Police hold Elsie man on murder charge

Charge Elsie man with murder.

ST JOHNS - Rex Alva Teferthiller, 53, of Elsie demanded examination in District Court Monday after being charged with 2d degree murder in connection with the death of his former wife, Mrs. Betty Lee Teferthiller, 49, of Elsie.

Her body was discovered Sunday morning at her 654 S. Ovid St. Elsie address by her son Jim, 20, of the same address.

The Clinton County Sheriff's Dept and the Elsie Police Dept investigated the death

and, subsequently, arrested the divorced husband.

Report cause of death was apparent strangulation.

Preliminary examination will be Oct 23 at 1:30 pm.

Drugs, money stolen from DeWitt pharmacy

DEWITT - The DeWitt Pharmacy was broken into late Monday night or early Tuesday morning and approximately \$1000 worth of drugs was reported stolen.

DeWitt Police Chief Wendell Myers said

the pharmacy was broken into between midnight and 1:30 am and was reported by a citizen who noticed the damaged door, where entry was gained.

The rear door was ripped open and 4 locks were forced to gain entry.

In addition to the drugs, \$450 in cash, a \$400 scale used to weigh drugs and small change was reported stolen.

DeWitt Police are investigating the incident.

DeWitt mayor names new committee members

DEWITT - Murl Eastman, DeWitt mayor, announced his committee appointments at the Monday night meeting of the council. Appointed to the salary and personnel committee are Dale Bohn, chairman, Bill Droin and Gary Gillespie.

Keith Blizzard was appointed chairman of the budget and finance committee. Serving with him are Gary Gillespie and Frederick (Bill) Shaver.

Art Newman heads the public works committee with Shaver and Blizzard serving with him.

Blizzard is also chairman of the Police board. Serving on the board are Councilmen Bill Droin and Ted Ward, a non-council member.

Shaver heads the fire board and serving on the board are Bohn and non-council member Thomas Jensen.

Droin was named chairman of the parks and recreation committee and Bohn serves with him on that committee.

Gillespie, chairman, and Newman serve on the sewer committee.

In other council action Monday night, the council also agreed to have the city attorney, Dan Matson, study the snowmobile ordinance.

Members of a snowmobile association were present at the meeting to request the city study the possibility of opening some streets to snowmobiles so that owners of the machines can reach out-of-town snowmobile areas.

Bath trustees approve budget

BATH TWP - The Bath Twp Board of Trustees Tuesday night approved the proposed budget for 1974 totaling revenue and expenditures of \$13,848,251, approximately \$1 million more than last year's budget.

New expenditures in the budget include \$31,000 to be paid for oversized DeWitt Twp sewer lines that will accommodate hook-ups in the future by Bath Twp and a \$7000 increase in the police department which can be used to finance the hiring of an additional patrolman in that department.

Roy Vansickle, Bath Twp supervisor, explained that available extra funds will be used for road improvements.

He said, in part of a statement accompanying the budget, "... we are, as in

the past 4 years, again proposing all extra available funds for road improvements. This expenditure is beginning to show itself

in some improved roads in our township, but we all realize, I'm sure, that we have a long way yet to go."

Another election was held to include that portion of the ballot and 529 persons turned out with "yes" votes and 323 voting "no" The previous election passed 522-389.

Stands mute on manslaughter charge

ST JOHNS - Elizabeth Pearl, 35, 120 S. 8th St, Lansing, stood mute Monday in Circuit Court on a charge of manslaughter and will stand trial.

Jon Newman, Clinton County prosecutor, cited the charges of "unlawfully operating a

vehicle in a reckless and wanton manner" and he said she was believed to have consumed alcohol and marijuana prior to the accident at the corner of US-27 and Cutler Rd, April 8, which claimed the life of another driver.

DeWitt twp adopts Land Use Plan

DEWITT TWP - A Comprehensive Development Plan was adopted by the DeWitt Township Board Oct 9. The plan is designed to guide township growth to the year 2000. Board action Tuesday night followed the plan's adoption by the DeWitt Township Planning Commission. Prior to adoption by the planning commission, a series of public information meetings and a public hearing were held. Next, the Clinton County Planning Commission will consider incorporating the plan into the Clinton County Land Use Plan. The plan considers potential land use to the year 2000, and contains a series of policies for

each major land use activity. There are 8 land use categories: low, medium, and high density residential, commercial, industrial, institutional, park and open space, and agricultural. Present and future capabilities of community facilities such as schools, utilities, parks, police, and fire protection were all taken into consideration in the plan development. Also taken into account was the construction of federal interstate highway I-69. In addition, the adopted plan seeks to preserve agricultural lands. All of these interrelationships and many others were analyzed and meshed together in the formulation of the Township's

Land Use Plan. Adoption of the plan culminated a fifteen month effort by the DeWitt Township

Planning Commission with the assistance of the Tri-County Regional Planning Commission.

