### Treize GOP winner in 87th House race

R. Douglas Treize easily outdistanced a pair of Republican opponents to gain the party's nomination to run for the State House of Representatives in the 87th District.

Republicans in the district, which includes all of Shiawassee and a portion of Clinton County, gave Treize more than 4,422 votes, according to unofficial returns. (Totals include all of Clinton and 37 of 43 precincts in Shiawassee.)

The closest challenger, Richard Flynn, a Shiawassee County Commissioner, received more than 2,529 votes, while Terry Bacon of St. Johns, was third with over 1,045 votes.

Treize received 1,181 votes in Clinton County and picked up at least 3,242 votes in Shiawassee, his home county.

Flynn received 791 votes in Clinton and at least 1,738 votes in Shiawassee, while Bacon received 734 votes in Clinton and at least 311 votes in Shiawassee.

"It's flattering to receive the confidence of the voters in the district," said Treize. "It's definitely an experience that makes you feel kind of humble." He also expressed his apprecia-

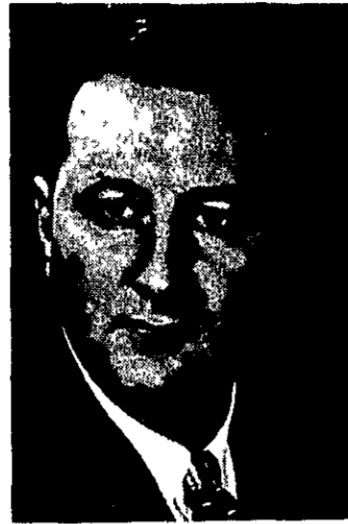
tion to "the 2,000 people involved in this thing," including campaign workers, those who circulated his petitions and others who assisted him.

Treize, who resigned his position as division manager with General Telephone Co. after 20 years with the company, is no stranger to politics and elections.

He has been a member of the Owosso City Commission since 1964 and recently concluded two years as mayor of that city. He was also a member of the Shiawassee Board of Supervisors from 1964-68.

Dale F. Calder, of St. Johns, running on the American Independent Party ticket in the 87th District, received at least seven votes in his party's primary election. He not opposed.

Richard Duzenbury, an unopposed Democrat from Shaftsbury in Shiawassee County, received at least 2,127 votes in his party's primary election to represent the 87th District.

## Commission gives green light

# Modular home plant to locate here

The city of St. Johns appeared destined for a new industry Monday morning after a meeting Saturday at Fort Wayne, Ind. with representatives of Stylemaster Manufacturing Corp., builder of modular home units.

Following approval Thursday by city officials to extend water and sewer lines, along with installation of a paved road next year, a delegation from the St. Johns Area Development Corp. traveled to Fort Wayne to arrange final details of the move.

According to James Leon, vice chairman, the non-profit development corporation, taking a suggestion offered at last Thursday's commission meeting will begin a stock sale open to all county

residents as well as other interested firms or individuals.

"This stock sale is a direct result of suggestions made last Thursday," said Leon. "Previously we had talked only with businesses for financial support, but the commission meeting comments leads us to believe there may be additional support from the general public."

Leon said that any contributions can be made to St. Johns Area Development Corp., Box 10, St. Johns.

Stock will be issued at one dollar per share but outright contributions will also be accepted and will be tax deductible. "Money collected," Leon ex-

plained, "will be earmarked for this or future growth opportunities and we're extremely hopeful that we can give a sizable check to the commission before this current project is too far along. Whatever the amount, we'll have something for the city to help this project."

Leon was accompanied to Fort Wayne by Harold Wellman, president of Central National Bank; Brandon C. White, vice president, Clinton National Bank and Rollin Huard of Clinton County News.

Arrangements for the firm to come to St. Johns reached a climax after nearly six months of negotiations and site examinations. The area finally chosen lies

between Gibbs St. and the Grand Trunk Railroad on land owned by Mr. and Mrs. Maurice Gove.

Solidification of the move came last Thursday when city commissioners voted to extend services from the corner of Morton and Gibbs to a point some 800 ft. adjacent to the property on which the plant will be located.

Their decision followed a meeting of nearly 90 minutes during which time expressions from the audience advanced favorable and unfavorable observations. Most objections were based not against the incoming plant but against previous decisions by earlier commissions regarding installation of streets and services.

## Millage to improve roads is rejected

Voters in Clinton County Tuesday overwhelmingly defeated a 1.5-mill levy for improvements to roads, bridges and culverts and matching funds for local townships. Totals, without the city of DeWitt, were 2,323 yes and 2,727 no.

The proposal - the only county-wide question on the ballot - carried in only six of Clinton's 16 townships. They were Ovid, Westphalia, Watertown, Duplain,

Bath and Greenbush. The levy would have extended for a five year period, however, it was expected that most of the road work could have been completed on a rush schedule within two years.

Included in the millage proposal was .75 mills for road improvements, .50 mills for bridges and culverts and .25 mills for improvements, plus bituminous surfacing at a total of \$3,148,000.

## Board incumbents win, lose and wonder

Three Republican county commissioners faced primary opposition in Tuesday's election - one was defeated, another was victorious and the fate of the third was still unknown early Wednesday morning.

Robert Dimer, 41, of St. Johns, defeated 76 year old Rex Sirrine, 306-195.

Dimer, president of Dimer Broadcasting Co., is unopposed in the November election for the District Four seat which includes St. Johns.

Incumbent Maurice Gove, of St. Johns, defeated a challenger, Bruce Lanterman, 226-169. Gove represents District Three which includes a portion of St. Johns, plus Bingham Township.

At 3 a.m. Wednesday incumbent Gerald Lankford was trailing his challenger, Bruce Angell, 165-211 in the primary race in District Five, DeWitt Township.

Returns from the city of DeWitt were not available at press time, however, leaving the outcome of that race still unsettled at that hour. The city of DeWitt has more than 600 registered voters.

In all other eight districts the candidates, all incumbents, faced no opposition in the primary nor had anyone filed to run against them from other parties in the November elections.

## Ballenger, Root to meet

William S. Ballenger, unopposed in his bid for the office of State Senator, collected at least 4,135 votes in the Clinton Republican primary election. Totals do not include city of DeWitt.

