

# Ensen calls for new spending priorities

Richard Ensen, Democratic candidate for the third district U.S. House seat, called for a drug education program, reduction in the voting age and a reorganizing of national priorities during an exclusive interview last week.

During the discussion with News reporters, Ensen said the drug laws need "some alteration and research must be done" soon to combat the problem.

"An education program is an absolute must," he said. "There should be a single law (on marijuana) and we should reduce the maximum sentence."

Ensen noted that much of the inequity in the current laws dealing with youths could be altered by lowering the age of majority to 18.

"Today, there are five separate laws of legal majority," he said. He cited the age of draft eligibility, contractual majority, and the criminal code among the group.

He said that the age of 18 would be a good point to set the majority, while still allowing 16-year-olds to obtain a driver's license.

He said the Vietnam war, specific.

He said that ending the Vietnam war is "extremely high" on the priority list. He added that appropriations to the military-industrial complex, the MERV defense system, and the space programs must be studied. He said he would reorder those priorities in favor of such programs as education and health.

"I'm also opposed to the use of troops in the Middle East," he said.

He indicated that American troops would make the situation more complex and would prefer to search for a peace formula between the U.S. and Russia by reducing arm shipments to the warring nations.

Ensen said he was not as worried about the current Soviet submarine base publicity as he was during the famed Kennedy Cuban missile crisis of 1962.

"We called their (Russian) bluff in the early '60's. This is a similar situation," he said.

He noted that it will call for high level diplomatic negotiations, but that the submarine bases do not pose as much a threat as the long-range missiles did 10 years ago.

Ensen, a former Peace Corps director in Costa Rica, had some specific thoughts on American aid to Latin America.

He cited the failure of the Alliance for Progress to achieve its goals on the U.S. forcing its priorities on Latin America.

"I would favor no military aid at all. There is little or no need for arms to these nations," he said.

"We have assumed the great uncle role," he said, "by patronizing them."

He said that the U.S. should accept the nations' problems as they are and try to help with proper aid.

He looked to the national problem of desegregation and the Nixon Administration's handling of the problem.

"Not well—not in the beginning," Ensen said of Nixon's

programs and their effectiveness.

"There may have been a 'southern strategy' or national strategy," Ensen quipped, but Nixon was "looking for votes."

Ensen said he was angered at the President's failure to consult with the Congress before committing troops to Cambodia. He said Nixon was avoiding the congressional prerogative by calling Vietnam a "non-war."

"But I don't fault Nixon alone," he added.

He cited the previous administrations' failure to consult with Congress before committing troops to fight.

"It's an issue today," he said.

Ensen, who is running against Republican Garry Brown for the third district seat, debated his opponent before an audience of 800 people at the First Baptists Church in Kalamazoo. "It went extremely well," Ensen noted.

He had earlier called on Brown for a series of public debates and a district-wide television debate, but Brown had declined.

In closing, Ensen said that he felt it was the "politicians' duty not to play on the fears of the people. They divide us," he said.

"We must try to live together," he added.

He is responsible for the Opportunity Kalamazoo program of counseling and rehabilitation which received national attention last year.

Ensen, 39, is a district court judge in Kalamazoo. He is married and has six children.

## Clinton Dems gather for Williams visit

G. Mennen Williams, former governor of Michigan, is on the trail to office again; this time for a position on the Michigan Supreme Court.

Williams, governor for 12 years from 1949 through 1960, made a visit to St. Johns Thursday for a luncheon to meet local Democrats and to endorse those running for office in November.

Democratic hopefuls present at the luncheon were Cedric Root, candidate for state senator from the 30th district which includes Clinton and Shiawassee counties, and Mary C. Kurka, state congressional candidate from the 88th district.

People attending the informal meeting heard Williams speak of his wish to become a member of the Michigan Supreme Court and just what the role of the supreme court is in Michigan.

He divided the court's role into three distinct areas of responsibility to the people of the state.

First was the "normal decision-making function" of the court. Williams said this involved decisions that affect the lives of everyone in Michigan.

Second, said Williams, was the fact that the court should "supervise the administration of justice throughout the entire state," or in other words, the "basic judging function of the court."

His idea of a third area of responsibility was one of "assuring the people of confidence in our judicial system." "The court," said Williams, "has a challenge to gain the respect of the people of the state." He went on to say that lawyers, too are included in this challenge.

After stating these three functions, the former governor took all areas into consideration and said that trials should be taken care of as soon as possible after the offense has been committed.

Williams stressed that voting for members of the supreme court is an important job. He reiterated this by reminding voters that simply voting a one-party straight ticket would not register a vote for a supreme

court candidate. The supreme court candidates can only be chosen by name, individually.

Senatorial candidate Root also made a few brief comments on his ideas concerning the upcoming election.

Root explained that the anti-parochial amendment being placed on the November general election ballot was tricky in one particular way. This was that a no vote for the amendment would, in reality, mean you favor state

It's a little late for a portable auto cooling unit or even a lawnmower, but all of these things are items which have been contributed toward the little league benefit auction.

—Approved the purchase of treasury bills with the bridge fund monies received through the motor vehicle highway fund in order to gain the greatest return in interest.

—Decided to contact the Clinton County Sheriff Percy Patterson and county highway department engineer-manager Donald Haske concerning the absence of a stop sign at the intersection of Shavey Road and Herblison Road. Councilmen noted that the corner is a potential death trap, and will request a road sign immediately.

Resurfacing streets near end

Workmen were laying asphalt along major streets in St. Johns last week as part of the summer improvement programs of the city, county and State Highway Commission.

Stated for the greatest improvement was the entire length of State St. between city limits. This phase of the road plan included several sections of new curb and gutters as well as improvement of inter-sections crossing State St. The cost of this project will be paid by county

and state funds. The major projects in the city include repaving of Sturgis St. from U.S. 27 to Lansing St. then north on Lansing St. to the city limits. Another extended length of new asphalt was laid on Oakland St. between Sturgis and State St.

According to City Clerk Tom Hundley a number of other shorter spans are being completed as well as several heavily traveled inter-sections throughout the city.

Fire escape plan is a family duty

National Fire Prevention Week is on and to commemorate it, local firemen and the office of civil defense want to introduce "Edith" to the county.

Operation "Edith" is a list of suggested preparations that people, and especially families, should study and learn in case of a fire in their households. It stands for "Exit Drills in the Home."

The idea of these home drills was introduced in Kansas City, Mo. in 1959 and met with great success. Since then, it has gradually spread country wide.

Tonight at 8 p.m., every household in the county is urged to conduct a practice drill to check and see what the members of your family know about escaping a fire. Here are some suggestions for procedures to follow.

There should be two ways out of each room in your house. This is the starting point for a home fire escape plan. Fire sweeps stairways and halls with alarming speed, according to the Fire Marshall's Association of North America (FMANA).

For this reason, bedroom and/or hall doors should be kept closed at night. Most home fatal

fires occur between 12 midnight and 6 a.m. in the morning.

A home fire alarm signal should be arranged next. This should be readily available to everyone in the family. Suggested signals are pounding on the walls, blowing a whistle or simply hollering.

Get out fast—Don't stop to get valuables. Don't let children look for favorite toys, and don't risk a search for the source of the fire.

Test doors before opening them. If the fire is on the other side of a door, you will be able to tell by pressing your hand against the door to see if it is hot.

If it is safe to open, do it slowly. Be ready to slam the door instantly if heat and smoke start to rush into the room.

An outside meeting place should be decided upon in advance of a fire emergency so that everyone in the house will know where to meet outside in order to account for everyone's presence.

Locate this meeting place well away from the house and make it an unbreakable rule that "Once Out, Stay Out."

cedure is essential, says the FMANA. To make the home fire drills as authentic as possible, some of them should be held at night.

For children, the drills should be a wise mixture of seriousness and a game, never a scary experience.

If you have a ladder, make sure your neighbor knows where you keep it. This information could save the life of a member of your family sometime.

For an upper floor escape, a

window may be your only alternate route. Be sure exit windows are in easy working order, and are low and large enough to get through.

Use any available porch and garage roofs as ways down to safety. If needed, install an escape ladder. Locate children in rooms with easy rooftop escape.

"Planning your household escape in case of fire at home isn't just a good idea. It's a duty and responsibility," says the FMANA.

Bohil wins IGA scholarship

Alan L. Bohil, a 1970 graduate of St. Johns High School, St. Johns, Mich., has been awarded IGA's Glenn R. Curtis Memorial Scholarship for the 1970-71 school year.

