Firemen seek raise, commission says no

ST JOHNS—Wages paid to volunteer firemen was the "hot" topic during Monday night's meeting of the St Johns City Commission but it appears a pay hike for the part-time smoke eaters will be delayed until the next fiscal year.

"We're not saying they shouldn't be paid more," said Commissioner James Grost, "but we must account for where the money comes from."

COMMISSIONER ROY Ebert added that "it's not a matter of dollar signs, it's how we're going to run business here." He explained that the budget for this fiscal year is already set and firemen should have made their request before July 1.

Later Ebert pointed out the commission's view on budget matters by noting the city was in the red before present commissioners took office and they are now operating in the black.

St Johns firemen are presently paid 5 dollars to answer an alarm and 4 dollars per hour for each additional hour. Only the first six men to answer a call for a rural fire receive the 5 dollars while the others are placed on standby and are paid 2 dollars. All firemen are paid the 5 and 4 dollar scale for city fires.

THE WAGE request is for 7 dollars the first hour and 6 dollars per hour thereafter. Under the proposal, the 2 dollar standby would be increased to 3 dollars and 150 dollars per man would be placed in the Blue Cross escrow fund. It is estimated the Blue Cross request would be about \$3000.

Following the discussion Ebert moved the firemen's recommendations be accepted and taken under advisement at the proper time. In response to a question from Ray Kentfield, senior captain and treasurer of the fire department, Ebert said during formation of the budget is the proper time. Kentfield said "this is fine but I think you'll have trouble with your fire department."

THE MOTION by Ebert was passed with Commissioner Jeanne Rand casting the only dissenting vote. Commissioner John Hamah, was absent.

In voting against the motion, Mrs Rand said "their timing is bad but in this particular case I'm in favor of their request."

The commission then decided to have City Manager Harvey Weatherwax meet with Fire Chief Clare Maier to discuss the wage hike request. Weatherwax will report to the commissioners on the matter at their next committee of the whole meeting.

ANOTHER AREA of concern by citizens attending Monday's meeting was sewers. A public hearing on a special assessment project slated on Wight St focused on the question of whether or not three property owners in that area still hooked into an old sewer line will encounter drainage problems. The feeling of those citizens present was that property owners paying for the new sewer line should not be required to share costs of any additional work required on the old line. Mrs Rand made a motion to this effect and it was adopted.

The commission then adopted a resolution of determination to proceed with the special assessment project on Wight St between Elm and Oak St. The project includes curb and gutter plus storm sewer. Property owners pay 80%

of the curb and gutter while the city picks up the remaining 20% and the entire cost of the storm sewer.

The other sewer problem presented to the commission concerned a petition for maintenance of a storm drain located on Circle Dr. Weatherwax explained tree roots in the ground are believed responsible for blocking the drain but he needs an easement to begin digging on private property. The petition is the first step toward obtaining an easement and this was the course of action commissioners decided upon.

Other commission action included: —instructing City Attorney Paul Maples to request a public hearing before the Department of Commerce on their recommendation that improvements be made at railroad crossings at Morton St and Scott Rd. A study by the agency has requested modernization of signals at several crossings in St Johns at a cost of nearly \$300,000. The city and Grand Trunk

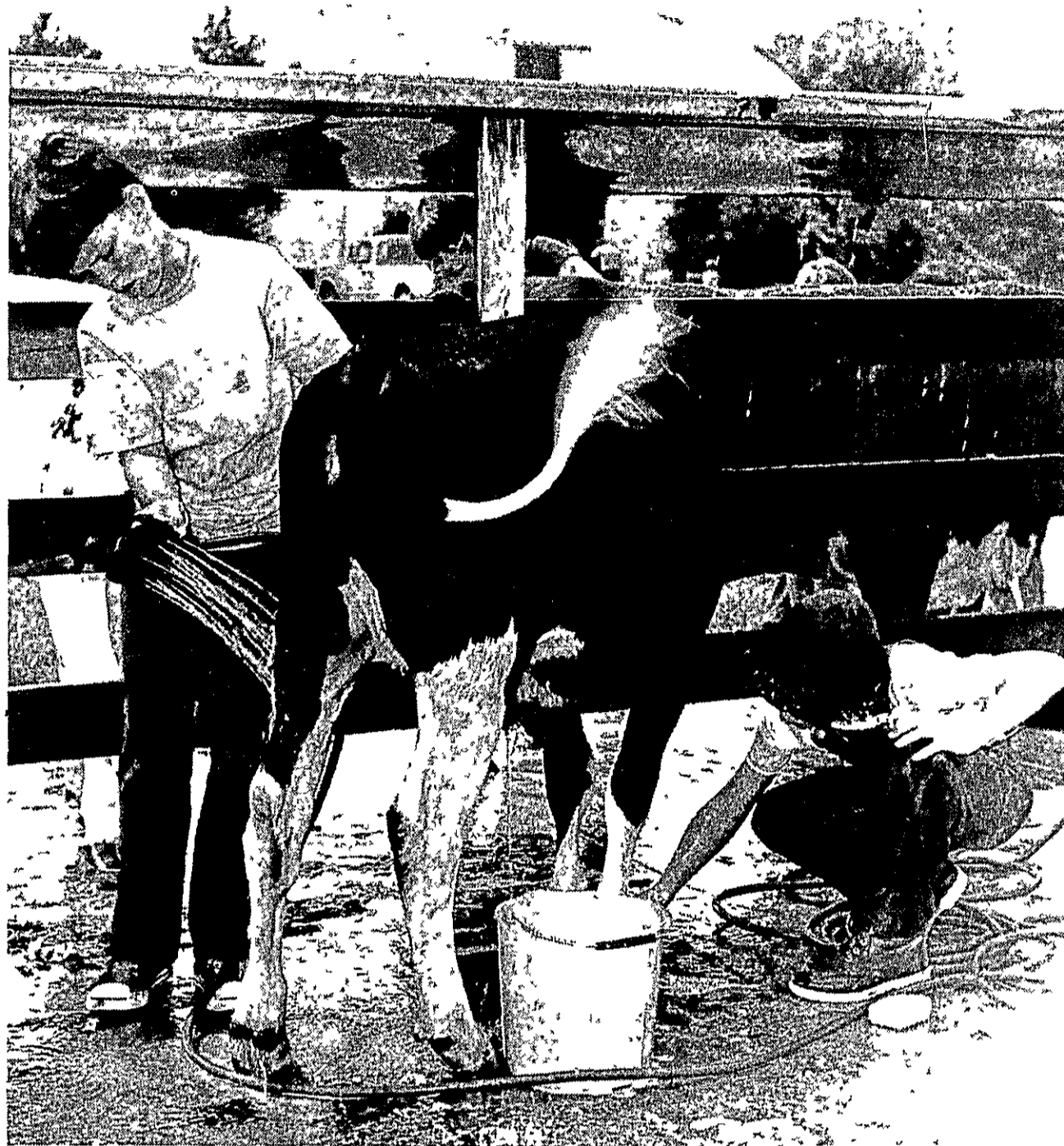
Turn to the second section of this issue for photos and addresses of Clinton County residents serving with military units throughout the world.

Tony Hufnagel tops 4-man sheriff race

ST JOHNS—Tony Hufnagel topped a field of four Republican contenders seeking the office of Clinton County Sheriff in last week's primary and appears a cinch to replace the retiring Percy Patterson.

Hufnagel presently serves as undersheriff and with no Democrats filing for the post his name will be the only one to appear on the November ballot.

Sheriff Patterson is retiring from the office he has held since 1948 on December 31 and at age 69 is the dean of Michigan county sheriffs. He first joined the Clinton County Sheriff's Department in 1925 as a motorcycle patrolman.

HUFNAGEL POLLED 3643 votes and led the four man race in all but 12 of Clinton County's 30 precincts. Ray Terpening, a Shiawassee County

deputy who lost a close race with Patterson in 1968, came in second with 2991 votes. He is a former Clinton County deputy and a current resident of St. Johns.

In 1968, Terpening was defeated by Patterson 2633 to 1835 when he took the edge in one St Johns precinct and the townships of Riley and Eagle. Against Hufnagel, Terpening topped the field in 3 voting precincts while picking up sizeable support in others. He was top vote getter in this year's St Johns precinct 3, Ovid Township precinct 1 and Riley Township.

DeWitt Township Police Chief Bruce Angell finished in the number 3 spot with 1952 votes. He also ran third in the 1968 election behind Patterson and Terpening. Like last time out, Angell captured the five precincts in DeWitt Township but fared poorly in other

areas of the county. This go around he also lead voting in Bath's precinct 1 and Victor Township plus his home area support.

THE FOURTH candidate, Clinton County Deputy Larry Floate of Maple Rapids, compiled 829 votes and lead balloting in Essex and Lebanon Township. His 143 total in Essex was the only precinct where he cracked the double figure park.

Republican Party dominance in Clinton County frequently propels a candidate into office during the primary. This appears the case this election year and barring the unlikely possibility of a united write-in campaign develops in November, Tony Hufnagel should be the new Clinton County Sheriff next year.

Martin and Hufnagel win county commissioner seats

Tuesday's primary election selected 2 of the 11 Clinton County Commissioners for next year where only the Republican Party had a candidate listed on the ballot. Only the unlikely possibility of a write in campaign this November will keep them from taking office.