Ballenger, who has served in the State House for the last two years representing the 87th District, will meet Cedric Root, a Democrat, in the November election.

Root, of Vermontville in Eaton County, was also unopposed in his party's primary election for the 30th Senatorial District.

He received at least 1,132 votes.

## Allen, Kurka battle set

Incumbent Rep. Richard Allen, R-Ithaca, received 1,426 votes from Clinton County in the 88th State House District in Tuesday's primary election. Vote totals from Gratiot County were not available at press time.

Allen, unopposed in his party's primary election is seeking his second term.

The district includes all of Gratiot County and part of Clinton County.

He will be opposed by Mary Kurka, a Democrat, in the November election. She is county chairman.

Mrs. Kurka, of Ovid, received 330 votes in Clinton. She also was unopposed in her party's primary election.

# UAW, Saylor-Beall reach agreement on new pact

After six weeks of negotiations, Local 925 of the United Auto Workers and Saylor Beall Manufacturing Co., reached agreement last week on a three-year contract calling for wage hikes totaling 35 cents an hour.

The 35 cents is to be spread over the three years with workers receiving an increase of 18 cents an hour for the first year retroactive to June 25 when the old pact expired.

An increase of eight cents an hour was negotiated for the second year and another nine cents for the third year.

In addition, workers will receive a seven-cent an hour increase each year for cost-of-living expenses.

Under the old three-year contract workers were paid \$2.65 an hour.

Tentative agreement came 3 1/2 hours after a union-set strike deadline.

The UAW had set the deadline for 3 p.m. Monday (July 27) but

five minutes before that time workers were asked to stay on the job as negotiations progressed.

Union and management negotiators came to tentative agreement at 6:30 p.m.

The contract was ratified by

a vote of 45 to 5 at a union meeting the following night.

Union and company officials signed the agreement Monday morning.

"I think it was a wonderful agreement," said Merlin Burk, president of Local 925.

"I think it is a good contract," added Russ Allman, president of the company. "There was no major trouble during negotiations."

Another highlight of the new contract was the negotiation of two additional paid holidays which will bring the number to 10 beginning in 1972.

Under the old agreement, workers were paid for Memorial Day, the Fourth of July, Labor Day, Thanksgiving, the day after Thanksgiving, Christmas Day and New Year's Day, plus a half day before both Christmas and New Year's Day.

Under the new agreement, workers will be paid for a full day off on the day before Christ-

## Two votes reversed

# County Commission OK's landfill for Watertown

Two Clinton County Commissioners switched sides on the controversial Watertown Township sanitary landfill proposal to voice their approval Monday, overruling a previous board decision.

Claude Underhill and Rex Sirrine, who had voted to deny the landfill plan in July, recorded yes votes to allow Vector Construction Co. a special use permit for the site.

The board voted 6-4 to concur with the county zoning commissioners who had given their approval in June.

Bruce Love, representative of the construction firm, told the commissioners that arrangements would be made to include all of Clinton County in the landfill's trash pickup operation.

The site includes 80 acres on the north side of Grand River Avenue near Interstate 96.

Opponents of the landfill plan, including Township Supervisor Herman Openlander, told the board that possible unsanitary conditions could develop at the site, that property values will decrease and the truck traffic will cause considerable congestion.

Love told the board that his firm had posted a \$40,000 bond in the event problems develop on the site.

Darwin Root, inspector for the Mid-Michigan Health Department

said that if he should close Vector's site due to unsanitary conditions, the bond would adequately cover the cost of covering the trash and stopping the project.

The bond could be used to hire trucks to haul the trash in case of a temporary shut-down, Root said.

Gerald Wilcox, chairman of the Clinton County Planning Commission, told the board that his group had engaged a private firm to study the present and future solid waste and landfill needs for the county.

Before the board voted, Wilcox asked that the commissioners table the Watertown proposal until the plans could be ready, possibly by April 1, 1971.

Discussion then centered on granting the special permit to Vector before the plans were available.

Gerald Shepard, commissioner from the Bath area, said the landfill was a necessity today.

"It seems more feasible to

have one now," he said. "We need a landfill and I suppose we will have to take the trash from other counties."

It was pointed out that some trash from Clinton County is being sent into Ingham, Shiawassee and Eaton counties at present.

The major objections to the plan were voiced by board chairman Walter Nobis.

"We're just jumping the gun," he said.

Nobis said he would prefer to table the request until reports from the county planning commission and the Tri-County Planning Commission are available.

The motion to concur with the zoning commission in granting the request was made by Gerald L. Lankford of DeWitt and supported by Shepard.

Commissioners approving the request were Shepard, Lankford, Underhill, Sirrine, Roy F. (Jack) Andrews and Duane Chamberlain.

Those posting no votes were

# Smith captured second time in flashy stolen sports car

Robert Smith's week of freedom came to an abrupt end Saturday. Smith, 23, who escaped from the Clinton County jail a week ago, was captured in Sheridan, Wyo. while riding in the same stolen vehicle he was captured in July 21 at Thunder Bay, Canada.

Clinton County Sheriff Percy Patterson said Smith was being held in Wyoming by FBI agents who will release him in the custody of the federal marshal in Cheyenne.

Smith allegedly removed the Michigan plates while riding through Missouri and replaced them with stolen California tags.

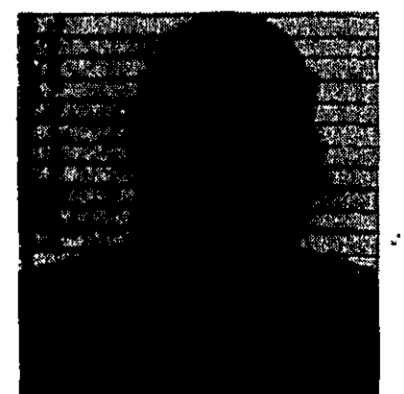
He escaped capture in Jasper, Wyo. when officers failed to connect the flashy yellow sports car with the Michigan stolen vehicle report. Officers told FBI agents that they realized later the car was the same one listed, according to Patterson.

Smith, while awaiting a July 29 preliminary examination, apparently jammed the lock on the cell door with a small rolled-up strip of metal.

He waited until the early morning hours, according to Patterson, and opened the door, proceeded to the basement of the jail, changed clothing and escaped through a basement window.

