White chairman of Communities Chest drive

1965, White was editor and publisher of Clinton County News for 20 years. He is chairman of the board of Clinton Memorial Hospital in St. Johns, and is past president of St. Johns Chamber of Commerce and of St. Johns Rotary Club.

Furry resigns as city commissioner, will move

City Commissioner and Vice Mayor John A. Furry announced his resignation from the St. Johns City Commission Monday night and said he had accepted a counseling job with the Upper Merion Area School District in eastern Pennsylvania.

Furry is guidance counselor at St. Johns High School and for the past year has also been part-time director of a federal pilot project team approach to special services at the elementary level. He has been with the St. Johns School System for 14 years.

Furry said he would start his new job Aug. 19.

The Upper Merion Area School District has a student population of 6,000 youngsters with but one public high school with 1,200 stu-

dents in grades 10 through 12. The district is 10 miles northwest of Philadelphia and is composed of Upper Merion Township and the boroughs of Bridgeport and West Conshohocken. It covers 17 square miles in southern Montgomery County near Norristown, Pa.

FURRY WILL BE one of five high school counselors and was one of five candidates interviewed for the job.

The Furry family (he and wife, Carroll, have four children) live at 106 S. Whittemore Street. He is a graduate of Girard College at Philadelphia and has bachelor of arts and master of arts degrees from Michigan State University. He is presently working

on his education specialist/doctorate degree.

While at St. Johns, Furry was a social studies teacher and department head, was wrestling coach for eight years, he organized the program here, and also coached gymnastics, football and track. He turned to guidance counseling in 1964-65. While doing that he took on the responsibilities of organizing and implementing a co-op education program with local merchants in 1965-66, and during the past year has been project director for the special services team approach.

Furry has been active in local civic affairs, too. He directed the summer swimming program for five years, was Jaycee dis-

tinguished service award winner in 1963 and 1968, was Michigan Week city chairman in 1962, local director of the Clinton County Red Cross from 1960-63, and regional representative to the Michigan Education Assn. in 1964. He was elected to a six-year term on the city commission in 1966.

He served as president of the St. Johns Education Assn. in 1963-64 and has held the offices of president, state director, local director and treasurer during 14 years of active membership in the St. Johns Jaycees. He is a past member of the MEA and NEA and is currently a member of the Michigan Councilors Assn.

"Sidewalk Days" Aug. 1 & 2

St. Johns merchants will take to the streets next week in their annual "Sidewalk Days" retail promotion and if past years are any indication, the city will be crowded with bargain-hunting shoppers.

Helping to draw the crowds will be an extra 2,300 copies of

Clinton County News stated for delivery to homes of non-subscribers throughout the county and in the towns of Fowler, Ovid and Elsie.

Norbert Rehman, chairman of the retail division of the Chamber of Commerce stated that practically all of the merchants have

signed up for the promotion and as in previous years the event will provide shoppers with regularly stocked merchandise at greatly reduced prices.

Aug. 1 and 2 have been selected as the dates for this year's event with Aug. 3 set aside as a third day in the event of rain.

This, the 11th annual "Sidewalk Days," will be fashioned after those of the past and merchants will display their wares along the sidewalk in front of their stores.

"Sidewalk Days" is one of the biggest retail promotions of the year and merchants plan well

in advance to insure shoppers with bargains that not only provide savings but top values as well. A generally festive atmosphere prevails and, according to Rehman, this year's plans should produce much of the same activity.

Assessment hearing is adjourned until Aug. 12 meeting of council

The St. Johns city council breezed through a light agenda Monday night pausing only twice to discuss subjects which brought about an exchange of conversation. The first exchange came following a reading of a letter from the Jaycees requesting permission to conduct a booth in the downtown area during sidewalk days and the second came after Mayor Charles Coletta announced an adjournment and involved the continuation of a project of a current electrical ordinance in the city code.

One other major item of business was put off until next meeting and a request for rezoning was referred to the planning commission. A public hearing for public assessments on sidewalk improvements along Sickles St. was adjourned until Aug. 12 at the motion of Councilman Gerald Irner. Irner advised the council to hold up action on the matter until meetings with school board authorities could be completed to make arrangements on financing. The adjournment action came following council's recognition of no written or oral objections to the assessment schedule.

THE REQUEST FOR rezoning was initiated by officials of Saylor-Beall Mfg. Co. and based on a buy and sell agreement between that firm and Provincial House Inc. The latter operates a chain of medical care facilities and has agreed to purchase land presently owned by Saylor-Beall for construction of a 110 bed unit.

Following council's referral to the planning commission, Councilman Rex Serrine reminded the council that the planning group should bear in mind the sewage requirements in the area. City Manager Harvey Weatherwax was directed to prepare a report on the current sewage capacity for presentation to the council and planning commission.

The most extended discussion to the evening was brought on by the Jaycees request for permission to sell snow-cones and candies in the downtown area during the upcoming retailers' "Sidewalk Days."

Councilman Irner opened the exchange by suggesting the letter be directed to the retail division of the Chamber of Commerce. "It's a retail promotion," Irner argued, "and I don't think we should act on it."

affirmed his position that "this should be up to the retailers." Mrs. Rand suggested that the council did not want to deny the request and perhaps Irner was right. Mayor Coletta again pointed out the city should retain authority to grant retail permits and, so the exchange went. Finally, the council was informed by a citizen in the gallery that the retailers were aware of the Jaycees desire to vend during "Sidewalk Days" and had directed the women to seek council approval.

This information was dispensed after Irner had moved, seconded by Mrs. Rand, that the letter be referred to the retail division of the Chamber. The

added information brought about a withdrawal of second and motion and the two council members then teamed up on a motion approving the issuance of permission to the Jaycees' request. Come "Sidewalk Days" the girls will be peddling snow-cones and candies manufactured by handicapped persons.

THE OTHER SUBJECT which brought about an exchange of comments was introduced by Ed Schmitt on grounds that the council during the last regular meeting assured him that a legal opinion would be presented at Monday night's session.

At the last meeting Schmitt questioned the legality of City

Ordinance 165 and questioned whether more recently adopted state contractor laws superceded it. Schmitt's argument is based on the fact that he must pay a fee to the state to meet Michigan laws as a master licensed electrician, but the city ordinance provides that with payment of a fee of lesser amount a journeyman may practice here.

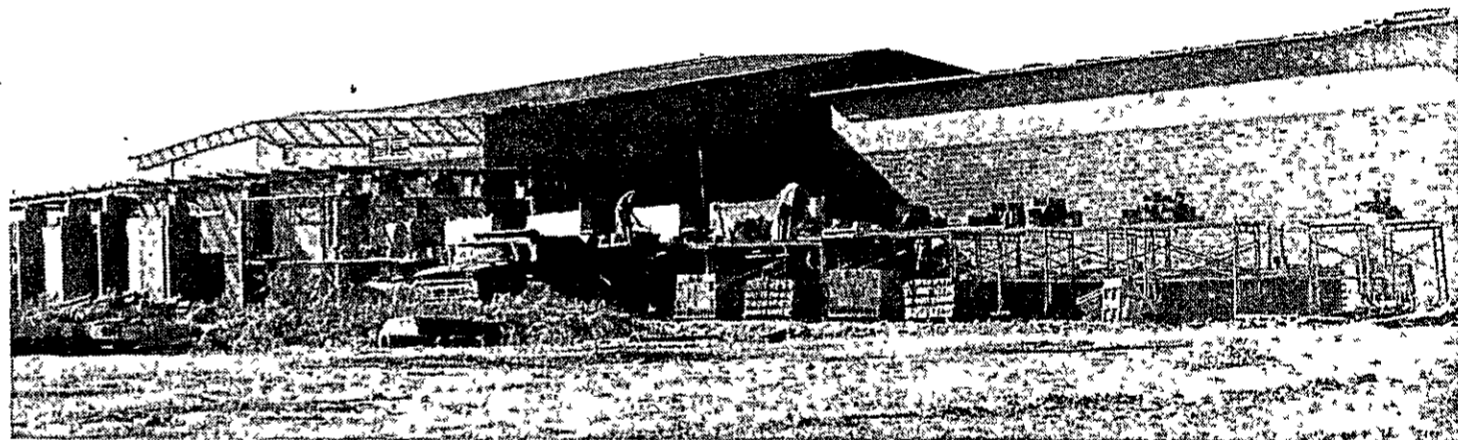
City Attorney William Kemper advised Schmitt that his workload has been based on priorities as indicated by the council and because of this he did not have occasion to compile sufficient information to present an opinion.

