Bath School construction begins

BATH - Construction began last week on the new Bath High School, expected to be completed in Sept., 1975.

The \$2,470,000 facility will include 72,000 square feet and will accommodate up to 600 students in grades 9-12.

The present high school will be converted into a middle school, with some additions being made.

After being defeated at the polls, the

construction proposal passed the 2d time around.

However, another election had to take place because of a mistake on the ballot.

In the meantime school officials went to half-day sessions for some classes because of lack of room.

The pinch for space came when the Couzens School said to be violating many state fire violations, making it unsafe for a middle school facility.

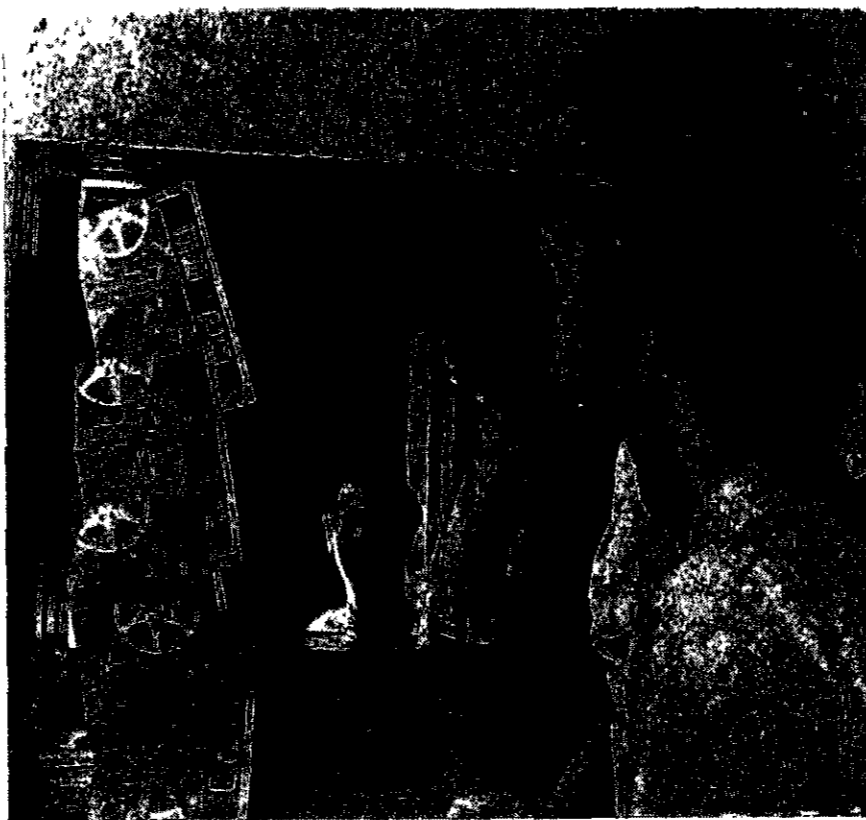
A slow-pitch softball tournament begins the activities Wednesday and will continue through Sunday with the playoffs scheduled for Sunday.

Seek queen candidates

The Clinton County Farm Bureau Young Farmers are searching for contestants for the annual queen contest and will be accepting applications during the next 4 weeks.

The county winner will receive an all expense paid trip to the State Annual Meeting in Grand Rapids in December and the state winner will be given a trip for two to New Orleans, Louisiana where she will represent her state in the colorful Parade of Queens.

She will also become a spokesman for the Michigan Farm Bureau and Agriculture in appearances on radio and television, at

farm and non-farm meetings. To qualify, contestants may be single or married, and must be at least 17 years of age and not have passed their 31st birthday.

Contestants must be Farm Bureau members; if unmarried, the contestant or her parents must be Farm Bureau members. All county Queens will be honored at the Michigan Farm Bureau convention.

Judging will be based on several factors such as beauty, poise, personality, speaking ability, activities and overall effectiveness. Applications may be obtained at the county Farm Bureau office.

Ovid-Elsie School Board reduces tax rate for '74

Taxpayers in the Ovid-Elsie School District will be paying 1 1/4 mills less this year, following action at the last Board of Education meeting.