Schools receive money

The State Department of Education has furnished State Representative Stanley M. Powell of Ionia with a list of state aid payments which were scheduled to be distributed on Oct 1 to the 30 school districts which serve citizens of the 88th Legislative District. This is one of 6 payments which are sent to the local districts from Lansing in the course of a year. The figures also give the total remitted to these districts since the last report under Titles 1 and 3 of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965 and the Vocational Education Act of 1963 (Federal programs). Figures for the districts in Clinton County are: DeWitt Public Schools — State Aid 189,080; Fowler Public Schools — State Aid 81,490, Title 1 4,687; Bath Community Schools — 167,770, VE 1963 2,435; Ovid-Elsie Area Schools — State Aid 252,190; Pewamo-Westphalia Comm S D — State Aid 92,050; St Johns Public

Schools — 418,740, VE 1963 21,199.

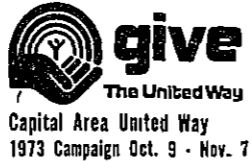
A \$1 donation will be taken with proceeds going to a special fund for underprivileged children.

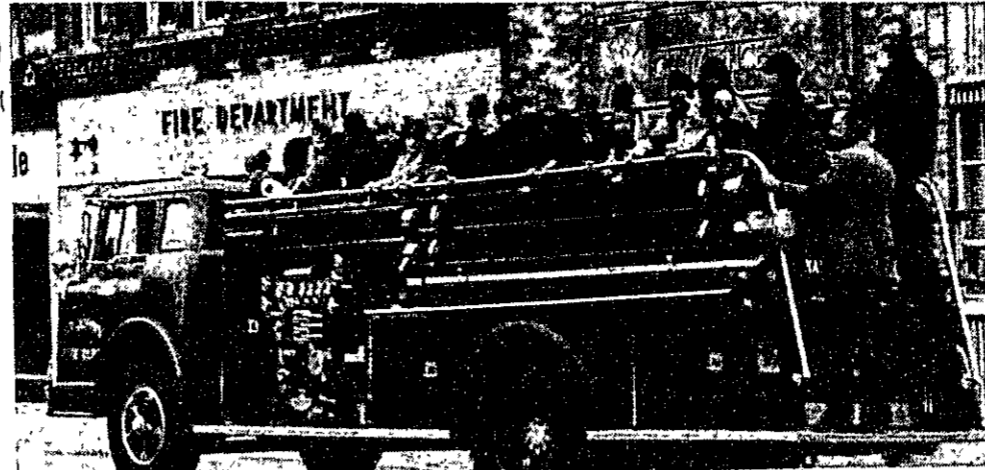

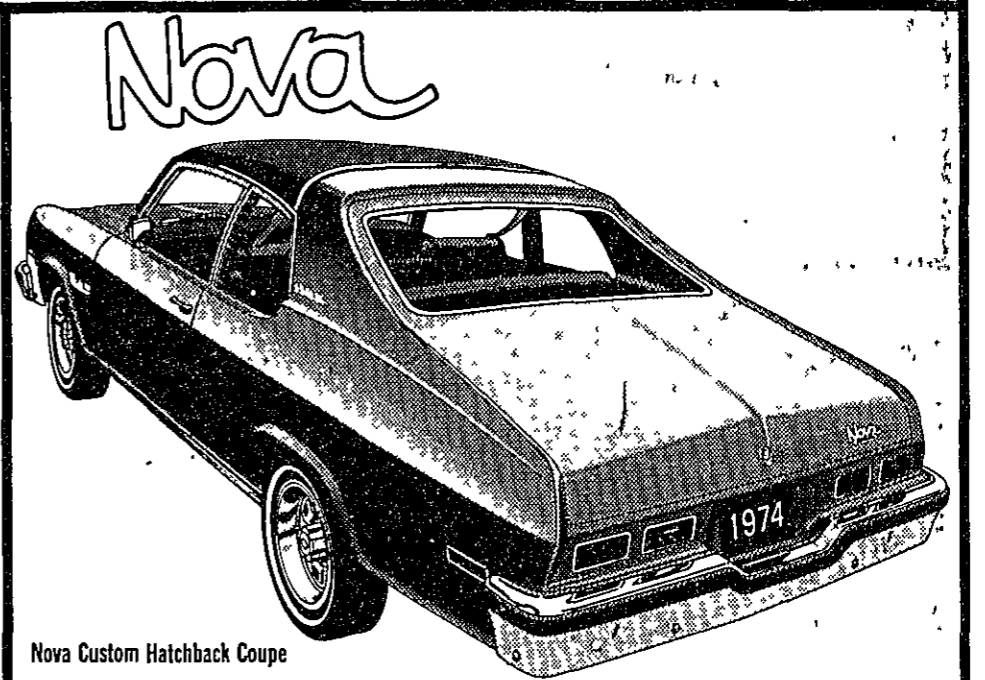

recovered the ball and raced 54 yards along the sideline before being tackled.

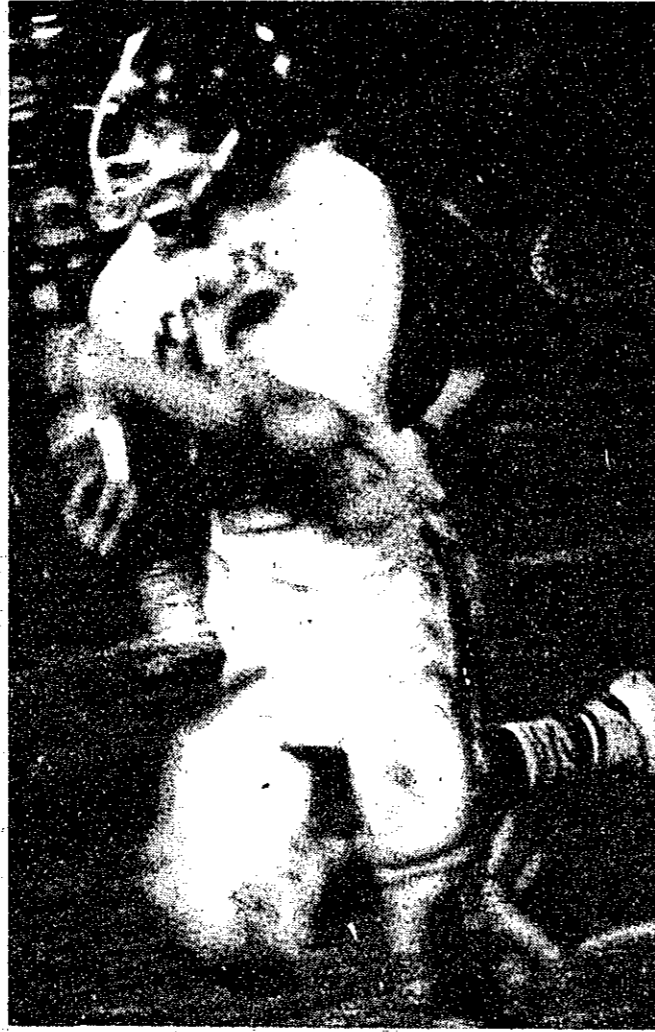
THE THREAT was short lived, however, when Lee Feldpausch intercepted to give the ball back to the Eagles.

Both coaches Roger DePaape and John Wilcox commended the play of the offensive linemen in the game and throughout the season.

