## P-W sets special election

Citizens of Pewamo-Westphalia School District will again be asked to approve 18.5 mills for operating purposes for the 1976-77 school year. A special election will be held Aug. 23.

The proposal was defeated at the annual election in June by 17 votes. The 18.5 mills represents an increase of 2 mills over the 18.5 mills the district levied last year.

Officials hope to reduce the levy for debt retirement by .6 of a mill, so the total increase will be 1.4 mills.

## Still no leads in girls' deaths

**BATH TWP.** - After discovering the second body last Wednesday of the two girls missing from a Bath Township park, police agencies still have no strong leads to who murdered the Charlotte teenagers.

Both girls were reported missing June 13 following a camping weekend at Friggoris Park in Bath Township.

At that time, the camping gear used by the girls was discovered, but a massive search was unable to locate Stacie Rost, 16, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Francis Eugene Rost of Charlotte, and Maureen Nichols, 17, daughter of Patricia Nichols of Charlotte.

Participating in the initial search were Bath Twp. Police and firemen, Clinton County Sheriff's Dept., Lansing Police, State Police and tracking dog, all police departments in Clinton County, Ingham County Parks Police, fire departments from Bath Twp., DeWitt Twp., City of DeWitt and Maple Rapids, a group of citizen band radio operators, RedCross of Lansing and St. Johns and a group of concerned citizens.

Eighteen days after the initial search, the body of Maureen Nichols was discovered June 28.

It wasn't until last Wednesday, Aug. 11, that the body of the second girl, Stacie Rost, was discovered.

Her decomposed body was found in a wooded lot on a farm owned by Paul Risk at 11299 Hunter Rd., about four miles southeast of where the Nichols girl body was found.

Both of the missing girls were identified through dental records.

Sgt. Lynn Knuth, conducting the investigation out of Bath Twp., said police have been unable to come up with any good clues as to the possible identity of the person or persons who murdered the girls.

He said that, following the discovery of the body of the Nichols girl, about 100

tips were received, but none proved to help in the investigation.

Police continue their search for information that could lead to a suspect and Sgt. Knuth said there is a possibility that someone might know who actually killed the girls, but is afraid to provide information to the police.

He said information from such a person will be taken in confidence either in person, by telephone or by mail.

In the meantime, police have checked leads in other states, but, once again, no

concrete clues have been found.

Currently conducting the investigation are the Bath Twp. Police Dept., Clinton County Sheriff's Dept. and the Michigan State Police.

Rewards have been established in Charlotte and Bath Twp in hopes of providing leads to the identity of the person or persons involved in the crime. See related story.

## Offer rewards for information

**BATH TWP.** - The unsolved murder of two Charlotte girls in Bath Township has prompted citizens of the township to establish a reward fund in an attempt to secure the identity and apprehension of the person or persons who committed the crime.

A group of citizens approached June Burnett, Bath Township Clerk, to determine if a reward fund could be established.

She took the request to the Township Board and members of the board agreed that the township office could be the collecting agent and administrator of such a fund.

Township officials then met with detectives investigating the case to establish a reward fund.

The reward will be awarded to anyone providing information leading to the identity, apprehension and conviction of the girls' murderer.

Determination of who will receive the reward will be made by the Clinton County prosecutor, local law

enforcement agencies and a committee of Carl Crofts, Bath Township Board member; June Burnett and Carol Case, township resident.

Money in the reward fund will be kept until October, 1978. If it is not used by that date, it will, upon request, be refunded to those donating \$10 or more with a receipt.

Unreturned money will go to the township public library fund.

Money began coming in last Thursday for the fund with more money being sought. To date, less than \$300 has been received at the township offices.

Donors are asked to send contributions to Bath Township Hall, 14480 Webster Road, 48808. Checks should be made to the order of Bath Township Reward Fund.

A separate bank account has been established for the reward fund.

Mrs. Burnett said it is hoped that area businesses and organizations will provide canisters to help in the collection.

## Youth program offers learning, earning experience

For the 3rd year, St. Johns Junior Senior High School students have had the opportunity to participate in a "learn and earn" program funded by the Youth Employment Act.

The program is designed to help students learn job skills, good work habits, career opportunities and earn money at the same time.

This summer, 23 students participated, working 30 hours a week, in a governmental agency.

The St. Johns community benefitted from the hours of service in the city park, water department, cemetery, courthouse and throughout the school system.

Students worked as switchboard operators, secretaries, groundskeepers, painters, cleaning helpers, clerks and custodial assistants.

Wherever possible, students were placed in a one-to-one relationship with adult supervisors.

Participants are selected for the program based on strict guidelines from the federal government including family size, financial resources, source of family support and financial need.

Loren Perry coordinated the screening, placement and counseling of the students as well as working on the

job with the participants. Dick Warren from the Lansing School System, which administers the program, is the liaison person between St. Johns and the funding agency.

The experience is close as possible to actual employment participants will be involved with in adult life - including the possibility of being fired as four were who could not learn good work habits.

The program continues during the school year when it is hoped five to 7 students will be able to participate about 15 hours a week.

## Ox Roast fills streets of DeWitt Saturday

An art show, sponsored by Mrs. Faye Hansen of the Library Association will be held in the Memorial Building from 11 a.m. until 7 p.m.

Square dancing on horseback will be presented by Bath Equestrian at 12:30 p.m.

