ST. JOHNS—Highlighting the 1972 Clinton County 4-H Fair was the selection of the Outstanding Boy and Girl as fine examples of how the program develops character in young people.

Randy Davis of DeWitt and Jeannine Seeger earned the honor this year after a committee of adult leaders made the choice from among about 15 youngsters nominated.

RANDY HAS been a member of the Olive 4-H Club for the past 9 years and has completed projects in 11 different areas. At this year's fair, his steer won Reserve Champion and a wishing well be constructed was on display to collect money for the March of Dimes. His projects include beef, rabbits, handicraft, gun safety, electrical, vegetable gardening, tractor, poultry, art, small engines and teen leadership. Randy has also been active in such 4-H activities as litter clean up, public speaking competition and numerous other areas.

This summer is working three different jobs to earn money necessary this fall to attend Ferris State College where he will study data processing.

JEANNINE HAS been active in 4-H for the past 7 years. During this time, she was a member of 3 different clubs. They include the Gourmet and Garments Club, Bath All Purpose and the Tail Waggers. She has held numerous club offices and is active in many areas of 4-H.

Projects completed by Jeannine were accomplished in the areas of food, flower garden, cultural arts, passport, dog care, clothing and teen leadership. She has been very active in the training of dogs to be used by the blind and her dog received a special award at last week's fair.

Top 4-Hers

Mrs. Thingstad serves as delegate to Miami

Margaret Thingstad doesn't fit the stereotype image of a politician but she's very active in a wide range of civic affairs and a woman who feels "there's so much to be done."

She's that special type of person who quickly spots segments of society which need volunteer help and immediately plunges ahead to meet the challenge.

THIS WEEK Mrs Thingstad is serving as a delegate to the GOP National Convention in Miami. She represents Michigan's Third Congressional District and is the first Clinton County Republican to attend a national convention since Alan Dean of St. Johns went to the Chicago session in 1960. The other Third District delegate is Bryon

Cross of Kalamazoo. Alternates are Shirley McFee of Calhoun County and Howard Ferris from Barry County.

A former college guidance counselor, Mrs Thingstad returned to her native home of Clinton County 10 years ago after living in the East and southern Michigan for nearly 40 years. Her husband, Syver, is a Watertown Township trustee and also plays an active role in the Republican Party.

A member of the Clinton County Republican Party for the past nine years, Mrs Thingstad is presently serving her second 2-year term on the GOP State Central Committee from the Third Congressional District. She has also headed the Clinton County Republican Women's Club and is a past vice-chairman of the county executive committee.

HER OTHER civic duties include an active role in the St. Paul's Episcopal Church of Lansing where she serves on the diocesan board and is in charge of the bishop's fund for world relief. Mrs Thingstad is also an appointed member of the Tri-County Mental Health Board and serves as a trustee on the state executive committee for Child and Family Services of Michigan. The latter organization is a 100-year-old private agency which offers assistance to unwed mothers and provides an adoption service.

When asked her opinion on the role women should play in politics she replied "we can't do political work without men's help" while adding "I'm not a women's lib person."

She points to an active interest in volunteer work as the reason she became involved in party politics. "There seemed to be a need for bringing people of the county together in an organized way," she explains.

"I BELIEVE Republicans in Clinton County will have to stick together because they'll have more competition in the future," stresses Mrs Thingstad "but I think we'll be strengthened by more competition."

Her years of counseling young people and study in psychology comes through when she says "in politics you have to give and take a little."

Her reaction to the possibility of student demonstrations in Miami also reveals a keen understanding of people. "I think authorities are being receptive and rather understanding," she points out. "They haven't put up too many barriers and nothing bad will happen if they (youthful non-delegates) keep within their rights."

County GOP re-affirm policy

ST. JOHNS—Republican office seekers in Clinton County are expected to work for or contribute money to the party organization if they desire party support at election time.

This policy adopted by the county party's executive board in March of 1971 was unanimously re-affirmed at last week's fall convention in a move which stymied an effort to change or clarify this rule.

Objection to the rule developed earlier this month when a newspaper ad placed in the COUNTY NEWS listed the names of all but 8 GOP candidates running for office in the primary election. While the ad stated the candidates listed were in "good standing" with the party, it clearly pointed out this was not an endorsement for anyone.

STRONG PROTEST came immediately from Mrs Jeanne Rand who lost her bid for county commissioner and Larry Floate, an unsuccessful candidate for the Republican sheriff's nomination. They held a meeting with Clinton GOP chairman James Palmiter several days before the primary and were told their names were deleted intently for failing to support the party. He then explained the policy adopted in 1971 and suggested the best way to make a change would be to attend the party's fall convention.

Following Palmiter's suggestion, Mrs Rand appeared at the GOP county convention and read a letter objecting to the newspaper ad. She also called for the formation of an ethics committee to screen the qualifications of candidates seeking public office.

County Finance Chairman William Gnodtke then took the floor and told Mrs Rand he had mailed her material requesting a donation to the party. She told him she never received anything from party officials.

AT THIS point, Gnodtke produced party records and told Mrs Rand "according to our record you've never contributed to the party since 1966." She replied that Gnodtke could "question me privately but not here."

Gnodtke then commented he was "really sad to see this come up" and Mrs Rand echoed his sentiment.

County Clerk Ernest Carter was next to speak and said "I'd like to sound a

note of caution". He proceeded to compare the discussion to a family feud while adding "I hope the airing of this does clear the atmosphere but we do have to show some consideration."

IN A further effort to bring the conflicting parties together, the county clerk said "perhaps, it's a lack of communications and it behooves all of us to remedy this situation."

A motion was made by Gnodtke to reaffirm the party rule in question and Liz Nobis offered a support. The measure gained unanimous approval by 17 voting members of the executive board.

Fatal Crash

DEWITT—A Lansing man was killed instantly last Saturday afternoon in a one car accident which occurred on Airport Road, south of Howe Road.

The victim, traveling alone in a 1971 Ford Maverick, was identified as Jack D Patrick, 24, of 720 East Coleman Road, Lansing.

Clinton County Sheriff's Department officials said that Patrick was traveling south on Airport Road and apparently lost control of his car as he broke over a hill. The car traveled 130 feet after it left the road, police said, and was airborne, jumping over a 50 foot wide ditch striking an abutment as it hit the ground.

Witnesses told the investigating deputy that it appeared the car was traveling at speeds over 100 miles an hour before the crash.

Funeral services were held for Patrick on Tuesday, Aug 22 at the Lee R Rummell Funeral Home in DeWitt with Rev Lavern Bretz officiating. Burial was in North Eagle Cemetery.

He was born in Lansing on July 31, 1948, the son of Erwin and Barbara Patrick and had resided most of his life in Eagle, moving to DeWitt three years ago. He married the former Angela White in Lansing on Nov 23, 1969.

Survivors include his wife, a daughter, Michelle; two brothers, Steven of Portland and Kevin of Coldwater; three sisters, Mrs Ellen Ring, Mrs Patricia Skinner, both of Lansing and Carol Patrick of Portland; his parents, who reside in Portland and his grandparents, Leo Patrick of Portland and Mrs Doris Jackson of East Lansing.

Other convention business concerned the selection of delegates to the Michigan GOP Convention in Detroit the first weekend in September and passage of three resolutions.

THE FIRST resolution called for county residents to study the abortion reform proposal on the November ballot and then vote their conscience on election day. In the second, Clinton Republicans gave support to a system of taxing real property based on land use and not its potential use value. The third resolution was a blanket support of all GOP candidates in November.

Another resolution on the control of firearms was defeated by a 23-20 floor vote after opponents to the measure claimed it was too broad. Confusion also centered on the resolution's wording and disagreement developed on whether the resolution favored or opposed stricter gun control.

ANOTHER MEASURE calling for a study of constructing county buildings at one site to form a complex was tabled after Carter explained at least two such studies have been made.

County Chairman James Palmiter was named a delegate-at-large to the state convention and will head the 13-member group. Other state delegates include: Ron Spitzley, Robert King Jr, Paul Nobis, Andrew Cobb, Doris Cook, Margaret Thingstad, Robert Zeeb, Dale Emerson, Beverly Ovenhouse, William Gnodtke, Harold Schmaltz and Debra Wagner.

