DEWITT TWP -- Most people driving by the Lars Syverson home at 3898 Alvin Place take a double look at the piece of "art" adorning their side yard. The sculpture, called "Djunke" has been sitting on the lawn of their home since last June.

Residency hassle in DeWitt Twp

DEWITT TOWNSHIP -- Once again, political trouble is brewing in DeWitt township, this time it involves the residency of a candidate for the office of supervisor in that township, Theodore L. Powell.

It all started after Powell tried to apply for voters registration in DeWitt Township after he was nominated to run on the Democratic ticket for Supervisor on a write-in vote. When he applied, the township clerk, Donna Syverson was on vacation and the deputy clerk, Betty Churchill wasn't positive about his actual

residency, so she told him to come back one week later, when Syverson was back from her vacation. He did, and filled out an application, swearing that he was over 18 years of age, a resident of the state of Michigan and the Township of DeWitt for at least 30 days. This was Aug 28th.

While Powell was a registered voter of DeWitt City at the time of the primary, his wife Joyce was registered as a voter in DeWitt Twp. Syverson questioned Mrs Powell's right to vote, believing that she resided in the City of DeWitt with her husband.

On Aug 8, 2 days after the August Primary, she asked the

Clinton County Sheriff's Dept to investigate and find out the true residency of Joyce Powell.

The Sheriff's Dept found that his mailing address was 9 Laura Lane in DeWitt.

But in 4 spot checks by the Sheriff's Dept during the course of the next week, Powell, his wife or any automobiles of Powell's could not be found at the residence.

In the report prepared by Syverson, Sheriff Anthony Hufnagel explained the above and a possibility of the cars being inside of the garage did exist. The report was prepared Aug 12 and Syverson received it after she returned from vacation on Aug 27, one day before Powell came in to register.

Clerk Syverson then proceeded after Powell's appearance to the County prosecuting attorney, Jon Newman in St Johns, asking that Powell be prosecuted for violating the election laws.

Newman refused, stating to Syverson, that he "Didn't feel that it was a serious enough offense to offer criminal prosecution." Trying to register in a township or city that one doesn't live in or has fulfilled election requirements for is a misdemeanor.

The prosecuting attorney suggested that he simply not register him.

Syverson continued to the attorney general's office, where she talked to one of the attorneys. The office looked into the matter and responded to Syverson that they couldn't force Newman to prosecute and gave her the same advice Newman gave her -- don't register Powell.

She followed their advice and on Sept 10 she wrote a letter to the Powells, using their address at King Arthur's Court Mobile Home Park. (He owns the court), stating that she was not accepting Powell's application and was cancelling his wife's registration.

Powell replied on Sept 16 acknowledging receiving her letter along with one in the same mail confirming that he was a candidate on the Democratic ticket for DeWitt Township Supervisor.

He asked Syverson how he could qualify "in the eyes of the County Prosecutor and Sheriff's Dept?" He also added in his letter "Apparently these agencies have a set of criteria established for residency and it would be helpful to compare their report on me with a report on someone who did meet the qualifications." He requested a copy of the requirements according to law.

In the next paragraph, he added "Would resigning as a Democratic candidate for supervisor improve my chances of being registered?"

Syverson sent a reply to Powell's letter the following day, Sept 17 stating that the Powell's did not meet the 30 day residency for the township when he tried to register.

So just where does Powell live? According to Powell, in an

apartment, which is connected to the office building at King Arthur's Court, 2201 East State Road in the Township.

Powell claims that he has been living there since either late June or early July. His drivers license states that as his address.

In the past week, he and his wife moved into a mobile home at 100 Brittany in the Court, according to Powell. A neighbor says that he's been there over a month and the girl who answers the phone in the office said he has lived at 100 Brittany for just under a month.

Where did the Police get 9 Laura Lane as his mailing address? From the post office, but Powell hasn't lived there for about a year and it is now rented out to tenants.

Powell has 5 mailing addresses: 2201 E State Road and 100 Brittany, both in King Arthur's Court in DeWitt Township, and at Laura Lane, his old house at 835 Andover Dr which has been sold to the project manager of Millbrook Meadows, Gary Newcombe and Powell's business address in DeWitt, 316 Manchester Dr.

Powell is head of the Millbrook Meadows development in DeWitt.

Holcombe stated that Powell and his wife haven't lived there in months and would testify in court if required to. "I just lived across the field from the last site (835 Andover) in DeWitt where Ted lived. I would swear to it that he hasn't lived there in several months."

Several neighbors confirmed that Powell hasn't been seen living at his old home. The weeds in the garden behind it have taken over, but the kitchen looked as if it had been used recently. Powell explained that the home is used for display purposes and Newcombe will move into it when ready.

Powell had talked to moving back into the township and in late April, told Supervisor Dale Emerson that he was going to move back into the township if things continue like they are. "I told Dale Emerson as early as April that I was unhappy with the way things are being run in the township and would move back and run for supervisor." He stated that Emerson just smiled.

He is a candidate for supervisor, but was a write-in candidate in the August Primary election.

Some questions still remain unanswered. One is why he waited until Aug 19 to resign as a member of the Board of Review for the City of DeWitt and, if he doesn't win the race for supervisor, will he remain in the township or move back into any of his new homes in his development. Syverson and many others believe that he will move back into the city if he doesn't make the race while others believe that he will remain and try to find a way to win again.

A DeWitt Township trustee said about the situation "He just maintains an address where politically expedient."

Police arrest 6, 1 kicks officer on way to jail

BATH TWP -- Four men and 2 women were arrested Saturday in Bath for drunk and disorderly and one reportedly kicked a law officer in the head on the way to jail. Five of the 6 are serving time in the Clinton County Jail presently.

Bath township police received a complaint at 8:30 pm that the 6 were drinking in the parking lot of the Family Party Store on the corner of Clark and Webster Roads in Bath. Officers Don Potter and Keith Norton of the Bath Township and Sgt Don Kennel of the Clinton County Sheriff's Dept served as backup. The 6 were arrested for being drunk and disorderly.

According to police, on the way to St Johns, William Eiserman, 35, of 1306 High Street in Lansing kicked Sgt Kennel in the head.

Five of the 6 were sentenced Monday. The two women, Lillian Pipes, 43, of 1613 Turner in Lansing and Mary Ann Williams, 56, of 3130 Pollard in Lansing pleaded guilty and each received 3 days in the County Jail.

Max Edgar Robinson, 51, of 1306 High St, Lansing; William Clifford Driver, no age given; of 1613 Turner of Lansing and Eiserman each received 30 days for drunk and disorderly with Eiserman getting 15 additional days for assaulting an officer. The 3 males also pleaded guilty.

The 6th offender, R.L. Pipes of 1613 Turner St was released on \$100 bond, then turned over to the Lansing Police Dept which had 2 traffic warrants for him. He was fined \$125 and is now in Arkansas attending his grandmother's funeral.

His wife, Lillian Pipes, remains in jail for the 5 days.

Chases end in arrests

DEWITT TWP -- Terry Lee Simmons of Lansing was arrested Sept 4 and charged with possession of stolen property after he eluded patrolman Danny Polzien of the DeWitt Twp Police in a chase the day before.

Officer Polzien went to State Road to investigate a report of an abandoned motorcycle 1/2 mile east of Airport Road with a Black Dodge Charger nearby.

Polzien observed motorcycle heading east toward him 1/2 mile east of Airport on State Road, driven by Simmons with a passenger on the back. Polzien became suspicious because the bike was covered with mud.

When the patrolman turned around, Simmons increased speed.

Polzien pursued Simmons with the lights flashing down State, then south on DeWitt Road.

Simmons turned left on Gage Rd where Simmons' passenger fell off.

The officer continued the chase onto Jenny Road where the motorcyclist hit a dirt trail. Polzien turned around and tried to cut off Simmons at the trail's end on

Sheridan Road.

When Simmons did not appear, Polzien returned to the place where he last saw the motorcyclist. The cycle was found at the bottom of the hill with the ignition wires cut. The cycle was owned by Robert Luttrell of Lansing. The injuries to the unidentified passenger are unknown at this time.

Simmons was apprehended the next day, Sept 4 for possession of stolen property and was released on a \$3000 bond.

Another chase occurred in the DeWitt area when DeWitt Police observed Jerry Dean Rhode, 22, of DeWitt running a stop sign at Cedarwood, heading south on DeWitt Road. The incident occurred last Sunday at 3 am.

Police pursued Rhode at a high rate of speed. Rhode was reportedly driving over 100 mph when he hit the gravel at the intersection of Herborn Rd. Rhode's car went airborne, flying 166 feet after leaving the road. Rhodes was taken to St Lawrence Hospital with injuries including the loss of 2 front teeth.

Rhodes was charged with reckless driving.

St Johns students scholar semi-finalists

ST JOHNS -- Two St Johns High School students are semi-finalists in competition for about 3400 Merit Scholarships to be awarded nationally in 1975.

They are Jeff Hazle, son of Mr and Mrs Charles Hazle of Rt 2, St Johns, and Kathleen Valentine, daughter of Alma Valentine, 10601 Francis Rd, DeWitt.

They are among 718 semi-finalists in Michigan and 15,577 nationwide.

Tests were administered to a total of 1,134,635 students.

The Merit Program Semifinalists were the highest scorers in each state on the 1973 Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test-National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (PSAT/NMSQT), administered to over one million students in about 17,000 schools nationwide. The Semifinalists, most of whom will complete high school and enter college in 1975, will be identified to regionally accredited US colleges and universities. (SEE PAGE 12A)

Who owns Bath's oldest building?

BATH TWP -- "It's an eyesore, unsafe, a fire trap and if the building goes (up in flames), the apartments would go too" says Sylvia Eitelbus, chairman of the Bath Bi-Centennial Committee in reference to the old community center in Bath, which is about to go to court for condemnation. Fighting it is Florence Schoals, who lives behind the structure.

The old community center, located in Bath, is the oldest standing building in Bath. Built in 1898 by Doc Dryer, it stands unpainted with broken and boarded up windows, a leaky roof, bad wiring and a delapidated front porch. The inside seems to be sturdy, but it is said that a bad foundation exists.

The 2nd floor at present serves as a massive beehive, with bees in almost every open (non-boarded) window.

At present, the only open entrance is on the northeast corner of the building. To enter it, one must crawl through the underbrush.

