## Many faceted election Tuesday

# Sheriff's race highlights primary

A four-way race for the Republican nomination for sheriff appears to be one of two highlights of the primary election in Clinton County next Tuesday, Aug. 6.

Incumbent Sheriff Percy J. Patterson, a veteran of 20 years in that office and 43 years as a lawman in Clinton County, is being challenged for nomination by three men who all have experience in law enforcement.

Challengers are Bruce Angell II, chief of police in DeWitt Township; Anthony Pohl, former Ingham County deputy sheriff; and Ramon Terpening, for four years until the last month a Clinton County deputy sheriff.

ANGELL HOLDS A BACHELOR of science degree in police administration and public safety and is an American Red Cross first aid instructor. He has been police chief in DeWitt Township for several years and is also civil defense director of DeWitt Township.

He is a former member of the Boy Scout advisory staff and has been active in planning social events for Clinton County teenagers. He's played an active part in several community safety programs in addition to teaching classes in first aid. He is a member of the Central Michigan Law Enforcement Assn.

Angell and his wife Virginia have a son, Bruce III. The family resides at 2201 Clark Road, Bath.

SHERIFF PERCY J. PATTERSON is seeking his 11th term in office since first being elected Clinton County sheriff in 1948. He joined the sheriff's department May 1, 1925, and served three years under Sheriff B. J. Fox and then 20 years under Sheriff Jack Barnes before being elected to the post himself in 1948.

He is a graduate of the FBI National Academy in Washington, D. C., an active member of the national chapter and Michigan chapter of the FBI Associates and the national and Michigan Sheriff's Assns.

Patterson is a native of St. Johns and his wife, Dora, is formerly from Merrill. He is a life member of the Masonic Lodge.

ANTHONY POHL OF WESTPHALIA is a former deputy sheriff of the Ingham County Sheriff's Department where he served for seven years. He was also with the Lansing Police Department for two years. He's a former member of the Michigan Sheriff's Assn.

Pohl, 41, is also a member of the American Legion, Catholic Order of Foresters and the Grand Lodge Aviation Council. He has been an active pilot since 1947 and is a Navy veteran of World War II.

He and his wife have six children. They attend St. Michael's Church in Grand Ledge.

RAMON TERPENING, 32, IS A LONG-time resident of

St. Johns, coming here about 21 years ago and graduating from St. Johns High School. He was employed at Sealed Power Corp. prior to joining the Clinton County Sheriff's Department in June 1964.

He completed a course in law enforcement and administration that year and an FBI basic law enforcement training course in 1966. He's a member of the Central Michigan Law Enforcement Assn.

Terpening is a past vice president and president of the Central School PTA. He and his wife Darlene have four children, Karen, 12, Brenda, 9, Cindy, 7, and Mike, 4-1/2.

## Plenty of names on ballot

A wild conglomeration of names faces Clinton County voters in the Aug. 6 primary election next week, but only the races for legislative seats in the 87th and 88th district will give a wide choice of candidates.

Outside of the sheriff's race and those for county supervisors, the only real competition on the ballot is provided in the legislative races in both the Republican and Democratic parties.

In the 88th District, which includes Eagle, Watertown, Westphalia, Riley, Dallas, Bengal, Lebanon, Essex, Greenbush and Duplain townships of Clinton County eight people are seeking Republican nomination for the seat vacated by Lester Allen. Included are his son, Richard J. Allen, and C. J. Bender, Harmon G. Crossley, Homer D. Hendricks, Marguerite I. Huhn, William C. Nicholas, James M. Palmeter and Thell M. Woods. Crossley and Nicholas are the only candidates from Clinton County.

On the Democratic ballot in the 88th district is Joseph F. Davey.

Democrats are seeking nomination in the 87th Legislative District. William S. Ballenger, Robert D. Dittmer, Charles A. Harper, Lamont Meier, Thomas E. Oakley, Charles J. Post, Robert A. Schultz and David L. Schwab are Republican candidates, with only Dittmer being from Clinton County. Richard D. Duzenbury and Sanford Volker are Democratic candidates.

THE 87TH DISTRICT includes all of Shiawassee County and Bingham, Ovid, Olive, Victor, DeWitt and Bath townships in Clinton County.

At the county level, the only race is for sheriff in the Republican ballot, where incumbent Sheriff Percy J. Patterson is being challenged by Anthony H. Pohl, Ramon E. Terpening and Bruce E. Angell II. Richard Cornwell is reportedly seeking a write-in vote for sheriff on the Democratic ticket.

There is no competition for the other county offices, and only Republicans have pieces on the ballots. Ernest Carter is seeking election as county clerk after his appointment to the post last January. Velma Beaufore is seeking reelection as treasurer and Dale Chapman as drain commissioner. Willard Krebel is a candidate for county register of deeds; incumbent Marie Belknap is not seeking reelection. Incumbent Van W. Hoag and Lee R. Rummell

## Competition faces all but 4 of supervisor candidates

Nine members of the current Clinton County Board of Supervisors are seeking election in eight of the 11 districts from which members of a new board of

supervisors will be elected in November.

All but one of them—William Hufnagel in District 7 (Dallas and Westphalia townships)—will

have competition to beat first, however, in next Tuesday's primary election.

All in all, 22 men are seeking the 11 seats on the new board

which will take effect Jan. 1. It was brought on by the one-man, one-vote ruling of the Supreme Court.

Current supervisors who are running for the new seats include Derrill Shnabery of Greenbush Township in District 1 (Greenbush and Duplain); Claude Underhill of Victor in District 6 (Riley Olive and Victor); Gerald Lankford of the City of DeWitt in District 9 (DeWitt Township north and west of Clark and Turner roads); Gerald Shepard of Bath in District 11 (Bath); Walter Nobis of Lebanon and John M. Setterington in District 2 (Lebanon, Essex and Bengal townships); Maurice Gove of Bingham in District 3 (Bingham and a portion of St. Johns); and Rex Sirrine of St. Johns in District 4 (the remainder of St. Johns).

All but one of the 22 candidates on the ballot are Republicans. The lone Democrat is Roy F. Andrews, who is running unopposed in District 10, which includes DeWitt Township south and east of Clark and Turner Roads.

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# Kerner report implications for St. Johns studied

The implications of the Kerner Report on civil disorders as they relate to St. Johns were discussed in detail last Thursday night by a Michigan State University professor speaking to about 40 persons in St. Johns.

The group, calling itself the St. Johns Kerner Committee, met at Niles Hall in the Meth-

odist Church. Dr. James Fendrich, professor of sociology teaching this summer at Michigan State University, was the speaker, talking on how to relate the implications of the Kerner Report to a community.

The committee was formed after about 50 or 60 community citizens expressed an interest

in a study of the Report of the National Advisory Commission on Civil Disorders, with former Gov. Otto Kerner of Illinois as chairman.

Members of the committee present for last Thursday's meeting included Mrs. Carol Keys, William Morris, Philip Greer, Rev. Hugh Banning, Rev. Joseph Labiak, Lewis G. Moldenhauer, William Chalmers and Miss Janet Sipkovsky. About 30 other interested citizens also heard Dr. Fendrich speak.

HE SUGGESTED FOUR ways of relating the implications, one of which is informing ourselves about our community, our relationship to other communities, the ideals and standards, interests of the community, educational background, etc. He suggested that to really know a community, one has to look at it from the perspective of others outside it who know the area.

He spoke of the need of breaking down the stereotypes and of fracturing prejudices and gave a few examples. We think of the U. S. as devoting huge sums of money to welfare, which it does — 7 per cent of our tax money going for this purpose. He also mentioned that other countries spend even more: Germany, for example, spends 17 per cent on welfare. We speak of an equitable tax base, and yet people who make less than \$3,000 per year spend 21 per cent on taxes while those in the \$10,000 bracket spend closer to 7 per cent in taxes.

He referred to the book "The Other America" by Michael Harrington, who speaks of the upside-down welfare state in this country. Harrington claims that

we have a great deal of socialism for our middle class and free enterprise for the poor. A few examples he gives are medicare program, Medicaid, social security retirement, most of which goes, he said, to the middle third of the population; subsidy to the farmers, and FHA loans. It was said that these FHA loans had helped to finance 10,000,000 homes since 1934 while aid in housing has helped only 800,000 poor class families. In reference to the poor we call this a give-away program.

HE SUGGESTED THAT there is no public school system in this country, that schools are subsidized nationally and locally but are run by special interest groups who get elected to school boards and that there is no equal distribution of resources to all communities. He suggested that we might see the day when black power groups take over their own school system.

Another comparison was offered in regard to welfare. It was said that all kinds of "make work programs" are provided for the middle class; yet when we have CCC or Youth Corps programs for the poorer classes, this is known as welfare. At the same time many scientists and educators are subsidized through grants which we do not call welfare. One out of every three dollars for state universities comes from the federal government.

We have the "American dream," as Dr. Fendrich said, that through hard work, initiative, and a little luck, people can better themselves. This is a myth because the redistribution of wealth has skipped the

bottom 10 per cent of our population. In 1966, for example, the bottom 10 per cent got one per cent of the national wealth. The proportion of black people in poverty is increasing.

To be informed, we were told to develop a sense of empathy, to try to see the world as the other person sees it. The examples given were of how the ghetto dwellers look at the police. Dr. Fendrich said that while we may not agree with this, if we had lived in a ghetto all our lives we might be able to understand how they look upon the police force.

Some suggestions were made in regard to the education of the community; providing books, not on statistics, so much as on experiences such as biographies and autobiographies and history books; reviewing the textbooks used in schools; setting up educational programs in schools and adult groups in the understanding of minority peoples and problems; taking a look at the history of some of the difficult situations in which we find ourselves today.

DR. FENDRICH'S second point was to engage in introspection, either by ourselves or in groups; for example, to ask ourselves about the effectiveness of the Christmas basket program and what happens to these people the other 51 weeks of the year. He said that there are those whom we regard as culturally deprived and that this is not so, although they may be economically and educationally deprived. An example was given of the program at Harvard where 200 Negro young men were received into the university not on the basis of standard testing but of a test devised to evaluate their aspirations. It was discovered that the achievements of those selected were approximately the same and in some cases better than their fellow white students, even though their previous marks may have been lower.