At the Aug 26 meeting, the Ovid-Elsie Board of Education voted to set 16 mills for operating purposes and 2 1/4 for debt retirement, a reduction of 1 1/4 mills.

The district is allocated 8 mills from the county.

The county and local district millage provides the school system with an operation total of \$1,028,993.09.

The 2 1/4 debt retirement totals \$117,905.46.

Lunch prices

In other action the board voted to retain the 1973-74 lunch and milk prices.

Prices are 45 cents per lunch (including a half-pint of milk) if purchased by the week

and 50 cents per lunch if purchased on a daily basis.

Milk, not accompanied by lunch, will cost 5 cents per half pint.

NON-RESIDENT TUITION

Tuition for non-resident students was set at \$65 for elementary students and \$96 for secondary students.

Application for enrollment of non-resident students is to be renewed at the beginning of each school year.

New site for cosmetology

ST JOHNS - Students from four area high schools, St Johns, Ovid-Elsie, Fowler and Pewamo-Westphalia, presently engaged in learning the art of cosmetology thru the Clinton Area Shared Time programs will have a new home in which to learn their skills this school year. Located on W. Higham Street in St Johns in the former Bee's Chevy-Olds building, the new training facility will replace Melba Beauty Academy that was used in previous years of the program. Two other area schools, Bath and DeWitt, will continue to use the Melba location as before.

Ken Lashaway, vocational director at St

Johns Public Schools, said the major advantage of moving the instruction site would be the time saved in transportation. Eliminating the drive to Lansing would permit more hours of classroom instruction and therefore would make it easier to accumulate the required 1500 hours within the 3-year program. Those students starting in their sophomore year should attain their 1500 hours without extra summer sessions whereas those starting in their junior year would require additional instruction time in months following high school graduation. Under the program, students completing 1500 hours, then take a state examination and upon passing the test, they receive a

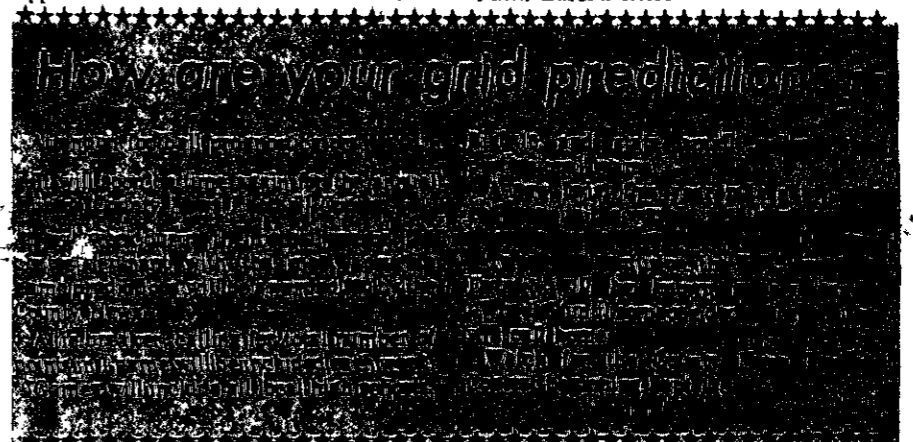
license to practice cosmetology.

Lashaway said that three licensed cosmetologists were contracted to handle the instruction duties at the new center. All are practicing cosmetologists.

The cosmetology program which is accredited by the state and audited by federal monies is closely monitored by the state to avoid an overflow on the job market, according to Lashaway. He indicated the present program could involve a maximum of 60 students per school year. Students graduating from the program can look forward to job placement services as an added reward for their career efforts.

Register for draft

You mean I still have to register for the draft? This question is frequently asked of Mr Arthur A. Holmes, State Director of Selective Service, by young men of Mich. His answer is always a resounding "Yes!" Even though there are presently no inductions, it is still a requirement of the military selective service act that young men who are 18 years of age register with selective service. They should register during the 60 day period commencing 30 days prior to their 18th birthday. If this 60 day period is elapsed, a young man should still register - better late than in violation of the law.

