FACT finder

Are you concerned about getting the straight facts on a question which arises but don't know where to find the answer? We'll find the facts for questions submitted by our readers. Just drop us a line at **FIND FINDER**, Clinton County News St. Johns 48879.

Q-While vacationing in northern Michigan we couldn't believe our eyes when what looked like a cougar ran across the road near Mesick north of Cadillac. Could this have been?

A biologist for the Department of Natural Resources in Lansing bets you didn't. You're not the only ones reporting such claims. The DNR checks hundreds of calls like yours from lower Michigan and the Upper Peninsula. A lady near Laingsburg is still sticking to her story that she's seen 1 in Clinton County. You might have seen a bobcat.

Q-When is the city going to resurface the corner of South Oakland street and Townsend Road. If something isn't done fast, cars are going to disappear in those holes. While I'm asking, why do dead end streets get passed by when it comes to sweeping? **BD, ST. JOHNS.**

A-Get a pail and shovel—that might be the only way to get the job done. This year's budget for road resurfacing didn't include that section of Oakland. It's up to the city commission if it's on for '73. A visit by road crews to patch things up should be in the workings by now.

A visit by road crews to patch things up should be in the workings by now. City Manager Harvey Weatherwax says the street sweeper is going all the time. When it's not it's not in the garage. Normal schedule is for each paved street at least once every 2 months.

Q-With DeWitt just down the road from St. Johns, why can't there be toll free service between the two cities? **DD, DeWITT**

A-You've reached a wrong number! But, with some help from Bill Graeff, General Telephone district manager, **FACT FINDER** untangled the lines. He says the calling volume between St. Johns and DeWitt is not sufficient to warrant considering it up to the present time. This could change with increased usage. Good news to the west is toll free service between Fowler-Pewamo exchange and St. Johns in '73. It was approved last year when Gen Tel in that area had sufficient volume to order the equipment. The cost will run into 5 figures. If you want to talk about it—just pick up your phone and dial Bill.

Q-My husband is 67 and gets monthly social security retirement payments. I'm 58 and totally disabled. Can I get disability benefits on my husband's work record?

A-No, you are not eligible to receive a wife's benefit until you're 62 unless you have a child in your care who is entitled to cash payments on your husband's work record. But, if you've worked long enough and recently enough, you may be eligible for disability benefits on your own work record if your disability will keep you from working for a year or more.

District expands with 2 buildings

ST. JOHNS-Clinton County Intermediate School district is getting some much needed room with the construction of 2 buildings on US-27 2 miles south of St. Johns.

A pre-engineered 72 x 48 feet unit to house 26 special education students will be ready for occupancy by the end of this month. Work on a \$126,000 administration building is scheduled for a December completion.

B. Stanley Pocuis, superintendent reports the 4-acre site was purchased this spring. The school is being financed by 3/4 mill approved last year for special education. To be paid for over a 3-year period, the district will furnish its own teachers.

Trainable students age 5 to 21 will be attending the new centrally located school. They will be bused from 6 districts served by the program. Until the school's ready to open the Greenwood School, a 1-room rural building northwest of St Johns will continue to operate.

The intermediate district had contracted with St Johns Public Schools and they in turn provided the school and teachers. Pocuis said the new school is a necessity because of the increase of special education students by 7.

"GREENWOOD SCHOOL is overcrowded," he related "and we couldn't find anything to rent at this late date so we decided to build early this month."

Pocuis explained that Space Planning Associates, Southfield, sold the district the National Homes building. The framework was constructed in less than a day with the interior now being

completed by workmen.

The school contains 4 self-contained classrooms. The 2 carpeted classrooms in the front are for regular usage while the others are tiled and slated for a "sheltered workshop." They will be further developed as the school year gets underway.

The new shelter program is being designed to teach older trainable students skills so they can have eventual income as adults. Area industries will be contacted and urged to provide piecework.

PLANS HAVE BEEN announced to turn another room into a home economics center where students can learn to prepare meals and to do housekeeping chores, according to Pocuis. He emphasized that while not all of the district's special education needs are being met this is a step in the right direction.

WARREN HOLMES, Lansing architects, designed the 100 x 43 feet administration building. Rademacher Construction, St Johns is putting up the single story, brick exterior building.

Building costs are coming from the general fund and none of the special education monies are being used. In December, the district's 21 employees will be able to move from inadequate facilities on the second floor of a building owned by the county across from the courthouse.

An innovation in the building is a room for a data processing hookup with Lansing and Ingham. The district would have a director connection with the end result better school service. The district believes this can be a reality within a year.

Pocuis believes the 2 buildings will complement each other. One well and 1 septic tank is being installed to serve both buildings. Only half of the parcel is being used leaving open 2 acres for the district's future building needs.

Independent seeks 10th district seat

State Representative Richard Friske of Charlevoix has confirmed that he will accept the draft initiated by the American Independent Party at last week end's convention in Flint to make him a candidate for Congress in the 10th congressional district against Elfred Cederberg.

Friske is presently a member of the Michigan Legislature and a very successful orchardist. He is married to the former Olga Kotke and they have three children. They make their home in Antrim County but also have a second residence and office in Isabella County.

IN MAKING his announcement, Representative Friske stated that "I will do everything within my power to expose how Mr Cederberg has betrayed the trust of his constituents by voting for bigger bureaucratic government and wasteful spending 70 times out of 100."

THE 10th Congressional District includes a geographical area which extends as far north as Antrim and Arenac County. The city of St Johns and the Clinton County townships of Bengal, Bingham, Duplain, Essex, Greenbush, Olive, Ovid, Riley, Victor and Westphalia are within this district.

"The DAV is an organization of wartime service disabled veterans who have given much for their country and many have given part of their body and mind that the United States may remain a free country," stated Carl G. Light, commander of the local group.

Light said that "he hoped people

would give a little for those who gave a lot". The drive will be held in the Ovid area on Friday, Sept 15.