These include Harold Martin who was unopposed in the District 3 race and William Hufnagel who edged Walter Nobis by a 481-350 vote margin for the 2nd District seat.

MARTIN POLLED 680 votes in the district which represents the townships of Bengal, Riley and Westphalia. A breakdown of votes by precinct in the Hufnagel-Nobis race shows: DALLAS TWO--Hufnagel 304 and Nobis 117; ESSEX TWO--Hufnagel 151 and Nobis 146; LEBANON TWP.--Hufnagel 26 and Nobis 87.

Clinton Co \$274,473 for highways

LANSING--Second quarter Motor Vehicle Highway Fund collections are being distributed to Michigan counties, cities and villages, the State Highway Commission reported last week.

State Highway Director Henrik E. Stafseth said net receipts of the Highway Fund during April, May and June amounted to \$99,699,514, an increase of \$8,424,019, or 9.2% over the same period of 1971.

Clinton County's share totaled \$274,473 compared with last year's \$252,605 for the same quarterly period.

All State gasoline and diesel fuel taxes and license plate fees go to the Motor Vehicle Highway Fund.

After deduction of collection costs and the Waterways Commission's share, the 46% of the proceeds are distributed to the Department of State Highways, 34% to the State's 83 counties and 20% to 529 incorporated cities and villages.

Under this formula, the Highway Department will receive \$45,861,776 as its share of the second quarter collections. The counties will receive \$33,897,835 and the incorporated cities and villages will get \$19,839,933.

Cities and villages in Clinton County received the following amounts for their share of second quarter collections. They include: DeWitt, \$7,399; Eagle, \$847; Elsie, \$4,376; Fowler, \$3,545; Laingsburg, \$5,461; Maple Rapids, \$2,843; Ovid, \$6,329; Pewamo, \$2,996; St. Johns, \$23,833 and Westphalia, \$3,389.

Republicans hold convention tonight

ST JOHNS--The Clinton County Republican Party will conduct their fall convention tonight at 8 pm in the Circuit Court room of the Courthouse in St. Johns.

Major order of business at the gathering will be selection of delegates to attend the Republican State Convention on September 1 and 2 in Detroit. The selection will be made on a vote by the precinct delegates elected in the May 16 primary.

PLANNED FOR immediately after the convention is a session by the county party's executive board which is expected to discuss a policy requiring office-seekers to actively support the party if they wish endorsement at election time.

A newspaper ad placed by the executive council before the recent primary election deleted eight Republican candidates on the ballot which had not paid the party's annual 10 dollar membership fee. Mrs. Jeanne Rand, a candidate for county commissioner, and Larry Floate, a candidate for sheriff, both voiced strong disapproval at this move during a meeting with county GOP chairman James Palmiter.

At the meeting, Palmiter explained the rule and said the eight candidates were intentionally deleted from the ad. Wording on the ad also indicated those candidates listed were in "good standing" with the Clinton County Republican Party.

MRS RAND cited her mother's long years of work as Republican in Clinton County and called the deletion of her name from the ad "a personal affront" while adding that it appeared she was not a "good Republican".

She called the rule a "bad one" and urged it be changed. Palmiter replied the change must come during a

meeting of the executive board and explained this is the best course of action. Mrs. Rand had asked Palmiter for a public apology for deleting the names but he adamantly denied the request.

The rule in question which was adopted by the county party's executive board in March of 1971 states: "Any Republican office holder who refuses to work for the party or contribute to it financially will be denied party support at election time."

This is the rule attention will focus upon at tonight's meeting and Mrs. Rand is expected to lead a move to change it.

Michigan farmers retire wheat - corn acreage

EAST LANSING--In the calendar year 1972, 70,000 farmers in Michigan signed agreements with the United States Department of Agriculture to retire corn and wheat acreage from annual production.

Arthur Rowley, Chairman of the Michigan State ASC Committee, ex-

plains that a random sample of these farms is visited by County ASCS representatives to determine that the required acreage has been set-aside and that the land is of average productivity for the farm.

Mr. Rowley states that he was very proud of the integrity of Michigan farmers and that after checking approximately 5,000 farms, no major discrepancies have been found. However, minor infractions which appear to be errors or misunderstanding, have caused a reduction of about \$6,000 to fifty farmers.

Mr. Rowley further states that there will be a continuation of the farm visits and that all farmers should recognize that the acreage set-aside from production cannot be harvested during the 1972 crop year and only grazed after September 1.

Railroad have been asked to share this cost. Both strongly object and a public hearing on proposals for the crossings at Lansing, Meade and Ottawa Sts is scheduled for Friday.

A 65-year-old maximum age was placed on city firemen holding a command post. Presently only the chief, assistant chief and treasurer are considered command posts but the commission decided the two fire captains also be included in this category. Sixty years old was the previously normal retirement age with extensions granted by commission in certain cases and physical exams required annually.

Tri-County discusses local representation

ST. JOHNS--A proposal by the Tri-County Regional Planning Commission (TCRPC) to restructure itself and give representation to cities, townships and villages was discussed in a special meeting with Clinton County cities and villages last Thursday.

Representatives from 5 communities, DeWitt, Eagle, Fowler, Maple Rapids and Ovid, met in St. Johns with Roy Andrews, Almond Cressman, Walter Nobis and Gerald Shepard, the TCRPC commissioners from Clinton County.

TWO TCRPC staff members, Herbert Maier, executive director, and McRoy Canterbury, were also on hand to answer questions regarding restructuring.

The Commission agreed to restructure itself last April in an attempt to become more responsive to the people.

The restructuring proposals include: --Increasing the membership from 9

to 16, which would give representation to the townships, villages and cities in each county.

--Changing the name to the Tri-County Regional Coordinating Council.--Asking cities, townships and villages to help finance the organization.

THE PROPOSALS have already been approved in concept by the boards of commissioners of Clinton, Eaton, and Ingham counties.

The community representatives will present the restructuring recommendations to their city and village councils and general reaction will be determined at another meeting scheduled for September.

Three Clinton County communities, St. Johns, Elsie and Westphalia, were absent Thursday but the 5 communities present voiced hope for full representation at the September meeting.

Laingsburg plans evening classes

Michigan rates safest for walkers

Michigan has been honored as one of the nation's safest areas for pedestrians with an Award for Excellence, the second highest honor for states in the 33rd annual National AAA Pedestrian Safety Inventory.

In recognition of Michigan's outstanding achievements in pedestrian safety programs in 1971, a special plaque has been presented to Governor Milliken by Richard R. Dann, Automobile Club of Michigan executive vice president.

"Michigan received the Award for Excellence on the basis of its legislative and safety control programs plus a significant reduction in pedestrians injured in traffic the last 2 years," Dann stated.

"A 16% drop in pedestrian injury accidents was recorded in Michigan the past 2 years," Dann pointed out. "The number of pedestrians injured went from 7589 in 1969 to 6402 in 1971."

"This significant decline is a major reason for this state being among the nation's leaders in traffic safety in 1970-71."

Michigan's 1971 pedestrian injury rate per 100,000 population was 71 as compared with an average of 77 for all competing states. The pedestrian death rate was 4.5 compared to 4.6 nationally in the inventory.

Auto Club points out that for the first half of 1972,

Michigan has 131 pedestrian deaths, a 12% drop over the first 6 months of 1971.

Michigan achieved a score of 100% in pedestrian legislative phase of the inventory. National AAA commended the State Legislature for reviewing and updating pedestrian laws, permitting local communities to enact pedestrian safety control programs and enabling the governor to do whatever is necessary to secure full benefits under the National Highway Safety Program.

The State Office of Highway Planning and State Police also were cited by National AAA for their efforts in improving pedestrian safety in Michigan.

The Award for Excellence was the 12th honor, including 5 first-place awards, Michigan has received in the AAA program since 1949. Last year was the first time Michigan was entered in the safety program since 1963.

Six Michigan cities also were named high award winners, including: Grosse Pointe Woods, Award for Excellence for cities in the 10,000 to 25,000 population class; Kalamazoo, special Citation for Pedestrian Award, 50,000 to 100,000 population class; Lansing, Special Citation, 100,000 to 200,000 population; Mount Clemens, Special Citation 10,000 to 25,000 population; Sparta, Award of Merit, under 10,000 population; Wayne, Award of Merit, 10,000 to 35,000 population.

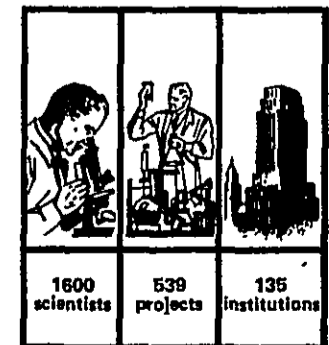

Graves begins fall campaign

MT PLEASANT -- Bennie Graves, Democratic candidate for the 10th Congressional District seat, launched his post-primary campaign Friday night by condemning the Republican administration for its "cynical disregard" for the unemployment problem in the 10th District.

Appearing as the keynote speaker before the Midland County Democratic Convention, Graves cited excessively high unemployment rates for 10th District counties and compared them with state and national figures.

"EVEN THAT effort has been unsuccessful," Graves said. "Crime has in fact increased under Nixon."

