Accidents claim 2 lives over weekend

DEWITT - Two Clinton County residents, both of DeWitt, lost their lives in separate automobile accidents over the past weekend.

Leila Maxine Zimmer, 37, 7505 W. Chadwick Rd, DeWitt lost her life Friday night in a fatal accident on Grove Rd in Watertown Township.

Clayton Allen Church, 20, 261 Solon Rd, DeWitt received fatal injuries in a DeWitt Twp accident early Saturday morning.

According to the Clinton County Sheriff's Dept, the dept received a call about 10:45 concerning the accident of Mrs Zimmer, but believed the accident had happened sometime earlier.

Sheriff's Dept officials said the car was evidently eastbound on Grove Road when it

left the roadway on the south side. The car appeared to travel about 290 feet from where the vehicle left the road and struck a tree.

She was the only occupant of the car. Services were held Tuesday from Lee Rummell Funeral Home in DeWitt.

Surviving are her husband, Robert Zimmer; 3 daughters; Dawn, Tracy and Jodi; 2 sisters, Mrs Phyllis Wallace and Mrs Mana Jean Stanton, both of Ionia; step-father, John Bader of Ionia and 1 grandson.

According to Lansing State Police, Clayton Church also lost his life when the car he was driving struck a tree.

State Police reported the accident occurred about 3 am Saturday morning on Airport Rd in DeWitt Twp.

According to their report, the church vehicle was traveling northbound on Airport Rd when the car left the road on the east side.

The vehicle struck a tree about 17 feet from the side of the road.

Funeral services were held Tuesday from Lee Rummell Funeral Home.

Surviving are his parents, Mr and Mrs Clayton B. Church of DeWitt; grandparents, Mr and Mrs Virgil Sample; grandparents, Mr and Mrs Nickolas Surdenik of Lansing; 2 brothers, Steve and Michael of DeWitt; and 2 sisters, Karen and Sharon, both of DeWitt.

DeWitt teachers agree to 3-year contract

DEWITT - It was reported Tuesday by a Michigan Education official that DeWitt teachers had approved an agreement with the DeWitt Education Association and the DeWitt Board of Education.

Unable earlier to reach an agreement, a mediator was called in for the negotiation. A 3-year contract, the agreement includes a negotiation procedure designed to minimize the threat of a strike at the end of the 3-year period.

According to the agreement, negotiations will begin 90 days prior to the expiration of the contract and the terms of the contract will be honored until the new contract is

ratified or services are withheld. A further negotiation procedure stated that no more than 2 non-economic articles will be opened in 1974-75 and again in 1975-76, unless by mutual consent.

Another part of the agreement will eliminate the BA-15 clause in 3 years. The BA-15 clause allows a teacher, an increased salary step for 15, 25 and 30 hours accumulated toward a master's degree.

Teachers must have their master's degree by 1976-77 or revert to the basic bachelor of arts schedule.

Following is the salary schedule reached in the agreement:

Meanwhile, employees of the Clinton Intermediate School District and the School Dist Board had not yet reached agreement.

Howard Ward of the Michigan Education Association said a 2-year proposal was being considered and, if that was not successful, the staff would ask for a 1-year contract to include the \$8400 starting salary, full-family insurance, 12 cents a mile mileage and a 4.5% raise next year, continued insurance and 13 cents asked for in the 2-year contract.

Ward said they actually wanted to go into fact finding, adding, "We don't think it can possibly hurt us."

St Johns pool schedule includes "adults night"

"No bomb"

ST JOHNS - A call was received at 7:38 am Sept 28 by the St Johns Police that a bomb threat had been reported to Federal Mogul officials.

The business was searched by the St Johns Police, St Johns Fire Dept, Clinton County Sheriff's Dept and Federal Mogul employees, but no evidence of a bomb was found.

The investigation is continuing and St Johns Police Chief Lyle French said his department will seek prosecution to the full extent of the law against anyone making such threats or falsely reporting the existence of bombs.

traveling - always with a camera.

For a short time, he worked with a travel agency but found that sending other people on trips was a poor substitute for going there himself. He, therefore, started traveling on his own, photographing the beautiful, the unusual, and the humorous in out-of-the-way places all over the world.