Patterson received a report from Hettler's Auto Sales the following morning claiming that the yellow car was missing again.

Patterson said that Smith, if convicted, could be sentenced to a minimum of three years in a federal prison for transporting a stolen vehicle across state lines.

# Textbook ruling concerns DeWitt School Board

The State Supreme Court ruling on school boards providing students with free textbooks and materials caused quite a stir during discussions at the DeWitt Board of Education meeting Tuesday night.

"I don't see how the Supreme Court could rule like this," board Secretary Merry Sellhorn said.

"I don't think people have objected to buying textbooks and paper in the past," she said.

"I know that there are some people who can't afford textbooks and paper but these things are already supplied for them," she added.

The board was confused about the wording of the high court decision indicating they wanted a directive to clearly define in detail just what areas were covered

by the judgment.

School Supt. James Ritchie told the board members that he would want the clarification to come from the Michigan Department of Education and the attorney general.

"The ruling said that necessary elements of the school's activity must be supplied," Ritchie said.

He said that many questions must be answered before the board can change the course textbooks and workbooks.

Ritchie noted that workbooks and periodicals required for certain courses must be supplied.

He said that the ruling requires no charge for special courses, such as graphic arts and photography classes.

One question proposed by Ritchie concerned the fees charged by the school for student activities.

"We can't charge fees for band or athletics or registration, according to this ruling," he said.

"But must we supply all of the band uniforms and instruments?"

He also asked whether or not students would be charged for admission to school-related functions such as football and basketball games.

"We would have to absorb some of the athletic department's budget this year," he said.

The questions will be asked of the two state authorities to determine the position of the board.

In other action, the board: —Heard a report by Donald Powell, elementary school principal and Donald Mueller, high school principal concerning the summer school programs in the district.

Powell said that the program, which ended July 24, was attended by 24 students from the sixth, seventh and eighth grades.

The program was established to improve the student's problem area, Powell said.

"The student's not there because he failed the sixth grade and would advance to the seventh if he took the course," Powell said.

# DeWitt council ok's nuisance ordinance

Little revision was needed Monday night for the DeWitt City Council to approve the proposed nuisance ordinance, designed to rid the city of junk cars, unkept yards and trash.

The only clause that was omitted from the original proposal was one that would not permit the keeping of farm animals inside the city limits.

Eldon Smith, city administrator, told the councilmen that there were farms inside the city limits and it would be impractical to pass the clause.

Smith noted that the county was planning a zoning revision which would incorporate the farm clause, excluding farms of certain sizes.

The main portion of the ordinance concerns the removal of junk autos on private property. The plan calls for the auto, if it cannot be operated, to be housed in a building or the owner would be liable.

The ordinance will become effective Aug. 12, upon publication

in a general circulation newspaper.

In other action the council: —Received a report by Tom Mauro, high school instructor who has undertaken a summer park program for city children.

Mauro said that the program attracts about 70 to 110 children each day, with five softball teams and arts and crafts.

He requested a small allocation from the city to repay the people who aided him in the project. He indicated that he would like to take them out for a dinner.

The council agreed and voted unanimously to appropriate \$40 for the dinner.

—Voted to install a new culvert at Wilson Street and W. Main Street at a cost of \$165.

—Acknowledged the receipt of bids for the municipal garage from four construction firms.

Those posting bids for the job were Morton Building, Moriarty, Chesaning Farmers Cooperative and Clinton Construction Inc.

The council's public works board will meet to open the bids and determine the low bidder.

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Other programs in the district include a head start program and the driver education classes.

—Asked Ritchie to request a sign at U.S. 27 and Herbison Road to direct visitors to the new high school. Ritchie indicated he would contact the Clinton County Road Commission about the sign.

—Voted to accept an electrical bid from Fox Electric of \$1,695 which was "considerable savings to the taxpayers," Ritchie said.

Approved the certificate of payment for two new buses authorized at the July 13 meeting.

—Approved the certificate of partial payment to the contractors of the new Middle School for mechanical, electrical and general work.

—Approved the maternity leave of absence for Mrs. Diane Jones for two years.

# Hart urges flood control, rec project in Clinton

Sen. Philip A. Hart, (D-Mich), has urged Congressional approval of a \$10 million flood control and recreation project serving Clinton, Gratiot and Shiawassee Counties.

The federal government would provide about \$5 million for the project under the Soil Conservation Service's watershed program.

Known as the East Upper Maple River Watershed, the flood control and recreation areas would cover 169,700 acres in the three counties.

Hart told a Senate Public Works subcommittee that the plan would provide flood control for many of the more than 1,000 farms in the watershed, plus two large multi-purpose lakes and recreation areas.

"The area is plagued by an average of four floods a year, many of which have occurred during growing seasons," said Hart. "Harnessing this resource will not only prevent damage to crops, roads and residences, but also can help increase farm productivity in the area."

"Equally important," he added, "the watershed is located in what might be called one of Michigan's 'most lakeless' areas. The six

surrounding counties have few if any large lakes suitable for swimming.

"As part of the flood control plan, two large lakes will be created and available for public recreation," he said. "The recreation areas will also include facilities for camping and boating."

Hart said the two lakes, covering 412 acres and 235 acres, would be located south of Route 21, between St. Johns and Owosso.

mas and a full day before New Year's.

In addition, beginning with the third year of the contract, workers will be paid for a "floating holiday" to be designated by the union.

The purpose of the floating holiday is to allow workers to take off long holiday weekends. The union must give the company at least 30 days notice of this holiday.

Other fringes negotiated include an additional \$10 during the first year for sick and accident benefits. Another \$20 will be added to this during the third year of the contract.

Beginning in the second year of the agreement, life insurance benefits will be increased to \$3,000. This will be increased to \$4,000 in the third year.

Beginning Sept. 25, 1972, the company will contribute up to 10 cents for every hour worked for pension benefits to be determined at that time. Terms of this provision are still to be negotiated.

Saylor Beall, which manufactures air compressors, was organized by the union in 1964 and employs approximately 75 workers covered by the UAW contract.

It is the only one of three major industrial plants in St. Johns to be organized.

This was the third three-year contract signed by the UAW since Saylor Beall was organized. Since 1964, the plant has never been struck.

