Agent Felham and had received his permission to utilize the 4-H grounds for this year's celebration and further that the Fire Chief had also agreed to same, and that all that was now required was the Commission's approval of the relocation.

Mr. Gary Biddinger, President of the St. Johns Firemen then appeared and stated that he had not been contacted as to the relocation and was uncertain as to its effect on the existing contract as well as the safety of the fireworks display.

Mr. Richard Cornwell, Chairman of the Fourth of July celebration was also present.

Discussion followed.

Motion by Comm Wilcox, supported by Comm Arehart that the City Clerk be instructed to write the Fire Chief and that a copy be sent to Mr. Gary Biddinger, asking if it was at all possible the Fourth of July celebration be moved to the 4-H grounds and further, that this location be given consideration also for the 1975 celebration. Motion carried.

Motion by Comm Ebert, supported by Comm Hannah to open the Public Hearing on Ordinance 267. Motion carried.

Mr. Bill Richards of 302 Lindy Lane appeared before the Commission to speak in opposition to the Ordinance. Discussion followed.

Mr. William Searles of Searles Construction also spoke in opposition to the Ordinance.

Mr. Cecil Smith of 718 South Lansing spoke in support of the Ordinance.

Mr. Willard Searles spoke in opposition to the square footage requirement for multi-family uses, stating he felt it was impractical.

Mr. Mark Barber of 304 East State stated that he felt in a multi-family unit designed for senior citizens that the square footage requirement would also be impractical.

Discussion followed. Motion by Comm Hannah, supported by Comm Ebert to close the Public Hearing on Ordinance 267. Motion carried.

Motion by Comm Ebert, supported by Comm Arehart to adopt Ordinance 267. He further asked for a roll call vote. YEA: Arehart, Ebert, Wood. NAY: Hannah, Wilcox. Motion carried. The City Clerk presented a de-

annexation petition from Bingham Township.

Discussion followed concerning the annexation of the property to the City, centering around the zoning process as well as the inclusion of the highway in the property.

Mr. Robert Ebert, representative of proprietor Clarence Ebert, was present and stated he desired annexation in order to obtain municipal utilities.

Motion by Comm Ebert, supported by Comm Wilcox to authorize the City Attorney and the City Clerk to draw an annexation resolution for the Clarence Ebert property and further that the resolution designate the property as being zoned single family residential.

Mayor Wood asked for discussion on the motion. Discussion followed.

The question was called and the vote on the annexation was as follows:

Arehart, Nay; Ebert, Yea; Wilcox, Yea; Wood, Yea; Hannah, Yea. Motion carried.

Motion by Comm Ebert, supported by Comm Hannah to ask the Planning Commission to begin consideration of the ultimate zoning of the annexed property. Motion carried.

The City Clerk then asked for a clarification as to whether the annexation was accepted or just a resolution authorized to be drawn.

The Mayor stated that the property had been annexed by the Ebert/Wilcox motion.

The City Clerk stated that it would be necessary for the Commission to designate the expiration dates of the five new Board of Appeals members.

Motion by Comm Hannah, supported by Comm Ebert to set the Board of Appeals term expiration dates for the five following members as follows:

Member Boak 11/74; Members Smith & Huard 11/75; Members Hicks & Green 11/76. Motion carried.

The City Clerk presented a memo from the City Manager regarding the storm sewer project.

Motion by Comm Wilcox, supported by Comm Arehart to authorize the City Manager to accept the alternate of 7" deep base and 2'4 1/2 suggested by the Contractor and recommended by the engineer. Motion carried.

The City Attorney reported that at the request of the Commission at their last regular meeting, he had researched the CACHPA. He

explained the background and general function of the organization.

Discussion followed concerning the CACHPA and inform them that while the City congratulates them on their fine work, funds for such a request were not budgeted for, and therefore, the City could not participate at this time. Motion carried.

The City Clerk explained that a prior meeting the Commission had authorized any City Commissioner who desired to attend the September League Conference meeting of the MML and appointed the City Manager as the representative delegate, however, an alternate must also be appointed.

Motion by Comm Wilcox, supported by Comm Arehart to appoint Vice-Mayor Ebert as the City's alternate delegate to the MML conference. Motion carried.

The City Clerk presented the

Commission with a communication from Williams & Works concerning what is known as the Sullivan Farm area.

Discussion followed concerning the holding pond as well as the Preliminary Plat.

The City Attorney stated that he had just prior to the meeting, received a revised lease for the holding pond from Mr. Searles and he had not yet had time to compare said lease with the one he had submitted to the Commission at their last regular meeting.

