Clinton studies Public Works Bill

Grant would bring county \$2 billion

Jerry Ambrose, Clinton County administrative assistant, introduced to the County Board of Commissioners a Public Works Bill at its regular meeting Sept. 7.

The bill contains three titles according to Ambrose. The first title is a public works grant totalling \$2 billion. The project would run through the fiscal year 1977. The monies are to be used for construction purposes, and would cover 100 percent of the cost. The grant could not be used for land acquisition, or maintenance.

Of the \$2 billion, 70 per cent of the money would go to areas whose

unemployment rate is above the national average of 7.3 per cent. The other 30 per cent would go to areas where the unemployment rate is above 6.5 but below 7.3. Clinton County's unemployment rate is seven per cent.

"The picture could change by October, with the county's

unemployment rate, but as it stands now we are in the 30 percent group," Ambrose said.

The projects will be ranked on a number of options which include the severity and duration of the unemployment, the possible long term benefits of the project, and the amount

of money paid in unemployment benefits.

According to Ambrose the bill should be finished by mid October and then applications will be made available to the counties.

"It takes 60 days before an

application is approved or denied. After the application is approved on site labor must begin within 90 days," the assistant said. "Work could start by March," he added.

The second title of the bill is for \$1 1/2 billion for five quarters beginning July 1, 1976. It is for governments whose unemployment reaches no more than four per cent. It is a basic grant of money for those counties who receive revenue sharing.

The grant is not to be used for supplies or construction but to be used to maintain the present level of services. It is an anti-recessional device. The money will be based on revenue sharing times the unemployment rate above 4.5 per cent.

The third title is for \$700 million for a sewage treatment plant by the Environmental Protection Agency. According to Dick Hawks, a member of the tax allocation board and the County Department of Public Works this money might qualify for the Elsie project.

"If we are going to apply for these grants we are going to have to move on it soon," Ambrose said.

In other action taken during the morning session of the Board, a bid of \$15,389 by Architectural Building Products of Lansing, for new insulated windows for the courthouse. The cost is for 43 new aluminum windows. By putting these windows up the county will save approximately \$1,000 a year in labor by not having to paint the trim and window sills.

The money will be taken from the Public Improvement fund.

School negotiating teams to meet

ST. JOHNS—Negotiating teams for the St. Johns Board of Education and the St. Johns Education Association were expected to meet Tuesday night as negotiations continue in the St. Johns School District.

Following a meeting Thursday night, attended by 95 teachers, the St. Johns Education Association expressed their

feeling that a third-party mediator is necessary to reach an agreement.

The teachers voted to have their contracts extended for the 1976-77 school year through Nov. 24.

The need for a mediator and the contract extension were expected to be discussed at the Tuesday meeting.

St. Johns Commission puts sanitary sewer project in motion

ST. JOHNS—St. Johns City Commissioners signed on several dotted lines during a special meeting last week—the dotted lines were on documents putting into motion procedures leading to the construction of a \$8.5 million sanitary sewer project

in the city.

The sanitary sewer project is actually the second phase of a 2-part sewer project.

The first phase was the construction of a \$1.45 million storm sewer project.

In the sanitary sewer phase, cost to the city is not to exceed \$1.5 million, or 20 percent of the cost.

Paying 75 percent of the costs will be the Federal Environmental Protection Agency with the remaining five percent to be paid by the Michigan Water Resources Commission.

Included in the sanitary sewer project enlargement and improvements at the waste water treatment plant, a new lift station in the southern part of St. Johns and a relief sewer in the eastern portion of the city.

The next stage of the project will be to submit engineering plans to the federal government. Once the engineering

plans are approved, the city is to receive funds and actual construction will begin.

It is expected the project will be completed in 2 years with hopes for construction to begin this winter.

A majority of the city's cost in the sanitary sewer project will come from revenue derived in a \$900,000 bond issue approved by city voters. Construction funds for the storm sewer project came from the voter approval of a \$1.45 million bond issue.

Storm and sanitary sewer problems that have been a part of living in St. Johns for the past few years are expected to be alleviated by the sanitary and storm sewer projects.

The new sewer is designed to meet the growing needs of the community and enlargement of the waste water treatment plant is expected to meet city needs for the next 25 years.

Special hearing Thursday on proposed nursing home

ST. JOHNS—A special hearing is scheduled to be held Sept. 9 to discuss a request to build a nursing home in St. Johns, a request that was originally turned down by the State Health Dept. The meeting is being held at the request of Dyle Henning on behalf of the Clinton County Board of Commissioners.

Various officials from the St. Johns area will meet Thursday with Dr. Maurice Reizen, director of public health.

The appeal is being made based on procedures used to deny the initial request to build a nursing home in St. Johns.

Hospital and those interested in locating a nursing home in St. Johns. Henning, chairman of the Clinton County Board of Commissioners, said "I feel there is a real need for nursing home in the St. Johns area."

He cited the fact that the Public Health Dept. intends to close Rivard Nursing Home in St. Johns because the facility does not meet state standards.

To meet the state standards, bed spaces would have to be reduced and Gladys Hetzel, owner of Rivard

Nursing Home, said such renovations would make operation unprofitable need for such a facility in the area.

The original request to be nursing home in St. Johns was reportedly turned down by the Health Dept. because of their opinion of a lack of

Senior citizens in action

RSVP helps local residents

"The great use of life is to spend it for something that will out last it." (William James). This could be the motto of the nearly 300 retired citizens who last year contributed over 22,000 hours in volunteer service to the Tri-County through the Retired Senior Volunteer Program (RSVP). Sponsored by the Greater Lansing Young Women's Christian Association under a partial grant from ACTION, a federal voluntary agency, RSVP offers seniors the opportunity to contribute their skills and energies to the betterment of the community life.

A program linking retirees over 60 years of age with the people and places needing their help, RSVP provides or arranges for transportation to and from the volunteer job when needed. In cooperation with the agency involved, RSVP seeks to cover the out-of-pocket costs associated with volunteering, such as transportation or a meal while on the job. In addition, volunteers enrolled through RSVP are covered by accident and liability insurance while volunteering, at no cost.