Graves, who was unopposed in last week's primary, called for party unity among Democrats in their effort to unseat the incumbent Republican administration in the nation and in the 10th District.

"The most hopeful thing about the McGovern-Shriver ticket is that it contains the potential to restore some of the nation's faith in the institutions of government," Graves said.

GRAVES, 44, is a teacher at Central Michigan University and chairman of the Isabella County Democratic party. He and his wife and three children live at 630 S. Fancher in Mt. Pleasant.

Before entering college teaching, Graves worked in the cotton fields of West Texas, on construction on the grain harvest and fruit picking trails through the Southwest, as a school teacher, principal and psychiatric social worker. He is a World War II Navy veteran.

GRAVES SAID that the median unemployment rate for district counties in March was 15.3 percent and that unemployment went as high as 25.6 percent in Clare and 20.3 percent in Shiawassee counties.

The lowest rate in the district, he said, was Saginaw county where the 6.3 percent rate was still higher than the national average of 6 percent.

Stony Creek school is home to area family

ST JOHNS—Clinton County students go back to school Sept. 6.

But it won't be new to Stephanie, Terry and Brent Churches. They've been in the classroom all summer.

Home to them is the old Stony Creek School at 4611 S DeWitt Rd. Their mom and dad, Larry and Sue Churches, bought the brick building in Bingham Twp eight years

ago as an investment.

WHEN CHURCHES' work with the Michigan Education Association Special Services Assn meant a move from Saginaw, the couple decided to convert the school into a house. They hired a DeWitt builder, Schaeffer Brothers, who took a look and gave the go-ahead.

"We had some of our own ideas," says Mrs Churches, a parttime employee at Consumers Power Co in St

Johns. Work got underway in March last year.

First step was to strip the walls of the 1887 structure and to raise the ceiling to 10 feet. A second story was added above the 24 x 36 foot ground floor topped off with a six foot walk-in attic. An adjoining two-car garage was constructed on the 3/4 of an acre site overlooking Stony Creek. Two features are a spacious sundeck with redwood trim and a front porch. The structure already had a furnace and indoor plumbing along with a septic tank and well.

After the family moved in July 14, 1971, Churches did much of the finishing work. His father, Lorenzo, who owns the adjacent lands pitched in to help. Mrs Churches chose a Colonial decor, throughout the 2000 square feet of living space.

The first floor has a spacious living room and dining room. A utility room with a built-in pantry closet and half bath is off the kitchen. From the hallway is a full bath featuring a fiberglass bathtub and the master bedroom with two walk-in closets.

Of special pride to the Churches is a mammoth fireplace where the original entryway was. It is constructed of large stones from the old doorway with a barn beam for the mantel and chalk board on the floor.

Three bedrooms and a bath are found on the second floor. Stephanie, 14, Terry, 11 1/2 and Brent, 9, chose their own colors and decided

for brother Bart, 15 months. The teacher's desk and chair are being used in the hallway where a doorway leads to the sundeck.

Much of the original brick was used for the exterior along with aluminum siding. A swing set and playground equipment was left in place for the children.

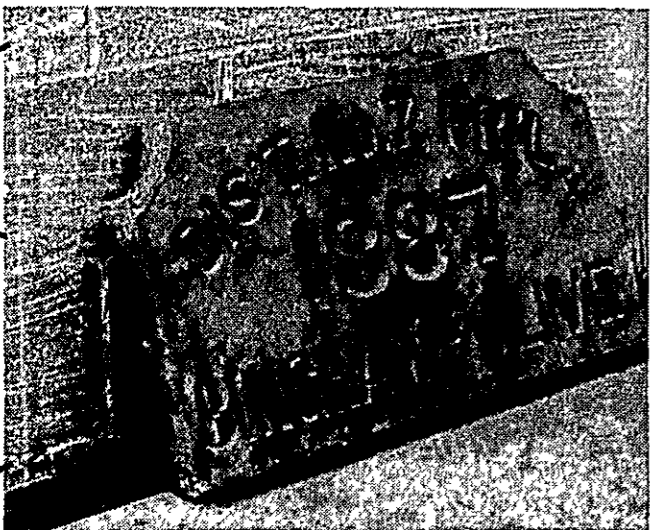
The couple say they still want to put many of their ideas into reality. But they're doing it step by step and are "learning" as they go.

The first night after crossing the Mackinac Bridge and following Route US-2 to Brevort, they were surprised to find their hosts were Mr. and Mrs. Bernard Eisler, formerly of St. Johns and Elsie, at the Surf Side Motel overlooking Lake Michigan where they stayed.

The next morning at breakfast in Naubinway they were again surprised to meet Mr. and Mrs. Dave Loughton and Mrs. Don Stillwell of Ovid. They continued on US-2 (originally Theodore Roosevelt Highway), which is unique in the fact that it crosses the top of this nation from Arcadia National Park in Maine to Olympic National Park in Washington.

At Blaney Park they turned off for the Seney National Refuge, Munising and nearby Christmas and drove along the Lake Superior shore. At Marquette they stopped to see the beautiful flowers and sunken gardens at the Marquette Branch Prison. Hiking and Negaunee with the iron mining, ski jumping, rock collecting and the surrounding lakes and rivers for fishing provided many points of interest. The most unusual part of the trip was Keweenaw-land.

They drove through the L'Anse and Baraga communities, historically rich in Indian lore, to Chassell, Michigan, Strawberry Capital, where they spent the night. They dined at a large supper club, that was formerly a private yacht club on Portage Lake.

They crossed the Portage Lake Lift Bridge, largest of its kind in America between 1844 to protect the miners against unfriendly Indians. There was quite a bit of restoration being done this year.

The travelers made the return trip past many abandoned mines and towns and such interesting places as Eagle River, Eagle Harbor, Calumet and Laurium and along the old Military Road to Fort Wilkins, which had been formerly been an old dog sled path over which mail was carried.

The Porcupine Mountain State Park, where they picnicked on the high rocky banks of Lake Superior was one of the highlights of the trip. Upon reaching the highest point of the state in the Porcupines (2,023 ft.) two of the party climbed the foot trail to the Buck Escarpment and viewed the breathtaking sights of "Lake of the Clouds" and the tops of the forests below.

They saw many hikers coming in from trails over the park which has 59,000 acres of lakes, rivers, forests of virgin hemlocks, pines and hardwoods said to be the largest and finest east of the Rockies.

Seeing the beauty and wilderness of this part of Michigan for the first time made one think "This is God's Country." They drove along the north side of Lake Gogebic, the Upper Peninsula's largest lake, on their way to the Wakefield-Bessemer-Ironwood area where they crossed the border to Hurley, Wisconsin to spend the night.

Again they were on the famous Route US-2 starting the homeward trip through Iron River, Iron Mountain, Norway and Escanaba. Between Gladstone and the Big Bay De Noc area, they found several miles of road construction, four lanes.

That night they stayed at Mackinac, at the top of Lake Michigan and it rained all night. The next day they visited several points of interest in that area: Kitchiti-kipi (Big Spring) in the Palms Book State Park where they rode a raft across the Spring to look down

Campaign signs are real "mind benders"

We commend the four candidates for sheriff for their conscientious effort in removing campaign signs immediately after the election.

At noon Wednesday a quick tour of St Johns revealed all Hufnagel signs were gone and only a smattering of posters remained on the other three candidates.

Perhaps it's just a little thing but we feel the appearance of Clinton County's landscape is more attractive without the presence of signs which no longer mean anything. It's much like the person who leaves his Christmas lights up all summer long.

We now await the next wave of campaign signs that will attempt to make voters aware of a fact that is common knowledge. McGovern and Nixon are seeking the presidency. Kelley and Griffin are running for US Senator. Cederberg and Graves seek the 10th US Congressional seat.

It seems to us candidates for public office should be spending their campaign dollars on printed material which informs the voter of his stand on the issues. A huge billboard or a mass of smaller signs pasted all around the country are only an example of psychological salesmanship. Voters should be sold on a man's philosophy and qualifications—not because his name rings a bell in the citizen's mind when he's casting his ballot on election day.

PARTY POLITICS are undergoing notable changes as the presidential election year picks up tempo.

A Republicans for McGovern and Democrats for Nixon groups have been formed. It's difficult to determine who's for whom.

This could create problems after November when legislative bodies at the state and national levels are realigned to begin their efforts to solve public issues. Equal representation of varied viewpoints is essential but a cohesive party structure must be present before the legislative process can accomplish any headway toward formulating public programs.

It's no easy decision to withdraw from a political party a person has supported for years. However, it's important that persons of like mind work together on the same political team and only joining forces under the same party structure will effectively accomplish common goals.

When Mother Nature gets time off from margarine commercials, I'll bet she hangs around a golf course. When the weather is right, and the greenskeeper is ambitious there is nothing prettier.

Also, we were packing a sloshing thermos which dispensed cold gin and tonic at the bend of an elbow which, fortunately, wasn't

bugged up 35 years ago pitching baseballs.

"You know, I could really get to like golf," I told my partner as we drove along, sipping. "If I could just hire some husky kid to hit the ball for me."

That wouldn't be possible, of course. You start bringing kids along, the first thing you know they'd want to ride the cart and share the slosh. A guy could get arrested for contributing to delinquency and I already gave at the office.