"Those modest Belgians," according to Strong, have kept their fascinating country a secret long enough. Now is the time to reveal the bright secrets

of their tiny kingdom, towering castles, pageantry and pomp, scenic beauty at every turn. Majestic forests and sweeping vistas in the valley of the Meuse pack the sightseeing boats with Europeans out to have a good time. Where the Battle of the Bulge thundered in hills and streams of the Ardennes, we now hear the crunch of hikers boots and the splash of doomed trout. In Flander's Fields from Brussels to Oostende, we see Belgians growing flax, begonias and hops. Beach resorts from Knokke to De Panne dot the channel coast."

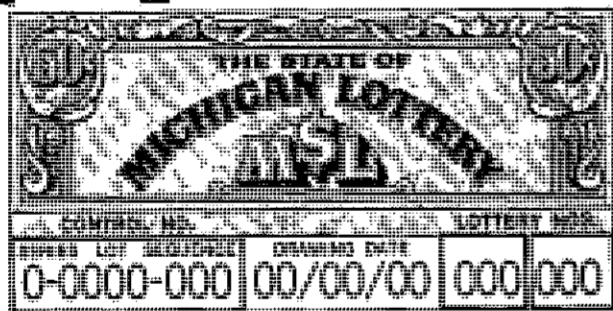

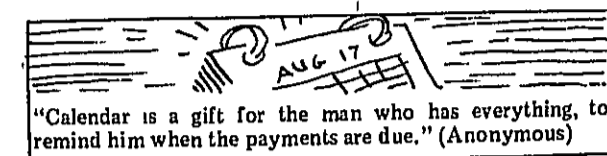

Zap--St Johns rocks Holt 21-12

ST JOHNS — A favored Holt squad was jolted by St Johns Friday as the Redwings upset last year's West Central champs 21-12.

Not many would predict St Johns as a winner before the contest, but the Redwings surprised a lot of people, pounding out 174 yards on the ground, while passing for 68 on their way to scoring more points than had been scored against Holt in 4 seasons.

Brian Pertler started the scoring in the 1st quarter when he tossed to Ray Schueller for a 3-yard touchdown. Drew Carpenter kicked the extra point to give the Redwings a 7-0 lead.

Holt struck back with a touchdown, but the unsuccessful conversion still left them trailing St Johns by 1 point, 7-6.

Holt scored when Dan Briggs went in from the 3-yard line on a quarterback keeper.

The Redwings stretched the lead in the 2d period when Scheuller made a fantastic 1-handed grab of a Pertler pass. The pass was over Scheuller's head, but he sailed up and snagged the ball with 1 hand to give the Redwings 6 points.

Again it was Carpenter who added the extra point.

St Johns was held scoreless in the 3d quarter and Holt pulled within 2 when Bob Maxey scored on a 3-yard run. The Redwings defense turned back the Holt conversion attempt.

The Redwings added an insurance TD in the final period when Pertler scored from 2 yards out on a quarterback sneak.

Carpenter kicked his 3d extra point of the evening for the final

21-12 Redwing victory.

St Johns rushed for 174 yards with Pertler hitting 6 of 13 passes for 68 yards, giving the Redwings a total offense of 240 yards.

Holt out-rushed the Redwings with 184 yards, but picked up only 6 yards in the air.

Holt was faced with a well-balanced Redwing offense. Pertler passed for 2 touchdowns and ran in another, Kevin Knight rushed for 70 yards in 24 carries, Harold Wellman ran the ball 7 times for 45 yards, Mark Barz carried 3 times for 22 yards and Rusty Waggoner picked up 27 yards in 6 carries.

Defensively Jim Lynch intercepted 2 passes and was in on 6 tackles while John Hayes and Marty Brewbaker each contributed 13 tackles. Jeff Thornton was in on 12 tackles.

Three Holt fumbles were captured by Hayes, Chris Slamka and Knight. Knight also punted twice for a 37-yard average. Coach Ernie Becker also commended the defensive play of Brent Coffman, whom Becker said, "Played an outstanding game."