Robert M. Montgomery, William Hufnagel, Maurice Cove, and Nobis, with Andrew Cobb absent from the session.

In July the board voted 7-4 to deny the request, overruling the zoning commission approval.

After the voting, Nobis asked that the board request a refund on money allocated to the Tri-County commission and the county planning commission for a current study of the solid waste landfill needs.

The landfill will be operated by the Vector firm for seven years when plans call for reclaiming the land for use as a golf course.

In other action Monday, the board: —Heard a report by Shepard on a resolution passed by the allocation board which would establish tax limitations of 16.9

mills for a four year period. The resolution, in the form of a petition, would be presented to the voters in the November general election.

The petition calls for a tax limit of 6.5 mills for the county, 1.15 for the townships, .25 mills for the intermediate school district and 9.0 mills for the schools.

A similar proposal for 18 mills was defeated by county voters two years ago.

Presently, the tax limit establishes 5.85 mills for the county, 1 mill for the townships, 1.5 mills for the intermediate school district and 8.0 mills for schools.

# Two from St. Johns prepare for Army life

Two St. Johns area men have been assigned, as army privates, here in the United States Army Training Center, Armor (USATCA), where they will receive their initial eight weeks of military training as members of Company C, 12th Battalion, 5th Brigade, USATCA.

They are Morris C. Conklin, son of Mr. and Mrs. Levi Conklin, 607 S. Ottawa and Randy L. Hart, son of Mr. and Mrs. Douglas A. Hart, 5533 South U.S. 27.

They will spend the next two months learning all the fundamental skills of a soldier. They will fire more than 500 rounds of live ammunition under simulated combat conditions, including those encountered at night, during a three week course with the soldier's basic weapon—the M-16 rifle.

They will also be taught protective measures and first aid for chemical, biological and radiological attacks, and will be schooled in the use of hand grenades, bayonet and hand-to-hand combat.

Much of the instruction is vividly illustrated by the latest visual-aid techniques and live demonstrations, and by living under actual field conditions for several days.

Interspersed with constant emphasis on proper physical conditioning, diet, rest and health habits, will be ample time to utilize USATCA's many and varied recreational and religious facilities.

Upon completion of basic training, these men will receive at least an additional eight weeks of either advanced instruction or on-the-job training to qualify each man in a specialized military skill.

Feldpausch pointed out that all funds from the oats and any other attractions which may bring revenues will be directed toward the establishment of a boys camp.

It's an idea he's had for a long time and the longevity of an old-fashioned thresher is bringing the plan to reality.

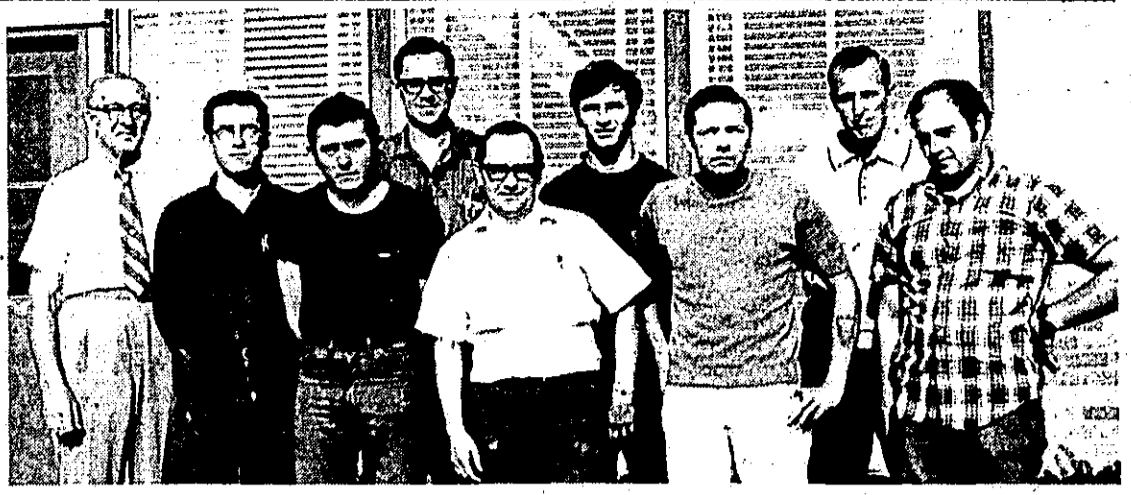

Football activities will step up in St. Johns next week as players report for physical examinations and equipment handouts.

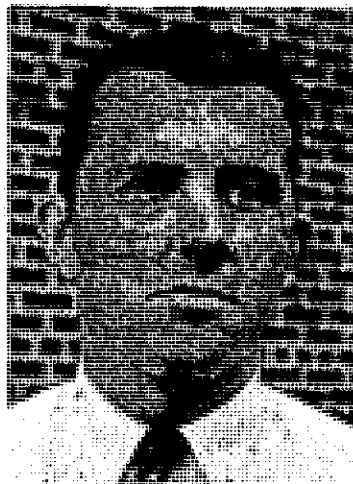
Although Smith has lost all but four of 22 starting lettermen, he expects St. Johns to be in the thick of the battle for the championship of the West Central Conference.

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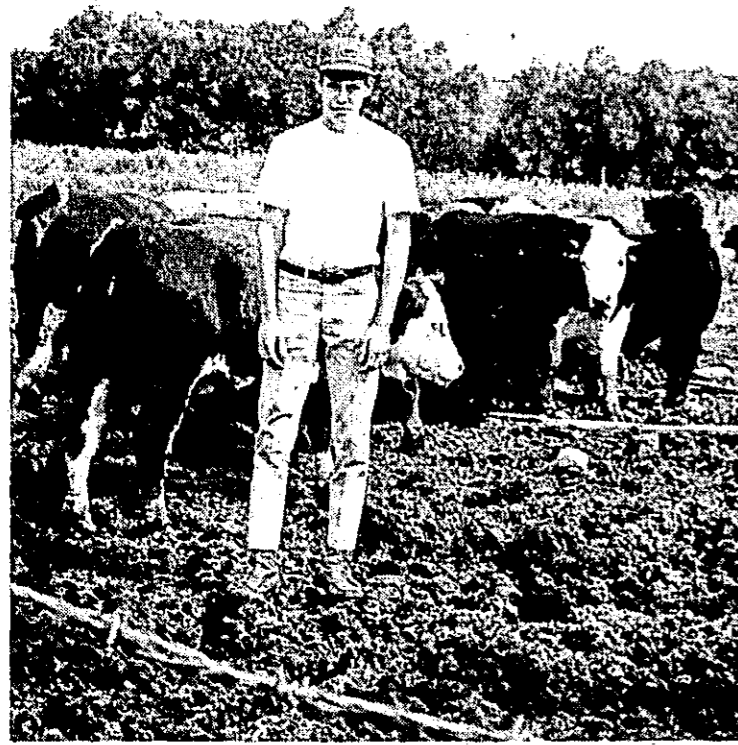

## State Crop Report

Wet soils from heavy rains of the previous week, some additional rain and high humidity continued to delay field work.