A pony pulling contest is sponsored by the Clinton County Pony Pulling Association and will be held from 1-4 p.m. at McGuire Park.

The public is invited to participate as well as watch when the garden tractor pull gets underway at 4 p.m. at the city Dept. of Public Works.

Square dancing will be demonstrated at 7:30 at the parking lot between the VFW Hall and the Masonic Lodge, continuing in the Memorial Building. Square dancing continues in the Memorial Building following the demonstration.

A grand finale will be held from 11 p.m. until 11:20 with a fireworks display by the bridge at Riverside Park.

Drawing prizes will be awarded from 3 p.m. until 10 p.m.

## County records protected in tunnels of gypsum mine

**ST. JOHNS** - Irreplaceable Clinton County microfilm records are being stored 85 feet underground in a former gypsum mine where six miles of tunnels have been converted into a storage area.

Clinton County register of deeds, Bonnie Wickerham has deposited 405 rolls of 35 MM microfilm records in the special vault of Underground Security Company in Grand Rapids.

Ernest Carter, Clinton County clerk also was there to inspect the facilities for his security microfilm when he starts microfilming in the near future. Clinton County probate judge Timothy M. Green already has his security microfilm records deposited in the vault of underground Security Company.

The original microfilm is in the register of deeds office for daily work, and the duplicate security microfilm records are stored in steel file cabinets in the mine. This gives the county the finest and proper security, and insures the safekeeping of these irreplaceable records from any type of disaster such as fire, tornadoes, explosions, riots, strikes, atomic attacks, etc.

The vault located 10 stories down under solid rock has special controlled humidity and temperature and is owned by Underground Security Company. The special vault provides a controlled temperature of 72 degrees, and humidity of 42 percent. This not

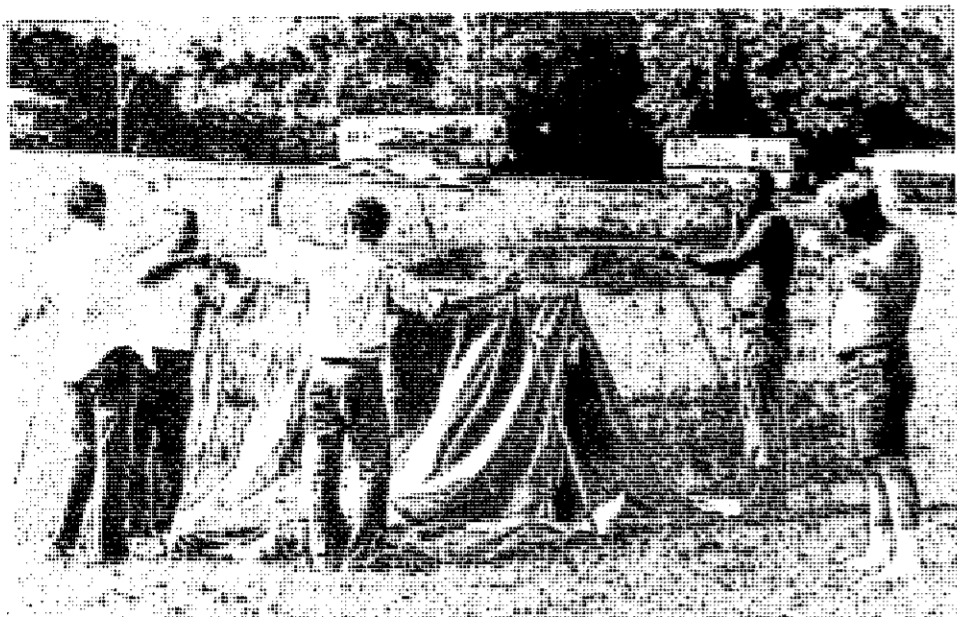
only meets the State of Michigan Code, but also the requirements set forth by the American Standard Association and the U.S. Bureau of Standards for the proper storage conditions for microfilm. The automatic burglar alarm system will notify the local Police Headquarters in case of any problems, and patrol cars respond to the area in from 2 to 3 minutes.

There are now 29 counties, many municipalities, school districts, colleges and corporations using Underground Security Company facilities for the safekeeping of their irreplaceable records. Other counties in this area using the vault include Ionia, Shiawassee, Montcalm, Gratiot, Livingston, and Genesee.



Bonnie Wickerham, register of deeds, and Ernest Carter, county clerk, with records stored in gypsum mine.

