Swine flu shot dates announced

Dates have been set for three counties to receive swine flu vaccinations. The Mid-Michigan District Health

Department has set Monday, Oct. 18, from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. and Tuesday, Oct. 19, from 2 p.m. to 8 p.m. as vaccination days for St. Johns

residents. Persons must register prior to receiving the shot. This is the first time in history that the health department has been able to

prepare for mass immunization before an outbreak occurs. Due to the major change in the virus the population has no established immunity.

In 1957 there was an outbreak of the Asian Flu and in 1968 with the Hong Kong Flu. In both instances over 50-million Americans were ill within a few months.

Two different vaccines will be given. The first is the bivalent (for a New Jersey-A-Victoria) which is intended to be used for the "high risk" patients. This includes persons over 60 years old and those with chronic diseases such as diabetes, respiratory disease, cardiovascular and kidney disease.

The second form is Monovalent (for A-New Jersey Swine Flu) designed for the general population 18-60.

Persons who are hypersensitive to eggs should receive the vaccine. Those who have a fever should delay getting the vaccine until the fever is gone. People who have received another vaccine in the past 14 days should consult a doctor before taking the vaccine.

People must register prior to receiving the inoculation.

Joseph Latoff, acting director of the health department stressed the need for the shots. It is impossible to mass immunize the population against the virus before epidemic conditions exist.

Persons who are hypersensitive to eggs should contact their family doctor and follow his advice in the matter. Those who have fevers can receive the inoculation at any of the other clinics set up throughout the area.

The dates, times and locations for the swine flu have been established. Both the monovalent and bivalent vaccines will be offered at the same clinic. Persons over 18 may attend these clinics.

Individuals under 18 years old should contact their family doctor.

Clinic sites have been selected in

central areas with consideration to available parking and easy access to the clinic.

Car pools are recommended due to the volume of people expected to attend the clinics.

Citizens pitch in to learn vocational needs of county

The thirty-member Clinton County Vocational-Technical Citizen's Advisory Committee is presently at work reviewing summaries of findings from three key sub-committees, prior to submitting suggestions to county school districts.

Steering Committee chairman, Bernard Feldpausch said that copies of the summaries had been distributed to each member of the full committee. "There's one heck of a lot of material to be looked at," said Feldpausch. "Much of it is very involved, and I want each member to have the time to study it fully before we call a committee of the whole meeting," he continued. According to the Steering Committee Chairman, that key meeting will probably be called "in about three weeks." It is likely, he indicated that the basic outlines of the final recommendations would be resolved at the committee of the whole meeting.

Those recommendations will be formally made to the superintendents and boards of the six schools in the Clinton County Intermediate School District. Each board unanimously approved a resolution requesting that the Intermediate District conduct such a study. Intermediate School District Superintendent, Larry A. Schwartzkopf, said after reviewing the summaries that he was "enormously impressed with the work the committee is doing. Remember," he said, "this is a volunteer citizens committee, and in just seven months time 44 separate meetings have been held. That's what I call real dedication, and it's our young people who will benefit."

The first summary of findings to be received was submitted by the Manpower and Training Needs Committee. The basic charge of this committee was to identify the future

occupational needs of the area and determine how these needs relate to the adequacy of present preparation and training in Clinton County. Primarily the summary includes the following major findings:

1. Based on figures supplied by the Clinton County Planning Commission, the population of the county was 53,000 in May of 1976. This represents a growth of 59 percent during the period 1950-76.

2. For each school year in the past 13 years with one exception (1972-73), there has been an increase in school membership over the prior year in Clinton County Intermediate School District. Based on official reports to the State Board of Education, the total increase between 1970 and the 1975-76 school year was 1,548 students in K-12 membership.

3. An analysis of the 1975-76, K-12 enrollments indicates the "Flattening-out" trend observed in 1972 and 1973 was not a genuine trend but a "Statistical bubble." Kindergarten enrollment figures are up and closely approximate the figures for graduating seniors. In fact, in Bath and Ovid-Elsie the kindergarten enrollment was substantially higher than that for graduating seniors.

4. Against this background, the enrollment in Shared Time Vocational Programs in the Intermediate District ranges from 9 percent of the 11th and 12th graders in St. Johns to 29 percent in Pewamo-Westphalia for a median shared time enrollment of 19 percent projected against the statewide goal of 69 percent.

5. Based on estimates provided by school principals and counselors a median of 30 percent of Clinton County high school graduates continue their

education in either a 2 or 4 year institution. These figures tend to support the state goal and to further indicate that a significant number of Clinton County students who are not on a college track are also not receiving adequate vocational education.

The U.S. Office of Education reports that only 23 percent of high school graduates will finish college. Also the

same office reports that only 17 percent of all job openings in the 1980's will require a four year degree.

7. As indicated by the Bureau of the Census figures for 1970, only 32.7 percent of the Clinton County Labor force is employed within the county. Over 50 percent of the labor force works

New signal helps make left turns

ST. JOHNS-- Drivers making left turns from US-27 to M-21 in St. Johns will find the experience less nerve wracking from now on, thanks to a new traffic signal sequence at the intersection.

The Michigan Dept. of Highways was scheduled to make the signal change Wednesday Morning.

The first sequence in the signals will allow northbound US-27 to travel straight through the intersection or

turn right or left while all other traffic is stopped, including southbound US-27.

In the second signal sequence all traffic except southbound US-27 will be stopped allowing southbound traffic to turn left, right or go straight.

The third sequence will stop both directions of traffic on US-27 while traffic on east and westbound M-21 receive the green light. There is a left-turn lane for M-21 traffic turning onto US-27.

Once struggling orchestra now going strong in St. Johns

The essence of culture is in our midst, yet few take advantage of the opportunity.

How many residents in St. Johns know that the high school has its own orchestra?

concept for the high school was not taken seriously and only three students signed up during the first year director Bill Tennant took the job in the fall of 1969.

Tennant said he heard that previous to his first year, the school board wanted to drop the class. However, parents of children in the orchestra wanted to keep the program, and made their feelings known.

The orchestra was kept on as a class, and then came Tennant's job of figuring out how to promote the program.

"A lot of emphasis was placed on the recruiting aspect," Tennant said.

One situation that lead to the orchestra's problems was directors of the group were always coming and going. There was no consistency.

In the school year 1969-70 there was no orchestra as it is known today. Tennant took the three high school students and one exceptional student from the junior high and formed a string quartet. The group met after school. In order to promote their efforts they performed for the elementary students, and

put on various programs for the students.

Since 1969 the group has grown from three students to 88 students in grades six through 12. "Now each year we start out with a really good group," Tennant said.

Recruiting starts in the fifth grade around the first of November. They start with about 20 new students each year. Tennant and his assistant Bryon Payne select the top students in the group from the fifth grade for the orchestra.

"These kids need a lot of individualized help, so we have to stay with the smaller groups," Tennant said.

"With the smaller groups we have a pretty good ratio of success."