But why couldn't a medical man with Dr. Godfrey's credentials look into golf? It might be better if he were a psychiatrist. There is no denying that golf drives people nuts, especially overweight, middle-aged businessmen.

Certainly the sanity of this nation's merchants and leaders is as important as the elbow of some little leaguer. How many worthwhile deals have gone sour because of tempers lost in the rough? How much commerce has been stalled because a duffer has become so deranged he still believes, after 30 years, that he can cure his slice if he just plays enough?

This would be a better world if a Dr. Godfrey would proclaim something like this: "No stockbroker of mine would ever swing at a golf ball. The possibilities of sustaining permanent mental restrictions of thought may definitely stem from taking a 9 on a par 3."

The solution is obviously automation. I envision a cannon-like contraption mounted on the front of the golf cart. It would shoot the balls directly where aimed and suck them back when necessary. There would be no reason to get out of the car except to get more ice.

Economic Stabilization

Questions and Answers



QUESTION: What kinds of evidence would a tenant find helpful when bringing his own legal action against a landlord for evicting him in retaliation for protesting an allegedly illegal rent increase?

ANSWER: Useful evidence to support an allegation of retaliatory eviction includes the following: 1) the tenant always paid rent on time, behaved properly, etc., and therefore, the landlord could have no reason for eviction other than retaliation;

2) when the tenant asked the landlord the reason for the notice of rent increase, the landlord refused to answer or was evasive;

3) if the landlord contends that the tenant was sometimes late in paying the rent or was sometimes noisy, the landlord had never complained about this to the tenant;

4) other tenants were late in paying rent for longer periods and more frequently than the tenant in question; or

5) the only points of consequence about which the tenant and landlord disagreed, or about which the tenant challenged the landlord, were the validity of the proposed illegal increase or the compliance of the rent increase notice with the form required by Economic Stabilization regulations.

ANSWER: Yes. Such pay adjustments are covered under the Fair Labor Standards Act and, thus, are exempt under Economic Stabilization regulations.

QUESTION: Can a person who has filed a complaint with the IRS about a price increase learn about the status of that complaint?

ANSWER: Yes. In addition to general information on the Economic Stabilization Program, the following information is available to a person who has filed a complaint or has specific knowledge of a complaint:

1) that a case is still under investigation;

2) that no violation has been found as the result of an investigation and an explanation of the general reasons for the finding of "no violation"; and

3) that a case has been investigated and no further action is contemplated.

For more information on Phase II disclosure policy, write your Internal Revenue district office and ask for a free copy of Publication S-3035, "Disclosure of Information."

QUESTION: If an employee has increased duties and responsibilities which are not considered a promotion, may he receive a pay raise without regard to the 5.5 percent wage and salary standard?

ANSWER: No. All wage and salary increases are subject to the 5.5 percent standard unless specifically exempted or excepted. Bona fide promotions have been exempted. However, increased duties and responsibilities which do not constitute an actual promotion are not exempt. Therefore, such increases are subject to the 5.5 percent standard.

QUESTION: I am leasing from the State residential property consisting of ten units. Is the rent I am charged subject to controls?

ANSWER: Rent adjustments by state or local governments are exempt from Phase II controls. However, a sublease agreement between you and a subsequent tenant would be controlled by the rent regulations.



The song of Songs

By REV. HUGH BANNINGA

I have just finished rereading a beautiful love story. It was a story of a young man and woman so much in love that they were oblivious to everything and everyone around them. They had no thought for anything but each other. It was an exclusive story—personal, intimate and private. In my estimation it was one of the most beautiful love stories I have ever read.

Not I know you are just dying to know what the story is, aren't you? Well, I won't keep you in suspense any longer. The story can be found in the Old Testament under the heading of "The Song of Solomon." It is also known by the title "The Song of Songs."

The Song of Songs is written in the beautiful language of love. Bernard of Clairvaux, a saint and a monk who wrote 86 sermons on the Song of Songs summed up its content when he wrote, "The Song of Songs is not a cry from the mouth, but the gladness of the heart; not the sounding of the lips, but the impulse and emotion of joys within; not a concert of words, but of wills moving in harmony."

To get you interested in reading the whole story listen to these selected passages. They will give you an idea of the beauty of this Old Testament writing.

In chapter 1 the young woman says, "O that you would kiss me with the kisses

of your mouth! For your love is better than wine, your anointing oils are fragrant, your name is oil poured out . . ."

In chapter 2 the young lady says, "O that his left hand were under my head and that his right hand embraced me!" A little later she says, "The voice of my beloved! Behold, he comes leaping upon the mountains, bounding over the hills. My beloved is like a gazelle or a young stag. Behold, there he stands behind our wall, gazing in at the windows, looking through the lattice. . ."

In the same chapter she says, "O my dove, in the clefts of the rock, in the covert of the cliff, let me see your face, let me hear your voice, for your voice is sweet and your face is comely."

In chapters 4 and 5 see how the lovers describe each other. The young man says, "Behold, you are beautiful, my love, behold, you are beautiful! Your eyes are doves behind your veil. Your hair is like a flock of goats, moving down the slopes of Gilead. Your teeth are like a flock of shorn ewes that have come up from the washing. . . Your lips are like a scarlet thread and your mouth is lovely. Your cheeks are like halves of a pomegranate behind your veil. Your neck is like the tower of David, built for an arsenal. . . Your two breasts are like two fawns, twins of a gazelle that

feed among the lilies."

The young lady sees her young man like this—"My beloved is all radiant and ruddy, distinguished among ten thousand. His head is the finest gold; his locks are wavy, black as a raven. His eyes are like doves beside springs of water, bathed in milk, fittly set. His cheeks are like beds of spices, yielding fragrance. His lips are like lilies, distilling liquid myrrh. His arms are rounded gold, set with jewels. His body is ivory work, encrusted with sapphires. His legs are alabaster columns, set upon bases of gold. His appearance is like Lebanon, choice as the cedars. His speech is most sweet and he is altogether desirable."

The theme here is unmistakably love. The love of a man and woman for each other. Read the entire 8 chapters of the Song of Solomon and next week we'll comment on it.

The Safety Valve

Answers your questions about every day traffic-related problems. Write Michigan Traffic Safety Information Council, c/o Michigan State Safety Commission, Department of State Police, East Lansing, Michigan 48823. The "Safety Valve" will try to answer all inquiries. However, not all will be printed.

QUESTION: What is the advantage of a roof rack on top of a car to pack all the vacation luggage and trappings when we travel?

ANSWER: It helps to spread the weight of the load more evenly on all four tires. When all your gear is stowed in the rear trunk - and the back seat is loaded with passengers, too, the extra weight lowers the back of the car and the decreased weight in front reduces the friction of the front tires on the roadway. This in turn has a deterrent effect on the steerability of the car and can also produce hydroplaning conditions at lower speeds than normal.

This can be partly compensated for by putting more air in the rear tires than in the front ones - to help level off the car.

QUESTION: With all the push for a mandatory seat belt use law, statewide and nationwide, is any consideration being given to those people for whom their use might prove harmful? M M M, Saginaw

ANSWER: You bet. The Michigan State Safety Commission members are giving extensive consideration to all the variables that a mandatory law might have to include.

Nationally, the National Committee on Uniform

Traffic Laws and Ordinances, in their comments on the proposed mandatory law, are taking many exceptions under advisement: such as, persons being transported in a prone position; persons who are very young or very short; or even persons in seating positions that do not have belts, to name a few.

QUESTION: Those fellows at road construction and repair sites on highways wearing checkered black and orange vests save a lot of accidents and cool a lot of tempers by protecting us and directing traffic. Do they have to have special training, or is it just part of a roadbuilder's role? T K, Okemos

ANSWER: Flagmen on road construction and repair jobs seldom have any formal training sessions on the etiquette of a flagman; however, State men do receive limited instructions. It doesn't take too long to figure out the best way to move traffic safely through the work area because of the need for self preservation.

Clinton kids get a 'head start' again

ST JOHNS--Pre-schoolers wearing graduation caps and carrying diplomas waved good-bye to teachers and aides as they boarded school buses to return home to await the opening of school in September when their

Head Start program closed Friday after a seven week session.

The 143 pre-kindergarten children attended Head Start classes in Ovid, Elsie, Fowler, Pewamo, Bath, St Johns and DeWitt. There

were 9 classrooms and sessions each day from 9 am to 12:30 pm.

Head Start's main task is to bridge the gap for the pre-kindergarten child so he would become familiar with school routine, teachers, and gain some fundamental knowledge to help him when he enters school in September.

EACH YEAR ALMOST a million underprivileged children enter school for the first time. Most of their more affluent classmates face the challenge with some assurance... a new dress or shirt, a series of successful experiences in a child's world--but many children bring with them a lack of self confidence, a mistrust of adults, the lack of ability to play and work in small groups, a deep fear of a new experience, plus the fear of being away from home and mother for the first time.

Too often the first school experience is the beginning of a familiar pattern. The child loses his will to progress and week by week falls more behind until eventually he becomes a drop-out.

Head Start is designed to help such a child in his home, school, and community. It is so much more than just a pre-school experience. It is designed to reach the whole child and his family so he will not become a drop-out.