Following a brief discussion Mayor Coletta directed Kemper

to make attempts toward securing the information and pass judgment on the status of the provision in question.

In other matters the council accepted the resignation of John Furry from their number. Furry has accepted an out of town position as a guidance counselor.

Resolutions were passed establishing the mayor, City Clerk, Tom Hundley and City Manager, Weatherwax as authorized agents in transacting financial affairs and a motion was accepted that Mrs. Edwin Cox be commended by the council through letter for her work during the period when the city was without a manager or clerk.



Workers trickle back to school site

Construction activity around the site of the new St. Johns High School increased early this week as segments of striking workers trickled back to their jobs. Florian Simon, job superintendent for the \$3.9 million project said carpenters had returned to work Tuesday morning, joining the ranks of brick masons,

glaziers, ceramic tradesmen and plasterers who were back on their jobs late last week.

Simon stated he could not speculate when the remaining crews would return to their jobs but indicated that union officials and members of the various trades were meeting regularly. Still striking are heavy equipment operators, steel workers and

pipe insulators.

According to earlier reports, about 12 weeks of work have been lost, but despite this setback overall progress on the project is still close to schedule. Officials of Clark Construction, general contractor directing the school's construction, feel there will be no delay in the original opening date set for the fall of

1969. The high school is part of a \$5.4 million building program which also includes two new rural neighborhood schools and additions to two existing neighborhood schools. Construction work on the grade schools is nearing completion now and they should be ready for use when school opens in September.

izing the post office on Saturday morning will find window service available only from 8 a.m. to 10 a.m., however, the lobby will be open for lock-box service until 6 p.m.

At Ovid, the post office will be open to lock-box patrons from 7 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. but there will be no window service pro-

vided on Saturdays.

A similar schedule will be maintained at Elsie where postal lock-box patrons will have access to the post office from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. but no Saturday service will be provided at the windows.