NOTICE OF HEARING AFFECTING ELECTRIC RATES

On July 8, 1974, Consumers Power Company filed an application with the Michigan Public Service Commission for authority to amend the fuel cost adjustment clause in its electric rates, M.P.S.C. No. 7 - Electric, Case No. U-4621. Existing electric rate schedules contain fuel adjustment clauses which permit adjustments to those rates to reflect changes in the cost of fossil fuel burned in the Company's fossil fuel electric generating plants. The Company proposes to amend its electric rate schedules to permit recovery of the cost of purchased and net interchange power which the Company must purchase to meet its electric system requirements, as well as the cost of fossil fuel. In addition, the Company proposes to utilize a system of estimates based upon the most up-to-date actual costs of fossil fuel and purchased and net interchange power and the most up-to-date actual kWh sales data to calculate the fuel adjustment clause and thereby eliminate the two month lag in recovery of costs under the Company's current clause.

The incorporation of the proposed amendment to the existing fuel cost adjustment clause, as set forth below, will cause the Company's electric rates to increase or decrease as the costs of fossil fuel and purchased and net interchange power increase or decrease.

The fossil fuel and purchased and net interchange cost adjustment shall consist of an increase or decrease in the cost per kWh, based on the difference between the estimated average cost per kWh of fossil fuel and purchased and net interchange power and 5.790 mills per kWh, rounded to the nearest 1,000th mill per kWh. The estimated average cost per kWh of fossil fuel and purchased and net interchange power included in this clause shall consist of the estimated calendar month delivered cost of fossil fuel burned plus the estimated calendar month cost of purchased and net interchange power, divided by the estimated billing month kWh sales. This adjustment shall apply to all kWh included in the customer's bill during the billing month in which the estimated calendar month's cost of fossil fuel and purchased and net interchange power is incurred. After the actual cost per kWh has been determined, any difference between the estimated and actual cost of fossil fuel and purchased and net interchange power per kWh of sales shall be included in the next estimated cost determination of this adjustment clause.

The Company represents that its earnings rate is appreciably less than that authorized by the Commission in its last electric rate case, Case No. U-4332. Applicant further represents that purchased and net interchange power contributes a substantially larger percentage of total electric system requirements than that utilized by the Commission in setting rate levels in that case and that the average cost per kWh of purchased and net interchange power is substantially higher than that utilized by the Commission in setting rate levels in that case. The Company further represents that the purchased and net interchange

power kWh requirements used as a basis for the relief requested in the application are not duplicative of the purchased and net interchange power kWh requirements used as a basis for the request for rate relief which it currently has pending before the Commission in Case No. U-4576.

Public hearings will be held on Consumers Power Company's application commencing at 9:00 a.m. on September 16 and 17, 1974, in the offices of the Commission, Law Building, Lansing, Michigan for the purpose of determining whether the authority sought should be granted.

Any person interested in the hearing, but not desiring to formally intervene, may attend and participate by making a position statement pursuant to the provisions of Rule 16 of the Commission's Rules of Practice and Procedure. Persons seeking to formally intervene as a party to the proceeding shall be required to strictly comply with Rule 11 of the Commission's Rules of Practice and Procedure by filing with the Michigan Public Service Commission, Law Building, Lansing, Michigan 48913, at least five (5) days prior to September 16, 1974 an original and twelve (12) copies of a petition to intervene, together with proof of service upon Consumers Power Company, General Attorney, Legal Department, Jackson, Michigan 49201.

Consumers Power Company, on or before September 16, 1974, shall serve upon each person seeking to formally intervene under Rule 11 of the Commission's Rules of Practice and Procedure a copy of its application and supporting direct testimony and exhibits as filed with the Commission, and proof of service shall be filed with the Commission on or before September 16, 1974.

Public hearings, if necessary, shall be held, in addition to the dates aforementioned, at such times and adjourned dates as shall be determined by the presiding officer until the matter has been fully heard.