He suggested looking into the manifest and latent motives of our non-profit organizations. He cited the example of the Red Cross, which has a maintenance of only 25 per cent, while there are other organizations spending 90 per cent perpetuating themselves. He estimated the holdings of the Catholic and Protestant churches in the country to be approximately \$74,000,000,000 and hinted that perhaps these churches spend most of their time protecting middle class interests.

There are projects going on in the churches now to help the poor but he decried these as "tokenism" and barely tapping the wealth of the churches. It was said that the churches in general promote institutional racism. The interesting remark was made that through self-education and enlightened self-interest we might find more powerful motives than charity.

DR. FENDRICH made commit-

ment his third point. He suggested that as a rule of thumb, "In general the greater resistance you encounter, the more likelihood that you are working on something important."

His fourth point was the selection of concrete sources of action. He referred to a booklet "Crisis in America" for numerous suggestions. A few he mentioned were to develop dialog with black churches, to serve on committees such as the Urban League or committees promoting the improvement of Negro

colleges, the formation of critique committees on school textbooks, to form group study projects, to boycott discriminatory stores, to promote the hiring of minority groups, to find out who the poor are in a community, to gather and send petitions to legislators backing the Kerner report and the reform of welfare programs, etc.

Other suggestions were participating in the family-to-family program in Lansing, a six-months project under the guidance of social workers or volunteering

in Lansing for the rumor control center which needs workers.

Finally he suggested that is we were looking for satisfaction from any course of action taken, we will probably be badly disappointed. He posed the question using the title of a book he recommended: "The Impossible Revolution?"

Fathers Banning and Labiak mentioned the possibility of several workshops which will be starting in August on these topics. They can be contacted for further information.

# Woodman endorses 3 Constitution changes

Three little-known but "important" amendments to Michigan's Constitution are being endorsed by Blair G. Woodman, the retiring state representative from Michigan's 87th District. Woodman said last week he endorses all three proposed amendments and urges their passage. They'll be on the ballot in the Aug. 6 primary election after having been adopted by the House of Representatives and the Senate by "overwhelming majorities."

Woodman commented on each of the proposals:  
 "Proposal No. 1 would establish a Judicial Tenure Commission to investigate complaints about conduct of judges. The commission is not authorized to take disciplinary action itself. Instead, recommendations are submitted to the Supreme Court which may decide to censure, suspend, remove or retire a judge convicted of a felony or physical or mental disability which prevents the performance of judicial duties. The commission would be made up of judges, lawyers and laymen to provide a balance of view points and interests and assure non-biased appraisals.

"AT PRESENT, Michigan judges may be removed from office by two procedures: 1) by impeachment, which may be used in the case of any civil officer, and 2) by removal by direct legislative action pursuant to the adoption of a concurrent resolution approved by two-thirds of the members of each house. The proposed amendment establishing a tenure commission would provide a third process for removing judges from office.

"The Judicial Tenure Commission would provide several advantages as compared to the present methods of removing judges (impeachment and direct legislative action being at the least very cumbersome). Under the proposed plan, the amendment authorizes not only the

removal of judges but also disciplinary action where removal is not warranted.

"The Supreme Court, which is the head of the judicial branch of government, is strengthened by being given the power to remove or otherwise discipline judges, and the judiciary will have a voice in monitoring its own members since the representatives of the judges of the various courts will be serving on the commission. The Tenure Commission can function to prevent abuses from arising by making continuing investigations and by the power of persuasion. Finally, the confidentiality of investigations will serve as a protection to judges against malicious and unfounded charges.

"Proposal No. 2 establishes a State Officers Compensation Commission of seven members. It would be empowered to set the salaries of legislators and of the governor, lieutenant governor and justices of the Supreme Court. Under the proposed system, salaries set by the compensation commission would be final unless rejected by a two-thirds vote in each house of the legislature.

"The main advantage of empowering a compensation commission to make salary deter-

minations would be to relieve the legislators from taking direct responsibility on a matter in which they have a personal stake. A precedent does exist in Michigan by allowing salaries to be set by an independent agency. The State Civil Service Commission, a constitutionally established independent body, is empowered to fix the compensation of state employees in the classified services.

"Proposal No. 3 authorizes the governor to fill judicial vacancies by appointment. He would not be able to appoint persons to newly created judgeships since these posts would be filled by election. The person appointed would fill the vacancy until Jan. 1 following the next general election after the vacancy occurred. The appointee would be eligible to run for election to fill the unexpired portion of the term of office or the full term if such should be the case and receive the "incumbent" designation on the ballot.

"The Constitution of 1963 does permit the Supreme Court to assign retired judges to perform judicial duties for a limited time from the occurrence of a vacancy until the successor was elected and qualified. Experience has proven that there does not seem to be a sufficient number of retired judges to perform these duties.

"The proposed amendment is needed because the present system is developing a unique problem that could conceivably result in prolonged vacancies on the bench. It also enables the electorate to evaluate the competency of a person to fill a judicial vacancy by election if he has been appointed to the post and compiled a record."

## Lucas wins sea cruise for sales performance

Audley Lucas of 109 N. Lansing Street, a salesman for Egan Ford Sales, Inc. of St. Johns, is spending this week with his wife on a cruise to San Juan, Puerto Rico, and St. Thomas. The cruise is a top prize in a Ford sales competition, and Lucas is making the trip along with 1,250 other Ford salesmen from across the nation. The trip started Friday morning when they left Detroit Metro Airport on a chartered flight to New York. There they boarded a luxury liner, "Independence," for a four-day cruise to San Juan P.R., and St. Thomas. They were to fly back from St. Thomas to New York Tuesday evening.

ASHLEY-Portec, Inc. (formerly Poor & Company) today announced an agreement to purchase for cash the business of Paragon Bridge & Steel Co. of Novi and Ashley, Mich.

Paragon specializes in the manufacture of auto shipping racks, auto frame equipment, auto parts racks, and the fabrication and erection of structural steel. It will become a division of Portec, Inc. without change in management, with Gilbert T. Innes as general manager.

Portec, Inc. are manufacturers of pit, quarry and crushing equipment for the road construction and mining industries, producers of railway products and shipping systems equipment, and of steel forgings, ferrous castings and specialty belting for industrial users.

## Library will hold book sale

According to Mrs. Hila Bross, librarian, the new organization called Friends of the Bement Public Library will sponsor the event with the library staff to help raise money for the club's treasury. The club has been organized for less than one year and needs the money to get the club on the way after some financial confusion at the first sessions.

Librarians will be at the bank corner to sell books that are not in use by the library any longer or books that have been donated by members of the community. The sale will last the duration of both days of sidewalk days.

Mrs. Bross added that the club would like to welcome new members and asked that interested members of the community stop by the library and talk with her about the club and its activities. She continued to say that the library will hold handicraft classes for children who were in kindergarten through the third grade for the 1967-68 school year. Registration is starting now for the classes to be held each Tuesday of August under the direction of Mrs. Larry Madar.

## 6-month sales up, earnings off slightly at Federal-Mogul

Federal-Mogul Corp.'s sales for the first six months of 1968 were \$121,581,000 and net earnings for the period, after giving effect to the 10 per cent income tax surcharge, were \$8,730,000, or \$1.28 a common share.

In the comparable period of 1967, Federal-Mogul's sales were \$115,992,000 and net earnings were \$6,840,000, or \$1.28 a common share. For the second quarter of 1968 sales were \$61,215,000 and net earnings totaled \$3,692,000, or \$.69 per common share. In the corresponding period of 1967, sales were \$58,532,000 and earnings were \$3,657,000, or \$.69 a share.

The company reported that its net earnings for six months of 1968 were reduced by \$.12 a share for the income tax surcharge, of which \$.07 a share applied to the second quarter.

IF ALL OUTSTANDING preferred shares were converted, earnings per share would be reduced by \$.03 a share in the six month period of each year.

Guy S. Peppatt, chairman of the board, said that Federal-Mogul's earnings in the last half of this year are expected to be substantially larger than they were in the last half of 1967, despite higher taxes and other cost increases that now prevail.

## Sister cities 'keyed' for visitors trade

(Continued from Page 1-A)

at city hall by Mayor Charles Coletta, Commissioners Mrs Jeanne Rand and Rex Serrine, City Clerk Thomas Hundley and members of the press.

Following a press conference, Fr. Castillo and Zwinnck were given a tour of city and school facilities and Federal-Mogul and Sealed Power industrial plants prior to a dinner in the evening.

SATURDAY MORNING about 9 a.m., some 24 local persons departed on a bus for an overland trip to British Honduras. They planned to camp along the way.

St. Johns and Stann Creek are the fourth link under the Town Affiliation Assn. of People-to-People and Michigan Partners of the Alliance for Progress programs between Michigan and

British Honduras. Stann Creek Town is the capital city for the Stann Creek District, one of six regions in the nation soon to become independent Belize. The St. Johns affiliation will include the town, nine villages and rural area, with a combined population of about 15,000 persons.

Stann Creek is a major part for the small nation. The town has sandy beaches, palm trees, and Caribbean waters. The district is largely citrus, exporting fruit, canned juice, and other local products. The only agricultural college, actually a high school, in the nation is Lynam College about 10 miles from Stann Creek Town.

The 4-H clubs, Boy Scouts, Girl Guides, and other groups want exchanges of their members in both directions next July. The

outstanding Carib dance group, known as the Butterflies, and Mayor Albert Arzu are among the Stann Creek people who hope to come to Michigan July 17, 1968. Invitations have been extended to local Boy and Girl Scouts, 4-H Club members, and others to visit Stann Creek, a peaceful valley with friendly people.

Unlike most of the rest of the nation, where Mayan and other art forms have been lost over the centuries, the Caribs have retained much of their original culture. Everywhere people are dancing the native steps.

Stann Creek Town has 6,000 people. The high schools are operated by the Catholic and Anglican churches, and these and other churches have elementary schools. One doctor serves the entire district, where there are few vehicles outside of the Town and factories. There are three dentists in the nation. In spite of the acute lack of medical facilities and an inadequate hospital, malnutrition is unknown.

Even the poor people help care for their relatives and neighbors. With such fertile land, food is plentiful, and many people are more than six feet in height. Even children are tall for their age by U. S. standards.

St. Johns has passed a resolution inviting Stann Creek to affiliate as a sister-city, and Stann Creek has accepted. Reverend Eugene Friesen of St. Johns has been there, and last month Zwinnck, cultural affairs chairman for the Michigan Partners, spent four days touring the district and explaining the affiliation, which Mayor Arzu and others promised will soon be the best of the four in British Honduras, even though this is the newest.