Coach Ernie Becker praised the play of the offensive line, saying, "The blocking by our offensive line with Brian Downing, Dick Parker, Jeff Hazle and Chris Slamka was really a factor in helping us move the football this week."

Asked what led the Redwings in their upset victory against Holt, Becker said, "I think,

number 1, we really prepared for them. Our offensive line really fired out and got off the football. All of our backs ran tough."

"The big difference was offense. Holt is a very strong defensive football team. This is the most points scored against them in 4 seasons."

Becker also said the passing

game helped pace the offense. "Our passing game was effective enough to throw them off. They came up to stop the run."

The Redwings take on an O-3 Ionia team in an away game Friday.

The Redwings next home game will be against Waverly Oct 12.

Jay Miller, Green Acres 4-H Club, St. Johns, placed first in the 1973 State 4-H Meats Judging Contest September 22 at Michigan State University. He scored 651 points out of a possible 775. The contest consisted of judging classes of beef, pork and lamb carcasses, a class of beef ribs and a class of pork hams, identifying 25 retail cuts of meat by specie, wholesale cut and retail cut, plus giving a set of oral reasons on the class of beef carcasses, pork carcasses and beef ribs.

The top 6 individuals in the contest were Jay Miller - Clinton County, Tim Grau-Washtenaw County, Karen Baldus - Washtenaw County, Jim Core - Leelanau County, Myra Jackman - Macomb County and Barbara Witing-Shiawassee County.

The top 5 members will now compete in the National 4-H Meats Judging Contest at Kansas City, Missouri, October 16-19 with the judging contest being on the 17th. Since Karen Baldus was too young to compete in the National Contest, Barbara Whiting, who placed sixth, will join the group in Kansas City.

This is the second year of the State 4-H Meats Judging Contest and the second year Clinton County had the top scorer in the 4-H Meat Judging Contest. In 1972, the state winner was Ted Ashley of St. Johns. Larry Martin of Ovid is the meats judging coach for Clinton County 4-H youth. SEEDS FOR US - Seeds are for the birds - and us! We adorn our breads and rolls with poppy seeds and sesame seeds. And it's cheese to please when stuffed with caraway seeds. Although not as well known, there are various other seeds readily available for our use. Cardamon is an aromatic and pungent seed. Actually, it's the dried fruit of a plant of the ginger family. This seed is a native of India but is also grown in Guatemala and Ceylon. This seed is more expensive than most spices, but a little makes a big difference.

The Vikings discovered this seed in their travels, and today cardamon is used in much of the Scandinavian cooking. You've probably tasted it, whether you know it or not, for this seed is the secret to that "special" flavor of many a Danish pastry.

Cardamon comes to market in several forms. You may find it in a green or more likely, a bleached white pod. This pod contains the small black seeds. Used in this form, it's good for pickling cucumbers.

For the most part, supermarkets carry packages of just the whole seed or ground seeds. All you need is one whole seed, and you can soon discover what a fantastic taste team cardamon and coffee make. Drop the seed into the cup of coffee for a delicious brew.

Ground cardamon has a multitude of uses. Try it in custards, cakes, cookies and breads. Or add it to sweet potatoes and pork or beef roasts. Add it to the French toast batter. Cardamon fits almost anywhere - even sprinkled on iced melon!

Coriander seed usage has survived from 5000 B.C. to present day. Originally from India, this seed now comes mostly from Morocco, Argentina and Russia.

The fragrance is mild, and it reminds you slightly of lavender. The taste is somewhat like a mixture of lemon peel and sage. Coriander seed is the dried ripe fruit of an herb in the parsley family. The herb itself is rather pungent, but the seed is milder. The seeds range from white to

yellowish brown, and have alternating straight and wavy ridges running vertically. These whole seeds can also be used in pickling, or for spicing fish and oriental candies. Many Mexican and Spanish cooks use coriander for rice, lentil and meat dishes. Many of the commercially prepared meats in this country are flavored with coriander.

You can easily use ground coriander in your meal. Add it to rolls, pastries, cookies and cakes. Sprinkle it over applesauce, or add the coriander to punch and seasoned butter.