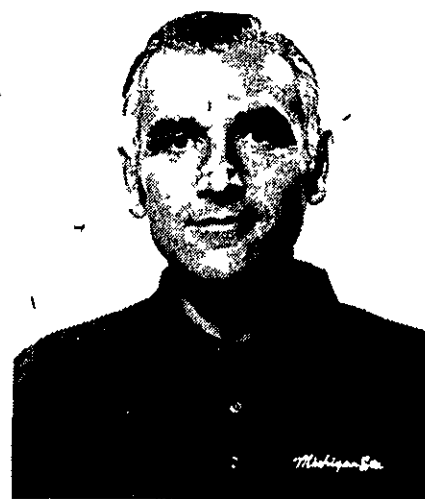
Last year's top awards went to Jack Downing as outstanding citizen and Bernard Feldpausch as the member contributing most to Chamber activities.

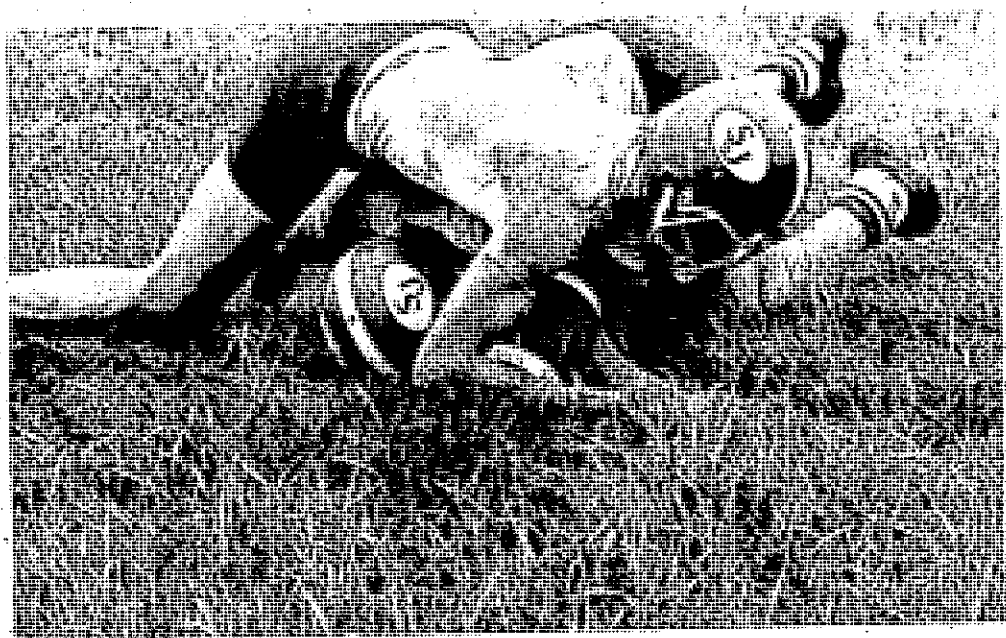

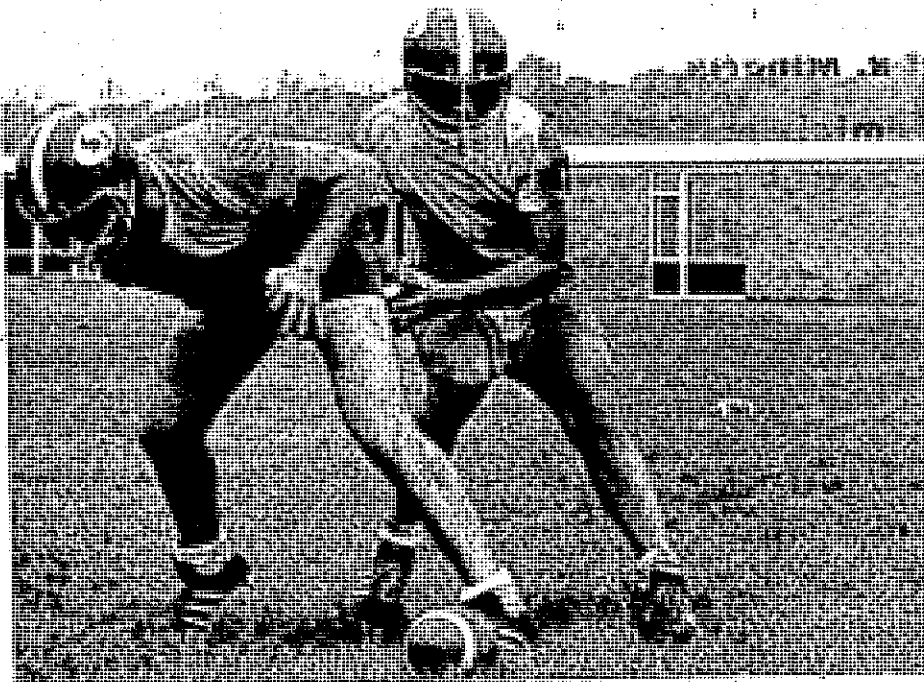

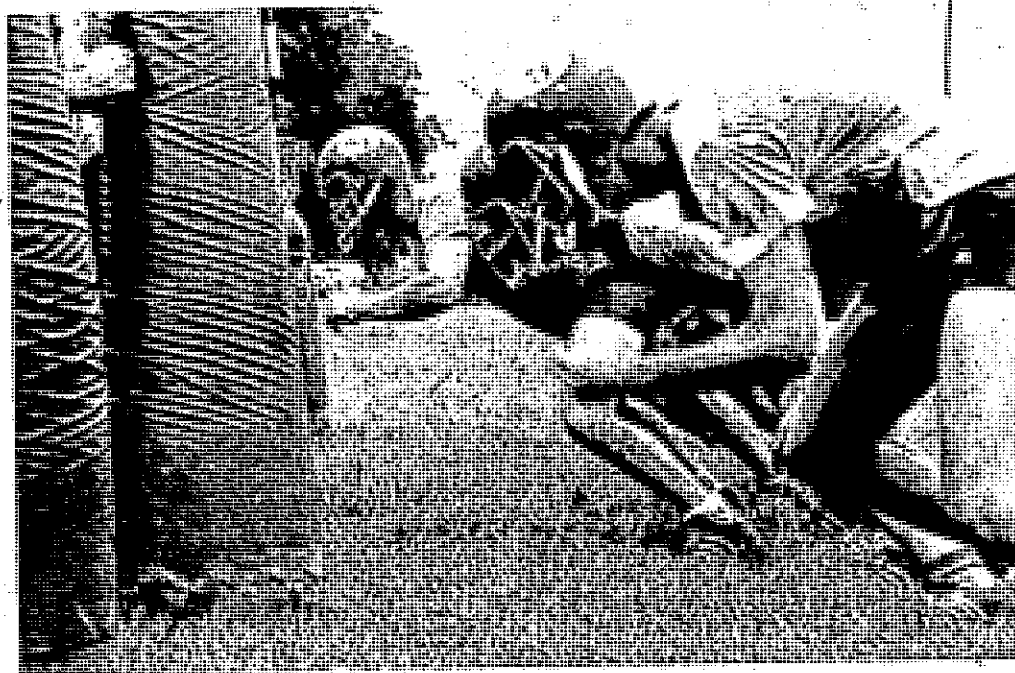

St Joe guild helps in ecological campaign

The ecological campaign for recycling and a women's church guild share the benefits of a paper shredding program undertaken two months ago by the maintenance staff of Clinton National Bank and Trust Co.