Bohil will begin studies this fall in the Food Marketing Management program at Michigan State University, East Lansing, where the IGA scholarship program is administered.

He will receive a \$1,500 grant. An additional \$500 has been given to MSU for administration of the program. The administrative

portion of the IGA grant will be used to underwrite student field research materials or industry materials to students and faculty, maintain industry and alumni relations, and partially underwrite doctoral dissertation efforts in the food field.

Bohil was selected from a field of applicants by the faculty scholarship committee at MSU. Applicants were judged on the basis of scholastic record, need and potential for developing a career in the food industry.

While working 30 hours per week in grocery stores the past year at Andy's IGA in St. Johns, Alan graduated in the upper third of his class.

His extracurricular activities included creative writing, guitar playing, and songwriting. He also completed a high school level computer programming course.

He intends to make the food industry his career because he considers it "a vital link in the economy, offering interesting and rewarding work."

Bohil says he enjoys "working with the public" and feels the Food Marketing Management program at MSU will help him "gain the knowledge needed for this fast-moving business world."

The IGA scholarship at MSU was established in January in memory of Glenn R. Curtis, IGA senior vice president who died December 19, 1969, after a distinguished career in the food industry.

Film a must, manager says, but not welcome by parents

"Myra Breckinridge" is gone, but her memory lingers on.

The lingering, is in the form of community concern among some St. Johns residents who are hopeful no further films of questionable subject matter are shown.

But theater manager Howard Kortjes told a Clinton County News writer that he has no control over films which appear in the city. According to Kortjes he acquires entertainment pack-

ages and once they are agreed to he must accept whatever films are distributed.

"Not true," says a member of a group opposed to the showing.

"That's the way it is," says Kortjes.

The showing of the film caused no little concern in some quarters of the city and this has been reflected by favorable and unfavorable letters to Kortjes and the Clinton County News. It has appeared in group movements to

encourage no further showing of undesirable films and it has appeared in numerous individual comments supporting theater attendance if more acceptable films become standard fare.

"I don't play up these X rated films," explained Kortjes. "In fact, Myra Breckinridge is the first X film we've had in the past year. I had no choice but to show the film but we did show it downtown where we could police the attendance."

THE THEATER has maintained a policy of strict enforcement of the industry-wide code which Kortjes explained is self imposed and not legislated by public law or ordinance.

In the meantime youngsters in the area seemed oblivious to all the wrangling. "What do you mean all the fuss?" asked one teen stopped on Clinton Ave. in St. Johns. "I haven't heard a thing." "Cee, I don't know," giggled a girl whose pretty face was distorted by a wad of gum. "We usually go to Lansing."

A third teen was more philosophical about the situation. "I really don't know what it's all about, but when it comes to movies, like, we ought to be able to decide for ourselves."

"I don't know what all the hell raising is about," Kortjes said. "Most of the people go to Lansing to the movies. They make a night of it, have dinner and take in a show. My auditor asks me every week why I don't close the place."

"No, I wouldn't want the theater closed, smiled the gum chewer. "There's nothing to do now and that would just make it worse."

WHEN ASKED what type of movies she liked the girl quickly replied, "Like 'Airport' and 'Romeo and Juliet'. I really liked 'Romeo and Juliet'."

Activity surrounding the film's presentation in St. Johns began some three weeks ago when members of city commission unanimously adopted a resolution opposing the showing. According to Dr. James Grost phone calls were made several times throughout the day prior to the meeting in efforts to inform Kortjes of the impending action. Further phone calls were made immediately before the session to business associates of Kortjes in efforts to have the matter discussed for possibilities of not showing the film in St. Johns.

None of the contacts were successful as commissioners were advised that Kortjes held final determination of showing and he was out of the mid-Michigan area.

And the show went on. Subsequent to the showing a News writer talked with members of the staff of the Clinton Theater and was told that attendance figures "eclipsed" those of "Airport" and "Patton", two films currently drawing well throughout the country.

But according to Kortjes attendance at the movie "was about average" during its week-long stay. "But I can tell you this," he said, "The manager of the Northside called to thank me for all the publicity because his attendance was way up when it played there."

KORTJES WENT on to explain that "They can complain all they want, but if I were to close the

# Operation Mainstream to aid unemployed

The woes of the Clinton County unemployed or under-skilled labor force may be disappearing soon under a new program called "Operation Mainstream."

The program is a job-creation and work-training program for chronically unemployed poor adults, mainly in rural areas who have no reasonable prospects for full-time employment or training assistance under other programs.

Kenneth Little, local representative of the program, indicated last week that "employment opportunities are available for low income families who reside in Clinton County."

Employment opportunities are available in educational, clerical, skilled and mechanical areas, he said.

Interested persons should contact Little at 224-3302 to establish appointments for a general aptitude test this week. Little indicated that transportation will be provided to the Lansing testing center.

He said that the nature of Operation Mainstream, as defined by the labor department,

is aimed at the solution of problems related to finding and holding suitable jobs.

The emphasis of the program is placed on "meaningful" work experience which may lead to permanent employment.

Any person 22-years-old or older and chronically unemployed, with a family income below the poverty line, may apply for the program benefits.

Little said that priority is given to enrollment of older persons. He added that the program is entirely funded by the Capitol Area Economic Opportunity Committee.

Little said that the salaries are about \$1.70 per hour for 24 hours of working time each week. There is a two-hour option time spent on remedial school courses with full pay.

The program is 24 weeks long with strong intentions of placing adults in permanent positions, Little said.

McNeill's farm awarded centennial landmark status

A farm owned by Glenn E. and Joy O. McNeill of Route 1, St. Johns, has been designated as a Centennial Farm by the Michigan Historical Commission.

The farm, located in Essex Township, has been in the possession of the family since 1869. It was originally purchased June 1969 by John and Christina McNeill, grandparents of the present owners.

According to Sec. of State James M. Hare, whose department directs the activities of the historical commission, the centennial farm program in Michigan was established in 1948. Since that time, certificates and metal markers have been awarded to more than 2,500 Michigan farms.

The program is administered under the direction of the Commission while markers are provided by Detroit Edison and Consumer Power Companies.

According to Hare, a centennial farm is one which has been in the continuous possession of the same family for 100 years or more. For this purpose, the historical commission considers a farm to be 10 or more acres having estimated sales of more than \$50 yearly, or less than 10 acres but having estimated sales of \$250 annually.

# O-E board approves contracts, maintains married student rule

The Ovid-Elsie Board of Education Thursday night ratified two new labor contracts with the custodians and bus drivers ending the threat of any school-time disruption.

Under the plan, the drivers will receive \$1,475 the first year, \$1,600 the second and \$2,000 the third year.

The father of a former Ovid-Elsie football player requested the board to present an explanation concerning the ineligibility of his married son to participate in the sport.

Board members told him that the policy had been in effect for more than two years, although no special publicity on the rule had been emphasized.