The director noted that St. Johns is a unique community in that small rural areas do not normally have orchestras. "Usually the majority of high school orchestras are located in large urban areas," he said.

Half of the high school groups are from the Detroit area. There are 95 high school orchestras in the state. The rest are in Grand Rapids and Flint, and according to Tennant there are only five or six schools like St. Johns that have orchestras.

In a five county area in mid-Michigan only two high schools have orchestras, St. Johns and Midland. "It's a growing thing and more schools become interested each year," Tennant said.

This year the director is trying to initiate a new idea. So that his orchestra can hear other groups perform the Flint and Muskegon

districts might play in the St. Johns district this year.

Districts are used mainly for competition, but with only two groups in a district it is hard to get an idea how good other schools are. Last year St. Johns received a first district rating at the

held at Michigan State University.

The group plays all different kinds of music from the classical "longhair", type to pop, and show tunes.

This year for the first time, Tennant has students he started out in the fifth grade

and from there chose the 20 kids for the class.

The high school puts on a musical and as an added dimension select orchestra students to play in the pit orchestra. "This really adds to the musical," Tennant said.

Tennant added that it would be nice if the orchestra had a little more community support. "It's been a real struggle to build up the orchestra, and to get the community aware of the fact that we exist," he said.

The group is fairly equally divided between the sexes. In the high school string group there are a total of 35 students, 15 boys and 20 girls. In the junior high there are 34 students, 13 of whom are boys.

This is the second year that wind instruments have been a part of the orchestra. "It's just tremendous for festivals," Tennant said.

"Everyone seems to be pretty 'gung ho' about the band, but not towards classical music," Tennant asserted. "I have to give the kids a lot of credit for sticking to it, because not many people attend our concerts except parents, and some of them don't even attend."

There is also the Orchestra Ragtime Ensemble who have played at the Lansing Civic Center. The High School Orchestra was asked to play at the state capital last year, which the director deems as quite an honor.

Students receive one credit for the class, and it applies towards graduation. However, a student cannot major or minor in music.

For music students there is a music theory course in the evening which about 15 students attend. Some credit is earned by students and it is on a pass or fail type grading system.

Also to help his students

March for the musical to round out the year a big spring concert is held in May where everyone performs.

Other aspects of the orchestra are the quartets. There are string quartets in the senior and junior high group. "The more advanced students play in this select group," Tennant said.

band festival. It was the first time the group had gone in four years.

There are four string instruments used in the orchestra. They are the violins, violas, cello, and bass. Recently the junior and senior high groups added wind instruments to make a symphonic orchestra.

Tennant has tried to make the class as interesting as possible and give his students a wide variety of musical opportunities. They have a non-performing or listening class. They also attend concerts and go to three or four musical event

who are now seniors, still in the group.

He commented that one of his best students graduated last year. She has gone on in music, majoring in it at MSU. She was chosen as 11th chair, first violin. She was also selected to play in the Chamber music group.

"She is doing outstanding as a freshman," Tennant said. He also noted that a few of his other students have gone on to play in college orchestras.

"I've gotten letters from some graduates saying they have been attending concerts and have been getting enjoyment out of them," he said proudly.

"They have learned to appreciate music even if they haven't gone on to perform."

For Tennant's fifth grade students a testing program and musical aptitude test is given. The score is taken and Payne and or Tennant talk with the classroom teacher to see how the student is doing academically. They pick about 75 students and send letters home to the parents

obtain and be exposed to culture, 100 students are taken to Detroit to see an opera. At first the students were not too excited about attending the event, but now it has grown to be a popular field trip. "With an opera, all the arts are incorporated, and this really gives the kids exposure," Tennant said.

"To each his own," has been a popular saying for quite a few years. It holds true in many respects. Each person has their own favorite things they enjoy doing. What Bill Tennant has tried to do over the past seven years is give his students more of a choice and more opportunity to discover new and different areas of cultural life.

"Culture...most people say, 'I can take it or leave it.' However, Tennant gives his students a chance to explore and decide for themselves.

Before we had to depend on outside rehearsals and that was really hard because most of these kids were involved in other outside activities."

Some activities the orchestra will be performing in this year are, a concert with the choir which is tentatively set for Oct. 27 at 7:30 p.m., a Christmas concert, a festival in St. Johns, Feb. 28; and four performances the end of

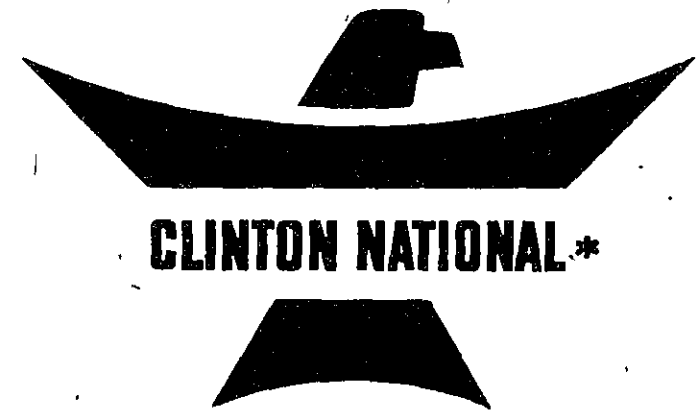

Other cases handled by the force from Oct. 4 to Oct. 11 were: one domestic problem, one person was cited for reckless driving, one malicious destruction of property, one driving while license was suspended, one furnishing to a minor, and one minor in possession. The police department also handled seven accidents during the past week.

Personality Profile Jim Koenigsknecht this week:

It has been said many times that all men are created equal. However what some men accomplish proves that equality is just a word. Some men go far beyond the reaches of just trying to be equal and surpass others who merely exist by just getting by.

Jim Koenigsknecht, has brought honor and pride to the community of Fowler, the Jaycees, and his family and friends, but most of all to himself. Koenigsknecht has been involved with the Fowler Jaycees for the past six years and has learned many things about himself, his capabilities, and how to set and reach goals.

In the beginning Jim became a Jaycee to belong to the softball team. Later he got involved with youth oriented projects like the children's halloween and Christmas parties, as well as softball games.

Then something happened and Koenigsknecht became interested in the internal area of the Jaycees. He took up the leadership training aspect of the available programs.

"It gives people the confidence to speak," he said. "And in turn it gave me this confidence."

From this point on there was no stopping Jim Koenigsknecht. He had set no limits to the things he was to accomplish.

A year and a half after he became a Jaycee, he ran for president. During that year the club accomplished many things, but Jim won't take much of the credit. "It's just like being on a football team," he explained. "You might have a great coach but if you don't have the men to back you up, you won't have a winning team. I was just really lucky to have a great group of people to work with."

During 1972-73 he was named one of five Outstanding Young Presidents in Michigan out of 333 Jaycee chapters. Prior to that time he was named a state director and Fowler Jaycee of the Year.

In 1972-73 the Fowler Jaycee Chapter won the Gold Chip award, under the young man's leadership. It is a highly coveted award in Jaycee circles. The chapter was also ranked in the top one-third of the chapters in the state.