Mrs Friesen and others are now on their way by land to British Honduras, and a delegation is being selected to visit Stann Creek in July 1969.

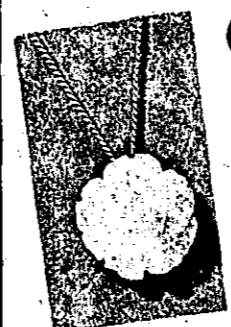

## Intangibles tax money distributed

## CITY OF DeWITT ORDINANCE NO. 48

AN ORDINANCE ADOPTING A FIRE PREVENTION CODE PRESCRIBING REGULATIONS GOVERNING CONDITIONS HAZARDOUS TO LIFE AND PROPERTY FROM FIRE OR EXPLOSION, AND ESTABLISHING A BUREAU OF FIRE PREVENTION AND PROVIDING OFFICERS THEREFOR AND DEFINING THEIR POWERS AND DUTIES.

Be it ordained by the City Council of DeWitt, Michigan

### SECTION 1. Adoption of Fire Prevention Code.

There is hereby adopted by the City Council for the purpose of prescribing regulations governing conditions hazardous to life and property from fire or explosion, that certain code known as the Fire Prevention Code recommended by the American Insurance Association, being particularly the 1965 edition thereof and the whole thereof, save and except such portions as are herein-after deleted, modified or amended (by section 7 of this ordinance), of which code not less than three (3) copies have been and now are filed in the office of the Clerk of the City of DeWitt, Michigan and the same are hereby adopted and incorporated as fully as if set out at length herein, and from the date on which this ordinance shall take effect, the provisions thereof shall be controlling within the limits of the City of DeWitt, Michigan.

The City Council also adopts the National Fire Prevention Code by reference.

### SECTION 2. Establishment and Duties of Bureau of Fire Prevention.

a. The Fire Prevention Code shall be enforced by the Bureau of Fire Prevention in the Fire Department of the City of DeWitt, Michigan, which is hereby established and which shall be operated under the supervision of the Chief of the Fire Department.

b. The Fire Marshal in charge of the Bureau of Fire Prevention shall be appointed by the Mayor of the City on the basis of examination to determine his qualifications. His appointment shall continue for two years.

c. The Chief of the Fire Department may detail such members of the Fire department as inspectors as shall from time to time be necessary. The Chief of the Fire Department shall recommend to the Police and Fire Board the employment of technical inspectors, who, when such authorization is made, shall be selected through an examination to determine their fitness for the position. The examination shall be open to members and non-members of the Fire department, and appointments made after examination shall be for a two year term.

d. A report of the Bureau of Fire Prevention shall be made annually and transmitted to the chief executive officer of the municipality; it shall contain all proceedings under this code, with such statistics as the Chief of the Fire Department shall wish to include therein; the Chief of the Fire Department shall also recommend any amendments to the code which, in his judgment, shall be desirable.

e. Where the chief of the Fire Prevention is used in the Fire Prevention Code it shall be held to mean the Fire Marshal.

### SECTION 3. Definitions.

a. Wherever the word "Municipality" is used in the Fire Prevention Code, it shall be held to mean the City of DeWitt, Michigan.

b. Wherever the term "Corporation Counsel" is used in the Fire Prevention Code, it shall be held to mean the Attorney for the City of DeWitt, Michigan.

### SECTION 4. Establishment of Limits of Districts in which Storage of Explosives and Blasting Agents is to be Prohibited.

The limits referred to in section 12/5b of the Fire Prevention Code, in which storage of explosives and blasting agents is prohibited, are hereby established as follows: No explosives or blasting agents shall be stored within the City Limits of DeWitt, Michigan.

### SECTION 5. Establishment of Limits of Districts in which Storage of Flammable Liquids in Outside Aboveground Tanks is to be Prohibited.

a. The limits referred to in section 16, 22a of the Fire Prevention Code in which storage of flammable liquids in outside aboveground tanks is prohibited, are hereby established as follows: No flammable liquids in aboveground tanks shall be stored within the Zones, A, B, and Commercial of the Zoning Ordinance of the City of DeWitt, Michigan.

b. The limits referred to in section 16, 51 of the Fire Prevention Code, in which new bulk plants for flammable or combustible liquids are prohibited, are hereby established as follows: No new bulk plants for flammable or combustible liquids shall be erected in Zones A and B of the Zoning Ordinance of the City of DeWitt, Michigan.

### SECTION 6. Establishment of Limits in which Bulk Storage of Liquid Petroleum Gases is to be Restricted.

a. The limits referred to in section 21, 6a of the Fire Prevention Code, in which bulk storage of liquefied petroleum gas is restricted, are hereby established as follows: No bulk storage of liquefied petroleum gas is permitted in Zones A, B, and Commercial of the Zoning Ordinance of the City of DeWitt, Michigan.

### SECTION 7. Amendments Made in the Fire Prevention Code.

The Fire Prevention Code is amended and changed in the following respects: Article 28, Section 28.1, Paragraph b. to read as follows: Hours for burning when permit issued; fires to be supervised; flames and ashes to be extinguished.

No person shall make any fire or burn any trash, rubbish, papers, refuse, grass, leaves or materials covered by permits other than between the hours of sunrise and eleven o'clock p.m.

Leaves, cut grass and yard rakkings in season may be burned in open fires between the hours of sunrise and eleven o'clock p.m. provided however, such fire remains under the direct and constant supervision of some competent adult person. Any person making or setting such fire shall not allow any fire to become so large or so intense that the fire is not within the complete control of the person supervising same. No person shall allow such fire to injure, damage or ignite any building, building structure, ornamental shrubbery, trees or hedge or any other property. Any open flame or ashes must be completely extinguished before being abandoned. Any person violating any of this section will be held responsible

for any damage caused by him and will be subject to the issuance of a court summons and dealt with in accordance with section eleven.

Addition of paragraph e: To read as follows: Fires to be confined in fireproof container, location of metal drum, portable or masonry type, spark arresters required on stack.

No person shall set or cause to be set, burn or cause to be burned any paper, trash, rubbish, unless confined within a fireproof container approved by the fire prevention bureau constructed of metal or masonry with an approved spark arrester. With openings no larger than three-fourths of an inch.

Hours of burning shall be from sunrise to not later than eleven o'clock p.m. Burners of the metal drum or portable type shall not be located less than fifteen feet from any building or less than five feet from the adjoining property line.

Masonry or heavy metal constructed burners or incinerators shall be constructed to withstand the heat of twelve hundred degrees Fahrenheit and shall be located not less than three feet from a combustible building or property line.

Masonry or heavy metal burners or incinerators shall be constructed with or attached to a suitable stack if within 15' of another building. The top of the stack to be at least three feet above the eave line of adjoining building. All stacks are to be properly capped with approved spark arresters.

### SECTION 8. Modifications.

Fire Marshal of the Bureau of Fire Prevention shall have power to modify any of the provisions of the Fire Prevention Code upon application in writing by the owner or lessee, or his duly authorized agent, when there are practical difficulties in the way of carrying out the strict letter of the code, provided that the spirit of the code shall be observed, public safety secured, and substantial justice done. The particulars of such modification when granted or allowed and the decision of the Fire Marshal of the Bureau of Fire Prevention thereon shall be entered upon the records of the department and a signed copy shall be furnished the applicant.

### SECTION 9. Appeals.

Whenever the Chief of the Fire Department shall disapprove an application or refuse to grant a permit applied for, or when it is claimed that the provisions of the code do not apply or that the true intent and meaning of the code have been misconstrued or wrongly interpreted, the applicant may appeal from the decision of the Chief of the Fire Department to City Council within thirty (30) days from the date of the decision appealed.

### SECTION 10. New Materials, Processes or Occupancies which may Require Permits.

The designated member of City Council, the Chief of the Fire Department and the Fire Marshal of the Bureau of Fire Prevention shall act as a committee to determine and specify, after giving affected persons an opportunity to be heard, any new materials, processes or occupancies, which shall require permits. In addition to those now enumerated in said code, The Fire Marshal of the Bureau of Fire Prevention shall post such list in a conspicuous place in his office, and distribute copies thereof to interested persons.

### SECTION 11. Penalties.

a. Any person who shall violate any of the provisions of the code hereby adopted or fail to comply therewith, or who shall violate or fail to comply with any order made thereunder, or who shall build in violation of any detailed statement of specifications or plans submitted and approved thereunder, or any certificate of permit issued thereunder, and from which no appeal has been taken, or who shall fail to comply with such an order as affirmed or modified by the City Council or by a court of competent jurisdiction, within the time fixed herein, shall severally for each and every such violation and noncompliance respectively, be guilty of a misdemeanor, punishable by a fine of not less than \$25.00 nor more than \$100.00 or by imprisonment for not less than 1 day nor more than 90 days or by both such fine and imprisonment. The imposition of one penalty for any violation shall not excuse the violation or permit it to continue; and all such persons shall be required to correct or remedy such violations or defects within a reasonable time; and when not otherwise specified, each ten days that prohibited conditions are maintained shall constitute a separate offense.

b. The application of the above penalty shall not be held to prevent the enforced removal of prohibited conditions.

### SECTION 12. Repeal of Conflicting Ordinances.

All former ordinances or parts thereof conflicting or inconsistent with the provisions of this ordinance or of the code hereby adopted are hereby repealed. In particular Ordinance No. 18 Fire Prevention Code.

### SECTION 13. Validity.

The City Council of the City of DeWitt, Michigan hereby declares that should any section, paragraph, sentence, or work of this ordinance or of the code hereby adopted be declared for any reason to be invalid, it is the intent of City Council that it would have passed all other portions of this ordinance independent of the elimination herefrom of any such portion as may be declared invalid.

### SECTION 14. Date of Effect:

This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its approval as required by law.

This Ordinance shall become effective on the date of publication, August 1, 1968.

# Healthy sales, earnings buoy Sealed Power spirits

First half earnings of Sealed Power Corp. showed a 16 per cent increase over the first six months of 1967 on a five per cent gain in sales, said Gordon E. Reynolds, president.

Net earnings amounted to \$1,573,000, or \$1.11 per share, compared with \$1,368,000, or 96 cents per share, in 1967. Net sales for the half rose to \$25,047,000 from \$23,955,000.