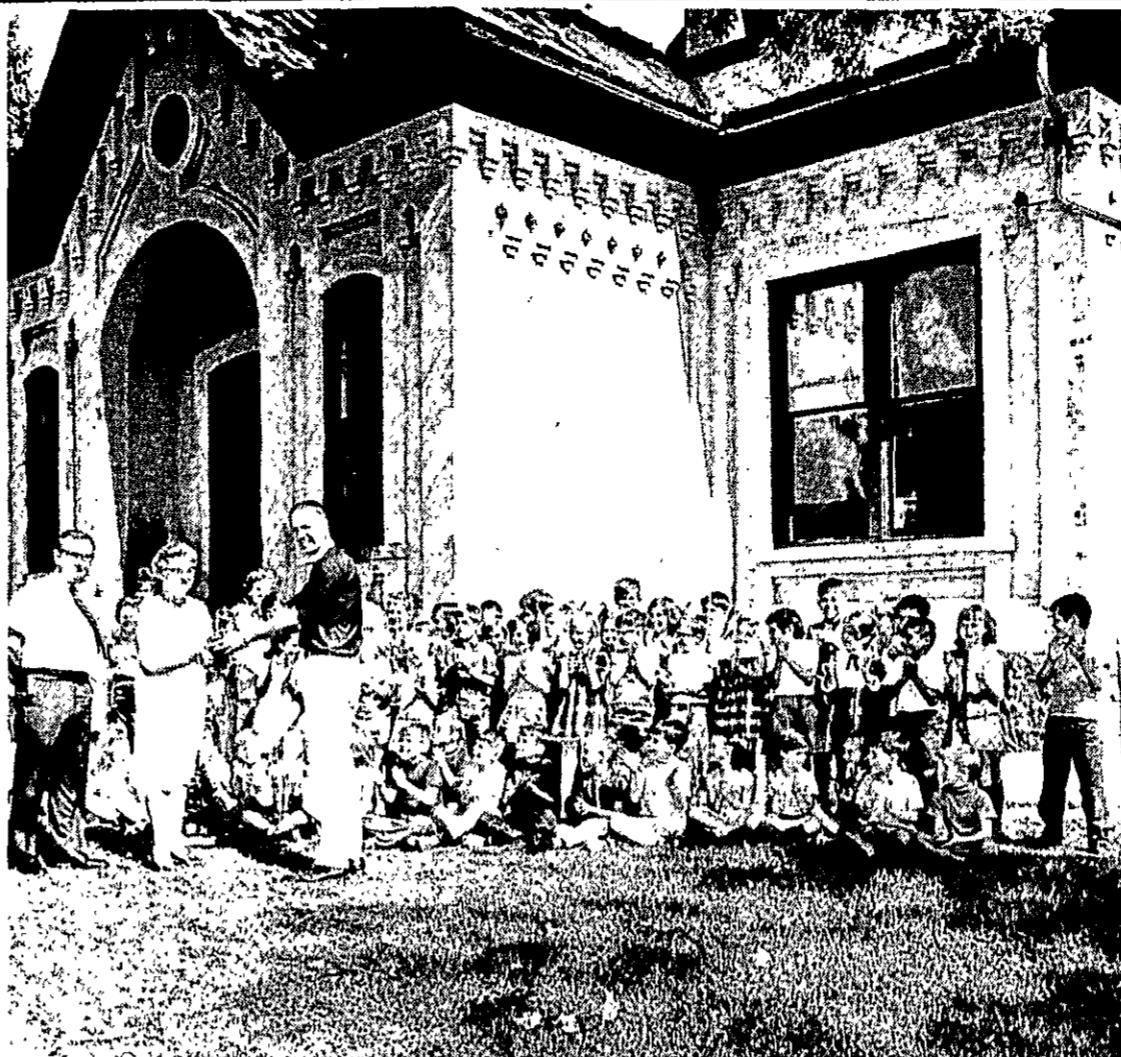

aid to parochial schools while a yes vote to the same amendment would mean you do not want parochial to be incorporated in the state.

Speaking of drugs and the problem they are in Michigan, Root said, "The penalties for crimes concerning drugs are completely adequate if they are enforced. Making the first offense penalties lighter, said Root, would only make it easier for the hardened criminal."

He went on to say, "The concessions made to the first offender becomes the norm to which the hardened criminals are judged by."

"Maybe I'm hard, my dad always was," said Root, "I know right from wrong and I act accordingly."

Williams, on drugs, said, "I see the problem all through the state. I thought it was more of a metropolitan problem but I surely found this to be wrong."

During the meal portion of the luncheon, Williams said, "We all hate to see the kids making trouble on the campuses across the country but when the kids see what is going on around them, no wonder they rebel."

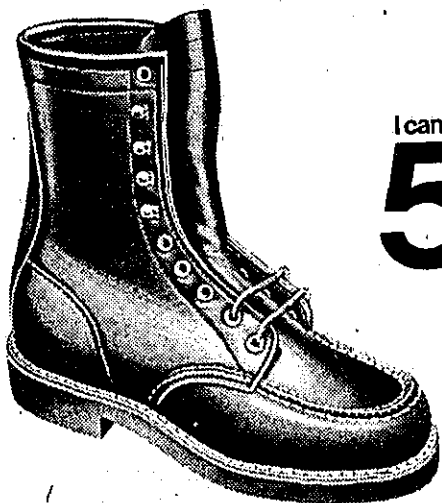

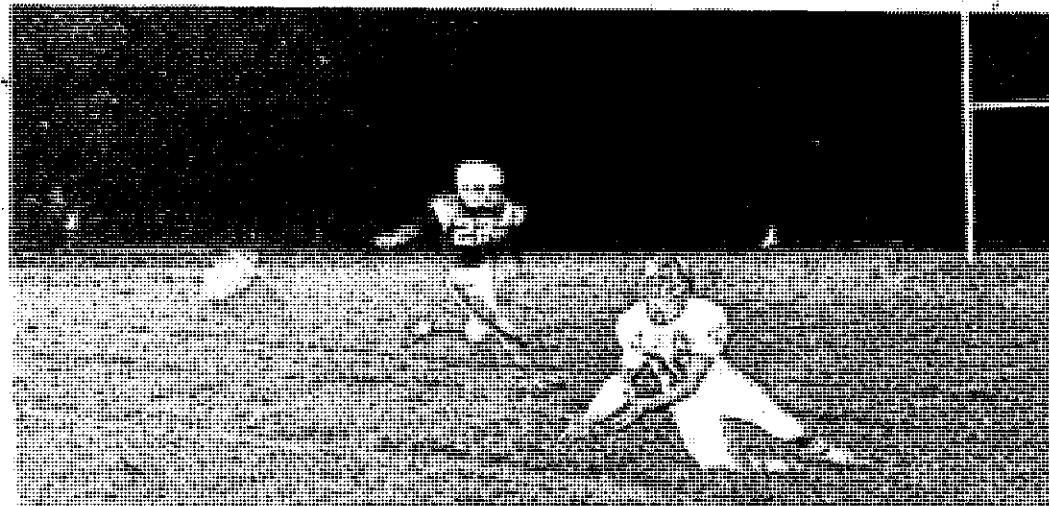

## Redwing Machine wins; Ionia, Homecoming next

The "Pack is back" but the Redwings haven't thought of leaving, yet.

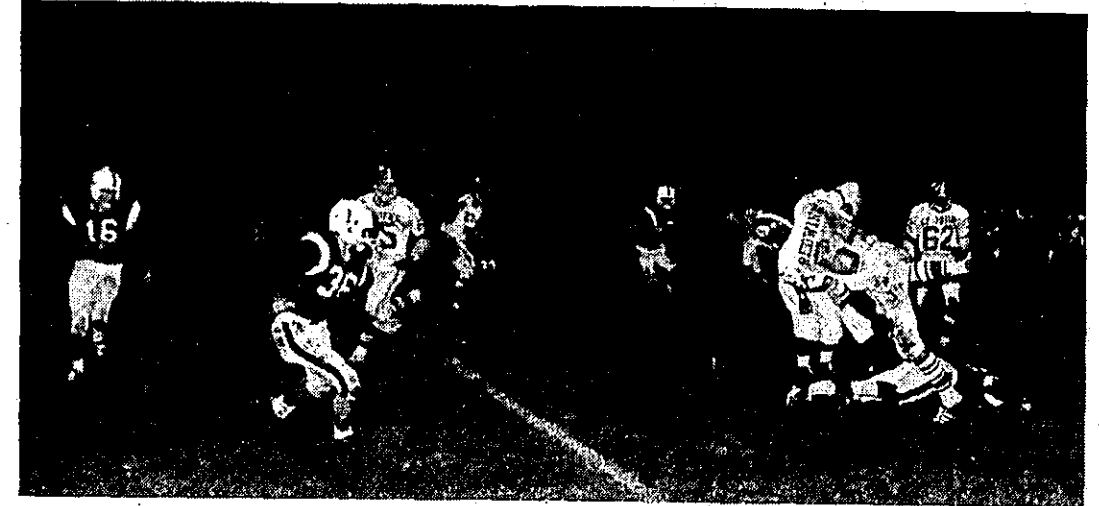
With production kept on increasing Friday as the Redwings of St. Johns High School cranked out their third victory of the young season against the Vikings of Lakewood 30-14.

First half action came to the assembled crowd through the courtesy of St. Johns with a slight flourish near the end.

However, as last week, the R.P.M.s decreased to a near stop. Power was evident but there was no scoring until St. Johns went in for a score with a little over two minutes left in the half.

Rumors had it that the Lakewood football field was under four inches of water Thursday night after a sewer backed up onto the field causing extremely wet conditions for the Friday game.

The Redwings couldn't have been bothered, however. They kicked off to the Vikings and got the ball back three downs later when Lakewood was forced to punt.

St. Johns began their first touchdown drive on their own 40 yard line. Randy Atkinson and Larry Hayes provided the running power to get down to the Viking 15 yard line where this same duo combined on a 15-yard touchdown pass to record the Redwing's first TD. With 6:41 left in the 1st quarter.

On the next kickoff, Viking tailback Sam Olivo romped 50 yards on the runback and almost went the distance before a lone Redwing defender caught up with him and made the tackle near the Redwing 40 yard line.