Alternates named were: Janet Palmiter, Victor Hopp, Darrell Beck, Lila Petlit, Claude Underhill, Ernest Carter, Virginia Zeeb, Max Calder, Eugene Ovenhouse, Dan Chisolm and Cheryl Amstutz.

Sheriff deputies busy during June and July

LANSING -- Sheriff's departments in Michigan's 83 counties investigated 11,557 motor vehicle accidents and a total of 92,241 civil and criminal complaints during the first two months of the summer, according to a report compiled by the Michigan

Sheriffs Association. During the first half of the summer (June and July), sheriff's deputies across the state booked 19,776 prisoners and issued 1,486 boating citations and 18,429 traffic citations, the Sheriffs Association reported.

IN THE motor vehicle

accident category, there were 142 mishaps that resulted in a total of 153 traffic fatalities. The average was one fatality for every 75 accidents investigated by sheriff's departments during the 2-month span. During the same period, 3,723 motorists were injured in the 11,557 accidents handled by sheriff's deputies.

The summer months caused a seasonal increase in boating citations issued by sheriff's departments, the Sheriffs Association reported. With water traffic at its highest point of the year, the Association urges all boaters to use extreme caution in operating their crafts and to follow the laws of common sense as well as the state's boating laws.

Sheriff's departments already are mapping plans to monitor the flow of motor vehicle traffic in their respective counties during the long Labor Day weekend, with the objective being further reductions in highway congestion and improved safety on each county's streets and roads

The company's common stock was assigned ticker symbol "SPW". Gordon E. Reynolds, chairman, president and chief executive officer, purchased the first 100 shares of SPW in the first trade of the day on the stock ticker tape. Reynolds and Robert J. Mason, vice president, secretary-treasurer, were welcomed on the trading floor by officials of the NYSE.

Gayle L. Desprez, Clinton National Bank and Trust Company, St. Johns, Michigan, was among 1,548 student-bankers from about 40 states and several foreign nations who have just completed the annual two-week residence session of the 28th annual Graduate School of Banking at the University of Wisconsin in Madison Aug. 7-18.

The school, sponsored by the Central States Conference consisting of the banker's associations of 16 midwestern states, requires attendance for two weeks each year for three years for graduation. A total of 441 seniors received their diplomas at the school's 1972 graduation exercises Friday night, Aug. 18. The Graduate School of Banking is one of the many schools, short courses, and conferences sponsored annually at the University of Wisconsin as educational services for all citizens.

Attendance at the 1972 Graduate School of Banking enabled its students at Wisconsin's University not only to meet a large number of bankers from all over the country, but they also had the opportunity of hearing the school's distinguished lecturers, over 100 experts from all parts of the nation, who are recognized authorities in banking, economics, government, law and industrial and agricultural and financial problems.

Russell Springer, St. Johns District central office supervisor for General Telephone recently com-

pleted a one week training course on Voice Frequency Transmission Theory and Testing at the Gen Tel Training Center, Owosso.

The course is designed to enable participants to develop the basic theory and practical knowledge to properly test and maintain voice frequency transmission systems. The course included such topics as: the nature of sound; transmission line characteristics; electrical properties of the transmitted signal; the nationwide DDD network; transmission testing and maintenance; and general transmission design.

Within the next nine months, all switchmen under Springer's supervision will be given an expanded two week version of the same course, according to William F. Graef, St. Johns District Manager.

Springer, employed since 1947, began his telephone career at Mt Pleasant and held positions as chief switchman and installation and maintenance supervisor there before being promoted to his present position at St. Johns.

Arnold's drug stores are offering free child-proof pill vials to anyone who brings their old pill bottles in for exchange.

The new pill bottle caps can't be lifted or twisted loose in the ordinary fashion. The lids must be pressed down quite firmly, then turned to the right while continuing the pressure.

"The vials will make pills much more inaccessible to small children," said Arnold Faudman, president of Arnold's.

About 75,000 children accidentally swallow potentially harmful substances in homes each year, according to the National Clearinghouse for Poison Control Centers.

Recognizing this problem, the Federal government has issued regulations which require prescriptions containing aspirin to be sold in child-proof containers after August 15. After October 24, all drugs subject to rigid Federal controls, such as amphetamines, and barbiturates, must also be sold in child-proof containers.

Faudman reminded parents that locked up medicines are still the safest way to prevent a child from swallowing them.

"These vials will help prevent accidental swallowing if the bottles are left on the dresser or the kitchen counter. But the best place for medicines is a locked drawer or cabinet—or even a suitcase, if necessary," Faudman said.

Faudman also reminded parents that storage of medicines must match a child's growth. As children grow larger, medicines must be stored in higher, more inaccessible places," he said.

Taking the pulse

County voices opinion on abortion

This November Michigan voters will be asked to decide on the question of abortion reform. In an effort to take the pulse of public opinion in Clinton County on this issue, we conducted a random telephone survey.

Here are a few comments voiced by local citizens:

Mrs. Gary L. Martens of 206 S. Swegles in St. Johns is expecting her third child in November. Although the pros and cons are many, she's in favor of legalization. With so many young girls getting pregnant and the ADC rolls expanding by leaps and bounds, she feels this is one solution.

Taking a different view was George Harter of 116 Lewis. "I don't think it's right unless it's a case of saving the mother," the St. Johns man disclosed. "As far as abortion," he added, "I don't believe in it."

Mrs. Herb E. Baker of 209 W. Cass agrees with Harter. She revealed that she wouldn't vote for abortion reform. Her suggestion is to have the necessary preventatives so that it wouldn't be necessary for a woman to carry through with any unwanted pregnancy. "When you go through illness and bad times," said the grandmother of 15, "you realize you shouldn't be in favor of it."

"I very definitely feel the Michigan law should be changed," announces Mrs. Roger M. Rasmussen of 1002 Lincolnshire. "There are times when it is very necessary," she inserted, "but I would hate to see it (abortion) as easy as it is in New York state."

Rev. Averill Carson of the St. Johns Congregational Church said he hasn't reached a decision on the issue. "In our denomination," he explained, "each one of us is free to formulate our own position on social issues. I haven't taken any public stand."

A mother of six, Mrs. Gerald Every of 210 S. Emmons feels it should be the woman's choice. "Accidents do happen," she replied, "and it would be better not to have a child than to do it wrong justice." "Let's face it," she added, "some people are not suited to kids."

"It's a decision that should be made between the woman and her doctor along with her husband if she has one," says Mrs. John L. Jones of 1434 W. French Rd. And, she stressed, there should be no limitations to make it more difficult to obtain.

"Dr. Harry J. DeVore of 417 Meadowview views the situation from the physician's standpoint. "This is something that should be decided by the individual involved," he maintains. There are times when abortion would certainly be in order, he said, and

pointed out a rape case as an example. At the present time there is no provision for this in the state law, he said.