Already nearly a ton and a half of shredded paper has been donated to the St Sylvania's Guild of St Joseph's Church, a group which sells the paper to a Lansing firm for recycling then directs the proceeds to projects within the church and the community.

Over 40,000 lbs of paper were collected by the ladies during a six-month period, bringing \$203 into the guild's coffers. According to Mrs Jerrold Brockmyre, guild president, the paper usually brings between \$3 and \$8 per hundredweight and the ladies' outlet in Lansing is the Friedland Iron and Metal Co.

For the past year the two-dozen ladies of the guild who have worked directly with the project have been encouraging area residents to bring discarded paper to the former Bee's Used Car office on South US-27, but collecting procedures for this year will be different.

Mrs Brockmyre explained that residents are asked to store the paper in their homes for collection at four different times during

coming months. Because of the auto firm's removal of their building, storage space is unavailable, however a semi-truck from the buyer will be in St Johns for weekend periods beginning with the following dates: Oct 13; March 2, 1973; June 22, 1973 and Sept 14, 1973. The truck will be parked at St Joseph School and residents will be asked to deliver papers to that location.

The local bank's role in the recycling program got underway early this summer after a study of the security surrounding the handling of an ever-increasing quantity of waste paper. The study

affirmed the value of a shredder but still the effective disposal of large quantities of paper posed a problem.

Volunteer clinic is a success in St Johns

ST JOHNS -- "Restorative as well as preventive." That's the purpose of the St Johns Inter-Agency Volunteer Clinic which came to a close Aug 28.

This summer's program was a success, says Michael Beechem, migrant resource worker with the Clinton County Department of Social Services. But, he em-

phasized, the real success will be measured only by the number of followups in Texas.

BEECHEM FEELS

free medical help given at the Monday night clinics is a must, for many reasons. Migrant workers employed on Clinton area farms have no family doctors here, he says, and they find it difficult to receive medical treatment.

Between 20 and 30 migrant workers and their families attended the 2nd annual clinics at the St Johns Episcopal Church. People were very receptive for the clinic which not only gave immunizations to prevent illness, but cared for those already sick.

Five doctors volunteered at the clinics beginning July 10. Staffing the clinics were Dr. George Bennett, MD, Elsie; Dr. William Jordan, DO, Fowler; Dr. William Steigerwald, DO, Maple Rapids; Dr. Douglas Hewitt, Lansing and Dr. Heland Garapetian, St. Johns. A visiting physician was Dr. Patricia Wentz, MD, Adrian. Beechem was disappointed more doctors didn't respond, but hopes for an expansion next year.

IN ADDITION to the medical staff, volunteers from United Migrants for Opportunity (UMO), Public Health, Clinton Social Services and the Ingham County Health Department Family Planning were on hand. Many others, including Michigan State University social work

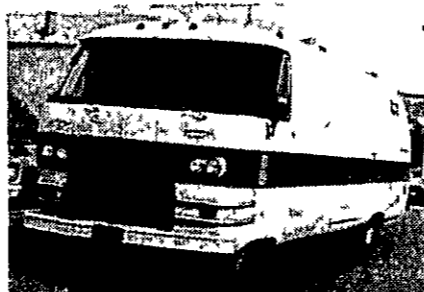

An ounce of prevention

Not long ago our Meridian Township Human Resources Commission recommended lowering the penalty for marijuana smokers apprehended within its boundaries to five dollars.

Fortunately, the township board of trustees turned down the recommendation.

My favorite explanation which may not be accurate at all, is that the township of Meridian, including the small towns of Okemos and Haslet, suffers from a chronic case of sibling rivalry as regards the adjacent enlightened city of East Lansing.

East Lansing had recently passed an ordinance of this type, and we in Meridian just would not pass up an opportunity to show that we are, at least, as enlightened and civilized and urbane as the college town.

UNNECESSARY ENCOURAGEMENT

This is so much nonsense! Most people today agree that making criminals, and dangerous ones at that, of the occasional users of marijuana has been a serious mistake. It has not helped either the individual involved, or society at large.

As a result, both at the federal and state levels, the once very harsh penalties for marijuana possession or use have been liberalized. Most experts consider this a good development.

However, for local units of government to take the approach of independently lowering penalties would appear to be an unnecessary and potentially dangerous move.

It is unnecessary, because there are state and federal laws to deal with the problem. It is also perilous and unwise, in that youth may see in this politically expedient maneuver an underhanded encouragement to TO ACT OUR AGE.

This position, I know, is not going to make me many friends with the younger generation.

And that is quite as it should be. I don't think youngsters necessarily respect their elders because we agree with them all the time, or go overboard in supporting their ideas.

Let youth be youth, and decide, as many have done, that marijuana smoking is merely harmless recreation, and that we older people are making much ado about nothing.

But let us stick to our guns, in terms of our longer experience and knowledge of life. SOME IMPORTANT REASONS.

Dr. Marvin Moser, a professor of Medicine at Albert Einstein Medical School in New York, has summarized in a very articulate way, a number of cogent points against legalization of marijuana.

Contrary to what many youngsters want to believe, little is known about marijuana overall effects, or a rigorous scientific basis.

In recent times, no drug has been cleared for general use, based on the kind of fragmentary evidence available on marijuana; particularly, one drug with such significant influence for the formative adolescent years.

If marijuana is legalized, and future information should disclose detrimental effects, how do we manage to re-impose restrictions? "Ah, go on," a youngster may say, "I've been smoking marijuana for years, and look at me!"