Reynolds said the entire impact of the 10 per cent surtax retroactive to Jan. 1 was absorbed in the second quarter. In spite of this, second quarter earnings increased 11 per cent to \$792,000, or 56 cents per share, from \$715,000, or 50 cents per share, in the prior year.

Second quarter sales totaled \$13,179,000, compared with \$12,056,000 last year, a nine per cent gain over the 1967 quarter.

THE EXECUTIVE attributed the earnings increase to higher sales in the replacement market and to some favorable price adjustments, both in the replacement market and in contracts with original equipment manufacturers.

He predicted a firm OEM market in 1969 due to the automotive industry's good reception of two recently introduced products—a new anti-smog piston ring and an oil ring of new design which cuts oil consumption.

"The anti-smog ring is expected to be of major help to the auto industry in meeting federal emission standards in 1970 models, and it is anticipated there will be some demand for it in the replacement field as well," Reynolds said.

"As more cars and trucks built in the high production years beginning with 1962 enter the repairable age bracket, sales of replacement parts continue to grow," he added.

Directors of Sealed Power Corp. have declared a regular quarterly dividend of 25 cents per share, payable Sept. 10, 1968, to shareholders of record Aug. 20, 1968.

The dividend will be paid on the additional shares to be distributed Aug. 7 to shareholders of record July 17 as a result of a 10 per cent stock dividend declared in June.

Sealed Power, a manufacturer of piston rings, cylinder sleeves and related precision engine parts, has paid dividends for 29 consecutive years.

**Clinton Road Report**  
By ROBERT ELDRIDGE Road Clerk

You may have wondered, if you have driven over Francis Road north of old US-16 this past weekend, just why only half of the road was resealed. It is explained by the fact that our new chip spreader broke down at that point. We had difficulty with a clutch adjustment and this put the machine out of operation from Thursday noon until Tuesday morning. The last full day the machine was in operation, the crew was able to reseat six miles of road, a much better rate of production than had been anticipated. With trouble-free going and no long moves between jobs, it would not be surprising if an even better record could be made.

Work has started on that mile of Upton Road between Herbison and Howe Roads. It is planned to rebuild this mile using a 36 foot grade and capping it with a 24 foot prime and double seal coat asphalt. The necessary clearing and grubbing work is being done first and then the grade will be laid. The seal coat will be put down next year—this allows for plenty of time to get good compaction of the road bed.

All the earth moving is done on the Clark Road project between Airport and DeWitt Roads and ditching and shoulder work is now under way. Due to the seal coating work, we are not able to haul much sand and gravel for the new construction projects right now but in about two weeks we will be able to go to work again on this phase of the projects.

In the office here at the commission, we have been busy these past several weeks changing over a large portion of our accounting system so that much of the work can be done on a computer. There is a great deal of detailed breakdown and classification of expenses in road commission accounting and this lends itself well to a computer operation. We hope in the future to be able to more accurately cost out the many operations of the commission and to increase generally the overall efficiency and usability of our accounting system through the use of the computer. It is rough going at times during this change-over period but, no doubt, a year from now it will all seem routine.



# MOSTLY For MEN

by CHUCK FLYNN

When you're entertaining outdoors, a "one dish" meal requiring minimal attention from the chef is most helpful. This requires some advance preparation, but timed properly you can be relaxed and available for hosting when the guests arrive.

The recipe is for four generous servings but can be multiplied for more people. Select a good quality boneless chuck roast of about three pounds. You also can use a blade cut, but oftentimes it's not economical. Have the roast cut about two inches thick.

Rub the roast with salad oil and elder vinegar, then sprinkle both sides generously with an unseasoned meat tenderizer. Incidentally, I advise against the use of seasoned tenderizers which cost more. Besides I like to choose the seasonings to fit the dish to be cooked.

Allow the roast to reach room temperature. Meantime build a charcoal fire a little larger than the size of the roast. When the coals are grey but still quite hot, drop on some wet hickory chips and brown the roast on each side. About five minutes for each side should be ample.

Take two pieces of heavy aluminum foil about twice the dimensions of the roast. Place the roast on the foil, and atop it and on the sides put four peeled potatoes, halved if large, four scraped carrots, and four medium sized onions. Peel the onions and leave whole. You can add more vegetables if you desire greater quantity. Sometimes I add four wedges of cabbage to the basic recipe.

After the roast and vegetables have been placed on the foil, salt and pepper to taste, then close, using the drug store fold, sealing at the top. Spread the charcoal on the entire package will be evenly heated and cook over a low fire. Do not turn. You and your guests will get a kick out of the bubbling of the sealed-in natural juices in this dish as well as an occasional whiff of the delights to come when steam escapes from the package.

Serve directly from the foil or place the roast and vegetables on a heated platter. In either case, open the package carefully because you'll want to use the quite tasty gravy which results.

## Make 2 egg yolks do

When does two equal one? This is no riddle, but a reality that you can use to your advantage. Think of two egg yolks substituting for one whole egg in favorite recipes. Such substitutes are fine in such dishes as scrambled eggs, custards, pancakes, breads, many cookies, cakes and puddings.

When special recipes call for egg whites, there are some people who think only of homemade noodles as a way to use the leftover yolks. There are many ways to use two yolks to replace one whole egg. Think of custards, baked custards, yellow cakes, many cookies and quick breads. Hollandaise sauce, meat loaf and meat balls at the same time you are separating eggs to use only the whites in a recipe. If its just the opposite, and your recipe calls for yolks, leaving you with extra whites, consider angel food and Lady Baltimore Cakes, meringue for pies and puddings, soups, fluffy sauces, puddings or even delicious Sea Foam Candy. Omelets can always absorb extra egg whites, especially the fluffy tops that call for

beaten whites folded into the yolk-milk mixture. Hard cooked eggs can be divided into "yellow" and "white" for many uses. The protein in eggs is classified as "complete" indicating they can be used in place of meat, fish, poultry or cheese in meal planning. Two large eggs provide about the same amount of protein as an average serving of meat or cheese. And, for weight-watchers eggs are low in calories.

Heat lowers the quality of eggs very rapidly. Therefore buy eggs only from refrigerated cases and hurry them home and into your own refrigerator.

A good rule to follow to get the most for your money when buying eggs is—large eggs sell for more than one-third above the price of small eggs, then small eggs are the better buy, ounce for ounce of egg.

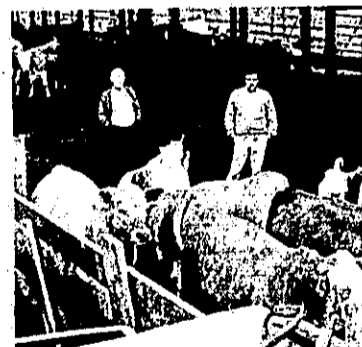

### Anderson amateur archeologist

# He studies local Indian lore

He used to clear fields of stones or plow around them. I figured they all had a purpose and set about finding out what it was. That is the story of Clyde Anderson, an amateur archeologist.

Mr Anderson has been a resident of St. Johns since 1916 when he moved here from Wexford County. He has been collecting stones and Indian relics for over 50 years. It was about two years ago he found his real treasure.

After studying a Hinsdale Atlas, showing Indian trails, campgrounds and burial sites, he found a burial ground himself. Although he only found three untouched graves, he discovered numerous relics.

Anderson had spent much time studying the information put out by Hinsdale before his son brought him an atlas from the Jackson Library. He tried aerial searches for a main trailway and other methods of discovery before a friend helped him locate the grave site near Maple Rapids on the Maple River.

According to other research similar to his own, Anderson says the Indians in the graves are probably Chippewa or Huron.

Due to the advanced state of decay it is almost impossible to come to any definite conclusions about much of the discovery.

It is suspected, due to items found in the graves, that they date back to the turn of the 19th century. Some of the jewelry and ornaments were trade items picked up from either the French or British traders that were in the area at the time.

Trade marks on the pieces that can be traced, lead Anderson to the conclusion that the graves were dug between 1794 and 1812.

From evidences on the bodies, Anderson concludes that the Indians were probably wrapped in a blanket covered with reeds, bark or slab wood of various nature. In the cases he found, he believes that the corpse was decorated to portray the life

of the person. He found one grave of a large male that also contained an ax, a knife at his right side, gun parts above his left shoulder and his pipe in hand.

A second grave, containing the body of a woman, held a small copper pail, similar to a cooking pot. Inside the pot was a small brass spoon. The woman was decked with strings of beads, bracelets and hair ornaments.

The third grave he uncovered, Anderson found belonged to a male. He also was buried with all types of jewelry and hunting equipment. All three graves contained silver plates on the bodies. Anderson was able to restore some of the plates to close to the original beauty.

Anderson is a retired machinist and now does some farming. He works with several Mich-

igan State University professors and has been a member of the Michigan Archeologist Society for over 10 years. He has donated some of his findings to the museum at MSU and also has given some relics to the library in Midland.

He has traveled in Florida and studied the Indian cultures there. He has many souvenirs of his explorations in the south and claims that the life of a southern Indian was most pleasant. He says that these Indians fed mostly upon shell fish and have been known to have shell discard mounds to take up an area of 24 acres.

He has a son in Dallas, Texas and another in Tucson, Ariz., and when he visits them he takes time to do some exploring in that area. He has made some trips to the west and has gone north from there into Canada for exploration.

Altogether he claims to have between two and four thousand artifacts of all kinds. He has a series of grindstones used by western pioneers and many, many other old fashioned devices.

Of all his collections, the most extensive is his collection of arrow heads and spear heads. The shaped stones are correctly categorized as arrow heads if they are under two inches in length and over that they can be classified as either spear heads or knives.

His knowledge is as extensive as his collections. He has traveled and studied for over 50 years. What a book could not teach him he has made an acquaintance with through the many organizations that have answered his questions.