In the following year he was named state vice-president and he was also named Key Man of the Year in Fowler. This award is given to the man who helps the president the most throughout the year. Jim in this instance again did more than was expected. During this time he was also in charge of District 18 as state vice-president.

"That was the year we brought Pewamo into chapterhood," Koenigsknecht commented.

In 1974-75 he was named national director and was put in charge of three state vice-presidents. His district started out with 28 chapters and ended the year with 36. This was when he set the modern day Jaycee growth record.

"In Jaycees you learn to set goals," Jim said. "I said I wanted to be first in everything I did." Well, Jim didn't quite make it this time. One of the highest honors bestowed on a Jaycee is to become the top National Director. Jim came in second that year, missing the number one spot by .15 of a point.

"It was a tight race for number one," he said.

That was the year he also won the President's Club Award, and so did all his state vice-presidents. "That was the first time that all three state vice-presidents and their Director won the award in the history of the Michigan Jaycees," Koenigsknecht said.

"During that year he put on 33,000 Jaycee miles on the car and was away from home 219 nights. He was from one end of the state to the other," his wife Brenda commented.

In 1975 he earned the second highest office in the Michigan Jaycees as the Internal Vice-President. He also came in second for the Clint Dunigan Award. That is the highest award that a national director can achieve.

Jim is a modest young man who went from a quiet farm boy to a confident leader. Jim accomplished a lot of things during his years in the Jaycees but he gives the credit to the people he worked with not taking much for himself.

"I don't work for awards," Jim said, "Just like I tell any new Jaycee, if you do a good job the rewards will come to you. If you work for the award the whole meaning and worth of the effort is lost."

The confidence that Jim gained by being a Jaycee has carried over in other aspects of community activities.

He is now a member of the Fowler Village Council, the Clinton County Republican party and a precinct delegate. He was chosen as a delegate to the state convention in Grand Rapids and the Michigan National Convention. Jim Koenigsknecht, does what he does because he likes it and is fun. "I wouldn't do it if it weren't," he said.

Once again you find that behind a good man there was a good woman, and Jim claims he has the best. Brenda can tell you just about as much as Jim can about the Jaycees. She took an interest in Jim's work and got involved herself. She saw the changes that being a Jaycee made in Jim.

Koenigsknecht has worked at Bee's Chevrolet in the parts department for 7 1/2 years.

In his spare time he attends classes at Michigan State University, races cars, and plays football. "I've just learned to manage my time," Jim said. "And not sleep very much," Brenda added with a smile.

To try, to seek, to gain, to accomplish, by setting goals and making them a reality has become Jim's way of life. To know where he is going in life and not settle for anything but the best is his ideal. There is no other way for Jim Koenigsknecht.

The debates: How great?

The wonder of the presidential debate, it is becoming clearer to many of us, is not their value to democracy, but rather that they are being held at all.

The 1976 version may well be the last of a species, too.

The debates are not electric. To many, they are downright uninteresting. As a help in the decision making process for the voters, their value is questionable.

Why, then, have debates at all? The answer, I suppose, is that it is the right thing to do. It's good for democracy.

Where were the debates in 1968 and 1972? The incumbents didn't want them, so they weren't held. This year, Mr. Ford, as the incumbent, felt he was behind Mr. Carter—and he was—so he not only agreed to the debates, but in effect challenged Mr. Carter to meet him on the podium, and Mr. Carter, was only too anxious to accommodate him.

There's only one real reason for the debates: Each candidate thinks he can profit from them politically. That's why they weren't held in 1968 and 1972; that's why they're being held now.

And despite the high-sounding phrases, political profit will be the only reason they will be held in the future. If Mr. Carter is the incumbent in 1980, there probably will be no debates; if there are two new candidates in 1980, the chance

of a revival of presidential debates is much greater, but their value is marginal at best.

Conservative columnist James J. Kilpatrick, writing before the first debate, was harshly critical of the whole process.

"Forensically speaking, the debates will be second-class entertainment," Kilpatrick wrote.

"As orators, Ford and Carter have all the excitement of last week's left-over macaroni...."

"Ford and Carter got themselves into these one-on-one matches in the finest tradition of American Adolescence: The dare. The chip on the shoulder. The line drawn by a stubby toe in the sand. All around the candidates were bellicose companions urging them on: 'Let's you and him fight. Our people dearly love a blooded nose....'

"I know how I would proclaim the winner. It would be the first man who looks the American people in the eye, through the TV lens, and has the guts to tell them: 'I don't know.'"

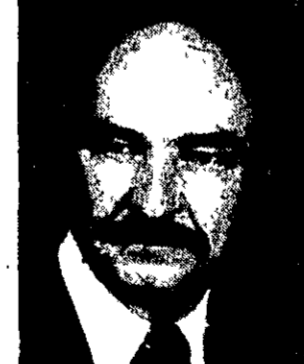
The Kilpatrick criticisms have some merit. Arrangements for the debates took some juvenile turns...like when Barry Jagoda, a television advisor for Mr. Carter, demanded at one point that there be a four-inch depression in the floor behind Mr. Ford's lectern so that Mr. Ford, at 6-2, would appear no

taller than Mr. Carter, at 5-10. Fortunately the demand got nowhere—except into print.

The League of Women Voters, which for some obscure reason has assumed the role as referee and arbiter, takes up its assignment with two-handed vigor—one hand heavy, and the other high. The League has been acting with all the finesse of the NCAA and Big Ten investigating recruiting violations at Michigan State University. Of course, someone has to do it, I suppose, so why not the League of Women Voters?

The fourth debate between the vice presidential candidates likely will top all the others for vim and verve. Sen. Robert Dole and Sen. Walter Mondale are not limited by the mantle of reserved statesmanship, which the quest for the nation's top office bestows upon presidential candidates. At least, restraint has not been conspicuous so far in the vice presidential jousting; of course, neither Mr. Dole nor Mr. Mondale has nearly as much to lose as their superior candidates. Maybe that's why they're freer and more colorful on the stump.

The purpose of the Dole-Mondale debate mystifies me. How many voters will the vice presidential debate inform? How many will it persuade? "Few, if any" would be an appropriate answer to either question. But then, that's also true of the Ford-Carter debates, in all likelihood.

From the Senate

If you ask a property owner what really gets his goat, the first thing that will probably come to mind will be his-her taxes. But there is another problem which our rural property owners, and particularly farmers, face which hasn't been publicized as much but is still as troublesome and that is trespass. And trespass particularly by hunters.

What prompted my thoughts on this subject? Complaints about broken fences, lost livestock, lack of accessible hunting lands, hunter accidents, cars in back lots, etc. So the Michigan United Conservation Clubs, Farm Bureau, the Department of Natural Resources and Dick Allen think they have a better idea. Now, you can argue that broken fences and lost livestock are only the result of careless hunters and I am willing to admit that that may be true in a few instances, but I would prefer to think that it is due to a lack of hunting lands and a large number of hunters.