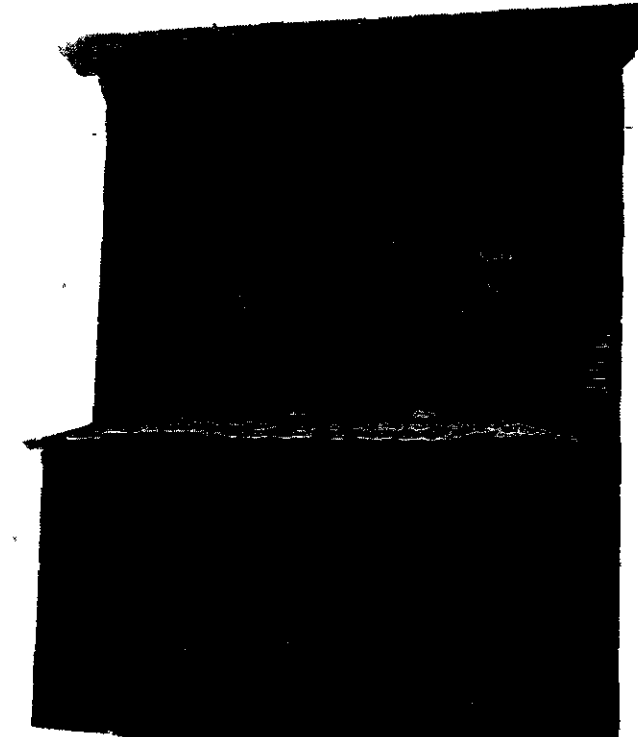
According to the abstract that exists (no deed can be found), Matthew Robson bought the property in 1893. In 1898, Doc Dryer built

the building, using the best materials. It was a 3-story building, with a stage and auditorium/dance area on the second floor. Trustees of the Bath Lodge, I.O.O.F. took over the property on October 8, 1910, using the 3rd floor for their meetings.

Somewhere between 1910 and 1919, the Bath Township Community Association obtained the property and in 1919, granted the Oddfellows and Rebekahs a 99-year lease to the third floor. The Oddfellows went defunct a few years back, but the Rebekahs used the third floor until 1970 when they found it impractical for their use.

The building has been used for many things in the past years. The township once held their meetings in it, amateur shows were performed on its stage, along with wedding receptions and dances. After the destruction of the Bath School in the early twenties, part of the building was used for a temporary school.

The Bath Township Community Association is no longer in existence today. The township supervisor, Thomas "Woody" Woodruff has tried to locate anyone who was a member of the group, but has had no success. It seems apparent that anyone who was a member is either dead or has moved out of the area.



WHO OWNS IT?

Who owns the building?

With no community association or deed available, just who owns the building has become the big question. Florence Schoals claims that the township owns it, since the township board gave her permission to use the land around it for her garden 35 years ago. Woodruff also speculates that the township might own it.

One factor is that the building was not on the tax rolls until 1971. When it was placed on the rolls, Mrs Schoals paid the taxes -- \$37.60. She also paid the taxes for 1972 and 1973, which amounted to \$200 for each of those two years, according to Schoals.

Mrs Schoals is fighting the condemnation of the building, wanting to obtain the property for herself to be used for the benefit of Bath. Although her plans are "secret" at this time, she claims that she has backing by local residents to obtain the building, and one would pay for the restoring of the old center.

Mrs Schoals would not say how many

were backing her, except that it was a good size group. If she does obtain the building, either by buying it, or eminent domain, which she could claim because she has occupied the land for 35 years, she would put on a new peaked roof and install new wiring.

Eitelbus and her Bi-Centennial Committee wanted to condemn the structure for the purpose of creating a "Centennial Park" for the Bi-Centennial celebration in '76.

Parts of the old building would be saved for the park, but in Eitelbus's opinion, as well as her committee's, it would cost too much to restore it.

Eitelbus speculated that it would cost \$50,000 to restore it. She quickly added that this was a conservative estimate.

The park project has \$500 in its account, a 50-50 split between the township and the state for the park.

In a few weeks, the case will go to court for a judge to decide. But in the area of Bath, most everyone would like to see the building remain, if it could be repaired. Mrs John Addis remarked, "Kind of a shame... something should have been done with it."

Old Maytag earns her a new Maytag

ST. JOHNS - Mrs. Annie Findlay of Rt. 1, St. Johns, received a new automatic washer as a result of her entry in a nationwide search conducted by the Maytag company.

Mrs. Findlay's entry was identified as the oldest Maytag automatic washer in the Lansing area, one of 121 markets where the search was conducted. New Maytag automatic washers are being presented to the winning entries in each of these markets.

The presentation of the new washer by Richard Snyder of Kurt's Appliance to Mrs. Findlay marks the final step in the appliance firm's search for the oldest working Maytag automatic for its historical museum in Newton, Ia.

The oldest machine was found in Story City, Iowa, and was identified as the 12th the company had manufactured. Owners of that washer, Mr. and Mrs. Vern Hornbacher, received \$5000 in cash in addition to the new washer.

The search was held by the company to observe the Silver Anniversary of its automatic washer first produced in 1949. Conducted earlier this year, the search resulted in more than 25,000 letters to the company.

The Michigan State Police graduated their first service trooper class of 46 members including a St. Johns man in ceremonies Friday afternoon, Sept. 6 in the National Guard armory in Lansing.

St. Johns man is graduate of 1st service trooper class

Among the 46 receiving badges was Steven J. Thelen of St. Johns. He has been assigned to the Tekonsha Post.

Principal speaker for the occasion was Richard H. Austin, Michigan secretary of state.

Col. George L. Halverson, department director, administered the oath to this service officer group of men and presented their badges. He also addressed the class members, their relatives, and friends.

There were two class awards. One for academic achievement was presented by Major Lloyd Brevard, uniform division commander, to Bradley A. Smith, Gladwin. The other was a team building award presented by Capt. Gene Roeker, training division commander, to Thomas W. Brunet, L'Anse.

Orator for the class was Clifton L. Edwards, Onsted. Post assignments for the service officers who reported for duty Sept. 10 were announced by Lt. Col. Forrest Jacob, field services director. Others participating in the program included Lt. Col. John Brown, staff services director, 1st Lt. William Van Westen, school commander, and the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Jerome MacEachin, department chaplain. Most of the class members have had some college training, including seven with associate degrees. All but one of the class are single. Following satisfactory service these officers who range in age at enlistment from 17 to 20 will become eligible for regular trooper training when they reach 21. Their civil service level position has a beginning pay of \$8,143 annually. Their duties include various clerical and other non-law enforcement type duties at posts, districts or other department operations. Their uniforms are the same as those for regular troopers except for insignia and other emblem material. The State Police service trooper position is replacing that of the former cadet (C) position which was established for the department in 1968 when the first class was graduated. Colonel Halverson at that time was commander of the training division.

Bath Twp receives Bi-Centennial flag

BATH - The highlight of the Bath Twp meeting Monday came when Sylvia Estebuss, chairman of the Bath Bi-Centennial Committee presented to the board the Bi-Centennial flag she received from the National Bi-Centennial Committee.

John Roetman of Amtrak asked the Township Board if they would be willing to donate to Amtrak \$200 for 1975 and \$40 for 1976 for the continuation of the project. The money would be used to help pay for station operation. The motion was passed.

The only other business at the meeting was the approval to send 3 more firemen to Lansing Community College to attend a Medical Training Program and the Board gave authorization to Bath Township Chief of Police Myron Steffes to hire Michael Boes as a part time policeman.

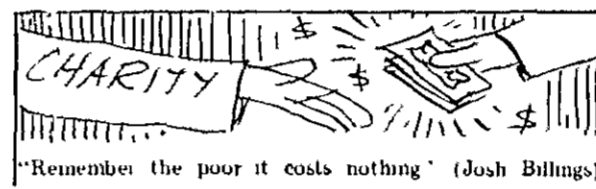
He is now in the Clinton County Jail waiting examination.

A little of Europe has come to DeWitt Township at the home of Mr and Mrs Jack Kzeski of 740 Boichot Road. Their daughter, Cynthia, 17, has just returned home from West Germany and they have an exchange student with them from Sweden, Inger Svenson, 18.

Both girls, who are seniors at Eastern High School became exchange students through the Youth for Understanding program. The program was founded just after World War II by Americans wishing to give German youths a better understanding of America. This program has branched out over the years to allow other countries to participate as well as to send American youth overseas.

The program is set up through cooperating schools with its main headquarters in Ann Arbor. The participants must pay their transportation over to the country in which they will reside.

Cindy went to Germany for a couple of months this summer, first to Ratzburg, then to Kiel on the Baltic Sea. The family she stayed with spoke English and as Cindy added "rather well." Her mother (the exchange students refer to the families that they live with as if they were their own family at home) worked much of the time since no "father" was present her older "sister" and Cindy became good friends.

Living with the family was a "grandfather" who in his earlier days worked as a forester traveling around the world. Forty years ago, he had visited the western part of the U.S. and to this day, he still believes that Americans drive Model T's out west and have no indoor plumbing.

When Cindy or her sister tried to correct his line of thinking, he'd simply reply that Cindy didn't know what the west was like because she was young yet and hadn't "really" seen America. She just didn't know what it was like.

Cindy described the border between the 2 Germanys. The border is like that described in the "movies" - high electric fence, filled barbed wire, dogs and guards with machine guns in towers along with mine fields. She said that when she was near the border, East German guards would point

their guns at her and take pictures. Her "family" told her that they were checking to see if she was an escapee of East Germany.

The young people were friendly to Cindy, wishing to learn more about America from her. Some of the older ones looked down on her because she was from the US but she felt most were friendly.

"It was really good," smiled Cindy. "People were very, very nice and the countryside was beautiful." She would like to go back there again, but would like to go to Bavaria in the southern part of West Germany.

Inger Svensson is now living with the Kzeski's. She came here from Sundsvan, Sweden. Inger became interested in coming to America because 2 of her 3 older sisters have been to this country. She speaks English fluently. She said English is required in Sweden and it's easy to learn. English is all around them, with tourists and rock music, which all comes from either Britain or the US.

Besides English and Swedish, she speaks French and Spanish.