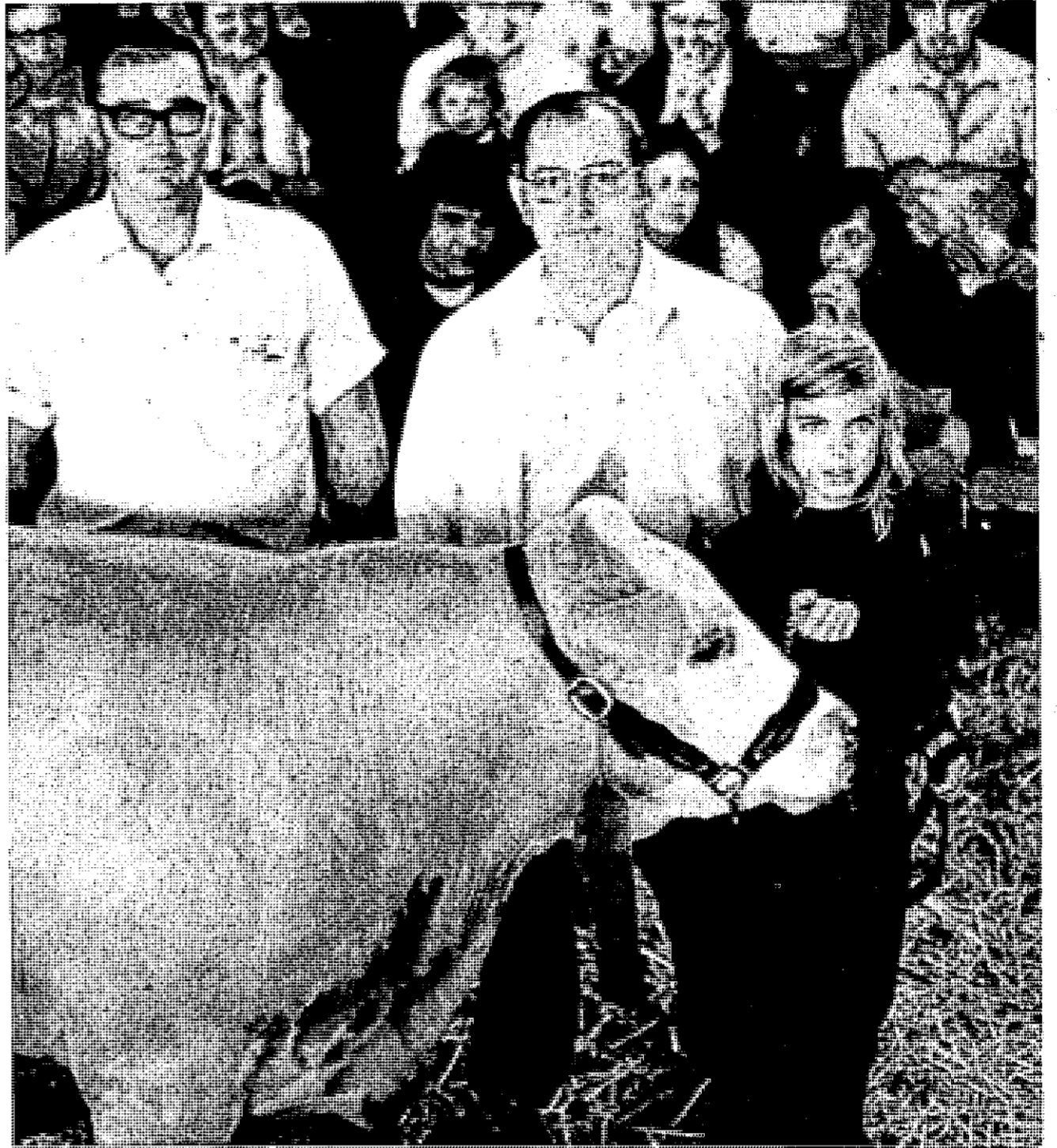
Mrs. Raymond Griffith, 211 S. Traver and Mrs. Lawrence Salters, 302, both said they'd vote against the bill. The two St. Johns women cited cases in which the mother's life is at stake as the only circumstance which they would favor abortion.

Personally I am not in favor of it, told Mrs. Walter Steward, 906 N. Oakland, St. Johns. "But," she added, "I feel a woman who sincerely doesn't want to have the child such as in rape cases should be able to have an abortion. Many times a couple is faced with an expected child they will not be able to provide for financially."

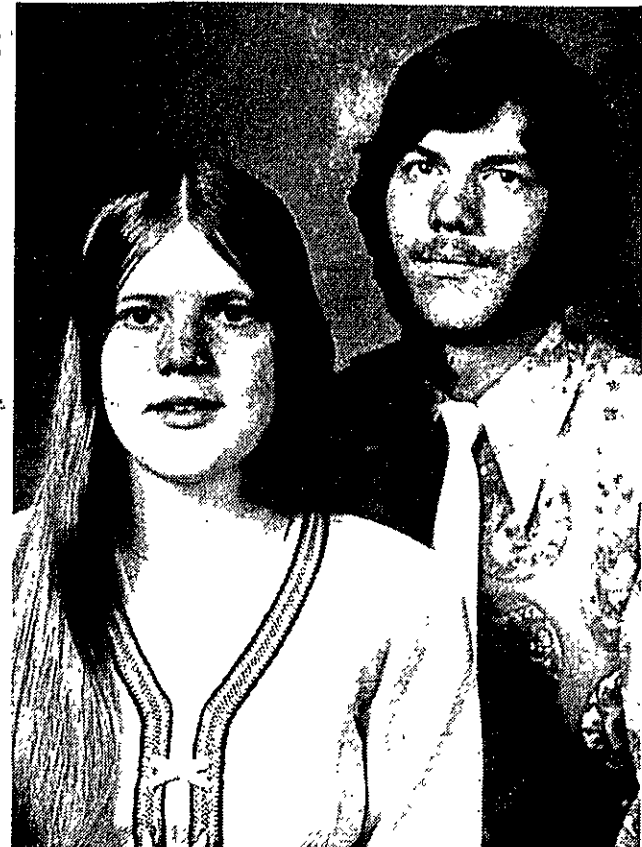

Provisions strengthened for 1973 wheat programs

New Drugs, New Life

ST. JOHNS—Producers can be better assured of equitable application of set-aside provisions in the 1973 Wheat and Feed Grain Program because payment deductions for less than average quality set-aside land are being increased.

Arthur Rowley, Chairman of the Michigan State Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, made the announcement. For wheat and feed grain farms, when low quality acreage is offered for set-aside—that is acreage not representative of land on which the farm's crops are grown—the entire payment will be based on the productivity of the set-aside land.

ROWLEY SAID that the announcement was made as a result of a study of 1971-72 program operations which revealed that a few

producers with farms having both poor quality and good quality land have offered the poor quality for set-aside and accepted deductions from their farm payments. The deductions were not enough to offset the monetary advantage gained by producing crops on the quality acreage rather than setting it aside from production. The increased deduction rates for 1973 will affect relatively few producers because the majority of participants in the set-aside programs have offered quality set-aside acres in both 1971 and 1972.

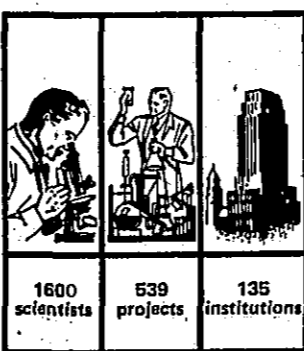

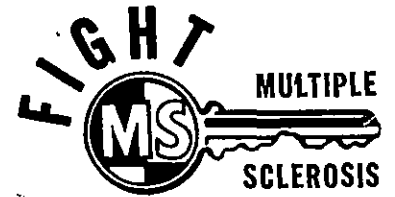

An Amendment to Ordinance Number 3, City of DeWitt being an Ordinance to Repeal Ordinance Number 3 in its entirety. Ordinance #3

LICENSING AND REGULATING AND SUNDAY CLOSING

Section 1. That on and after the first day of April 1928 any person, firm or corporation desiring to conduct, operate, or maintain within said Village of DeWitt any hotel,

restaurant, lunch room, eating house, or other place for the serving of lunches or meals (with the exception of such places as serve meals or lunches only), or any billiard room, pool room, or combination thereof, or any public show or exhibition to which admission is gained by the payment of money, shall first pay to the Village Clerk a fee of fifty cents, payment of which shall entitle the applicant to a license good for one year from its date, for the purpose named therein, subject to the

revocation by the council of said village for failure to comply with any or all of the provisions of the second and third sections of this ordinance; provided that all traveling or transient tent and street shows charging admission shall pay to the village clerk a license fee of three dollars (\$3.00) for the first day and at the rate of one dollar for each additional day for which license is desired. This fee to be payable in advance. Also that in the first day of April, 1928 and thereafter all stores selling groceries, all meat markets, hardware, and barber shops, within said Village of DeWitt shall remain closed on Sunday.

Section 5. Anyone who shall on or after the first day of April, 1928 conduct, operate, or maintain or attempt to conduct, operate, or maintain within the corporate limits of the Village of DeWitt any place of business coming within the terms of this ordinance without first obtaining a license therefor, as in this ordinance provided, and any store that sells, groceries,

any meat market, hardware or barber shop that shall remain open Sunday, shall upon conviction thereof, be punished by a fine not exceeding ten dollars, or be imprisoned in the County jail of Clinton County for a term not exceeding thirty days, or by both fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the court.