Wheat harvest has been held up and some wheat is sprouting in the fields.

Soil moisture supplies range from adequate to surplus in the Southern half of the Lower Peninsula to short to adequate in the Northwestern Lower Peninsula and Upper Peninsula. The State averaged only 3.7 days suitable for field work.

About 40 per cent of the State's wheat acreage has been harvested and another 50 per cent is ripe, waiting to be harvested.

Only 10 per cent of the wheat acreage is not yet ripe.

Standing wheat is sprouting in some fields in the southern and central counties. Over one-third of the State's oat acreage has not yet headed, 45 per cent has turned color but is not ripe, and 15 per cent is ripe. Only two per cent has been harvested.

Corn continues to make an excellent growth on well drained fields. Some corn has been lost or growth retarded by flooding or excessive soil moisture. Dry beans and soybeans continue to develop well on well drained land.

However, damaged from flooding and washing of the soil is still apparent in later planted bean fields. Potatoes and sugarbeets generally continue to make a good growth. Digging of early potatoes has been at a slow pace because of immaturity.

About 30 per cent of the second cutting hay has now been made. Pastures continue to supply average to above average amounts of feed in most of the Lower Peninsula. However, pastures in the Upper Peninsula are supplying less than average amounts of feed in many localities.

Onions and other vegetables continue to develop well. The harvest of an excellent crop of pickles is underway in most producing areas. Wet weather has slowed the pickle harvest in the Lansing area.

Picking of fresh market tomatoes has started in the Detroit area and is continuing in Berrien County. Packing of carrots has started in the Grant area. Early sweet corn is being harvested in many areas.

Strong winds caused considerable damage to unharvested tart cherries and other tree fruits in the northwestern and west central counties. Tart cherry harvest is nearing completion in West Central orchards and is underway in North Western orchards.

The blueberry harvest is approaching its peak in Berrien County but has been slowed by wet fields and cool weather in the West Central areas. The picking of summer apples, early peaches and early plums continues in Berrien County. Later varieties of apples continue to size well.

## Michigan dairy products show increase this year

The whole milk equivalent (based on Milkfat content) used to produce manufactured dairy products in Michigan in 1969 was 1,548 million pounds, according to the Michigan Crop Reporting Service. This was two per cent more than manufactured in 1968 but four per cent less than 1967.

By products, butter production in Michigan, was 28.4 million pounds, 10 per cent more than 1968 but 11 per cent less than 1967.

Butter accounted for 39 per cent of the total manufacturing whole milk equivalent in 1969.

All cheese made from whole milk in 1969 in Michigan totaled 23.7 million pounds, down five per cent from 1968 and 10 per cent from 1967.

American cheese which includes Cheddar, Colby and Jack or Monterey, decreased 13 per cent from 1968.

Brick cheese increased 11 per cent from 1968 and Italian cheese increased three per cent.

Cheese accounted for 16 per cent of all milk used in manufactured dairy products.

Michigan plants produced 57.2 million pounds of creamed cottage cheese in 1969, three per cent more than 1968 and five per cent more than 1967.

Michigan's ice cream output

for 1969 was 36.0 million gallons, one per cent less than 1968.

The 11.2 million gallons of ice milk produced was 26 per cent more than produced the previous year. Sherbet production of 2.4 million gallons is seven per cent less than 1968 production.

All frozen products used 34 per cent of all milk used in manufactured dairy products in 1969.

Manufactured dairy products utilized 50 per cent of the 1969 U.S. milk production.

Net use of whole milk equivalent (based on milkfat content) was 58.3 billion pounds, down nearly two per cent from 1968.

Butter production took five per cent less milk than a year ago. A total of 23.7 billion pounds net whole milk equivalent was used—the second smallest amount since 1946.

Milk used for cheese production, excluding creamed cottage cheese, set a new record high for the sixth consecutive year.

A total of 17.6 billion pounds of whole milk went into U.S. cheese production, up one per cent from 1968.

Frozen dairy products used 13.0 billion pounds of gross whole milk equivalent in 1969, just above the previous record set last year.

U.S. creamery butter production in 1969 was 1,121 million pounds—the second lowest annual output in a half-century.

Minnesota, for the 23rd consecutive year, maintained its position as the leading butter producer, followed by Wisconsin, Iowa, California and New York.

These five states accounted for 65 per cent of U.S. butter production.

Total cheese production, excluding full-skim American and cottage cheese, was 1,986 million pounds in 1969, two per cent above the record high set in 1968.

Wisconsin produced 44 per cent of the national output, and with New York, Minnesota, Iowa, and Missouri, accounted for two-thirds of the total.

Production of processed cheese and processed cheese foods, spreads, and cold pack was 1,017 million pounds in 1969, five per cent above 1968 and a record high.

Processed cheese alone totaled 650 million pounds, one per cent above 1968.

Processed cheese foods, spreads, and cold pack totaled 367 million pounds, 12 per cent above 1968, the previous high.

Frozen desserts (ice cream, ice milk, milk sherbet, mellorine and "other frozen dairy products," but excluding water ices) totaled a record 1,155 million gallons in 1969, 10 million gallons or one per cent above 1968.

Increases in ice milk and milk sherbet production more than offset declines in production of ice cream, mellorine, and "other frozen dairy products."

Cottage cheese curd production in 1969 was 673 million pounds—four per cent above 1968 and a record high.

All regions showed increases, and California maintained its lead for the 21st year. Other major producing States were New York, Ohio, Illinois and Wisconsin.