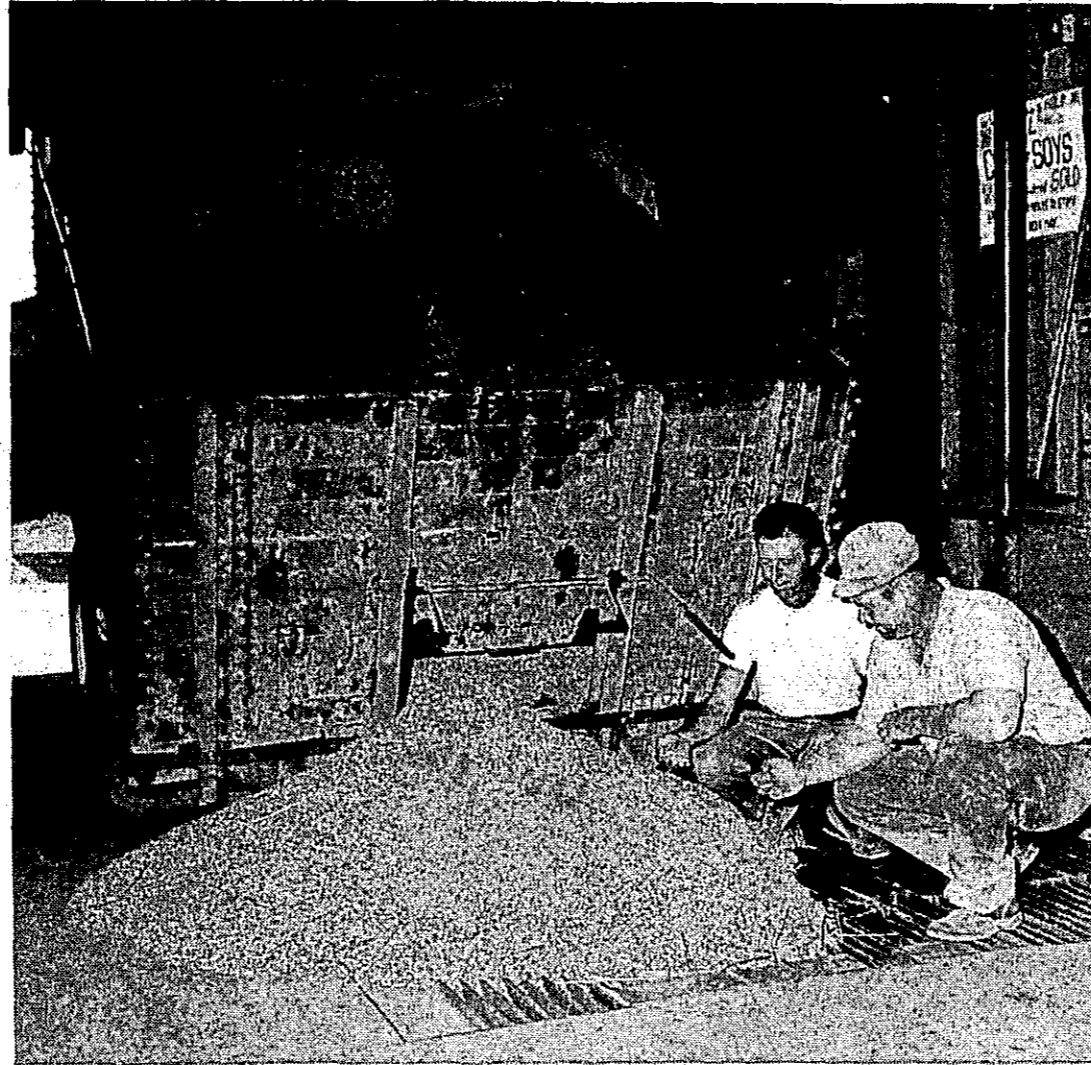

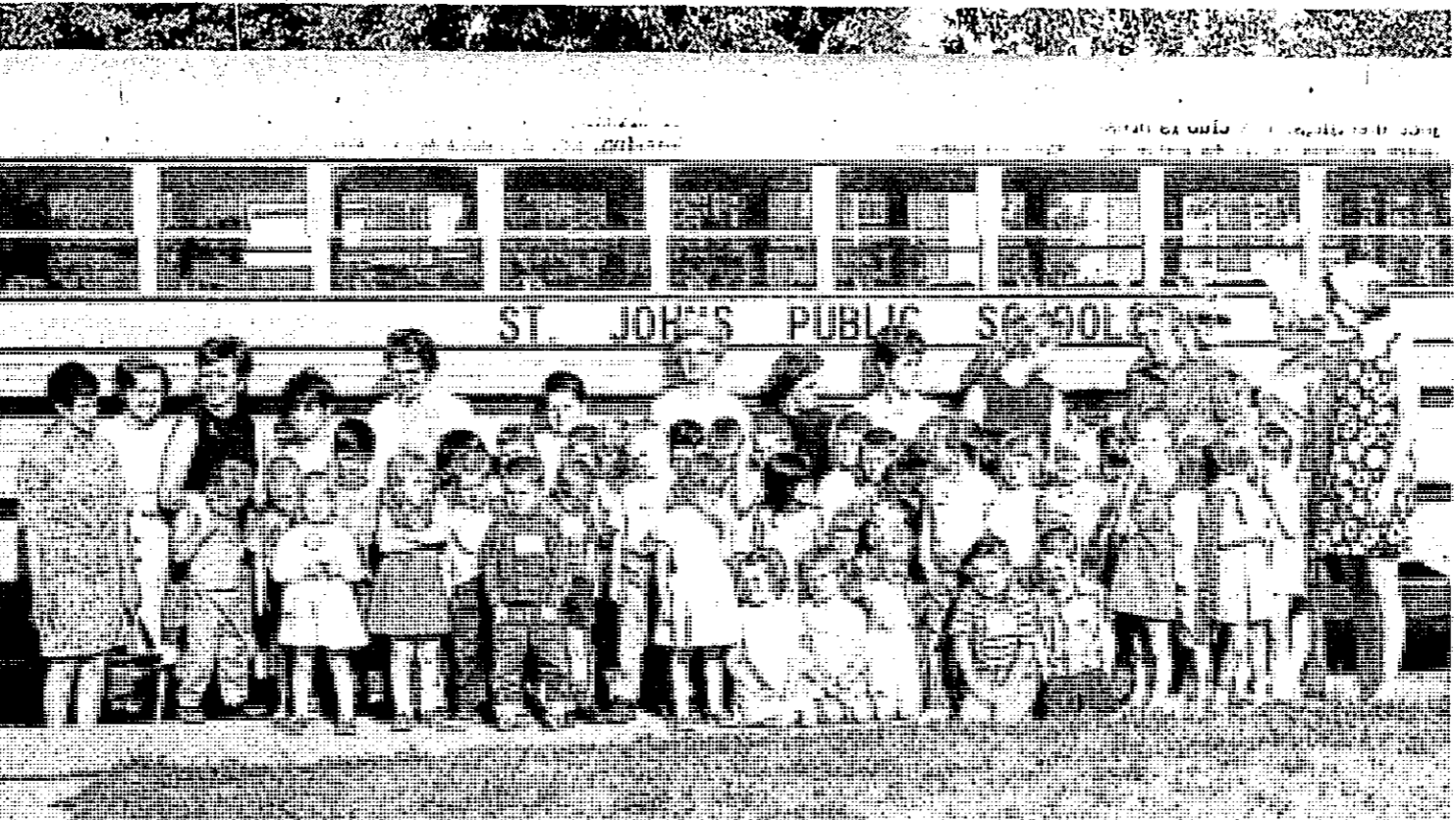

Cite methods to cut mishap increase

The importance of action taken in the present legislative session to strengthen the state's control of problem drivers is emphasized by the recent trend of Michigan auto accidents and insurance cost.

Coincident with a concentrated campaign by the insurance industry, for public support of stronger control action, the Secretary of State's office over the past year has substantially increased such activity.

This was accompanied by a reduction in accidents, injuries and deaths, which helped to stabilize auto insurance cost over the same period, in spite of a continuing inflation in injury and repair costs.

Now the fatality trend has turned upward again, and Secretary of State James Hare has been pointing out that increased driver control action has been partially nullified by conditions which permit evasion or defiance of control.

Legislation which he has sought for some time to combat these conditions now has been adopted.

One of these actions authorizes calling in for inquiry drivers who have repetitive accidents but fewer traffic law violation points than are required for license reexamination.

Another allows impounding the car of a driver who continues to drive in violation of a license suspension or revocation.

A third attacks the present massive evasion of license control through failure to answer traffic law violation summons. All of these, plus the new implied consent law for control of drinking drivers, which has been strengthened in the current session, are directed at problem areas which insurance industry analyses of problem driver accidents during the past two years have demonstrated to be responsible for a major part of the accident problem and its consequent insurance cost.

Clinton County swim team in first test Saturday

The newly formed Clinton County Competitive Swim Team will face its first challenge this weekend when the squad travels to East Lansing for a meet with the Walnut Hills Country Club squad. Competition will get underway at 10 a.m. and Valerie Bartholomew, coach of the local squad, stated that all 30 members of the team will make the trip.

The Clinton County team is under the auspices of the Lansing YMCA and Larry Scramlin, YMCA director of the St. Johns pool coordinates activities. The

squad has been practicing for the past three weeks but Miss Bartholomew emphasized that openings on the team are available to any swimmer six years or older wishing to participate.

Practice sessions are conducted daily from 8 a.m. to 9 a.m.; noon to 1 p.m. and again from 5:30 p.m. to 7 p.m. All swimmers must attend the middle practice session but may attend either of the other two that best fits their schedule.

At present the team provides competition in four swim classifications and ten divers participate in that division. Swimming classifications include breast stroke, free style, back stroke and butterfly. Medley competition includes a free style which calls for four participants; a relay involving four swimmers performing four different strokes and an individual medley where one swimmer completes

each of four laps using a different stroke.

Divers are required to know at least four different dives and one of these must be a backward dive. Present plans call for the purchase of tank suits for each member of the squad. Boys suits will be all red and the girls will wear red and white striped one-piece suits.

Following Saturday's initial outing, the squad will return to practicing for later meets at Okemos and a future return to Walnut Hills for the YMCA Invitational Meet in late August. Sandwiched in between will be the St. Johns Jaycee swim meet slated for Memorial Pool Sunday Aug. 11 at 1 p.m.

Youngsters interested in participating on the YMCA competitive swim squad may join by attending any of the practices attending any of the practice sessions or by leaving their name at the St. Johns pool.

In the past the county-wide meet has been limited to youngsters ten through 15 years but changes this year are designed to encourage broader participation among youthful swimmers.

Competition is open to both boys and girls and forms for registration are currently available at the St. Johns Memorial Swimming Pool. Swimmers completing the registration blanks should return them to the pool by Saturday Aug. 10. Competition will be conducted Sunday Aug. 11.

In addition to other advance preparations, youngsters may receive swimming and diving instructions at the swimming pool. Co-chairman of the event is Mart Livingston.

Swimming dominates scene of local sports

With the swimming season now just about half over, YMCA officials seem to be quite happy with the way things are going in their operation of the swimming program at the St. Johns park pool.

Larry Scramlin, YMCA director at the pool here, said attendance at the pool has been real good so far, helped along by some hot weather, and there have been no major problems so far.

The second session of swimming lessons is more than half over now, and almost all of the classes are full — meaning about 60 kids for each of six classes during the morning and early afternoon hours.

Afternoon attendance during open swim periods has ranged around 200, and attendance at the evening hours of 7-9 has been around 100.

ABOUT THE ONLY big problem Scramlin has found so far involves pool capacity. State and county health ordinances limit the number of people to between 170 and 175 at one time — the number determined on the basis of square footage of the pool and deck area.

"This has created a problem at times," Scramlin said, "when some people just can't understand why as long as they keep coming we can't take them all."

"So we have limited it to 175. This has been no problem in the evenings, but on hot days this is what we've done. The pool often fills up in the first five minutes or so and a lot of kids are left waiting. At 3:45, after they've had an hour and 15 minutes to swim and there are still kids in line, we pull some of the first kids out and let those in line in."

Scramlin said pool personnel can tell by the pins the children wear into the pool who the first ones in were, and they are the first ones to come out.

"IT MAKES THE first ones unhappy and the ones waiting very happy," Scramlin remarked. "But we felt in fairness to all people, this might be the solution."

Because of the below-capacity numbers swimming during the evening, Scramlin said he hasn't found it necessary to limit Saturday evenings to families only for open swimming.

"Before we started I felt that even in the evenings we'd have so many kids come and line up early that the family that wanted to come and swim wouldn't be able to get in," the director explained. "But this has not developed."

"In fact, the afternoon has been extremely filled, but in the evening we have not had to turn anybody away, so we felt that as long as we could get everybody in and there's room for them then we'll let the children come, too."

THE FAMILY rate does apply, however, when an adult accompanies his youngsters. Scramlin says quite a few adults have been showing up at the pool, and they number from five to 20 each evening. "We've had a lot of compliments on the warm water."

"We've had a lot of compliments on the warm water," he chuckled. "We had a lot of non-believers at first when we'd tell them the water's about 78 degrees, but it's been in this range most of the time. It's real good for lessons and open swimming."

Starting next week will be the third two-week session of swimming lessons. Scramlin said enrollment for that and for the fourth session are "good" at this point, but there are still openings in all the classes.

Postal cutbacks to be felt throughout county

Residents of Clinton County will feel slightly the pinch of current cut-backs in postal service brought about by a congressional mandate to return Federal postal employment to levels of June 1966. Limitations brought about by these efforts will take effect Saturday July 27, according to J. D. Robinson, St. Johns Postmaster.

