FACT finder

Are you concerned about getting the straight fact on some question which arises but don't quite know where to find the answer?

Q-It's great to have Airport Road paved! But what about shoulders? Are they just going to let the project drop?

A-Here's "great" news. The "grader" has been on the Clinton County road, according to a spokesman for the county road commission. The reason for the delay is not enough help and money. They do plan to put gravel where the road is low. But first oils must evaporate out of the asphalt so it isn't marked up when heavy equipment returns.

Q-I know curiosity killed the cat. But what's the ladder doing on the courthouse steeple? SK, ST JOHNS

A-Don't get all rung up! There's a logical answer says R G Becker, head of maintenance at the court house. It's to unscrew the 500 watt bulbs in flood lights on the steeple. The ladder lets workmen on the roof to do the job. Bulbs are only changed every 6 to 8 months, but even then it can be a "highly" dangerous job. Any volunteers?

Q-If this situation doesn't get settled, I'm going to have to resort to a bottle of sleeping pills. Can your neighbors ride minibikes to all hours of the night. Please help cure my insomnia! LS, ST JOHNS

A-St Johns Police Department to the rescue. It's legal to ride minibikes only on your own property. If they're buzzing around at a late hour, operators could receive a summons for disturbing the peace. Pleasant dreams.

Q-Seems like a lot of motorists are confused at the traffic pattern at the corner of US-27 and Sturgis St in St Johns. Is this causing a high number of fender benders? AJ, ST JOHNS

A-Not that many people are getting their signals crossed. At least that's what Richard Blost of the State Highway Department reports. A traffic survey was made before the signal was installed at the request of local citizens and a followup will be made after it's been in operation a year. It looks like the light won't be changing right away.

Commission takes action to help communications

ST JOHNS - St Johns City Commissioners look action Monday night toward creating the post of a fire commissioner as a means of improving communications between volunteer firemen and the city.

Commissioner Roy Ebert presented the motion which would amend Ordinance 120. The present ordinance requires firemen to report to the entire city commission. Under the new proposal, a fire commissioner would be appointed by the mayor to handle negotiations with firemen, City Attorney Paul Maples was instructed to prepare the necessary amendment.

IN MAKING the motion, Ebert said "instead of reporting to five people, they'd report to only one." He added that "we need some communication where people can work together."

St Johns Fire Chief Clare Maier reports his men are "very unhappy" over the commission's refusal to act upon their request for higher wages. The request was made after the new budget was finalized and commissioners have indicated next spring will be the proper time to consider higher wages for firemen.

City Manager Harvey Weatherwax submitted a report to the commission Monday night which contained recommendations on the firemen's pay

requests following a meeting he held with Chief Maier. First a motion by Commissioner Ebert to accept the report and consider it at the proper time was tabled on another motion by Commissioner John Hannah. The motion to table the matter was defeated as Commissioners Ebert, Dr James Grost and Jeanne Rand voted no.

EBERT'S ORIGINAL motion was then presented and gained a 4-1 passage. Rand voted against the motion and stated "the fire chief has asked for

something concrete he can tell his firemen."

At this point, Maier told the commission "I think you're going to have to ask for a whole new fire department." He declined to make further comment but said a meeting of firemen is planned for tonight.

The recommendations developing from the meeting between Weatherwax and Maier trimmed an original wage increase request drawn up by firemen. Present wages for firemen are \$5 the first hour and \$4 thereafter with a \$2

standby fee paid for rural calls. Firemen wanted \$7 the first hour and \$6 thereafter with a \$3 standby fee plus \$150 per man added to the Blue Cross Escrow Fund. The report by Weatherwax recommended \$6 the first hour and \$5 per hour thereafter. The City Manager's report agreed with firemen on the \$1 increase for the standby fee but suggested the Blue Cross Fund remain the same. A final point of Weatherwax's recommendations suggested "a duly appointed group from the fire depart-

ment" meet with the city commission when proposed budgets are prepared between April 1 and June 1 each year.

OTHER ACTION taken by the commission Monday night included: - an annexation petition from Willard Searles concerning property on the city's northeast side was tabled when Searles failed to appear. The commission was told Searles was attending a Bingham Township meeting to gain approval for de-annexation.

Rezoning question looms over plans for new store

ST JOHNS - To be or not to be, that's the question.

The architect's sketch shown above is a \$1 million structure Bobenal Investment Company of Alma tentatively plans to build for the Kroger Company on a site southwest of Southgate Shopping Plaza in St Johns.

Presently a one-half acre tract of the proposed building site is zoned single family residential and Bobenal seeks a rezoning change to commercial to proceed with construction of the new store. Bobenal is presently the landlord for businesses located in the Southgate Plaza and would lease the new building to Kroger.

The question of whether or not Bobenal's plans become a reality developed during an August meeting of the St Johns Planning Commission when property owners near Southgate voiced objection to the zoning change.

They contend such a structure would overload the area's sewer system and also create a traffic problem. Bobenal has offered to construct garden apartments between the new Kroger store and nearby residential housing which would serve as a buffer zone. This suggestion developed when area residents expressed concern over commercial buildings too close to their homes.

Alma attorney Al Fortino, a spokesman for Bobenal, said Monday "We've investigated the possibility of garden apartments and we think this is economically feasible." He explained such a complex would "form a complete" buffer for the residents in this area.

Pointing out the growth of St Johns, Fortino added "We feel that there's no other use for the land." He stressed the expanded shopping area is one thing necessary to satisfy consumer needs resulting from such growth.

Fortino made it clear Bobenal is aware of existing problems his firm faces in proceeding with their plans. "I think it's more beneficial than harmful," he said, "and we'd like to (complete the project) if it's possible."

The rezoning request will be a major item of the St Johns Planning Commission agenda at the September 7th meeting. A recommendation from this group then is sent to the St Johns City Commission for final approval or rejection. Until then, the question of a new Kroger store in St Johns remains just that. A big question.



Sen. Griffin visit sparks Clinton GOP campaign

ST JOHNS - US Senator Robert Griffin made a campaign swing through the Mid-Michigan area Monday making an afternoon stop in St Johns.

The Republican incumbent from Traverse City strolled along Clinton county seat's main street greeting early week shoppers. His visit to St Johns was staged as part of the Senator's bid for reelection in November.

THE ST JOHNS stop was under the direction of Griffin's county campaign leader, Stuart Fitzpatrick of Fowler. Fitzpatrick introduced the Senator to local supporters while Griffin girls handed out pamphlets, buttons and bumper stickers. Would-be Griffin voters in the 1980's walked around in feathered headbands.

Griffin talked to a large crowd, in-

cluding county officials on the courthouse lawn. Listeners flocked under the towering shade trees to escape temperatures in the high 80's.

Passing up an opportunity to speak on busing, Griffin told supporters of many other important issues at stake. He voiced concern over enticing the young vote this fall. "One of the things I like to be sure to get across," he spoke, "is that two years ago I sponsored the first constitutional amendment to give the vote to 18-year-olds. He added he supported it twice when it lost.

Another important issue, according to Griffin, is women's rights. Griffin explained that he is co-sponsoring the equal rights bill for women which has passed the Congress and is on its way to the legislature. And, he continued, I was the first to recommend a woman (Cornelia Kennedy) to be a federal court judge. The first girl page in the Senate (Deborah Kanter) was ap-

pointed by him.

Griffin admitted he hasn't got involved in abortion reform, saying he feels it's a state issue. "It's supposed to be a state matter," he decided, "but I am opposed to federal legislation in that field."

Griffin, who introduced Spiro T Agnew at this month's Republican National Convention in Miami, revealed he's not going to speculate on '76. He said he is going to devote his full efforts for this campaign. He will oppose now State Attorney General Frank Kelly on the November ballot.

The candidate left St Johns saying his experience in the county has always been very heartwarming. "I've got some oldtime friends here," he related, "referring to the Fred Lewises." "Some of the most active leaders in the Republican party come from Clinton," he announced. "I always feel at home here."

Tentative agreement reached

ST JOHNS--A six-hour session between the St Johns Education Association and the board of education Tuesday night Aug 22 has ended in a tentative agreement.

St Johns School Superintendent Earl Lancaster reported the two parties came to terms in the 1972-73 contract with the aid of a state-appointed mediator. A final settlement at the meeting came in the early morning

THE COMPLETE board met with the SJEA negotiating team led by Don Valentine, negotiating chairman. Teachers will hold a ratification this week and will return to the classroom next Wednesday when the new school year begins.

Lancaster said the board will be voting on the contract as its Sept 13 meeting. Details of the contract will be announced at that time.

School awards bid

Central National Bank has been awarded the bid from St Johns Public Schools for a one-year note at 2.95% annual interest to be used as operating capital.

According to Supt Earl Lancaster, "it's a routine affair that is done every year." He explained the \$455,000 loan due Sept 1, 1973 is necessary to meet operating costs until the school's state aid is received. Lancaster said the first payment of state aid was received in August but the next one does not arrive until October. He explained the loan is used to meet the expenditures due upon the opening of school in September. The only other bidder was Clinton National Bank.



Hosing down the highway

Traffic was tied up briefly on South US-27 near the Wheel Inn Tuesday, Aug 22 while St Johns firemen used spray nozzles to clear debris off the rain slicked highway following a car-truck accident. According to police, 50-year-old Donald Coll of Fowlerville was making a left turn into the Wheel Inn when an auto driven by 16-year-old Jeanne Lynne Caesar struck his truck in the rear. Witnesses told police the truck's turn signals were working and Miss Caesar was ticketed for failure to stop in the assured clear distance ahead. No serious injuries were reported.

City of DeWitt - Ordinance No. 75

An Ordinance to provide for the incorporation of the City of DeWitt Building Authority in order to acquire, furnish, equip, own, improve, enlarge, operate and maintain buildings, automobile parking lots or structures, recreational facilities and the necessary sites therefor, for the use of the City of DeWitt, a Michigan Corporation; to provide for compensation of authority commissioners; to permit transfers of property to the Building Authority; to authorize the execution of contracts pertaining to the authority property and the use thereof; to provide for the issuance of revenue bonds by the authority; to validate action taken and bonds issued by the

authority; to provide for the disposal of authority property and to provide other powers, rights and duties as provided by Public Act 31 of 1948 as amended being Michigan Statutes Annotated, Section 5.30 (1-15).