Lakewood was unsuccessful in getting a drive started and had to punt again. The Redwings took over on their own 32 yard line and marched 68 yards in 13 plays for the second score. Atkinson kept the ball and ran a right sweep two yards for the TD.

From this point, the ball switched hands three times until Lakewood had possession on their own 5 yard line. Lakewood proceeded to gain one yard, lose one yard and fall prey to an incomplete pass. This brought a punting situation. The ball came back to the punter in the form of a high pass from center which caused the ball to be fumbled. The punter recovered the ball but was tackled in the end zone for a 2 point safety.

Lakewood then kicked off to the Redwings who, after a few penalties, again scored; this time on the fleet-footedness of Gary Burk, who ran the ball into the end zone on a one-yard plunge. This score came with 3:21 remaining in the first half.

Thanks to a late whistle and a subsequent self recovery of their own fumble, Lakewood finally penetrated the Redwing defense and got a march underway with two minutes left in the half. Pay dirt came for the Vikings when quarterback Mike Catlin threw a three-yard pass to split end Bill Bowen for the first Viking score. A two-point conversion attempt failed.

The halftime score was St. Johns, 23, Lakewood, 6.

Some of the first half totals were interesting. Steve Mead, the biggest Redwing back in years, ran for a total of 48 yards.

This figure would climb to 104 with the 56 yards he would pick up in the second half.

Second half action was fast and furious for both squads but there was no scoring until both teams traded touchdowns late in the 4th quarter. One high spot of the 3rd quarter was an interception by Redwing safety Ken Schueller who leaped into the air and timed the snag perfectly.

In the first down department, the Redwings eclipsed the Vikings 23-8. Rushing yardsage was an interesting total with St. Johns gaining 249 yards on the ground compared to 49 for Lakewood. Sixteen passes were attempted by the Redwings and eight were completed for 86 yards.

Individually, Mead rushed for 104 yards. Atkinson and Larry Hayes each ran for 54 and Gary Burk added 20 with a good amount of backfield blocking. In the pass catching department, John Smit grabbed three aeriels for 36 yards. Roy Pederson brought down three for 27, Hayes caught one for 15 and Burk grabbed one for eight.

The fumbles were two made and recovered by the Redwings.

Injuries are starting to plague the Redwings for the first time this season. Doubtful starters for the Homecoming game Friday night are Larry Wakefield, Larry

Vitek and Ed Boettger. Boettger and Vitek suffered shoulder separations in Friday's game and Wakefield injured his leg.

Penalties hampered the Redwings during the game and especially in the second half. A total of 95 yards in penalties were brought upon St. Johns, 75 of those in the second half and 60 of those in the third quarter.

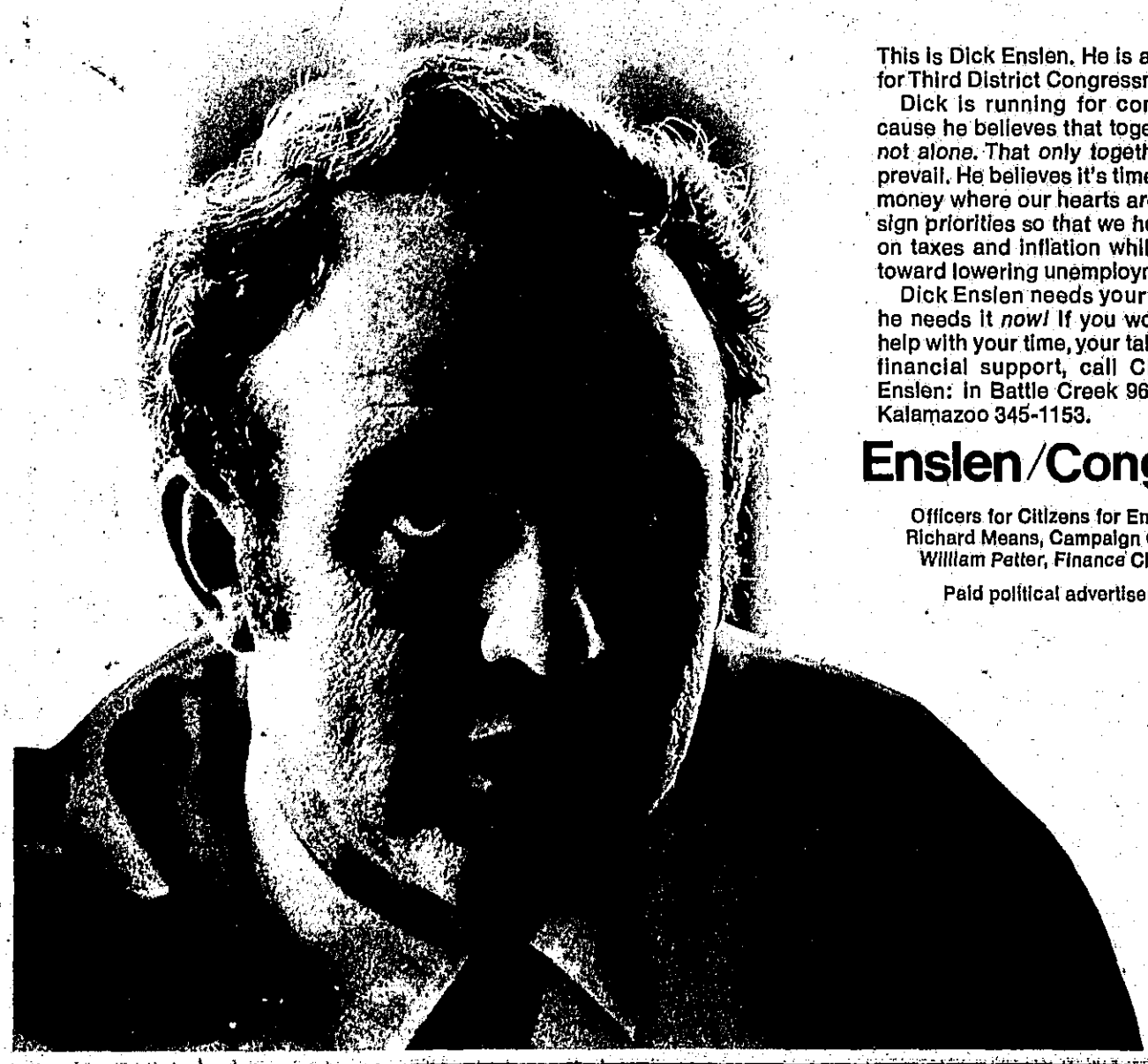
Defensively, the Redwings were very balanced. Tackles were made by almost every defensive player on the team, second team included. For an example, three players had four tackles, four had three and another five had two apiece. Head Coach Jeff Smith commented that he liked this balance very much.

Speaking of the offense and their showing Friday, Smith said, "We were making too many needless mistakes. Clipping, holding, offsides and fumbles were keeping us from doing more scoring."

Steve Mead was a shoo-in for back of the week honors Friday night against Lakewood. Lineman of the week honors went to Tom Rasdale for his blocking and overall effort in Friday's encounter. And, captain of the week was Larry Hayes, for the second time this year.

# 'Razzle dazzle' Panthers edge Wolf Pack 20-18

DeWitt Panther Head Coach Gary Roberts ordered a bit of razzle-dazzle against the Wolf Pack from Laingsburg Friday night and it paid off. It paid off so well that they remain undefeated in conference play and tied with Pewamo-Westphalia for the league lead.

The Panthers were down 18-14, deep in their own territory, with only 4:53 left to play in the game.

That's when Roberts inserted the trick play. Huddling on the line of scrimmage before an amused Wolf Pack line, the center broke away and snapped the ball to the huddle.

The entire team raced down the

field in a bunch and made 40 yards before the startled Laingsburg defenders could force quarterback Ron Wilcox out of bounds.

One minute and two plays later, Jim Ashley took a screen pass from Wilcox and skirted the left end, racing 43 yards for the winning touchdown.

Laingsburg, then behind 20-18,

tried desperately to recover with 3:50 left in the game.

Quarterback Jack Hurst moved the team downfield to DeWitt's 22-yard-line before Jim Ashley intercepted tailback Mike Rann's option pass killing the threat.

DeWitt struck first with a three-yard plunge by Tony Vetraino late in the first quarter, with Wilcox providing the extra two points.

The Wolf Pack made a bid to tie the game just before the half on a four yard burst by Rann with only 38 seconds left, but the extra point try failed and DeWitt led at the break 8-6.

The Pack came back fired up and took that lead away with a long touchdown pass from Hurst to Chuck Ordway covering 57 yards. Hurst threaded the ball through three Panther defenders for the scoring strike.