So far, she enjoys the US, finding most everyone very friendly. One thing which she discovered is American television, becoming fascinated with soap operas. However, she doesn't like the commercials. She explained that in Sweden it costs money to watch television and it is only on from 6-11 pm daily.

Mass transit systems are far better in Sweden than in the US. During the gas shortage, Sweden experienced little difficulty in their severe gas rationing because most everyone uses the trains and buses. It costs to use the system, but it is low enough so that everyone can afford it.

When she compared American schools to that of her homeland, she stated the US schools had more extra-curricular activities than those of Sweden. The Swedes believe that the schools are only for learning.

When Inger returns to Sweden in a year, she will have to repeat this year. The reasoning for this is that she is missing many subjects taught in Sweden that are not taught here, but she felt that the experience was worth repeating the year.

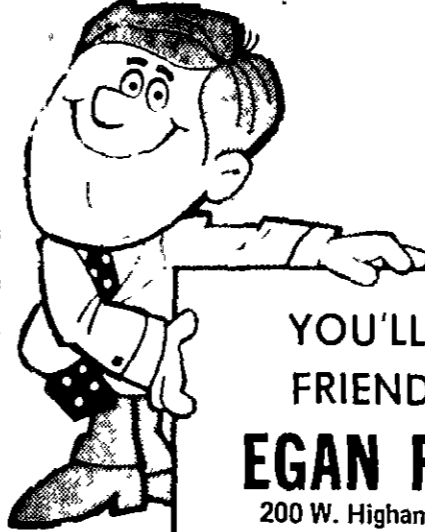
New officer for Bath township

Sleepy Hollow taking shape, but predict 1980s completion

OID -- Construction is in full swing at Clinton County's future state park, as Maclean Construction Company begins preparation of the man-made lake for Sleepy Hollow State Park. The park's completion date is set for the early 1980's.

Sleepy Hollow State Park is located southwest of Ovid in parts of Ovid and Victor Townships.

The park, when completed will contain a lake the size of Lake Lansing with a beach and pike fishing once the lake bed is completed and the Little Maple River is dammed up. The site is hoped to become a popular recreation area in the tri-county area.

Located on 2685 acres of rolling, wooded land with the Little Maple River flowing through the center of it, it has become a popular hunting spot for fall, and has good snowmobiling facilities in the winter time.

The Department of Natural Resources (DNR) plans for a half mile of sand beach, a campground of 150 sites, 6 picnic areas and over 3 miles of hiking trails.

Construction has begun for the lake-bed, with Upton Road being changed to follow the perimeter of the lake. The DNR hopes to have the sandy beach ready by the end of November and the dam constructed in a month, but one ranger at the park said "that it remains to be seen."

So far, 1 group campground has been completed on Upton Road just north of Price Rd and a temporary picnic area has been created on Price Road just west of Shepardsville Road.

Three miles of hiking trails have been completed along with the restoration of 2 one-room schools.

Construction of the park had been delayed because of vandalism and problems with acquiring the necessary land. Pike will be a plentiful catch when the 110 acre lake is completed. A pike-spawning bed located in the park just west of Shepardsville Rd, has been very successful in the past few years.

Sleepy Hollow, which was first dedicated in 1966 by the Conservation Commission (now the DNR) will cost \$925,000.

The State of Michigan will provide for \$626,000 and a

federal grant of \$299,000 will provide the rest. In addition, a boat launch and rental will be located on the west side of the lake. A picnic area will be on the lake's largest island.

Fall colors are expected to be good this fall at the park. To reach the park, go east of

St Johns on M-21 to Shepardsville Road, then south to Price Rd. Those coming from the southern part of the county can take US-27 to Round Lake Road, head east then north on Shepardsville Road. No State Park sticker is yet required for admission.

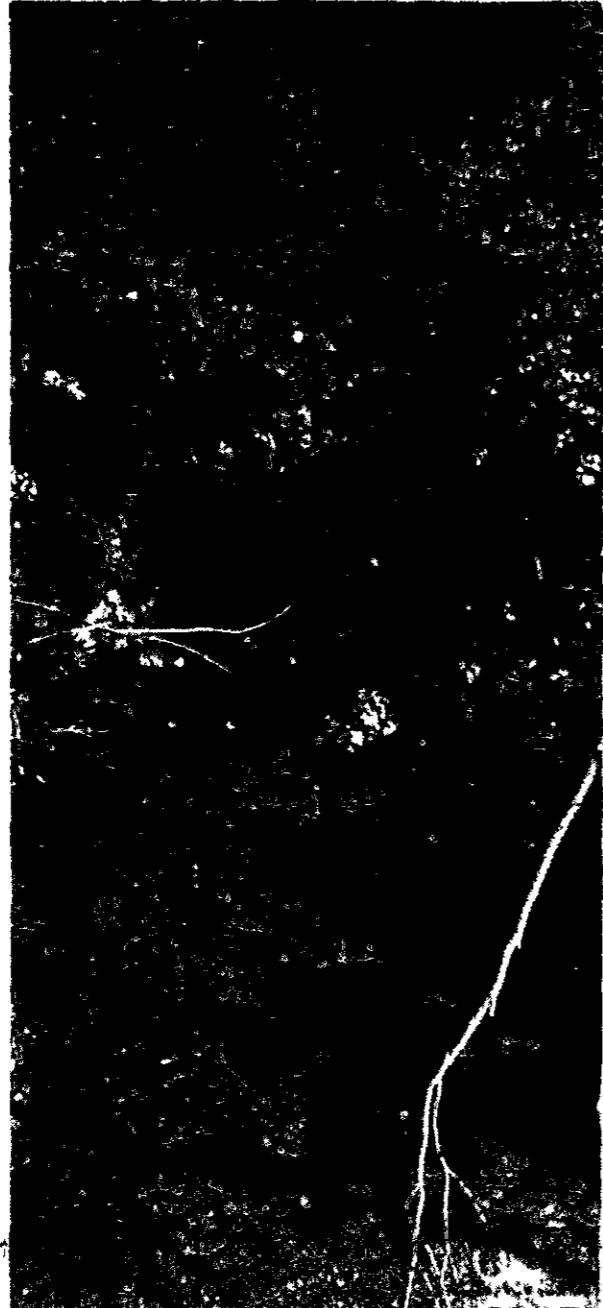

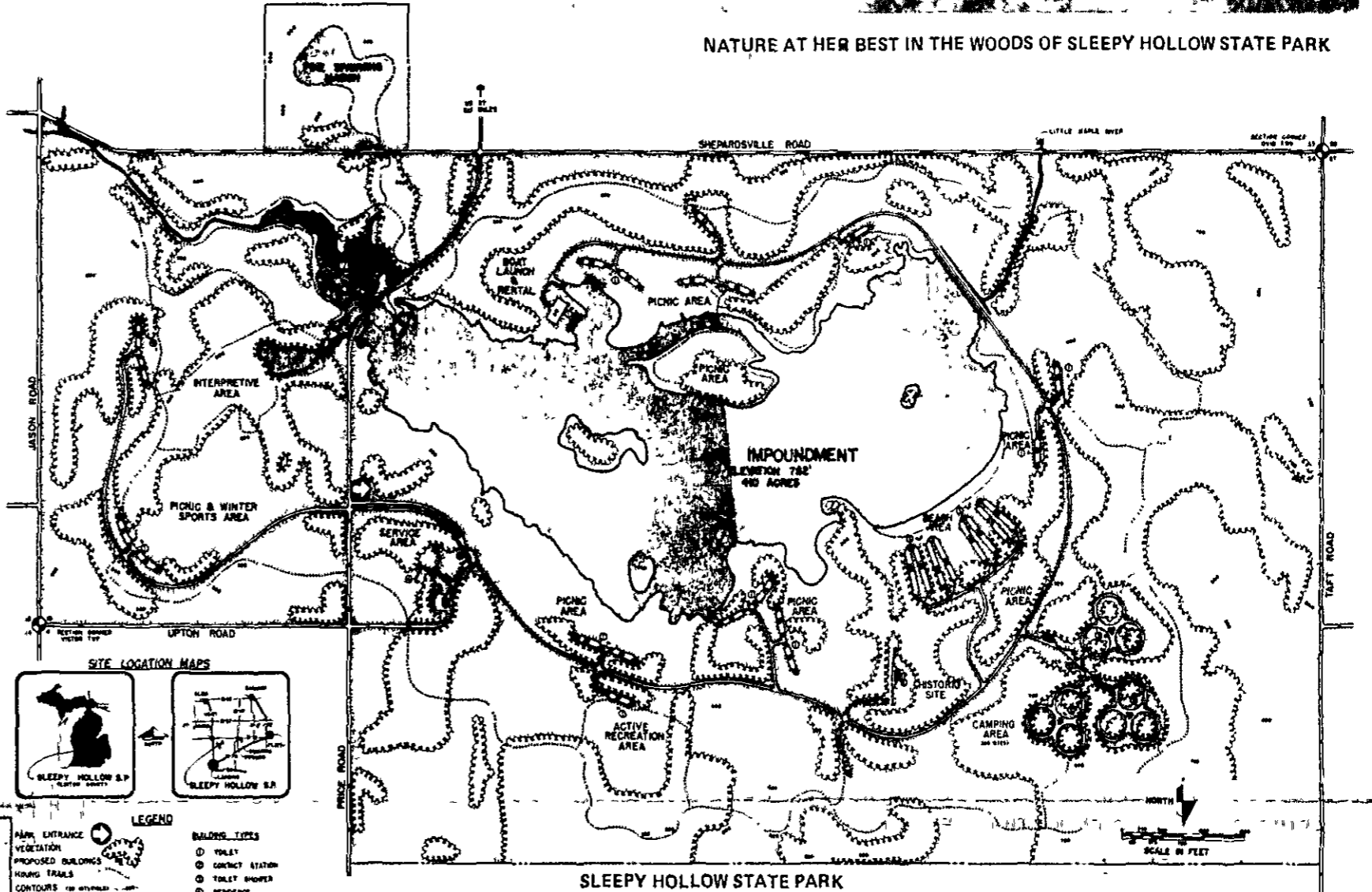

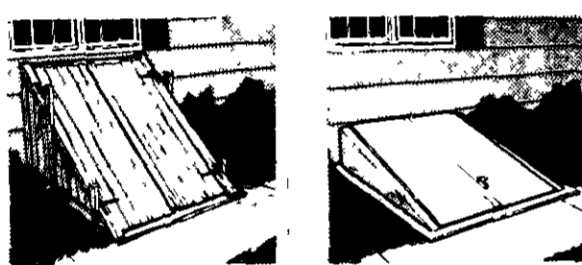
There were nearly 2000 children, ages 5 to 16 from Kalamazoo participating in the Learning Fair with 13 staff members, about half of them college students leading the activities.