RSVP volunteers perform a variety of important tasks in more than 50 public and private non-profit agencies in Ingham, Eaton and Clinton Counties. Seniors serve in schools as tutors, library assistants, and teacher's aides. Some visit a number of schools presenting a musical program, old-time crafts demonstration or instruction. Typists and office workers help a variety of groups ranging from the Michigan Heart Association to the governor's office, to the Michigan Department of Public Health.

Focusing on health, volunteers assist in clinics, working directly with patients or in the records department; in mental health centers as activity aides, receptionists, and friends to patients; in hospitals as messengers, pediatric aides, gift shop salespeople, and book cart volunteers. They also work in nursing homes as friendly visitors, activity aides, or by feeding patients. Volunteers are involved in a variety of senior programs from giving classes at a senior center to serving meals at a nutrition site, or to visiting a home-

bound elderly person. office, which keeps in Variety is a hallmark of RSVP as volunteers also serve as readers to the blind, consumer investigators and public relations assistants. After an initial interview with an RSVP staff member, potential volunteers choose to visit one or more agencies. RSVP through previous and continuing contact with community agencies smooths the way for new volunteers. Supervision and training are provided by the organization being served, usually referred to as a volunteer station. When agreed upon by the station and volunteer, the senior starts work.

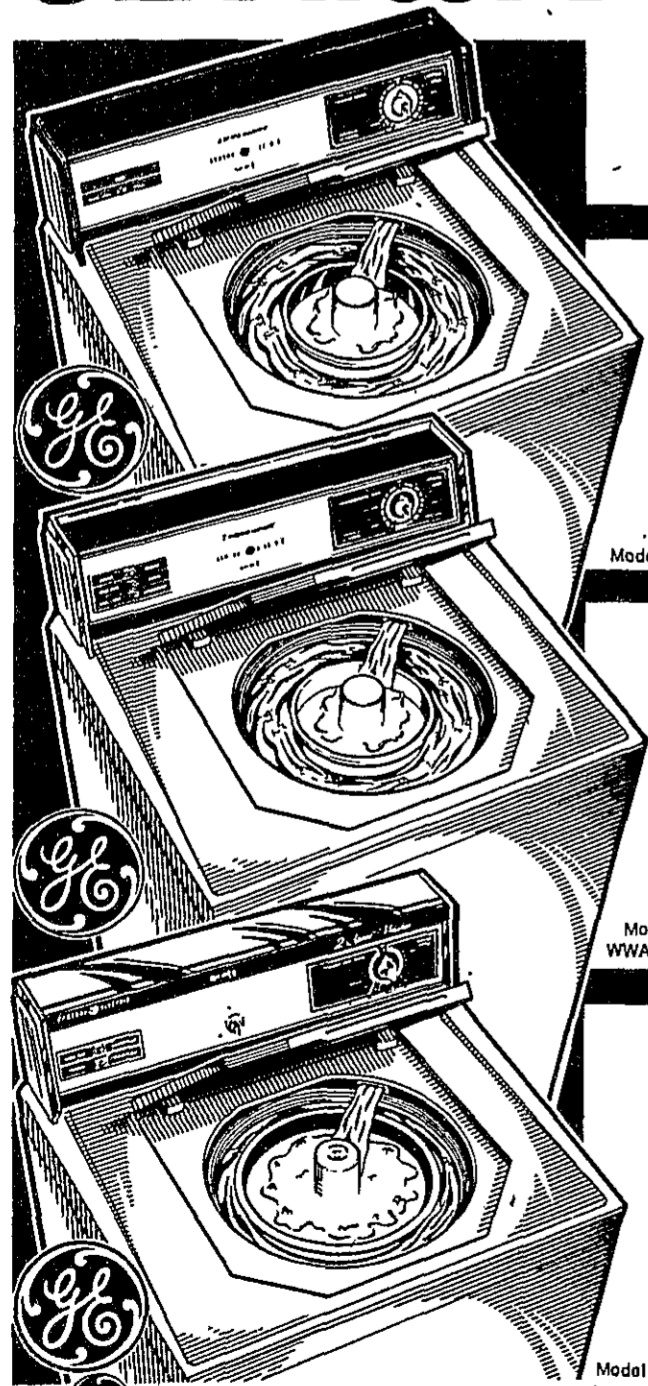

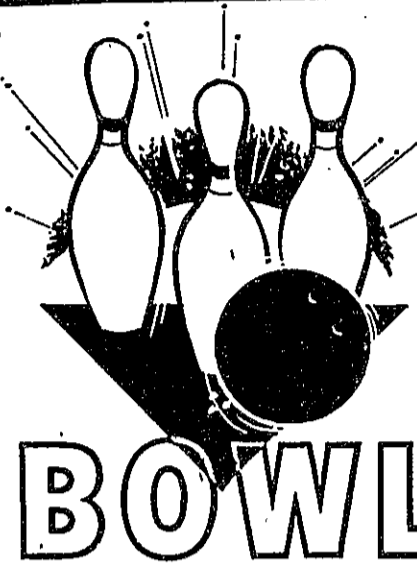

Between the lines

with Jim Edwards

From The Senate Sen. Richard Allen

Jobs are important. Especially if you don't have one or you don't like the one you have.

The 30th Senate District, surrounding Lansing, is an area of high unemployment now and is found with two major threats in the near future. Owens Illinois in Charlotte expects major reductions in its employment force if the bottle ban passes in November and Michigan Chemical is forcing out its

St. Louis operation, at least partly due to DNR water quality requirements. Both actions are related to Government action.

Jobs, and how to provide them, are becoming a major topic at the state as well as federal level. I have been meeting with the Commerce Department and local officials recently to explore attracting new jobs to our part of the state.

It's tough. Partly because

everyone wants the same thing. A high paying, non-polluting industry with a lot of clean health jobs. And these are getting scarcer as manufacturers automate and employment in manufacturing decreases both in total and as a percentage of total employment.