Statistics show that our hunter population is growing larger and larger. The DNR tells us that 625,000 licenses for hunting game are sold annually in the southern half of Michigan (Muskegon to Bay City and south) while there are only 314,000 acres of state land in the same area which includes recreational facilities which are off limits to hunters.

Now, here's our plan! All persons planning on hunting in Zones 3 (Muskegon to Bay City and south) will be required to purchase a \$1 access stamp per year. The \$1 will be collected for the sole purpose of supporting a program to lease lands from private landowners for hunter access. Now you are saying "wait a minute, I don't want anyone telling me that I have to let anyone hunt on my land." You don't. The program is completely voluntary for landowners. We figure that at \$2 per acre we can lease almost 240,000 in the first year and nearly 300,000 in the second year. That's going to double what

is actually available for hunting now!

The program will require hunters to stop at the farmhouse and ask permission to hunt and leave some sort of identification. Only a certain number of hunters will be allowed per acre and cars will be parked in a designated area.

Since each hunter will wear a bright "hunter access tag" provided by the DNR to the farmer for distribution, we are hoping that hunters will self-police this program and take down those hunting tag numbers of individuals who abuse the program.

We have to admit that this is not a new idea to us. There have been three programs instituted in Michigan embracing these principles. You may recall the Williamston Plan, established in 1929, which was completely voluntary on both hunter and farmer. The state also had federal monies for these purposes through two other programs which are no longer in existence due to a lack of funds.

We think this program will benefit everyone concerned. The hunter now is beset by many other hunters on state land and the farmers are beset by hunters entering their land because of the shortage of good hunting land. It will provide a quality hunting experience while giving the farmer more control over those individuals who enter their property.

And finally, probably one of the most important features is that we have placed a "sunset amendment" on the bill which means that if the program doesn't fly in five years and people decide it's not worthwhile, it will self-destruct without further action by the Legislature.

Shown presenting the gun to Mrs. Lodewyk is Big Brother, Jim Klamo, and his Little Brother Robert. Robert drew the winning ticket. The gun was donated at cost to the organization by Dean Hardware. Klamo reports that people in Clinton County have reacted generously to Big Brother-Big Sister Fund raising appeals. "However, now we need another kind of support," Klamo said. "We need volunteers...we need people who want to become a Big Brother or Big Sister." Klamo and Robert are the first match made in Clinton County.

Under new management concept

Twp. Police list performance goals

Management by Objectives. It's a new concept in getting a job done, and done efficiently. The program defines what is expected for job performance. It defines a person's job and establishes communication between supervisor and subordinate.

The DeWitt Township Police department took on the MBO project a year and a half ago. They are developing the pilot program, to fit the department's needs and to establish goals.

This is a federally funded program, through the combined efforts of the DeWitt Township police, the Michigan Law Enforcement Training Program, and the Personnel Service department, of Michigan State University.

According to William Swartz, acting police chief, it will be three to five years before the department will be comfortable with the finished project.

Swartz explained it as the same principle as a factory worker doing piece work.

"The worker knows ahead of time what is expected of him," Swartz began. "He knows that if he puts out 15 pieces a day he is doing a poor job, 20 a fair job, 25 a good job, and 30, an excellent

job. He doesn't need to be told he is doing a good job, or ask for a raise. He knows what he is doing and how it compares with the company's standards. He knows where he stands."

This is how the DeWitt Police department hopes to operate in the near future.

"In the long run it will provide a more exact definition of responsibilities from the top to the bottom," the acting chief surmised.

"It will enable the men to approach their responsibilities in a realistic manner. We want to get away from the old idea of management by crisis."

He said the department also wants to get away from

increased activity and concentrate on getting results.

Outlined are eight main organizational goals. A few of them are: to minimize crime; prosecution of people who commit crimes; provide emergency services; assist those who can't assist themselves; recover stolen or lost property; provide a feeling of confidence for the people of the township through the actions of the police force, and to assure the people they are receiving quality service.

Hopefully the police officer will have a better understanding of his job through MBO and will be

able to provide safety, service, and emergency aid to those who need it.

Although this is a pilot program, Swartz commented that other agencies are giving serious consideration to the idea since DeWitt Township started its studies of MBO.

"A lot is going to rest on our success with the program and with the success of our sister city, Grand Blanc," he said.

"I believe in this program 100 percent," Swartz asserted. "It works in other areas, so why not in the police department?"

During the next couple of weeks patrolmen on the DeWitt force will be receiving their outlines.

"They will have input as to what they think is reasonable," he said.

Evaluation is the performance plan. That is the key to the whole program.

"People have to know if they are doing a good job or not," Swartz said. "It's good for their morale and it provides an incentive. This is what the MBO program sets out to accomplish," he concluded.