Article I
The name of the corporation is the City of DeWitt Building Authority.

Article II
The incorporating unit creating this authority is the City of DeWitt, Michigan.

Article III
This authority is incorporated for the purpose of acquiring, furnishing, equipping, owning, improving, enlarging, operating and maintaining a building or buildings,

automobile parking lots or structures, recreational facilities and the necessary site or sites therefor, or any other property permitted by Act 31 of 1948 as amended for the use of the City of DeWitt.

Article IV
This authority shall be a body corporate with power to sue or be sued in any court of this state; it shall possess all the powers, privileges and authority set forth in Act 31 of the Public Acts of Michigan for 1948 as amended. It shall also possess all powers set forth in these articles and those incident thereto and the enumeration of any powers herein shall not be construed as a limitation upon its general powers unless the context shall clearly indicate

otherwise. This authority shall possess all the powers necessary to carry out the purposes of its incorporation and those incident thereto.

Section 1.
This Authority and the incorporating unit shall have the power to enter into a contract or contracts whereby the authority will acquire property necessary to accomplish the purposes of this incorporation and contemplated by the terms of the enabling Act, and lease said property to the incorporating unit for a period not to exceed forty (40) years.

Section 2.
This authority shall have power to increase the consideration specified in any contract of lease with the incorporating unit whenever during the term of the lease on leases an increase of rent is necessary to provide funds to meet its obligations.

Section 3.
For the purpose of accomplishing the objects of its incorporation, the authority may acquire property by purchase, construction, lease gift, devise or condemnation, and for the purpose of condemnation it may proceed under the provisions of Act No 149 hereafter amended, or any other appropriate statute.

Section 4.
This authority shall have the right power and privilege of issuing self-liquidating revenue bonds pursuant to the terms of Section 11 of Act 31 of the Public Acts of Michigan for 1948 - (Extra Session) as amended, and pursuant to the provisions of Act 94 of the Public Acts of 1933 as now or hereafter amended, pertaining to the self-liquidating revenue bonds provided that such bonds shall be payable solely from the revenue of any property of the Authority, which revenue shall be deemed to include payments made under any lease or contract for the use of such property; and provided further that no such bonds shall be issued unless the property whose revenues are pledged has been based by the Authority for a period extending beyond the last maturity of the bonds. The issuance of such revenue bonds shall be subject to the referendum provisions of Act 31 of the Public Acts of Michigan for 1948 (Extra

Session) as now or hereafter amended, and of the referendum provisions of Act 94 of the Public Acts of 1933 as now or hereafter amended.

Section 5.
When all bonds issued pursuant to the provisions of the enabling act under which the authority is incorporated shall have been retired, the authority may convey title to the property acquired hereunder to the incorporating unit in accordance with any agreement adopted by the governing body of the incorporating unit.

Mr and Mrs Lloyd Brocker spent the weekend with Mr and Mrs Theodore Piotrowicz and family of Novi.

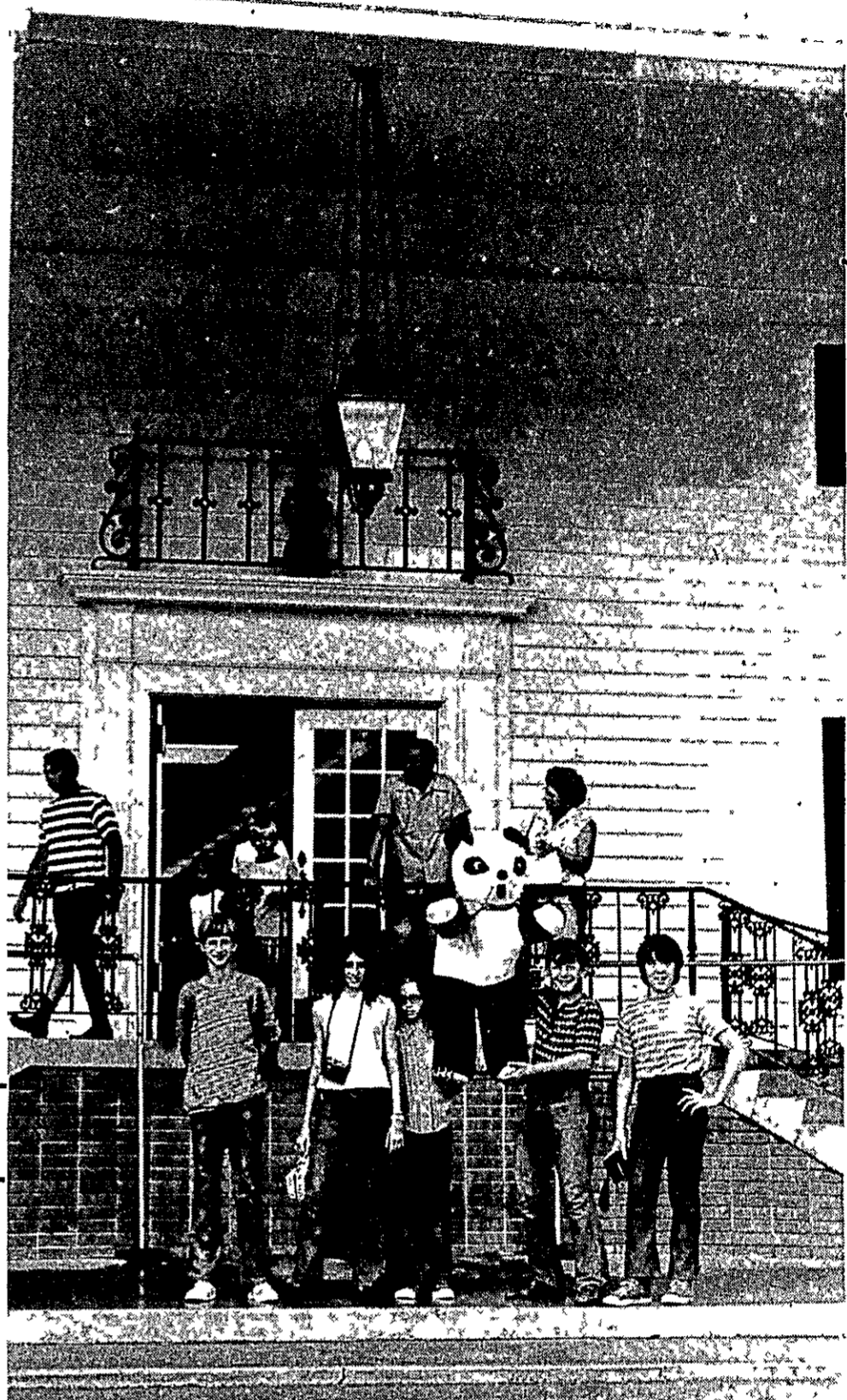

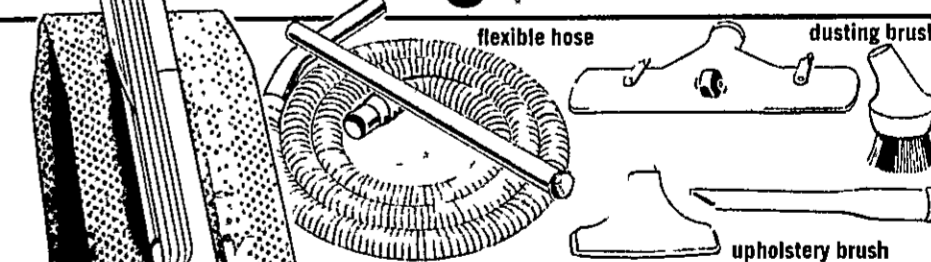

Elsie High School building is removed

ELSIE—A bit of history was removed from Elsie with the tearing down of the former Elsie High School this week. Its removal during the week brought many former students and residents to the scene as workmen started to dismantle the structure which had been erected in 1903. Last May a public sale, headed by the Ovid-Elsie FFA students brought many former students back to the school to purchase mementos in the building such as desks, light fixtures, panels of slate board, music stands and books. Prior to its demolition school officials found several record books in the basement dating back to 1883. Among the treasures found were student grade records, guest books, records of some of the first school board meetings and

copies of the first annual which was compiled by the class of 1909. Don Kenney, Ovid-Elsie School superintendent said he is interested in locating former teachers, students, school board members or any person that had any connection with the structure from the time it was built. "Nothing is formalized yet" said Kenney "but later in the year perhaps a ceremony can be planned." He stated that letters and calls are already starting to come in from former associates of the school. Mrs Lawrence Hess of Elsie, historian of the Elsie Alumnae Association, told the NEWS that there is one living member of the first class to graduate from the building. She is Mrs Dora Nooney Lowry who is a 1904 graduate and still makes her home in Elsie. Others listed in the first class were Eva Bates Huntoon, Elizabeth

Rumbaugh Hess, Lloyd Craven, Ernest Woodard, Vera Taylor, Donnah Lee, Alberta Chase, Laura Peck Bouch and Ina Caswell. Records show that the very first class to graduate from high school in Elsie was in 1887. "The school was a one room wooden building, located slightly north of the building now being torn down" said Mrs Hess. Records also indicate that the first commencement was held on June 3 with a class of 9 students receiving their diplomas. The building, now being torn down was used by the system until 1966 and an addition which was erected in 1950 will be retained and used by the Elsie junior high students. A portion of the basement area will be used for storage. As school officials dug through past records of the building they discovered that costs to demolish the building will exceed the costs of its construction.

Zeeb named to 4-H post

ST JOHNS—Robert Zeeb of Bath has been appointed by top officials of Ford Motor Company, the Michigan Farm Bureau, and Michigan State University to serve as Clinton County Agricultural chairman of the 4-H Bonanza.

BONANZA IS an auction-exhibition involving Michigan agriculture, industry, and education in joint support of expanded opportunities for Michigan youth.

Zeeb's affiliation with the event was announced officially August 24 by the triumvirate chairmen of Bonanza: Benson Ford, Vice President, Ford Motor Company; Elton Smith, president, Michigan Farm Bureau; and Dr Clifton Wharton, president, Michigan State University.

As county agricultural chairman, Zeeb will be responsible for motivating and involving key agricultural individuals within Clinton County and organizing countywide support for Bonanza.