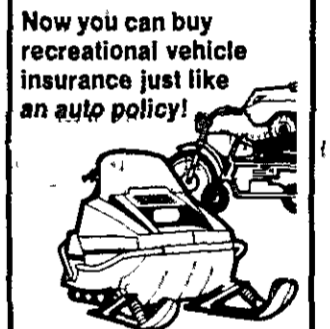

Redwings show poise and ability despite 20-0 loss to Oilers

"I thought St Johns had a good club out here - I just hope for their sake they don't get their daubers down," said Mount Pleasant Coach Hilt Foster after his Oilers had handed the Redwings a 20-0 football loss Friday.

"They executed real well and they gave us a lot of trouble on the option and sweep pass. They're good hitters; they have spirit and pride."

Over in the home locker room, coach Joe Gonzales also praised his chargers:

"They never gave up. I said we'd be inexperienced with just 6 starters back, but they played well. I figure it should have been a 14-7 ballgame."

True to his pre-season word, Gonzales made his varsity coaching debut by trying to open the offense and present a varied attack.

The Redwings wound up passing 10 times, and might have tried more had not the Oilers defended the air game so well. A stingy Mount Pleasant crew held St Johns to 97 yards on the ground despite a variety of off-tackle smashes, end sweeps and up-the-middle runs from several formations.

St Johns simply ran into a solid, big Mount Pleasant team of experience and depth. The score did not reflect the closeness of the game.

Mount Pleasant scored on a drive from the opening kickoff, but found St Johns highly resistant after that and led just 7-0 at the half.

A foiled St Johns bid ended at the Oiler 1-yardline, or the score would have been tied by halftime. Later, the Oilers tallied after earning their way to the end zone once and getting more of a gift near the end of the game - a 60-yard interception return.

Both sides agreed it would have been a different game if St Johns had scored the 1st time around.

As it was, Foster - a veteran known for consistently solid teams at Mount Pleasant, bemoaned the fact that St Johns kept the Oilers in a bottle half the night.

"When you start inside the 15 yardline it's awfully tough to show what you can do," he said while discussing the talents of senior quarterback John Weisenburger. A solid 6-1, 192-pounder who also punts and plays in the defensive backfield, Weisenburger left late in the 3rd period with a knee injury.

Meanwhile, Gonzales attributed the bottling of Mount Pleasant to the activity that gave its name to the sport - "Our kicking game kept them in the hole."

Kevin Knight buried the

Oilers at least twice with punts, leaving them on their own 8-yard-line in the 1st period and the 14 in the 3rd. One 34-yard boot went from the Redwing 31 to the Oiler 35. An illegal block by Mount Pleasant on the return put the visitors back on their own 25.

But Mount Pleasant's ability to punch out key ground gains now and then and play stifling defense made the difference. Nigerian fullback Obi Nwabara hurtled his 6-0, 185-pound frame a total of 100 yards in 15 carries to lead all rushers. He tallied the 3rd period touchdown on a 21-yard scamper after gaining 14 yards on the previous play. A pair of 13-yard runs by Nwabara kept the 1st Oiler TD drive going.

The defense shut off St Johns' deep passing game, but Redwing quarterback Brian Pertler

kept things lively in the 1st half by hitting 3 for 4 on shorter passes.

The teams were statistically close at halftime - Mount Pleasant held a 6-5 edge in 1st downs, a 100-60 yard advantage in ground gains and a 43-25 margin in the air.

Final stats saw the Oilers with an improved gap on the ground - 187 yards to the Wings' 97 - but other figures were still close. Oilers had 11 1st downs, Redwings 8, the same passing yardage to St Johns' 39; 52 penalty yards to the hosts' 45.

Significantly, the relatively more inexperienced Redwings fumbled just once and recovered their own, while Mount Pleasant dropped the ball 3 times and lost it twice.

Kalem Latimer gained more than half the Redwing ground yardage by rushing for 14

yards. Harold Wellman picked up 24 yards in 7 tries, while end Ken Randolph received 2 passes for 16 yards.

Mount Pleasant drove 57 yards to score from the opening kickoff, tearing big chunks of yardage on 4 of the 9 plays of the series. Weisenburger kept the ball up the middle for the final yard to score at 7:56 and Mike Ralston kicked the extra point.

St Johns got to the Oiler 35 before punting, but held the visitors deep in force a Weisenburger punt. The Redwings got the ball on the Mount Pleasant 45 and moved well all the way to the 2 yardline.

Key gains in the drive included a 9-yard pass to Knight, 12-yard and 19-yard sprints by Latimer and a 5-yard pass to Randolph for a 1st down.

But the Oilers stiffened at their own 5, where Randolph's leaping catch had put the Redwings. Latimer got 2 1/2 yards on 1st down, another half-yard on 2nd down and a signal cross-up left Knight yardless on a 3rd down end sweep. Latimer picked up 1-yard from the 2 on the 4th down try.

Mount Pleasant took over and got out to its 20 before punting, but St Johns was never able to mount a deep thrust after that. Closest penetration was the

Mount Pleasant 33 yardline in the 3rd quarter. Another deep punt and a penalty had left the Oilers frustrated on their own 9 yardline and St Johns took over on the Oiler 38 with a chance to tie the score. But Mount Pleasant threw Knight for a yard loss, yielded 6 yards to a scrambling Pertler, and forced 2 incomplete passes.

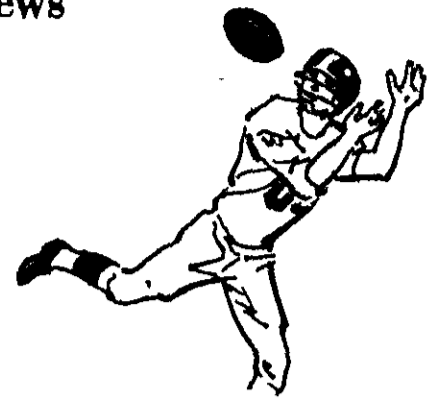
The Oilers mounted their only consistent march since the opening series to score at 1:49 of the 3rd period on Nwabara's 21-yard run. St Johns got the ball at midfield in the 4th quarter and had a 1st down at the Mount Pleasant 40, but a flat pass intended for Knight was picked off by defensive back Kip Schmidt, who had clear sailing 60 yards to the end zone.

Jeff Hazle blocked the Oiler extra-point kick.

All St Johns players saw action in the game. Pertler called most of the plays himself, said Gonzales, who was pleased with his quarterback's performance.

St Johns will open the West Central campaign against Charlotte at home Friday (7:30 pm), while Mount Pleasant stays out of its league against arch-rival Midland Dow, also a 20-0 victor last week. Charlotte pulled out a last-minute 14-12 triumph over Eaton Rapids.

Walleye Fingerlings now being released

LANSING -- Walleye fingerling production by the Michigan Department of Natural Resources and sportsmen's groups for 1974 is double that of 1973 with over 300,000 two- to three-inch fish being released.

The largest source of walleye fingerlings is a highway "borrow pit" in Roscommon County Earth is taken from "borrow pits" for freeway construction and the hole fills with water.

The Roscommon pond, located next to I-75, yielded 200,000 fingerlings which have been transferred to Missaukee Lake near Lake City. This is the first year of operation for this pond.

Over 92,000 walleye were taken from the Moss Lake and Rapid River "borrow pits" in

Delta County and planted in Little and Big Bay de Noc. In operation since 1968, the Fife Lake Pond in Grand Traverse County produced 9,200 small walleyes. These were all marked by fin clipping to evaluate their survival rate in Fife Lake.

Another 9,000 walleyes were raised in Holland Fish and Game Club ponds in 1973 with similar production expected

this year. These fish are being held in the ponds longer and are being fed minnows in an effort to produce larger fingerlings. Biologists from DNR's Fisheries Division say a study is in progress to determine how many of the fish survive the rigors of the wild. A twenty-percent survival rate with half of the survivors being caught by fishermen is considered a good rate of return.

Mueller added 63 yards in 17 carries.