THE PROGRAM in Head Start is especially rich in first hand experiences, a sequence of experiences that builds a sound foundation for

later learning. The program stressed language development and verbal communication. The activities were developmental in nature with varied community and school experiences that will better enable each child to compete successfully with his friends when he enters kindergarten in the fall. A basic curriculum was followed so each child was exposed and gained the necessary knowledge of fundamentals he needs for kindergarten.

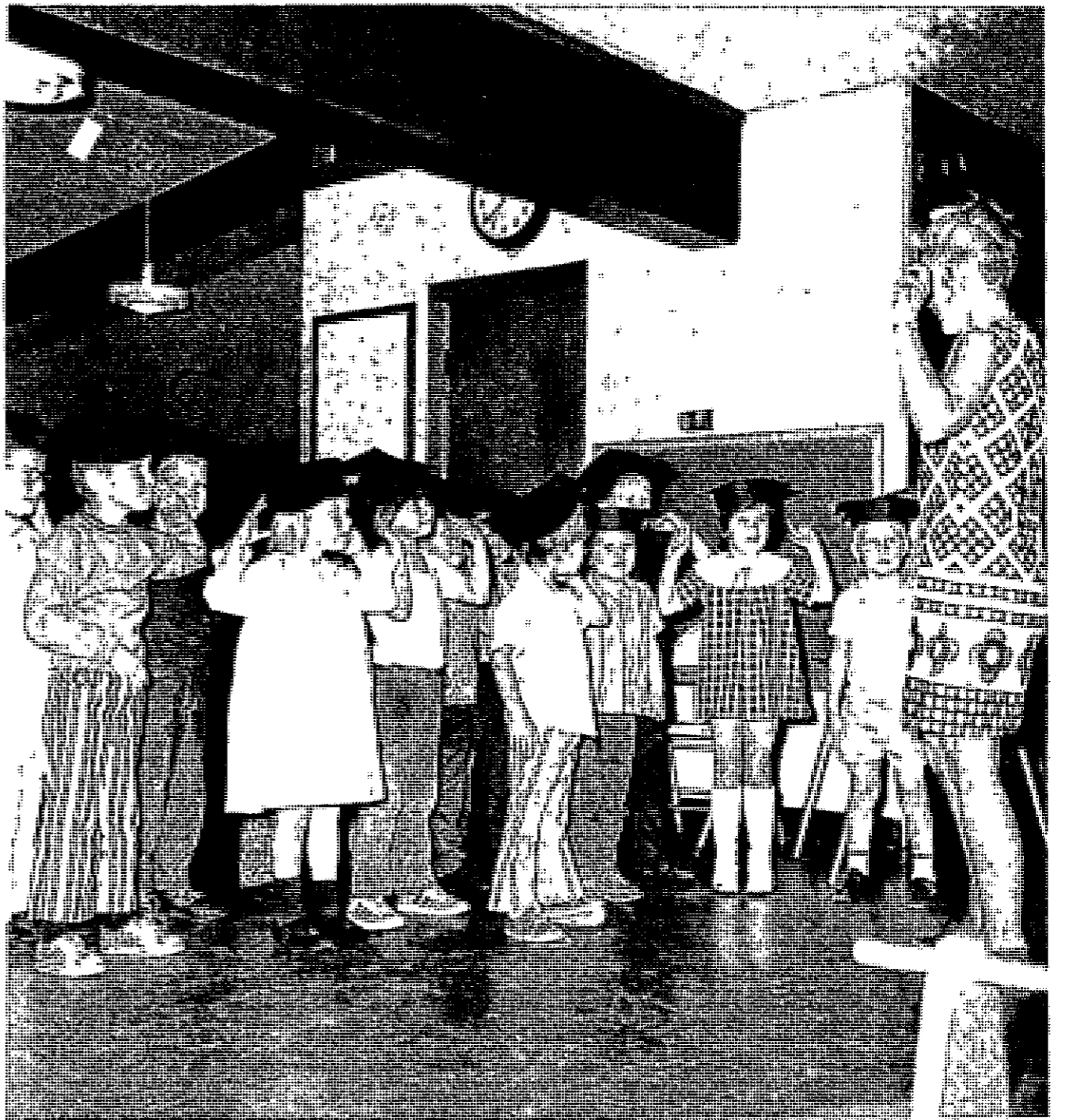
Children were given first-hand experiences in meeting with community helpers, making field trips to visit the bakery, city market, the postoffice, farms, fire station, airport, zoo, local gardens, and to check the progress of a newly constructed home. Exology was stressed and these five-year-old youngsters grasped the suggestions offered and put their ideas to work. Buckets of broken glass were picked up from various playgrounds.

Head Start not only gives a cultural boost but also gives corrective medical, vision, audiometer, speech, and dental, and psychological care. Each child was given the opportunity to visit the dentist and was given a dental evaluation. The parent was sent a copy of the evaluation so he could make a dental appointment with his own family dentist and start the corrective work. Fifty-three of the children visiting the dentist received congratulations for having no cavities.

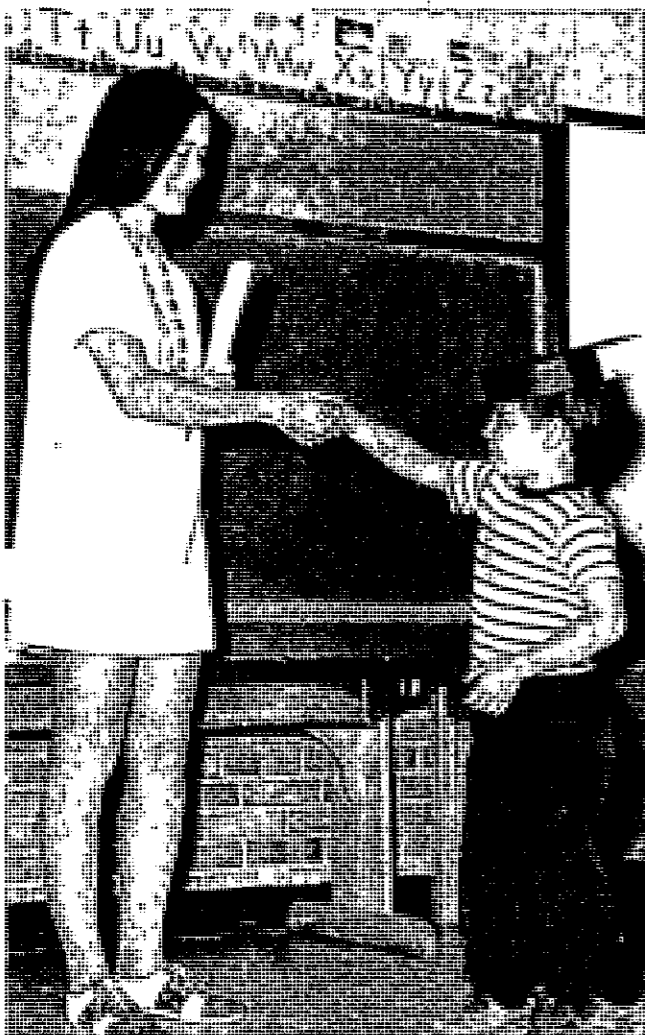
All children in the program had physical examinations by their family physicians. Head Start offers follow-up in medical care as well as in any other medical area. Four students will receive adenoid and tonsillectomy after classes close in August.

Vision and audiometer tests were given to the students by technicians, Mrs Marceda Harper and Mrs Dorothy Sauber. As a result 25 children are receiving treatment from medical specialists.