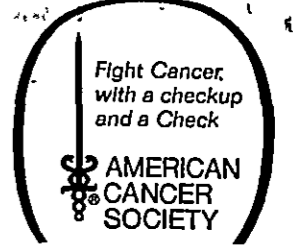

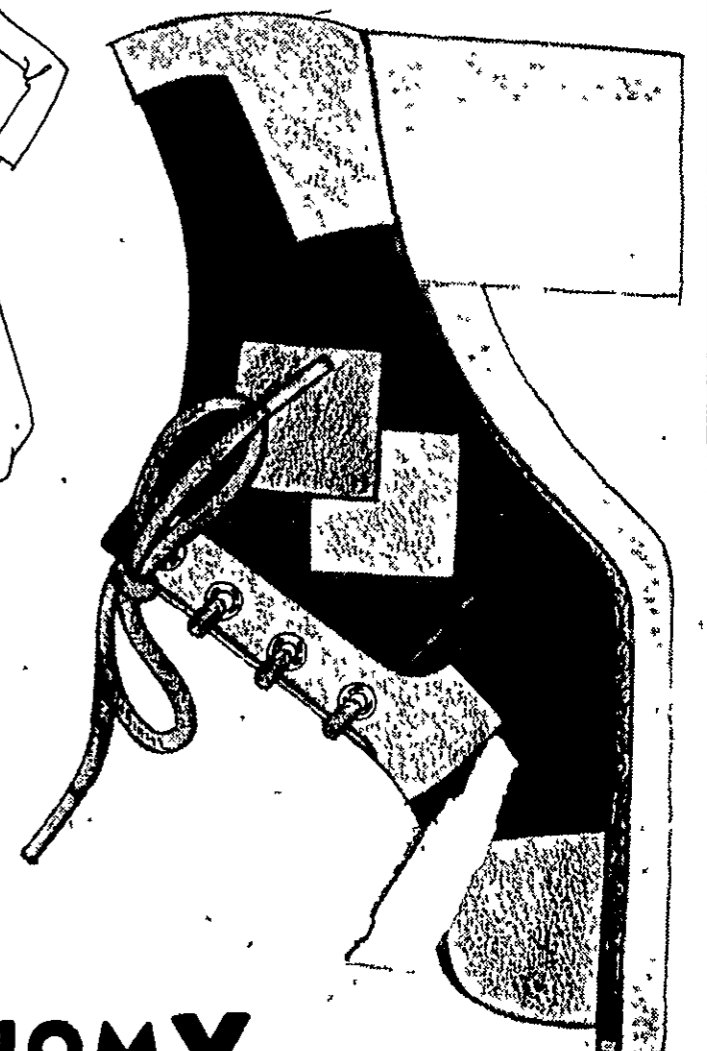

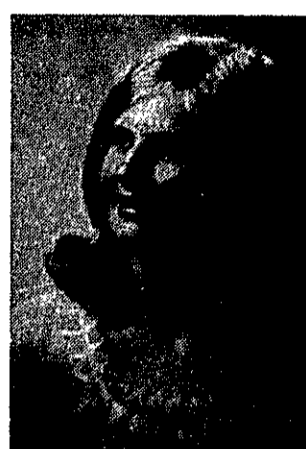

ORDINANCE NO. 249
AN ORDINANCE TO VACATE A PORTION OF RAILROAD STREET RIGHT-OF-WAY WITHIN THE CITY OF ST. JOHNS.
THE CITY OF ST. JOHNS ORDAINS:

Section 1. Vacation of Street Right-of-Way. The City Commission of the City of St. Johns hereby vacates a portion of Railroad Street right-of-way, being more particularly described as follows:

The North 2 feet of Railroad Street right-of-way, traversing parallel to the West 58 feet of Lot 117, vacated Traver Street, and all of Lot 118, according to the original plat of the City of St. Johns.

Section 2. Compliance with Charter. The City Commission, in adopting this Ordinance, certifies that a public hearing has been held after due notice to those persons entitled to receive notice; that a resolution declaring the City Commission's intent to vacate said street right-of-way and other provisions of the City Charter relative to vacating streets and alleys have been complied with.

Section 3. Easement Retained. Notwithstanding the vacation of said street right-of-way, the City of St. Johns retains for itself, for the benefit of the public, an easement, under, over and across said vacated premises, for the installation, maintenance and repair of any drains, sewer, water pipes, gas pipes, electric and telephone lines and other essential utilities, said easement being perpetual and unlimited unless hereinafter released by the City Commission.


Section 4. Effective Date. The effective date of this Ordinance shall be the 20th day after its passage.

PASSED, ORDAINED AND ORDERED PUBLISHED THIS 28th DAY OF AUGUST, A.D., 1972, BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF ST. JOHNS AT A REGULAR MEETING HELD ON SAID DATE.

ORDINANCE NO. 248 AN ORDINANCE TO CREATE A LOCAL OFFICERS COMPENSATION COMMISSION FOR THE CITY OF ST. JOHNS. THE CITY OF ST. JOHNS ORDAINS:

The City of St. Johns, a duly chartered home rule city, pursuant to the provisions of Public Act No. 8 of 1972, MSA 5.2084 (3), is desirous of creating a local officers compensation commission, pursuant to the provisions and for the purposes set forth in said Act.

Section 1. The Mayor of the City of St. Johns is hereby authorized to appoint a five member local officers compensation commission whose terms of office shall be the member first appointed shall serve one (1) year; second appointed two (2) years, etc., until the fifth appointed, serving a five (5) year term.

Section 2. Said local officers compensation commission shall have the powers and duties as set forth by the above captioned Act.

Section 3. Said local officers compensation commission shall serve without salary, but shall be entitled to actual and necessary expenses incurred in the performance of their duties.

Section 4. This Ordinance shall take effect twenty (20) days after its passage. PASSED, ORDAINED AND ORDERED PUBLISHED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF ST. JOHNS AT A REGULAR MEETING HELD THIS 28th DAY OF AUGUST, A.D., 1972.

County agent cautions farmers on corn blight

By WILLIAM LASHER, Clinton County Agricultural Agent

Southern Corn Leaf Blight has been found in various areas of Clinton County. The past ten days of warm, wet, humid weather has been the ideal growing conditions for the fungus Helminthosporium maydis which causes Southern Corn Leaf Blight.

Farmers should check their fields for southern corn leaf blight. It usually attacks the lower leaves first; lesions range from minute specks to spots 1/2 inch wide and 1 1/2 inches long. They are oblong parallel-sided, and grayish-tan to tan. Occasionally they may have a dark brown to purplish margin.

In most of the fields I have seen the lower two to three leaves are nearly completely blasted (entirely brown, dry and brittle, with the leaf totally covered with lesions).

Lesions can be found on all leaves from the root to tassel with the upper leaves having progressively fewer lesions the higher they are on the plant. Usually all leaves will show lesions with the top-most leaves having fewer in number and smaller with less damage evident. The control for Southern

Corn Leaf Blight is to plant seed with normal (N) cytoplasm which is resistant to the blight. Corn with Texas male sterile (T) cytoplasm is susceptible to Southern Corn Leaf Blight and with the weather conditions this year will show symptoms of blight.

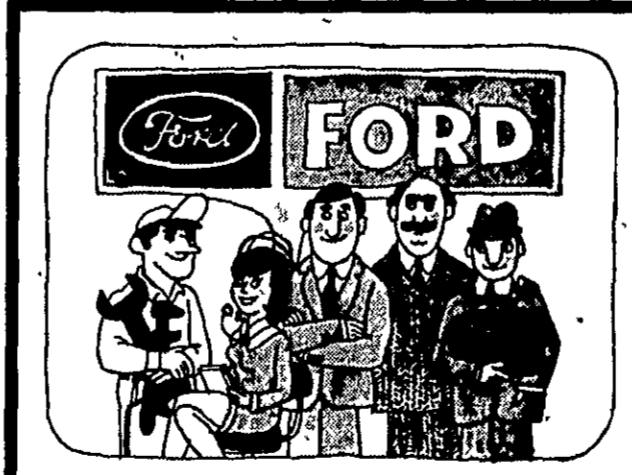
The loss of leaves due to the blight will weaken the plant and make it more susceptible to stalk rots; also the blight may attack the grain at the ear tip or enter the ear stalk and attack the cob.

You should check all cornfields for blight starting with those planted with "T" seed. Depending upon the damage evident you may want to harvest infected fields for silage in place of grain or if you ensile most of your corn, harvest infected fields first.

AG in ACTION

Some Chicago housewives are more irritated with the butchers' union than food prices these days. It all started when several chain stores decided to keep stores open until midnight every day to accommodate women with full or part-time jobs who cannot find time to shop during regular hours and Saturdays. One chain in the Chicago area even keeps its stores open 24 hours a day, including Sundays.

The response from consumers has been great, but then many shoppers discovered that the butchers' union contract with Chicago area stores prohibits the sale of fresh meat after 6:00 pm. This regulation prevails even though most of the meat is pre-cut and packaged during regular working hours by union members and is on display in self-service refrigerated counters.

The union contract which prohibits sales of meat after 6:00 pm was first made back in 1919 before the era of supermarkets and when union meat cutters were seeking shorter hours. The contract is out of date with our modern marketing system and consumer-oriented sales approaches. In 1957, the Jewel Tea Company brought suit against the unions for conspiring to restrain trade, but finally lost to the unions in a 1964 US Supreme Court ruling. The Jewel Tea Company had filed its suit against the unions under the restraint of trade provisions of the US anti-trust laws in an attempt to terminate the union's dictation of market hours.

The butchers' union is now engaged in bargaining for a new contract with the Associated Food Retailers. More and more meat is being cut and packaged in packing plants or in central packaging centers. The packinghouse workers belong to the same union as the meat cutters, which may lead to some interesting developments.

Section 6.
All property owned by the authority shall be exempt from taxation by the State or any taxing unit therein.

Section 1.
The Authority shall be directed and governed by a Board of Commissioners of five (5) members known as the "Commission" all of whom shall be appointed by the Mayor of the City of DeWitt with the advice and consent of the City Council. The Treasurer of the City of DeWitt shall also serve as Secretary-Treasurer for the Authority as a non-voting member of the Commission. No Councilman shall serve on the Commission.