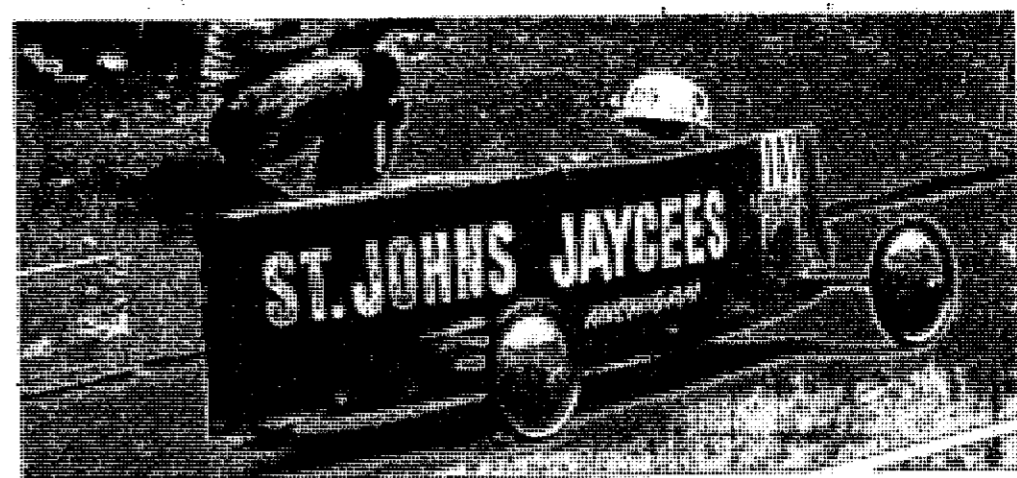

Clinton County Derby Champ Harry Todosciuk heads down the hill at Akron's Derby Downs.

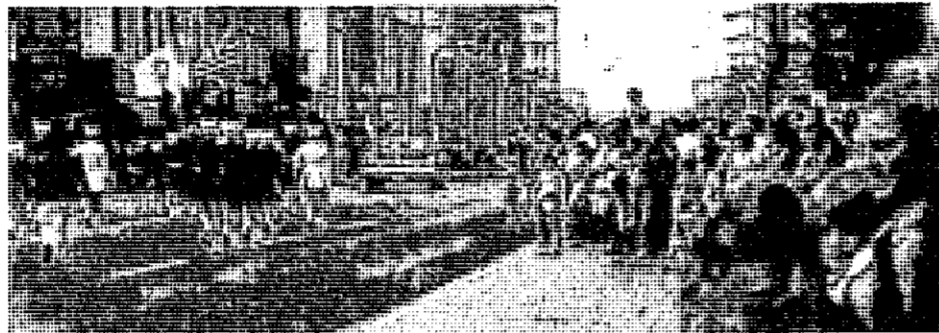


After the camping weekend for 20 boys and girls who won trips to Akron came the taking down of the camp and packing for the trip home.

### New ticket prices for CMAC

New ticket prices have been approved for athletic events in the Central Michigan Athletic Conference (CMAC). The proposal was moved by Potterville and seconded by Fowler and sets the following prices: football, basketball, girls' basketball and wrestling - \$1.50 for adults and \$1 for students.

Students who have brothers or sisters in high school may come in at any of the times any of them are scheduled to appear.

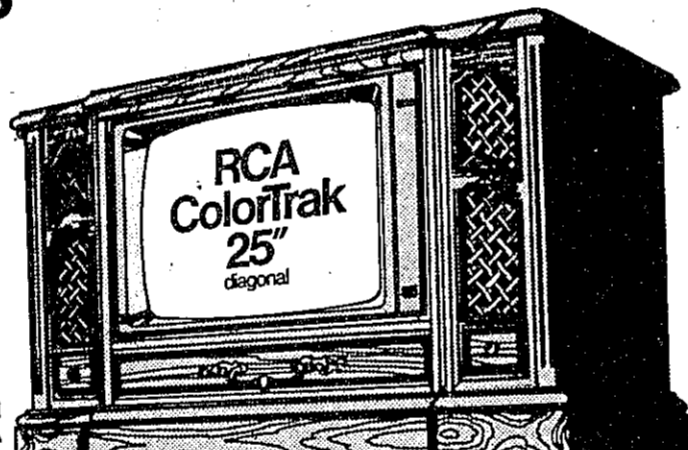
Students who are new to the district are to come in to register and pay their fees on Friday, Aug. 27.

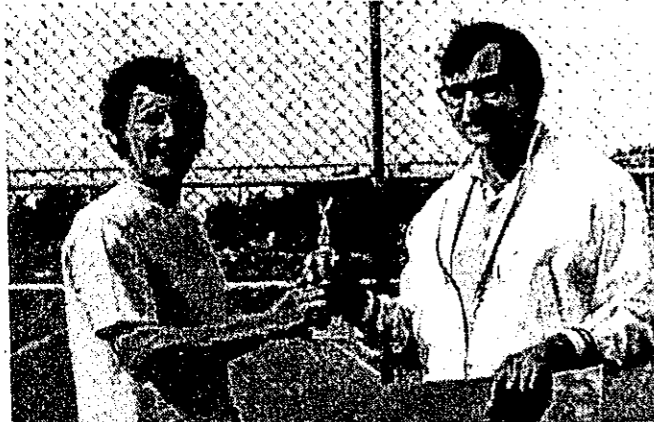

## From The Senate

Sen. Richard Allen

You have been seeing and will be seeing considerable news coverage of nursing homes in Michigan.

The reason is a special Senate Committee headed by young, ambitious, hard-working Democrat John Otterbacher. John enjoys being at the center of controversy and manages to garner considerable publicity which has propelled him from State House to State Senate to candidate (short-lived) for U.S. Senate. All by an age when most of us are just getting our feet on the ground in our first jobs.

Also on that committee is not so young, perhaps less ambitious, in this assignment less hard-working Republican Dick Allen. I have just not been able to make all the trips and meetings John has scheduled. But I am becoming quite well-informed about Michigan's nursing homes; the care they give; the money we spend on them and where it goes.