Jurisdiction of the Commission in this matter is pursuant to 1909 PA 106, as amended, MCLA 460.551 et seq.; 1909 PA 300, as amended, MCLA 462.2 et seq.; 1919 PA 419, as amended, MCLA 460.51 et seq.; 1939 PA 3, as amended, MCLA 460.1 et seq.; Chapter 4 of 1969 PA 306, as amended, MCLA 24.201 et seq., and the Rules of Practice and Procedure Before the Commission, 1954 Administrative Code, Supplement No. 54, R 460.11 et seq.

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The scenic Au Sable

Michigan is a land of lakes and rivers, but few of the latter are as scenic as East Michigan's Au Sable River, according to Automobile Club of Michigan.

"The Au Sable originates in northern Michigan, south of Gaylord, and empties into Lake Huron at Oscoda," Joseph Hatke, Auto Club touring manager, pointed out. "The river is famed as a trout stream, but is equally popular with sightseers and canoeists."

The areas along the Au Sable were once the scene of heavy logging, and traces of this era in Michigan history may be seen

today along the river's high banks. Logs were rolled down the banks and floated down the river to Lake Huron where they were taken by schooners to the nation's cities.

A well-known attraction which draws thousands of visitors annually is the Lumberman's Memorial, about 12 miles west of Oscoda on a high bluff overlooking the river. The view of scenery from the bluffs ranks with some of Michigan's best.

Funds for the impressive memorial were furnished by 73 descendants of pioneer lum-

bermen. On a granite base are three large bronze figures - a river man, land locker and woodman. The surrounding area was once dense with timber and the memorial itself is near what was an old logging tote road.

The memorial is in the Huron National Forest and nearby is the Lumberman's Monument Store, convenient for campers in the area.

Two other memorial attractions are in the area. They are the Kiwanis monument erected by the Kiwanis Club of Michigan on a national forest

cooperative plantation established in 1931 and a statue to the Kirtland's Warbler, one of the world's rare birds, placed in 1963 by citizens of Oscoda County.

A canoe trip down the Au Sable River is a pleasant way to spend a day or weekend on a family outing. It is a scenic sport, offering enjoyment for all. For those without canoes, liveries in Oscoda offer rentals.

The Au Sable is the scene of the annual 140-mile, non-stop World's Championship Au Sable River Marathon canoe race from Grayling to Oscoda. Started in 1947, the race is billed as the "granddaddy of canoe races" with prize money amounting to nearly \$5,000. The event attracts the nation's top paddlers, who must portage over six dams before reaching their destination. Normally about 30 teams enter, but fewer than half finish the race.

Children and also adults will enjoy paddlewheel riverboat tours of the Au Sable west of Oscoda. The boats are the Au Sable River Queens Nos. 1 and 2. The dock for River Queen No. 1 is at Five Channels Dam off M-65, while River Queen No. 2 starts from Foote Dam near Oscoda. The boats usually operate through mid-October and attract thousands of fall color enthusiasts. Largo Springs, near Oscoda, is a natural flow of sparkling cold

water emerging from the side of a hill. The spring is reached by descending a long flight of stairs to a quiet, shady ravine.

Mystery Ridge, on US-23 between East Tawas and Oscoda, is an entertainment-type presentation upon the law of gravity. The attraction is open daily through September and Saturdays and Sundays during October.

No trip to the Tawas area would be complete without a visit to the US Coast Guard Lighthouse on Tawas Point. Located just beyond Tawas Point State Park, only pedestrians are permitted in the vicinity of the light and on the nature trails which run to the end of the point.