Section 2. No owner, proprietor, or manager of any of the places licensed hereunder shall knowingly permit or countenance the selling, giving away, furnishing or drinking in or about the premises, of any beverage or beverages consisting in whole or in part of spirituous, malt-brewed, or fermented liquors; nor shall harbor or permit to be harbored in or about the premises any drunk or intoxicated or disorderly person; nor shall permit or countenance in or about said premises the playing for money of any game or games whether with or without mechanical or other devices.

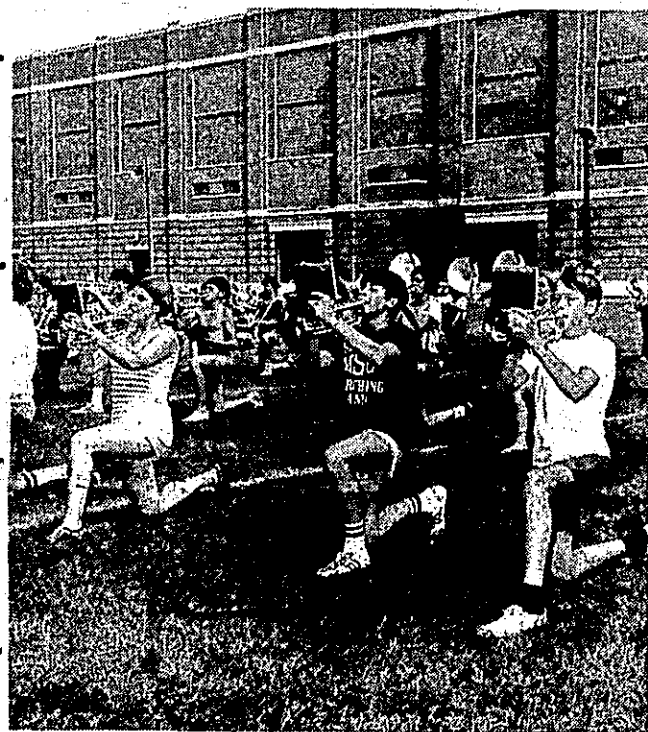

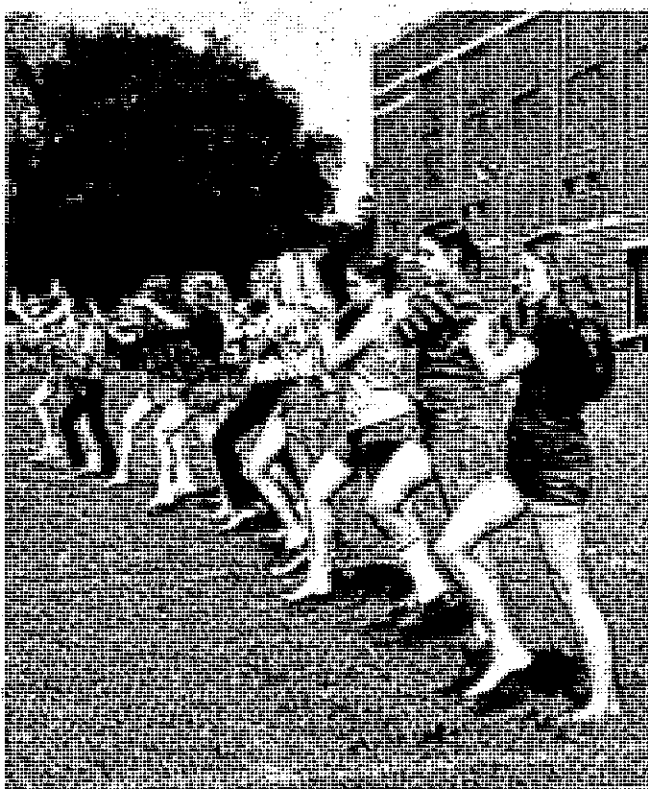

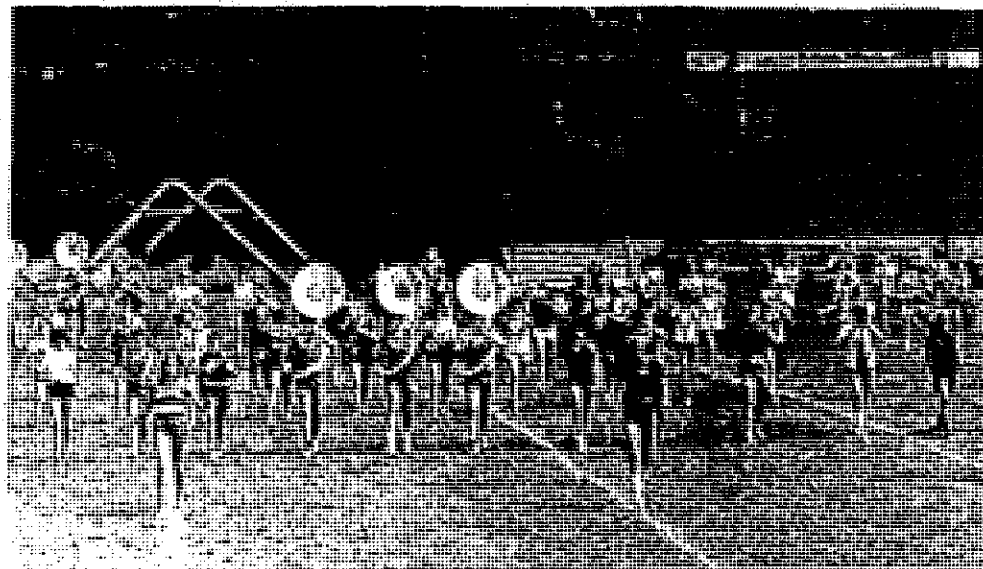

Commission uses good judgment

A lack of communications between St Johns City Commissioners and volunteer firemen surfaced last week when the firefighters submitted a request for higher wages.

The present commission is making a commendable effort to keep a tight grasp of the city's purse strings and balanced budget. It was poor timing by firemen to request more money just a few weeks after the budget was finalized for another year.

All departments in the city fall under the supervision of Manager Harvey Weatherwax except the firemen. Herein rests the communication problem because firemen must present their own case to the commission when they seek additional benefits. They neglected to request the higher wages when the budget was being prepared.

It appears unlikely the commission will bend to the demands by firemen for higher wages. Such action is based mainly on their firm belief that the city budget should be closely controlled. This means consideration of additional expenditures BEFORE the annual budget is prepared and not after.

It's unfortunate this situation developed but we commend the city commission for their efforts to wisely control the taxpayers money. The firemen's request has been tabled for now and no immediate action on it is expected. Their recommendation of \$150 per man added to the Blue Cross escrow fund alone represents an estimated \$3,000 expenditure. This makes it a matter which merits careful study and we're glad to see a hasty decision was not made.

Gen Tel realigns district operations

ST. JOHNS--General Telephone has announced a realignment of its district operations, consolidating the present 29-district organization into 12 districts, effective Sept 1, according to ER Wellman, operating vice president for the company. The company will continue to operate under the direction of 5 division managers.

"Consolidation of our operating area into 12 districts will provide us with maximum effectiveness of specialized job functions and insure a greater responsiveness to customer service requirements," Wellman said.

The new districts will include from 25,000 to 50,000 telephones and will be headed by a district manager with the responsibility for all phases of telephone service in that district. In addition, management personnel will continue to be located at present district and service office sites with the specific responsibility for customer service in that area.

Headquarters locations for the company's 12 districts are Alma, Owosso and St Johns in the central division; Adrian, Davison and Imlay City in the eastern division; Alpena and Gaylord in the northern division; South Haven and Three Rivers in the southern division, and Muskegon and Whitehall in the western division. Included in the central division managed by B R

Davies are Owosso District, L Baker, manager--Bancroft, Durand, Elsie, Gaines, Ovid and Owosso and St Johns District, W J Langeland, manager--Ashley, Bath, Carson City, DeWitt, Fowler-Pewamo, Grand Ledge, Hubbardston,

Laingsburg, Maple Rapids, Middleton, Muir, Palo, Pompeii, St Johns, Williamston and Woodland. Present district managers not designated to the new posts will be assigned new management responsibilities.