All I can say is, think of how long it took to recognize the hidden dangers of cigarette smoking. Why should chronic marijuana inhalation be less damaging, in the long run?

It is true enough that the effect of marijuana on many people may be no more serious than changes in sense of time and space or in perception of coordination, though occasional cases of

acute psychosis have been documented.

In fact, in countries where more potent forms of the drug are freely available (hashish), drug-induced psychosis and admissions to mental hospitals are as numerous as alcohol related problems are in ours.

Here's the Gamaliel Ariaz home at 512 W Gibbs. Included in their half acre of flowers are roses, petunias, zinnias, moss rose, hens and chickens. The list is endless.

ST. JOHNS -- The Gamaliel Ariaz family says it with flowers.

They've turned their home at 512 W Gibbs into a makeshift greenhouse. And the thick green grass surrounding the white frame house sprouts a rainbow of budding colors.

The local couple put their green thumbs to work 4 years ago. That's when Gamaliel, his wife Vicky and 3 girls traveled to Clinton County from Texas.

Ariaz suffered a heart attack shortly after the move taking him off the job. Gardening became his therapy.

A most unusual plant they have raised is a cactus hand carried from Texas. Another one of the pride and joys is a zinnia which measures 5 inches across the head. Many flowers will be rerooted for next year.

Another gardening project Gamaliel has undertaken on a larger scale is corn and pickles. He's harvesting his acre of crops now before fall weather comes along bringing cold weather.

Friends, neighbors and passersby have enjoyed the floral show. Many go out of their way just to look at the colorful spray to brighten their day.

What's the secret to successful flowers? Gamaliel and Vicky don't mind revealing their secret.

"We just keep the weeds out -- that's all."

The home economist

School time can be maddening for the women who sew for school age children. Some children have a way of growing out of a garment almost before it is completed. But one good point about growth spurts is that they are mostly in the vertical position.

Planning for a large hem is the most obvious remedy, but quite a large amount of growth takes place in the torso area. This makes dropping the hem less of a cure-all.

Dresses which have no waistline seam are ideal choices.

Some other ideas include choosing a dress with a waistline that dips to a point or curves down in front. It can be worn from a fraction of an inch below the waist to a fraction of an inch above. Sometimes this extra camouflages and adds another years wear.

Jumpers are great coverups for too-short blouses.

A wide sash worn at the waist will cover a rising waistline. Sew it to hang a bit below on belt loops, and as the waistline rises, so can the sash until the bottom of the sash touches the top of the waist.

If sleeves have become too short on a long-sleeved blouse, remove them, and add a colorful seam binding to the edge.

When choosing a long sleeved blouse select one with a roomy sleeve. It won't become tight so quickly.

Skirt problems have a few solutions too.

Those too-short suspenders can be removed. To hold the skirt up, sew buttonholes in the skirt and buttons onto the matching blouse.

When first sewing a skirt with suspenders lengthen those straps 5 to 6 inches for growth room. Sew the buttonholes in the skirt and buttons on the suspender. Then you can lengthen with no trouble.

Don't forget an extra inch in the side placket for waist expansion.

For suits, which present quite an investment in time and money, choose a straight boxy style jacket. It looks attractive at several different lengths. Begin with it cut slightly below the hips and wear until it rises slightly above the waist.

Sleeves may present the only problem. These can be removed to make a bolero out of the jacket or shortened to 3/4 length.

For the slacks that somehow still fit, but are straight leg instead of bell bottomed here's an idea. Add a V-shaped piece in the outside seam starting at the knee in a contrasting print or stripe. And if you need a little length add a strip around the bottom too.

About the only other tip I have is, "hang on, in 12 years or so it will be all over."

Questions about Social Security

Q. I JUST FOUND SOME DOCTOR BILLS FROM LAST YEAR AND WAS WONDERING IF I COULD STILL SEND THEM IN TO MEDICARE FOR PAYMENT. CAN YOU TELL ME IF THERE'S A TIME LIMIT ON CLAIMING MEDICAL EXPENSES FROM 1971?

A. Yes, there's a time limit. It's December 31, 1972, for services from 10/1/70 through 9/30/72. It's December 31, 1973 for services received from 10/1/71, through 9/30/72.

Q. I'M 66 AND GETTING MONTHLY SOCIAL SECURITY RETIREMENT CHECKS, AND I'M ALSO WORKING PART TIME FOR A CHURCH NURSERY. SINCE THE CHURCH HAS NOT DECIDED TO COVER MY PART-TIME WORK BY SOCIAL SECURITY, CAN THESE EARNINGS AFFECT MY MONTHLY CHECKS?

A. Yes, if your total earnings for the year go over \$1680. Earnings from any work, whether or not covered by social security, have to be included in figuring the amount of your earnings that may affect benefits due you for a year. However, income from savings investments, pensions and insurance does not count.