Section 2.
The Authority shall select a Chairman and a Vice-Chairman from among its memberships by majority vote of the Commission. Terms of said officers shall

be one year each.

Section 3.
The terms of the Commissioners constituting the first Commission shall be for three years. Two three year terms, 2 two year terms, and 1 one year term. Thereafter, succeeding commissioners shall serve for three year terms.

Section 4.
The Commission shall adopt and may amend by-laws and rules of procedure consonant with the provisions of the enabling act and provide therein for regular meetings of the Commission.

Section 5.
The Commission shall adopt a corporate seal.

Section 6.
The chairman shall preside at meetings of the commission and may sign and execute all authorized bonds, contracts, checks and other obligations in the name of the authority when so authorized by the com-

mission. He shall do and perform such other duties as necessary or proper, he shall endorse in behalf of the authority for collection, checks, notes and other obligations, and shall deposit them to the credit of the authority in a designated bank or depository; he shall sign all receipts and vouchers for payment made to the authority; he shall jointly with such other officer as may be designated by the commission, sign all checks, bonds, promissory notes and other obligations of the authority when so ordered by the commission; he shall render a statement of his cash accounts when required by the commission; he shall enter regularly in the books of the authority to be kept by him for the purpose, full and accurate account of all monies received and paid by him on account of the authority, and shall at all reasonable times exhibit his books and ac-

counts to the commission or any member thereof when so required. He shall perform all acts incidental to the position of treasurer fixed by the by-laws and as assigned to him from time to time by the commission. He shall be may be fixed by the by-laws and from time to time assigned to him by the commission.

Section 7.
The secretary shall keep the minutes of all meetings of the commission, and of all committees thereof, in books provide for that purpose; he shall attend to the giving, serving and receiving of all notices or process of or against the authority following the signing of contracts authorized by the Commission, and when so ordered, he shall affix the seal of the authority thereto, he shall have charge of all books and records, which shall at all reasonable times be open to inspection and examination by the Com-

mission, or any member thereof, and in general perform all the duties incident to his office. The Vice-Chairman shall preside at meetings of the commission in the absence of the chairman.

Section 8.
The treasurer shall have custody of all the funds and securities of the authority which may come into his hands or possession, when bonded for faithful discharge if his duties as treasurer, the bond to be of such character, form and in such amount as the commission may require.

Section 9.
Annual compensation, if any for the members of the commission shall be fixed by a majority of the City Council of the City of DeWitt.

Section 10.
Vacancies occurring in the office of Commissioner shall be filled by the Mayor with the advise and consent of the City Council of the City of

DeWitt.

Section 11.
A commissioner may be removed from office for cause by an affirmative majority vote of the City Council.

Section 12.
The books and records of the authority and of the commission, officers and agents thereof, shall be open to inspection and audit by the City of DeWitt at all times. The authority shall submit an annual report to the City Council.

Article VII
The fiscal year of the Authority shall commence on the first day of July, in each year, and end on the last day of June following.

Article IX
Amendments may be made to these Articles of Incorporation as provided in Section 10 of Act 31 of the Public Acts of Michigan, Extra Session, 1948.

Article X
Location of the registered office and post office for the Authority shall be: Office of the Clerk City Hall DeWitt, Michigan 48820

Article XI
These Articles of Incorporation shall become effective and be in full force and effect ten (10) days after their adoption as provided in Section 4 of the enabling act being Act 31 of the Public Acts of Michigan, Extra Session, 1948, as amended. 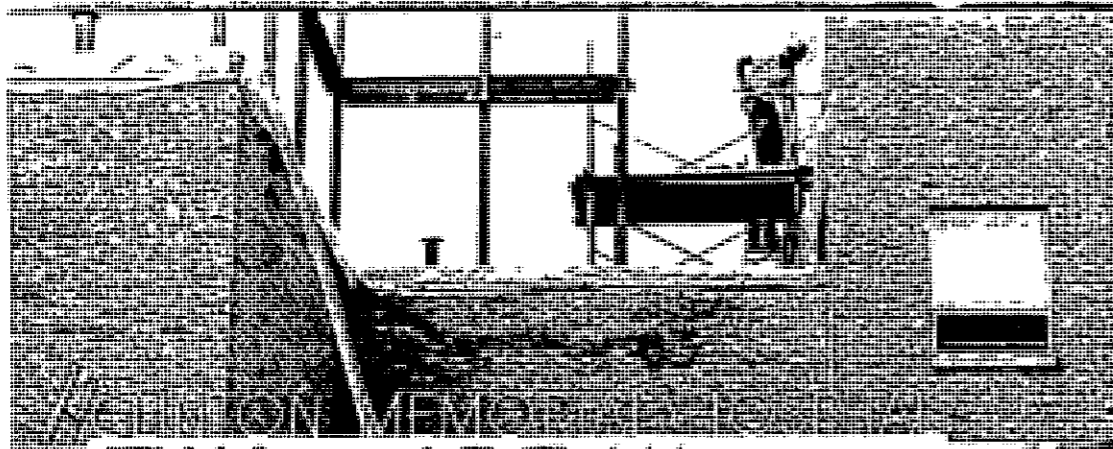

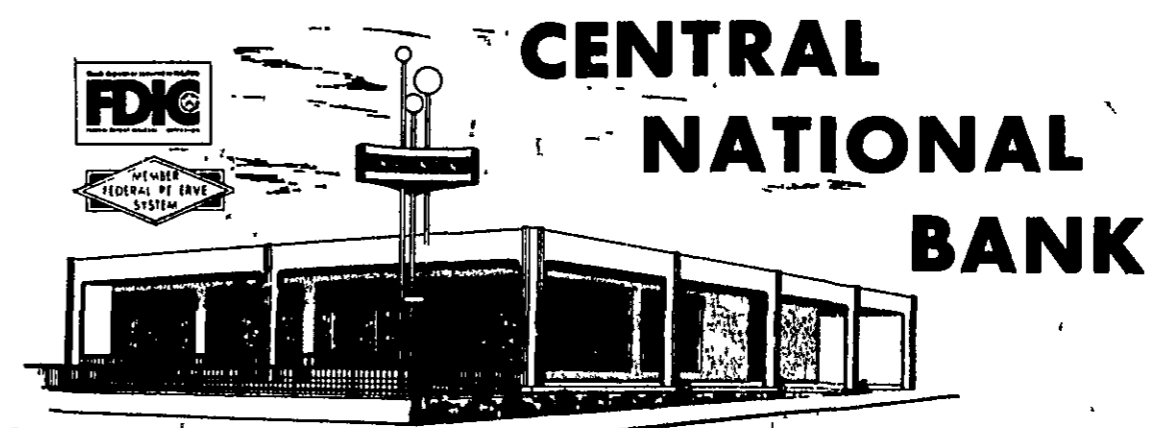

Mother Nature won't cooperate

Mint harvest is late for Clinton farmer

ST JOHNS — Norman Irrer's 270 acres of crops northeast of here are usually worth a "mint."

But this harvest the Clinton County farmer is up against an uncooperative Mother Nature. Heavy rains and humid weather have put spearmint distilling a month behind schedule.

It's not the first time the 20-year veteran has battled the elements. . . and it won't be the last. Despite the setbacks, Irrer says he's determined to get his usual 7,000 to 8,000 pounds of spearmint oil to market.

MANY YEARS OF hard work have

gone into the rural St Johns man's farm since he first established his mint bed. He explains how it's done. "When a bed's established," he tells, "roots or plants are put in rows either in the spring or fall."

"The rhisomes or roots spread all over the ground," he continues. After summer harvest, they're plowed under. The next spring they come up as a meadow.

"The mint bed will continue to flourish from year to year," Irrer states. That is, he points out, unless it freezes, weeds set in or the stand gets weak. "It's mainly a matter of keeping the weeds out and I hire four men for hand labor to supplement spraying," he adds.

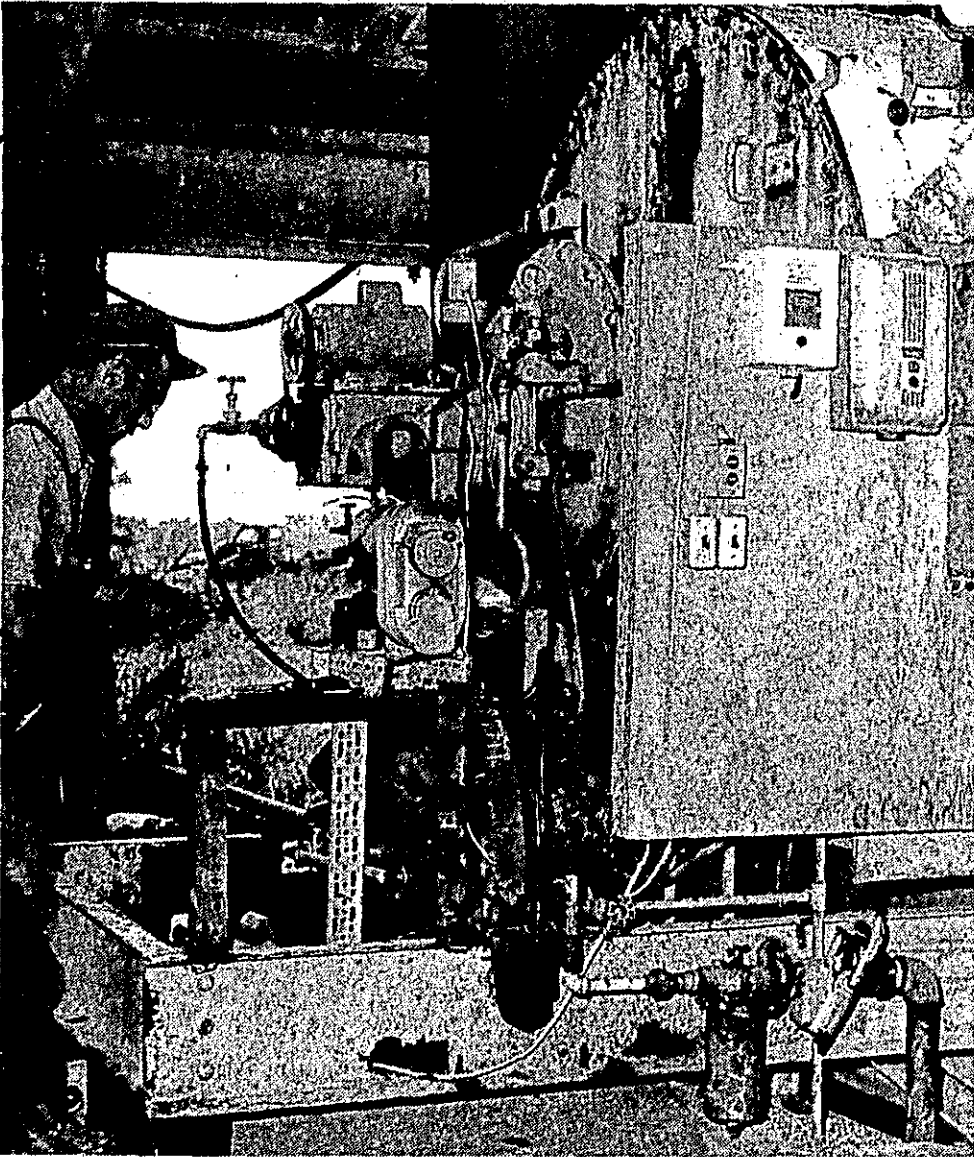
The land chosen by Irrer to establish his bed is the black dirt so plentiful in Clinton County. It's of a high organic matter and is commonly called muck. "At some time," Irrer relates, "this was low lying swamp. Actually," he jokes, "it's half rotten wood and half weed seed."