The home economist

When it comes to food, the month of August always poses a big problem for many consumers. The problem... how to possibly eat all the good homegrown fruits and vegetables that are available while they're in peak of the season. There are so many homegrowns available that many people are tempted to be "fruitionarians" and vegetarians only.

Green peppers, green beans, soft shell squash, new potatoes, onions, radishes, lettuce, sweet corn, cucumbers, carrots, beets, eggplant, broccoli, tomatoes, cauliflowers, etc., etc., and etc. all vie for attention. Michigan's summer supply is generous now and peak season has started. When produce is in peak supply, quality is generally at its peak also, the variety from which to choose is greater and prices generally, but not always because there are so many other factors involved, are lowest of the year.

Hurricane Agnes caused severe damage to crops in New York and Pennsylvania but did little harm to Michigan vegetables. Because of the shortages in these now almost non-producing states and competition for the total shorter supply, some small retail price increases may be seen on carrots, onions, peppers, tomatoes and squash. All supplies are estimated to be adequate to generous however, so eat to your heart's content. The fresh fruit picture is

not quite as rosy... but there will still be ample supplies to feed Michigan-ers. Crop prospects for non-citrus fruits, except cherries and apples, were sharply reduced by cold, wet weather so higher prices will reflect this shortened supply. When you see the higher prices blame the weather. Don't blame growers, processors, retailers, politicians or inflation. It's the weather that caused the problem here.

Michigan's peach crop, for example, was severely damaged by cold winter weather and the June 11 freeze but there will be a few around for the most ardent peach lovers. Prices are high and quality is not the best. At this writing it looks like we'll have an excellent crop this year, starting in late August, of purple plums and pears. Early grapes will be coming to market soon and locally grown melons have just become available. The total late summer melon crop is down from a year ago but quality is reported excellent.

A good crop of those summer apples for pies and sauce is now available and a good crop of fall apples is predicted, though supplies of Delicious may be smaller. The June freeze didn't hurt the blueberry crop quite as much as first anticipated so there are more available than predicted. Quality has been very good considering... and prices are not out of line for the supplies available.

One might call this the era of the investigation.



An ounce of prevention

When a hijacking episode makes the headlines, most of us center our interest on the "jackers", and tend to forget about the "jacked", the victims, and their harrowing experience.

HOW PEOPLE REACT

What would you do if your plane was hijacked? How would you feel?

At a recent psychiatric meeting, Professor Sylvia R Jacobson, of Florida State University, told what it was like for those like her, who were kidnapped suddenly and without warning. Some 40 families with about 25 young children and 10 babies found themselves diverted from their original destination, New York, to Jordan, in the Middle East. "I found my life running in review in my mind," the Professor said, "with regret at the many opportunities life had offered me and from which I had turned aside".

In addition to a sense of regret, there is, of course, fear. There is physical and mental discomfort, as the hijackers make uncertain threats, unclear and contradictory ultimatums.

One interesting fact was that young people seemed to adapt better to the stress of the situation.

Adults, though more experienced, also had many more panicky fears and anxieties.

There were 14 college students on board, and soon they began to form a peer group. They studied maps, wondering where they were heading, tried to predict their destination, and, in general, looked upon the event with a sense of adventure.

Later, when things got rougher, they helped mothers to take care of the many children on the plane.

TOO MUCH REGRET

Older people, in contrast, seemed to withdraw into

themselves and become more self preoccupied. Despair and pointless regret were their most common reaction.

One elderly woman suddenly spoke up refully about a quarrel she had had with her only relative, and bitterly regretted that there might not be an opportunity to make amends.

"An old Jewish man who had escaped the Nazi terror, stated in a trembling voice that this experience was like the one his friends and relatives had had at the death camps.

"We are innocent people, being led helplessly to destruction, like sheep", he wailed.

Other men and women prayed. Some wept silently. Some sat quietly in frozen terror.

POSITIVE ASPECTS

As in all disasters or dangerous situations that people may go through, the sense of shock wears off after a while, and also feelings of fear and anxiety ebb and flow, depending on the danger.

Sooner or later, however, there is a lowering of the

psychological barriers between people of diverse social and cultural backgrounds. A "we are all in the same boat" type of attitude develops, and people become more friendly and helpful to one another.

The feeling of unity, though temporary, is very strong. People from many different walks of life, different nationalities, races, religions, with differing experiences in life, and sharply opposed private convictions and even fears, were able to find a common ground, and trust each other.

THE OUNCE OF PREVENTION

It is regrettable that it should take a disaster or a dangerous situation to make us behave in a friendly and helpful fashion with one another.

When you feel that family, friends or community are putting too many demands on you, it may be useful to ask yourself, "Would I really feel this way if all of a sudden I was in danger of losing them?"