We part company in our assessment of the extent of the problem and its causes. It is, in a way, a sad commentary on our society that so many people end their lives in nursing homes surrounded by other elderly and infirm rather than in their own homes with some care from relatives and friends. On the other hand, it can be considered a compliment to us all that we do provide these services for those who really need it. In some cases the need may be caused by the scattering of family and friends around the country. In other cases the person simply requires more constant care than could be expected to be delivered at home.

In the majority of our homes care is very good. I don't think anyone should feel guilty about placing those who truly need care in these homes. Nor do people need to fear aging simply because a nursing home may at some stage be involved.

However, John and I agree that the care can and should be improved. The worst homes should be eliminated, the middle improved, and the best maintained at high standards.

We sharply disagree on the causes of present problems and therefore directions for future improvement. Senator Otterbacher tends to blame businessmen and the profit motive in operating nursing homes for many of our difficulties.

I tend to feel these have been and are very positive aspects of our nursing home industry and that problems have been caused by inadequate reimbursement, an overly complex pay formula and a substitution of bureaucratic regulation for competition.

We both agree church and civic groups need to be more involved in working and monitoring local nursing homes.

You'll hear more in the future on the complex question of nursing homes.

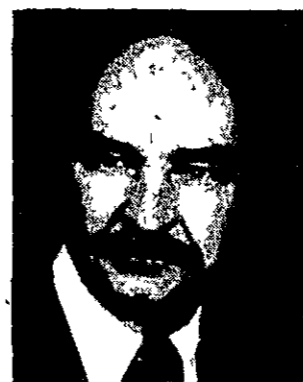

## What happened to Dick Austin

About the only real question of statewide significance arising from Michigan's recent primary is this one - what on earth happened to Dick Austin?

You will recall that Richard Austin, Michigan's incumbent secretary of state, entered the Aug. 3 Democratic primary for United States Senate nomination sharing historical similarity with a couple of prominent Republicans from the past - Alf M. Landon in 1936 and Thomas E. Dewey in 1948.

Like Landon and Dewey, Mr. Austin was so far ahead in the public opinion polls as to be unbeatable. And like Landon and Dewey before him, Dick Austin woke up on the day after the voters went to work without the victory the polls had promised him.

In fact, U.S. Rep. Don Riegle buried Austin under a 100,000 vote margin.

The question is "why," and the answer has been tackled so far by a score or more of Michigan political pundits.

The Almanack can add little more to what has been widely suggested so far.

Austin certainly was hurt by the widespread publicity about the branch manager "donation" practice - the so-called political kick-back scheme: Austin didn't inaugurate the system, but he benefitted from it. Publicity about this long-standing practice certainly hurt Austin.

Then there was his age, a contract which Mr. Riegle deftly used to his advantage.

And third, Richard Austin is black; without a doubt in my mind, his blackness hurt his political chances.

Any of these Austin stumbling blocks, by itself, was probably not enough to make the polls out as liars; but combined, they did in the honorable Mr. Austin at the ballot box.

Add one more Austin problem: Dick Austin is not an exciting person. He comes across, either in person or in his media projections, as what he is - a nice guy, soft-spoken, respectable, calm, competent . . . but rather unexciting.

Cross this with Mr. Riegle's rah-rah, hell-bent-for-leather style, and the contrast is stark.

What happened to U.S. Rep. James O'Hara, the other big-name Democrat in the primary? Even with all his union support and party backing O'Hara ran a dismal third.

Down in Washington, O'Hara is a much more significant cog in the congressional wheel than is Riegle; but back home among the voters, O'Hara just didn't wash. Which underlines an old Almanack thesis - that too many Washingtonians develop political myopia in direct proportion to the years they've been gone from the home base.

The simple explanation seems to be that O'Hara and his backers lost touch, and didn't understand or know how to reach the statewide Michigan voter.

And there was Don Riegle, a man who entered Congress 10 years ago as a Republican, admitted at that time that some day he would like to be President, tried for a Republican nod for the Senate and was rebuffed by his then-party, switched to the Democratic side of the ledger in mid-stream, got elected a couple more times to Congress as a Democrat, and then jumped into the next available Senate primary under his new party colors.

No one has ever questioned Riegle's ambition, or his ability or his energy. All of them played big parts in his whopping win over Austin and O'Hara.

Now comes the general election, and it will be two congressmen for the U.S. Senate - Democrat Riegle against Republican Marvin L. Esch of Ann Arbor, who, too, survived a four-man race for his party's nomination.

Esch shares some of Austin's blandness. For example, he commented after the primary, that his "goal" for the general election "is to relate to people's needs throughout the state." Goleeeee...such a goal sends shivers up the spine.

As for November, it looks like Riegle all the way. After all, the polls indicate Jimmy Carter is leading for President by a whopping margin - up to 2-1 in some polls - and with a top of the ticket showing such attraction, the Senate race in a state like Michigan would normally follow the same pattern.

At least, that's what the political polls indicate, and who can question political polls? Right, Mr. Landon? Right, Mr. Dewey? Right, Mr. Austin?