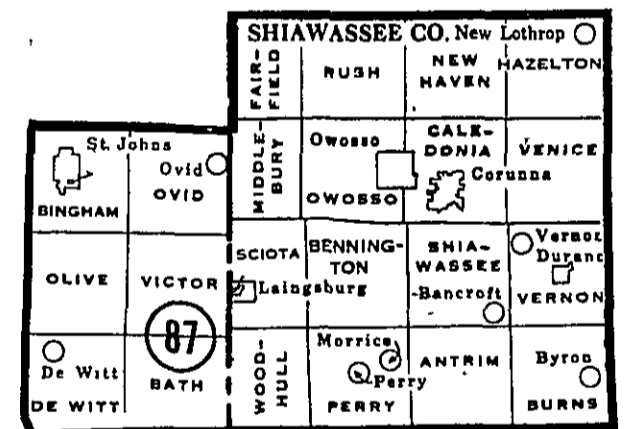

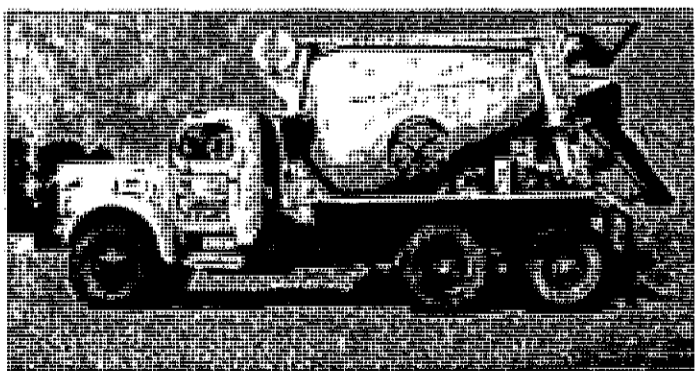

ASC PROGRAM

Action taken to ease handling of 1967-crop loan corn, soys

New moves to protect prices and to provide for orderly handling of 1967-crop corn and soybeans held by farmers under the price support loan program were announced on July 12 by the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

To provide space for new harvest, grain under extended loan in local warehouses will be re-concentrated for storage in sub-terminal and terminal warehouses when necessary.

Offsetting domestic market purchases of storable corn may be made when 1967 crop high moisture or nonstorable corn is delivered and it is necessary to sell such takeover grain in order to avoid further quality deterioration.

THE ONCOMING 1968 crops of corn and soybeans are expected to require a large amount of storage and drying space because of the increasing use of new har-

vesting methods such as the corn picker-sheller. This prompts the move to shift 1967 crops to other storage positions to provide adequate space for the new crops.

The loan maturity date of 1967 crop corn and soybeans is July 31, 1968. Since many producers holding corn and soybeans must make decisions by that date the department listed the following available options:

1) A producer can continue the corn or soybeans under extended loan in on-farm storage or in approved warehouses. If the producer's 1967 crop is in a local warehouse and space is needed to accommodate the 1968 crop, the warehouseman may request the Kansas City ASCS Commodity Office to arrange for moving the corn and soybeans to terminal positions. In such case, the producer can continue his corn or soybeans under extended loan. He will receive a local market price settlement from CCC if the market price increases to a point where he elects to liquidate his loan. Storage on extended loan commodities in the terminal warehouses, as well as on farms or local warehouses, will be paid by CCC.

2) If local-approved warehouse space is available, a producer may convert a 1967-crop farm storage loan to an extended warehouse storage loan.

3) To the extent that space is available in local CCC bin sites, a producer may arrange for leasing space in the bin site for storing his grain under extended loan.

THESE OPTIONS permit a producer to retain his interest in the commodity and receive the benefit of any market price increases. This is a part of the continuing efforts made by the U. S. Department of Agriculture to provide for orderly handling and to strengthen farm prices.

A producer with eligible 1967 crop corn or soybeans which are not now under loan can elect to sell corn and soybeans direct to CCC through his ASC county committee. Under this purchase program, arrangements must be made with the county office by July 31.

Recreation appraisal published

A limited number of copies of a new "Appraisal of Potentials for Outdoor Recreational Development" in Clinton County are being distributed to libraries, banks and governmental personnel around the county.

Stanley Baird, chairman of the Clinton County Soil Conservation District, announced the printing of the book last week and said the study was done in January 1967 by people from a number of agencies.

The publication is the first completed for a county in Michigan. Copies of the 54-page book have been sent to all libraries in Clinton County, lending institutions, township officials and high school libraries.

Compiling information for the book were: Verne M. Bathurst, W. D. Miller, Palmer G. Skaland, Charles M. Smith, and Lloyd B. Campbell of the U. S. Soil Conservation Service; William H. Colburn, Nels I. Johnson and Jim Wicks of the Michigan Department of Conservation; William Smith and Ray Locher of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service; Robert Kuehne, chief planner of Tri-County Regional Planning Commission; Robert Moore, director of Clinton Soil Conservation District; George R. McQueen and F. Earl Haas of the Extension Service; Emmanuel T. Van Nierop of the State Soil Conservation Committee; Dave Carvey of Economic Research Service; and Louis Twardzik, recreational specialist at Michigan State University.

Bean production \$50 million business

Dry beans which include navy, light red kidney, cranberry, yelloweye, pinto, red and several minor types of beans contributed about \$50 million in cash receipts to Michigan in 1966 -- making it the second largest single crop enterprise in the state.

Michigan State University specialists say most of the dry beans for domestic consumption are canned, with "pork and beans" the most important bean product in the U. S.

The reason, he's sure, is that the field is tilled every four rods and has a good outlet, easing any problems of excessive water. Warner is last year's "Conservation Farmer of the Year" in the Clinton County Soil Conservation District.

Pollution produces pre-dawn fish kill

Pollution does its dirty work in streams and lakes under cover of darkness according to a Michigan State University scientist.

"Dissolved oxygen reaches its lowest point just before dawn," says Dr. Niles Kevorn, assistant director of MSU's Water Research Institute, "and that's when many of the summer fish kills take place."

"Fish need oxygen all around the clock," he explains, "but aquatic plants, a major source of dissolved oxygen in lakes and streams, only produce oxygen during daylight in the process of photosynthesis. So, after eight hours of darkness, the amount of oxygen in the water is relatively low."

Farm labor data new service by MASA

Have a question about labor? Farmers often express the desire to have more information on labor availability, regulations and employment problems. Farm Bureau members can now have such "inside" information at a nominal cost through the Michigan Agricultural Services Assn's. "Information Newsletter."

The confidential subscription service is a frequent, timely summary of topics of current interest about farm labor. Most of the data presented is from government and industry sources backed by personal survey data developed on the scene by operations manager M. J. Buschlen. He brings to the Farm Bureau-affiliated association a wide background in labor management from many years with agriculture and related industries using migrant labor.

Topics of some of the first letters to members included such information as a personal survey of possible migrant labor sources in Texas; some of the problems facing farmers using these workers and suggestions for handling these problems; what to do in case of attempted unionization of your workers; details of minimum wage laws in easy-to-read language; the applications of workmen's compensation laws to farms; and simple-language version of the current child labor laws.

If a farmer uses full-time or part-time workers, these confidential letters will keep him informed of the latest developments in the increasingly complex field of labor management relations. The county Farm Bureau secretary has complete details on the service.

go unnoticed throughout the summer," adds Kevorn. "These weakened fish are more susceptible to other dangers, and their deaths, often attributed to other causes, are still indirectly caused by pollution."

Michigan farmhands received an average of \$1.23 an hour in 1966, while factory hands averaged \$2.71 an hour, according to Michigan State University studies.

"Fish may be seriously weakened and harmed by pollutants

In natural waters this process rarely affects the native fish species, says Kevorn. But in polluted waters, raw or partially treated sewage requires oxygen for the bacteria to decompose these wastes. The added "biological oxygen demand" reduces the amount of available oxygen that would normally be present.

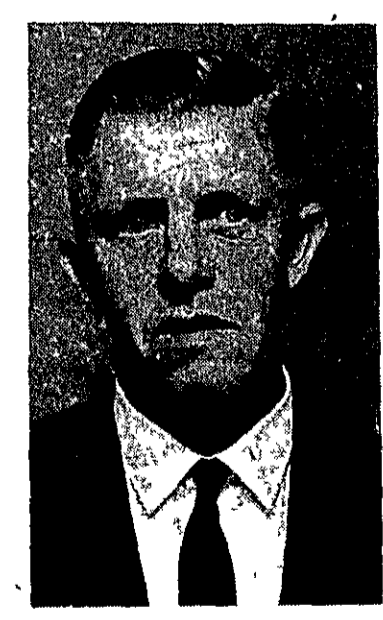

# Strawberries and do-do bird

"Strawberry" is the third most popular ice cream flavor in the U.S., but if the cost of the fruit escalates much more, it may have to be reserved for high ticket catering grades.

While a major portion of the nation's strawberries are grown in California, growers everywhere are experiencing higher harvesting costs. The seasonal workers that progressed from one area to another following the harvests are becoming organized, demanding higher wages and unemployment benefits. Furthermore, anxious to send down domestic grass roots, families that follow the harvests are becoming fewer.

Growers must harvest when maturity and weather dictates. Rain or wind on a strawberry field can ruin the crop. Recruiting casual labor

has its drawbacks because even a simple matter of picking strawberries requires some technique the aptitude. Even worse, an unwilling picker can do damage to the rows and come up with trays that are not marketable.

The ice cream industry already has been forced into compromise on strawberry flavor, offering vanilla variegated with strawberry which is a fair substitute but hardly matches the old-fashioned genuine.

In the 1930's when labor was cheap, Borden's offered "Frozen Strawberries"—a sherbet loaded with fruit at no increase in price. People bought this item to serve at breakfast, on cereal and for a festive dessert. Fond memories!

# NDC unit studies milk imitations

Let's look at the sales threat posed by milk imitation. Dairy Council is hard at work on this. Dr. Marion Brink of the NDC staff reported at the annual meeting on a nutritional evaluation of imitation products made in conference with national authorities using analysis of Griffin-Hasson Laboratories. The group agreed unanimously that:

- 1) The imitation milks as formulated today are unsuitable for infants and children. One pediatrician said these products constitute a hazard for infants up to six months of age. However, another pediatrician extended this for children up to at least age 12.
- 2) The imitations were judged unsuitable not only from the standpoint of low content of protein, essential amino acids and minerals, but also because of the type of fat used, namely coconut oil. Because the filled product also contained coconut oil, it too was viewed as not a satisfactory replacement for milk.
- 3) These products were also judged to be potentially harmful

for other vulnerable age groups such as pregnant and lactating women, and persons on marginal diets such as those in low income groups and the aged.