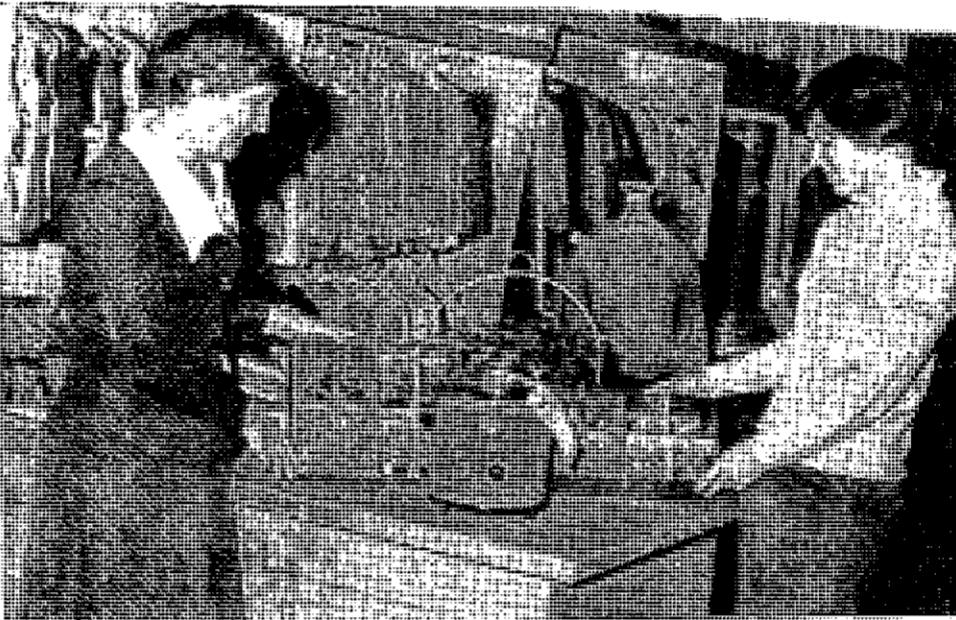

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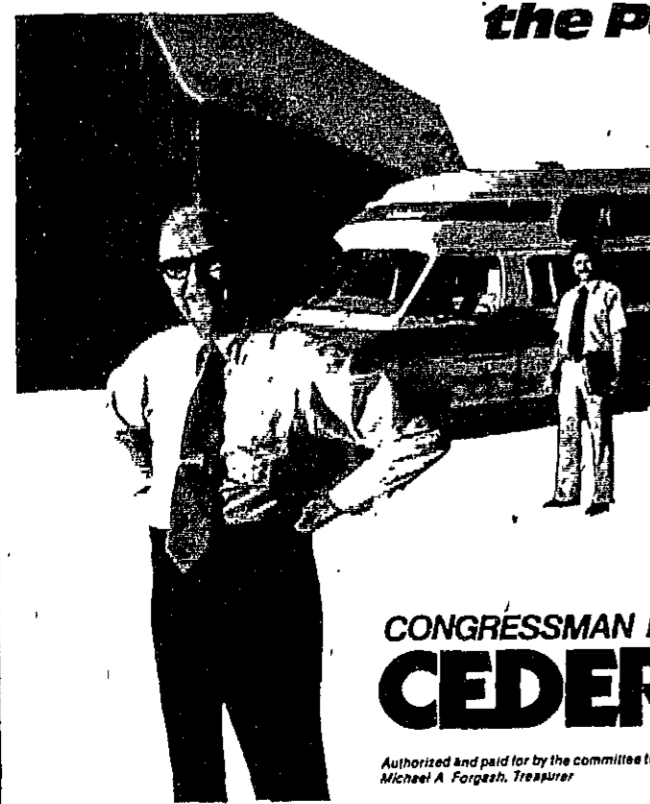

All the food items exhibited were delicious, as the people attending the program were able to sample the different items. The recipes for these different food items will be available later this month from the Extension Office.

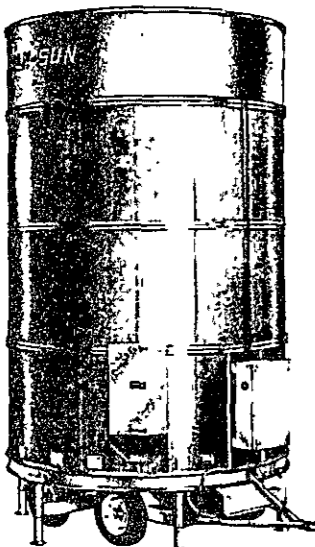
Seeds for the pumpkins and sunflowers were provided free to the members last spring through the Men's Garden Club of America at Des Moines, Iowa.