Creamed cottage cheese production was 908 million pounds—five per cent above 1968 and a record high.

California led for the 24th consecutive year, and with New York, Illinois, Ohio and Michigan accounted for 48 per cent of all creamed cottage cheese.

Partially creamed cottage cheese (less than four per cent milkfat) totaled 43 million pounds up 24 per cent and highest of record.

## payments released 1970 farm program

Ninety-five per cent of the Feed Grain and Wheat program payments have been released to Michigan participants according to Nick Smith, Chairman of the Michigan Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) Committee.

A commitment for the early release of 1970 payments was made by the Secretary of Agriculture earlier this year when he because of budgetary limitations he did not approve the issuance of advance payments. In prior years, wheat payments were released late in July and feed grain payments in August and September.

Payments when completed will be made to Michigan farmers participating in the 1970 program on more than 73,000 farms. Payments are made to compensate farmers for acreage they set aside from the production of wheat, corn, grain sorghum and barley. The payments are intended to offset the loss of income normally derived from the production of these crops.

The American farmer has the ability to produce more than we can utilize by direct consumption and exports. Congress is now working on New Farm Legislation. Farm programs must be designed to help maintain stability in the production of food and fiber, the chairman explained. Huge surpluses or shortages must be avoided.

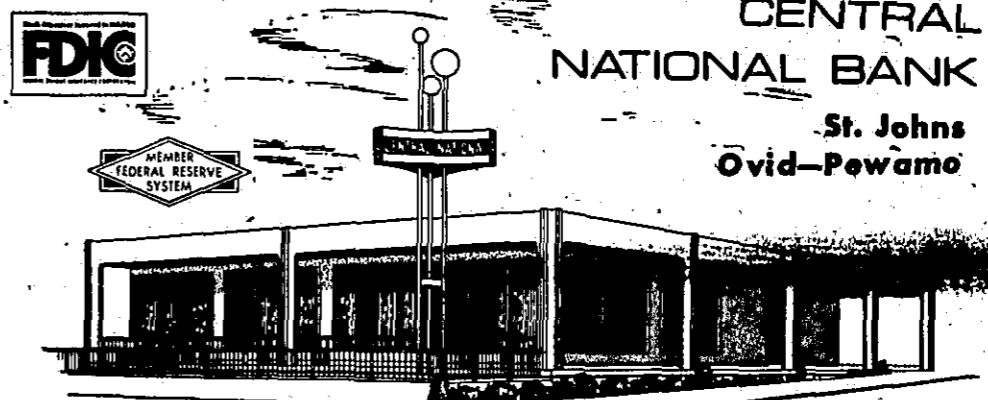

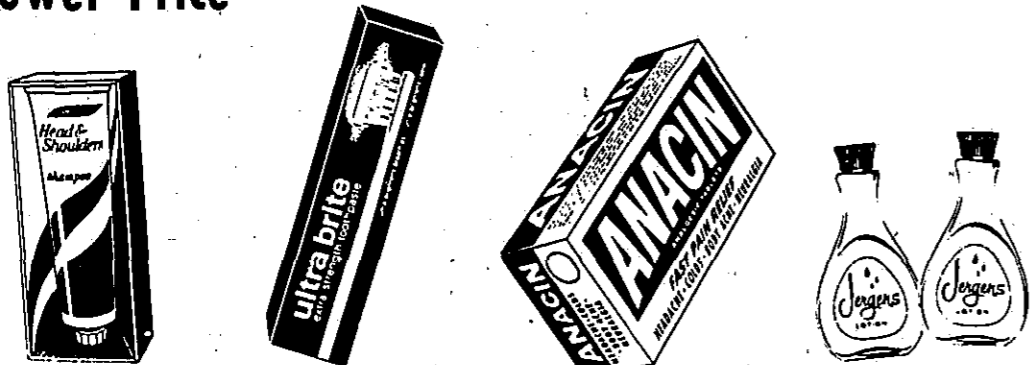

# Here's how to judge that new cookbook

Are you one of those gals who just can't resist each bright and shining cookbook as it gleams across the counter at you?

If you are one of the gullible ones, here is a guide for you to help in selecting a basic cookbook

that is really basic.

1. Is the author a qualified authority? Is the information unbiased or has the author promoted specific brands and products? What's the purpose of the book? Some cookbooks are written with "special diets" in mind and are not especially adaptable to normal diets for healthy people.

2. Is the cookbook well organized? Does it have a table of contents and does the index help you locate a recipe quickly? If the cookbook is arranged by menus, recipes should also be listed alphabetically by type (salads, desserts and breads, for example) to make it easy to find recipes. When recipes are organized by menu, it is difficult to compare ingredients and recipes at a glance.

3. Are the pages made of sturdy paper to withstand daily use? Does the book open easily and lie flat? Has space been provided for writing in new ideas and recipes? The loose leaf type of book allows the addition of new pages.

4. Is the cover durable and easy to clean?

5. Are the recipes easy to read and understand?

The basic cookbook should also contain general information helpful in food preparation. This often includes:

-a list of equivalent measures for measuring techniques as well as substitutions that might have to be made, such as using cornstarch instead of flour as a thickening agent.

-a description of measuring techniques to get best results when using the recipes in the book.

-a list of standard equipment and utensils for a well-equipped kitchen.

-a description of common ingredients that points out the differences between various types of baking powder, flour, flavoring, fat and other cooking staples.

-temperature definitions and time tables for cooking.

-buying tips.

-basic principles of cookery.

-reasons for failure.

-illustrations or clear descriptions of the finished product.

-pictures that show "how to do" it.

-descriptions of various types of meal service, including ways to serve and formal and informal table settings.

-suggestions for preparing food in quantity.

The basic cookbook may also include suggestions for meal planning, calorie counts of common foods and guides for providing well-balanced meals.

## Frozen food can be saved if power fails

With the home freezer filling up fast with the abundance of fresh fruits and vegetables, it could be good insurance for you to know what to do should the electric power fail.

First, if the freezer stops, keep the door closed. How long the food will stay frozen depends on the amount of food in the freezer. A full freezer will remain cold considerably longer than one only a quarter full. Baked foods and frozen fruits will warm up faster than meat. The longer the freezer, the longer the food will stay frozen.