Testimony of a Jail House Lawyer

Dear Editor:
I am a jail house lawyer. Because of my efforts in this area I have been persecuted, prosecuted against illegally and slandered, but that is not my message.
I am a member and Secretary of the S.M.P. Jaycees which is affiliated with the United State Jaycees. Upon becoming a Jaycee over two years ago I made a vow to myself that I would do everything within my power to uphold and live by the Jaycee Creed. The fourth line of that creed reads, "That government should be of laws rather than of men."
These are powerful words which I find have little or no meaning in the State of Michigan. I am dedicated in an apparent self-destructive effort to help establish those words in the vocabulary of Michigan's Judicial System.
Justice Mary S. Coleman stated as published on the Detroit News Editorial page Wednesday, June 5, 1974: "I hate to put it this way but I think appellate courts like ours have become obsessed with the perfect trial to the point that we have forgotten about the fair trial. Courts have become, in hindsight too ritualistic. The substance of a case becomes lost as a result and so does the truth." These are fine words by Justice Coleman, but, they apparently have little meaning to her and the court she sits on as is evident by the attempt

covering up process which that court is attempting in the case of People vs Collins, Docket Number 55785.
Richard Collins was arrested and charged with a murder committed in the perpetration of an armed robbery. A curious procedure was followed by Mr. Collins' Preliminary Examination. The complaining witness against Mr. Collins was not called by the Prosecution to testify. Even though the person who signed the complaint against Mr. Collins was a Police Officer, had escorted Mr. Collins to the courtroom and sat next to him throughout the proceedings Mr. Collins was not allowed to cross-examine this man because the prosecution failed to produce him as a witness.
Mr. Collins was bound over to Circuit Court, tried before a jury and convicted.
Mr. Collins exerted his right to appeal and requested the services of the State Appellate Defender as appellate counsel. Because trial counsel would not continue with his defense he was compelled to take that step. The State Appellate Defender refused to accept the case claiming a conflict of interest in that they represented the co-defendant in the case. Therefore, Mr. Collins was required to carry his appeal to the Court of Appeals in proper person without the benefit of counsel. That is when I agreed to assist Mr. Collins.

After the brief was filed on behalf of Mr. Collins the Court of Appeals consolidated Mr. Collins case with that of co-defendant. Proper objection was made and the court severed the causes. Even though the Court of Appeals separated the cases, and over Mr. Collins objections, they were heard on the same day by the same panel of Judges that heard co-defendant case.
In People vs Hill, 44 Mich App 308 the Michigan Court of Appeals ruled that the requirements for a valid arrest warrant under the Fourth and Fourteenth Amendments have been set forth in Giordenello vs United States and most recently in Whiteley vs Warden of Wyoming State Penitentiary, both United States Supreme Court decisions. This is the same question raised by Mr. Collins.
When People vs Collins, 52 Mich App 332 came along, the Michigan Court of Appeals, by a different panel of Judges, refused to abide by the holding in the Hill decision defining the Fourth Amendment requirements as to probably cause sufficient to justify the issuance of a warrant and declined to follow that interpretation. This Court in effect, overturned the Hill decision which is in direct conflict with its own ruling of 3 Mich App 143 wherein it stated that "Appellate court may not presume to determine what law might be set forth by Supreme Court, but is required to interpret and apply the law as it has been set forth by that court in its decisions."
Needless to say, Application for Leave to Appeal to the Michigan Supreme Court was prepared for and filed by Mr. Collins. Mr. Collins did not at that time request Counsel because of the problem he had in going to the Court of Appeals. The Supreme Court on their own Motion appointed the State Appellate Defender as Counsel. Mr. Collins objected on the ground of the conflict of interest. This was supported by a brief from the State Appellate Defender. The Court resented its order and issued another order appointing Mr. Richard D. Wells of St. Johns, Michigan as counsel.
After writing several inquiry letters to Mr. Wells and failing to receive any response whatsoever, Mr. Collins chose to investigate into the matter. Several startling discoveries have been made that are apparently widely known to various involved parties but have been kept secret from Mr. Collins including the possibility of collusion between Attorney's and the Prosecutor in this case.
It has been discovered that trial counsel for Mr. Collins also handled at one time, civil matters for the decedent and remaining victim of the crime. This was not brought to the attention of the trial court, on the record, which is required by the canon of ethics.
At the time of trial Mr. Richard D. Wells was engaged in a partnership with the trial counsel.
It has further been discovered that counsel for co-defendant, Mr. James A. Moore was at one time an Assistant Prosecuting Attorney. It appears that he prosecuted and sent to jail or prison the husband of one of the women on the jury panel.
It is also a fact that one of the woman jurors played the organ, at the church, for the funeral of the decedent in this case.
The startling fact that all Michigan residents should be made aware of is that in