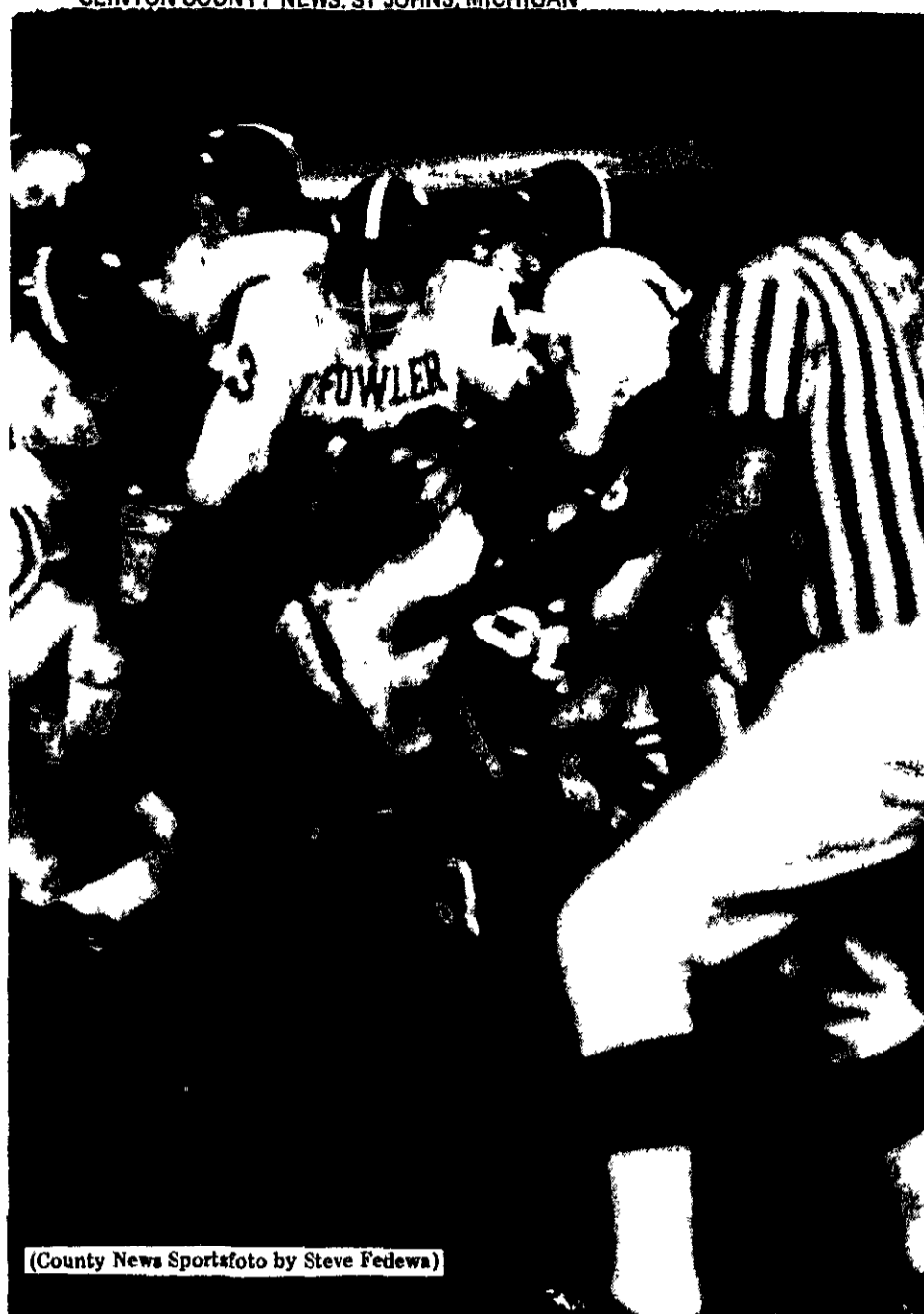

"Know your duck"

LANSING - Limited assistance is available from the Department of Natural Resources for hunters who wish to organize their own "Know Your Duck" clinic before this fall's duck season begins October 2 in the Upper Peninsula and October 9 in the Lower Peninsula.

Duck recognition is important as bag limits are based on the type of duck taken. The daily bag limit is 100 points with the canvasback and redhead worth 100 points each.

The female mallard, black duck, wood duck and hooded merganser are 90 points and pegged at 35 points are the male mallard and ringneck.

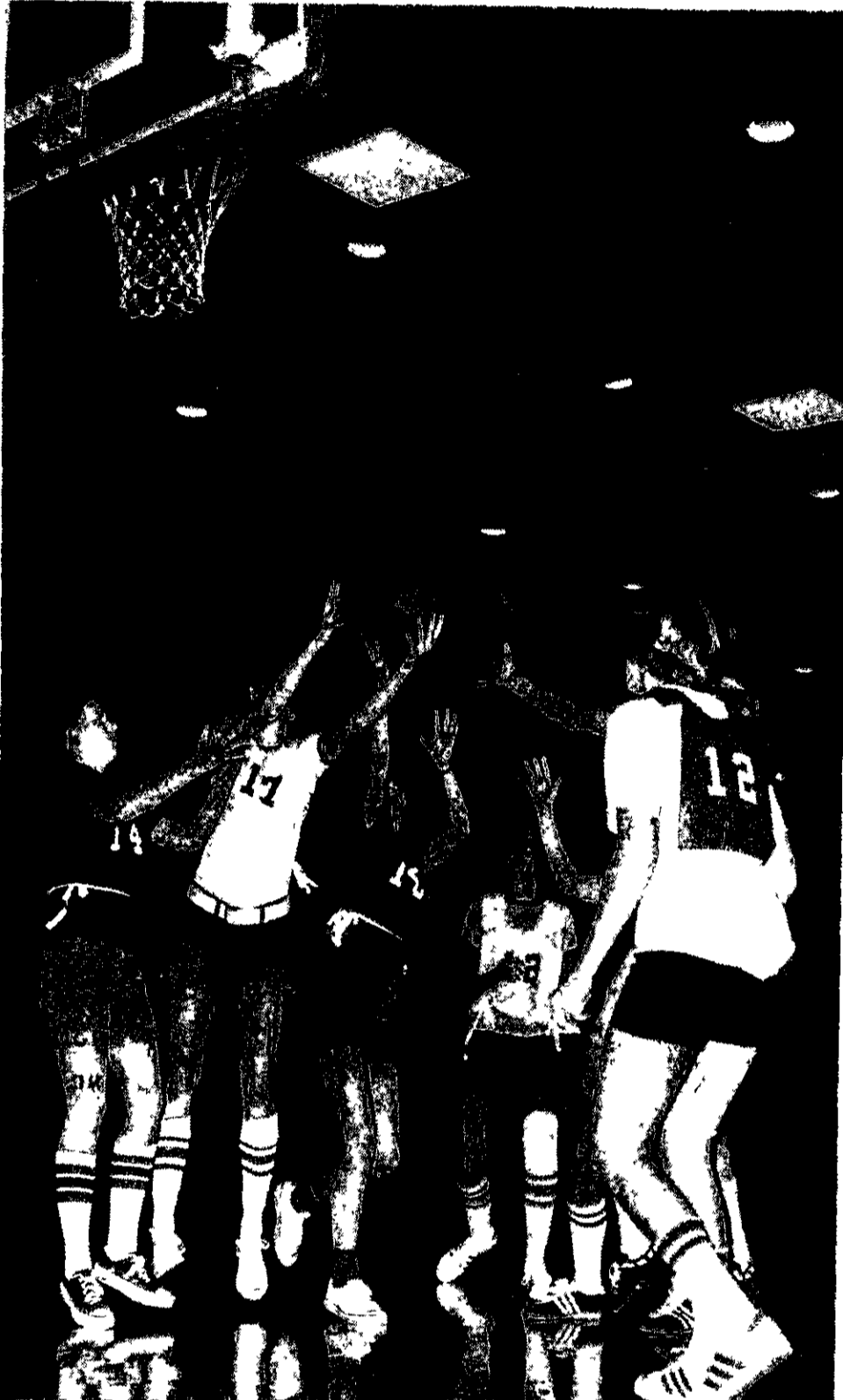
Allowing a larger daily bag are birds rated at 15 points. These are the bluewinged and green-winged teal, baldpate, shoveler, Old Squaw, common

and redbreasted merganser, goldeneye, bufflehead, gadwall, scaup, pintail, scoter and ruddy duck.

It can easily be seen that correct identification of the duck is a must and many sportsman's organizations ask the DNR each year for assistance in teaching members which ducks are which.

A limited number of identification kits are available through DNR district offices primarily in the southern Lower Peninsula. These kits include stuffed birds and a slide presentation with script for narration. They are available on a first-come, first-served basis.

Clubs and other organizations interested in setting up classes should contact their local DNR office.

All Outdoors

Some tips for cooks

For most of us who hunt and fish for fun doesn't end with the quarry in the game pocket or the fish on the stringer. One more experience is ahead, we are yet to eat these various game animals and fish.

Comments and suggestions from the gals who read this column have caused me to gather a few of the many ex-

cellent recipes from friends whose cooking I have sampled on many occasions.

Because they are the largest of the game we regularly hunt in Michigan, I'll start with deer Venison.

From Mary Follett and Jean Trask of Alma comes this blueprint for delectable Venison - even those who hate deer meat will like this one!

Venison Roast

- 1 cup flour
- 1/2 cup butter
- 1 large onion (chopped)
- 1 clove garlic (minced)
- 2 tablespoon catsup
- 1 tablespoon Worcestershire
- 1 1/2 cups Claret Wine
- 1/2 teaspoon pepper

1 - 6 oz can mushrooms

Preheat pot - Roll meat in flour - Brown in butter at high heat. Add remaining ingredients except mushrooms. Cover - cook at low heat 4 hours - turn heat up at end to absorb moisture - Add mushrooms - Serve with rice and salad.

Mrs Ruth Gibbs of St. Louis has permitted us to use these directions for preparing any kind of fish. Even bass and pike are a treat when this mustard recipe is used.

Baked Fish with Mustard Sauce

- 1 1/2 lb filet (haddock)
- 1/2 teaspoon salt-pepper
- 2 tsp melted butter
- 1 tsp flour
- 1 cup boiling water
- 1 tsp lemon juice
- 1 tsp prepared mustard
- 1/2 cup dried bread crumbs

Sprinkle filet with salt and pepper. Lay in shallow pan (well greased). Melt 1 tablespoon butter and blend with flour. Add water, lemon juice and mustard and stir till thickened. Pour over fish. Add remaining tablespoon of melted

butter to bread crumbs and sprinkle over fish. Bake in 400° oven 20 minutes. Place on hot platter and garnish attractively.

Harold Anderson of Reed City has a unique way of using all of the various animals and birds that he hunts.

A recent get-together at his house gave him an opportunity to spread a buffet table with some very delicious hors d'oeuvres. He has his wild game processed by a gentleman in Grand Rapids. Some of the meats he has made into salami and some, I believe, was in summer sausage. The major portion of the remainder was smoked.

It's hard to imagine an old, tough Canadian Honker as being a gourmet's delight, but believe it or not that smoked goose was great!

Smoked partridge, deer, rabbit and duck rounded out the menu.

Had Harold and his wife not told us, I'm sure that most of those present would have

believed that they had made a trip to a delicatessen just prior to that great spread!

John Wootton, formerly of Houghton Lake passes along his secret formula for all sorts of fish. John should know his fish for at one time he was a licensed charter boat captain on Lake Michigan. He also served as the First Mate on the Mitchell II. This boat was owned and operated by the Mitchell - Garcia Tackle Company.

This 60 foot craft operated as a sports fisherman in the Bahamas during the time that John was aboard.

RECIPE

Pinch of salt - Pinch of pepper
Package(s) cracker crumbs.
Beaten eggs in bowl. Cut fish filets into one inch strips - Dip in beaten eggs - roll in cracker crumbs - Deep fry until pieces float or until well browned - place on paper towel until dry - sprinkle with garlic salt (if you wish) and eat.