This seems to be the year for historic silver anniversaries.

In the beginning of 1945, 25 years ago, the German counter-offensive in the bitter cold and snow of the Ardennes was being turned back, while in the Pacific, GIs were mopping up the Philippines.

By March, the Americans broke through the German defenses at Remagen to launch an

attack that broke the back of the Third Reich.

In April, Franklin D. Roosevelt, exhausted and weak, passed away leaving the burden of victory to the inexperienced Harry S. Truman.

That same month, delegates met in San Francisco to draft the United Nations charter.

By May, the two dreaded dictators, Hitler and Mussolini, were dead.

On Sept. 2, the war was officially ended with the unconditional surrender of Japan aboard the USS Missouri.

But the most significant anniversary will fall on Aug. 6.

That's the day a lone bomber flying high over the territory of the Empire of the Rising Sun released the most devastating single payload in history.

Three days later, Aug. 9, Nagasaki's civilian population disappeared in the fire-rain of the second Atomic attack.

Since those days in 1945, the world has been living on borrowed time.

A new "War to End All Wars" with nuclear weapons would very probably end mankind as well.

Under fear of atomic war, the succeeding generation has witnessed untold amounts of progress, prosperity and development. But what has been the cost?

We've seen old enemies form new alliances; the United States, Japan, Italy, West Germany, Austria and Yugoslavia.

However, we have lost the friendship or alliance of Soviet Russia, China, Egypt, and occasionally even France.

Shooting wars have developed three times in the Middle East, East Europe (Hungary and Czechoslovakia), Korea, Vietnam, Laos and Cambodia—not to mention the Dominican Republic and Cuba.

We've seen the Nuremberg War Crime trials, the assassinations of John F. Kennedy, Robert F. Kennedy, Martin Luther King, Malcolm X and George Lincoln Rockwell.

The nation has lived through Little Rock, Birmingham, Selma, Watts and Detroit. We survived the Joe McCarthy Red scare; although not without scars.

We've walked on the moon and entered the age of Aquarius.

The events of 25 years have left their impressions on the American people and have changed the structure of our value system.

The problems we face with the young can't be laughed away like that All-American shot of bourbon behind the football bleachers after a sock hop. We are entering those when the horrors of society's neglect have caught up with us.

## Back to work

Other than Tuesday's Primary Election, the chief topic of discussion among legislators this past week has been the likely agenda for the fast-approaching session of the House and Senate which convenes Thursday.

Meetings—many of them attended by Governor Milliken or his staff—have been going on at the Capitol during the present recess to develop priorities for the session.

Elected leaders of both parties in the House and Senate have issued their recommendations for the priority list. Topping the list is the last unresolved budget bill for the 1970-71 fiscal year. This is the grants and transfers bill (HB 4067), which has been held up due to a conflict over a proposed grant to the city of Hamtramck—a conflict which will have to be resolved before the bill can pass. The House has turned down this portion of the bill, and the first move in August will be an attempt to remove the amendment from the Senate version of the bill.

Proposed constitutional amendments, intended for inclusion on the November ballot, will be a very important area of consideration.

As far as I'm concerned the most important amendment proposal is the one to limit local property taxes for school operations to between 12 and 16 mills, which would provide some true property tax relief and general tax equity. This is House Joint Resolution "WWW" or "Triple W", as it is most often referred to. This proposal passed the House with my support and is awaiting action in the Senate.

Also very important is the proposed amendment (SJR "JJ") to create an independent state investigations commission as a major anti-crime force in Michigan. This measure has passed the Senate and must be acted upon by the House. There are indications that objections to the form of the proposal, which held up action earlier, may be resolved through revision.

Both legislative branches have passed proposed amend-

ments to allow 18-year-olds to vote in Michigan. There has apparently been a leadership agreement to act on the House version of the proposal (HJR "A").

Still a fourth ballot possibility is a proposal for a graduated income tax (HJR "EE"). Like the 18-year-old vote, this question has been defeated by Michigan voters in the recent past, but supporters (chiefly Democrats) want to place it before the voters again. This measure is awaiting Senate action after passage in the House.

There are several environmental bills on the suggested priority list, covering pollution and the preservation of the Great Lakes shoreline and our scenic and wild rivers. A controversial bill seeking to end unrestricted access to dangerous explosives is another high-priority item. This bill is opposed by many sportsmen, principally muzzleloaders who use black and smokeless powder. We will also be considering a state-wide construction code, bills on drug abuse, more equitable tax assessments, and teacher incentive pay. Finally, HB 2533, a bill co-sponsored which would mandate the assessment of agricultural land on the basis of its use for farming and nothing else, is one step away from the Governor's desk.

The tentative plans call for a two-day session in August, with other meetings later in the year. The memo drafted after the leadership conference last week said we would go into session at 10 a.m. on Aug. 6, and attempt to finish work on the priority items by the following night.

With all of the unfinished business before us, however, it is quite possible that we won't achieve satisfactory results in a two-day period. My personal opinion is that we should spend as long as necessary to clear the important bills. If this can be accomplished in two days, fine. If not, I would favor extending the August session beyond the tentative two-day schedule. As it is, it looks like we may be convening again in September anyway.

## Don't worry . . .

Are you a worrier?

If you are, you know that its effects are never constructive. Worry always tears down.

A large industrial concern discovered that nine out of 10 cases of worker's inefficiency were caused by worry. A life insurance company found that four out of five nervous breakdowns began not from actual events, but in worry. A medical clinic's analysis of its patients showed that 35 per cent of all illnesses in their patients started with worry.

Dr. Charles Mayo once said, "Worry affects the circulation, the heart, the glands, the whole nervous system and profoundly affects the health. I have never known a man who died from overwork, but many who died from doubt."

Jesus tells us not to be "up tight" about the material things of this world. He says, "Look—your heavenly Father knows you need all these things, so instead give first place to His Kingdom and to what He requires, and He will provide you with all these things."

Well, how do we do this? How do we get rid of our worries and put our trust in God?

Listen to what Johannes Weiss, a German scholar once said:

"In our modern world with its hurry and striving, this song of banished care sounds like a strain from the lost paradise. Indeed none of us will accept it so completely from the heart as not to feel afterward some silent objections, and many a person, in the midst of his need and struggle, will bitterly reject it as not meant for him. . . . But has Jesus' words, then, no meaning for us? Once again we remind ourselves that "to be anxious" is not the same as "to work and to pray."