Michigan under our present law it is possible for a person to be arrested, tried and convicted based upon a complaint filed by an individual who has no personal knowledge of the facts set forth in his complaint and the person arrested, tried and convicted has no right to challenge the complaint nor does he have the right to question the individual who makes the complaint.
Regardless of the hardships imposed upon me as a result of my stand as a jail house lawyer, I will continue in my struggle to change Michigan's laws to conform with the United State Constitution and the United State Supreme Court's interpretation of the Constitution.
The old saying "that the pen is mightier than the sword" is true. I will continue using my pen in trying to establish in Michigan law the mandates set down by the United States Supreme Court.

In the world of stage and film, one of the harsh critical complaints made against actors is that they can only "play themselves" they can't make people really believe for a while that they are the character portrayed in the script.

In politics, our hope is to elect men who are not good at roleplaying but who fill their office by being truly themselves. And we are learning to tell the difference.

President Ford supportive of vocational education

The following article, written by President Gerald R. Ford, appeared in the "MICHIGAN ASSOCIATION OF SCHOOL BOARDS JOURNAL", November 1973:

"Fundamentally, I feel that the Federal role should be supportive of local efforts and should not dictate local decisions on educational policy. However, it is unrealistic to suppose that there are no broad national interests served by education which require a measure of national leadership. For example, vocational education in the public schools

was initiated by the Smith-Hughes Act of 1917 in recognition of national needs for skilled manpower. Thus the Federal Government does quite deliberately try to affect educational decision-making.

"THE FEDERAL Government cannot escape its own responsibility to examine Federal aid in terms of national priorities. I suspect that what really occurs is a complex interaction between local, State, and Federal levels, and with the general public, which determines priorities in education. In

any event, I think it is appropriate that they constantly be re-examined. The requirements of the job market in a fast-changing technological society, the rapid revision upward in the level of basic skills needed for functional literacy, and the needs of the adult population for retraining, among other factors, means that education cannot stand still.

"Hopefully we shall begin to find more effective answers to some urgent problems in education through better

research. But I do not believe we can wait all the answers before we attack the problems. This year some 700,000 youngsters will leave school before high school graduation; another 700,000 will graduate from a general curriculum which has prepared them neither for further academic work or entry on a skilled job; another 700,000 college students will drop out without having completed requirements for a degree and will need some sort of additional occupational preparation. We cannot as a Nation afford to be complacent

about educational needs of these dimensions. "I think, therefore, that there will continue to be in Federal programs a strong emphasis upon helping school systems to overcome educational failure, with the objective that no child leave school unnecessarily disadvantaged by a lack of basic skills, I hope that we shall continue the strong Federal emphasis upon vocational-technical education as a vital component in the concept of "career education" - that every person should be prepared to pursue a career

commensurate with aptitudes and interests. "MODERN VOCATIONAL-TECHNICAL education should not be thought of as "second rate" or "second best." Federal programs can play a vital role making the concept of career education a reality for all. Obviously, programs to strengthen counseling and guidance services in the schools, and to give more emphasis to occupational and career counseling, are vital in reaching this objective.