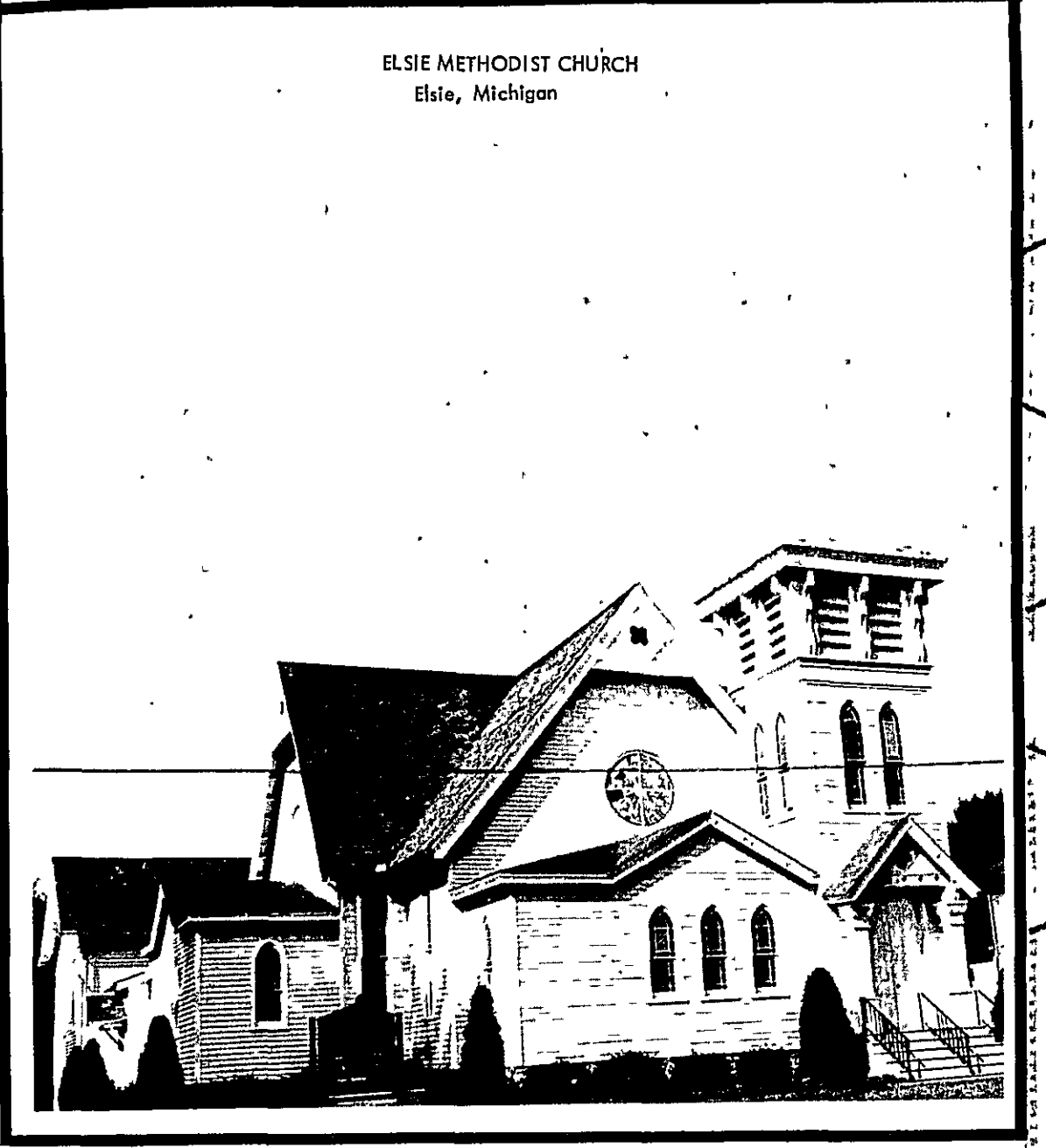

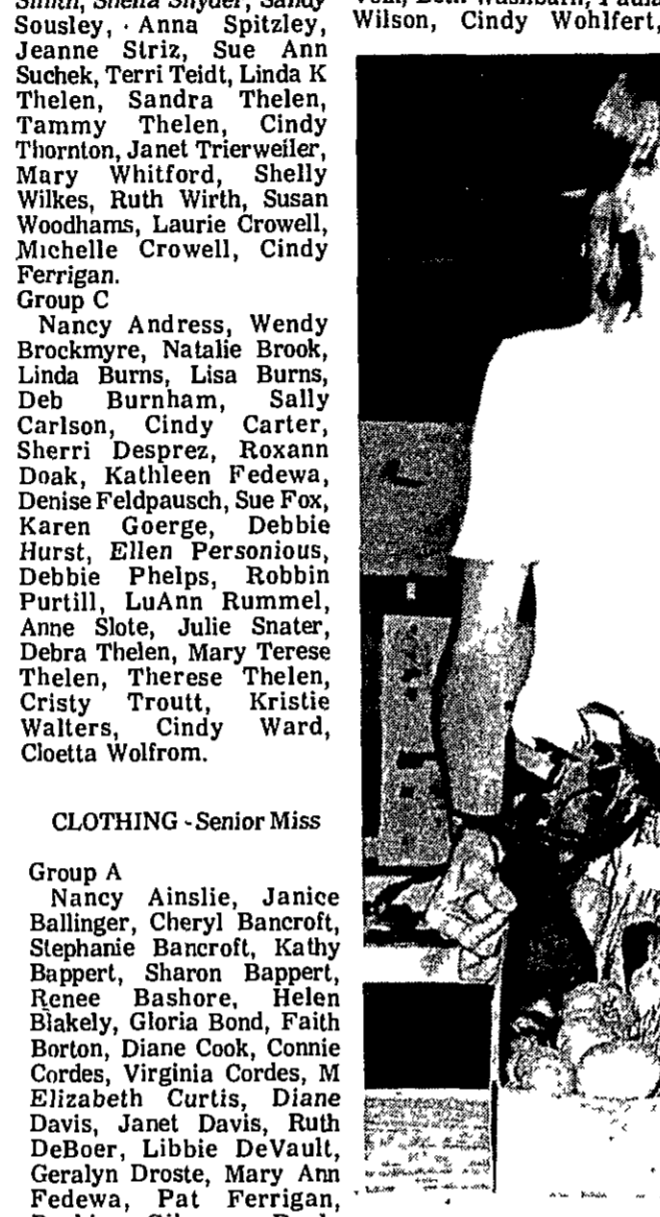

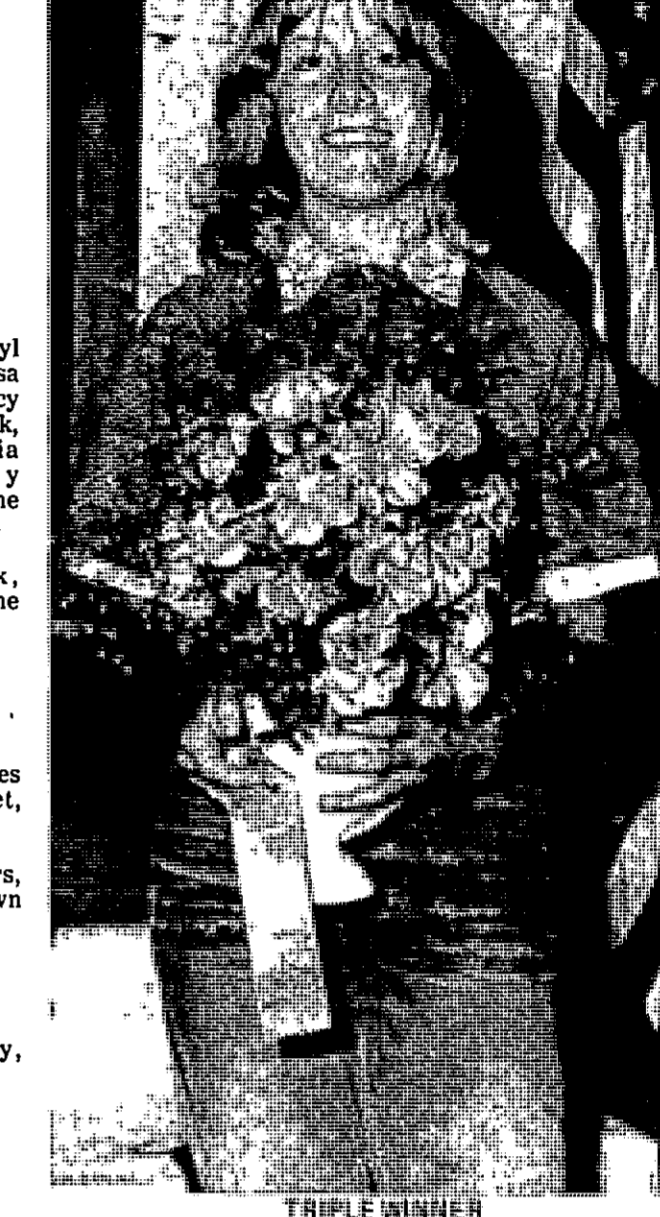

County Board of Commissioners

Tuesday, May 2, 1972

The Clinton County Board of Commissioners met Tuesday, May 2, 1972, at 9:00 a.m. Prayer was offered by Maurice Gove, A Pledge of Allegiance was given to the flag. Roll was called and a quorum reported. Present were Derrill Shinabery, Walter Nobis, Maurice Gove, Robert Dittmer, Duane Chamberlain, Claude Underhill, William Hufnagel, Robert Montgomery, Gerald Lankford, Roy Andrews and Gerald Shepard.

Minutes of the April 18, 1972 meeting were presented. Corrections were made. It was moved by Hufnagel, supported by Chamberlain, to approve the minutes as corrected, Voted and carried.

Communications were read. A communication from Department of Natural Resources in which they expressed appreciation for the interest which County Commissioners have shown in deer and wildlife management programs was read. They invite a representative from the Board to attend the Natural Resources Commission meeting to be held in Cadillac, Michigan at the Caberine Lodge on July 13, 1972 1:30 p.m.

A communication from Bernard Hillenbrand, Executive Director of National Association of Counties, urging support for H.R. 14370, the State and Local Fiscal Assistance Act of 1972, was read. They are requesting counties to express their views (hopefully a favorable one) to their US Congressmen on this important measure. Chairman Shepard referred the matter to the Government and Personnel Committee.

Copies of letters addressed to Richard Allen, State Representative and to Barry McGuire of Michigan Association of Counties from John T. Dempsey, State Budget Director relative to Governor Milliken's position on State Revenue Sharing with counties, was read. Mr. Dempsey stated that a substantial misunderstanding has developed and he seeks to clarify it. Because of this confusion, the governor has asked that the matter be given further consideration. When a final decision is to be made, they will be advised of the Governor's specific plans.

A copy of a letter sent to Clark Kingsbury, Shawassee County Clerk, by Senator William Ballenger, expressing his views on tax on mobile homes in licensed mobile home parks, was read. He also commented on a resolution he had received which strongly opposed Governor Milliken's Revenue Sharing Plan. He also verbally chastised the County Commissioner Boards of Shawassee, Clinton and Eaton counties for adopting resolutions to oppose to SB 1036 and HB 5464 (Home Rule Bills). He feels that these bills would have been a means of solving some of the county problems.