It was a great race for Terry

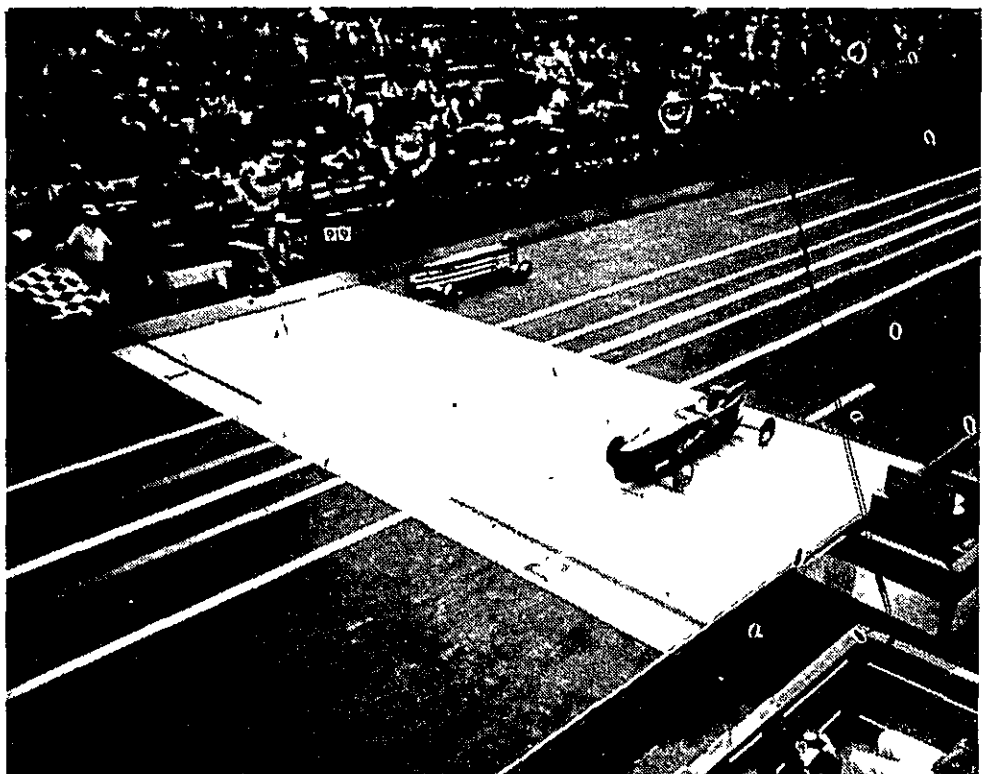

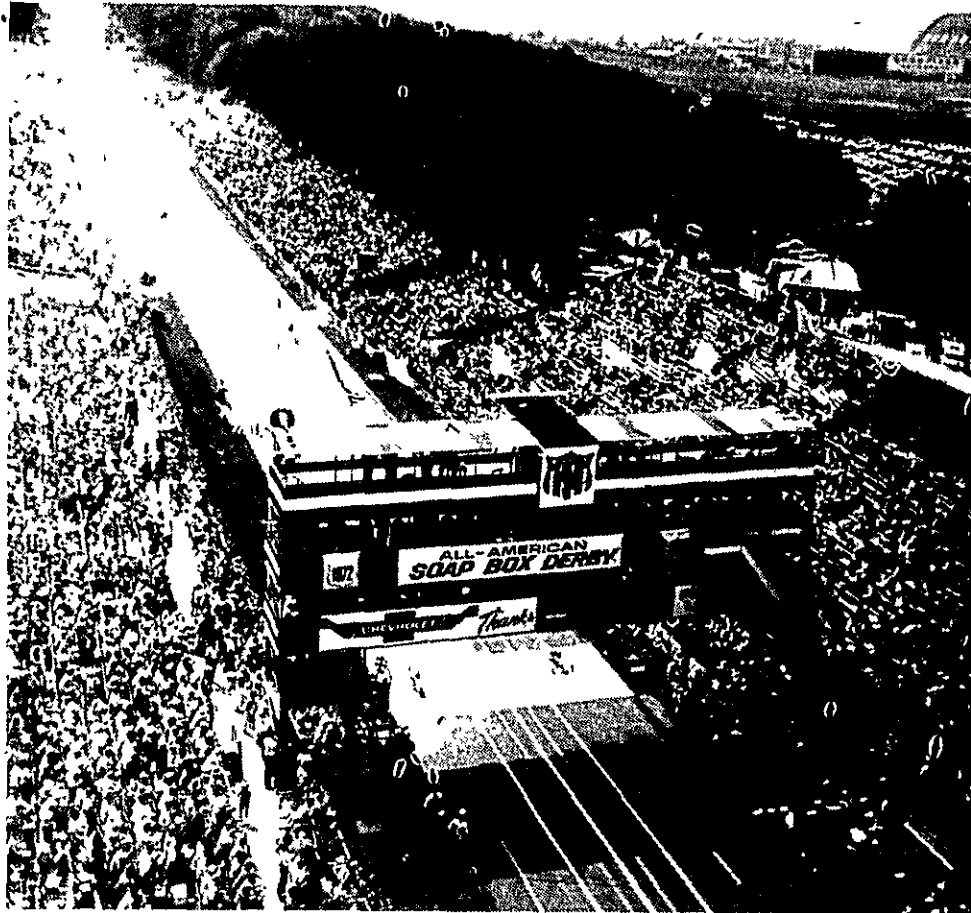
meeting national celebrities and other excitement preceded the running of the Derby.

Mutual problem

Citizens of St Johns and the City Commission have a mutual problem and it isn't anything new.

Flooded basements following rain storms or when extra strain is placed on the sanitary sewer system are becoming increasingly prevalent. And no one is appreciative of the fact that government moves slowly.

The fact that engineering work is under way and has been for months to correct some of the water problems doesn't go far in appeasing a distraught property owner. City Commission members aren't happy over some of the delays either, but state specifications change, often times in the middle of a project, and it requires a restart.

When the time arrives to implement the plans to help solve the problem it is hoped that no major bonding issue will be required. However, in some areas of the city corrective measures will necessitate special bonding districts. Dear Editor: The newspaper editorial from K.C. in the Aug 22 issue, have given the firemen a black eye. Now I feel it is time for the public to be a little more informed on information that doesn't seem to be clarified very complete.

FACT—Firemen are not hurting the budget. Last year the Firemen underspent their budget by \$10,000.

FACT—An increase in our Blue Cross rate would be 2,700 and not over 3,000 as stated.

FACT—Firemen lay their life and limb on the line every time we answer an alarm for approximately \$1.25 per day.

FACT—Firemen are not being unrealistic in our efforts, we are only asking to be compensated fairly for our volunteer efforts.

FACT—Firemen spend a lot of time after fires cleaning and restoring equipment that we do not log.

FACT—No estimate can be made on time spent by the Firemen in attempts to supply one of the greatest 4th of July shows in the area, at no compensation, for the Public. Funds earned here are generally spent on extra fire equipment.

FACT—Our Department is one of the best in the State. It pains us after these honors to be shunned so by our city fathers.

FACT—2 hours are spent each monthly period to keep it that way.

FACT—2 hours a month are also spent in drill for \$3.00 per hour. Drill constitutes laying hose, checking, picking up hose, re-laying on truck beds and general maintenance on equipment. Sometimes constituting hard labor.

FACT—If Firemen do resign over this, the city will have to go to a paid Department which will really blow their budget.

FACT—I wish just one of the people fighting us, could make one bad fire in their Sunday clothes and ruin an outfit, mess up an afternoon

with their families, get a cold meal, and for more gratitude for their efforts, try and explain to their wives "THAT SOMEONE HAS TO DO IT."

FACT—Moral has dropped on the Department after recognizing how much we are really appreciated. I also am sorry K.C. that the City Commission feels there is a lack of communication. I guess the old saying "We didn't realize how much they meant to us until they were gone," seems to hold true here.