## Plan to sell 35 grain structures in Eaton Aug. 8

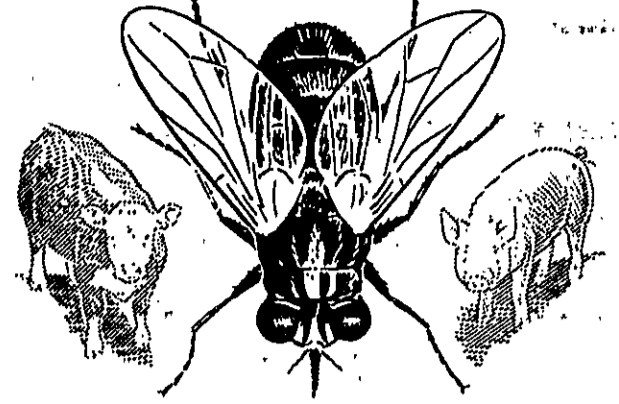
The Eaton County ASC Committee will offer for sale Thursday, Aug. 8, 35 government-owned grain storage bins at the Sunfield bin site one mile north of Sunfield.

The bins have a rated storage capacity of 3,250 bushels, and will be sold by auction completely dismantled. Eligible producers can finance the purchase of these bins with a low interest loan, obtained from their local county ASCS office.

The sale of these bins is particularly timely because of the shortage of on-the-farm storage, and the high cost of off-farm storage. This type of storage space on farms will permit farmers to harvest and store price supported crops, and obtain farm storage loans at harvest time.

All crop reports indicate a large crop of all grains and beans this year, which means that the market price farmers will receive for their crops will be the lowest at harvest time. Producers who have adequate storage on their farms will be able to take advantage of any price increase that occurs later in the marketing year.

# White beans not all navy beans

One doesn't know beans about beans if he thinks Great Northern beans are Michigan Navy beans. This an Illinois processor learned recently when the Michigan Department of Agriculture's Food Inspection Division seized its product for being misbranded.

Michigan Navy beans are one thing and Great Northern beans (western) are something else. And ne'er the twain shall meet. Least of all in an eastern Michigan grocery warehouse where 36 cases of the Illinois firm's canned product were found with the label "Canned white navy beans." The contents was Great Northern beans. The shipment was sent back to the processor.

THE UNITED STATES standards for beans class pea beans as the type grown in the Great Lakes region, known also as Navy beans, while Great Northern beans are a white medium-type field bean grown mainly in some western states.

Most any of the state's 12,000 bean farmers will tell you Michigan Navy bean looks about as much like a Great Northern as a Detroit-built car resembles a Russian tank. As far as is known there isn't a Great Northern bean raised in all of Michigan where dry edible bean production sometimes exceeds 8 million hundredweight a year.

Ninety per cent of Michigan production is Navy beans, referred to in the East as "pea beans." They are small and nearly round and are preferred by canners because they will not

## Michigan big on bean production

Michigan farmers produce more than 98 per cent of the navy beans in the United States. Three-fourths of these "navies" are produced in six counties in the "Thumb" and Saginaw Valley. Over 98 per cent of all navy beans are Michigan State University developed varieties.

Featured will be varieties, new cultural practices and developments in future growing methods.



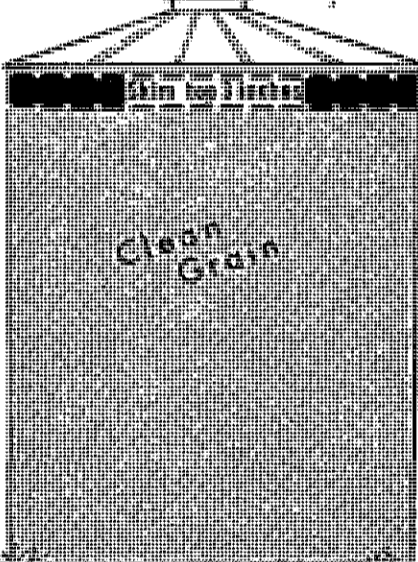
HOW SOIL SURVEY WORKS

## Tips on clean grain

- Every load of grain from your farm is carefully inspected to guarantee its safety as food. If it contains bird or rodent filth, or any kernels of mercury-treated seed grain, the shipment is not fit for consumption. THE LOAD MUST BE SEIZED. Loads contaminated by birds or rodents can't be sold for livestock feed either unless free from salmonella bacteria. YOUR LOSSES CAN BE ALARMINGLY GREAT. Clean grain or contaminated grain—begins on the farm. Here's what you can do to keep it clean:
1. Regularly set out poison for rats and mice around the farm and in the buildings. Be sure to follow directions on labels and do not allow poison to come into direct contact with the grain.
  2. Seal bins as tight as possible to keep out rodents and birds. Screen all windows.
  3. Clean and spray all bins before putting in new-crop grain. Use only recommended chemicals.
  4. Clean out combine boxes and machinery before harvest. Sweep out trucks before loading them.
  5. Mow around edges of grain fields to discourage insects and rodents from getting into swathed grain.
  6. Cut or cultivate out grass and weeds around storage buildings. Clean up all trash. Don't give 'em a hiding place.
  7. Don't let treated or unclean grain get mixed in with clean, marketable grain.

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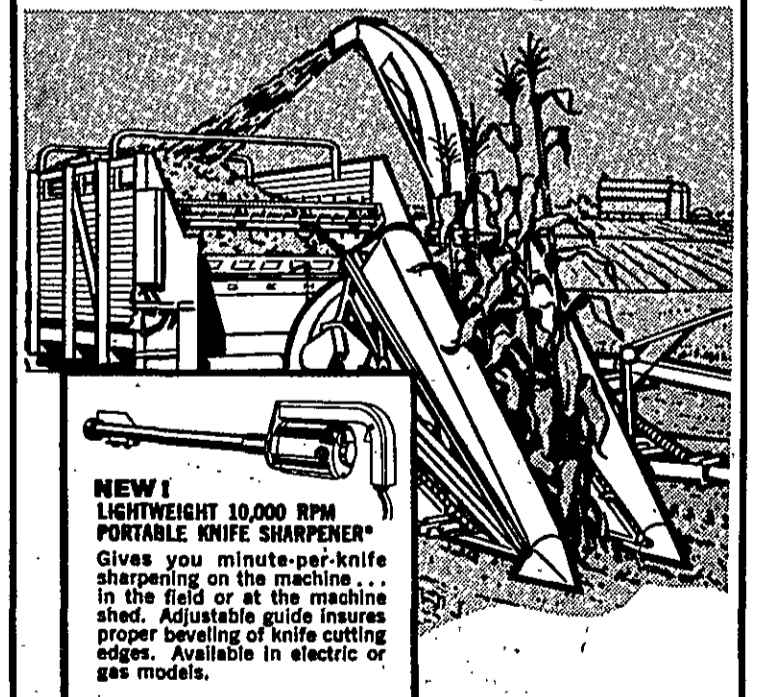

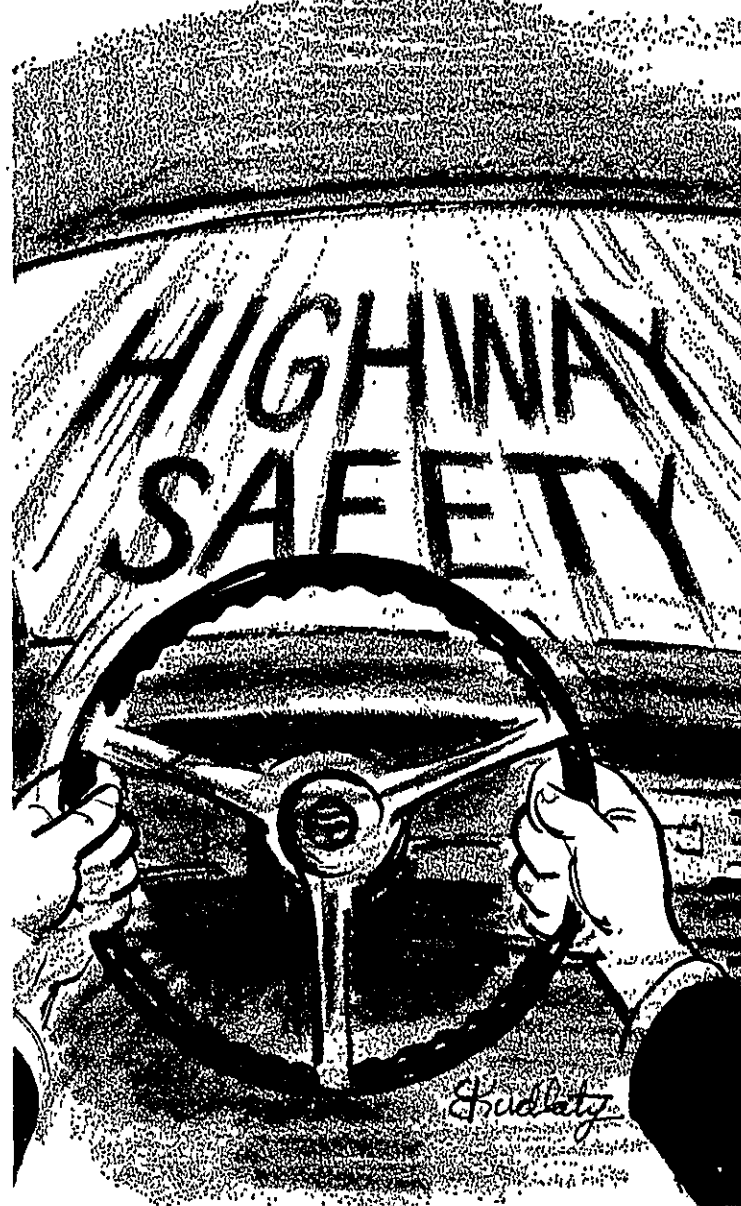
# She didn't want to go

James H. Lorie, Professor of Business Administration at the University of Chicago, takes exception to the new liberalism: "The Constitution of the United States was based in part on the belief that people needed protection. . . from the government, and that free, competitive enterprise was the most efficient engine for promoting the public good . . . the intellectual climate of this country placed the burden of proof for the necessity of interference with the market process on those who would interfere. Interference was presumed to be an error unless an overwhelming case could be made for it. In the present intellectual climate, the reverse is probably true—actions by the government to regulate business are presumed to be beneficial and the burden of proof is on those who oppose."

The professor then compares the tender concern of government for the consumer to the Boy Scout who came to a scout meeting with a black eye. The scout explained that he had tried to help a little old lady across the street. "How in the world," asked the scoutmaster, "could you get a black eye doing that?" He replied, "She didn't want to go." It could be that the people do not wish to go where the new liberals are leading them.