Motion by Comm Hannah, supported by Comm Wilcox to call a special meeting for July 1, 1974 at 7:00 pm to take action on Sullivan Farm Holding Pond Lease and the Searles Estates Preliminary Plat. Motion carried.

The City Clerk read an excerpt from the Planning Commission minutes of June 20, 1974 recommending that the entire block bounded by Mc-

Connell, Prospect, Baldwin and

Lansing Street be rezoned from R-2 to R-3.

Comm Arehart gave the background of the recommendation stating that it had been a result of the Mark Barber rezoning request which was submitted to allow for the adding of apartments at his existing structure at 306 South Lansing Street.

Discussion followed.

Motion by Comm Ebert, supported by Comm Arehart to table the Planning Commission recommendation and to return it to the Planning Commission for their study as to the possibility of rezoning a larger area than previously recommended, and if at all possible to report back to the Commission for their July 8th regular meeting. Motion carried.

The Mayor then asked the City Clerk to contact the Planning Commission as to the content of the aforementioned motion.

The City Clerk stated that the negotiations had taken place

with Mr. John Watts concerning the possibility of purchasing property for a storm sewer holding pond and that a price had been generally arrived at.

Discussion followed concerning the acquisition of the land.

Motion by Comm Ebert, supported by Comm Wilcox to authorize the City Attorney to prepare the necessary legal documents, including title insurance, and to authorize the purchase of the Watts property for the proposed holding pond. Motion carried.

The City Clerk stated that he had received a request from Mr. Ken Kerstead, Vice President of Provincial House Inc asking that the Commission consider the refunding of the 1970 building permit and utilities fees collected in conjunction with the proposed construction on the Provincial House property located on East Sturgis Street. Said construction was never commenced.

Motion by Comm Arehart, supported by Comm Wilcox to return the total amount of \$926.50 to the Provincial House Incorporated, and that a letter accompany the refund with a line item breakdown of the aforementioned amount and further that the Provincial House Incorporated be informed that all permits have been cancelled. Motion carried.

The City Clerk presented a memo on behalf of the City Treasurer requesting approval to pay all invoices rendered by June 30, 1974, pending proper authorization by city department supervisors.

Motion by Comm Ebert, supported by Comm Arehart to authorize the City Treasurer to pay all proper invoices rendered to the City for payment by June 30, 1974. Motion carried.

Motion by Comm Hannah, supported by Comm Ebert to adjourn the meeting. Motion carried.

Mayor Wood declared the meeting adjourned at 9:20 pm.

Dry cleaning problems?

Chloe Padgitt
Clinton County Home Economist



Have you had a dry cleaning dilemma lately? If so, maybe this information from John Criner, Extension Home Economist from Wayne County, may be helpful.

HOW CAN YOU HELP?

Your role begins when you make the purchase. Look to see if the label tells the name of the fibers (for example 65% dacron, 35% wool or cotton, etc.) and make sure the product can be laundered or dry cleaned. Save the tags for future reference if they are not sewn on. If this information is not listed on a tag, ask the store buyer or your dry cleaner.

When you take your clothing to the cleaner, tell him a few things in advance. If a good many articles are involved, pin a note to any that require special care.

For example, point out spots or stains and, if possible, tell the cleaner what caused them. Failure on the part of the customer to identify certain stains may lead to damage that cannot be corrected.

Synthetic fibers such as rayons, polyesters, and acrylics need special care. Include any tags you may have removed from the garments if the tags identify the fabrics or provide cleaning instructions.

Inform him if you want to have water-resistant or spot-resistant finishes restored. They disappear with repeated cleanings but can be renewed, generally at an extra charge. Consider the possibility of shrinkage, particularly with knitted and felt garments. If

you want to have them reshaped, give him your measurements.

Do not use water or chemicals at home to remove spots. This sometimes sets them or damages the color on the garment.

IF A GARMENT OF OTHER PRODUCT HAS BEEN CLEANED OFTEN WITHOUT DAMAGE, AND THEN DAMAGE OCCURS, WHAT MIGHT BE THE REASON?

One factor is age, and how much the garment has been worn or used. All merchandise eventually wears out. Suits and dresses are expected to last 3 to 4 years, coats, 2 or 3 years; and shirts, 1 to 2 years. If damage should occur through the fault of the dry cleaner, the value in dollars and cents is determined proportionately. A nationwide guide establishing standards and life expectancy for consumer textile products has been set up.