So let's fight for manufacturing jobs but realize they are unlikely to provide a long time complete answer.

That leaves agriculture and the service industries. Fortunately agriculture, a major economic activity in our district, is financially healthier than it was a few years ago. This is a definite aid to commerce in our small towns and cities and is providing a few of the amenities in the country that were so long done without. Agriculture does not provide a lot of direct jobs. I do think more experimental station and extension service research and emphasis on higher intensity and specialty operations that require more labor would help. It also would help if we could attract some food processors to our area.

Services are the booming employment area of the future and though the jobs are scattered and not always high paying, they cannot be ignored in future planning.

Medical services is a big one. Average family expenditure is approaching that for food and employment is booming. We should insist on these services, hospitals, nursing homes, clinics, etc. being available in our communities. Not in nearby metropolitan areas but in our towns. Not just because we need the services but because we also need the jobs.

The same with education. Vocational training, community colleges, rehabilitation, special education; we should have our share of all these because we need the services and we need the jobs.

State institutions and offices are also important employers and need not all be located in Lansing.

The highways through our area can provide tourist dollars with proper facilities, a rapidly growing area of employment.

In other words we are going to have to fight the job battle on a broad front. That nice clean industry with a few hundred high paying jobs is not going to be easy to find and won't do the full job for the future.

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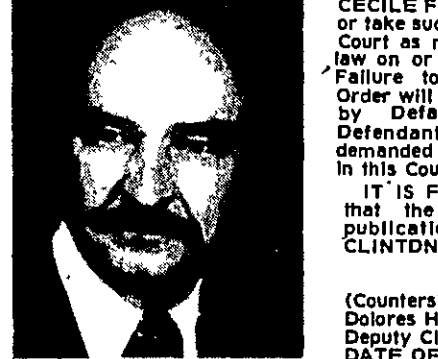

Supreme court races jumbled

Generally speaking, I favor rather drastic revision of Michigan's method of judicial selection.

Take the Michigan Supreme Court, for example. Our long-standing system is a non-sensical hybrid - candidates for the 7-member court are nominated by a partisan, political convention, and then run on a non-partisan ballot. The method, which has been around in Michigan as long as I can remember, doesn't really make much sense.

With adoption of our present state Constitution in 1963 a new wrinkle was added. In addition to our partisan-non-partisan mishmash of judicial election, incumbent justices were allowed to renominate themselves by filling an affidavit of candidacy. That has added a bit to the confusion.

Other sections of Michigan law provide methods whereby minority parties with relatively few members also can place candidates for the supreme court, on the non-partisan judicial ballot right alongside the big party choices. In fact, one of the sitting justices formed a new political party, which nominated him for the supreme court, and he won.

As I said, generally speaking, I favor revision of this system, tending toward something like appointment with life tenure, or something of the sort.

But if such reform ever comes, Michigan election watchers will miss out on one of our more interesting political phenomena.

The one-judge political party, which produced present Justice Charles Levin, is one example.

In a state such as Michigan, which is heavily Democratic, a Republican candidate for the supreme court generally has slim chance for election, unless he has a recognizable name,

such as O'Hara or Fitzgerald or something of that nature, along with a good, sound judicial record. Then he might win.

Or if the Republican-nominated candidate is somewhat unusual - such as an attractive, qualified, articulate woman, like Justice Mary Coleman - then she might win.

But usually, Republican chances are rather dark in Supreme Court races.

This year, for example, what with resignations and deaths, the voters will fill three seats on the Supreme Court.

One is currently held by the chief justice, a man with a political powerful name and venerable record, Justice Thomas Giles Kavanagh. Democrats nominated him 8 years ago.

The other two are filled by Republican appointees - Justice Lawrence B. Lindemer, and Justice James Ryan.

In a normal political situation, it could be predicted that Justices Kavanagh and Ryan would be elected, and that Justice Lindemer would have a tougher time of it, depending upon the record and name of the candidate Democrats nominated against him.

But chances are it just won't work out that way at all this year.

Justices Kavanagh, Lindemer and Ryan all nominated themselves by affidavit, under the 1963 Constitutional provision, and each seeks a specific term.

In addition, all three asked for nomination from their party conventions; Lindemer and Ryan were endorsed by

Republicans with pleasure, while Kavanagh was denied Democratic backing at his convention. The main reason is Kavanagh's position that incumbent justices should not campaign against other incumbent justices - a view not held in high esteem by his fellow Democrats, especially with Lindemer and Ryan up for grabs this year.

So instead, Democrats nominated another candidate for Kavanagh's seat - Circuit Judge Roman Gribbs, a former Detroit mayor. Republicans, meanwhile, nominated Circuit Judge Joseph Swallow of Alpena, a former state legislator. That makes for some unknown ramifications; what could have been a Kavanagh cake walk may well be the deposing of an incumbent - or at least an electoral donnybrook.

But that's not all. Zolton Ferency, former Democratic state chairman and one-time Democratic candidate for governor, also hankers after a supreme court seat. So he was nominated by the Human Rights Party for the Lindemer seat, making that a three-way race also featuring Wayne Circuit Judge Blair Moody, the regular Democratic nominee, who also owns a powerful vote-getting name. In my view, Ferency's maneuver moves Lindemer from the role of underdog to at least an even bet.

The third race is more straightforward. Justice Ryan, the Republican nominee, will square off against another Wayne Circuit Judge, Charles Kaufman. It's a battle between two popular vote-getting names, but the incumbency likely will pull Ryan through.

What a year for the supreme court. Certainly we should have some sort of reform in selecting justices; but think of all the fun we'll miss.