Ask the Governor

QUESTION: After being shamelessly lied to and finally cheated in my recent attempts to collect on a small claim, I am extremely interested in your proposed legislation for no-fault car insurance. Is there any chance that we will have no-fault insurance soon?

ANSWER: The adoption of a no-fault insurance program for Michigan is one of my top priority proposals for this legislative session, and I am optimistic about the enactment of a system of no-fault insurance before the end of this year.

A no-fault plan has already passed the Senate, and members of the House Insurance Committee have been meeting during this recess in preparation for consideration of a no-fault plan by the House of Representatives during the fall session.

I firmly believe that the citizens of Michigan deserve a better system for compensating persons injured in automobile accidents than exists today. Under the present system of "fault" insurance, nearly 33 cents of every premium dollar paid by Michigan motorists goes for attorney fees, and delays and inequities in the settling of claims are the rule rather than the exception.

The plan I have proposed may result in some savings in insurance premiums, but, more importantly, the primary benefits to Michigan citizens under a no-fault plan will be prompt payment for medical, hospital and rehabilitation services and for lost wages, with a greater proportion of the automobile insurance premium dollar going to pay for actual losses than does today.

QUESTION: My husband's parents have spent their entire lives in Florida, and will be visiting Michigan for the first time this fall. We want to show them some of Michigan's beautiful fall color and are wondering if you have any recommendations as to where to take them?

ANSWER: Michigan's abundant forests each autumn beckon hundreds of thousands of visitors, both from within and outside of our state. Beginning in the Keweenaw Peninsula in late September and slowly moving southward, the reds and yellows of our native hardwoods, contrasting with the green of our pines, spruces, and balsams, give Michigan some of the most beautiful and breath-taking fall scenery available in our nation.

I would suggest that anyone planning a trip to northern Michigan during the coming fall, obtain a copy of the "Michigan Autumn Color Tour Guide" published by the Michigan Tourist Council. This guide contains 24 color tour maps and information on points of particular interest in both the upper, and lower peninsulas, and is available for free by writing the Michigan Tourist Council, Suite 102, Commerce Center Building, 300 S Capitol Ave., Lansing, Mich, 48933.

Beginning the last week of September, the Tourist Council also maintains weekly "Color Progress Reports" in its Lansing office, and a telephone call to (517) 373-0670 will yield an up-to-date report on areas of peak autumn color throughout our state.

QUESTION: Did you ever serve in the US Military?

View from the Senate

Under the Michigan Constitution, the State Board of Education is responsible for "leadership, general supervision . . . general planning and coordinating" of all public education, and for advising the Legislature as to the financial requirements of public education.

In accord with this latter responsibility, and in recognition of the strong possibility that Michigan's system of financing its schools largely through locally-leveled property taxes may be altered by Constitutional amendment this November, the State Board has directed the Department of Education to prepare a plan for full state funding of education.

The Departmental Plan recommends, for the basic instructional program, that Michigan should begin working toward equity in a dollars-per-pupil sense, by placing an equal "Basic Education Allocation" and an equal "Non-instructional Allocation" behind every pupil in the state.

The Basic Education Allocation would cover the total instructional expense, the total administration expense, and certain fixed charges — but not the additional costs of compensatory special and vocational education.

The Non-instructional Allocation would cover such expenses as plant operation, maintenance, health services, attendance, etc.

Through these two allocations, the Department proposes that all public school children be guaranteed a number of dollars for their education roughly equal to the "average" amount that would have been spent on a Michigan pupil in whatever

year full state funding is initiated.

Every child would be guaranteed this same basic amount — regardless of the salary scales in the region where he lived or the qualifications of his teachers.

(If the Departmental Plan had taken effect in the 1972-73 school year, for example, the foundation program would consist of a Basic Education Allowance estimated at \$647 and a Non-instructional Allocation of \$133, for a total per-pupil allocation of \$780.)

The Department of Education would meet the requirement, under the proposed constitutional amendment, that the state "equalize" the optional 6 mills each local district could levy in the same manner recommended by Governor Milliken.

Each district would be guaranteed the same \$30 per-mill per-pupil return on whatever millage level local voters approved as is currently received by a \$30,000 SEV district. Because of relatively few school districts have extremely high expenditures, the equal distribution system proposed by the Department would raise the dollar support behind fully 58.3% of Michigan pupils.

Through the use of the optional millage, it is estimated that support levels could be maintained (with a minimum 5-1/4% annual increase) for another 35% of Michigan students — leaving about 6.7%, or 150,000 students in 20 districts, in need of some special provision or "grandfather" clause to maintain support levels. (The cost of such a special provision would be roughly \$20 million.)

The Departmental Plan

would fund transportation on the same basis as the Governor's Plan, with 100% state payment of approved costs, but recommends that "in-city" transportation for pupils living more than 1-1/2 miles from their schools be provided.

The Departmental Plan would fund special, vocational and compensatory education on an "added-cost" basis — with the state paying the price of approved programs in excess of the amounts provided for children in those programs through its Basic Educational and Non-instructional Allocations.

Had the plan been implemented for 1972-73, the following cost projections can be made:

Basic Education Allocation	\$1,442,810,000
Non-instructional Allocation	296,590,000
Educational Need Allocation	29,363,000
Compensatory (Vocational)	39,114,000
Special	82,380,000
Transportation	67,000,000
Enrichment Equalization (maximum)	134,090,000
Grandfather	20,000,000
TOTAL STATE COST	\$2,111,347,000

This estimate does not differ significantly from current estimates of the comparable cost of the existing system for 1972-73. There can be little doubt that the Departmental Plan is a practical vehicle which could be financed within the framework of an even "trade" of old revenue sources for new, and that it deserves and will receive the thoughtful consideration of the 1973 legislature.

Abortion

Letter to the Editor

Dear Sur: Since I do live within Clinton County even though I have a Portland mailing address and since I was not included in your random telephone survey, I would like to voice my opinion on abortion. Your article, "Taking the pulse: County Voices Opinion on Abortion," as found on page 3A of the August 23, 1972 issue of the Clinton County News is what called forth the following response from me.

I would simply like to present a) some of my ideas on the issue; b) my reaction to some of the people's reasons for abortion as were found in the above mentioned article; c) a list of resources so that people might read and think out this important issue before they vote without sufficient reflection as to the consequences of their vote.