# Charlie Brown for President

Kids around that age had a presidential election during story hour at the Lapeer Public Library. They elected Charlie Brown of Peanuts fame.

In nominating Charlie, little Anita Bommarito said: "Everybody can identify with Charlie Brown because he is a loser and everybody is a loser at one time or another."

Anita should make speeches for Nixon. As reported by librarian Paul Malecki, the youngsters went through every election routine. First they held a primary. Here's how the voting went:

Charlie Brown, 16  
Bozo the clown, 12  
Eugene McCarthy, Al Kallne and Nelson Rockefeller, 11 votes each  
Charles Percy, 8  
Richard Nixon, 6  
Hubert Humphrey and Jim Fitzgerald, 3 votes each.

"I hate to tell you this," Malecki told me, "but there was quite a negative reaction when your name was read."  
"What do you mean, negative?" I asked.  
"They booed," he said.

I had to ask. Anyway, after the lynching of those three kids who voted for me, the youngsters held two nominating conventions.

THE DEMOCRATS nominated Charlie Brown for President and McCarthy for vice president. The Republicans gave the top spot to Rockefeller with Bozo the Clown as his running mate.

It was no contest in the run-off. Brown and McCarthy polled 63 per cent of the vote. Rockefeller and Bozo got only 33 per cent.

Malecki said the other 4 per cent were spoiled ballots. I think he meant they had my name on them.

So there you are. If the 48 kids at the library story hour were running this country, I would not have to choose between Nixon and Humphrey next November. Instead, it would be Charlie Brown or Nelson Rockefeller.

The kids obviously did a better job than is expected from the national delegates at Chicago and Miami later this summer. And they did it without getting drunk, stamping their feet, wearing silly hats, or blowing hot air into a bolsterous balloon of boredom.

The trouble with professional politicians is one of their big rules—"don't tell the truth, you might lose a vote." My boy McCarthy gave a good example in Lansing the other day. He said he could foresee circumstances under which he would support Rockefeller rather than fellow Democrat Humphrey. Big deal. I can foresee circumstances under which I also could vote against Humphrey. Such circumstances as say, the election were held on a weekday, or I were breathing, or December followed November.

How could McCarthy ever support Humphrey, under any circumstances? McCarthy has said, hundreds of times, that he is a candidate for President for only one reason: he is saddened and disgusted by President Johnson's policies in Viet Nam. Humphrey supports Johnson right down the line—in Viet Nam or in a leap frog game. McCarthy and Humphrey should have trouble talking about the weather without getting into a fistfight.

BUT MICHIGAN'S Democratic politicians—such statesmen as Gus Scholle—were aghast at the idea McCarthy might favor a Republican over a Democrat. You just can't do that, even if Jesus Christ Himself is on the GOP ticket. McCarthy's advisers quickly advised him he shouldn't have said what he said. And McCarthy quickly went the route of most hungry candidates. He denied he said what he said.

When McCarthy weasled, he teetered toward the edge of the pedestal where I had installed him with high hopes. But he is still my choice over Humphrey. Because if it's going to be Nixon for the GOP, I don't want Tricky Dick running against his twin brother. And when it comes to the single most important issue—Viet Nam and your son's life—Nixon can look in a mirror and see Humphrey. The people deserve an alternative vote for their money. It will be a foul blow if neither party gives it to them.

In which case I'll go the library and vote for Charlie Brown because I'll sure feel like a loser.

# Charcoal makes me burn

There are a lot of skill areas in life where you will find the Rambler very unskilled. Nevertheless, I keep at it, and once in awhile I become skilled.

However, when it comes to grilling food over a charcoal fire I must admit I'm not even able to boil water.

Our recent vacation camping trip gave me several chances to improve on my inability, and about all I was able to do was to confirm it. Two sessions (each one worse than the previous one) were enough to convince me that I must either take lessons from a professional or insist that my wife do the cooking on a regular stove.

My first bout with the charcoal was at our campsite below Kingsley Dam in western Nebraska on the second night of the trip. We pulled into the camp fairly early in the evening and it was warm and quite breezy. The good wife suggested it would be a good night

to grill some steaks over charcoal.

Again there was flame for a few minutes, but when it went out all the heat seemed to go, too. After the third dousing and firing, the charcoal finally caught, and within 45 minutes of the time I started we flopped the steaks on. They didn't turn out too badly, but after all that fuss I felt they would have tasted as good coming off the

gas stove in the trailer.

Our trip proceeded at an eventful pace. When we reached Sequoia National Park, we liked the atmosphere and the tree-filled surroundings so we decided to stay an extra day. The second evening the good wife brought up the subject of grilling again.

Hamburgers would be fine (we were saving up for Disneyland), she said, and offered to make them up into jumbo patties if I'd prepare them. OK, yahl!

It was Kingsley Dam all over again, only worse. It took three doublings of fluid and four matches (one broke) to get even a partial burn to the charcoal. Things finally got hot enough to throw the hamburgers on the grill, but it was about 20 minutes before I ever got a sizzle out of them. Talk about rare hamburgers! The meat never got beyond the blood red stage, and after 35 minutes of cooking (snicker!) I turned the remains over to my wife to finish up on the stove in the trailer.

Disheartened, I turned to neighbor Max Shinabery for advice when we got home. He is a professor of charcoal and was quick to spot my bag of charcoal sitting in the garage. He pointed out that this was an extremely hard-starting brand and was most likely the cause of my problem rather than my lack of skills (bless you, Max).

So once again there is the possibility the Rinkers' backyard may become swathed in charcoal smoke as I try to become skilled in something.

For a real black raspberry pie.

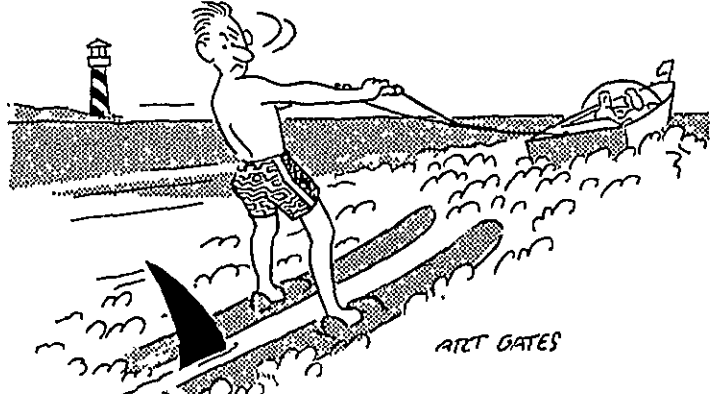
So I don my tear-proof outers

## Personal income up 12.1% in Michigan, 7.9% nationwide

Demands for more city services have forced nine Michigan municipalities to adopt a city income tax. Other cities are sure to follow suit. The income levy has been found to be an effective means to raise needed revenue without adding burden to property taxes.

Taxation of income by local government, although not used in Michigan until Detroit's adoption in 1962, actually began in 1939 in the District of Columbia, notes Avon M. Dreyer, professor of economics at Central Michigan University. By the end of 1967, some 171 cities in eight states had begun to levy income taxes.

Uniformity of a sort was provided by the 1964 City Income Tax Act. The legislation permits municipalities to levy a flat rate one per cent tax on residents and one-half per cent on non-residents working within the city limits. Other provisions deal with business and industry profits. The act was deemed necessary to prevent a wide variation in bases and rates and to control maximum rates established by cities.

"Average salary" for state Supreme court justices is \$24,640. The lowest pay is in Wyoming, Utah and Oklahoma. Judges there receive \$16,500 per year.

Compensation for "intermediate" appellate court judges shows the same variation: New York, \$33,500 to \$40,100; Pennsylvania \$35,000; Illinois, \$35,000; Michigan, \$32,500. Arizona and New Mexico pay the least, \$18,500 per year. The average salary across all states is \$27,118.

We don't mean to say that the employers in either case are necessarily entirely blameless. Still, the union's reason for existence is supposed to be the enhancement of their members' interests. In New York, and especially in Detroit, the chief aim instead seems to be to display union power.

There are apparently several explanations for the unions' decline. And one of them well may be the lingering doubt among unorganized employees about outfits that, launching unnecessary strikes threaten destruction of the workers' jobs.

The Decline of the Unions  
Labor unions in recent years have been representing a declining percentage of the work force, and their leaders quite naturally wonder why. Some of the reasons, it seems to us, may be reflected in disputes in Detroit and New York City.

A GRASSROOTS COMMENT  
Strikes against newspaper publishers and theater producers are one thing, strikes against the public are something else. We cite a recent few.

EDUCATION: Florida teachers, HEALTH: Flint, Mich., city owned and operated hospital, POLICE: Allegan County Mich., Sheriff's Deputies, TRANSPORTATION: Bus drivers, Chicago owned and operated bus company, FIRE: Lansing Mich. Fireman, COMMUNICATIONS: Illinois Bell Telephone Co., etc.

In Detroit, strikes have shut down the city's two major newspapers for more than seven months. In New York, a strike by the Actors Equity this week closed the city's major theaters for three days and idled several touring companies on the road.

There are important differences between the two groups. To cite only one, Detroit's newspaper publishers are caught in crossfire from 14 separate unions, compared with the single union involved in the New York strike.

In many cases, in addition to the inconvenience, the taxpayer, who has no voice in the settlement of the strike, is forced to meet the union's demands.

If state laws prohibiting strikes against the public, cannot or will not, be enforced, they should be repealed.

#### Bathing Belief

From the time of the Middle Ages until the second half of the 19th century, outdoor bathing was discouraged in Europe because of the belief that it helped spread the epidemics which had so often swept across the Continent.

CITIES HAVE FOUND that income tax somewhat difficult to administer. Critics charge that it is an "upside down income tax," based on the inability to avoid rather than the ability to pay. While it is comparatively easy to determine city residents, enforcing the tax on "outsiders" can be difficult.

Non-resident taxpayers must pay only that portion of wages earned within the city. Employees hired on a contract basis, or those with more than one place of employment present difficult problems.

Renters who work outside of the city present other problems. Statistics on the amount of non-taxable insurance, annuity, and retirement income are not readily available. Corporate profit figures are not published on a local basis.