Chemical damage is responsible for many consumer complaints. This is often traceable to the customer's own medicine cabinet, kitchen aids, cosmetics, deodorants or cold waving lotion.

Celluloid or other plastics containing nitrocellulose can cause damage. Stored in an air restricted closet, they may decompose, and release nitric acid, searing the fabric. Another possibility is moth or carpet beetle damage. Both insects often finish their meals leaving the skeleton of the fabric intact. No damage is

apparent at first; but when the garment comes back from the cleaner it is full of holes.

Have clothing cleaned before it gets too soiled. Garments which have been stained and are not cleaned soon afterwards may be permanently damaged.

WHAT ABOUT FADING?

Look at your fabrics as soon as they are returned. Do not let several months pass before removing clothes from paper. Check with the dry cleaner immediately on any problems. If fading has occurred, it may be traced to "fume fading". This is a complex color change that takes place when certain types of dyes in some acetate and wool materials are subject to combustion gases in the atmosphere of the home. When

this happens, the fabric becomes streaked or changes color, with or without dry-cleaning. Solution-dyed acetate fabrics do not fade. Some dyes, commonly called "fugitive dyes", may run or rub off even when carefully handled. They may withstand one or two cleanings and then run or fade as their hold on the fiber lessens. Some of the dyes used in synthetics do not penetrate the fabric, and a color change or loss may occur. Check for color fastness before you buy.

Gilt prints, and some pigment prints, are only skin deep - held to the fabric with an adhesive - and loss of color through use or dry cleaning means loss of design. Embossed designs may be pressed into fabrics and become less distinct with wear and cleaning.

Farm Safety Week July 25-31

Over 2,000 people were killed by agriculture accidents last year, many in falls from farm equipment.

During National Farm Safety Week, July 25-31, accidents are being recounted to alert farmers to the dangers of unsafe practices.

Most of the accidents in 1973 occurred in the field or barnyard, accounting for two-thirds of the death total. The remainder happened in farm buildings, home yards, public roads and other farm sites.

A third of the victims were young people and children-16 percent were 14 years old and under; 15 percent were 15 to 24 years old. Some people boast of their children's ability to operate complicated machinery, without realizing the danger to life and limb.

Typical accident descriptions are similar to the following:

- a tractor strikes a culvert, bump or similar obstacle and throws the rider off who caves his head in on a rock.
- a child loses balance, falls from the tractor and is run over by trailing equipment.
- attempting to jump aboard a moving tractor, a youngster falls and is crushed beneath the wheels.
- a farmer attempts to remove wheat from a clogged combine. loses his balance and is dragged into the separating system, crushing his arms.

Before help arrived, friction set the combine on fire, burning him to death.

These tragedies are actual recent cases in Michigan. During Farm Safety Week, farmers are urged to make special efforts to improve their operation for year round safety.

In doing so, they might be reminded to:

- let no one ride on any kind of equipment.
- shut off all equipment when removing obstacles or making minor machinery adjustments.
- keep all floors clean, wear safety shoes, keep repair and storage barns free of rubble, adopt good housekeeping practices.
- establish walkways that avoid having to step over conveyors, belts, shafts, PTOs, etc.

Good farm safety is just as important as good farm technology in maintaining an enviable farm production. Farm accident costs run into the billions of dollars annually.

But no monetary value can be placed on human suffering, loss of life and interrupted flow of produce resulting from farm accidents.

SCS-SCD assist pollution control

ST. JOHNS - "Today, in Michigan, livestock waste is the second most serious source of pollution coming from our farms. Soil erosion, causing sediment, is still number one," says Arthur H. Cratty, State Conservationist, USDA Soil Conservation Service.

"Continued progress," he said, "is being made in the protection of our streams from both sources by farmers, the soil conservation district and

many federal and state agencies working together.

"During the past year," Cratty continued, "the SCS-SCD team worked with 163 farmers in helping them install complete livestock waste management systems. These complete systems involve not only the collection of waste in holding pits or earthen ponds, but also a fully planned way of spreading it on the land.

"When planning such

systems, the farmer and the Soil Conservation Service technician consider the kind of soil, time of year and how the crop can make maximum use of the nutrients available from this animal waste. Only by considering all these items can the job of stopping this pollution from reaching our waters be done," concluded Cratty.

Date Anderson, a livestock farmer near St. Johns recently completed a waste management system on his farm, reports Lloyd B. Campbell, conservationist working with the Clinton County Soil Conservation District.

Last year, 2 systems were built in Clinton County by concerned livestock farmers with technical assistance provided by Soil Conservation Service technicians.