American Coot - this bird is the carp of the duck world. This author has recently been made aware of the following old Indian Recipe for preparing this majestic bird:

- 2 Coot
- 1 lg pinch of salt
- 1 lg pinch of pepper
- 1 lg pinch of bay leaf
- 1 handful of meat tenderizer
- 1 double handful of red cedar chips

Place both coot in deep kettle on top of carefully layered cedar chips, add spices and all dry ingredients. Add two cups water, cover and simmer for about 3 days - adding water as necessary - after 3 days, drain remaining water, take both coot outside. Now bury the coot and eat the cedar chips.

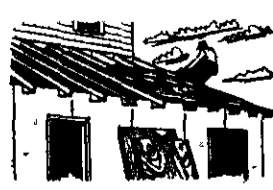

Smith, president of the National Merit Scholarship Corporation (NMSC), "The approximately 15,000 Semifinalists represent the top one-half of one percent of the nation's most academically talented young people. The students bring honor to themselves, their families, their teachers, and their communities. Many of these students, those who make the best use of their ability to become productive at the high intellectual levels of which they are capable, will be future leaders in business, industry and the professions."

and industrial sponsors and by NMSC's own funds. Winners will receive a single payment of \$1,000 next fall after enrolling as full-time college undergraduates. A Selection Committee of experienced college admissions officers and secondary school guidance counselors will be convened to select the 1,000 winners nationwide. The Committee will judge in combination all information about each Finalist - his high school academic record, accomplishments, extracurricular activities, and test scores.

The season end event is unusual in two respects. First it is designed to bring together cars and drivers that do not usually travel from track to

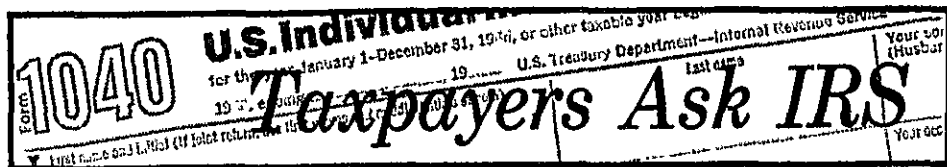
track, and 2nd, it will present fans with 2 unique races with the 100 lap feature on the 1/4 mile oval and the Double O Competition that uses both the 1/4

This column of questions and answers on federal tax matters is provided by the local office of the U. S. Internal Revenue Service and is published as a public service to taxpayers. The column answers questions most frequently asked by taxpayers.

Q. I have \$30,000 in group term life insurance coverage which is paid for by my employer. Should the cost of this insurance coverage be included in my income?

A. No. In general, you must include the cost of group term life insurance provided to you by your employer only when the coverage is in excess of \$50,000.

Q. In January, I gave my son \$2,000 worth of stock as a wedding present. In July, I gave him another \$3,000 gift. I know I'll have to file a Federal gift tax return because of these gifts. When is the annual filing deadline?

A. Federal gift tax returns are not filed annually. They are filed quarterly. If total gifts to any one person, when added to all previous gifts to that person during the calendar

year, exceed \$3,000, a gift tax return must be filed for that quarter and all gifts made during the year must be reported. In your case, a return did not have to be filed for the first quarter since the January gift did not exceed \$3,000. However, the July gift raised the total amount of gifts to your son for the year above the \$3,000 level, requiring a gift tax return to be filed by November 15 (the due date being 45 days after the close of a quarter). At this time, you must report both the January and July gifts to your son.

For more information, see IRS Publication 448, "A Guide to Federal Estate and Gift Taxation." It's available for 50 cents from the Superintendent of Documents, U.S. Government Printing Office, Washington, D.C. 20402.

Q. I found a copy of an old

tax return of mine and noticed a deduction I neglected to take. Is it too late to claim the deduction?

A. You can file an amended return, Form 1040X, but it must be filed within three years from the date your original return was filed, or within two years from the time the tax was paid, whichever is later. If you filed your original return before the due date, the three-year rule applies from the due date for that year.

Q. Under a divorce decree, I'm required to pay my ex-wife's medical and dental expenses. Do I deduct these as medical expenses subject to the limitations imposed on such deductions or as alimony without any limitation?

A. In general, such amounts qualify as alimony and may be deducted as such without limitation. Your ex-wife must include the payment in her gross income, but if she itemizes her deductions she can deduct the payment as a medical expense.

Want to hunt antlerless deer? Apply now

LANSING - If you're hoping to hunt antlerless deer with a gun this fall, Department of Natural Resources officials remind you that now is the time to apply for any-deer permits on special forms available at license dealers throughout Michigan

As in the past, applicants may obtain cards and envelopes for their permit requests by first purchasing regular firearm deer licenses for the upcoming season in November. Each applicant will again be limited to submitting one permit request for hunting antlerless deer

This year, 25,000 permits will be issued following a drawing, if needed, on or about Oct 8. Oct 1 is the application postmark deadline

On the application for a permit, the applicant must indicate the hunting area in which the permit will be used.

The season in areas 30, 31 and 36, traditionally called "Club Country" around Alpena, is November 15 to 30. New this year is a shorter season from November 15 to 21 in 23 southern Lower Peninsula antlerless deer areas

Specific information on which areas are open to antlerless hunting is available in the 1974 application guide. This guide has been issued to the approximately 3,000 Michigan hunting license dealers.

Hunters are also reminded there will be no antlerless deer hunting in the Upper Peninsula this year

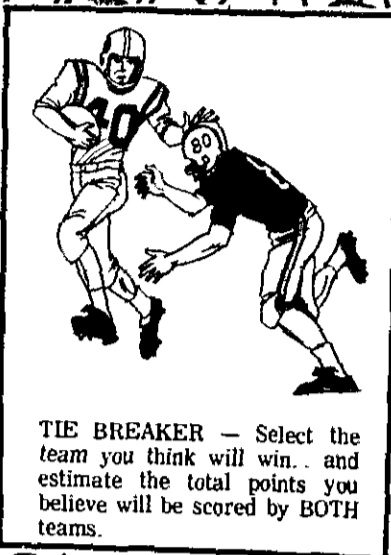

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

Dear Editor

As employed dental assistants we feel all citizens should be aware of the following:

Very soon a report from the Michigan State Board of Dentistry will be presented to the Michigan Legislature's Rules and Regulations Committee stating the duties "of a person, Section 9a (1) of House Bill No 4114" signed into law January 1974.

This report deals with the duties of "persons presently employed by dentists as dental assistants" In this State, as in the Nation, we have "on the job trained" dental assistants and "Certified Dental Assistants". Those assistants who are Certified hold "Certificates" issued by the Certifying Board of the American Dental Assistants Association. A course of study was designed by the Council on Dental Education of the American Dental Association to assure a basic level of competency for dental assistants. After completion of formal study, the dental assistant is eligible to sit for the National Certification Examination and if successful, is issued a "Certificate". To keep a certificate current, as of January 1, 1960, proof of 12 hours of continuing education is mandatory yearly. Our profession is the first health profession in the nation to demand continuing education in Michigan 643 dental

assistants hold such "Certificates". We have established 13 post-secondary schools of dental assisting since 1966, at a cost to taxpayers of no less than \$1,300,000.00 This amount covers equipment only, not buildings or faculties. These programs were set up to meet the demands for formal training of dental assistants, so that all personnel in dentistry had a minimum level of education.

This bill was designed to update the profession of dentistry by expansion of duties of auxiliary personnel so that more persons could receive comprehensive dental care at reasonable cost by using existing training facilities and accepting no less than "Certification" of dental assistants as the minimum of formal education can we meet the need for expanded duties and maintain the high level of professional care our patients are receiving and so right deserve.

What does this mean to you the consumer? May we suggest you support the concept of care rendered by the best qualified persons available, and endorse the "Certified Dental Assistant" as such.

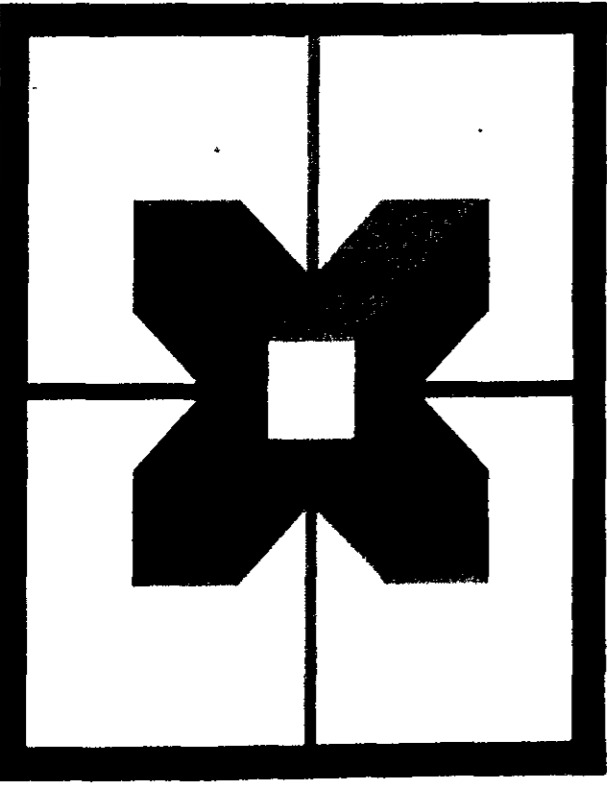

It's Michigan cider and doughnut time

Michigan's fall tourism season is here and with it comes the taste-tempting treat of cider and doughnuts - a delicacy enjoyed each autumn by thousands of Michiganders, according to Automobile Club of Michigan.

"While the sweet cider is available year-around in most areas, it's in the fall, when freshly picked apples are turned into pure juice, that this delicious drink is most popular," states Joseph Ratke, Auto Club touring manager.

To help motorists discover the whereabouts of area cider mills, the accompanying map provides the locations of 54 operations, including 3 in the Clinton County area, where pressing may be observed. Twenty-nine mills are located in Southeast Michigan, 15 in West Michigan and 10 in East Michigan.

"HALF THE FUN of visiting a cider mill comes from watching the fermented apple juice being extracted by means of a press," explains Ratke. "The other half comes from sampling the finished product."

After the apples are pressed, preservatives are then added and the cider is pasteurized before sale.

"Cider mills vary in character from the most modern endeavor complete with hydraulic presses to the small family operation that uses gear-driven machinery," he adds. "Either method produces a juice that is pure and sweet to taste."