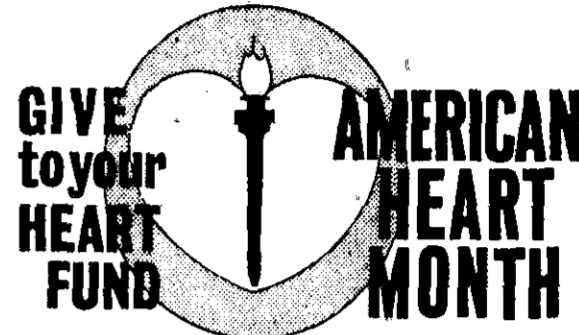

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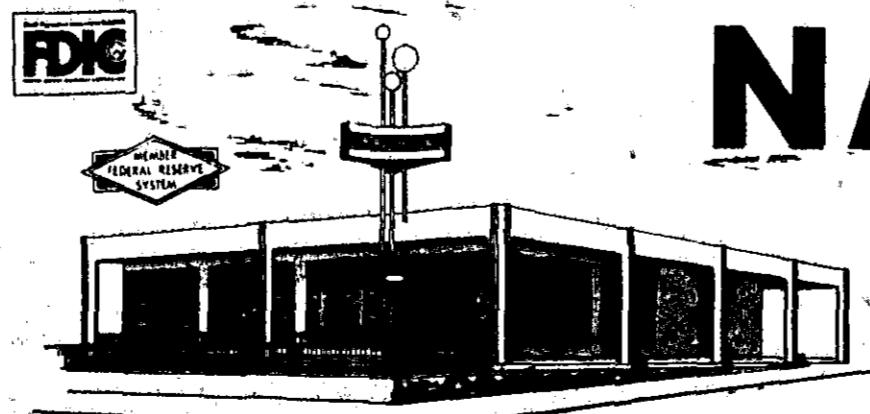

Energy labeling of household appliances

With only 1/17th of the world's population, our country uses 1/3 of the world's energy.

Approximately 20 percent of all energy consumed in the United States is used in apartments and single family dwellings. Much of this energy is needed to operate the vast number of appliances found in American homes. These include some 31 million room air conditioners; 70 million refrigerators; 23 million freezers; and 55 million water heaters.

The Department of Commerce, working with the Council on Environmental Quality and the Environmental Protection Agency, has recently developed a voluntary system of energy efficiency labeling for home appliances. This program focuses on household appliances

and equipment, such as air conditioners, that are large energy consumers and that have a wide range of efficiencies.

The program's purpose is two-fold: -to encourage manufacturers to provide point-of-sale information on appliance energy use; and -to encourage consumers to buy the most efficient products that will meet their needs.

Success of the program is dependent upon participation by manufacturers, retailers and consumers.

MANUFACTURERS. Participating manufacturers will label their products to indicate their energy consumption, and their relative efficiency in comparison with other directly competitive models. Where

practical, energy cost will also appear on the labels.

CONSUMERS. By actually using the information on the label, and by showing preference for the more efficient appliance models, consumers can also compete in production of more efficient products.

Room air-conditioners were chosen as the first appliance group to be labeled with energy efficiency information. Ultimately, labels will appear on such other energy-intensive appliances such as refrigerators; freezers; water heaters; dishwashers, etc.

Look for the energy conservation label when you purchase your next appliance. Using it can save energy and make a difference in your utility bill.

Bill's Column

Watch out for silo gas

Silo gas can kill. And almost every farmer who puts up silage could be faced with silo gas.

Treat every silo as though gas were present. Nearly every silo with corn silage in it will have some gas.

Silo gas (nitrogen dioxide) is heavier than air and accumulates just above the silage, at the bottom of the silo, in the unloading chute, or in the feed room. Dead birds around these areas are clues that the gas is at dangerous levels. But many times the gas will be toxic and you won't see these signs.

Don't take the chance. Even if the gas doesn't kill you, it can

permanently damage your lungs and cut down your oxygen supply for the rest of your life.

Safeguards against silo gas: -Stay out of the silo for a week, better yet two weeks after filling the silo. Never go into the silo alone during the danger period.

-If you must enter the silo within two weeks, run the blower 15 to 20 minutes before going in. Keep the blower running while anyone is inside.

-If you experience the slightest throat irritation or coughing get into fresh air right away. Immediate treatment by your doctor may reduce lung

damage and keep pneumonia from developing later.

-Keep children and animals away from the silo base during filling and for at least two weeks afterward.

-Keep the door closed between the silo room and barn to protect livestock.

-Ventilate the silo room for at least two weeks after filling by opening outside doors and windows to carry away fumes. Removing the chute doors down to the level of settled silage will permit natural ventilation at that point where gas tends to be concentrated.