ASCS reports on fuel and fertilizer

EAST LANSING - Although the spring planting period has passed, the US Department of Agriculture continues to monitor the availability of fuel, fertilizer and other agricultural production items, reports Walter Wittenbach, chairman of the Michigan State Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee.

USDA is continuing to provide assistance to farmers who are experiencing difficulty in obtaining adequate supplies of fuel A 3-level, problem-solving network has been established to ensure that fuel related problems will be resolved promptly so that no farm operations will be delayed by a lack of fuel.

It is still important for farmers to keep their local distributor advised of current fuel requirements.

Fuel allocation regulations have assigned the highest priority to agriculture in the distribution of petroleum products.

The fertilizer situation has been a more difficult problem for USDA and farmers. There are no regulations for allocation or distribution of fertilizer materials, Wittenbach said.

Fertilizer supply lines into Michigan have been reduced or cut off by several major suppliers due to a shortage of product, transportation difficulties and increased demand in other parts of the nation.

The 1st step in this system will be taken at the local level. The county ASCS office will assist the farmer in trying to locate a supply of fuel.

If this is not successful, the 2d step will be to contact the State ASCS office. If necessary, the State Energy Office will be notified and fuel may be supplied to meet an emergency situation.

The 3d step may be used when the problem is of a serious nature and ASCS and the State Energy Office are not in a position to provide assistance. This situation may be handled by a direct call to the Regional or National Federal Energy Office. Prompt action will be taken to meet the urgency of the problem.

As a result, many distributors have not had enough fertilizer to meet current demand.

According to Wittenbach, farmers have had to review their fertilizer requirements and cropping plans. This has led to reduced fertilizer application, substitution of another analysis for the one normally used and searching for additional supplies of fertilizer.

USDA has established a monitoring system to review the price and availability of fertilizer products, but is not involved in assisting individual farmers in locating fertilizer.

The most difficult shortages have occurred with nitrogen fertilizers. All forms of nitrogen have been in short supply during the planting season and continue to be difficult to obtain for side-dressing.

Prices have increased significantly since 1973, causing farmers to cut back on the amount of fertilizer applied and still obtain a profit on their crop.

Wittenbach said supplies of gasoline and diesel fuel have increased recently to the extent that no serious problems have developed.

Many agriculture related fuel problems have been resolved at the state or local level without calling FEO for assistance.

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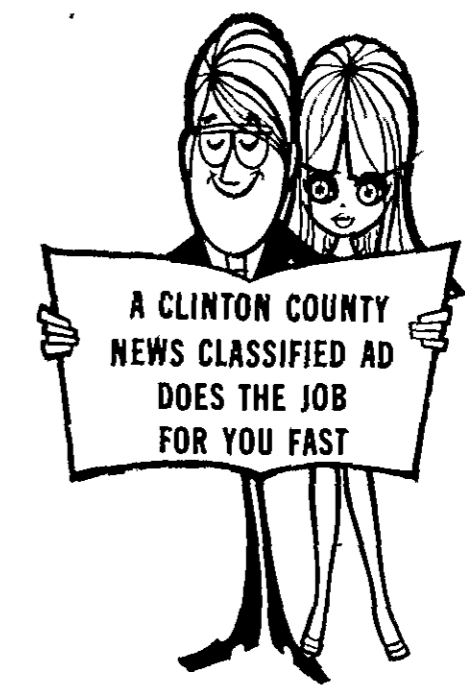

Farm leaders told -- "Should not be necessary to idle land"

Washington - "It should not be necessary to ask farmers to idle land in 1975", Kenneth E. Frick told farm leaders here July 8, in reference to government programs for wheat and feed grains.

Last July, Secretary of Agriculture Earl L. Butz announced the lifting of all acreage set-aside (idling) provisions for 1974 programs. Frick said the current grain production and demand outlook indicates a need for continuation of a full production policy in 1975.

"There are 2 main reasons we should be able to continue our hands off policy in farmers

production plans", according to Frick, administrator of the US Department of Agriculture's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service.

"First of all, we plan to keep the government out of the commodity business, and leave stocks in private hands", Frick told members of the National Association of Farmer Elected Committeemen. "This will result in less government interference in farm markets, lower cost to taxpayers, and greater dependence on the market-place, not government, by farmers for their incomes."

"Second, the high demand for US agricultural products at

home and abroad will continue". He indicated current projections for US farm exports were probably low. "The US is no longer the world's residual supplier of farm products. We have the best exporting system and the world's most efficient farm production. As a result, we have become the most dependable food and fiber supplier. There is no reason why we cannot maintain our role as the world's number one agricultural supplier."