The conversion attempt failed, but Laingsburg led 12-8.

Then with 4:02 remaining in the third period, the Pack struck again as slotback Ron Goetschy stormed over center from the five to give Laingsburg an 18-6 lead.

Undaunted, DeWitt turned around and ripped off a four-minute series of plays culminating in an eight-yard sprint by Wilcox. The two-point conversion failed and DeWitt still trailed 18-14.

The game was a costly one in one respect as quarterback-halfback Mike Cole suffered a mild concussion and was carried out on a stretcher as the game ended.

Roberts wasn't sure how long Cole would be out of action.

Vetraino collapsed in the locker room from exhaustion and was rushed to the hospital for examination but returned to school Monday and will apparently be fit to play Friday night against Webberville, the homecoming game.

Roberts seemed pleased as his star passing quarterback Wilcox returned to the line-up after sitting out most of last week's game with Owosso St. Paul. He had injured his neck in the first game of the season against Bath, but his statistics indicated he is recovered.

Wilcox hit on four of seven attempted passes for 81 yards and a touchdown.

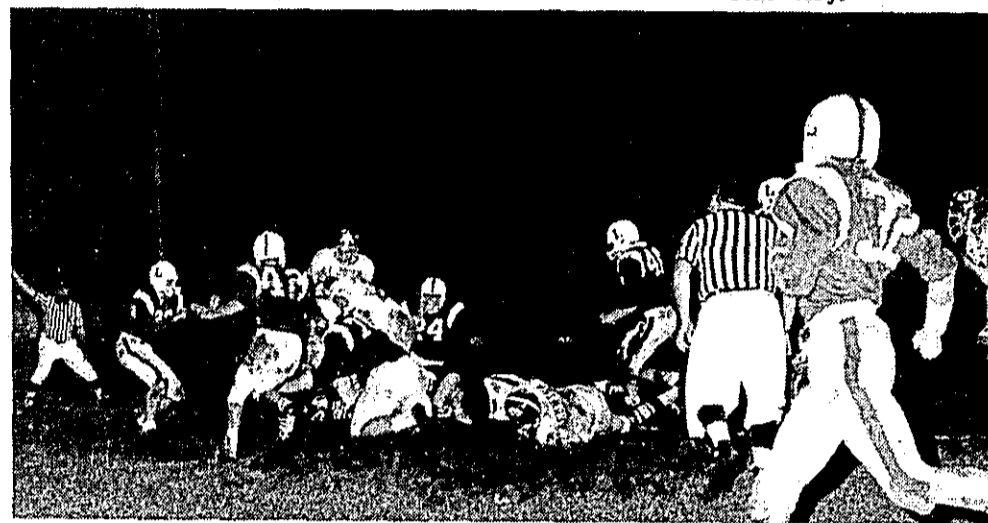
The Panther ground machine was impressive rolling up 222 yards and 15 first downs and only fumbled once, while the defense held down the Wolf Pack air attack with three big interceptions, two by Jim Ashley.

# Weber's punt return clinches win 20-14

P-W's little Dan Weber did everything but crown the queen last Friday night as he led his Pirate teammates to a 20-14 homecoming win over the visiting Eagles of Fowler.

The 150-pound tallback scored in the first and second quarters on runs of seven and five yards, then raised Pirate fans from their seats with a fourth quarter punt return of 80 yards that clinched the P-W victory.

But the show was not all P-W's. Despite a severe case of the huddles, which involved some backfield mixups and some fumbles, Fowler threatened a happy homecoming right down to the wire.

The 20-14 lead was threatened as the Eagles took the kickoff and began a sustained drive toward pay dirt. A series of four first downs put them on the P-W seven yard line but with only a minute and 26 seconds to go the determined Pirates halted the Fowler effort one-foot from the

goal and took possession of the ball.

It was merely a question of running the clock out from this point and the Pirates wrapped up their third victory - second in conference play - of the season.

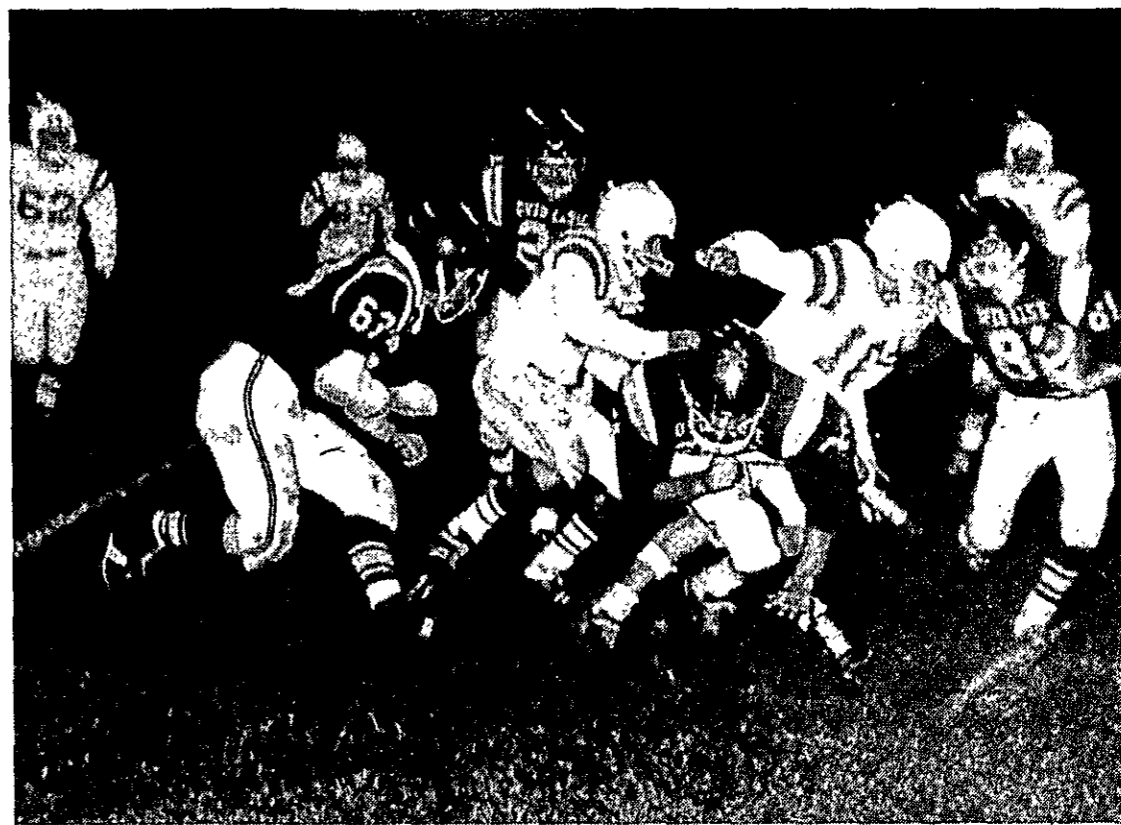
Paced by Al Piggott, Frank Spitzley and Charlie Tice, the Pirates' defense harassed Eagle quarterback Steve Feldpauch the entire game. Feldpauch, who was filling in for regular starter Gene Messer who injured an ankle last week playing basketball, might not have made friends among the Eagles, but he saw a lot of them throughout the game. They trapped him repeatedly behind the line of scrimmage and regularly disrupted his attempts at aerial plays.

Playing without Messer, the

Eagles seemed unsure and only twice did they show sparks that suggested a return to position among the state's top ten class D squads. Those moments came after Thelen's jaunt and during the closing minutes sustained drive that faltered at the Pirate's goal.

In addition to Rossow's alert play, determined efforts on defense were displayed by Eagles Dave Osborn, Bruce Weber and Stan Weber. At times the Fowler front wall stopped Pirate runners cold, but the wirey running of Weber proved a bit too much to contain.

The loss leaves Fowler with a season record of 2-1 and a CMAC standing of 1-1.