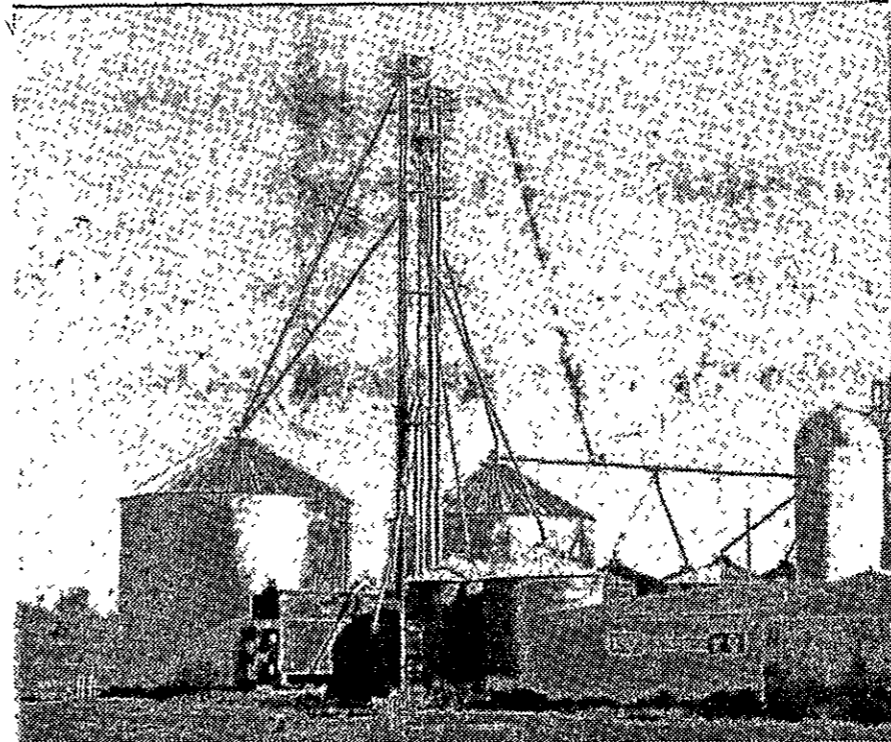

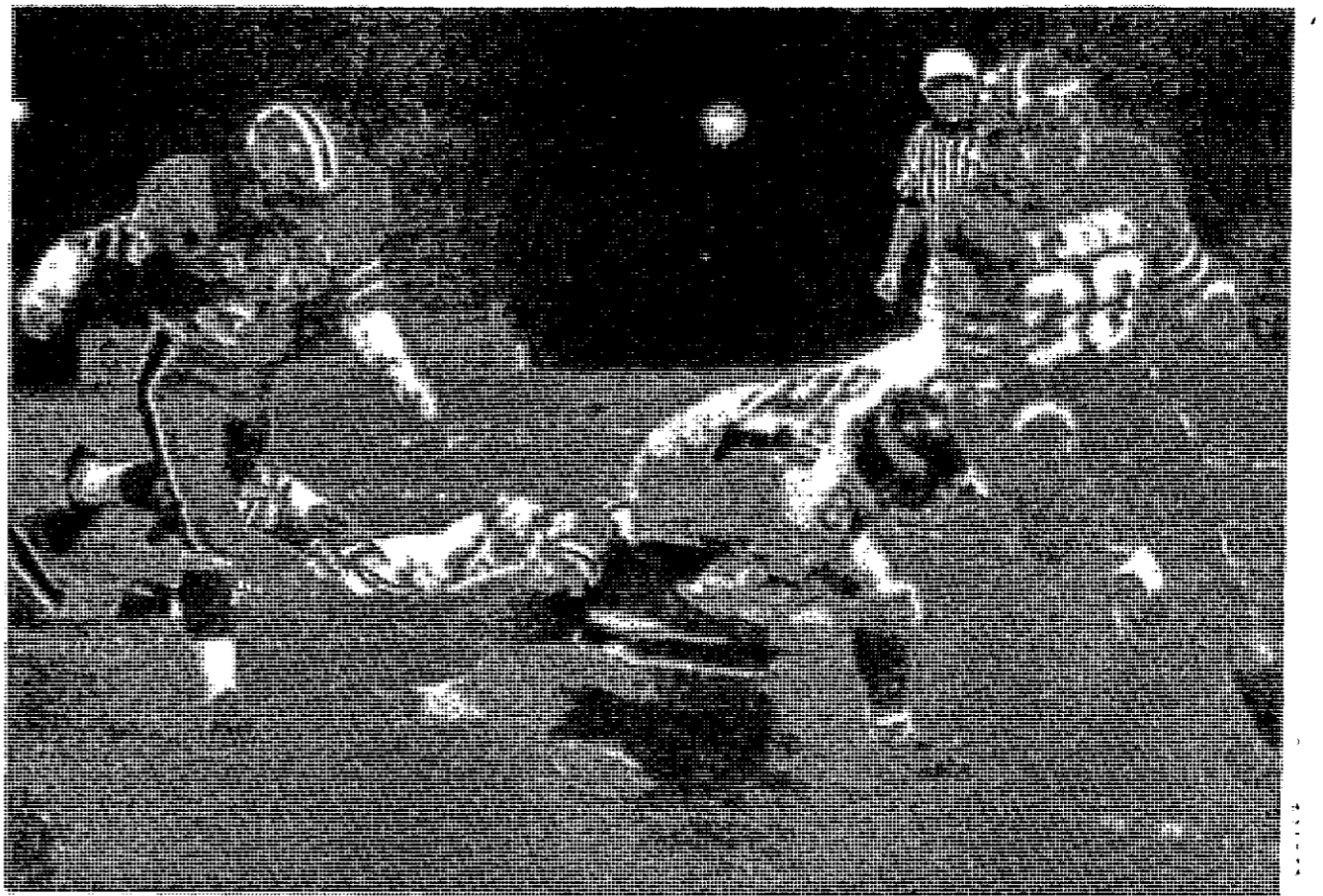

Both teams fumbled once, losing each time to the other. In the first downs department, St. Johns accounted for 14 to the Vikings' 13.