Robinson explained that local cutbacks will be made primarily in window service at the Post Office; collections from street deposit boxes and in new carrier deliveries on residential and rural routes. At present, however, deliveries on Saturday to residential and rural patrons will be continued but the addition of new routes in cities and towns and along rural routes will not be installed.

The directive received by Robinson from Postmaster General W. Marvin Watson basically outlined the curtailments as follows:

Effective July 27 all regular Saturday and Sunday window service will be discontinued and also effective that date collection of mail from street deposit boxes will be adjusted to conform to the generally less-frequent Sunday collection schedules.

Robinson explained that street

deposit box collections on Saturday will revert from the present 2 p.m. and 4 p.m. pickups to only a 4 p.m. pickup as is presently the practice on Sundays and holidays.

Postmaster Robinson also noted that beginning July 1, all planned extensions of city and rural delivery were curtailed. At this time, he explained, there are no plans to provide mail delivery service to new housing subdivisions and apartment projects.

General Delivery windows at the post office will be open for two hours on Saturdays from 8 a.m. to 10 a.m. to deliver mail to General Delivery patrons and to firms that normally call for their mail at the post office. Residential customers who have received a notice that parcels are being held for them at the post office also may call for them at that time.

Postmaster Robinson emphasized that the Post Office Department agreed to the reduction in funds for the 1969 fiscal year that began July 1 and is not asking for a restoration of any money cut from its budget.

"The Postmaster General," Robinson explained, "told us we could operate within our budget and maintain postal services at or near their present level if we

did not have to reduce employment to the June 1966 level."

Robinson noted also that he has been directed to submit his plans by Sept. 1 regarding his proposals on how and when Saturday delivery on city residential routes should be handled locally.

An effective date for the elimination of Saturday residential delivery here and across the nation is then expected to be established by the Post Office Department, Robinson explained.

Postmaster General Watson explained that under the manpower restrictions imposed by currently effective legislation the Post Office Department will not have enough people to continue all postal services at their present levels. "This is not a matter of dollars but of people," he explained.

The exact total of the overall employment cut that will apply locally is not yet known and it will be affected to some extent by the rapidity of job turnover in the local staff in the months immediately ahead. However, the postmaster said he expects the cut to be serious.

To make the overall outback to the June 1966 level, post offices across the country have been ordered to fill only three of four vacancies as they occur,

ASC PROGRAM

Price support on 1968 crop wheat

We are getting a lot of questions regarding our Wheat Price Support Loan Program. With the current market price well below the support rate, many producers are seriously considering placing their 1968 crop wheat under a price support loan. Our county loan rate for Number One wheat is \$1.17 per bushel.

Producers to be eligible for a price support loan, must have signed up under the 1968 Wheat Program and complied with the

allotment requirements. Loans are available for farm and approved warehouse stored wheat.

Producers storing on the farm should be sure they can control rodents and weevil, because contaminated grain will be rejected from the market.

One of the advantages of storing in an approved warehouse is the warehouseman is responsible for maintaining the grade

and keeping the grain in a marketable condition.

Wheat stored in an approved warehouse is eligible for a loan right away. The warehouseman issues a negotiable receipt to the producer upon receipt of the wheat, the producer brings the receipt to our office and normally we can get the loan processed in 24 hours.

One important change this year on the price support program, which should help producers who

store wheat in approved warehouses, is the elimination of the requirement for an official grade certificate which has been in effect for the last two years.

Grades on warehouse receipts that are used for price support purposes may be determined on the basis of a joint decision by the producer and the warehouseman.

For a farm-stored loan the producer must contact our office, our Commodity Inspector will visit the farm and determine the amount of wheat stored, he also will inspect the storage to see if it is adequate. Farm-stored loans will be processed as soon as possible but due to the farm visit they take more time than a warehouse loan to complete.

I urge wheat producers who are not familiar with the loan program to come to our office and get the details. The primary purpose of the program is to pro-

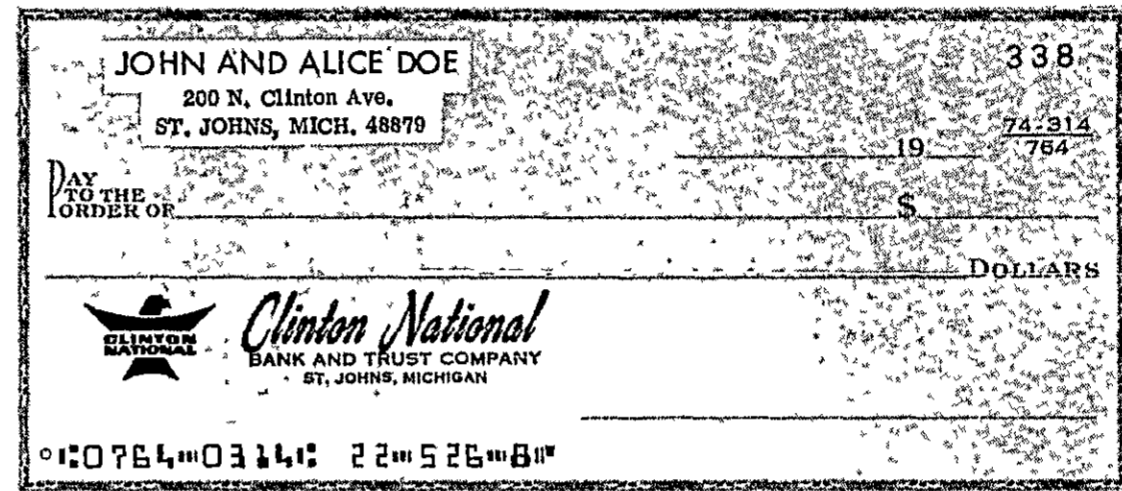
vide orderly marketing and give needed financing to producers who need it at harvest time.

We mailed out a number of wheat certificate drafts this week. There is a statement accompanying the drafts this year showing how the payment was computed.

There will be some delay in receiving drafts, for those who are in both feed grain and wheat programs and did not certify to their feed grain acreage until July 15. Others are held up until the producers' acreage is spot checked, the wet weather has delayed our field work.

We will get all wheat drafts out as soon as possible. Feed grain drafts will be mailed the last of August.

MOSTLY For MEN

by CHUCK FLYNN

This being the time of the year when fresh sweet corn is abundant, let's talk about a corn roast.

When you invite guests, please don't have them dress up. A corn roast is strictly for picnic attire.

As the host, here's what you'll need:

Two charcoal grills. Build your fire so that all areas of the grill will be evenly heated. If your group is no more than four people, one grill will suffice, but for any more, have two fires available.

If you can get the sweet corn direct from the field, do so only about an hour before serving. This is absolutely the best. However, if this is impossible, then purchase the corn on the same day it's to be used and place it immediately in cold, salted water, silk down.

Be sure that the corn has not been "shucked" or cut at the end. Now equip yourself with a serving table of some kind, several sizable salt shakers, and melt a pound of butter and place it in a warmed dish so you can keep it in liquid state. You'll also need a good brush for buttering the corn. An inexpensive two-inch paint brush will do.

WHEN THE FIRE IS RIGHT, YOU'RE ready to start the corn roast. Incidentally, there are many devices employed to know when the fire is right. For corn, I'd say to place your hand over the coals and count one one thousand, two one thousand, three one thousand. If you haven't withdrawn the member to avoid a burn, the fire is right for corn roasting.

Place as many ears as you can on the grill, leaving just enough room so that the corn can be turned. Keep turning the ears as you observe they're cooking. The shucks will begin to dry out, perhaps burn lightly as they cook.

Keep turning until the ear has had a chance to cook all around. Generally it takes about 20 minutes to bring the ear to the desired doneness, but the best method is to sample one when you feel the corn is getting ready to serve.

Now, put on your asbestos glove and bring out plenty of paper napkins or paper towels. When the ear is done, grasp the base in one hand and pull the shucks back including the silks from the top. You'll find that shucks and silks will come off very easily from the cooked corn.

Wrap a napkin or towel around the base, shuck and all. Brush the corn with butter and hand this delicacy to a guest. He can salt it as he desires.