Fennel is a yellowish brown seed native to Europe, but now found in several other places including the U.S. It has a pleasant fragrance and a sweet taste that's reminiscent of anise or licorice.

Scandinavians also make good use of this seed, and Italian bakers use fennel extensively for bread, rolls and pastries. This seed is shaped rather like a miniature watermelon.

Fennel is another pickling ingredient, while being a delicious seasoning for fruits, soups, fish and sauces. Mix this seed into the filling of an apple pie or spaghetti sauce. Sprinkle fennel on a pizza or potatoes.

Seeds, they're for the people - and birds!

The Department of Commerce, not enough emphasis may be given to environmental factors and preserving the state as a tourist attraction.

There is also the question of whether any more tourist pressure should be put on our existing recreational facilities - although more recreational facilities are being added in the state every year.

Another measure which may be considered this fall is one to change the name of the Tourist Council to the Michigan Travel Commission and enlarge its membership from nine to 13.

Safety at harvest time

Staying alive is a good idea and it takes a little thought, and judgment and luck to do a good job of staying alive.

Safety should be on your mind when operating farm equipment, especially harvesting equipment, because harvesting equipment - choppers, combines or corn pickers all have a way of getting the crop into the machine. And the machine doesn't know or care if its corn or soybeans or you that go into it. It will do its job of chopping silage or separating the grain from the chaff. If you get too closely involved with one of these machines, you could be chopped or separated just as the crop would be. The machine may not succeed in putting you through it, but you'll be the worse off, that's for sure.

I recently read some guidelines for living a ripe old age. First, pick your parents! If they lived to be 90 years of age, your chances of living that long

are better than if your parents lived only to age 40. Second, do things in moderation and third look both ways before crossing the street, that's called safety.

So when running farm machinery - read the operator's manual and its comments on safe machine operation, keep all shields and guards in place, stop the machine before getting off and shut down the power before making adjustments, wear tight fitting clothing that won't get caught in the machine.

In living a long life, don't trust to luck too often, remember to look both ways when crossing the street and to operate harvesting machinery in a safe manner.

Postmaster says service needs customer help

ST. JOHNS -- "The US Postal Service depends heavily on customer participation to help meet its service standards," postmaster Keith A. Mishler of St Johns recently explained. "Public cooperation in 2 areas is vitally important," he said. "First to qualify for service standard handling, mail addresses must contain the Zip Code. Second, airmail items and 1st class items for overnight delivery must be deposited in mail collection boxes designated for the 5 pm collection, or by 5:15 pm at the Post Office.

The Postal Service has made detailed commitments to the American people on dependability and timeliness of mail service, Mishler said. Called Service Standards, they specify levels of service the public can expect for airmail and first class mail.

"Their use within the Postal family is important too," Postmaster Mishler said. "Service standards measure success or failure. They promote cooperation and teamwork from all Postal workers--those who pick up and deliver, those who man the post offices, and those who operate the vast postal transportation network."

For airmail, the Postal Service commitment is to deliver 95% by the next day between specified cities within a radius of 600 miles, such as Chicago and Cleveland. This overnight delivery recently has been extended to selected cities beyond 600 miles. At least 95% of all airmail will be delivered by the 2d day anywhere in the Continental United States.

"First class standards are no less demanding," Mishler said. "Next day delivery to local service areas are made for at least 95% of the mail."

This standard is now being expanded to provide for 2d day delivery to points within 600 miles at least 95% of the time, and 3d day delivery is to be made to any community within the Continental United States at least 95% of the time. "Equally demanding service standards are now being developed and tested for parcel post and other classes of mail," postmaster Mishler said.

"Service standards measure success or failure. They promote cooperation and teamwork from all Postal workers--those who pick up and deliver, those who man the post offices, and those who operate the vast postal transportation network."

For airmail, the Postal Service commitment is to deliver 95% by the next day between specified cities within a radius of 600 miles, such as Chicago and Cleveland. This overnight delivery recently has been extended to selected cities beyond 600 miles. At least 95% of all airmail will be delivered by the 2d day anywhere in the Continental United States.