A resolution from Derrill Shinabery requesting a change in the zoning ordinance, was presented. Dittmer moved, supported by Hufnagel, to refer the resolution to the Zoning Commission, Voted and carried.

RESOLUTION

Whereas the Clinton County Zoning Ordinance adopted September 21, 1971 made no allowance for mobile homes in Clinton County and, Whereas it causes undue hardship under certain conditions,

Let it be resolved that the Clinton County Board of Commissioners recommend and petition the Clinton County Zoning Commission to amend the Zoning Ordinance to allow mobile homes for occupancy under certain extenuating circumstances. Said appeal and petition to be heard by the Clinton County Appeal Board to be granted or denied at their discretion.

The Board recessed for committee meetings at 9:50 a.m.

Upon again coming to order, a letter from Michigan Association of Counties concerning wage schedules was referred to the Government and Personnel Committee.

A resolution on Phase II, DeWitt Township, which will amend the resolution passed May 2, 1972 and award the contract to the second lowest bidder. Reason: the low bidder refused to sign a contract.

Andrews moved, supported by Nobis, that the amendment to the Bond Resolution, Phase II, DeWitt Township be adopted. On a roll call vote, those voting aye were Shinabery, Nobis, Gove, Dittmer, Chamberlain, Underhill, Hufnagel, Montgomery, Lankford, Andrews and Shepard. Nays none, 11 ayes, no nays. Motion carried. (This will increase the bond issue by \$710,000.)

Roy Davis, Paul Nobis, Road Commission members; and Jay Hebner, Superintendent appeared. Robert Eldridge, Road Commission Clerk presented the 1971 Annual Report of the Clinton County Road Commission. He reviewed the report and answered questions arising from it. Discussion followed.

Jay Hebner reviewed the construction and maintenance road program for the current year.

The matter of weight restrictions was discussed. The county presently does follow state highway restrictions. Hufnagel moved, supported by Gove, to adopt the Road Commission report as presented. Voted and carried.

Nobis moved, supported by Shinabery, that Equalization Director, Leon Thelen, be authorized to attend the Directors Summer Conference at Petoskey, Michigan on June 21, 22 & 23. Voted and carried.

The Board recessed for lunch at 11:50 a.m.

P.M. SESSION

On again being called to order, Chairman Shepard presented a communication from Michigan Association of Counties. Clinton County will exchange government officials with Oceana County on Government Day, May 22, 1972. Mr. Peter Plosterman is chairman of the Oceana Board. Commissioner Dittmer will act as Master of Ceremonies for the day with activities scheduled to begin at 10:00 a.m. Chairman Shepard presented a committee report on the 4-H Fair Grounds:

1. Rental Rates on Smith Hall - Since no complaints have been received, it was suggested that they remain the same.
2. Cleaning of the Draperies - Now that the construction of the new entrance is completed, it was suggested that the draperies be dry cleaned since they are really dirty and have not been cleaned since they were put up in 1967.
3. Horse Wash Rack - The 4-H horse leaders have asked to put up a wash rack for their horses during the 4-H Fair. The size would be approximately 12' x 24' and would cost about \$300.00.
4. Possible use of Fairgrounds for 4th of July Celebration - The City of St. Johns has said that 1972 is the last year they will allow the 4th of July celebration to be held on the City Park area as it damages the grass seeding and playground area. It was suggested that the Fairgrounds might be a possible site for 1973. No action was taken as this decision will be left to the total Board.
5. Parking Lot Area - There is a need for general improvement of the parking area plus a need for additional area past the Quonset. Mr. Shepard will check with the other Commissioners.
6. Election of Officers - They will remain the same for 1972 since no election was held - Earl Haas, Chairman and John Aylsworth, Secretary.
7. Seeding the Fairgrounds - The seeding of the grass area is to be done this spring around the arena area.

Commissioner Lankford moved, supported by Nobis, to refer the matter to the Property Management Committee. Voted and carried.

Dittmer presented a Property Management Committee Report:

1. County Insurance program. The committee has met with the present insurance carrier (Allaby & Brewbaker) and the Farm Bureau Insurance Company. They seek direction in finding the best solution to securing the best insurance coverage for the county.

Nobis moved, supported by Gove, that the Property Management Committee and the interested insurance agents meet and draw up specifications for the best possible insurance program for the county. Voted and carried.

2. Roof repairs - Bids submitted for repairs to the Children's Home at \$248.00 and Smith Hall retarring at a cost of \$1,320.00.

Dittmer moved, supported by Hufnagel, to approve the bid of Whitaker Roofing Company at a cost of \$1,568.00 to repair roofs at the Children's Home and Smith Hall. Voted and carried.

Commissioner Shinabery reported on a meeting with the Building Authority Commission. Apparently there is not sufficient area to build on the Maple Street property (former Oatley property). They recommend placing the new building (District Court) on county owned property next to the present Welfare Building on Oakland Street.

Dittmer moved, supported by Andrews, that upon the recommendation of the Building Authority, the Board does hereby approve the Elm Street property as the site for the proposed District Court Building. Voted and carried, unanimously.

Bids on Sheriff Patrol cars were as follows: (two cars)

Lankford moved, supported by Shinabery, that the bid of Egan Ford Sales trade-in difference \$4,342.78 for 2 Sheriff Patrol cars be accepted. Voted and carried.

The Board recessed at 3:00 p.m.

Upon resuming session, a letter from Lansing Mayor Graves to meet at his office May 3 at 8:15 a.m. to discuss and form a cooperative manpower program was read. Also an answer from Eugene Wanger, Chairman Ingham Board of Commissioners in which he outlined some suggested rules adopted by Ingham, Eaton, Clinton Counties and Tri County Regional Planning Commission was also read.

Nobis moved, supported by Montgomery, that the following resolution be adopted. Voted and carried.

RESOLUTION

Whereas, the Government and Personnel Committee has reviewed the request from the Mayor of the City of Lansing to participate in a Manpower Area Policy Board for the Tri-County Area, composed of the chief officials of Eaton, Clinton, Ingham Counties and the City of Lansing, Therefore, be it resolved that the Clinton County Board of Commissioners agrees that the basic concept of a Tri-County Regional Manpower Planning Council, with the understanding that no one government representative will have the principal authority over other governmental units and that an appropriate check and balance system of authority be established.

Nobis reporting on Tri County Regional Planning Commission moved, supported by Andrews, to approve the resolution which will expand membership of the Tri County Regional Planning Commission Board from nine to sixteen members. Voted and carried.

Nobis moved, supported by Andrews, that the contribution from participating units be as follows: \$800 for the combined townships of each county; \$800 for the combined cities and villages of each county; and \$2400 for the City of Lansing. Voted and carried.

Nobis moved, supported by Hufnagel, that the Tri County Regional Planning Commission as restructured be renamed Tri County Regional Coordinating Commission. Voted and carried.

Lankford reported on Community Mental Health Budget. He moved, supported by Nobis, to recommend the transfer

of \$6,000 from General Fund, unappropriated surplus account, to the Tri County Mental Health Board to pay the balance of the 1971 budgeted appropriation. (This action will amend the 1972 budget) and to pay as follows: replace lost check, 1971 appropriation, \$6,000-balance of 1971 appropriation, \$6,000. Total appropriation for 1971 of \$12,000. Voted and carried.

Lankford moved, supported by Nobis, to pay at this time \$6,000 of the 1972 appropriation. Voted and carried. Lankford moved, supported by Hufnagel, to approve the payment of \$8,292.07 for bills audited for the month. Voted and carried.

Nobis moved, supported by Gove, that the County Equalization Director be appointed to represent Clinton County at the State Tax Commission hearing to be held at Lansing May 22, 1972. Voted and carried.

Nobis moved, supported by Hufnagel, to recommend to the Zoning Commission, that the provision in the Zoning Ordinance dealing with Special Use Permits be revised to omit special use permits. Said use to be covered by zoning regulations. Voted and carried.

Shinabery moved, supported by Nobis, that Chairman Shepard be authorized to attend CAPACOG to represent Clinton County. Voted and carried.