HARVEST OF THE square-stemmed plant usually starts the latter part of July or early August. Step 1 in the process is smoothing and chopping the mint. It's referred to as hay because the harvesting procedure is much the same. "And it's got all the characteristics of hay," injects Irrer, "without the spirit."

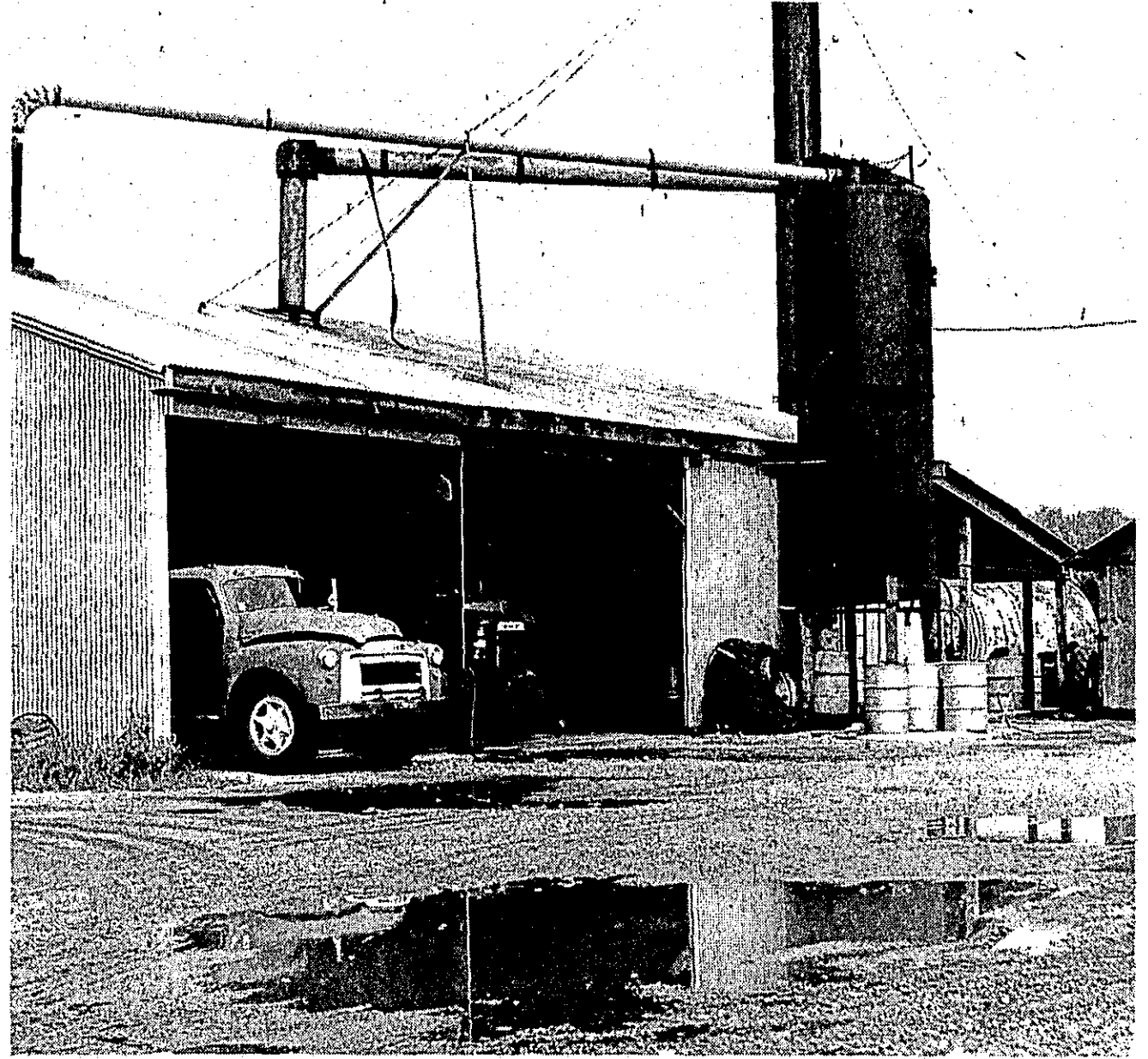
After it's chopped, mint is loaded

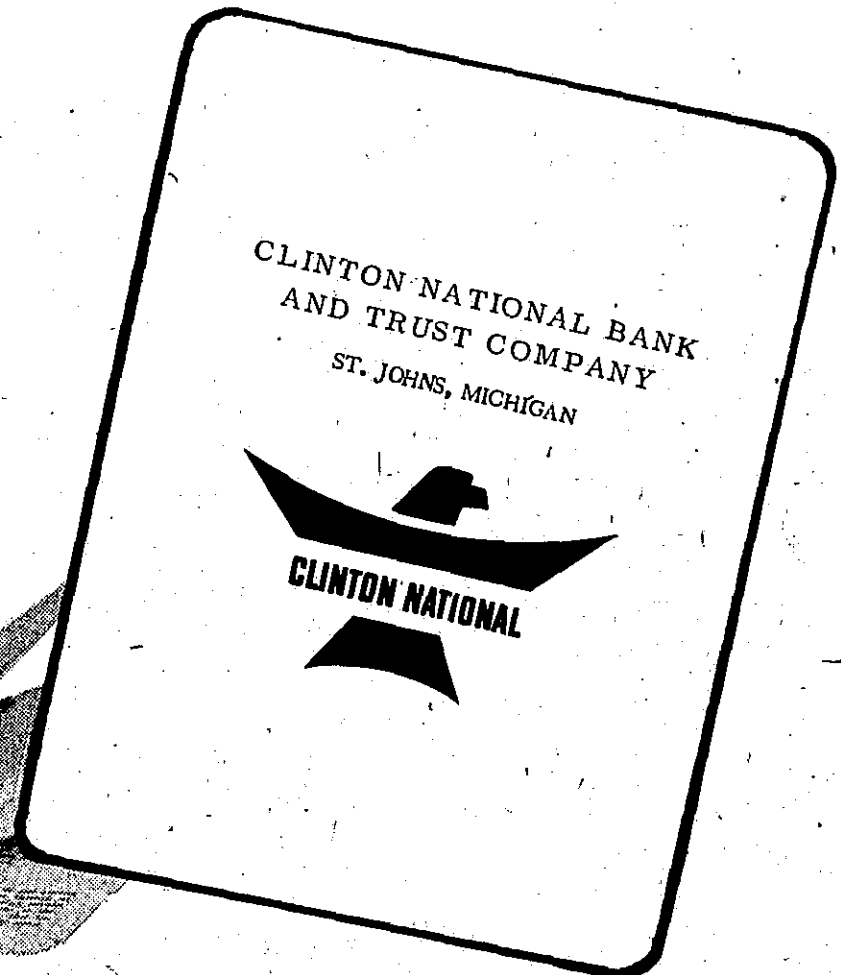
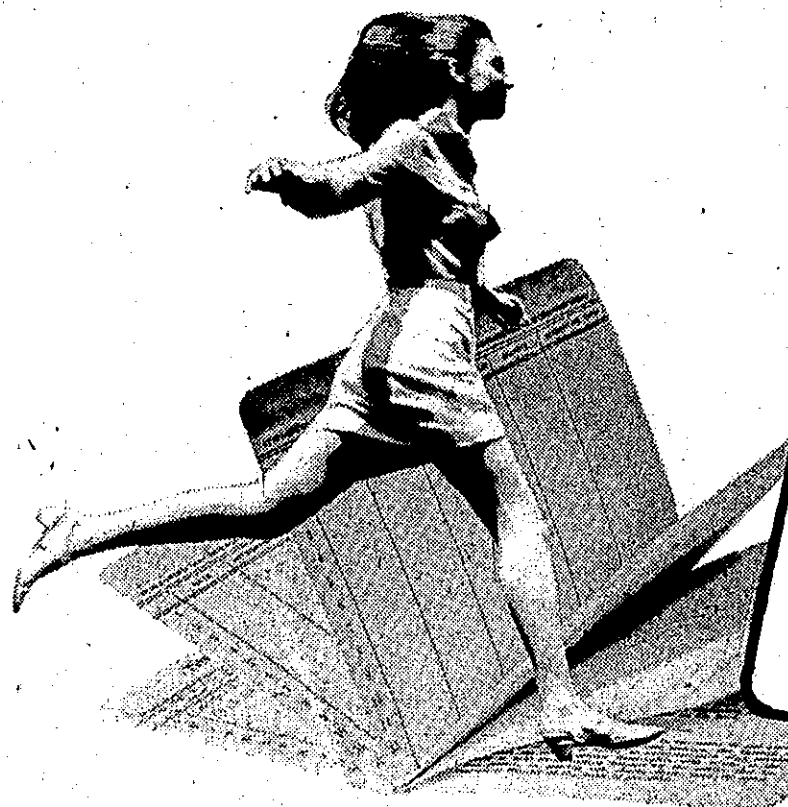

"If It Fitz . . . Room for 1 more

When it comes to touching in church, I was way ahead of my time. I was playing kneecaps in the pews 30 years ago.