KEEP REPEATING THE PROCESS UNTIL all have been served and re-served. You can bet everyone will be back for seconds or thirds.

Roast corn served piping hot in this fashion is something to be remembered. You, of course, can see why I recommend picnic clothes.

You may wish to serve something else after everyone has had his fill of corn, but don't plan much. The guests just won't be that hungry. Regardless, try the corn roast as a novel way of entertaining and don't burn your fingers. I said "asbestos" gloves.

Fabrics that resist oil not far away

It's true that someone someplace is always seeking ways and products to improve our way of life. Research scientists are constantly developing entirely new products or finding improvements in old ones. The fabric industry and all those related are among the leaders in promoting benefits for the consumer.

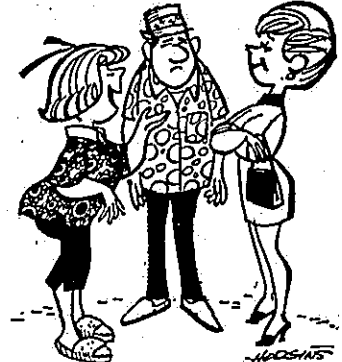
Currently United States Department of Agriculture researchers have found chemicals that make fabrics resist oil but not water. Fabrics that resist water are hard to wet and therefore very difficult to launder. Such fabric treatment is still in the research and testing stages, but it's well to be aware of what may be on the market and recognize it when it appears.

Homemakers want, and researchers want to give wash and wear and other chemically modified cotton fabrics resistance to oil soiling that normally occurs in closefitting parts of the clothing like men's collars. "Shirt collar ring," stains from vegetable oils and meat fats have long been bug-a-boos. Tests show

these new treated cottons resist such stains.

So far these new developments prove effective in repelling oil stains only on colored fabrics. They cause white fabrics to yellow. Tests to date indicate these new finishes are durable and last through several washings but further testing is needed to determine longer time durability and other factors. Researchers are looking for a way to combine these new finishes with permanent press cotton.

Since permanent press fabrics generally stain more easily than untreated cottons, favorable results in the research could be most valuable. Imagine a permanent press cotton fabric that resists oil stains and is easily and successfully laundered. Would not that be a wonderful fabric for the family's wardrobe?

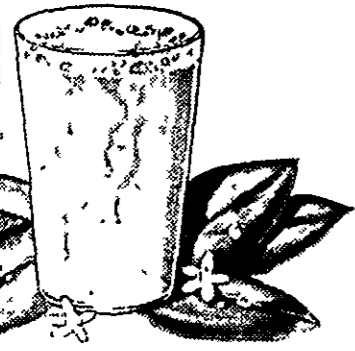

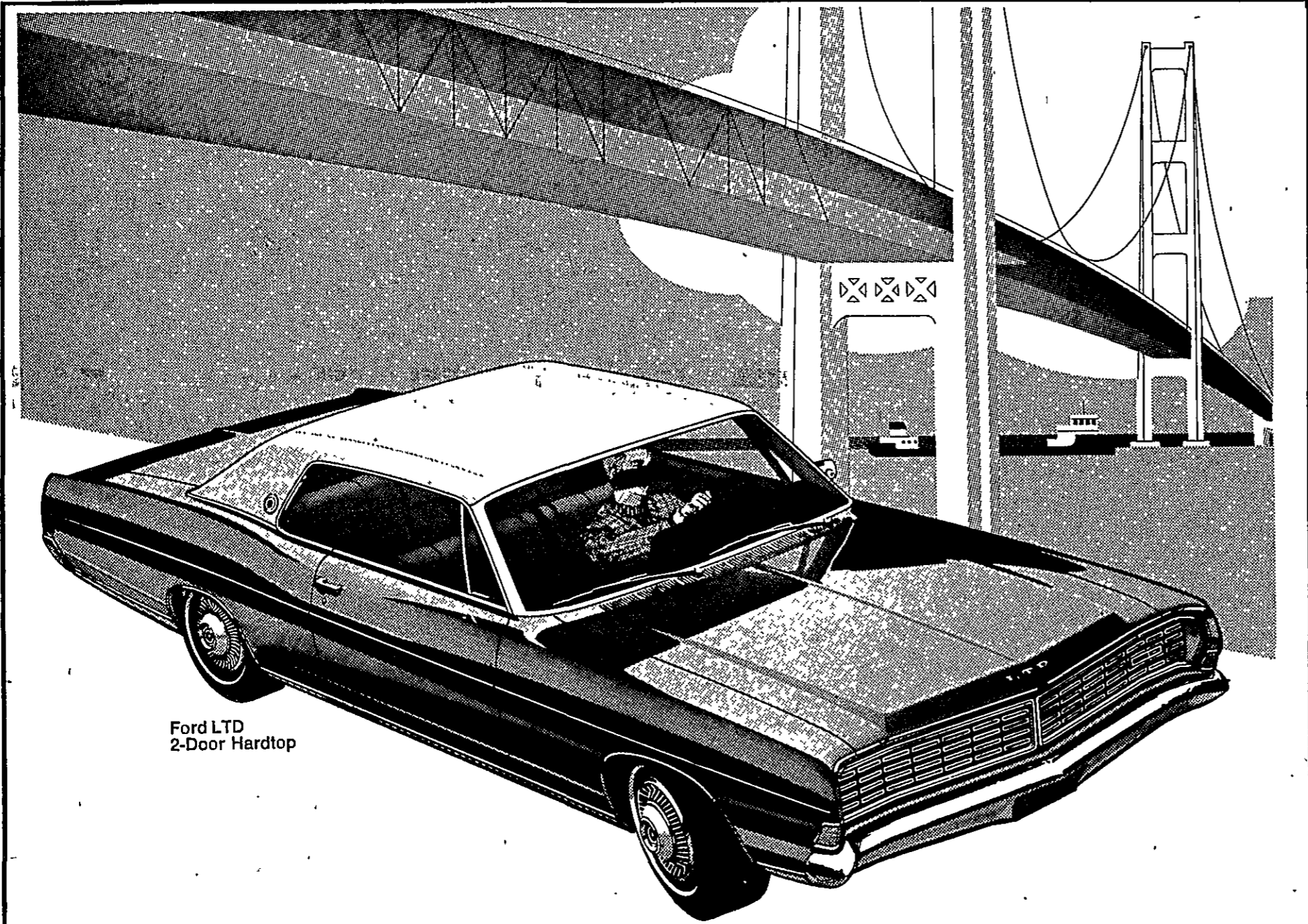

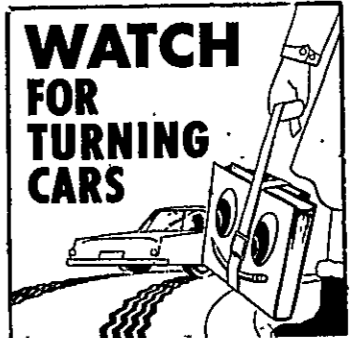

What Are Some of the Problems of Farmers in Clinton County?