I. Some of my ideas on the issue: What good is any other right, if we as a nation, state, community, or individual give up the inalienable right to life? Why does not the State of Michigan take a real leadership role and point out to the other states of the Union that Abortion is a negative rather than a positive attempt to solve a given situation.

It stands to reason that what is conceived of animals is in fact animal and what is conceived of humans is in fact human. If, as many argue, life does not begin at conception, then what does happen at conception? The late Dr Leroy Augenstein, a former bio-chemist at Michigan State University, stated categorically at a Michigan Public Hearing on Abortion that "life begins at conception".

Human life is a continuum. You are not now the person you were seven years ago; you are not now the adolescent, child, infant, fetus or embryo that you once were. But what is to say that you were not are not

now a human person at any stage of your human development as a unique human being? Abortion and birth control are not to be confused; abortion is not simply another means of birth control. Abortion kills the new life that has already begun whereas birth control prevents given sperm and egg to form a new life.

Some would have us believe that abortion is only a religious question. This is a rather narrow construct. True, theology does concern itself with respect for human life, but it must turn to science to tell it when life begins. The question of abortion is a basic human question that concerns the entire civilized society in which we live. Abortion is not just a Catholic, Protestant, or Jewish issue. It is a question of who lives or dies.

In my mind it makes no difference to vaguely assume that human life is more human post-born than pre-born. What is critical is that we judge that which is conceived of human beings to be or not to be human life. By a measure of "more" or "less" human, one can easily and logically justify infanticide and euthanasia. Are we going to fail to learn the lessons that history can teach us as illustrated by Great Britain's law, Japan, Israel, East Germany and what about New York's Law - they too are finding it hard to live with.

Why do people think in terms of affording children? Why can we not move toward creating a society in which material comforts are not the ends of our lives; where no child is hungry or neglected; where even defective children are valuable because they call forth our power to love and serve without reward. Instead we destroy the conditions which make life intolerable? If we do this then every child regardless of his capabilities or the circumstances of his birth, would be welcomed, loved, and cared for. What we need in the State of Michigan is

not Abortion reform but Adoption reform.

Before people run to the poles and vote their opinion off the top of their heads, why not read more and try to think out the entire issue? What are we in fact doing if we allow a human life at a given stage of its development to be snuffed out simply for convenience sake?

Did you know that: The Michigan Prosecutors Association regards the proposed easy-abortion bill as a Pandora's box of legal problems, both in enforcement and in its failure to protect the rights of father, mother, baby and doctor.

Did you also know that: The Michigan Sheriff's Association is also on record against the bill, noting that rape is often reported but much less often formally charged. The sheriffs regard the bill as a further step in reducing the respect for authority and law and order.

A circuit judge, Thomas J Foley, (Wayne County), points out that the rights of the unborn child protected by court decisions and the State and United States Constitutions are completely disregarded in the bill.

II. My reaction to some of the people's reasons for abortion:

1) Mrs Gary L Martens: Why don't we help the many young girls before they are blessed with the gift of life so that they will appreciate it when they receive it?

2) Mrs Roger M Rasmussen: When is abortion, i.e., the killing of a new human life that has already begun, ever necessary?

3) Rev Averill Carson: Who is going to speak up in behalf of the unborn if not those who are dedicated to man and his Creator?

4) Mrs Gerald Every: Which is the greater injustice, to destroy a unique human life at any stage of his development or to allow what has begun to come to completion?

5) Mrs John L Jones: I'm happy to see you think the husband should, at least be consulted in the decision

making process of who shall live and who shall die. Too bad our legislators are not willing to speak in behalf of the unborn!

6) Dr Harry J DeVore: There are three involved to start: father, mother and child. Which one are you referring to when you say, "This (abortion) is something that should be decided by the individual involved"? Doctor DeVore, how many cases of conception as a result of rape have you actually come upon? The September 1970 issue of The Educator states that pregnancy from rape is extremely rare. A scientific study of 3,500 cases of rape treated in hospitals in the Minneapolis-Saint Paul area revealed zero cases of pregnancy. This study took place over a ten-year period.

III. Sources of Information: When one is given the opportunity to make a choice, he will make the best choice only after he has examined as carefully as possible, as many of the given options that he possibly can. Here follow some sources of information:

Dr and Mrs J C Wilke's book, Handbook on Abortion has become the "Bible" of those seeking facts for the case of the unborn. This handbook has 25 short chapters with 500 questions and answers and is available at your local bookstore-if not ask for it.

Life Or Death, a fact sheet is available from Hiltz Publishing Co., 6304 Hamilton Ave., Cincinnati, Ohio 45224. Write your Michigan Right to Life Committee 705 Westmoreland, P O Box 9231, Lansing, Michigan 48915

They will be happy to send you a packet of information; ask specifically for their list of 36 Pro-Life Facts, Dr Richard V Jaynes' list of Facts About the Unborn, Dr James J Diamond's report on "Suicide American Style: The Danger of Birth Rate Decline", as well as their fact sheet on Life or Death.

Also write your Michigan Committee for Social Legislation, P O Box 155, Lansing, Michigan 48901.

This committee is a non-profit, non-sectarian educational organization which presents a leaflet entitled "Questions and Answers on Abortion" in the belief that all aspects of this important socio-legal issue should be presented to the public. This same committee was also formed on the proposition that there is life before birth, and that this living person has not had an adequate spokesman in his fight for survival.

I'd like to close with a quotation from Wilke's book:

"One cannot help but be reminded of the anguished comment of a condemned Nazi judge who said to an American judge after the Nuremberg trials: 'I never knew it would come to this.' The American judge answered simply: 'It came to this the first time you condemned an innocent life.'"

When YOU vote this November, will you think positively or negatively; will you choose life or death? Spoken in behalf of the unborn never to be born, DENIS R SPITZLEY

Applications may be submitted any time during the school year, the form itself is simple to complete and requests information needed to determine economic need based on the income and number of persons in the family, number of children attending school or preschool, any unusual circumstances or hardships which affect the family's ability to pay for school meals. The information provided on the application will be confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility.