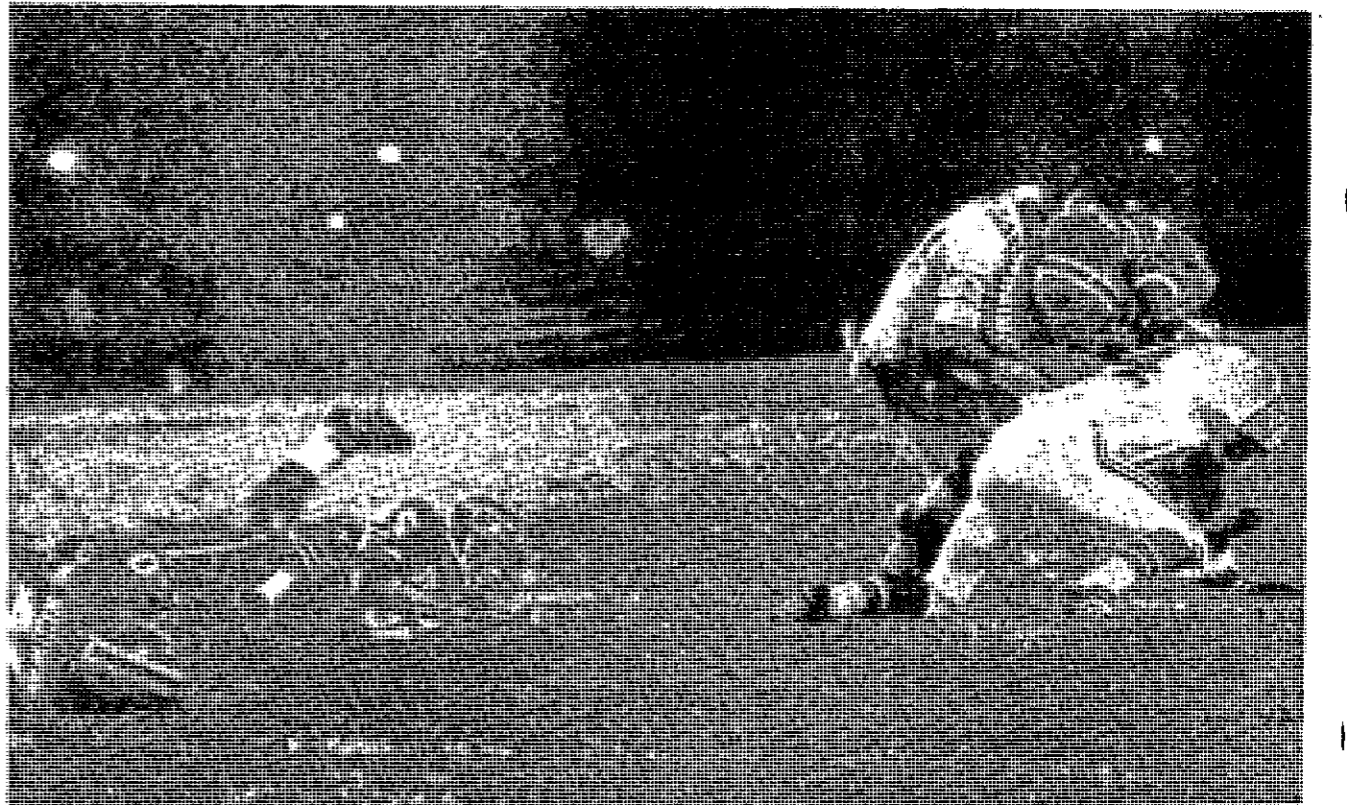

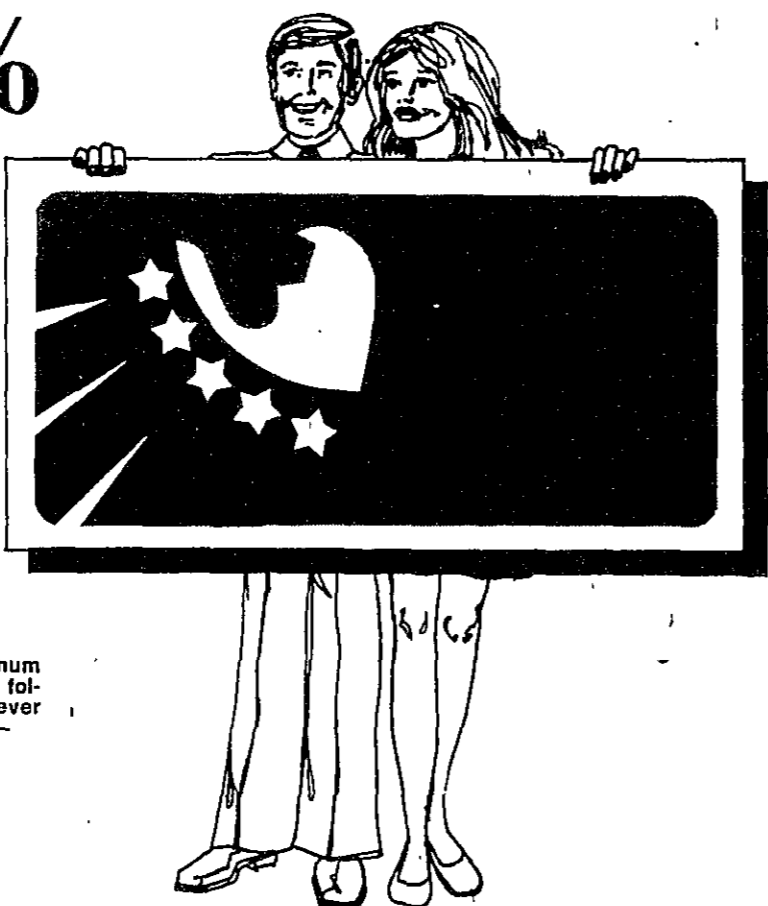

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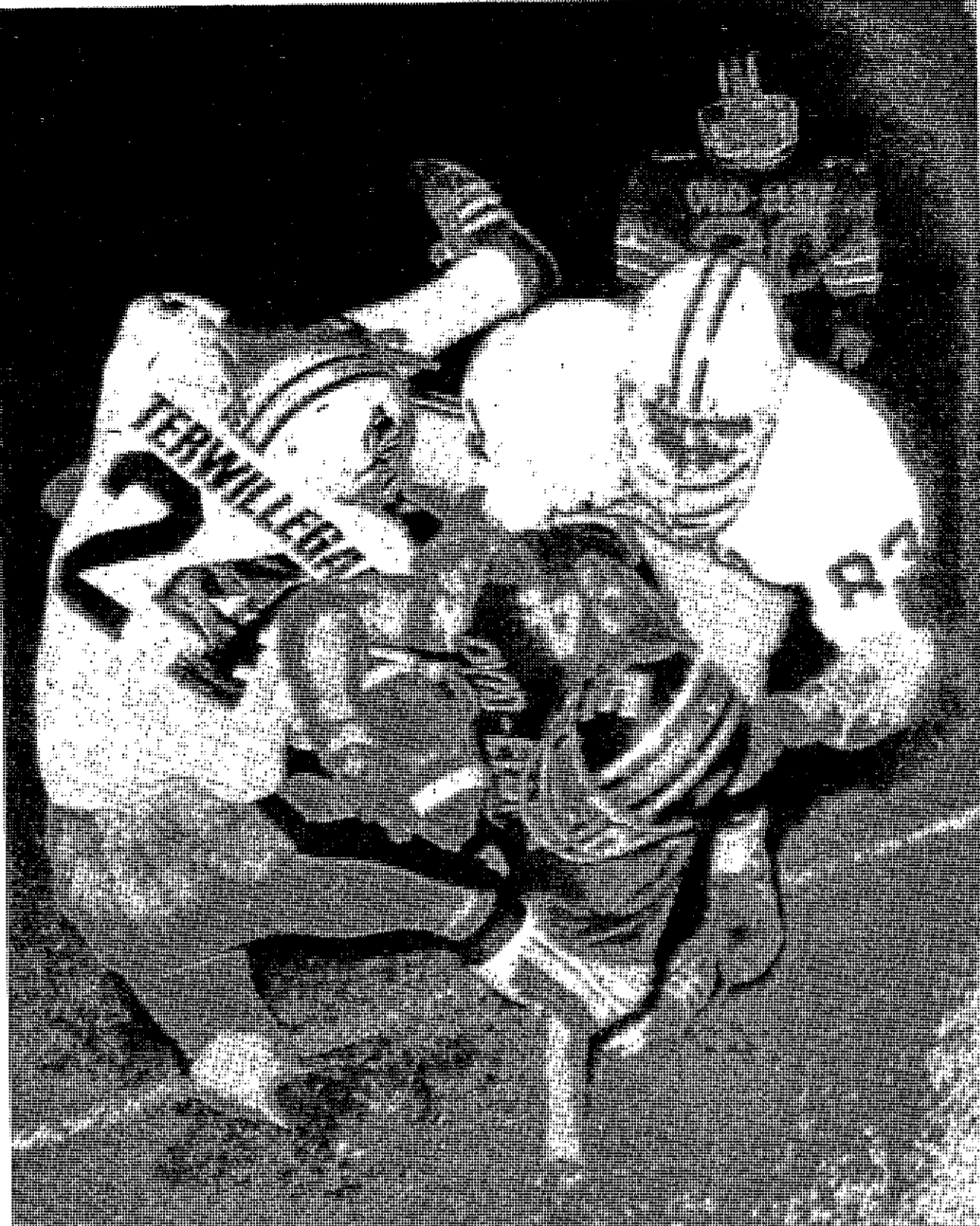

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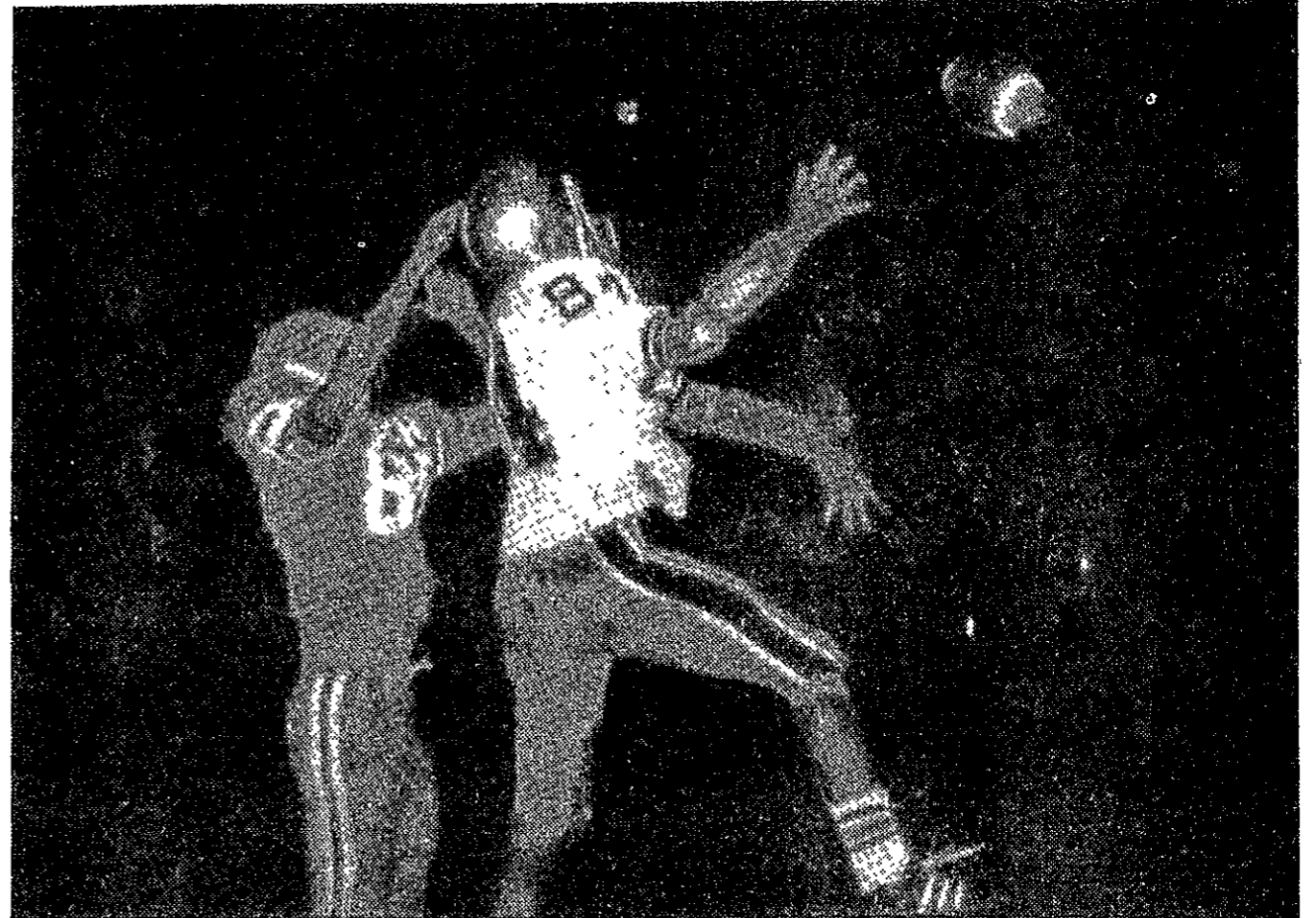