Some of the mills have their own orchards where apples may be picked. Others feature horse-drawn wagon rides, flea markets, gift shops and restaurants. One East Michigan operation even offers all the pumpkins you can carry for \$1.92.

CIDER MILL TRIPS are most popular on weekends, when long lines of cars often develop outside. Travelers may avoid these lines by visiting mills on weekdays.

Since many mills operate irregular hours persons wishing to see pressing operations should call ahead before leaving home.

Due to increasing costs, many mills are not establishing advance prices for cider and doughnuts. The average price for a gallon of cider should be about \$1.50 to \$1.70 with doughnuts between 90 cents and \$1.40 a dozen.

There is a Simple Solution to the complex problem of crime. It was unwittingly discovered in a neighboring county where they built a tunnel which could be the light at the end of the tunnel, if you follow me.

Mother and Aunt Madeline will remember I am always interested in finding Simple Solutions to complex problems. In 1967, for instance, I proposed the perfect solution to the population explosion. It occurred to me after that massive power failure blacked out much of the east coast - 9 months after that when hospitals noticed unusually big business in their maternity wards.

Even Doris Day could figure out what most people like to do in the dark. So there was the Simple Solution to the population problem. Turn on the lights all over the world and leave them on. Get the idea? Like it? You'll love the tunnel.

IT WAS RECENTLY built in Genesee County for \$156,450. The tunnel connects the jail to the court house and its purpose is to prevent prisoners from escaping. Some people call it a bridge because it's built several floors above the ground. But I call it a tunnel because it is completely enclosed with not even a peephole through which a crook might sneak one last look at a Coca-Cola billboard.

Besides, if I didn't call it a tunnel, I couldn't have made that clever remark about seeing the light at the end of it. It is not easy being a columnist. The tunnel provides the "maximum security" needed to protect the public from muggers and welfare cheats. "It's a wonder we haven't had an incident in the parking lot as we escort prisoners from the jail to the court house," said Sheriff John O'Brien. "We have been completely exposed to the public."

The only lawbreakers who can be safely exposed to the public are Presidential aides and other lawyers. They are taken to court in open convertibles, slowly moving, so the prisoners can easily explain to TV cameras how they are sorry they sinned and are going to become priests after they serve their sentences - 15 days in a Howard Johnson's motel.

The tunnel contains lockers so prisoners can change clothes. There is also an area where they can visit with their families. So here comes the Simple Solution.

ALL WE HAVE to do is make the tunnel longer and add some coin machines that dispense food and Kool-Aid. Whenever an arrest is made, it should be immediately determined if the crook went to law school with the President. If not, he should be nudged through the tunnel entrance with instructions to keep moving until he finds justice.

The delicious gimmick is that the tunnel doesn't really lead to a court house - It doesn't exit anywhere. It is so long no prisoner can live long enough to reach the end. Several times a poor slob might think he sees the light at the end of the tunnel but it turns out to be just another neon sign advertising grain ground exceedingly slow.

And soon, presto! The streets are free of crime. If an innocent citizen is slugged, he can crumple secure in the knowledge it wasn't a lousy mugger, it was the CIA.

The Simple Solution is so great I'm surprised no one ever thought of it before. Did they?

St Johns City Commission Meeting

ST JOHNS CITY COMMISSION MEETING August 26, 1974

The regular meeting of the St Johns City Commission was called to order by Mayor Wood at 7:30 pm.

COMMISSIONERS PRESENT: Arehart, Ebert, Hannah, Wilcox, Wood

COMMISSIONERS ABSENT: None

STAFF PRESENT: Weatherwax, Humphrey, Vermette, Wood, Maples.

Motion by Comm Arehart, supported by Comm Ebert to approve the minutes of August 12, 1974 as written Motion carried.

Motion by Comm Ebert, supported by Comm Wilcox to approve the warrants. Motion carried.

Mayor Wood asked for additions or deletions to the agenda as presented. Several additions were made.

Motion by Comm Arehart, supported by Comm Ebert to approve the agenda as amended. Motion carried.

Mr Doug Austin, Attorney for Mr Willard Searles appeared before the Commission to present a rezoning application.

Motion by Comm Ebert, supported by Comm Wilcox to refer the Searles rezoning request to the Planning Commission for their recommendations. Motion carried.

The City Clerk read a letter from the St Johns High School, thanking the Commission for permission in using the tennis courts for a dance, even though they decided later to use other premises for the dance.

Building Inspector Wood appeared before the Commission and presented a memo concerning building permit rates in St Johns and surrounding communities.

Discussion followed.

Motion by Comm Wilcox, supported by Comm Arehart to authorize the Building Code discussion to be placed on the agenda of the second meeting of September, further that the Code itself, fee structure, and personnel, be discussed at that time. Motion carried.

The City Manager reported that he had contacted the asphalt contractors concerning the restoration of the old tennis courts.

Motion by Comm Hannah, supported by Comm Ebert to authorize the renovation of the tennis courts to that extent, not to exceed \$5,500.00, as per the budget. Motion carried.

The City Manager presented and read on behalf of the Police Chief, a memo concerning truck traffic in residential areas of St Johns.

Discussion followed.

Motion by Comm Arehart, supported by Comm Wilcox to ask that the Planning Commission in conjunction with their study of the Master Plan, investigate the feasibility of establishing traffic routes throughout the City. Motion carried.

The City Clerk presented a letter from Mr James Park, representing Mr Willard Searles, concerning the final preliminary plat of Searles Estates.

Discussion followed concerning the letter.

Motion by Comm Ebert, supported by Comm Wilcox to table the Searles agreement and further that the Mayor be authorized to call a special

meeting next Tuesday, September 3, 1974 at 4:30 pm for the purpose of taking action on the Searles agreement/South Clinton Street sewer route. Motion carried.

The City Manager stated that he had received a satisfactory physical examination report of Fire Captain Ray Kentfield and also presented a recommendation from the Fire Chief recommending a one year extension.

Motion by Comm Hannah, supported by Comm Wilcox to grant Captain Kentfield a one year time extension for service on the St Johns Fire Department as per the recommendation of the Fire Chief. Motion carried.

The City Manager presented a list of outstanding building permits in the City's southern section.

Discussion followed concerning the permits that had been issued.

Motion by Comm Wilcox, supported by Comm Hannah that the City Manager and City Clerk start the special assessment proceedings for the extension of the sanitary sewer on South Oakland Street as per the special assessment Ordinance. Motion carried.

The City Clerk presented a memo concerning the Cartwright request for additional vacation of East Railroad Street.

Motion by Comm Wilcox, supported by Comm Arehart to draft the necessary vacation documents as per the Cartwright request and further to set a Public Hearing for September 23, 15 7:45 pm concerning the vacation. Motion carried.

Vice Mayor Ebert asked for discussion concerning the firemen's request to hold next year's Fourth of July celebration on the East practice field. Discussion followed.

Motion by Comm Wilcox, supported by Comm Hannah that the firemen be authorized to hold the Fourth of July celebration at the City Park but not on the ball diamond and not on the East practice field, nor East of the West line of the new tennis courts and further that the football field may be used for the fireworks. Motion carried.

The City Manager presented and read a letter from the Clinton County Drain Commissioner concerning the holding pond in the Steel and Wallbridge drainage district. Discussion followed.

The City Manager asked for permission to advertise for bids on the storm sewer holding ponds. Discussion followed.

Motion by Comm Wilcox, supported by Comm Arehart to authorize the City Manager to advertise for bids on the Holding Ponds with the stipulation that the City would retain a right to reject any and all bids and further that the Manager present a financial report on the project at the second meeting in September. Motion carried.

Motion by Comm Arehart, supported by Comm Hannah to make temporary Traffic Control Orders 48, 50 and 51, permanent Traffic Control Orders. Motion carried.

Comm Wilcox reminded the Commission of the problem at 602 Oak Street, ponding of water in Mr Gentry's driveway. The City Engineer stated that he

would estimate the correction cost to be approximately \$400.00 if done by City forces.

Motion by Comm Wilcox, supported by Comm Hannah to authorize the City Engineer and City Manager to correct the problem in front of Mr Gentry's home as per the City Engineer's recommendation and further, that the work be done by City forces when those forces were available. Motion carried.

The City Engineer presented two possible change orders from the Storm Sewer Project, on West Gibbs Street. Discussion followed.

Motion by Comm Wilcox, supported by Comm Arehart to authorize the change order at a cost not to exceed \$3,340.00 and further, to add this change to the list of other change orders and further that prior to the paying of the Engineers' bill that all such change orders would be reviewed. Motion carried.

The City Manager then asked the City Engineer be authorized to investigate the storing of dirt located on the SE corner of US 27 and Townsend Road. Motion carried.

Motion by Comm Hannah, supported by Comm Arehart to adjourn. Motion carried.

Vice Mayor Ebert declared the meeting adjourned at 9:30 pm.



Bauman participates in Ft. Knox Leadership Week

FT KNOX, KY - Benjamin Bauman of St Johns has returned home after 3 days here participating in the post's first Boys' Leadership Week.

Thirty-four high school students, all seniors this fall, were guests of the Second ROTC Region located here.

Their selection was handled by Reserve Officer Training Corps (ROTC) units from eight Michigan universities. The students selected have not only maintained a high scholastic record, but have also distinguished themselves in athletics and as leaders in their schools and communities.

Arriving on Monday afternoon, the young men started

the "week" on Tuesday morning with a tour of the Armor School and then a visit to an extensive display of armored vehicles and weapons. That afternoon they got a chance to ride on an M60 tank. Tuesday night they were guests at a party at "TAHO" the Fort Knox teen center.

Wednesday morning they toured the Patton Museum, a military museum which contains the largest collection of memorabilia of General George S. Patton, Jr, the famed World War II commander. They then met their commissioned officer counterparts who had been assigned to each participant. Bauman's counterpart was

Lieutenant Colonel Willis C. Pratt, Chief of the Army Research Institute. Bauman spent the rest of the duty day observing and working with Lieutenant Colonel Pratt.

From these experiences Bauman and his fellow participants prepared briefings describing their counterparts' duties. They presented these briefings to each other on Thursday.

Michigan was the only state chosen to participate in Boys' Leadership Week. It is anticipated that the project will be continued next year involving other states in Second Region's eight-state area.