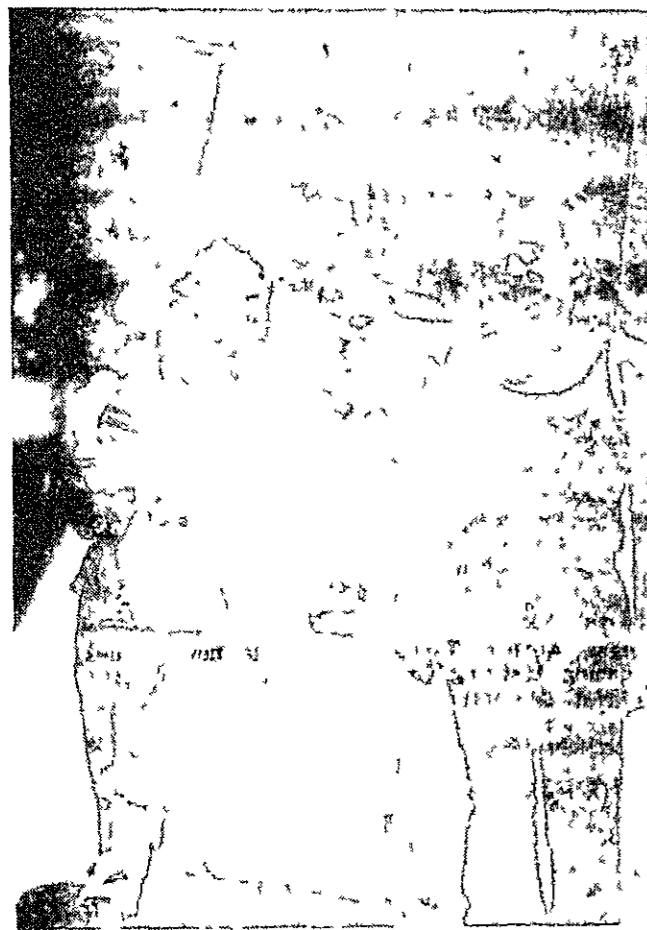

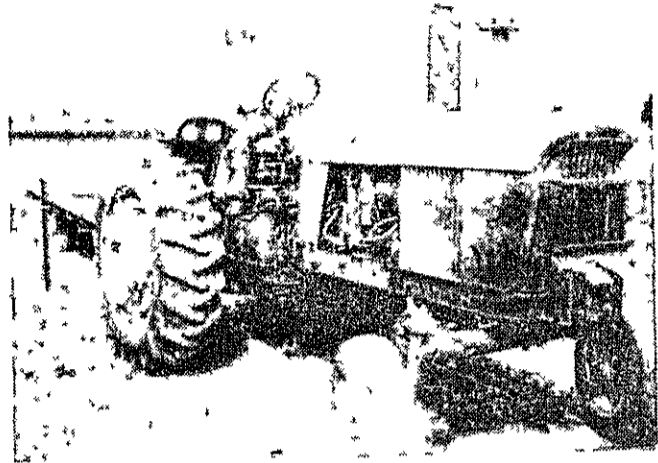

at state events

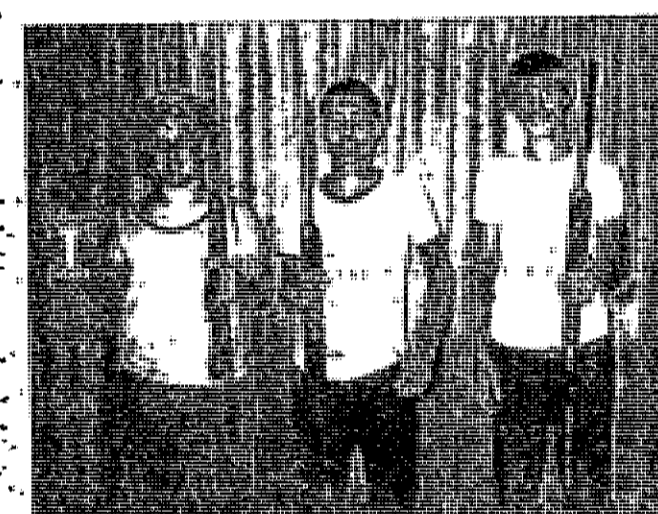

Clinton County 4-H'ers will be well represented at the State 4-H Events from August 21-28 at Michigan State University and at the Ingham County Conservation League. ### Efficient operation of the home freezer

To operate your home freezer efficiently, keep it as full as possible always. According to the USDA, operating costs per pound of food are less if the freezer is kept at least three-fourths full.

Food should be used on a rotating basis. It is not economical to store food in the freezer for more than 8 to 10 months.

To minimize the cost of running your freezer, open the door as infrequently as possible. Every time you open the freezer door, cold air escapes from the freezer and warm air enters. Needless to say, it takes energy to chill that warm air. If your freezer is half empty, a lot of warm air can rush into it whenever the door is opened. But very little warm air can enter a freezer that is fully loaded with food - not air. (Do not fill empty spaces in your freezer with newspaper. Newspaper acts as an insulator, if fresh food put into the freezer are

surrounded by newspaper, they will freeze very slowly. Slow freezing results in loss of product quality and possible food spoilage. If you have a frost-free freezer, newspaper could interfere with its operation by retarding air circulation during the thawing cycle.)

Check older freezer for leaking door gaskets. A freezer that continually loses cold air cannot be operating efficiently. If the gasket is brittle or cracked, it should be replaced. Take a dollar bill and close the freezer door on it. If it fits snugly, the seal is good. But if you can pull out the bill with no resistance, a new gasket is needed.