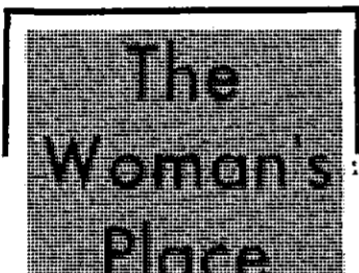



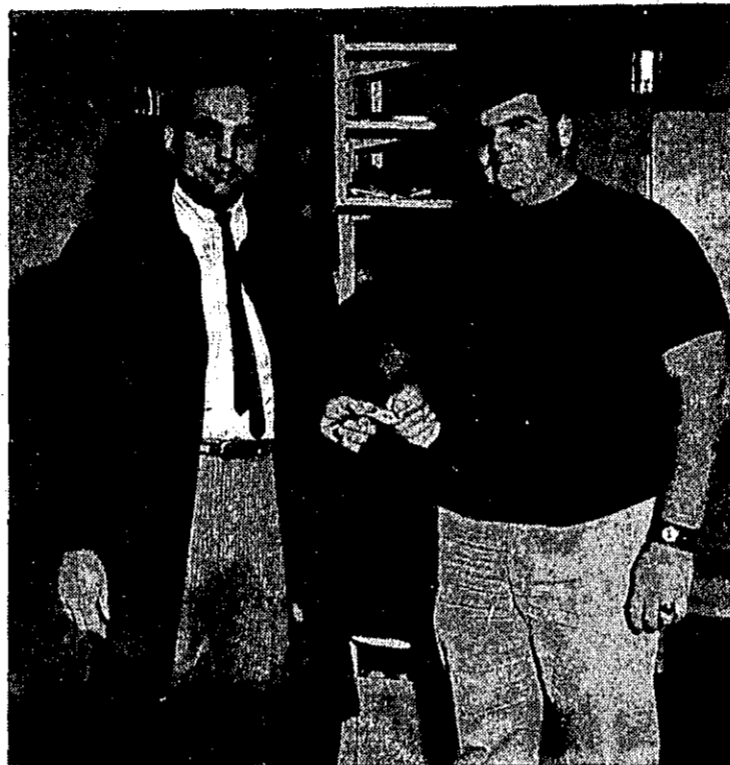

For three weeks she practiced. For three weeks we played Fish with the boys. Because for three weeks she looked like a terrified raccoon.

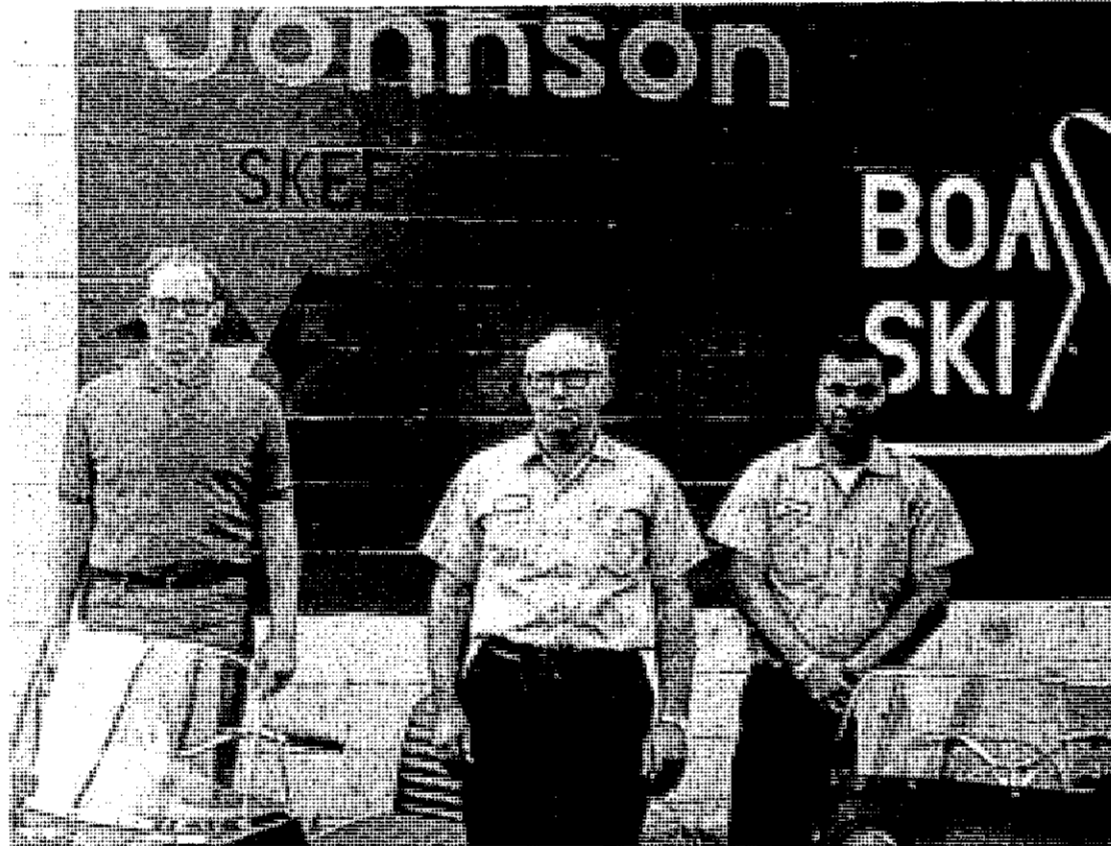

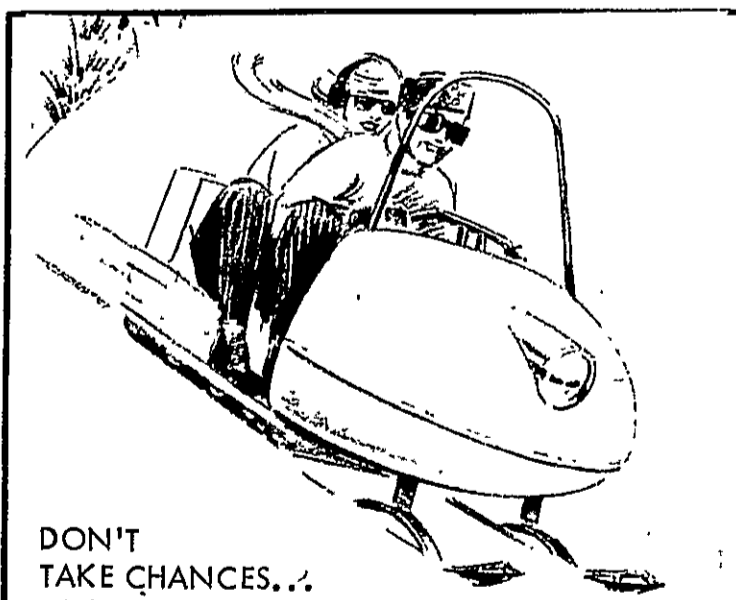

### AGRICULTURE IN ACTION

If you're hungry don't read this column. We talk about things like the sweet aroma of mom's apple pie and it's bound to activate the nerve endings of an empty stomach. Can you smell the pie?

Try a sniff, sit back and imagine, and if you can't do this, you should pick up the latest book on the shelf—"The Sweet Smell of Christmas"—a Golden Fragrance Book of Western Publishing Co., N.Y., that adds a new dimension to reading by catering to your sense of smell. This children's book of learning by eyes, ears and nose as well, is a first of its kind and is covered with "small pictures" of apple pie, pine tree, peppermint candy cane, gingerbread, hot chocolate and orange.

How is it done? The aroma comes from an innocent enough looking strip of paper coated with tiny bubbles of scented oil that 200 would fit around a human hair and a half million to the square inch.

When folks scratch or rub the paper, bubbles crumble and release the pleasant aroma. And if your tots get hungry, it's safe,

while doubtful such adventures would travel past the first bite. We're betting advertisers won't hold back on this technique in the future since it appeals to the greatest biological instinct of them all—hunger.

The great advantage certainly will be to the food industry's credit. Whoever could resist being motivated to buy from the fresh smell of a crisp crunchable eating apple, or a soft sugary peach would have to be a cold soul. Promoters of fresh fruit and vegetables would benefit. Perhaps even the meat industry could duplicate the aroma of a sizzling steak, sausage or bacon.

Some magazine advertisers of mixed drinks have already chimed in with the sense of smell technique. People just can't underestimate the power of the nose. Sniffing before eating is a habit of folks that automatically dictates; if it doesn't smell good, don't eat it. True...folks taste by trial and error. Other than being properly educated before hand, how else would anyone know? So our sense of smell is a dear commodity, an antenna to separate what is agreeable from the not so agreeable.

And for food relishers...perhaps the "Sweet Smell of Christmas" just might prepare "ye old bread basket" for the even sweeter...after meal contentedness.

Pornography report

The report of the president's commission on pornography has been released and amid the furor of support and rejection there are two recommendations by the commission which seem objective. The two are creating more definitive laws which can be enforced effectively and the inception of a meaningful sex education program which would encompass all age levels.

If there is anything on which to hang hopes for a morally stable future in our country these proposals are it.