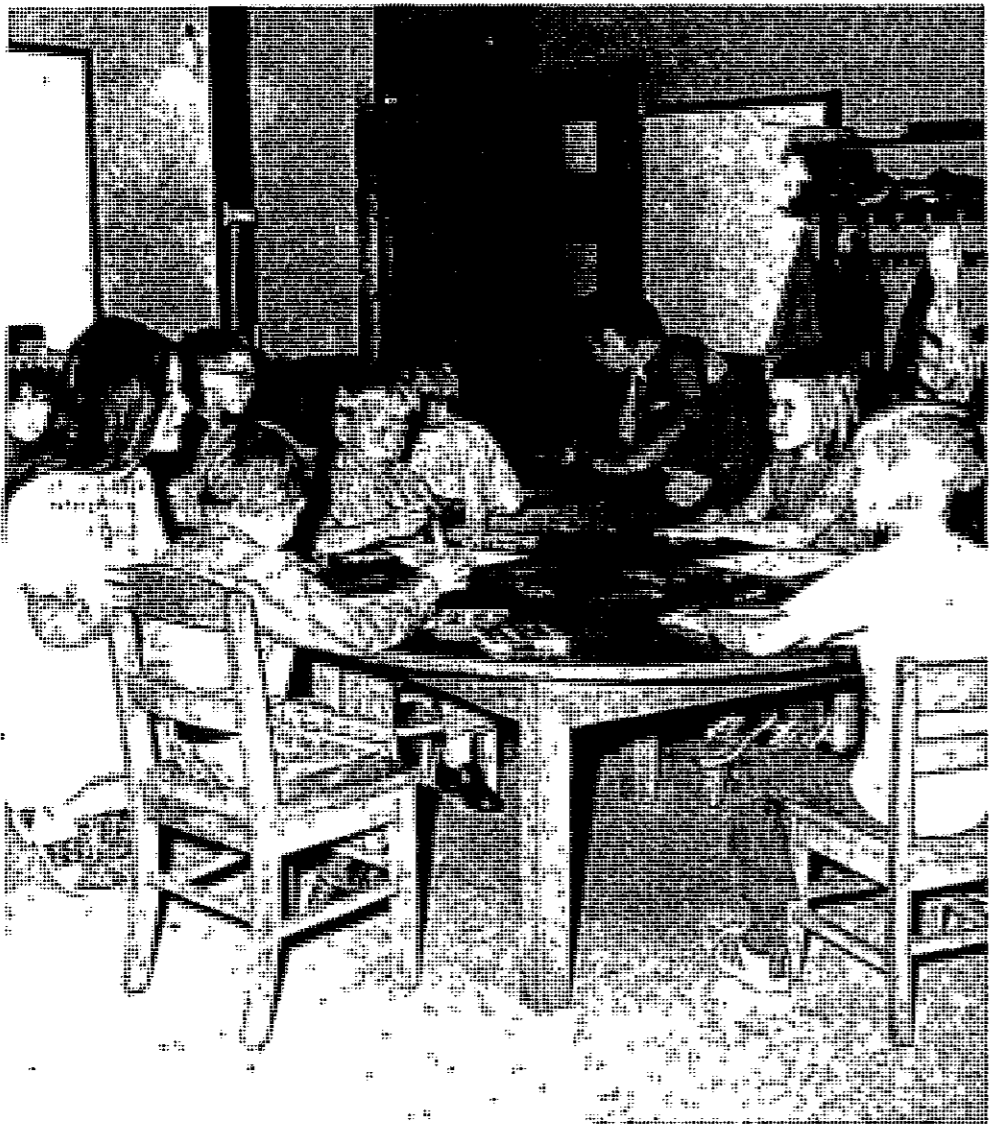
For each child in the program the school will receive a complete permanent health record and the child's Head Start achievement record. All physical immunizations were brought up to date and carefully checked by Mrs Gertrude Buehler, Head Start nurse. These forms

when totally completed will meet the kindergarten physical entrance required by the state law.

Parent-teacher conferences were scheduled and held with 96.4% of the parents appearing for the conferences.

Mrs Gay Wood, diagnostician and mental health specialist, gave tests to various children with special learning problems. Psychological evaluations were made with resulting educational recommendations. Mrs Weed conferred with many parents.

Mrs Linda Dickens, speech correctionist, assisted

greatly in the program by working with the child in a class and by giving the parent advice and suggestions for helping the child when he is away from the classroom. Speech class sessions were held in each center.

Parental involvement was another important part of Head Start. Centers had one or two mother volunteers daily in each classroom. Teen-age, brothers, and sisters often aided in the program. Workshops for the mothers were held so the mothers would feel more secure and be of utmost help in the classroom. Many parents accompanied the teachers and

students on their field trips. Classroom visitations by the parent was another phase of parent involvement. Group meeting consisting of guest speakers, films, discussion groups were also held for the parents. Every effort was made to give the parent some beneficial help in the area of his problem and interest. Elaine Cincala from the Clinton County extension office gave a lecture and demonstration of homemade toys that develop eye and muscle coordination.

Two social workers, Mrs Ruth Wesner and Mrs Ella Mae Beck worked with the parents, teachers, and children by making home

calls, scheduling volunteer services and helping to arrange medical and dental appointments.

A noon meal was served by experienced cooks, who planned the menus. A midmorning snack of juice, cereal, fruit, and a cracker was served. Good eating habits were stressed. Following the noon meal a tooth brushing program was carried on. The cooks and cook aides in the program were Mrs Alice Miller, Mrs Donald Arens, Mrs Irene Mead, Mrs Eileen Trer-weller, Mrs Gertrude Bast, Mrs Richard Kerr, Mrs Josephine Janz, Mrs