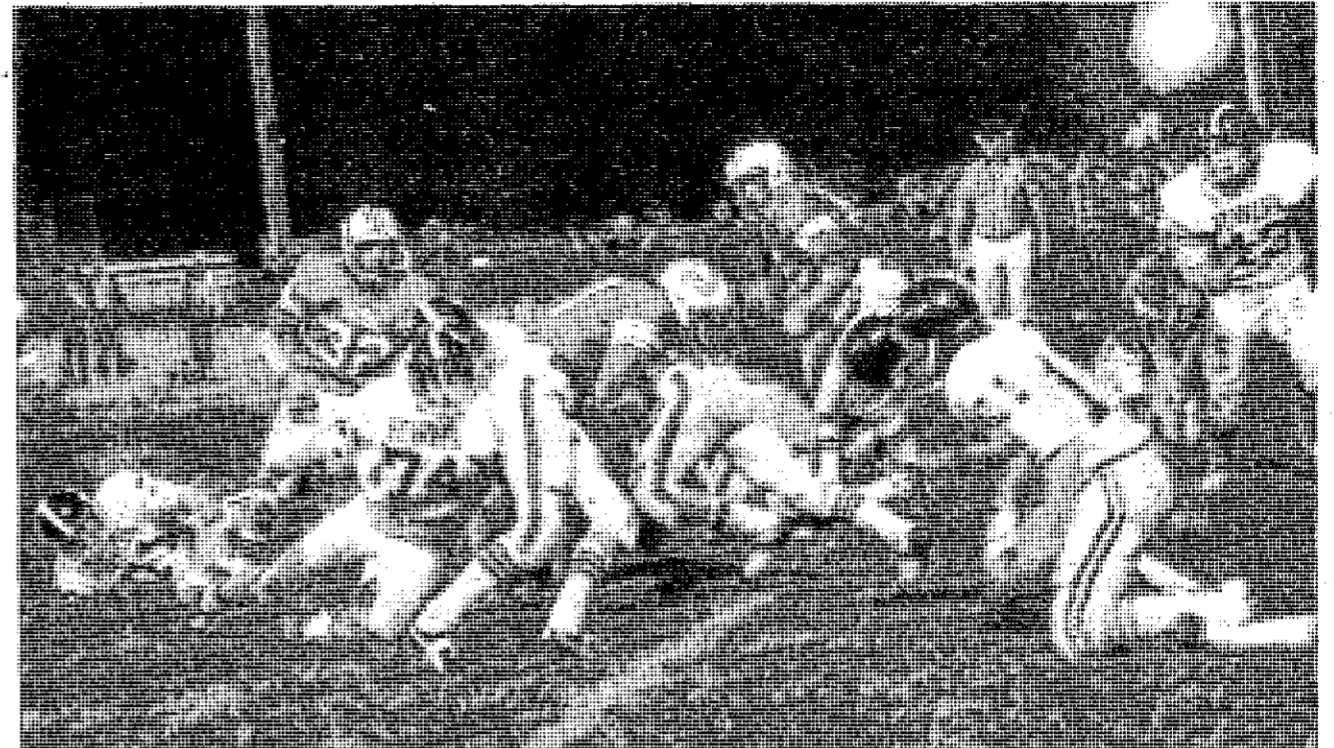

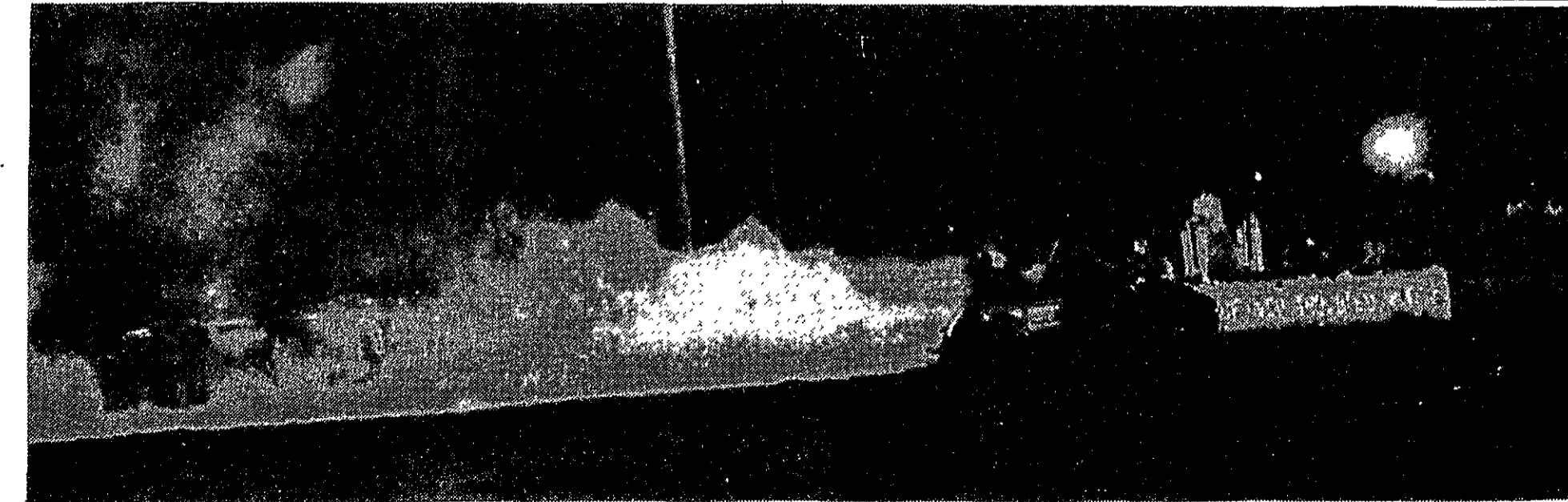