The cool thing to do today is make physical contact with your pewmates (pewmates? That sounds gross. Make it seatmates).

Modern ministers and priests often include touching in their worship service. They urge their congregation to reach out, join hands, touch shoulders, make some kind of physical contact.

Many people don't like this holy touching. In fact, I know a couple of guys who absolutely refuse to partake, no matter who is sitting next to them. Whenever the minister gets that brotherly gleam in his eye, these 2 guys get up and run. These rapid escapes must leave their deserted seatmates really feeling like pewmates ("Usher, bring me a bottle of Listerine").

I asked my friend Joe why he objected to joining hands in church.

"It embarrasses me," he said. "My wife always sits on one side of me and it feels silly to shake hands with someone I've been sleeping with for 15 years. On the other side there's usually some strange guy with a face like a catcher's mitt. There's no way I'm going to hold hands with him."

I'd simply reach out and grab passerby and assure them there was room for 1 more in our pew. After you've squeezed in 5 more "mores", the touching is not only easy, it is unavoidable. It did wonders for a dull sermon.

Of course, in 1942, this was quite touching. The preacher didn't encourage such messing around in church. He didn't even approve it on the playground (co-educational touch football was forbidden). If you wanted to love your neighbor, it was wise to make it a sin of thought, not deed.

It is marvelous to see the progress that's been made in 30 years. I think it's grand that many ministers are now urging their parishioners to become physically aware of each other.

The idea is Love, of course. Love everybody, including the fat guy trying to read your hymnal. But first you must know him. And a good way to start is to touch him. That way, both of you outwardly acknowledge each other's existence. This world is full of people suffering in invisible agony, waiting in vain to be acknowledged.

Many of you church goers will probably regard that last paragraph as pretty pretentious, even stupid, coming from a heretic who has confused teenage lust with brotherly love. Maybe so. But even just can look good when compared with hate — or tech-tech sophistication.

I'm for a world where every man is eager to make room for 1 more in his pew.

Sheriff's race proves expensive

Running for public office is a very expensive proposition according to financial statements filed at the Clinton County Clerk's office.

The Major race during the primary was the 4-man contest for sheriff and competitive campaigning resulted in the expenditure of much money.

It was interesting to note that a certain comparative is apparent between votes a candidate received and the money he spent.

Tony Hufnagel, winner of the Republican nomination and unopposed in November, reports he spent \$6317 in his successful bid for the sheriff's job which pays \$11,500 annually. He polled 3643 votes.

State election rules limit candidates to 25% of the annual salary for the office they seek or, in this case, \$2875. Hufnagel circumvented this rule by forming three committees—a common practice among public office seekers and a legal method in the eyes of state election officials.

He reported spending \$1500 personally on one financial statement while a Hufnagel for Sheriff Committee spent \$2732 and another committee, Women for Hufnagel, filed expenditures of \$2085. Roger Overway signed the statement as treasurer of the Hufnagel for Sheriff Committee while Mrs Marleen Matson was treasurer of the Women for Hufnagel.

Ray Terpening received 2091 votes for second place while reporting expenses of \$2019. He signed his own statement and had no campaign finance committee.

In the third spot was DeWitt Township Police Chief Bruce Angell who polled 1952 votes and spent \$1743 on his campaign. His financial statement was submitted by Patricia Rosenberg, treasurer of the Angell for Sheriff Committee.

Larry Floate, the fourth candidate, reported spending \$1013. He received 829 votes.

We feel the margin of Hufnagel's victory clearly indicates he is the choice of a majority of citizens in Clinton County. However, it causes us deep concern that a person seeking public office must spend such large sums of money.

The relationship between money spent and votes received may indicate to some people what it takes to win an election. We're not so sure. If this is the case, it demonstrates a weakness in our political process.

An editorial column is the place where an editor expresses his own opinions and makes his own suggestions about people and-or events which he believes require attention.

Few editors believe they are infallible in their opinions. Few editors believe they are setting forth gospel messages.

This privilege, some call it responsibility, of an editor to express his views is quite often misunderstood, particularly by targets of critical editorials.

Readers often express the opinion that editorials should not have been published because (1) They were controversial, (2) They were opinionated and (3) They stirred up people.

Beautiful--Those are the main 3 reasons for editorials. Editorials are designed to promote dialog and any dialog worth its salt must have all 3 ingredients.

Many people think that it is improper for editors to voice opinions on important issues. These critics want a sterile press.

People have a right to their opinions--and that right extends to editors as well as readers. Readers have a right to express their opinions in published letters to the editor as long as they are signed and reasonably brief. Editors have a right to set forth their opinions in editorial pages. That seems like a fair enough setup.

Questions about Social Security

Q. I'M 63 AND WANT TO RETIRE. I HAVE A WIFE AND TWO CHILDREN UNDER 18. I KNOW MY MONTHLY PAYMENTS WILL BE LOWER IF I RETIRE NOW INSTEAD OF WHEN I'M 65. BUT WILL THE PAYMENTS TO MY WIFE AND CHILDREN BE FIGURED ON MY REDUCED PAYMENTS?
A. No. Checks for your family will be figured on your unreduced amount.

Q. I ALREADY RECEIVE SOCIAL SECURITY CHECKS BUT I'LL BE 65 IN A FEW MONTHS. HOW DO I SIGN UP FOR MEDICARE?
A. Since you already receive social security checks, you don't need to contact our office. We will send you a card two or three months before you are 65 asking if you want to sign up for Medical Insurance or not. Fill that out and mail it back. You will be covered automatically for Medicare Hospital Insurance.

Those people who do not already get a social security check should contact the Social Security office three months before they reach age 65.

Alma doctor explains abortion law reform

Since 1967 sentiment for abortion law reform has grown in Michigan. Each year Legislative hearings were held around the state. In March, 1971, an abortion reform bill passed the Senate but was stalled in the House.

The Michigan Coordinating Committee for Abortion Law Reform has been a coalition organization working politically since June, 1969.

In the summer of 1971 the decision was made to launch a state-wide petition drive. Under the Michigan constitution and election laws we are allowed to initiate legislation by petition and if the initiated legislation is not passed by the legislature it goes to the people for a public referendum.

THE WORDING on our bill simply states, "All other laws to the contrary notwithstanding, a licensed medical or osteopathic physician may perform an abortion at the request of a patient if the period of gestation has not exceeded 20 weeks. The procedure shall be performed in a licensed hospital or other facility approved by the Department of Public Health."

Legislation passed by public initiative and referendum cannot be changed by the Legislature except by a three-fourths majority of both Houses of the Legislature. Note that our law would not fall under the same threat as the New York law where a simple majority can modify or even repeal their law.

Michigan is one of the Megastates with two large land masses connected by a bridge. Our population might be considered a microcosm of the national population with our industrial base, outstate rural farm and resort population. One half of our 9,000,000 people are located in the southeastern corner around Detroit.

Eighty per cent of our population is located in eighteen counties. Twenty-five per cent of our population is Catholic and ten per cent Black. The only organized opposition to our referendum are the Right to Life Committees and the Roman Catholic Church. We have already organized in every county in the state and on nearly every college campus. Our major statewide race will be for US Senate.

Our campaign plans include adequate polling and in-depth public opinion surveys to determine exactly where our people are on the

issue. We have the nucleus for a statewide speakers bureau and will talk to every Child Study Club, Rotary, Lions, etc., in the state if they allow. Our campaign will be a public information campaign and we will avoid any anti-Catholic rhetoric - partially because we already have the support of many Catholic leaders and people in the state. We will use the media as financial resources allow. We will supply the Protestant and Jewish religious leaders with factual information especially on the beneficial results of abortion reform in New York.

WHAT IS the significance of Michigan's referendum, to Michigan and the rest of the nation?

We are taking to the people a bill which clearly states that a woman may request an abortion and that the physician may perform an abortion. No limitation to the woman's access to this care has been written into the bill such as residency, age, husband consent, etc. Public Health Department licensure of free standing clinics will give the woman assurance of a standard of quality of care without restricting her access to early out-patient abortion services. With our people on the special committee the Public Health Department here prepared a set of guidelines which insure quality care, and reduce the possibility for exploitation.

Many of our friends sat on their backsides during our petition drive claiming they were for repeal or that they were waiting for the courts to resolve the issue. I believe that nearly all of us are for repeal. In the absence of any evidence that we can accomplish repeal, we must support this measure, which

is a permissive law under which physicians are more likely to perform abortions, rather than repeal, where the possibility of future restrictions exists.

MANY OF our potential supporters withheld their energies and support with the belief that the Supreme Court would rule in the Texas case in June and resolve the issue.

June has come and gone and the court has indicated that they will rehear oral arguments before a full nine member court in the next session.

The court could continue to give restrictive rulings, not addressing itself to the key issues of the woman's privacy and equal protection.

The court could take up to twelve years to give a definitive ruling, as was true in the Griswold case.

The court could rule that the laws, such as Texas', are unconstitutional because of vagueness, but uphold the Georgia law, which is not too vague and clearly spells out the conditions under which abortions may be done (subjecting the woman to the tyranny of the practice of medicine by committee).

We must not assume that the opposition would rest. They would move to pass laws in other states as restrictive or even more restrictive than Georgia. Consider Florida where the Supreme Court ruled the law unconstitutional and the Legislature proceeded to pass a law which all of us recognized years ago would not help stop criminal abortion nor give access to abortion to the young and the poor and those without connections.

Consider Connecticut where their court victory

was temporary and hollow as the Governor and Legislature moved immediately to pass another and even more restrictive law.

We believe that now Michigan is clearly the great hope in the nation for the pro-abortion people. It is imperative that we win in Michigan. An affirmative vote in Michigan will be a message to other state legislatures that the people approve of this change. Perhaps they would then have the courage to pass similar statutes - if they have to pass any at all. We would give encouragement to other states which have the provision for initiative petition and/or constitutional amendment by petition. We would pass national legislation to guarantee that women would

not need to cross state lines to obtain safe ethical medical care.