How Well Does Bill Nicholas Understand these Problems? HERE ARE A FEW ANSWERS:

- **AGRICULTURAL LAND ASSESSMENT:**
To check the rapid disappearance of good agricultural land, action should be taken to allow assessment of farm land on the basis of its value for agriculture rather than for non-farm uses. Such action would prevent the forced conversion of open space to more intensive uses as a result of economic pressures caused by the assessment of land at a rate or level incompatible with the practical use of such land for farming.
- **SPECIAL PROPERTY TAX ASSESSMENTS:**
Owners of agricultural land often find themselves saddled with high special assessment taxes due to the necessity of crossing their property with water mains, sewers, storm drains, etc., in order to reach an area of industrial, commercial, or residential development. Such facilities may not be of any value to the property crossed, but can impose a serious financial burden on the owner. Michigan should follow Ohio's lead in recognizing this problem and pass legislation to do away with such a hardship.
- **PUBLIC AWARENESS OF AGRICULTURAL PROBLEMS:**
Farmers and agricultural groups should continue to work ceaselessly to create more public awareness of the farmer's cost-price squeeze; the relative price of food in this country and throughout the world; marketing problems; and the special problems of farm labor.
- **COOPERATIVE MARKETING PROCEDURES:**
An ever-increasing number of farmers sense that they will never achieve parity until they possess the power to help determine the price at which they sell their products without the threat of meddlesome government interference. There should be legislation to help the farmer achieve parity.
- **PESTICIDES:**
Pesticides have saved thousands of lives in the United States over the past 25 years and are essential to efficient modern-day agriculture. Any hasty and ill-conceived action by the Legislature or the State Conservation Department to ban so-called "hard" pesticides (especially the chlorinated hydrocarbons) might result in a possible 20% loss in Michigan crop production. The control of pesticides therefore should remain in the responsible hands of the State Department of Agriculture.
- **THROWAWAY BEVERAGE CONTAINERS:**
Throwaway bottles are a costly hazard to farm implements, motor vehicle tires, and farm livestock as well as to both adults and children. Crops have been rendered useless by broken glass picked up by harvesting equipment. Since the throwaways have no salvage value, they are discarded where they are emptied to be shattered and become a public danger. The Legislature should require all bottled beverages sold in Michigan to be delivered in returnable bottles with a deposit value of at least 3c each to encourage their return.
- **AGRICULTURAL LAND USES:**
Because projected population growth will make demands for all kinds of land for a variety of public and private uses, all alternatives should be given every possible consideration before productive farm land is taken for such purposes as reservoirs, research, industrial and housing developments, and roadways. Township, county, and state planning and zoning are the tools which can help solve the problems of land use.
- **FOREIGN MARKET EXPANSION:**
Expansion of foreign markets is vital to Michigan agriculture. The Legislature should continue to support the development of programs to increase the export volume of Michigan farm products.

Last Tuesday morning I observed the initial operation in this year's black top resealing program. Simply stated, this is merely the application of a coat of hot, liquid asphalt to the road followed immediately with the laying of a uniform layer of fine, clean stone called "chips" or "pea-stone." These in turn are pressed into the soft asphalt by a heavy roller. The whole process then, seals the cracks that appear in the surface of our black top roads, helps smooth them out and prolongs the life of the road.

Under normal conditions a road seal job will last four or five years, but when there are severe break-ups in the spring, it is often necessary to resal portions of a road every other year. You may have noticed such break-up areas in driving around the county. On Kinley Road, for instance, and on Wright Road south of Fowler there are considerable stretches of road that are presently gravelled but which will be ressealed.

The start of this year's resealing was of particular interest because of the use of our newest piece of equipment—a self-propelled chip spreader. Our asphalt distributor is a big stainless steel tank mounted on a truck chassis. This tank is kept heated with burners using bottled gas for fuel. One man drives the distributor truck down the center of the road and another operates the spreading mechanism from a platform on the rear. The hot, liquid asphalt is sprayed on the road surface through a long spreading nozzle that covers the entire width of the road. The application is made at the rate of 2,800 gallons per mile.

The chip spreader follows behind towing a tandem truck load of chips and spreading them in a thin, even layer ahead of the machine and directly onto the soft asphalt. The dual wheels of the tandem and those of a heavy roller that follows up the spreader pushes the chips into the surface and the job is complete.

A simple operation, really, but like most road maintenance jobs, it is an expensive one. The asphalt costs between \$400 and \$450 per mile. The chips add another \$100 to \$125 per mile to the cost. A minimum of nine men is required for the operation and an estimated investment of about \$65,000 dollars is involved. About four miles or a bit better is a good day's work and there are in excess of three hundred miles of black-top roads in the county. From all this you can easily see another reason why good roads are costly.

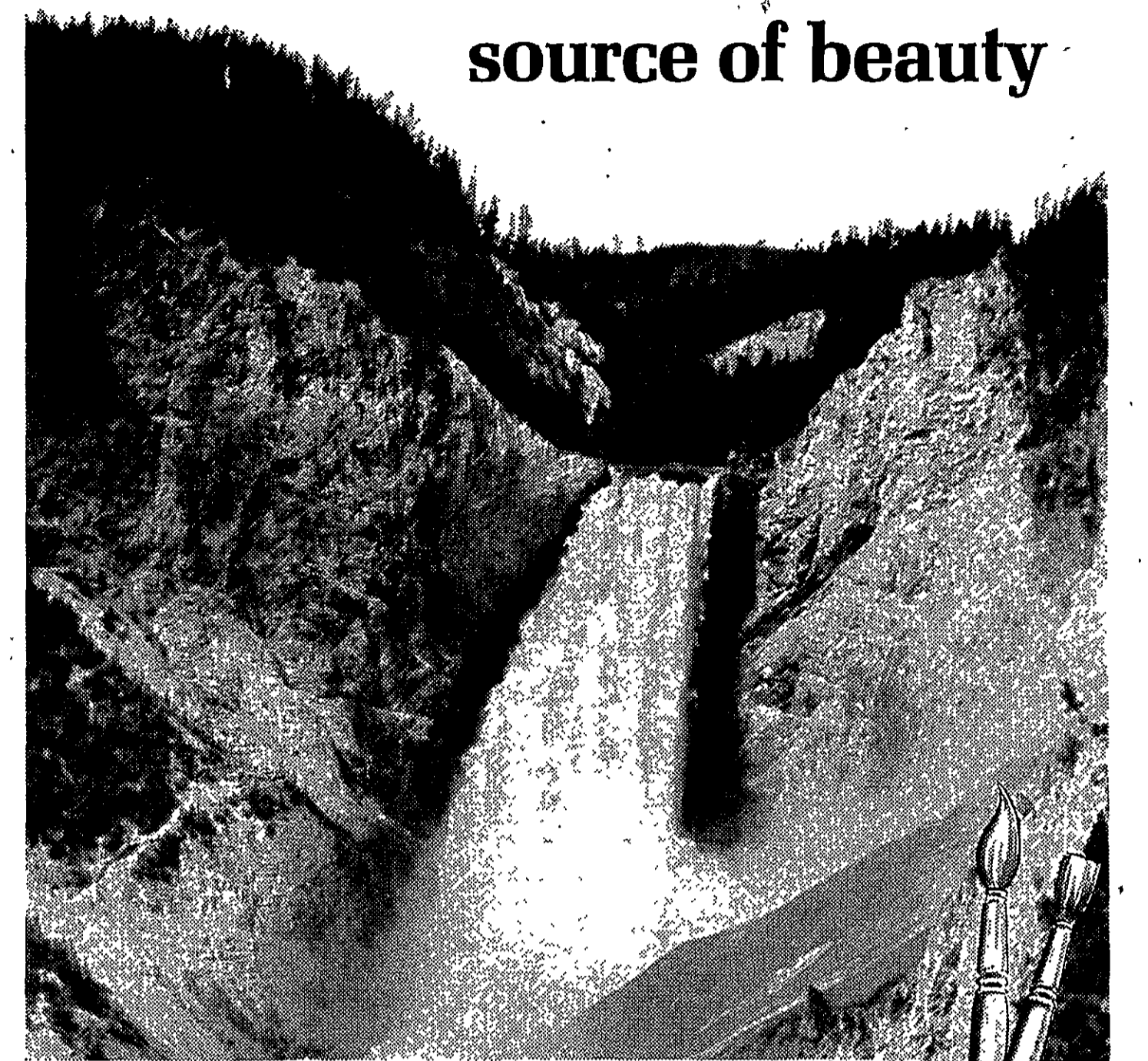

Eye-level rule won't work for hanging pictures

The old rule that pictures should be hung at eye level just doesn't work, according to a home furnishings specialist at Michigan State University.

Margaret Boschetti, specialist with MUS's Cooperative Extension Service, asks: "Does 'eye level' mean when you're standing or sitting? Whose eye level are you using—a five-foot woman or a six-foot man?"

But she doesn't recommend putting pictures just anywhere. "Deciding where to place pictures is the ability to see them as one part of the whole interior design of a room," she comments. "Pictures serve no other purpose than to give pleasure—but this visual comfort is as important in a home as physical comfort of a chair or sofa."