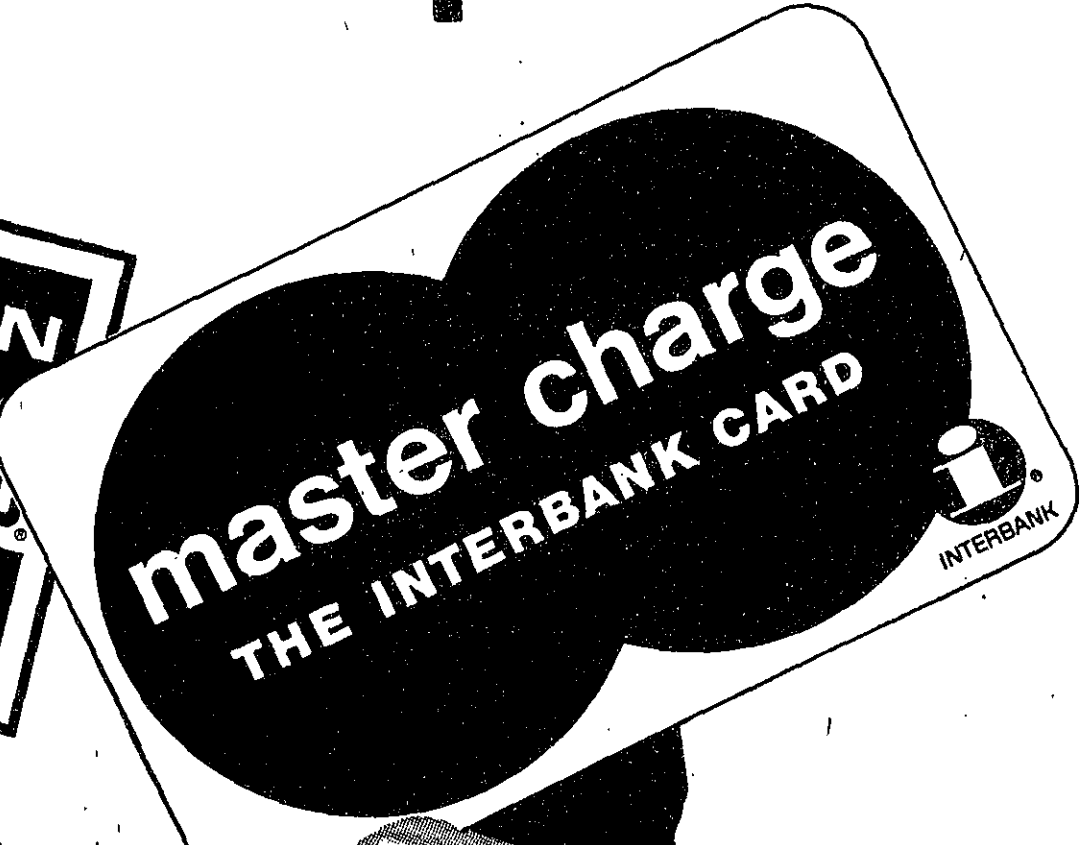

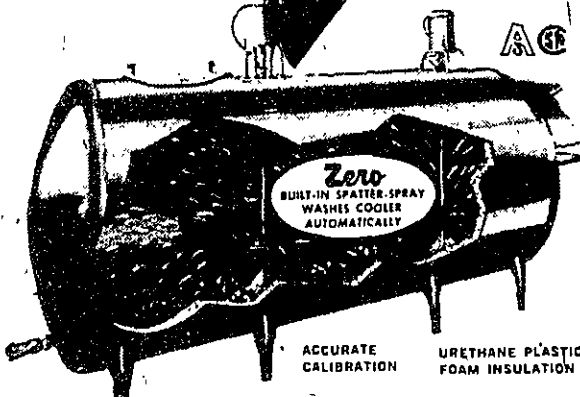

Chloe's Column

Fiber in diet, important role

A Toronto physician specializing in gastrointestinal diseases says fiber in the diet does have an important role in treating certain intestinal diseases.

Dr. K.N. Jeejeebhoy of the Department of Medicine, University of Toronto, addressed 400 nutritionists at a conference held recently at Michigan State University.

"Recent books claim fiber is a cure for all ills, but no research has proven this," said Dr. Jeejeebhoy. "What fiber can do is alleviate certain intestinal diseases such as constipation, irritable bowel diseases and diverticulosis. But bran's role in preventing cancer of the colon is still not certain."

Bran or fiber regulates transit time of food passing through the body. It slows down the time, if the person has diarrhea hastens it if the person is constipated. It changes the composition of bile and it may influence gallstone formation.

Cereal fiber does have a slight relationship with decrease in cancer of the colon. (Other types of fiber do not.) However, a person's fat intake has a higher correlation with cancer of the colon.

"We're not sure whether it's the total diet, or the fat or bran intake, or a combination of these which has the greatest effect on cancer of the colon," pointed out Dr. Jeejeebhoy.

In the United States where diets contain very little fiber, people spend \$250 million a

year on laxatives. In areas such as rural Africa, where fiber is a major component of the diet, constipation is virtually unknown. In Western countries, 45 people out of every 100,000 get cancer of the colon. Only 3 per 100,000 get the disease in rural Africa.

"Much research still has to

be done before we can really define the role of fiber in the diet," Dr. Jeejeebhoy told the nutritionists.

The conference was sponsored by the American Institute of Nutrition, the American Society for Clinical Nutrition, and the Nutrition Society of Canada.