To date our campaign has been financed by the small contributions of hundreds of people who share our concern for the health and welfare of our women and children. Our workers have all been volunteers.

Those throughout the nation who wish to help can send a dollar or more to the Michigan Abortion Referendum and/or can join us for a weekend, a week, a month or the duration of one of the hundreds of volunteers who will help us win this campaign.

into a box-type bin mounted on a truck. Second step is the distilling plant housing Irrer's two boilers.

The boilers, fired by fuel oil, force about 80 pounds of steam through pressurized bins. It takes 20 to 25 minutes to warm the mint up and it's run an additional 45 minutes, to cause the mint oil to vaporize.

A COMPLETELY automatic process, the vapors travel to the condenser where they are cooled. Condensed vapors are deposited in a separation unit forcing oil to the top. The mint oil is then drained into waiting 400 lb galvanized barrels.

The resulting product is sold to companies in Kalamazoo and Indiana to be used for candies, chewing gum, toothpaste and certain pharmaceutical needs. What's left over is used by Irrer for livestock feed.

"It's potent," Irrer admits. "I've heard it takes only a pound of spearmint to flavor 120,000 sticks of chewing gum.

And if that isn't enough, he concludes, it makes a great paint remover.

Looking as if they just stepped out of the mid-nineteenth century, these workmen are posing in front of the newly completed Bay Valley covered bridge, the first covered bridge built in Michigan since 1887. Constructed from authentic bridge plans of the 1880's, the Bay Valley covered bridge is 55 feet long, 13 feet wide and is covered with weathered barn timbers that are over 100 years old. Spanning the Squaconning Creek on Old Bridge Road, the Bay Valley covered bridge is part of Bay Valley, a new 500 acre Recreational Development, presently under construction in the Tri-Cities of Bay City, Saginaw and Midland, Michigan. When completed, Bay Valley will offer 2,000 condominiums and apartments, an 18-hole PGA golf course, an indoor-outdoor tennis club, a 152 room motor inn and restaurant, and 60 acres of man-made lakes.

Road construction adds 200 new lakes to state

LANSING—Add 200 man-made lakes to Michigan's legacy of nearly 12,000 natural lakes, compliments of the Department of State Highways.

That's the approximate number created during the last 14 years as a by-product of highway construction. It happens when roadside gravel and sand pits, known by engineers as "borrow pits," are excavated below ground water level.

The three newest lakes, one covering 60 acres, were dug out in heavily wooded areas where the new I-75 Freeway is being built through Ogemaw and Roscommon counties.

Many highway-created lakes have been sold for conservation and recreational purposes such as wildlife refuges and camping. Some were transferred to other public agencies and a few are still

held by the Highway Department.

"This is one way in which Michigan's needs for good roads and for preservation of its environmental quality go hand in hand," said State Highway Director Henrik E Stafseth. "We are building better highways and getting more lakes as a dividend."

The effort to create lakes as a dividend of highway work began in 1958 when Michigan's interstate freeway system, demanding great amounts of fill, began to take shape. Until then, roadside pits often were left as scars on the landscape that frequently were used, without official sanction, as local dumps.

Karl Rock, a highway soils engineer and native of lake-studded Barry County, suggested that many pits could be excavated below water level and shaped into usable ponds and lakes. He pushed the idea.

To prove it practical, Rock and associates from the Department's Grand Rapids District prospected proposed highway routes, making test borings. When several excavation sites were located along the planned route of Interstate 96 Freeway between Grand Rapids and Lansing, he developed impressive cost figures. They showed expense of deeper underwater excavation in

several pits on I-96 could be balanced against costs of opening a second pit farther from the highway site. Until then, contractors had ceased excavation when they reached water and moved on, usually to a pit farther from, the highway where hauling costs were higher.

Rock's calculations were put to the test in 1957-58 when several small lakes were created along I-96. Except for minor adjustments, his theory proved practical. Resale value of the resulting lakes was higher than expected and pit restoration costs were eliminated.

Nine lakes were created during 1965 construction of Interstate 69 in Branch County. Another fronts the newly opened travel information center and rest area on I-94 near the Indiana

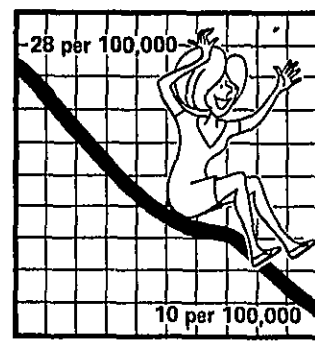

Announce free meal policy here

ST JOHNS—The St Johns Public Schools today announced a free meal policy for their school children unable to pay for their meals.

Local school officials have adopted the following family size and income scale to assist them in determining eligibility.

Families falling within these scales or those suffering from unusual circumstances or hardships are urged to apply for free meals for their children. They may do so by filling in the application forms sent home in a letter to parents. Additional copies are available at the principal's office in each school. Applications may be submitted any time during the school year.

The form itself is simple to complete and requests information needed to determine economic need based on the income and number of persons in the family, number of children attending school or preschool, and any unusual circumstances or hardships which affect the family's

ability to pay for school meals. The information provided on the application will be confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility.

In order to safeguard their identity, children receiving free meals will be treated in the same manner as full paying students.

Further assurance is given that children eligible for a free meal shall not be required to:

- (1) Work for their meal.
- (2) Use a separate dining room.
- (3) Go through a separate serving line.
- (4) Enter a dining room or serving line through a separate entrance.
- (5) Eat meals at a different time.
- (6) Eat a different meal than those sold to children paying the full price of such a meal.

Under the provisions of the policy the administrative assistant will review applications and determine eligibility. If a parent is dissatisfied with the ruling of the local official he may make a request either orally or in writing for a hearing to appeal the decision. Earl R Lancaster whose address is 501 W Suckles St has been designated as the hearing official. Hearing procedures are outlined in the policy.

A complete copy of the policy is on file in each school and in the office of the Administrative Assistant, Steve Bakita, where it may be reviewed by any interested patron.

Fulton announces school dates

FULTON—Fulton Schools will welcome its teachers for the school year of 1972-73 with an orientation meeting Sept 5.

A full schedule of meetings and activities have been planned for the orientation day beginning at 9 am and continuing until 3 pm Sept 6, all students will be in attendance for a full day of school, and hot lunches will be served. Buses will travel their regular routes at the usual time as in previous years.

Kindergarten children, who have not previously enrolled, are to enroll with their teachers Sept 6 at Middleton as well as at Maple Rapids. Both morning and afternoon sessions will meet on Wednesday. All kindergarten children are required by law to have immunization shots by their local physicians previous to entering school or a form verifying, because of religious beliefs, that they are unable to be immunized.

A law was passed seven years ago by the State Legislature whereby all children entering school for the first time must undergo a test to determine if they are free from tuberculosis. Parents are requested to consult their local physicians and have their child tested before entering school.

Maple Rapids Elementary school will have two sessions of kindergarten again this year. Rural children in the Middleton-Perrinton area are to attend morning sessions and village kindergarten children are to attend afternoon sessions. The Ola Elementary school will operate again this year with the kindergarten children being transported from the area surrounding the school.

TEXTBOOKS and workbooks will be furnished free of charge to all children in all elementary grades. A deposit of \$4 per student will be levied to high school students, grades 8 through 12, refundable at the close of the school year, if books show normal wear. High school students desirous of attending assembly programs and plays, during

the school year, will pay an additional fee of \$4. An activity fee of 50¢ will be charged to all elementary students in grades through 4 and \$1 in grades 5 through 7.

A great deal of maintenance work has been accomplished this summer. Many of the rooms have been painted, and all rooms thoroughly cleaned. Another relocatable unit has been leased from the McFadden Corporation of Lansing to house a split section of 6th and 7th graders. This unit will be installed at the Perrinton Elementary School site.

Hot lunches will be served the students at a cost of 30¢ for all elementary children in grades 1 through 7 if tickets are purchased on a weekly basis. Single lunches on a daily basis will cost 35¢. Grades 8 through 12 can purchase lunch tickets at a weekly cost of \$1.75. If purchased on a daily basis, the charge will be 40¢.