INSTEAD OF THE eye level rule, Miss Boschetti suggests eight guides that might help in picture placement:

- 1) Make pictures a part of a furniture group. The group might be a sofa, lamp or table, or just

- a single table or television set. In your mind's eye, extend the lines up from the outer edge of the furniture group and over from the top edge if there is other furniture that gives the group height. When most of the picture is within these imaginary lines, it is part of the group, she explained.
- 2) Consider shape of wall space. Wall spaces appear to be square, vertical or horizontal—depending on the shape and placement of pictures. When a picture repeats the general shape of the space where they're placed, the whole design looks more integrated. This happens because the eye follows the direction of the picture, either crosswise or upward.
- 3) Plan height of the picture above the furniture. Most people are apt to hang pictures too high rather than too low, Miss Boschetti said. However, if a picture is being hung over an extremely low table, a tall candle or flower arrangement can tie the two together. This would prevent people

from having to bend over to see the picture.

- 4) Pictures should be in scale with furniture. You wouldn't hang a small square print over a low horizontal sofa.
- 5) Try grouping pictures. The eye connects small pictures and sees them first as a large unit, Miss Boschetti explained. Pictures can be the same or different sizes and shapes. When grouping pictures, remember to keep the space between the pictures less than the width of the pictures themselves.
- 6) Align pictures with each other and with furniture lines. Unless the picture is to be centered, start with a line that is already present in the furniture group—perhaps the continuation of the line of a cabinet door. Each picture should be related to the furniture group that it is a part of.
- 7) Pictures need a "ground line," usually parallel to the floor. Staggered lines at the bottom of a row of pictures can create disturbing stair-steps for the eye to follow. However, the exception would be a group of pictures hung in a stairwell. Then the ground line would be a diagonal, the specialist noted.
- 8) Balance your pictures. Formal balance is established when the picture is centered over a piece of furniture, while informal balance means it is located off-center.

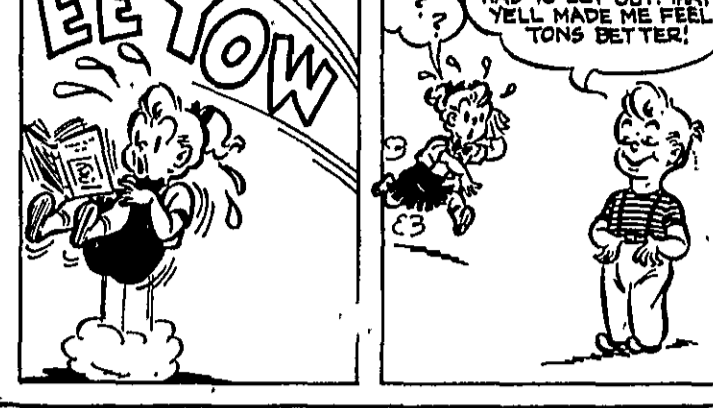

Good management highlight of state farm tour on Aug. 1

Good management in action, where farmers have put decision-making and records together for profitable farming, will be shown at the 1968 State Farm Management Tour in the Hillsdale area next Thursday, Aug. 1.

The 20th annual event, sponsored by Michigan State University's Cooperative Extension Service and Agricultural Economics Department, is expected to attract several hundred visitors.

Eight farms, all specialized and quite different, are on the list. Farmers may visit as many as they find time to see during the morning, starting at 9:30 a.m. County extension offices have a list of farms, a map with direc-

tions and a brief sketch about each farm.

At noon all visitors will go to the Hillsdale County Fairgrounds, Hillsdale, for lunch, entertainment and a brief program. Dr. L. L. Boger, chairman of MSU's Agricultural Economics Department, will be the speaker. After this program, eight educational meetings, each on a different type of farming, will be held on the fairgrounds.

A SPECIAL PROGRAM for homemakers, with three MSU extension specialists in home economics speaking, is scheduled for the afternoon.

Albert T. Hall, Hillsdale agricultural Extension agent, is general chairman of the event and

has local committees working with him to handle parking and arrangements at the farms and fairgrounds. About 25 MSU extension staff members will participate either at the farms or at the fairgrounds event.

Farmers and city residents are welcome to see some of the modern trends in farming being exhibited at these farms: Mike Barton Swine Farm, Horton. With first of two new slatted floor farrowing houses in operation, this farm is moving from 3,000 market hogs annually to goal of 6,000 by 1971.

Mrs. Ophelia Hawkes Sheep Farm, Litchfield. Mrs. Hawkes and two sons raised 160 lambs from 100 ewes in 1967.

Walrus Tree Farm, Jonesville. This 400-acre plantation markets 20,000 to 25,000 Scotch pine trees annually through an efficient cost-controlled operation.

Charles Ames Dairy, Quincy. A profitable 106-cow Holstein herd in process of expanding to 140 head, with added forage

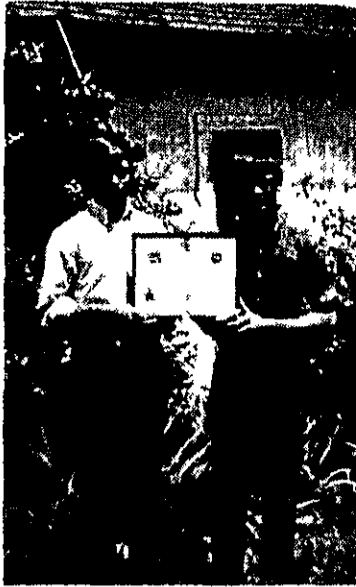
and grain plantings and new silage storage facility.

Frank Green Orchard, Allen. This family utilizes traffic along US-12, in front of the farm, to market much of the produce from the 200 acres of trees. Major crop is apples.

WILLIAM HAYWARD JR., Hillsdale. This young cash crop farmer handles 400 acres with modern grain handling, drying and storage facilities for corn, wheat and oat crops.

Charles Zeller Poultry Farm, Hillsdale. This 600-acre, family-operated farm harvests, dries and stores 400 acres of corn crop to feed 11,000 laying hens and 11,000 replacement pullets annually.

Merry Lake Recreation Farm, Camden. Robert and Mary Cooper gave up their 60-cow dairy herd in 1966 to develop this recreation enterprise. They dammed a creek and made a 180-acre lake for fishing, boating, swimming and converted an old dairy barn into a modern restaurant.

Supply control, legal teeth are key bargaining issues

Two key issues in the bid to build market muscle for farmers are: 1) control over supplies, and 2) legal power for producers.

So said Kenneth Naden, executive vice president of the National Council of Farmer Cooperatives, in reviewing the National Agricultural Bargaining Act introduced by Sen. Walter Mondale (D-Minn.).

Naden said the bill (S2973) contains wide ranging proposals and is sure to spark lively debate in hearings expected soon in the Senate Agriculture committee. It would provide for collective bargaining through an entirely new legal framework and would be in some respects similar to organized labor's apparatus. A bargaining committee of pro-

ducers would negotiate for fairer prices with a similar committee representing processors or other buyers of a commodity. If no agreement could be reached, the issue would be settled by a three man Joint Settlement Committee, including a producer, a buyer and a neutral party.

The procedure would be open to all farm commodities. A five-man National Agricultural Relations Board would be created to conduct referendums and to provide technical and clerical service to both committees during negotiations.

A second approach would permit collective bargaining through an already existing law—the Agricultural Marketing Agreement Act of 1937. The law would

New workmen's compensation program offered

Many family farms require little or no hired labor. Use of modernized farm equipment allows many large productive farms to operate with a minimum of hired help.

Recognizing the need to provide complete protection for both employer and employees in these situations, Farm Bureau Insurance Group has developed a new workmen's compensation program, unique in the insurance industry. The new program is designed for those agricultural employers who do not employ any one employee for a period of five consecutive weeks or longer. It is perfect for farmers who rely on exchange labor or occasional hired help.

Minimum premium is \$30 a year. A flat rate is applied to your annual payroll figure to determine the final premium. This policy provides unlimited medical benefits from the first hour of employment for all employees. This policy also will pay any benefits the employer may be required to provide by the Michigan Workmen's Compensation Act.