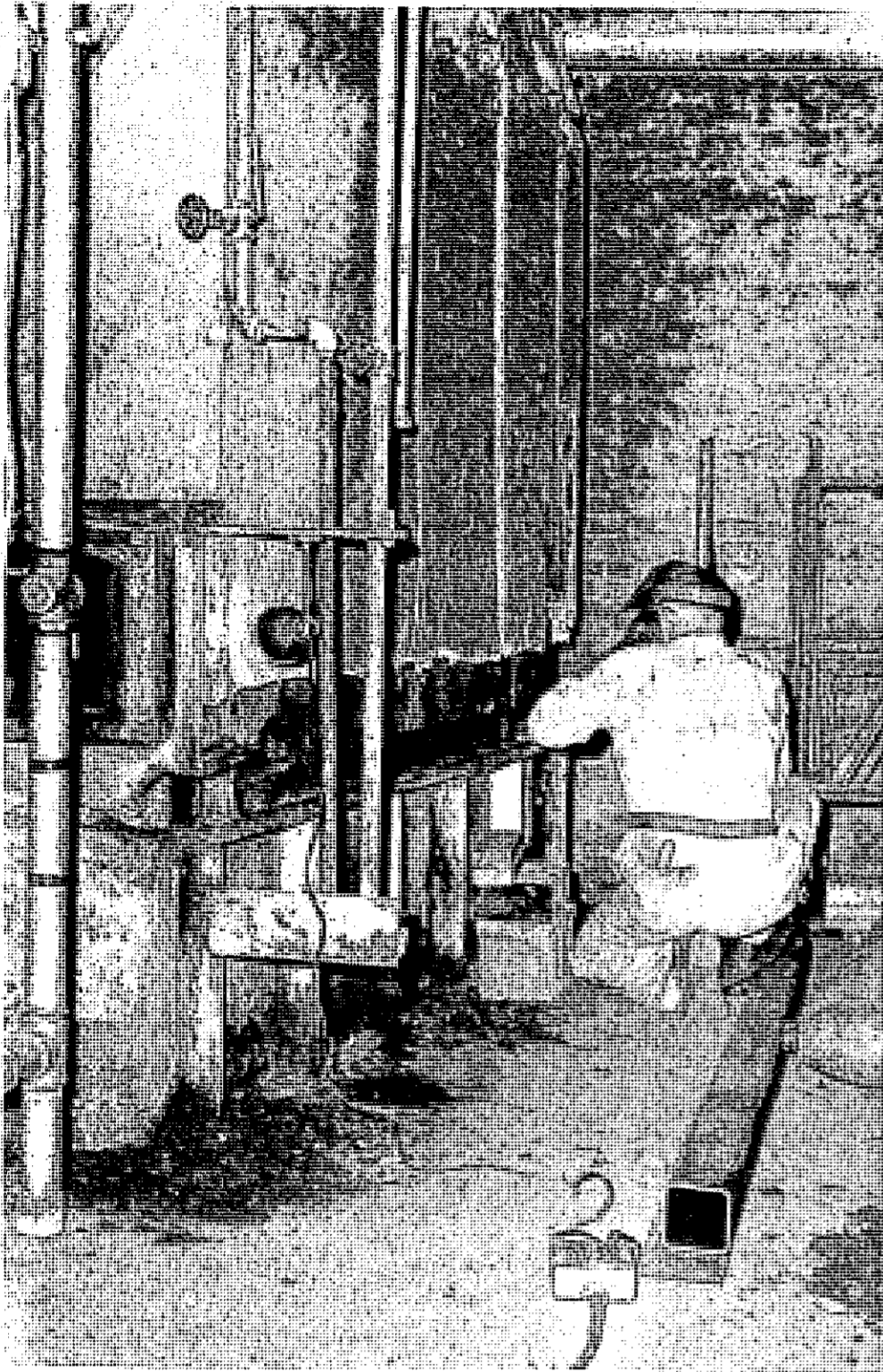

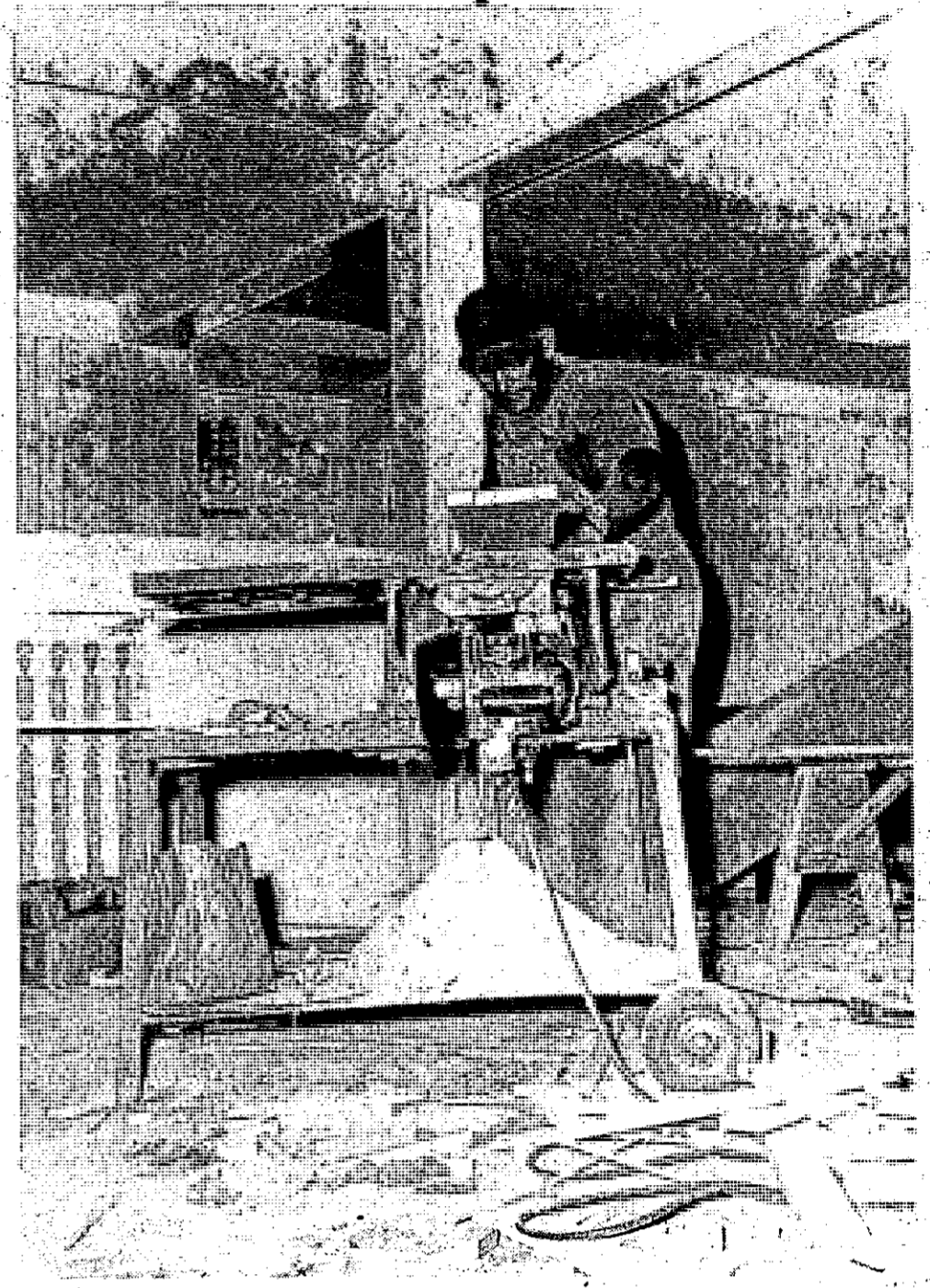

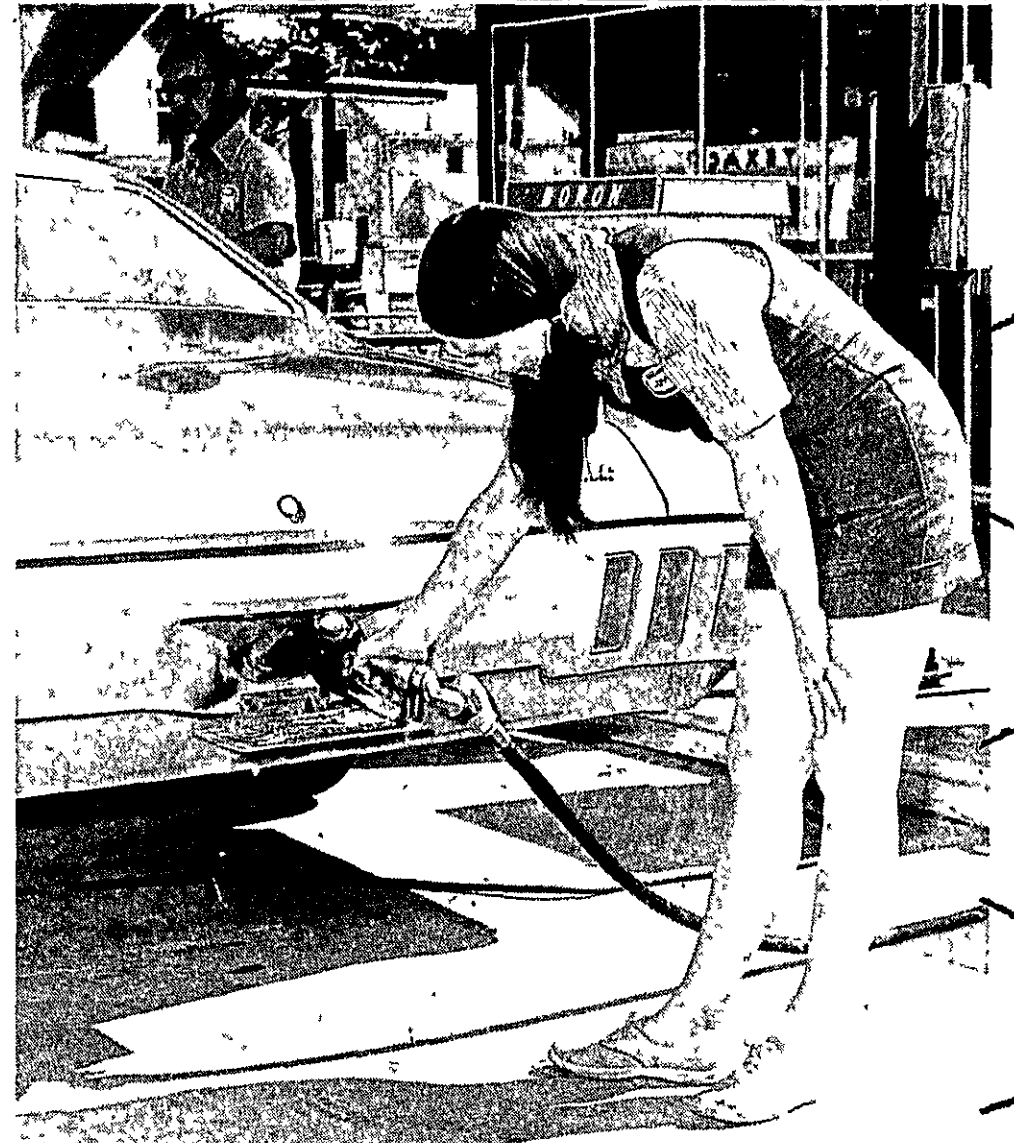
It took a year before anyone here would take her on as an employee. Her boss, Clyde Melton, 803 E Sturgis, says he likes having Judy around.

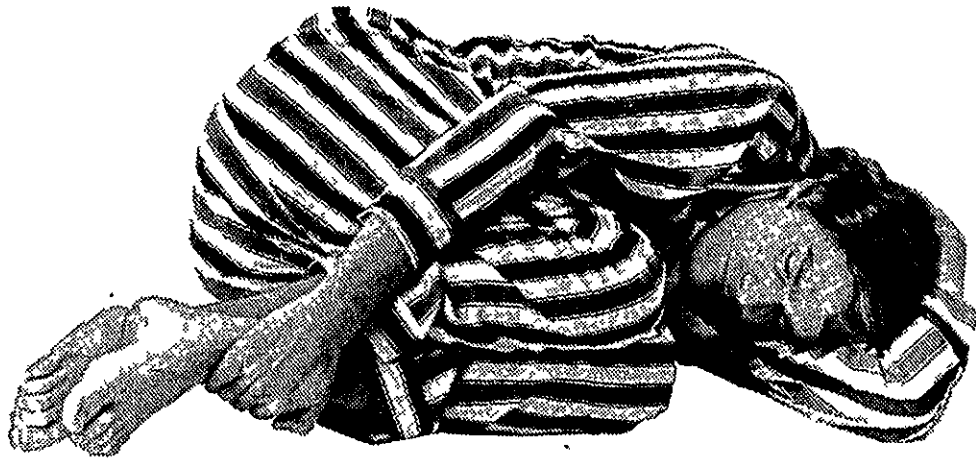

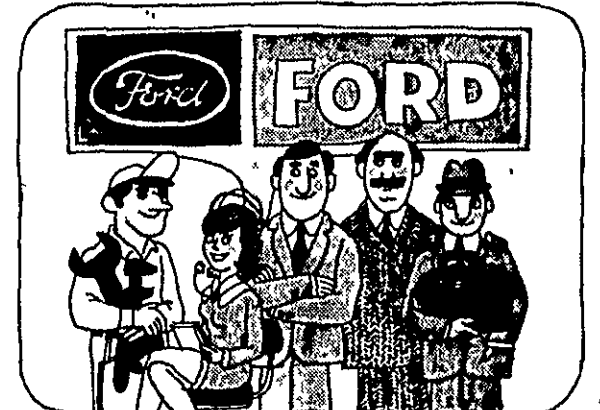

St. Johns firm studies environmental problems

ST JOHNS - Escher Technology Associates of St Johns recently announced its accomplishments in the field of technological consulting in the areas of energy production and environmental improvement.

The firm, operated here by local resident William J.D. Escher, will have been in existence for 2 years this November.

Its most recent award of a contract to build a scale model for an exhibit series beginning in the Fall by the Institute of Gas Technology of Chicago marks the first expansion of ETA services beyond consultation. This model will illustrate the operation of a possible future clean-fuel hydrogen energy distribution system. Such a system might fuel industrial, residential and commercial, transportation, and the electrical utility sectors of our economy without dependence on imported or domestic fossil fuels which are in increasingly short supply.

The model, and a automatic "slide/sound show" also being prepared by the Company, will be displayed to executives and technical personnel of the nation's gas industry in meeting in Cincinnati and Chicago in October and November, respectively.