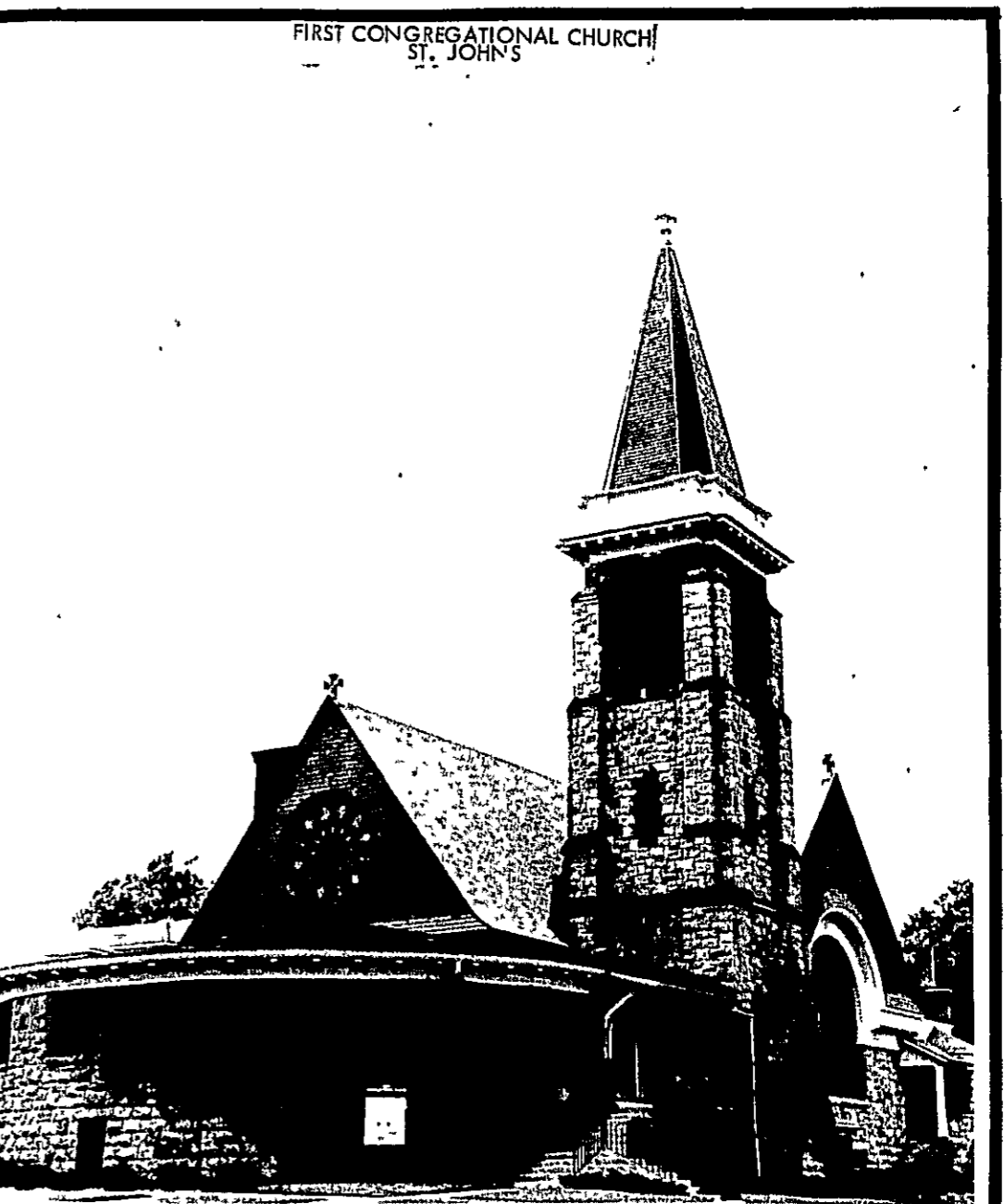

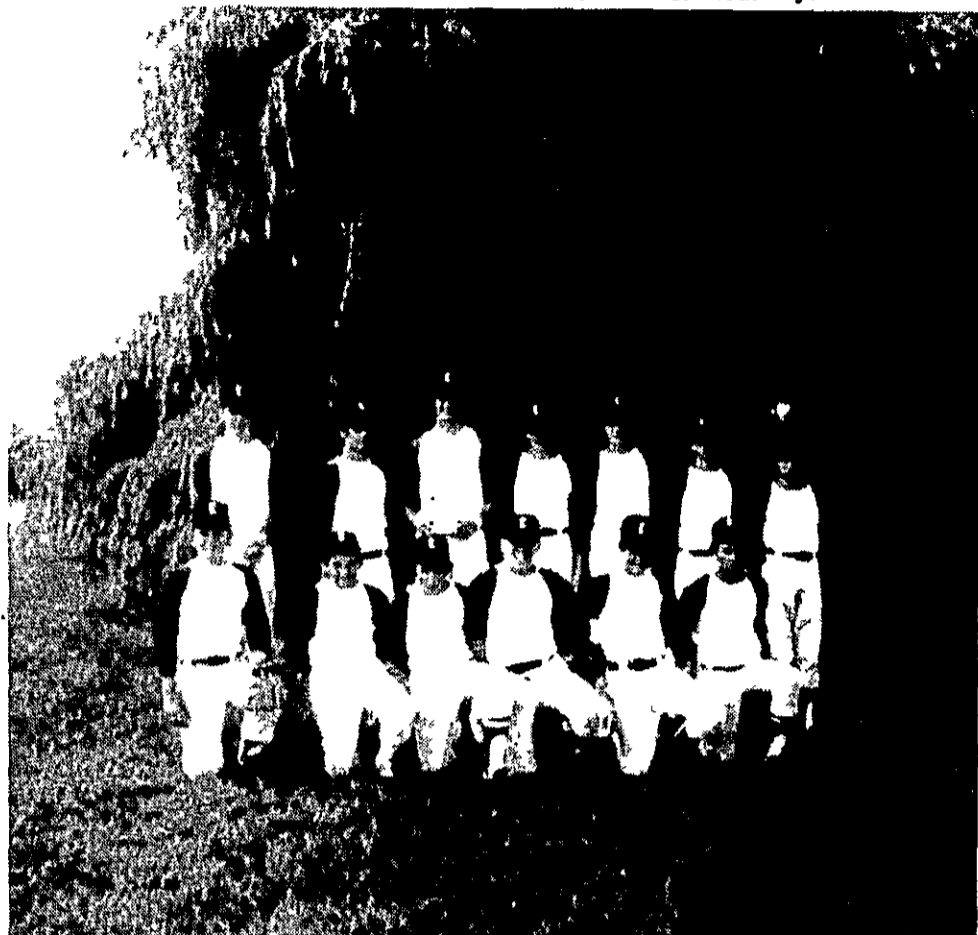

Ask the Governor

By Governor William G. Milliken

State of Michigan

QUESTION:
I read recently that legislation now being considered in Congress would create a national, uniform standard for the ingredients of hot dogs, sausages, and lunch meats, and that this law would weaken the standards that Michigan now has. Has anything been done to prevent this from happening and keep Michigan's standards at their high level?

ANSWER:
Michigan has long been recognized as a national leader in establishing high standards of quality for meats, and has set rigid requirements regarding protein content and ingredients permitted in ground meats. However, an amendment to Senate Bill 1316, legislation now pending in the US House of Representatives, posed a serious threat to those standards by requiring the substitution of weaker federal measures for Michigan's tough regulations. These lower federal standards would have permitted lips, snouts, intestines, and other material to be sold in ground meats, additions that are currently prohibited under our state's laws.

In July, I sent a letter to the congressional committee considering the legislation and dispatched state officials to Washington to urge amendments to this bill which would permit Michigan to retain its present higher standards. We won that battle in committee, and the bill as reported out would allow us to retain our tougher restrictions. However, we still face a difficult fight on the House floor. I will continue to urge support in Congress for the measure allowing Michigan to continue enforcement of its stricter regulations, and urge all citizens interested in this issue to contact their Congressman and urge support for Senate Bill 1316 as reported out of com-

QUESTION:
Being Governor, you must get tired of handshaking, picture-taking, and giving interviews. Don't you ever get the feeling that you just would like to forget the whole thing and go home to relax?

ANSWER:
I think that anyone in public life at times feels that way. When the day starts early and goes late and decisions that have to be made are pressing in, the job of being Governor sometimes becomes a frustrating and lonely experience. But I can honestly say that beyond those infrequent moments, I would not trade this opportunity for any other opportunity that might ever be mine. The chance to make a difference in the solution of a problem that plagues the state, the chance to carry out my convictions, and the chance to correct a situation which affects people in a negative and sometimes disastrous way, all make this job extremely worthwhile and rewarding to me.

QUESTION:
This fall I plan to go with my father and uncle on a deer hunting trip. Since I am 15 years old, is it necessary for me to fulfill some safety requirement before I can get a hunting license?

ANSWER:
Since September 1, 1971, Michigan law has required that all first-time hunters 12 through 16 years of age obtain a Firearms Safety Certificate prior to purchasing a Michigan hunting license.

This certificate can be acquired by completing one of the approved Hunting Safety Training courses offered during the fall by more than 2,000 volunteer instructors at various schools, YMCA's, and Sportsman Clubs located throughout the State.

18,000 Michigan young people successfully completed these training programs last year, and this

"Beginning at a point on the North-South 1/4 line 740 feet Southerly from the North 1/4 corner of Section 18, T5N, R2W, DeWitt Township, Clinton County, Michigan, running thence East 200 feet, thence Southeasterly 560 feet more or less, thence East 305 feet to the centerline of Schavey Road, said point being 1105 feet Southerly from the North Section line as measured along the centerline of Schavey Road, thence Southerly on said centerline of Road 1800 feet, thence East 215 feet parallel with the East-West 1/4 line, thence North 315 feet to said East-West 1/4 line, thence East 780 feet on said 1/4 line, thence South 1660 feet, thence West 175 feet to the East line of Lot 29 of Luroma Park Subdivision No. 1, thence North 70 feet on said Lot line to the Northeast corner of Lot 29, thence West 425 feet to the Northwest corner of Lot 28 of said Subdivision, thence South 215 feet to the Northeast corner of Lot 21 in said Subdivision, thence West 430 feet to the Northwest corner of Lot 20 of said Subdivision, thence Northeasterly 240 feet on the East line of Luroma Park Subdivision to the Northeast corner of Lot 2, thence Northeasterly 270 feet, thence North 205 feet, thence West 330 feet to the centerline of Schavey Road at a point 1515 feet Northerly from the South Section line as measured along the centerline of Schavey Road, thence Southerly 30 feet along said centerline, thence Westerly 695 feet to the North-South 1/4 line at a point 1455 feet Northerly from the South 1/4 corner of said Section 18, thence Northerly 3195 feet more or less to the point of beginning."

Also, an amendment to the Clinton County Zoning Ordinance to allow mobile homes for occupancy under certain extenuating circumstances. Said appeal and petition to be heard by the Clinton County Zoning Appeal Board to be granted or denied at their discretion.

QUESTION:

I'm a deputy sheriff working part time and relief schedules and I noticed a new bulletin for law enforcement officers with some real up-to-date information on traffic records and accident reports. Can you tell me how I can get a copy for myself, and get any future copies that might be published? M.K., Caro

ANSWER:

The Bulletin you described sounds like the new Crash Prevention - Enforcement publication for law enforcement officers, published periodically by the Michigan Association of Chiefs of Police, Michigan Sheriffs Association, and the Michigan Department of State Police. Comments and inquiries concerning editorial materials should be directed to: Editor, CRASH PREVENTION - ENFORCEMENT, c/o Highway Traffic Safety Center, Kellogg Center for Continuing Education, Michigan State University, East Lansing, Michigan 48823.

QUESTION:

Did the State Legislature pass that law that would require a person to pay for the identification cards issued by the Department of State Police? R.T.L., Niles

ANSWER:

Act 222 of the Public Acts of 1972, effective August 1 of this year, added a couple new wrinkles to the requirements for obtaining an identification card from that Department. A fee of \$3 is now charged (and the Department turns this money over to the State general fund); and the applicant must be 18 or more