Your freezer should be

located away from a back wall so that there is adequate air circulation around it. Otherwise, heat will build up around the coils in the back, resulting in inefficient operation.

If you are shopping for a freezer, consider these points:

1. Don't buy a bigger freezer than you need.
2. Buy a chest-type freezer. Cold air tends to stay in a chest freezer when the door is opened, whereas with an upright model it tends to "spill-out."
3. Remember that it costs more to operate a frost-free freezer.

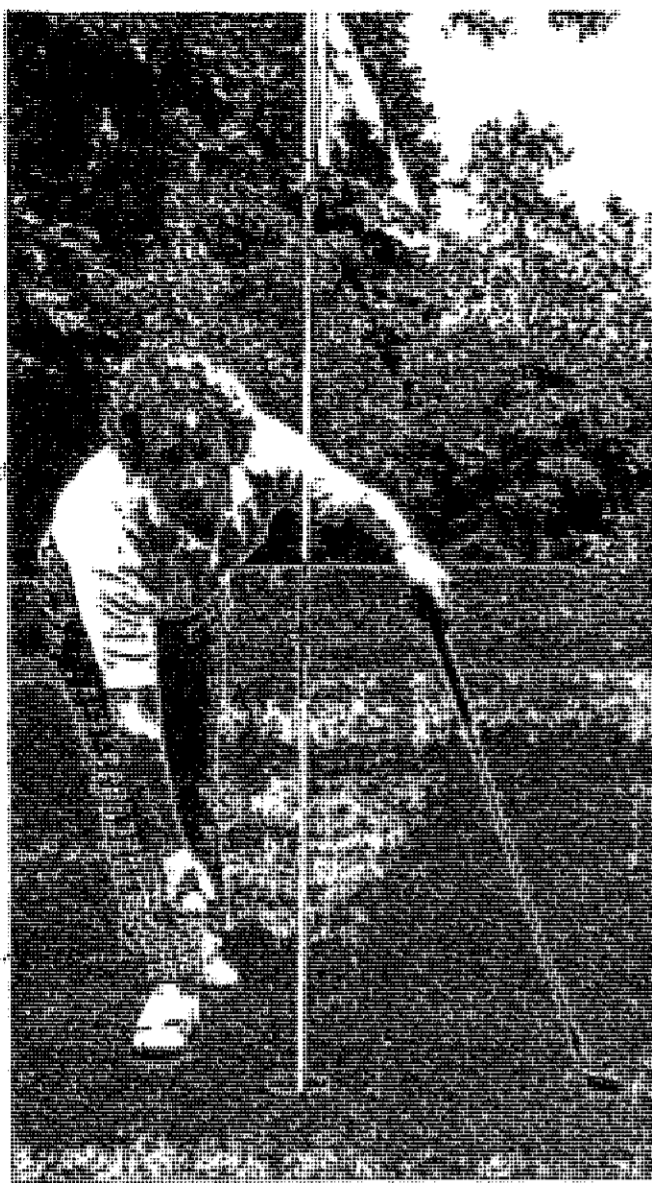

# Area rivers offer canoe attractions

Covered bridges, paddlewheel showboats, a restored village and state wildlife refuges are featured attractions along West Michigan's Grand, Thornapple, Flat and Maple rivers, according to Automobile Club of Michigan.

The Grand River—famous for showboats—is ideal for experienced paddlers who can compete with powerboaters and is also excellent for riverside trips by car.

The Thornapple features historic attractions, the Flat boasts two covered bridges and the Maple passes through a large state game area. These tributaries of the Grand River have stretches for novice canoeists seeking short trips but still provide two-to three-day journeys for the hardy.

The Grand, Michigan's longest river, is noted for its outstanding scenery between Lansing and Lake Michigan. In West Michigan, the river is bordered by high bluffs, wooded areas and greenery from Portland to Grand Haven.

Motorists wishing to follow the river by car can take M-21—the Blue Water Road—from Muir to Ada and also pass through the riverside towns of Ionia and Lowell. Canoeists traveling the Grand River will portage

many dams, including the Portland, Webber, Waggar and Lyons in Ionia County. The many dams in Grand Rapids make ground transportation from North Park to Grandville advisable.

At Ionia, the Ionia State Park and fairgrounds border the Grand River. This year the Ionia Free Fair, the largest of its kind in the world, will be held Aug. 6-15.

Further west, Lowell attracts thousands to its showboat extravaganza each July. The boat is docked year-round by the town's amphitheater.

For a ride on a paddlewheel riverboat, stop at Grand Rapids' North Park Street where the Grand River Queen departs on two-hour cruises. Tuesday through Sunday evening cruises offer Dixieland band entertainment.

Of special interest in the heart of Grand Rapids is a unique sculptured fish ladder at the Sixth Street Dam where the public can "salmon watch" in the fall. From Grandville to Lake Michigan, the river is especially suited for motorboating. There are many boat clubs and marinas near the resort community of Grand Haven.

For a two-day canoeing trip on the Thornapple River through gentle farm country

to the Grand River at Ada, put in at M-86. Portaging is necessary at six dams along that 47-mile length and the one at Cascade requires a half-mile carry. There are private campgrounds at Middleville and Irving, and canoeists can picnic at several riverfront parks along the way or on islands that dot the river.