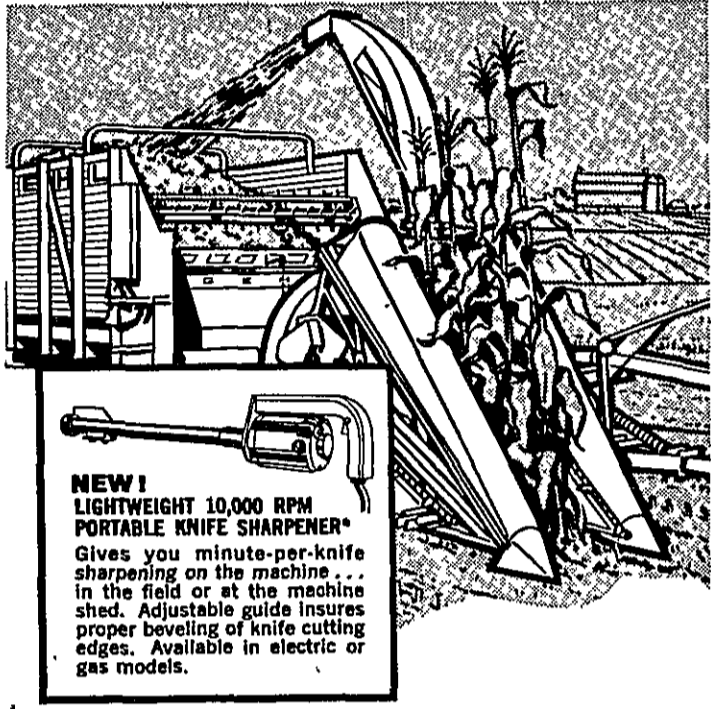

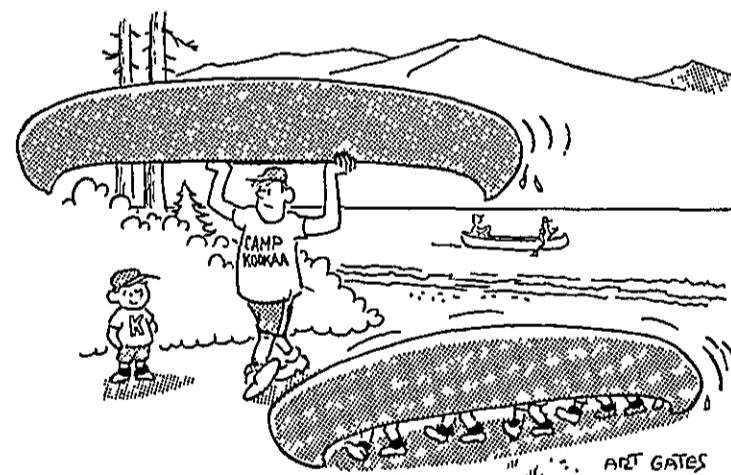
O-E FFA wins FB gold award

Personal income up 12.1% in Michigan, 7.9% nationwide

Personal income in all states increased considerably over a year ago, but Michigan was third from the top in percentage increase. Alaska and Hawaii both enjoyed a rise of 12.8 per cent, while Michigan scored a 12.1 per cent gain. The national average was 7.9 per cent. Statistics were compiled through April of 1968.

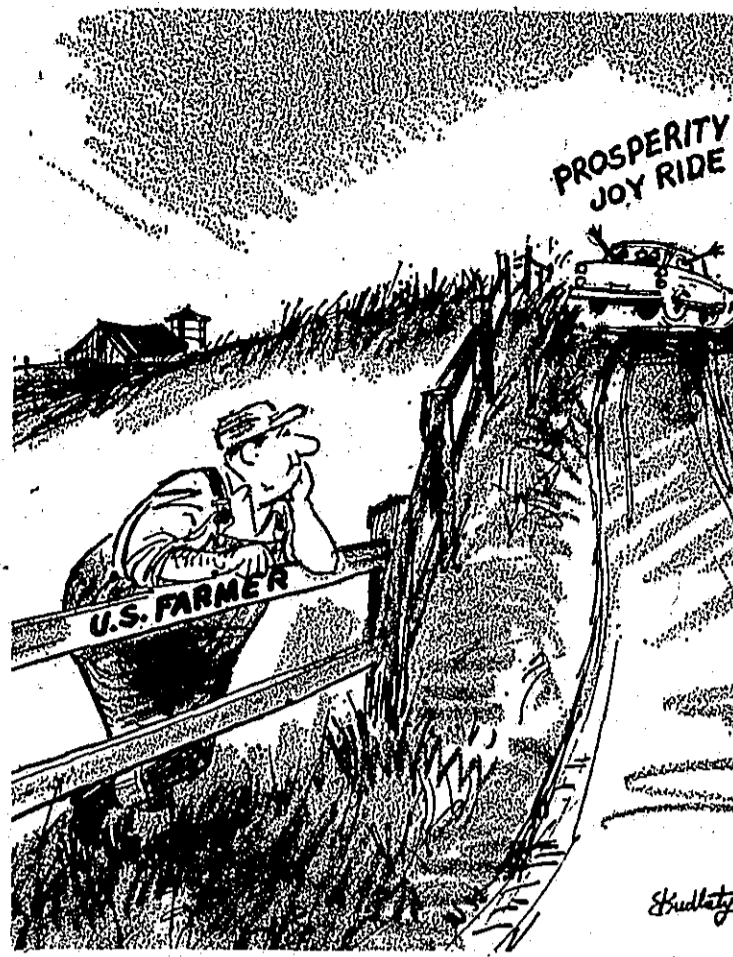

No news is not good news

We seem to be getting the same kind of double-talk regarding the U.S.S. PUEBLO, that we received about the attack on the U.S.S. LIBERTY, by the Israelis, on June 8, 1967.

Rep. William J. Scherle (Iowa) put this information into the Record.

"July 4... marks the 164th day in which the crew of the U.S.S. PUEBLO remains in the hands of the North Korean Communist government.

"We have heard no word from these men. We have heard no word from our government about when they will return.

"We must ask ourselves how our government has handled this matter, and we must ask our government when some action will be taken.

"Recent reports have been disturbing and contradictory. On June 12, it was reported from Poznan, Poland, that North Korea displayed photographs of the crew of the PUEBLO at the Poznan international trade fair, which is supposed to be non-political.

"On June 20, the State Department disclosed that the United States had made 'certain proposals' to North Korea to gain the release of the captured intelligence ship. The press officer,

Civil defense & you

Senator Tower's observations on "America's strategic strength" being one of "a military posture superior to that of our potential enemies" cannot be rationally disputed.

It seems that too often we read in the newspaper or hear a newscast of the VC's use of Russian-made weapons or planes. I suspect the ideals of Communistic superiority are not dead, but that an undermining movement to weaken this government continues.

Another of the "America's strategic strength" is a prepared populace, one with an understanding of the dangers it would face in an attack.

two-thirds of the cost is borne by the central government. Fallout shelters are required in all new buildings (apartments, industries, churches, hotels, theatres and residences) of a certain size at the expense of the owner.

IN SWEDEN, private fallout shelters of specified blast resistance are required in buildings in towns of 5,000 or more with the exception of one story, single-family buildings.

In Switzerland, fallout shelter provisions are required in communities of 1,000 or more population for all new construction and remodeling of structures.

SOME EUROPEAN countries have enacted mandatory fallout shelter legislation. A May 1966 study by the Office of Civil Defense revealed that West Germany, Belgium, Denmark, Finland, Norway, the Netherlands, Sweden and Switzerland have each undertaken means for achieving fallout protection through legislation.

The West German legislature has passed a civil emergency planning bill that requires the inclusion of fallout shelters in all new buildings, residential and industrial, with blast resistance of specified over-pressure required in densely populated areas; federal subsidies are to be granted under the ordinance.

In Denmark, legislation makes compulsory the inclusion of fallout shelters in new buildings having more than two dwellings which must provide both fallout and limited blast protection—at the expense of the owners.

In Finland, a civil defense law requires the owners of all new buildings of a specified volume (3,000 cubic meters or 105,930 cubic feet) within designated areas and supervision districts to construct fallout shelter spaces.