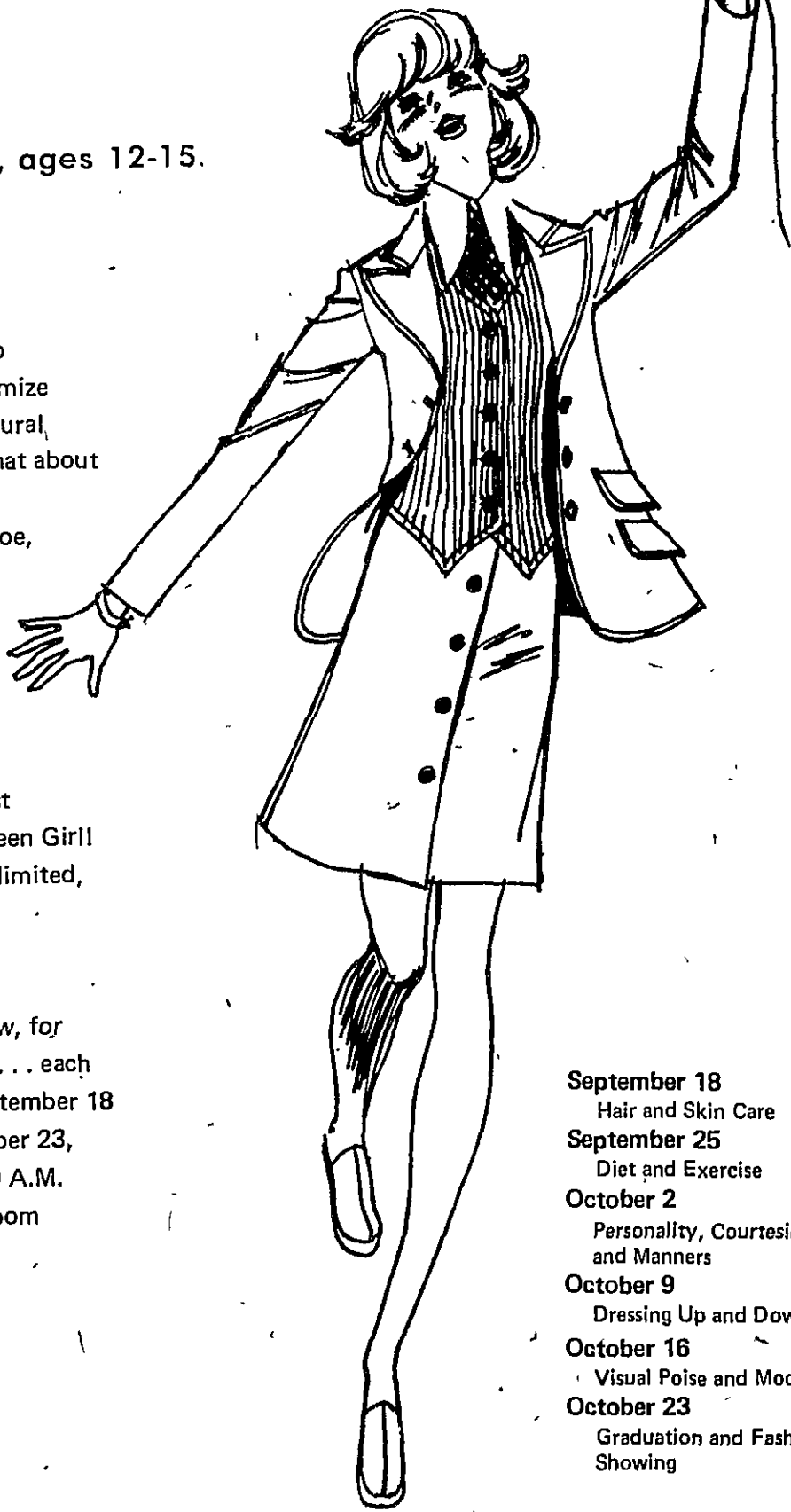

Each issue will include food shopping tips, grocery list, a week's menus, including low cost snacks and recipes for main dishes, and other foods that can be made inexpensively.