Two parks along the Thornapple feature historical attractions. Leonard Field Park in Ada features one of Michigan's four remaining covered bridges, dating back to 1887 and open only to pedestrians since 1939.

Charlton Park is midway between Hastings and Nashville, featuring a restored mid-1800s agricultural village. It contains a historical museum, blacksmith shop, carpenter-cooper shop and stage coach inn.

Mike Hawthorn's Canoe Livery in Hastings offers short trips with easy paddling. The most popular trips for beginners include a stop at Charlton Park for a picnic, swim and sightseeing.

For anglers, Thornapple Lake and the stream below the lake have plenty of smallmouth bass, pike, muskies and some trout. Greenville is the starting point for a 2½ day trip down

the Flat to the Grand River at Lowell. Greenville's Flat River museum explains local history and the town's Danish heritage. The annual Danish Festival with parades, music, dancing and Hans Christian Andersen plays is slated Aug. 21-22.

The canoe livery at the Double R Ranch in Smyrna offers a six- to eight-hour canoe trip from Greenville to the ranch and a two-hour trip from Belding to Smyrna.

To see the two covered bridges spanning the Flat River, begin canoeing five miles south of Smyrna below White's Bridge dam. The first covered bridge is below the dam, dates to 1887 and still carries vehicular traffic.

A few miles downstream is Fallsburg Covered Bridge and County Park, ideal for picnicking. The remainder of the Flat river runs through Lowell State Game Area.

The Maple, which meets the Grand River at Muir, also offers wilderness

canoeing. With US-27 the suggested starting point, nearly 30 miles of 40-mile canoe route passes through the Maple River State Game Area. Camping is not permitted in the game area, but a private campground is

located at Cook's Landing near Matherton.

Fallen trees may cause problems in the Maple Rapids area. Check the water level of this stream before canoeing in mid-summer.

## Fowler schools opening schedule

Fowler Public Schools will begin the 1976-77 school year Sept. 7 with a half-day of school. Teachers will report to school on Sept. 1 for planning and programming day.

Bus runs will remain approximately the same as last year with adjustments made only where necessary. Students are to be at their regular stops the same as the 1975-76 schedule unless notified before school starts.

### Good combine operating practices

Good combine operating practices should coincide with equally good grain handling and storage.

"Producers should have a critical eye for energy consumption and moisture content of grain during harvest and drying operation," says Bob Maddex, Michigan State University Agricultural Engineer.

An important key to this good management is a moisture meter. It is the only way to know for sure what is going on in the field and storage facilities and will pay for itself many times over. All grains should be harvested at less than 30 percent moisture, which greatly reduces kernel damage and minimizes fuel requirements for drying.

Moisture evaporates from grain at basic predictable rates—there are no shortcuts. It requires 1,800 to 3,000 BTU to evaporate one pound of water from grain. If the moisture content is 300 percent, 11.6 pounds of water per bushel must be evaporated to reach 15.5 percent moisture, which requires 27,840 BTU. But if grain is harvested at 26 percent, 7.95 pounds of water per bushel must be evaporated to reach 15.5

percent moisture which is a savings of 8,780 BTU.

Fuel may also be saved by drying grain to 17 to 18 percent then using dryer aeration to reach 15 percent. Keep dryer temperatures within manufacturer's guidelines. Excessive temperatures only waste energy and may overheat grain, causing burning, uneven drying and more kernel damage.

Grain depth is important to in-bin drying. Air flows fall off as grain depth increases. Variation in the final grain moisture between the top and bottom layers results from the combination of air temperature, air flow and grain depth. Stirring devices reduce this moisture variation for in-bin dryers and increase drying capacity but cannot compensate entirely for this variation.

Drying temperatures less than 100 degrees will yield better quality grain than temperatures more than 100 degrees. An in-bin dryer is a low volume drying unit. Increasing the drying temperatures does not overcome this characteristic.

Grain depth and drying temperatures are important to quality drying for batch-in-bin dryers, and modified

bin drieration units that transfer hot grain to another bin for cooling. Follow manufacturer's recommendations carefully. Reduce grain depths and drying temperatures if drying results are not satisfactory.

Uneven drying can occur in any type of dryer from uneven air distribution in the plenum chamber, plugged perforations in the floor and wall of the dryer, or from outside wind pressures. New dryers should be checked carefully for hot or cold spots by grain sampling or feeling the grain or dryer surfaces. Farm dried grain can be equal to commercially dried grain if the farm operator will familiarize himself with the drying process and the dryer.

Inspect grain bins regularly during filling and throughout the storage period; check for odor, condensation on grain and bin walls, crusting or mold growth on the corn. If any of these conditions are found, run the aeration fan or drying fan without heat until the condition is corrected.

In-bin dryers are particularly susceptible to moisture condensation on side walls. Look for this

condition carefully and if found, run the fan until all condensation is evaporated and grain next to the sidewall is dry.

If fines accumulate in the center of the bin during filling, remove 20 to 30 bushels if there is a center or bottom unloading auger. This will take most of them out and allow better air movement during aeration.

Never enter a grain bin when unloading equipment is running. It only takes a few seconds to be pulled into moving grain to the point where escape becomes impossible. Always have a person nearby when entering the bin.

The only way to determine moisture content of grain is with a moisture tester. Check grain going in and out of the dryer, then judge the dryer performance.