"The efficiency and productivity of the American farmer has also allowed us to maintain our domestic and

world humanitarian role", Frick added. Frick noted that federal costs have been greatly reduced as a result of market-oriented farm programs.

"Because of reduced payments for programs and for storage of government-owned stocks, the farm program share of the USDA budget has been reduced from about 40 percent to an estimated 5 percent for the current budget." He noted that farm efficiency has been helped two ways by the turnaround in farm policy.

"Farmers have the freedom to choose the crops they feel they can grow best for the most

return", Frick said, "and full production farming allows for economies of volume".

Among the other options for 1975 programs Frick discussed with the farm group were commodity loans made to farmers for interim financing and the government's sales policy for disposing of commodities acquired under the programs.

Frick said government planners are discussing the possibility of setting the sales price for government-owned grains at 115 percent of the target price for the commodity involved. Target prices are prices established by law as a basis for payments to farmers, should average market prices fall below prescribed target levels.

He also said the government was considering a change in provisions to offer loans for a 12 month period only, with no loan extension, or "reseed", as has been often offered in the past. "The resealing of production under loan represents a non-decision on the part of farmers in marketing their crops", Frick said.

Frick said he expected complete farm program provisions could be announced soon, early enough for farmers to have time to plan for 1975 production.

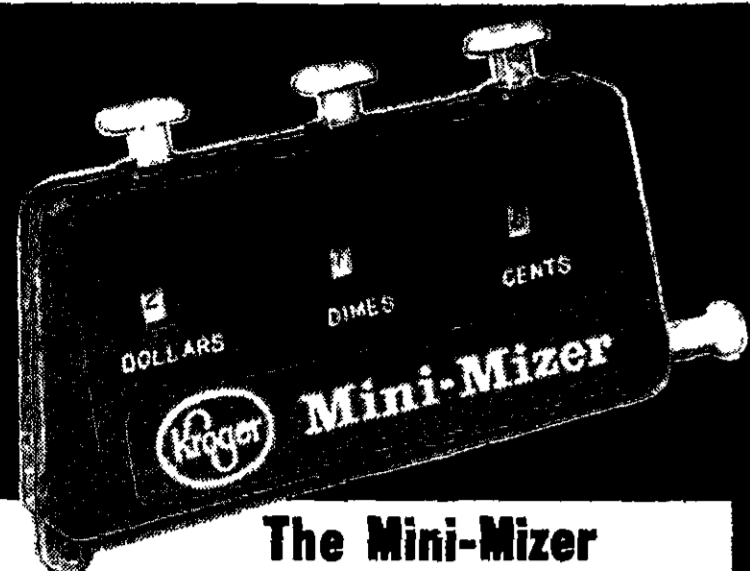

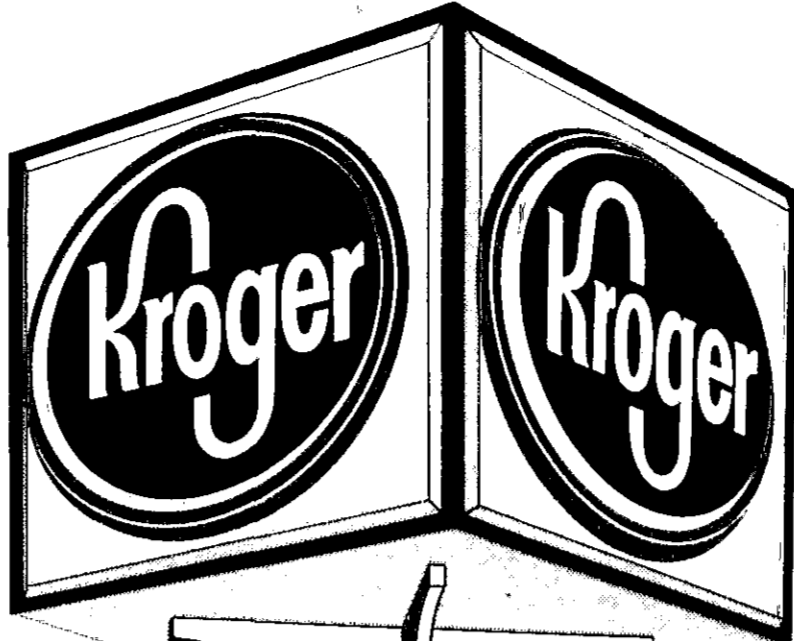