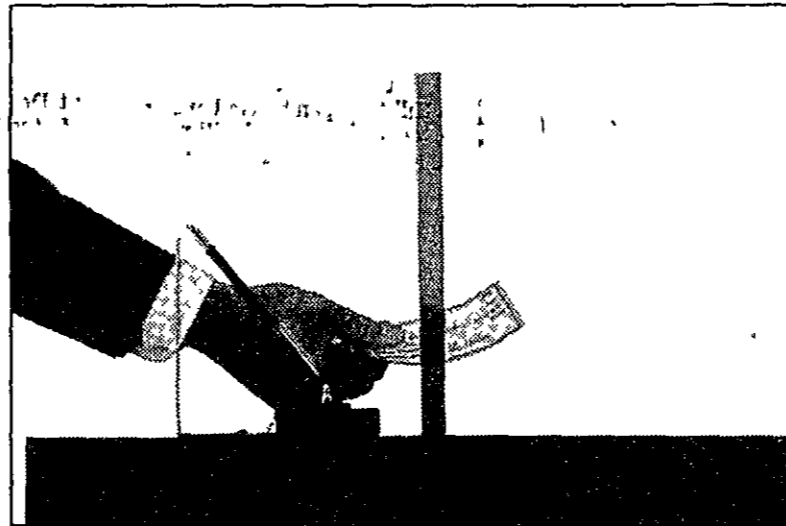

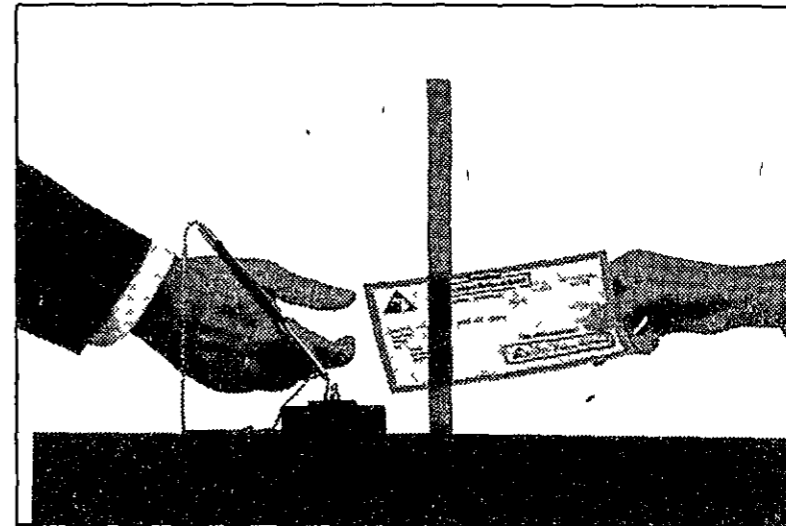

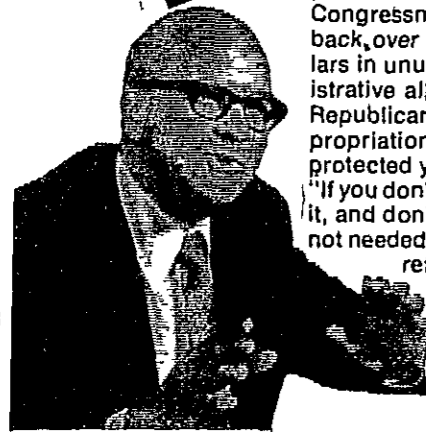

PLEASE TAKE NOTICE that the City Commission of the City of St. Johns intends to adopt resolutions authorizing the issuance and sale of general obligation bonds of the City pursuant to Act 320, Public Acts of Michigan, 1927, as amended, in amounts not to exceed in total principal amount \$1,500,000.00 for the purpose of defraying part of the cost of acquiring and constructing improvements to the Sanitary Sewage Disposal System of the City, consisting of waste water treatment plant improvements, an interceptor sewer together with a new sewage lift station and force main outlet and new relief sewer, together with all necessary appurtenances and attachments thereto, necessary in order to comply with Amended Final Order No. 1766 of the Michigan Water Resources Commission, issued November 20, 1975. 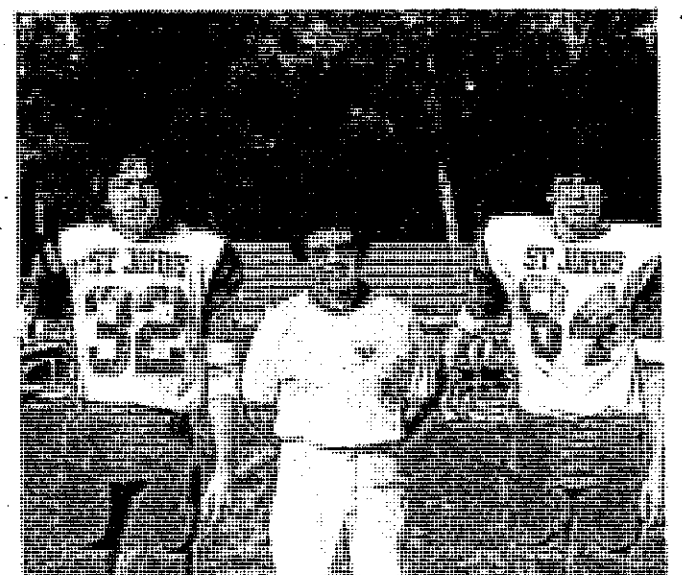

Creative experience

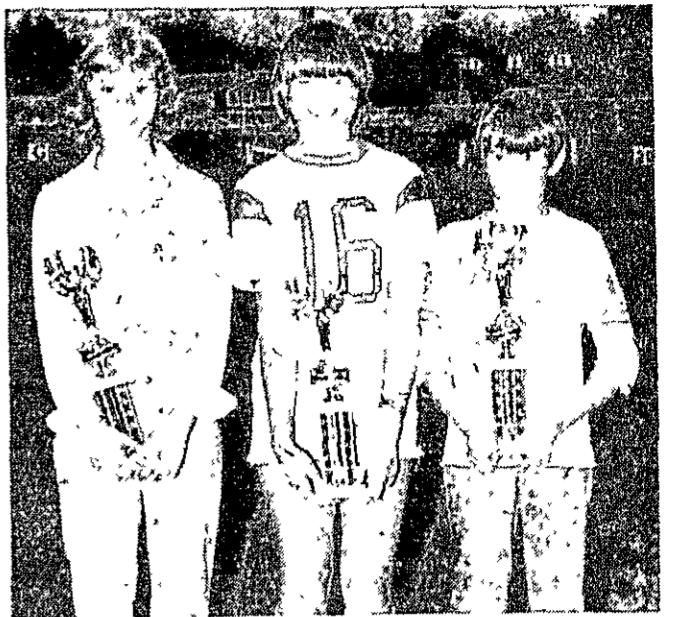

Jim's Column

Quotations - a critical test

My column this week comes from Secretary of Agriculture Earl Butz, speaking of the world's ability to feed itself in the future, at the annual meeting of the Institute of Food Technologists:

The world is coming up against a critical test in regard to food. Rising affluence and a rapidly increasing population are soon going to put the heaviest strain on man's ability to feed himself that our race has ever known. In the next 25 years the demand for food is likely to double; two mouths will cry for nourishment where one cries today. Seven billion people will populate a small planet that today supports only 4 billion.

Where's the extra food to come from? There's not that much more land that can be brought into cultivation economically. There's also a question as to how much food the oceans can supply over a sustained period.

The answers to increasing food supplies will have to be found in science, in technology; by doing a better job of supplementing, processing and storing, and distributing the increased food supply that farmers can raise for us.

This inevitably means the increased use of chemicals on the farm; and new food manufacturing processes in the food industry -- antibiotics, growth regulators, hormones and what have you. If the world's people are to eat as well, or hopefully even better tomorrow than they do today, then the rule of reason is going to have to prevail in the use of food technology.

Innovation must not be hampered on this front. None of us must worship at the God of Status Quo in food production or food processing methods. To do so would be to bring food shortages, famine, and social unrest.

Admittedly, some of the scientific and technologic agents we must use - both on the farm and in the food industry - will be poisonous and dangerous. Some of the food additives may indeed cause cancer in laboratory animals if forced upon upon them in massive amounts.

Just as salt in massive doses will undermine your health. We must constantly ask ourselves whether the benefits from carefully controlled use of such agents outweighs the risks.

Let me illustrate my point. When I become ill, I go to my doctor. That rascal tries to kill me; he prescribes poisons - deadly poisons - for me to take. But he writes very specific instructions on the label that tells me exactly how to use these poisons, and he says that if I do what he says, that I'll get better....

So must it be with usage of food additives and chemicals, with food fortification, with farm chemicals and pesticides. We must view them as tools to be handled carefully, not banned. We must not deny ourselves or future generations their potential benefits by flatly denying usage of all such agents.