Offering the technical advances of the aerospace industry for application to energy, transportation, and environmental problem areas here on earth, ETA has been able to expand its number of clients considerably over a year ago.

Escher explained that the areas of energy production and environmental improvement are so strongly intertwined together that to "work on one to the exclusion of the other is simply not feasible in the broader picture."

Escher Technology Associates has been actively consulting on a national basis since its inception late in 1970. Clients have included Federal Government agencies, not-for-profit research institutes, and private companies. The firm has laid plans for two separate projects with universities, which if supported as proposed to the Federal Government, will require a significant expansion of the firm's staff and capabilities.

ETA has submitted a joint proposal to the National Science Foundation in Washington, for the development of a research /demonstration non-polluting automotive vehicle based on hydrogen-oxygen technology. "The only exhaust will be pure water," Escher notes in anticipation of this project with MSU's College of Engineering.

Involvement with the University of Hawaii arose with the joint proposal to the Department of Commerce's Office of Sea Grant for harnessing solar energy at sea.

The latter project derived from the engineering proposal put forward earlier at the annual meeting of the American Chemical Society in Boston this April which ETA calls "Helios-Poseidon". Named after the Greek gods of the sun and the sea, Helios-Poseidon has received mention in a half dozen of the nation's technical and scientific publications since it was introduced by Escher.

Escher will be delivering another technical paper on the non-polluting automotive power systems this September in San Diego. The system to be investigated with MSU will be discussed at this time, and the favorable effect on the nation's energy and environmental crises of such an approach underscored. In this effort, ETA is staying in touch with the automobile manufacturers in Detroit and the Environmental Protection Agency offices in Ann Arbor.

Another type of accomplishment that Escher noted was that announced recently by the Commonwealth Edison Company of Chicago, the nation's second largest investor-owned electrical utility. A 1.6 million dollar effort to demonstrate clean electrical energy production on a pilot scale will be carried out with the firm's initial client, an aerospace company in California. ETA actively worked on the initiation of this promising program earlier.

"The project, if successful, will be an impressive demonstration of how advanced aerospace technology can improve our situation here on earth," Escher noted.

An ounce of prevention

Suicide is never a pleasant subject to talk about, but a very important one if we want to save some of the people who needlessly die every year from this not uncommon cause.

If it creates some discomfort for you to have this discussed in a family newspaper, please remember that we could be reaching, this very moment, somebody who may be contemplating self-destruction. And, if we only help save one productive human life, a little distress is really a very small price to pay.

SUICIDE IN RURAL AREAS

One of the myths in this field is that people in rural and semi-rural areas tend to have less mental health problems, including self-destructive behavior. What happens is that in sparsely populated areas, it is more difficult to identify the problems, but they are there. What makes suicide more tragic as a problem is that so often it could be prevented.

The self-destructive urge comes on in spurts, and if the person can be protected from it, even for a fairly short period of time, he will be able to regain self-control, and a useful existence is preserved.

In rural areas, the affected people may be perhaps more reluctant to accept help, or even recognize the situation as very serious when they are severely unhappy or depressed.

DENIAL OF THE PROBLEM

At a recent discussion in one of our centers, a psychiatrist mentioned that he had examined a young man who had shot himself. Despite the obvious self-destructive nature of the wound, and the fact that he had openly threatened to end his life, the boy steadfastly denied to the physician that he had tried to kill himself.

In the turmoil of guilt and remorse which involves the victim's relatives after a serious attempt of this type, it is no wonder that, for awhile, the family was not sure which way to go. In a rather pathetic way, the mother, who was very distressed, asked the psychiatrist, "Do you think he was really trying to hurt himself?"

Another man I saw many years ago was extremely lucky. After a heated argument with a close relative, he put a gun to his temple, and pulled the trigger. The bullet went into his head, without seriously damaging his brain—an almost incredible event. By the time I was able to talk to him, at his physician's request, he had developed a highly unlikely explanation about "accidental" shooting.

In a more recent case, a man admitted to the hospital after a serious overdose of barbiturates almost convinced his doctor that he had accidentally poisoned himself. As the physician came out of the room,

however, the patient's concerned wife handed him a suicide note written by her husband.

Why is it so hard, sometimes, to admit to suicidal intent?

People in these circumstances feel very ashamed, and they figure nobody will really understand how distressed they were. They may even feel that nobody else in the world ever gets depressed to that point, or has suicidal thoughts.

THE OUNCE OF PREVENTION

By far, most people who ever attempt suicide communicate their intention to somebody else. Among other things, the suicidal act is a cry for help.

There are, however, small numbers of people who will not give any warning, or, if they do attempt suicide, will later deny that they had any such intention.

It is very important, therefore, that we give people in distress respect and consideration; and that we show, in any way possible, that we care about them, and that we are willing to help.

The home economist

With the arrival of the canning season a refresher on cautions and methods of preserving is important.

If you are not using a pressure canner to process low-acid vegetables, you are playing with poison. A low-acid vegetable is any vegetable besides tomatoes.

The hot water bath method will not kill the botulism bacteria. No matter how long you leave jars of food in a hot water bath, they will never get hotter than the boiling point of water and that just isn't hot enough. Remember you cannot taste the botulism bacteria.

A pressure canner raises the temperature to 240 degrees F, this will kill any of the dangerous organisms that might be present.

The poison - botulism - is the rarest and most deadly form of food poisoning. And the foods that present the greatest risk of botulism are inadequately or improperly processed, home-canned, low-acid vegetables.

Tomatoes and fruits are acidic, and the botulism bacteria can't grow in an acid environment.

Processing "low-acid tomatoes" can also make some problem. Dr Bedford, Food Science Professor at MSU, suggests the following processes:

1. Hot pack then pressure cook pints for 10 minutes, and quarts for 15 minutes at 5 lbs pressure.
2. Hot pack then process in a hot water bath for 20 minutes.

These new low-acid tomatoes have given quite a

few people problems when canning.

Since botulism does not grow in an acid environment, the spoilage is not botulism. It is a flat-sour spoilage.

OTHER CANNING TIPS: Some older recipes specify cane sugar. . . but you can use beet sugar with the same good results. And the beet sugar will probably cost a few cents less.

Granulated salt, sometimes called sack or bag salt, is better than table salt for pickles. Table salt contains chemicals that prevent lumping and is often iodized. . . two conditions that may cause cloudiness and darkening of the brine.

Finally, it's OK to use brown cider vinegar when canning pickles, some even prefer it because of its flavor and aroma, but the white vinegar gives a clearer brine and better color to the pickles.

Ag in Action

While the Secretary of Agriculture is proudly proclaiming that American farm exports have reached a new record high in the past year, the Administration announced action to restrict the export of US cattle hides.

The recent action of restricting exports of cattle hides will seriously reduce farmers' income opportunities and is not in accord with the nation's efforts to increase exports, according to William J. Kuhfuss, president of the American Farm Bureau Federation, the nation's largest farm organization.

The intention of the government in restricting hide exports is to force down the price of hides available to domestic tanners and shoe manufacturers. Such action is not expected to have much impact on the retail price of shoes since hide price is an exceedingly small factor in the overall cost of a pair of shoes.

The importance of farm exports to the nation's balance of payments is seen in the fact that an increase in our farm exports for the fiscal year ended June 30 partially offset a large US trade deficit in non-farm products.

Farm exports for the fiscal year were \$2 billion larger than agricultural imports. This favorable farm trade balance is the highest in five years. The accomplishment in farm trade held the nation's overall balance of trade to a \$5.1 billion deficit, the largest in history.

Government officials have also expressed concern over beef prices and have rightly pointed out that one reason for higher meat prices is rising consumer demand. The best way to satisfy demand is to increase production. But how do export controls on hides encourage farmers to produce more cattle?

While export controls have been initiated in an effort to reduce shoe prices, it is farmers' income opportunity which will decline, not shoe prices.

State ASC sets grain bin auction

ELWELL—Arthur Rowley, chairman of the Michigan State Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, announced another public auction sale of government-owned grain bins and equipment in Michigan.

Thursday Aug 24, 1972 starting at 12:30 pm 50 round bins with 3250-bushel capacity each will be offered for sale by public auction. Pan and tube assemblies for grain aeration will be included with each bin. Also included at this sale will be several miscellaneous items such as electrical equipment, office fans, etc. This sale will be held at the Elwell Binsite Gratiot County located at the northeast village limits of Elwell and details of the sale may be obtained by contacting the Gratiot County ASCS Office, 125 S Maple, Ithaca, phone - 517-875-3900 or by contacting the nearest county ASCS office.

EACH PURCHASER of a bin will be required to certify that the bin will be used in connection with the storage or handling of agricultural commodities or, if purchased by a nonprofit agency or organization, an authorized official must

certify the bin will be used for the purpose of such agency or organization.

Farmers may finance the purchase of these bins through the Farm Storage Facility Loan Program provided they meet eligibility requirements; however, the prospective purchaser must bring a memorandum from his home county ASCS office so

stating his eligibility. Empty grain bins at binsites in Clinton County will again be offered for rent to farmers at a rate of 1 cent per bushel per month for storage of grain this fall.

Farmers interested in purchasing or renting storage space through the ASCS programs should contact their local county ASCS office for details.