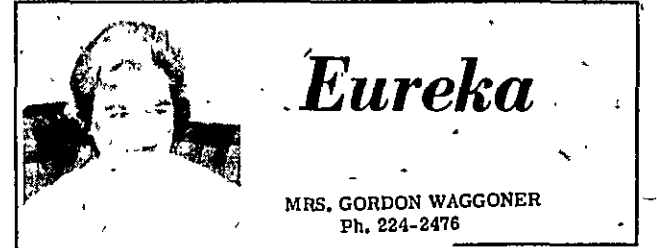
In order to safeguard their identity, children receiving free or reduced price meals will be treated in the same manner as full paying students.

Further assurance is given that children eligible for a free or reduced price meal shall not be required to: (1) Work for their meal, (2) Use

a separate dining room, (3) Go through a separate serving line, (4) Enter a dining room or serving line through a separate entrance, (5) Eat meals at a different time, (6) Eat a different meal that those sold to children paying the full price of such a meal.

Under the provisions of the policy the superintendent will review application and determine eligibility. If a parent is dissatisfied with the ruling of the local official he may make a request either orally or in writing for a hearing to appeal the decision: Gerald Wieber whose address is R-1, Fowler, Michigan 48835 has been designated as the Hearing Official. Hearing procedures are outlined in the policy.

A complete copy is on file in each school and in the office of the superintendent where it may be reviewed by any interested patron.

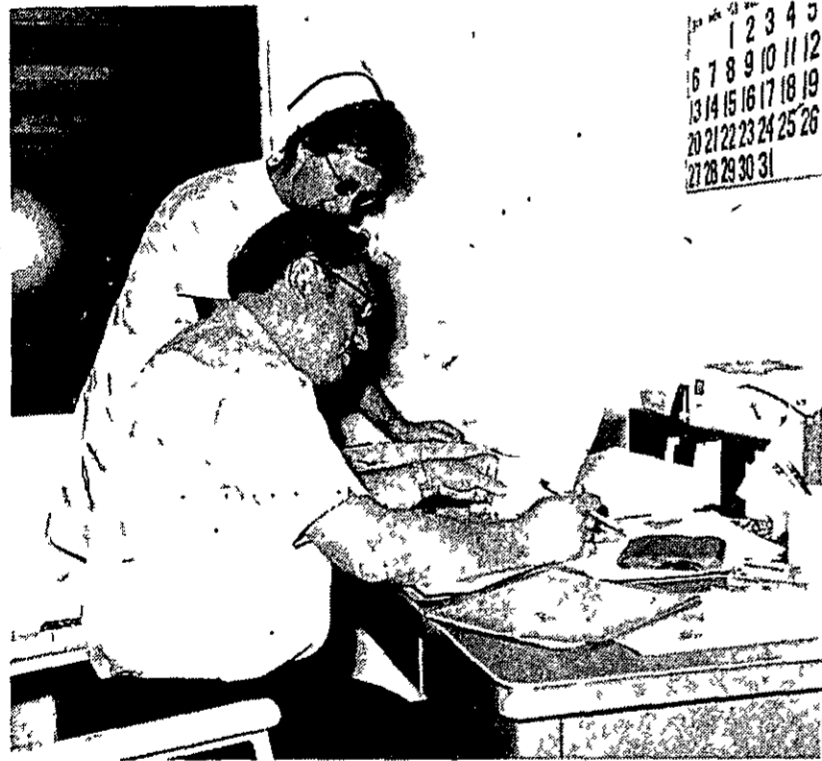

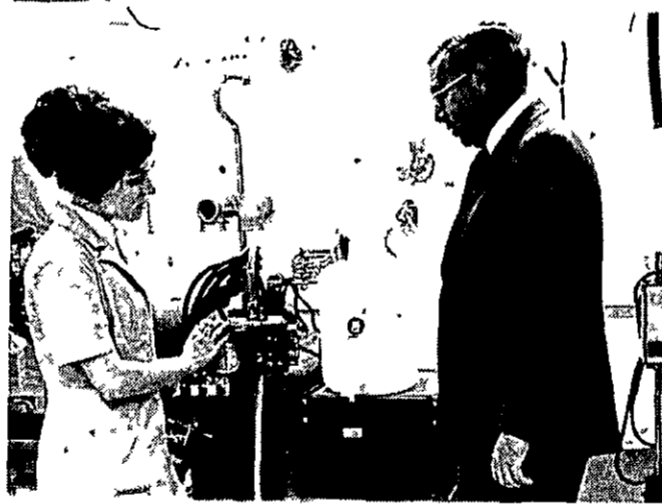
Clinton Memorial Hospital has two major surgery rooms and a minor surgery room.



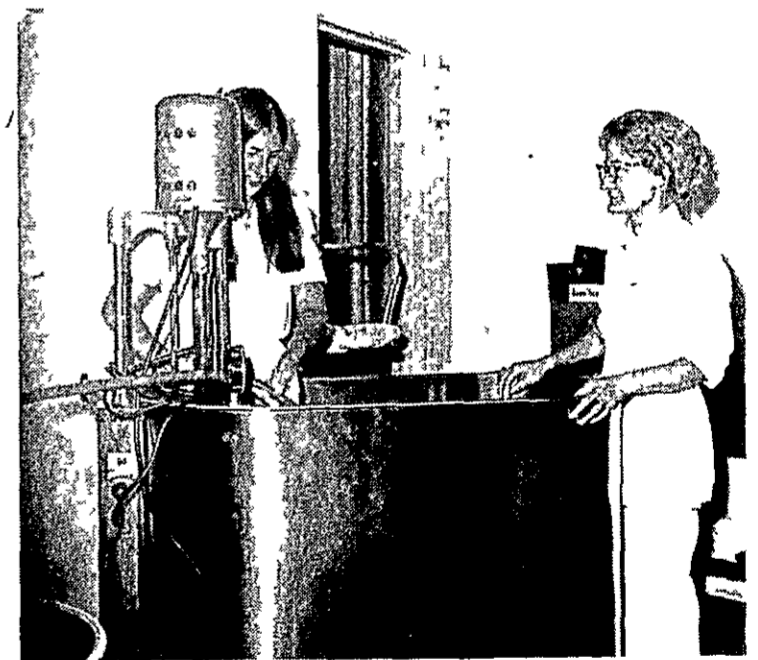
A cardiac monitor unit was provided by the ladies auxiliary, Mrs Pat Simmet, RN, director of nurses shows bank president how the unit operates.