We find it difficult to accept many of the reported findings of the commission, for traffic in pornography has become a cancerous growth which poses a threat to our society more erosive than unrest and more perilous than war.

It is hard to accept that pornography does not lay the foundation for sex crimes or that distribution of smut is not an activity of organized crime. We have too long linked these elements to have the belief dispelled with the wave of a commission report.

However, the proposals mentioned at the outset have much merit. In most any human endeavor education is the key-stone to success and generating a wholesome knowledge of sex can well pave the road to a general lack of interest in smut.

Similarly, if laws are to be the tools of war against pornography, then they should be explicit in definitions, penalties and scope of coverage. Morality cannot be legislated, but a society desiring order cannot attain that goal with loosely worded restrictions which, in effect, merely mention that which is objectionable. This type guideline is not only difficult to enforce, but even more difficult to interpret, particularly in these times of growing understanding and involvement.

We have no reason to believe the commission did not work diligently and objectively but much of their report seems to be in conflict with traditional values.

Perhaps a strong educational program supported by vigorous legal guidelines can bring us to accepting some of the more permissive proposals the commission has advanced.

City and school authorities admitted that there was never any degree of intent to terminate the year-to-year leasing agreement on the field.

Bath Township officials took under consideration a new proposed budget of \$114,550 at a special meeting on Oct. 27. The law stated that the township could assess a total of five mills. St. Johns Redwings came off the gridiron with a successful Homecoming victory over Waverly 24-6. The junior varsity and the freshmen also followed with victories over their respective Waverly opponents. Redwing Homecoming Queen was Vicki Johnston.

The Clinton County Farm Bureau made plans for their 50th Anniversary meeting and celebration which was scheduled for Tuesday Oct. 14. The Young Farmers Committee was on hand to speak to the assembled group. Ovid Elsie's Marauders gave Head Coach Mark O'Donnell his 100th football victory of his coaching career with their defeat of Bullock Creek, 28-6.

The Newcomers group of Welcome Wagon International became St. Johns' newest social organization with installation of officers, that was held in the

community room of the Clinton National Bank. State Rep. William S. Ballenger opened his St. Johns office on a regular basis on Friday, Oct. 10. The office was closed during the summer because of the recess of the State Legislature.

TEN YEARS AGO Oct. 6, 1960

Clergymen representing the St. Johns Ministerial Association appeared before the county commission to protest the issuance of a beer and wine take-out license to the Kroger Store on south US 27. The representatives presented petitions to the commission with the signatures of 502 residents and 14 clergymen. Both the St. Johns City Commission and the Michigan Liquor Control Commission had granted their permission for the license to be issued.

The last call for voter registration was made and the date set for Monday, Oct. 10 at 8 p.m. It was reminder to citizens that they do not become automatically registered when they move into the area where they intend to cast their vote on the ballot on Nov. 8.

Justice Oliver E. Smith was recommended for appointment as Friend of the Court for the Clinton circuit court by Judge Paul R. Cash. Smith succeeded Steven L. Dykema, former St. Johns attorney, who recently became associated with a Grand Rapids law firm. Smith's new office was established in the Parr Building.

St. Johns' Redwings gave the axe to Belding Redskins 12-6 but were getting ready to face a formidable foe in the form of the Hastings Saxons. The Saxons were pre-season picks in 1960 to take the West Central Conference crown. They had scored 74 points to only 12 for their opposition in two games. Just in case you're interested, Hastings won 35-6.

An old-fashioned cider-barrel political rally was held at the DeWitt Athletic Field on Oct. 13. Present at the rally were gubernatorial candidate Paul D. Bagwell, congressional candidate James Harvey and candidate for the U.S. Senate, Alvin M. Bentley. Improved street lighting in Monroe became a reality with the installation of soft fluorescent lights on taller poles making street lighting in Monroe twice as bright. The project was to cost an estimated \$7,000 and would be paid out of the parking meter fund.

25 YEARS AGO Oct. 11, 1945

Memorial Park Fund reached a level of \$14,476 during its first week of soliciting. Initial contributions ranged from \$1 to \$1,000. This first week only covered about a quarter of the families in St. Johns.

Pvt. Stephen Jakus was killed in action in San Pedro Gulf off Leyte in the Philippines, when his ship was hit by a Japanese suicide plane.

About doctors, lawyers

Right now, in my favorite town, there is being heard considerable criticism of the legal profession.

"This makes the doctors happy," a wise man explained to me. "If people spend enough time knocking lawyers, they may forget to rap the doctors."

You can hear a lot of phony reasons why doctors and lawyers are oftentimes targets of locker-room gossip and bridge-table barbs. You can hear the real reason from most any young woman who is seeking a husband and has not yet fallen in love with a truck driver.

"I would like to marry a doctor or a lawyer," she will say.

This is because doctors and lawyers generally make a lot more money than truck drivers or newspaper writers. Mrs. Doctor can drive a Volkswagen because it's chic, not because it's all she can afford. When Mrs. Lawyer works on the church rummage sale, she doesn't come on duty early to search for shirts that will fit Junior.

There are, of course, exceptions. Some of my best friends are lawyers and doc-

tors. Some of my best enemies, too. And many of them protest that all is not gold that glitters inside their crowded clinics and offices.

But they needn't protest to me. Rich or poor or in between it makes me no difference. Jealousy sours a man's stomach and makes everything he swallows taste bitter. I don't have time for envy. I'm too busy trying to pay my doctor bills.

Seriously, I don't begrudge the doctors and lawyers their incomes. I'm sure most of them work hard and honestly, and earn every cent. A survey would doubtless show that more people trust lawyers and doctors than trust newspaper editors. Me too.

Which brings me to my only real beef against doctors and lawyers. They are too clamish and self-protective.

If I think newsmen have it coming, I don't hesitate to knock them—publicly and soundly.

But the other day, over a private Scotch and soda, a doctor told me too many doctors exercise their vanity by keeping terminal patients alive long after they should be allowed to die. But he forbade me to quote

him. He didn't want to make his colleagues angry.

And I had 4 lawyers agree with me that a judge was doing something unlawful. But they all whispered and said they didn't dare speak out loud, they didn't want to offend the judge.

And the worst sin can be pinned on the lawyers alone. Too many of them take more cases than they have time for. This results in lousy service for the least important clients—usually the clients most in need of help and least likely to demand their money's worth. A couple of lawyers have admitted this to me—"but if you quote me I'll deny I said it."

Too many doctors and lawyers refuse to speak out against one another. Maybe it has something to do with protecting their standing in the various medical and bar associations. Or maybe it's the same understanding as in the U.S. Senate: "I won't pick on you if you don't pick on me."

Whatever the reasons, the result can be the continuation of undesirable practices and a thumb in the public eye.

Which is a heck of a lot worse than making more money than a truck driver.

Live and learn, I guess, is the phrase.

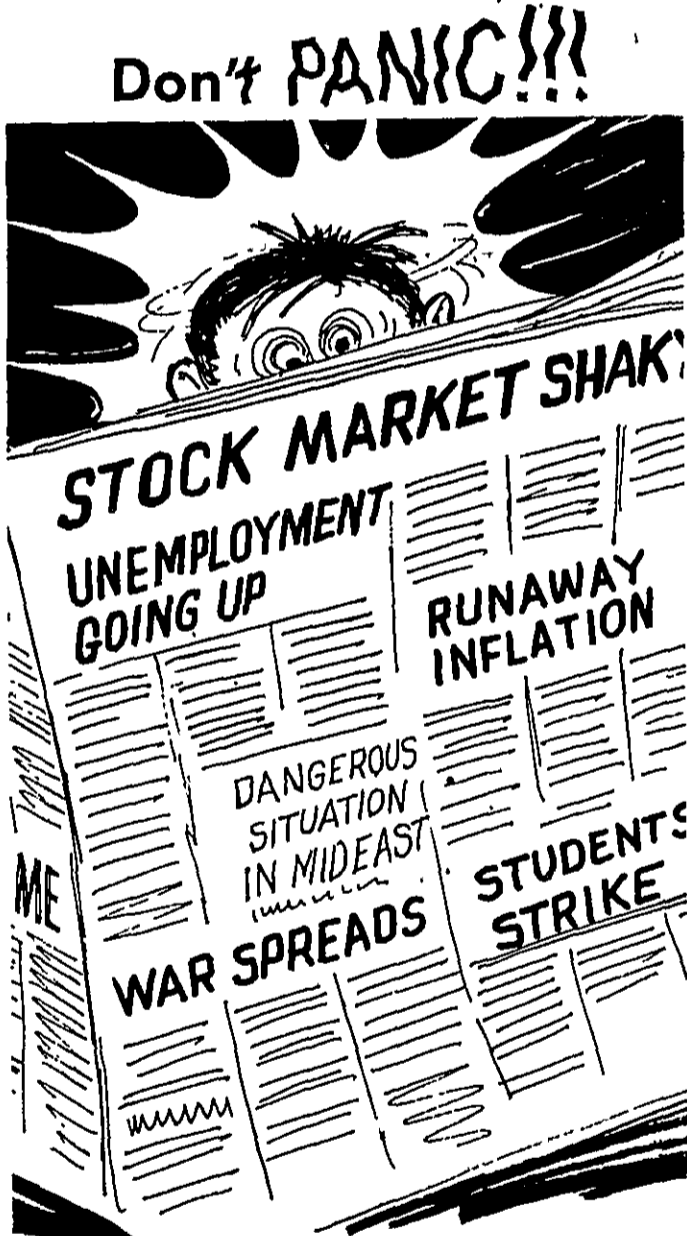

Results of new ruling

Here are the immediate results of two separate decisions last week by the Michigan Supreme Court on state aid to non-public schools:

1. Such aid is constitutionally valid under the present Michigan Constitution; and
2. Now Michigan voters must decide whether they want to change their Constitution on this particular question.