These problems and others make the city income tax costly as well as difficult to collect. A study of Mt. Pleasant in 1966 indicated that the collection cost would run as high as 13 percent, a direct reflection of the need to establish a separate tax office, staffed by competent personnel.

The blow of a city income tax may be softened by two factors: a reduction in property taxes and a legal deduction against both state and federal income taxes.

Any property tax reduction depends upon the action of city government when the income tax is adopted. A substantial reduction was granted to Lansing residents, but the tax expert cautions that a city adopting the tax probably does so to wipe out deficits or increase service. In most instances, it is the school rather than the city which accounts for the major burden on property.

Breyer notes that city tax reduces the taxable income for state and federal purposes. For example, a married man with two children who earns \$10,000 a year and is taxed \$76 at the city level would find his state and federal income taxes reduced by \$29.66. The "real" cost of the city tax would be \$46.34.

The tax is not a popular one, and 10 per cent of the voters can bring it back for voter reconsideration. Breyer reminds that the tax is one of the very few ways cities can meet demands for more services with present revenue.

JUDGES IN MICHIGAN are among the highest paid in the nation, according to the American Judicature Society. A comparison indicates that Michigan Supreme Court Justices, who receive \$35,000 per year, are the fourth highest paid in the nation. New York pays \$39,500; Pennsylvania and Illinois pay \$37,500. All four states have seven high court judges. Michigan has eight.

Where the principal material-technical means are concentrated, as large industry, transportation, communications and communal economy installations, these groups are well developed. The European "free world" nations', civilian defense shelter development programs, as reported last week, is the major defense against nuclear conflagration of those nations. By "major defense," I mean they are not in the nuclear weapon race and protection for the people is their main objective.

The Soviet Union not only has a weapon delivery capability and a sophisticated anti-missile missile system but, according to reports, gives civil defense a considerable priority and involves quite a training and educational program.

From excerpts of congressional testimony on civil defense and other reports that come to this office, let's look at their program.

It seems all able-bodied men of 16 to 60 years of age and women of 16 to 55 must take instruction in a compulsory civil defense training program. School children are devoting much time to the study of military glory and "Ready for the Defense of the Homeland." Militarized outings and war games are organized during school vacations. In school, "special education" emphasis is "on significance of technical progress in strengthening a nation's defense might. Teachers of civil defense are a highly qualified staff, about 95 per

cent reserve officers, three-fourths of higher education standards with more than five years experience in scientific pedagogical (exact adherence to a set of arbitrary rules) activity in institutions of higher learning.

"IT IS EMPHASIZED that in the schools, all youths of pre-induction and draft age must pass the requirements for the "Ready for the Defense of the Homeland" tests, while the technicians must acquire a military-technical specialty," says Mr. Bulgakov, chairman of the State Committee for Professional-Technical Training, Council of Ministers, USSR.

"There are competitions in para-military sports and exhibits of inventions with military application. Related subjects as aviation, parachute, automotive, motorcycle, rifle, sailing, motor boat and radio for club or team competition are included. This work is carried on on an ever-increasing scale. Our young pathfinders are growing up to be real patriots. We are aware of the value of military-patriotic indoctrination and of training our students in Civil Defense." Also Mr. Bulgakov added, "We are not at all inclined to rest on our laurels."

The Russians believe it is necessary to increase and strengthen civil defense forces day by day. They, it appears, have "numerous groups of the able-bodied populace equipped with the necessary equipment for rescue and emergency repair work in damaged areas," organized and broken down into special groups at enterprises, institutions, schools, kolchozes, and sovkhozes. These services (such as medical and firefighting) are capable of solving complex problems.

Where the principal material-technical means are concentrated, as large industry, transportation, communications and communal economy installations, these groups are well developed. "Besides repair of anticipated damage to communal systems, in the event of a nuclear attack, it is necessary to maintain public order and discipline. These are the tasks of the civil defense service for maintaining public order. This service uses units and subunits of the militia, militarized plant guard units, and volunteer people's police units (druzhina).

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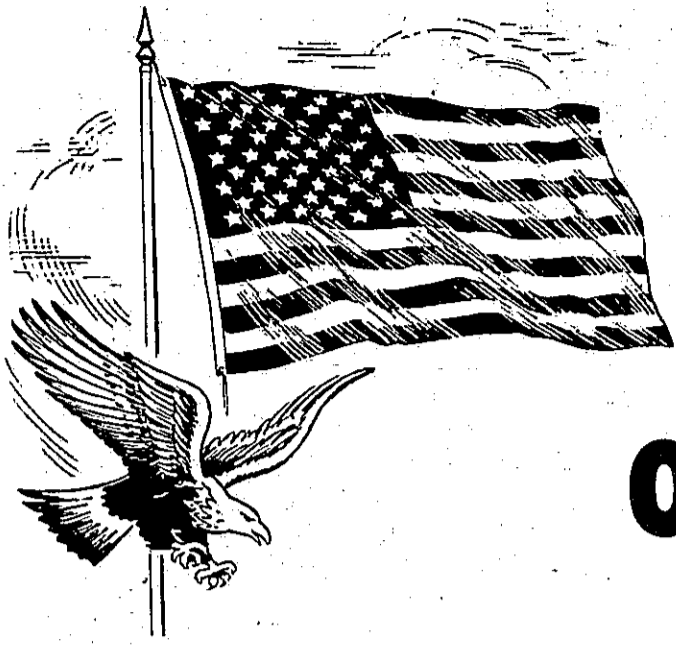

# Military life a family affair

DEWITT — Since Feb. 10, 1943, at least one of Mrs. Leon Parkhouse's sons has been in active duty in the armed forces of the United States.

It was 1943, only one week

after his father's funeral, that Richard "Bud" Decker entered the Army. Less than one year after that, Don enlisted in the Navy. The next son, Harry, joined the Navy not quite a year later. Rex became the fourth in less than a year when he enlisted in the Navy.

That made four sons for Mrs. Parkhouse in World War II. Her fifth son became a service man not long after his brother when he joined the Army. Ken was involved in the Korean conflict.

At present, Mrs. Parkhouse's youngest sons, David and Jim Parkhouse, are both Army men. Jim has served his year in Viet Nam and is now on leave. Dave is still serving in Viet Nam and will be home in January.

Now Mrs. Parkhouse's sons are not the only service men in her family. She has two grandsons in the service. One is in the Air Force, the other is in the Army.

## Blue Star Mothers founded in Flint

When the war broke out in 1941, many mothers were finding themselves with sons overseas. In 1942, in the January 22 edition of the Flint News Advertiser printed a coupon in their newspaper asking the mothers of servicemen to fill it out with their name, address and telephone. The blank also requested the name and number of sons that the woman had and in what branches of the services they were serving.

On February 1, that year, over 300 mothers of servicemen met for the first time in the Durant Hotel at Flint. Captain George H. Maines, who had conceived the idea for the group, acted as chairman. He reported that over 1,000 applications had been received by the News Advertiser. It was decided to form a permanent organization to be known as the Blue Star Mothers, for each would keep one blue star in her window for each son serving the United States.

On February 6, the story of the organization of the Blue Star Mothers was published in full in the Congressional Record in Washington, D. C.

OVER 800 MOTHERS attended a meeting in the Flint High School Auditorium on March 8. Mrs. Mathilda Burling of New York, National President of the Gold Star Mothers of W.W.I., installed the national officers of the new group with Mrs. Adda Harris of Flint as the first National President. Chapters were quickly orga-

nized throughout Michigan, Ohio, and Wisconsin. In June, both Michigan and Wisconsin instituted departments; that is, a state head of the many chapters of the states. In May, 1943, Ohio organized its department, California was next in September of 1945 with Pennsylvania and New York not far behind. And so the Blue Star Mothers organized from coast to coast with other departments in Iowa, Oregon and Washington and Chapters at large in several other states and Hawaii. In June 1960, the Blue Star Mothers of America were incorporated by an Act of the 86th Congress of the United States.

This year, representatives from many chapters all over came together in the same room at the Durant Hotel in Flint to meet with the same man who addressed the 300 women who met the first time. Captain Maines greeted the old and new members for the 25th anniversary of the founding of the Blue Star Mothers of America, Inc.

MICHIGAN, one of the first chapters to form a department, now has 83 chapters. This year the department is headed by a St. Johns woman, Mrs. Grace Shipley. Mrs. Shipley has also been president of the local chapter, which now has about 50 members.

The local chapter No. 88 was organized on May 8, 1944 with Mrs. Myrtle Page, state president and Mrs. Ida Butterfield, both

WHEN ASKED IF ever any of her sons or grandsons were drafted, she promptly replied, "No! We wouldn't have any draftees in this family."

How did it all get started? Mrs. Parkhouse said that when World War II erupted, her oldest son was in high school. When the drafting of boys became commonplace, he decided it was his turn to do his part, so he enlisted. Since then all her sons have done the same.

But, of all the sons, only one made the service a career. Harry Decker, the third son, is presently stationed in the Philippines with his wife and three children, one of whom is in the Air Force. He has been in the service for 24 years.

"And of these 24 years," Mrs. Parkhouse adds, "only once was he not able to have his wife and children with him."

Of all the sons who have served, only two ever met on foreign soil. Not too long ago, David and Jim met in Saigon. They sent pictures of their meeting home where it was placed, along with all the other pictorial records of the other sons, in one of the photo albums.

MRS. PARKHOUSE HAS quite a collection of pictures. She says her sons send pictures home frequently. Since her two youngest have been in Viet Nam, hardly a letter arrives without at least one picture enclosed.

When she talked about having a son away all the time and fre-

quently engaged in combat, she said, "That's why I work nights! If I can't sleep, I might as well be doing something to be paid for. Sleep is what you do when there is nothing else to do."

Only once did she have a son wounded. "We didn't know for about three months whether or not Bud would come home, but he finally made it," she said. Her first son was injured in Italy during World War II.

Her son Harry served first with the Navy then switched to the Army Air Force. Rex also changed. He was first affiliated with the Navy, then entered the Army.

At present, Dave's wife lives with Mrs. Parkhouse and is expecting her first child in August. Two granddaughters live with her, too.

A flag with three blue stars hangs in her front window. She said that after World War II it was hard to find blue stars and she was not always able to keep one in her window. Recently she read where she could send for them. So now there are three blue stars in her window.

After all this, Mrs. Parkhouse mentioned that having many sons in the service was not a tradition of her own. Her own mother had 16 grandsons in World War II.