"Do not be anxious, that is, have a free heart, be courageous and active, accept life each day new from God's hand and trust Him. And how do we obtain such freedom from care? Jesus says to us, "Fill you soul with a really great care; strive after the Kingdom of God; fight for the victory of the good in the world; seek for personal fulfillment; then what has hitherto oppressed you will seem petty and negligible."

Dr. Weiss' advice to us is to "accept life each day new from God's hand and trust in Him." This means that we are to take one day at a time and not worry about "yesterday" or "tomorrow."

"Yesterday" is water over the dam, and "tomorrow" isn't here yet. So by removing the burden of "yesterday" and "tomorrow" we ought to be able to handle "today" with little trouble as long as we invite God to be our partner.

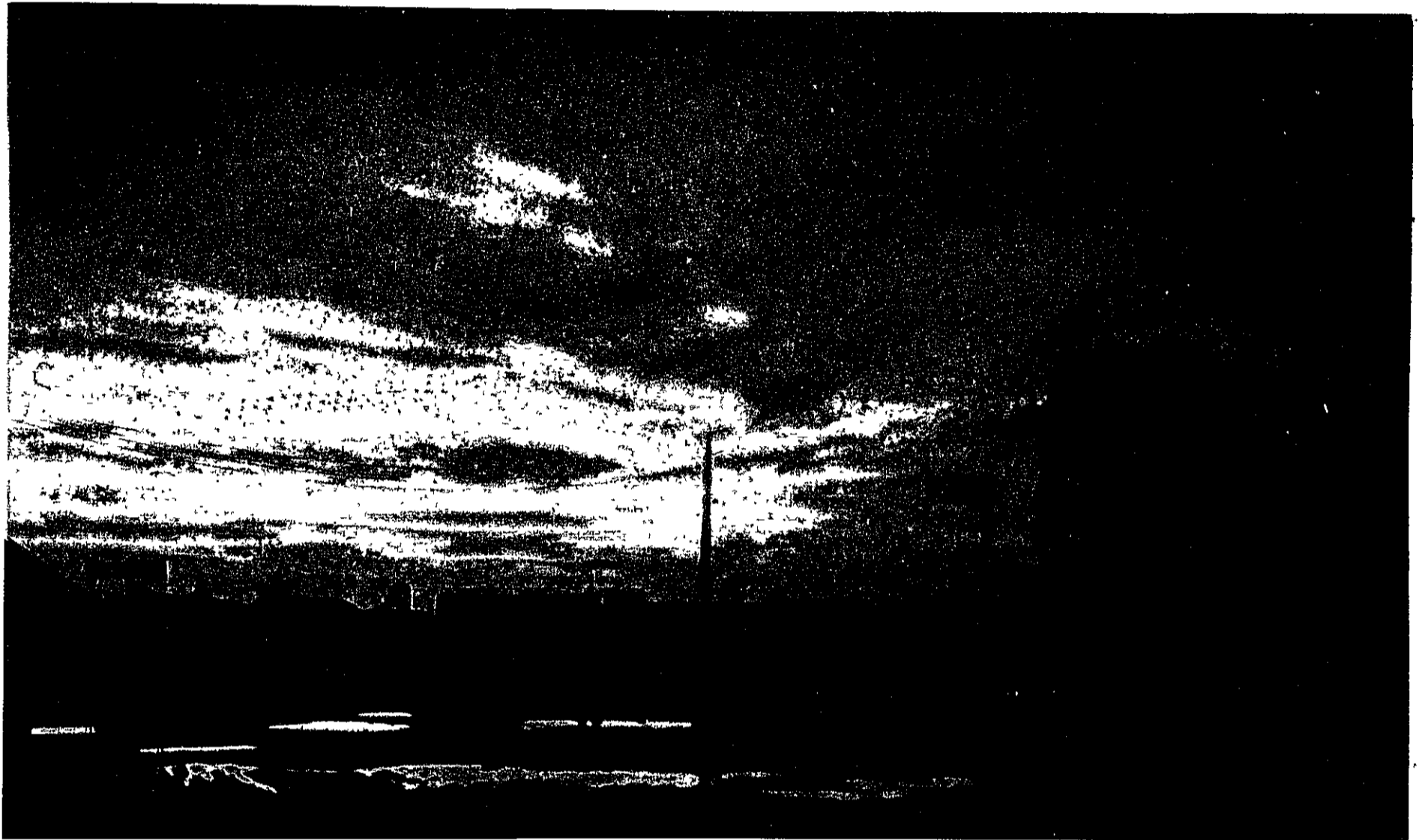

Two soldiers from Clinton County lost their lives in Vietnam in the past year.

Pfc. Benny Sloat, 18, son of Mr. and Mrs. Victor Sloat, of Ovid, was killed when the armored personnel carrier in which he was riding struck a land mine on March 19.

Spec. 4 Brent R. Law, 20, son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Law, of St. Johns was killed July 21, near Phu Bai, South Vietnam. He was with a medical unit picking up wounded men when he was hit by gunfire just before the helicopter in which he was riding touched down.

Sloat was a 1969 graduate of Ovid-Elsie High School. He enlisted in the Army early in July of that year and was sent to Vietnam on Jan. 11.

Law graduated from St. Johns High School in 1968 and attended Lansing Community College before he went into the Army July 1969. He was sent to Vietnam on Jan. 7.

"And the people whose government sent the soldiers are not sure if they should be there at all," he adds.

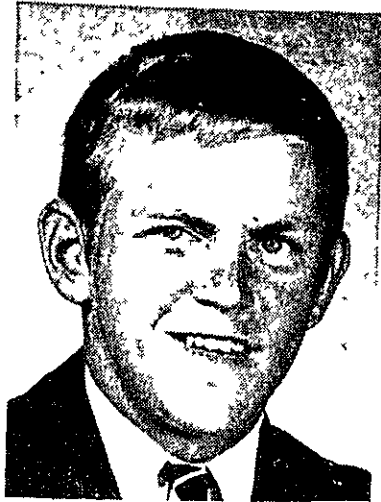