The Parochial issue will be on the Nov. 3 ballot. The Supreme Court upheld an earlier ruling by the State Appeals Court that the

citizen petitions seeking the ballot question were properly worded. Thus, both courts ruled against Attorney General Frank Kelley, who had issued an opinion that the petitions were not valid.

The Supreme Court's vote to turn down the Attorney General's appeal on the petition question was 5 to 2. The decision on the actual constitutionality of Parochial under existing constitutional language was closer, 4 to 3.

The Legislature made a ruling on the present constitutionality a condition of this year's school aid bill, which included a Parochial grant. The stipulation we made was that none of the funds could be spent for this purpose until Michigan's highest court made its ruling.

So Michigan will have Parochial, at least temporarily, pending the outcome of the November vote. The aid will be in the form of payments of up to half of the salaries of lay teachers of secular subjects, up to the ceiling of \$22 million specified in the overall \$969.3 million school aid bill. It is estimated that about 900 schools embracing approximately 10,000 teachers and 270,000 students will qualify for assistance under this program.

Because of the important responsibility you and other citizens will have in making a personal decision on this issue, a few more details on the Parochial vote would be helpful.

After reading through the proposed amendment, here is my understanding of the issue you will face:

If you vote YES—you are voting to change the present Constitution so that public aid to non-public schools would be specifically prohibited.

If you vote NO—you are voting to retain the present constitutional language, which the Supreme Court has ruled allows the program of aid to non-public schools through salary payments for lay teachers of secular subjects.

Please keep this point clearly in mind. You are not going to be voting on the basis of "Yes" I favor non-public aid, or "No" I don't favor such aid. You will be voting on the proposed constitutional amendment which would ban non-public aid. You should think of your vote as either "Yes" I favor prohibiting non-public aid, or "No" I do not favor prohibiting such aid.

To further aid you in reaching your personal decision on this matter, here is the wording of the constitutional amendment proposal (you'll notice that transportation assistance for non-public school students would be exempted from the ban):

This amendment adds language to the Constitution to:

- prohibit use of public funds to aid any non-public elementary or secondary school.
  - prohibit use of public funds, except for transportation, to support the attendance of any students or employment of any person at non-public schools or any other location or institution where instruction is offered in whole or in part to non-public school students.
  - prohibit any payment, credit, tax benefit, exemption or deductions, tuition, voucher, subsidy, grant or loan or public monies or property, directly or indirectly for the above purposes.
- The above will be the question before you on Nov. 3.

When we ask for God's blessing at mealtime, one of the prayers says, "Bless, O Lord, this food to our use and us to thy service; keep us ever mindful of the needs of others, and help us to respond to those needs."

The man turned his head, looking down the sloshy street. "I can't forget my friends, my children," he said sadly. "They are out there."

"But sir," I complained, drawing the door to me a little, "consider my schedule; look here on my calendar. See the neat lines

of events. My life is split up into activities that keep me here."

The man turned and looked in to the street. Then he pointed to a home and demanded, "Who lives there?" I said, "Why, Mr. and Mrs. No Good. They never go to church."

The man asked me, "Do you know the hell they live in? Do you know of her unfaithfulness? Do you know of his drinking, of their young child's lying to get attention, and of their teenager's search for thrills?"

I sighed, "Of course. Who doesn't? We will receive them into the church when they straighten out."

The shabby man then pleaded, "But they need you to go to them and love them and share their problems!"

"Me?" I nearly shouted. "Me? Are there no AA workers? Have they closed the mental hospitals? Where is the welfare agency?"

The man turned slowly and started down the stairs. And from

somewhere I heard the words, "When did we see you hungry, or thirsty, or a stranger, or naked, or sick, or in prison, and did not minister to you? I say this to you—inasmuch as you did it not to one of the least of these, you did it not to me."

One of the specific needs in our county has been brought to my attention by Mr. J. D. Robinson, who heads up the Clinton County Volunteer Bureau. He tells me that the Avon Nursing Home in DeWitt has asked for volunteers. Two of the needs to be met there are hairdressing for the women and visiting with the men for talk about farming, fishing and hunting. The over-all need there is to show loving concern for the residents.

Couldn't you spend one or two hours each week being a volunteer at the Avon Nursing Home? Sure you could. Just give them a call, and you'll be in business. Remember, "inasmuch as you did it not to one of the least of these, you did it not to me."

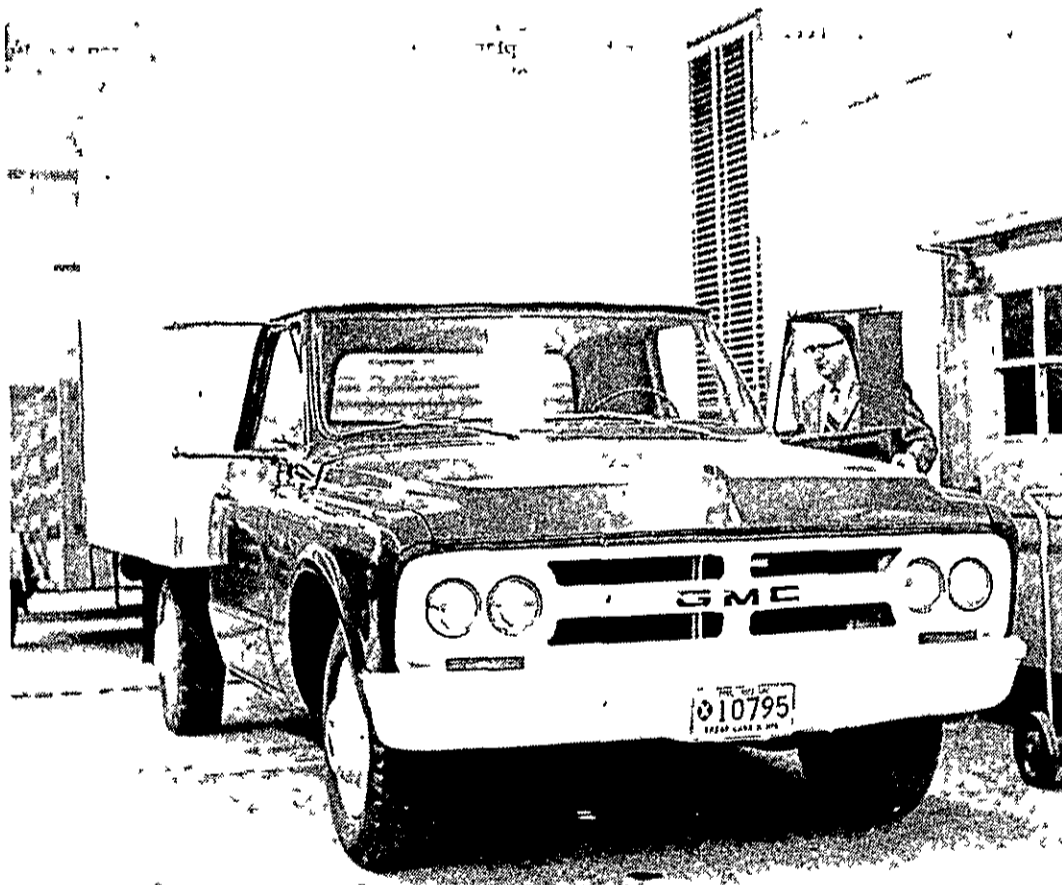