Disabled may be eligible for supplemental security payments

People disabled since childhood may be eligible for supplemental security income payments when they reach age 18, regardless of their families' income, according to Roger W Seamon, Social Security district manager in Lansing.

The supplemental security income program makes monthly payments to people with little or no income and limited resources who are 65 and over or blind or disabled.

"The program can be especially important to young people who are severely retarded or have other handicaps that keep them from becoming self-supporting," Seamon said.

Eligible people can get supplemental security income payments at any age, but the eligibility of children under 18 can be affected by their parents' income and resources. "However," Seamon said, "severely disabled people who remain unmarried are considered independent of their families starting at 18 or 21 if they're in school. Starting then, they may be eligible for some supplemental security income payments if they have little or no income of their own."

Families of people disabled since childhood can get information about applying for supplemental security income

payments by calling or writing any social security office.

"The amount of the monthly supplemental security income payment people get depends primarily on other income they might have," Seamon said. "People with no other income at all can get \$146 a month for one person and \$219 for a couple. People with some other income may get reduced supplemental security income payments."

Michigan adds to supplemental security income payments so the average payment to eligible people here is \$160 a month for one person and \$240 for a couple. The supplemental security

income program is run by the Social Security Administration, an agency of the US Department of Health, Education & Welfare. The Lansing social security office is at 838 Louisa Street. The phone number is 372-1910.

People disabled since childhood may also be eligible

for social security benefits if a parent gets social security payments or has worked long enough under social security and is deceased, according to Seamon. "The amount of monthly social security payments can affect the amount of supplemental security income payments," he said.

On honors list

Norman G Strayer of DeWitt and Phillip S Knight of St Johns have been named on the Ferris State College Academic list. The 2 have been honored among 470 others from the college.

To be named on this list, a 3.25 average must be maintained on a 4.0 basis and must carry a full academic load of 14 quarter hours of credit.

Bill's Column

Safety at harvest time

Staying alive is a good idea and it takes a little thought, and judgment and luck to do a good job of staying alive.

Safety should be on your mind when operating farm equipment, especially harvesting equipment, because harvesting equipment - choppers, combines or corn pickers all have a way of getting the crop into the machine and the machine doesn't know or care if its corn or soybeans or you that goes into it. It will do its job of chopping silage or separating the grain from the chaff. If you get too closely involved with one

of these machines, you could be chopped or separated just as the crop would be. The machine may not succeed in putting you through it, but you'll be the worse off, that's for sure.

I recently read some guidelines for living to a ripe old age. First, pick your parents! If they lived to be 90 years of age, your chances of living that long are better than if your parents lived only to age 40. Second, do things in moderation and third look both ways before crossing the street, that's called safety.

So when running farm machinery - read the operator's

manual and its comments on safe machine operating, keep all shields and guards in place, stop the machine before getting off and shut down the power before making adjustments, wear tight fitting clothing that won't get caught in the machine.

In living a long life, don't trust to luck too often, remember to look both ways when crossing the street and to operate harvesting machinery in a safe manner.

Chloe's Column

Clean your pressure canner

Chloe Padgett
Clinton County Home Economist

You've finished canning your fresh produce, but you still have one more important job to do. Clean your pressure canner thoroughly before putting it away for next season.

Wait until the kettle of the pressure canner is cool enough to handle. Then wash it with hot, soapy water.

If there are heavy mineral deposits on the canner, fill it with water to the mineral deposit line. Add a half cup of vinegar and simmer one hour. Don't use harsh abrasives on the canner. However, you may scrub with a fine steel wool pad.

Never immerse the dial gauge in water. Keep the canner lid out of water. Just wipe it with a sudsy cloth and then with a clean damp cloth. Dry all parts well.

An accurate pressure gauge is necessary to get the processing temperatures needed to make food safe. A weighted gauge needs to be thoroughly clean. A dial gauge, old or new, should be checked before the canning season. This might be a good time to contact your dealer or manufacturer about checking it, so you'll be all set for next year.

The openings in the cover require a more thorough cleaning. Draw a string or a pipe cleaner through them. Take off the removable petcocks and safety valves. Wash and dry these thoroughly. Remember, do not immerse the dial gauge.

Remove all grease from the gasket. If steam escaped around the cover when canning, examine the sealing edges of the canner. If the edges aren't smooth, clean them with a fine cleaning powder.

Try turning over the gasket, if it's reversible. However, replace it if it is worn, stretched or hardened.

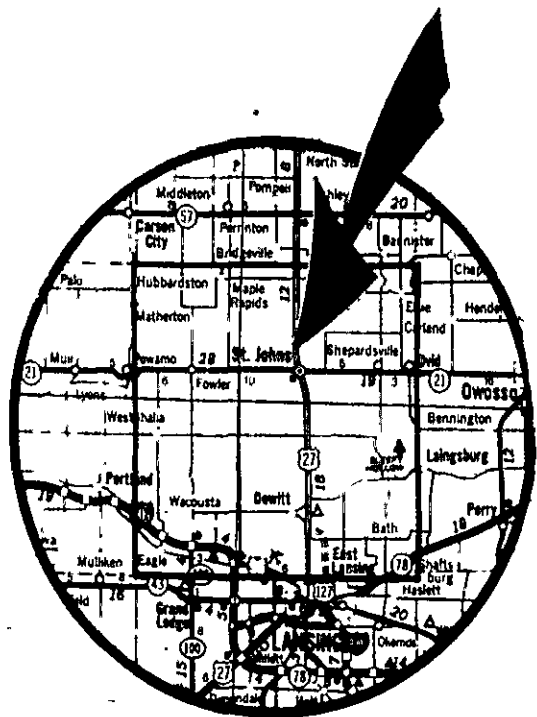

Bath Charter Twp minutes

The following is a synopsis of the Bath Charter Township Board's regular monthly meeting of August 5, 1974. The meeting was called to order at 8:00 pm by Supervisor Woodruff.

All Board members were present except Trustee Snider. Minutes of the July 15 meeting were read and accepted. Minutes of the July 22, 1974 meeting of the Planning Commission were read.

Regarding the application of Wm Rysberg for a mobile home subdivision, it was moved by Trustee Bragdon to concur with the recommendation of the Planning Commission to deny application for change in zoning to RIT. Seconded by Trustee Carleton. Carried unanimously.

Richard Hawks gave a report of the County Commissioners meeting. Mr. Hawks reported that Bath Township to get \$10,734 including benefits for a new police officer through the Public Employment Program grant.

The second reading of the Bath Township Ordinance governing public parks was read. Moved by Trustee Morrill to adopt the Park Ordinance as read. Seconded by Trustee Carleton. Carried unanimously.

Moved by Trustee Carleton to authorize Supervisor Woodruff and Clerk Burnett to sign the lease with Park Lake Improvement League. Seconded by Trustee Bragdon. Carried unanimously. This is concerning storage space for election machines and holding elections there.

Road contract for construction of Coleman Road was increased from \$10,000 to \$15,000, this includes 6 inches of gravel instead of 2 inches. Moved by Trustee Carleton to approve the contract as corrected. Seconded by Clerk Burnett. Carried unanimously.

Extending the sewer line on Whoopee Lane to Mrs. Root's residence the approximate cost will be \$1,700 and the residence owner maintain the pumping system or to extend the line to include the next cottage and 27 platted lots for an approximate cost of \$36,000. Moved by Trustee Carleton to table the matter pending further investigation. Seconded by Trustee Morrill. Carried unanimously.

The cost for renewal of the accident insurance policy on the firemen for 1974-75 is \$398. That is an increase of \$62 over the last year. Moved by Clerk Burnett to approve the increase in benefits in the accident policy with the total cost to be \$598 for the premiums for the coming year. Seconded by Treasurer Leiby. Carried unanimously.

The 6 month audit was presented for study for action at the next meeting. Roger Kindy requested permission to use the Township Hall or the firehall for a hunter's safety school for one week in September. Moved by Trustee Carleton to approve the use of either building whichever is available at the required time. Seconded by Clerk Burnett. Carried unanimously.

Supervisor Woodruff would like to figure the budget at the rate of 4 1/2 mills instead of 5 mills. He would like letters sent to the school districts and the county to drop 1/2 mill also to compensate for the 10% factor placed by the State of Michigan. Moved by Trustee Carleton to authorize the Clerk to send letters of request to the County Commissioners and the school district to drop the 1/2 mill to compensate for the 10% factor.

Moved by Clerk Burnett to approve voucher #1037 through 71088 with the exception of #1062 for payment. Roll call 7 yes votes. Carried unanimously.

Roger Kindy requested procedure in personal injury accidents and the men trained in EMT. Are the trained men to be called to administer aid? It was suggested a meeting be set up with the Police & Fire Board. Moved by Clerk Burnett to adjourn. Seconded by Trustee Carleton. Carried unanimously. Meeting adjourned at 9:20 pm.

RUFFED GROUSE HUNTING REGULATIONS FOR 1974

The Natural Resources Commission, at its meeting on June 7, 1974, under authority of Secs 1, 2, 3, and 4, Act 230, P.A. 1925 (pp 28-80 of Laws Relating to Natural Resources, revision of 1972) took the following action regarding hunting areas, season dates and bag limits for the hunting of ruffed grouse, statewide, for 1974:

1. Rescinded the December closure on ruffed grouse in those portions of Gratiot and Saginaw counties bounded on the north by Highway M-46, on the east by M-52, on the south by M-57, and on the west by U.S. 27
2. Closed the reduced area in the Gratiot-Saginaw State Game Area as follows: For a period of five years beginning September 1, 1974, no

person shall hunt, take, or attempt to take ruffed grouse in December in that part of Gratiot County bounded on the north by Washington Road, on the east by the Gratiot-Saginaw county line, on the south by Highway M-51, and on the west by Hanson Road

OPEN SEASONS:
Zone 1: September 15 through November 14.
Zone 2: September 15 through November 14; December 1-31.

Zone 3: October 21 through November 14; December 1-31; except in that portion of Gratiot County bounded on the north by Washington Road, on the east by the Gratiot-Saginaw county line, on the south by Highway M-57 and on the west by Hanson Road, where the season will be open from October 21 through November 14 only.

BAG LIMITS, STATEWIDE—5 a day, 10 in possession, 25 in a season.