We must not succumb to the national hysteria for absolute safety that is being flogged up by the agitators out to make a quick buck and a name for themselves, or by the bureaucrats who always want to mess with somebody else's life.

Bill's Column

Root rot reduces county wheat yield

Wheat yields in Clinton County were reduced in 1976 by Root Rot Disease more than any other factor according to M.S.U. Specialists. Here is the latest information on how to reduce Root Rot in Wheat.

A) Use crop rotation - at least one year and preferably two years between wheat crops. Don't plant wheat on land where the previous crop was wheat, weedy hay, pasture, or native grasses.

B) Plant wheat from Oct. 1 to Oct. 7. A M.S.U. five year study shows increased yields from wheat planted during the first week of October. Planting at this date also helps to reduce Root Rot diseases.

C) For high yields, plant wheat after navy beans, soybeans, oats, or corn where herbicide use has been minimal. Plant no deeper than necessary to assure adequate soil moisture.

D) Follow good management practices and provide adequate, balanced nutrition. Use a soil test to ascertain fertilizer requirements. Nitrogen levels can be moderate in the fall but adequate phosphorous and potash is necessary for optimum growth and winterhardness. Top dressing nitrogen in early spring gives the higher yields. Washington's birthday is a good time to top dress nitrogen.

Loose Smut Control

Loose Smut and Bunt (stinking-smut) have been noticed in the county this year. Control is seed treatment. Vitavax 200 controls both Bunt and Loose Smut. The cost is minimal (about 40 cents per bushel) and you control Loose Smut, Bunt, Seed rots, and Seedling Blights. I recommend that all wheat seed be treated.

City of Dewitt Ordinance No. 83

ORDINANCE NO. 83
CITY OF DEWITT
CLINTON COUNTY,
MICHIGAN
UNEMPLOYMENT COMPENSATION ORDINANCE TO ESTABLISH AND MAINTAIN A SYSTEM OF UNEMPLOYMENT COMPENSATION TO COVER EMPLOYEES OF THE CITY OF DE WITT.

SECTION 1. UNEMPLOYMENT COMPENSATION SYSTEM. There is hereby established an unemployment compensation system and benefit plan for employees of the City of Dewitt to be administered by the City Clerk of the City of Dewitt. This plan is established pursuant to Act No. 170 of the Public Acts of 1955, as amended, of the State of Michigan.

SECTION 2. DEFINITIONS.
"City" means in all cases, the City of Dewitt.
"Average Weekly Wage" with respect to a base period of employment, shall be the amount determined by dividing total wages paid by the City for credit weeks earned in the employment of the City by the number of such credit weeks chargeable to the City as employer.

"Benefit Year" means the period of 52 consecutive calendar weeks ending with the day immediately preceding the first day of an individual's benefit year.
"Benefit Year" with respect to any individual means the period of 52 consecutive calendar weeks beginning with the first calendar week with respect to which the individual, who does not already have a benefit year in effect, files a claim for benefits under this ordinance provided that the individual has earned wages of at least \$25.01 in 14 or more calendar weeks within the Base Period. Each such week shall be a "Credit Week."

"City Clerk" shall mean the person who is appointed Clerk of the City of Dewitt, whether or not such person shall hold any other office of the City, or whose position as Clerk may be combined with any other office.
"Department Head" means the person in charge of the particular department in which the employee works.
"Unemployed" An individual shall be deemed unemployed with respect to any week in which he or she performs no services and with respect to which no remuneration is payable to him or her, or with respect to any week or less than full-time work if the remuneration payable thereto is less than his or her weekly benefit rate.

"Wages" means remuneration paid for employment but shall not include any employee payment for life or health insurance, pension, equipment allowance, or similar payment.
Benefit payments shall begin with the effective date of unemployment and shall be set forth in the following rules:
(a) The weekly benefit rates and amount of weekly benefit payment shall be determined in accordance with all of the relevant provisions as set forth in Section 27 of the Michigan Employment Security Act and as set forth in the MESA weekly benefit rate tables in effect for the week for which the employee is claiming benefits.
(b) A dependent and dependency class category of a laid-off employee shall be determined as provided in the Michigan Employment Security Act, in accordance with Section 27 (b) (5) and (6) of said Act.
(c) Employees shall be entitled to 3 weeks of benefits for each credit week of earned working for the City of Dewitt up to a maximum of 26 weeks of benefits provided that the claimant has worked at least 34 weeks in the 52 weeks preceding the week in which the claimant applied for benefits, and except as otherwise provided by Section 28(2) of the Michigan Employment Security Act.

(d) Any change in the rate of regular benefits and their duration that would be mandatory to meet the requirements for equivalency with the Michigan Employment Security Act shall become effective on the same day to change the method of determination of amounts of benefit payment as provided in this section.
(e) Authorization of payment of unemployment benefits shall be based on a certification from the Department Head to the City Clerk. Such certification shall contain all information necessary for payment. A record of the benefits received by each individual shall be maintained by the City Clerk.
Section 5. Employees Covered. Except as provided by Section 6, covered employees shall include all Administrative Officers of the City enumerated in the City Charter.
Section 6. Employees and Persons Not Covered. Employees not covered by this Unemployment Compensation System shall be:
(a) Elected officials and appointees of Board and Commissions.
(b) Persons providing

contractual services to the City as specialists, consultants, independent contractors, and employees thereof.
(c) Employees who are or were at the time of their employment by the City, students enrolled on a regular basis in high school, college, graduate school or any other school in which their primary status is clearly that of students, or any persons fifteen or more weeks of services not longer than sixteen (16) consecutive weeks.
(d) All part-time, temporary and seasonal employees employed under a written agreement for the performance of services not longer than sixteen (16) consecutive weeks.
(e) Persons receiving relief or work-training as part of an unemployment work-relief or work-training program assisted or financed in whole or in part by any federal agency or any agency of the state or other political subdivision.
(f) Service performed by an individual while compensation is being received from federal funds received under a specific federal program for which an application was made and whose employment is terminated due to discontinuance of federal funds.
(g) Service by a student under the age of eighteen (18) years regularly attending either a public or private school below college level and employed as an employee of the City of Dewitt, or a part of the school curriculum.