The moisture content also provides a guide to adjusting dryer heat, flow rate through automated batch and continuous flame dryers and grain depths for in-bin dryers. Moisture is evaporated from the corn kernel surface. As grain dries, movement of moisture from within the kernel slows. Therefore, grain coming from a dryer where 10 to 15 points of moisture have been removed will usually have a low moisture check. After it stands 24 to 48

hours, moisture within the kernel equalizes, reflecting the true grain moisture. It may run 1 to 2 percent higher than the check shown as the grain exited the dryer.

Compare your moisture tester, at least seasonally, with an elevator moisture tester by taking a grain sample in a sealed jar or plastic bag to the elevator along with your moisture meter. Check the grain on both moisture testers and use the proper charts for grain temperature correction. Overdrying 1 or 2 percent costs money. Underdrying causes storage problems.

Major causes of fines and broken kernels include too high a moisture content at harvest, incorrect combine adjustment, too high a dryer heat, overdrying or partially filled augers. Grain is also damaged when the drop is too long without adequate cushion boxes to break the fall. Careful inspection at various handling points in the grain system may pinpoint specific problems. If augers cause breakage, slow the auger speed so it runs three-fourths full or more.

An ordinance to regulate the speed of vessels and to provide for the safe use of the waters in Victor Township, Clinton County; enacted under the authority of Act 303, Public Acts of 1967, as amended (M.S.A. 18.1287 (17)), being identical to State Administrative Rules filed in the Office of the Secretary of State.

SECTION 1  
All words and phrases used in this ordinance shall be construed and have the same meanings as those words and phrases defined in Act 303, P.A. 1967, as amended; M.S.A. 18.1287 (8).

SECTION 11  
Regulation No. 19, Clinton County.  
R. 281.719.1 Lake Ovid, Sleepy Hollow State Park.  
1. On the waters of Lake Ovid, Section 34, T7N, R1W, and Sections 3 and 10, T6N, R1W, in Sleepy Hollow State Park Victor Township, Clinton County, it is unlawful to operate a vessel powered by a motor, except an electric motor not exceeding 3 horsepower. This rule does not apply to law enforcement officers or department of natural resources personnel pursuing their lawful duties.

SECTION 111  
All other ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

SECTION IV

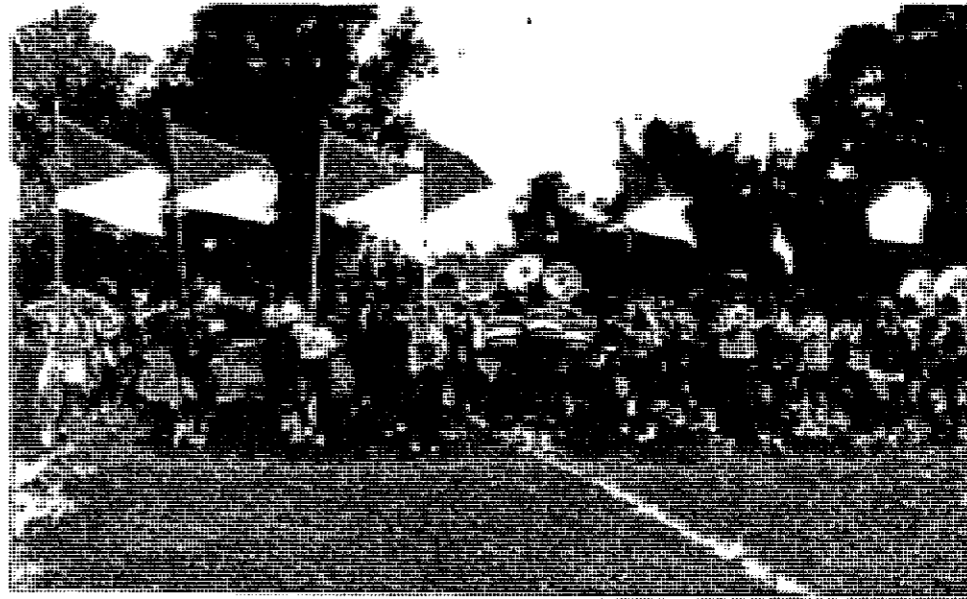

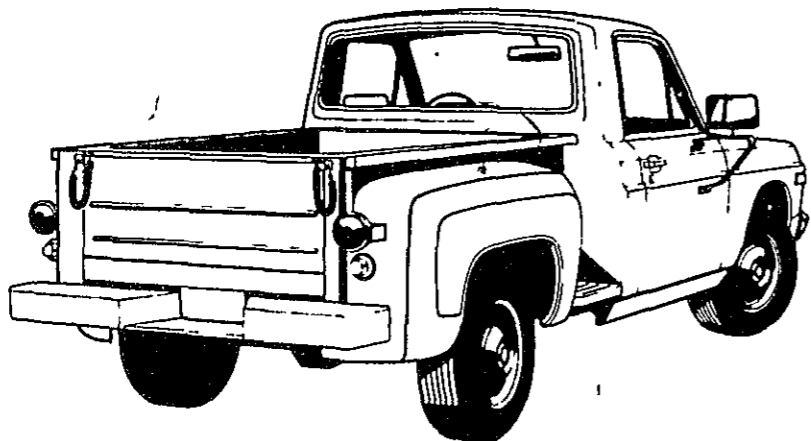