Commissioner Chamberlain reported a request from the Drain Commissioner for an aide to assist in DPW work. He moved, supported by Andrews, that the Drain Commissioner be authorized to hire an aide. Voted and carried.

Nobis moved, supported by Chamberlain, that the salary be set at \$6500 per year. Voted and carried. Montgomery moved, supported by Hufnagel, to adjourn at this time and to meet again Tuesday, May 23, 1972 at 9:00 a.m. Voted and carried. Meeting adjourned.

The Clinton County Board of Commissioners met Tuesday, May 23, 1972 at 9:00 a.m. Prayer was offered by Maurice Gove. A Pledge of Allegiance was given to the flag. Roll was called and a quorum reported. Present were Derrill Shinabery, Walter Nobis, Maurice Gove, Robert Dittmer, Duane Chamberlain, Claude Underhill, William Hufnagel, Robert Montgomery, Gerald Lankford, Roy Andrews and Gerald Shepard.

Minutes of the May 2, 1972 meeting were presented. Corrections were made. It was moved by Hufnagel, supported by Chamberlain, to approve the minutes as corrected. Voted and carried.

Chairman Shepard requested the Board's approval to insert an ad in the local newspaper for bids on furnishing radio communications equipment. Discussion followed. Lankford moved, supported by Montgomery, to advertise as per original specifications. Voted and carried. Communications were read.

A letter from MacCabees Mutual Life Insurance Company informing this Board that effective June 1, 1972, life insurance rates on our Sick, Accidental & Life Policy for county employees will be decreased from 86¢ to 81¢.

A letter from Garry Brown, our Congressional Representative, acknowledging consideration of our Board's interest in H.R. 14370 on revenue sharing, was read.

The communication from James S. Hyde, Executive Secretary of the State Boundary Commission stating the commission's approval in the matter of the proposed annexation of territory in DeWitt and Watertown Townships to the City of Lansing, was read and placed on file.

Richard Dell and Claire Hulet from the State Audit Division appeared. Mr. Dell briefly reviewed a report written by himself as regards Clinton County's accounting system. He answered questions arising from it. They are requesting a total county budget request to be filed in the County Clerk's Office. This will include County Road Commission, Social Services, Mental Health and Mid-Michigan Health Department, etc.

The Board recessed at 10:35 a.m. On again coming to order, communications were resumed.

An invitation from Michigan Association of Counties to attend the annual meeting to be held at Mackinaw Island August 14-16th was presented.

Lankford moved, supported by Gove, to send a letter of protest to State Association and to all counties, that we think it is unrealistic to hold the annual meeting at such an expensive place. Nobis moved, supported by Hufnagel, to amend the motion by adding that the Chairman and one other commissioner be authorized to attend the meeting. Voted and carried. Voting on the motion as amended, voted and carried unanimously.

A letter from RCA, communications system division, stating that RCA would be pleased to formulate written specifications for Clinton County communications system, was received and placed on file.

A letter from Michigan Department of Public Health informing Clinton County of a new service to be effective August 1. The program will offer preventative health services to children under twenty-one.

House Bill 5869 was presented which would appropriate \$500,000 as attorney fees for indigent persons appealing from Circuit Court trial. No action taken.

Chairman Shepard reported on a CAPACOG meeting. John Roetman of Meridian Township was chosen chairman, Lucille Belen of the City of Lansing was named vice-chairman, also some committees were named.

The Board recessed for lunch at 12:00 noon.

P.M. SESSION

Upon resuming session, Arnold Minarik presented the recommendations of and the action taken by the Zoning Commission at their April 25, 1972 meeting.

Item III, Greenbush Twp. (Ernest Huss) Rezone from B-1, Local Business to A-1, Agricultural on the following described parcel of land: Part of SE-1/4 of NE-1/4, Sec. 8, T8N-R2W, com. 670' N. of SE cor. thereof, th N to NE cor thereof, W to NW cor thereof, S. to SW cor thereof, E. to a pt 1135 ft W of SE cor thereof, th N 37 degrees E 836' to a pt 635' W of P.O.B., th E 635 to P.O.B.

Montgomery moved, supported by Chamberlain, to deny the request to rezone. Voted and carried.

Item VIII, DeWitt Township (DeWitt Twp. Police Dept.) Application for a Special Use Permit to erect a radio antenna on the following described parcel of land: NE cor. of the E-1/2 of NW-1/4, Sec. 18, T5N-R2W, Clinton County, Michigan.

Lankford moved, supported by Andrews, to approve the request and grant a Special Use Permit. Voted and carried.

Mr. Minarik presented a revised fee schedule for building permits and requested the Board consideration of the matter. Shinabery moved, supported by Montgomery, to refer the matter to the Zoning Committee to investigate and make a recommendation to the Board. Voted and carried.

Roger Shutes appeared and requested permission to change (transfer) a budgetary line item which would allow implementation of Homemaker Service for clients of the Department of Social Services Department. This is a Federally-funded project with a yearly cost of \$9,251.64 of which the county's share will be \$2,310.41. Shinabery moved, supported by Andrews, to approve the request to transfer the sum of \$2,310.41 within the Social Services Department budget to implement the Homemaker Service Program. On a roll call vote, those voting aye were Shinabery, Dittmer, Chamberlain, Underhill and Andrews. Nays were Nobis, Hufnagel, Montgomery, Lankford and Shepard. 5 ayes, 5 nays. Gove was absent. The motion did not carry.

Lankford moved, supported by Andrews, to refer the matter to the Health Committee with instructions to investigate and report at the next meeting. Voted and carried. The Chairman declared a recess at 3:00 p.m.

Upon again resuming session, Herbert Maier of Tri County Regional Planning Commission stated that the restructuring of Tri County Regional Planning Commission is progressing satisfactorily. They are meeting with the new governmental unit members and hope to be in full operation in the near future, hopefully during July of this year. He then distributed copies of a Solid Waste brochure.

The lease agreement with Rademacher Development Company and the county on the building now under remodeling for the Social Services Department was discussed and agreed upon.

Velma Beaufore presented the Annual Report of the Treasurer's Office and answered questions pertaining to it. Dittmer moved, supported by Underhill, to accept the Treasurer's Report and to place on file. Voted and carried.

RESOLUTION
WHEREAS, Representative Mittan introduced House Bill 6166 on April 19, 1972, and WHEREAS, this proposed legislation is identical to legislation sponsored by the state Social Services Dept., and WHEREAS, the legislation removes county authority in selecting social service department staff, and WHEREAS, this authority was one of the agreed conditions under which the county and state merged their welfare departments, and WHEREAS the Michigan County Social Services Association is an affiliate member of the Michigan Association of Counties, and opposes this bill, and WHEREAS, it is understood the executive secretary of M.A.C. is supporting Representative Mittan's proposal, contrary to the wishes of the counties. NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that we instruct our legislators to oppose this bill and any similar proposals which removes authority from the counties. BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the executives of the Michigan Association of Counties meet their official responsibilities by opposing this kind of legislation which weakens its own membership, and violates the spirit of the existing affiliation of the Michigan County Social Service Organization. BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, a copy of this resolution be sent to all State Senators and Representatives.

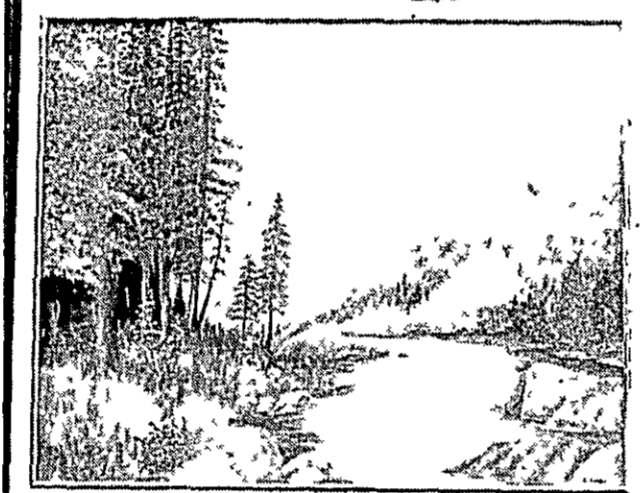