Section 7. Eligibility for Benefits. A claimant to be eligible for benefits must be unemployed, as defined, and must make a claim for benefits in the manner prescribed by the Department Head and further must:
(a) Be able and available to perform full-time work which he or she is qualified to perform by his or her education, training, and of a character generally similar to work for which he or she has earned wages;
(b) Be in compliance with registration and reporting requirements; and
(c) Be seeking work.

Section 8. Disqualifications. A claimant is disqualified from receiving benefits if the Department Head finds that an individual is unemployed due to an ineligible termination or separation as specified in Section 9, has left his or her work voluntarily or has accepted permanent full-time work with another employer, or has failed without just cause to apply for available suitable work or has failed to accept suitable work when offered, or has failed when directed to return to his or her customary work.
Section 9. Ineligible Termination and Separations. An employee shall not be eligible for benefits under the

unemployment compensation system established by this ordinance, if the unemployment shall result from:
(a) Retirement under any City Retirement System covering City employees.
(b) Discharge or suspension for misconduct connected with his or her work, incompetence to perform his or her designated work, for intoxication while at work, for absence due to imprisonment, or for any act of assault, theft, or sabotage connected with his or her work.
(c) Resignations, including resignations in lieu of discharge.
(d) Leaves of absence for any reason, whether voluntary or involuntary.
(e) Temporary separations made at the written request of the employee.
(f) Participation or direct interest in a labor dispute including any strike, unauthorized work stoppages, or other labor action.
Section 10. Payment of and Restrictions on Benefits. Benefits shall be paid weekly at a time and place fixed by the City Clerk. All beneficiaries must report weekly to the City hall offices or designated days for weekly benefit checks and determination of continuing eligibility. For continuing eligibility, a beneficiary must be actively seeking work during the time and place fixed by the City Clerk to recover any monies paid upon a fraudulent or untrue application or claim.

Section 11. Rules and Procedures. Rules and procedures including any necessary forms may be established by the City Clerk to administer the Unemployment Compensation System. The City Clerk or the designee thereof may bring suit in the name of the City to recover any monies paid upon a fraudulent or untrue application or claim.
Section 12. Determinations. The City Clerk or the designee thereof shall promptly make a determination, after an application for benefits is filed, whether or not the claimant is a covered individual eligible and qualified to draw benefits based upon the available information. The issuance of each benefit check shall promptly make a determination that the claimant receiving the check was a covered individual eligible and qualified for benefits. Where a claimant refuses work or fails to apply for work in any other way or becomes disqualified shall promptly make a written determination of such disqualification or ineligibility and shall send the claimant notice thereof.
Section 13. Redeterminations.

Upon the written request of any claimant within 15 days following any determination or decision respecting qualification, eligibility or rate of benefits, the City Clerk or the designee thereof shall promptly review the prior determination and, if necessary, may order a hearing thereon. Upon review with or without hearing, the City Clerk or designee shall issue a redetermination affirming, modifying or reversing the prior determination and stating the reasons therefor. Such redetermination shall be final unless an appeal is filed as provided in Section 15 (below).
Section 14. Appeals. There is hereby established an unemployment compensation appeal board, to consist of three members appointed by the Mayor, with the advice and approval of the City Council. The terms of office of the members of the initial Board of Appeals shall be for three, four, and five years, respectively. At the expiration of each such term, a person appointed to fill a vacancy shall be appointed for a five year term. The expiration dates of all terms shall coincide with the annual date of appointment of the various boards and commissions of the City of Dewitt.
Section 15. Appeal Board Powers and Duties. It shall be the duty of the appeal board to review redeterminations and decisions of the City Clerk pertaining to the Unemployment Compensation System, provided that a claim of appeal is filed within 15 days of such decision or order. The time to file a claim of appeal shall not begin until an employee has been notified in writing of his or her right to appeal. The appeal board may on its own motion, affirm, modify, set aside or reverse any decision or order on the basis of the evidence or may permit any of the parties to such decision or order to initiate further appeals before it. The appeal board shall promptly notify parties of its findings and decisions and its reasons therefor but may omit the giving of any reasons if the previous order or decision is affirmed without any alteration or modifications.
Section 16. Procedure. Reports, Record or Proceedings on Appeal, Transcripts of Testimony. The manner in which appeals to the appeal board shall be presented, the reports thereon required from the interested party or parties, and the procedure governing such appeals shall be in accordance with rules prescribed by the appeal board. A full and complete record shall be kept of all proceedings in connection with an appeal.

Section 17. Extension of Time. Whenever the last day of the period to apply for redetermination or appeal any decision, determination or redetermination, falls on a Saturday, Sunday or legal holiday, the period shall run until the end of the next day which is not a Saturday, Sunday or holiday.
Section 18. Finances. Financing shall be accomplished through the Unemployment Compensation System Fund, herewith established to account for related revenue and expenditures, including payment of unemployment benefits. The City Clerk shall recommend to the Mayor as Budget Officer such annual appropriations as are to be made for this activity.
Section 19. False Statements. Any person who makes or causes to be made any false or untrue statements or reports, in lieu of criminal action based on any false or untrue statements or reports, the City Clerk may recommend disciplinary or other action to the controlling board or commission.
Section 20. Catchline Headings. The catchline headings of the sections of this ordinance shall in no way be considered to be a part of the respective sections or of this ordinance but are inserted here for purposes of convenience.
Section 21. Severability. Each section, and every part of each section, is hereby declared to be an independent section and part of section, and the holding of any section or part of a section to be invalid, void and/or ineffective for any cause, by a court of competent jurisdiction, shall not be deemed to affect any other section or part of section.
Section 22. Effective Date. This Ordinance is hereby declared to be immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health or safety, and therefore is adopted at time regular meeting of the Dewitt City Council this 16th day of August, 1976, as an emergency ordinance in compliance with the Charter of the City of Dewitt, and given immediate effect.