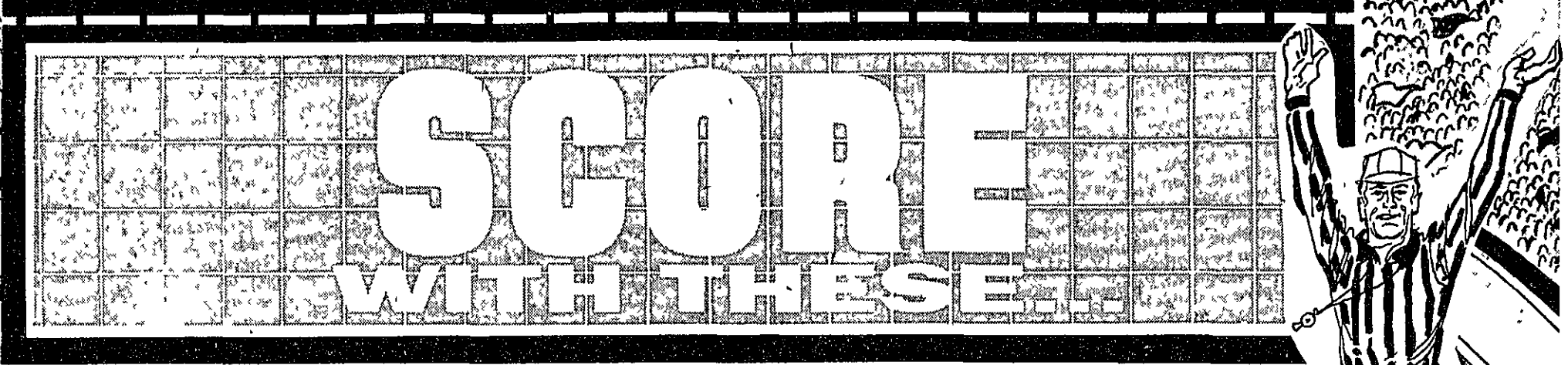

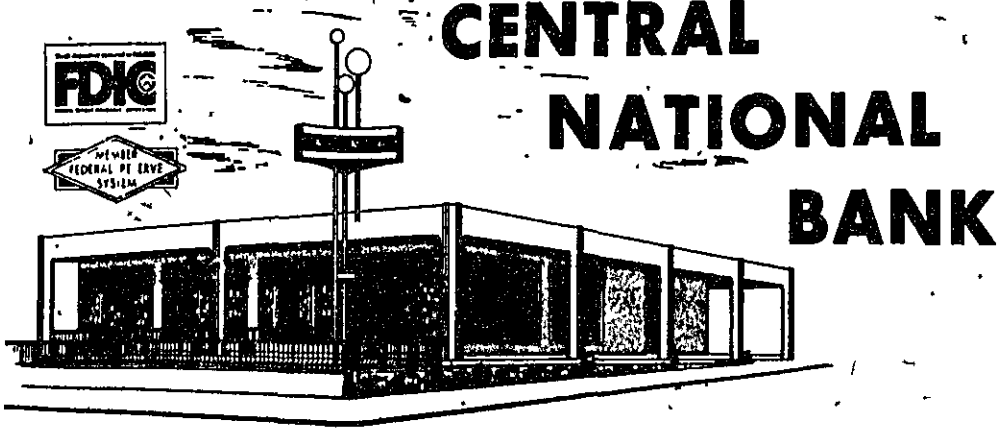

It seems all 3 television networks are programming under a system I call the IGBADLPORPTPD.

There's a new doctor show on now with the reverse twist of McCloud. In this case, it's a big

deal New York City doctor who decides to try his bedside manner in the wide open spaces of the western USA. Yawn.

With all the police running around the tube, it's only natural they have an equal number of lawyers to defend all the people caught by all the police.

If you've seen 1 television lawyer taking on impossible odds to win his client's case, you've seen them all. However, the newest addition is Jimmy Stewart playing a "poor old country boy" lawyer. If he winds up in competition for an Emmy Award, he might get beaten by Sam Ervin. Nothing against Jimmy Stewart, - he's a fine actor. But scripts full of "aw shucks," "hold on just a minute" etc seem to make commercials a welcome break.

Besides the doctor program mentioned a couple of paragraphs above, there's not much I can say about the doctor shows - I stopped watching 2 years ago. But, after a refresher course in watching doctor shows last week, I find that 3 things should classify them as fairy tales - they all make house calls, none seemed to be married and their female patients are never homely.

How about a program with McCloud running around yelling, "Mr Dillon, Mr Dillon, there's an ugly old lady private eye who says she has to speak to you right away. She says Columbo accused her of killing Dr Welby because he wouldn't make a house call and Perry Mason won't take her case cause he's pretty sure he can't win."

statement of the federal school lunch program, world free trade, lifting of import restrictions on imports of foreign oil, early completion of the Alaskan pipeline, land usage, enforcement of existing laws requiring adequate muffler systems on all motorized vehicles and a resolution from the floor called for the repeal of the 1970 Occupation Safety and Health Act, which was accepted.

The members also asked for state tax credit legislation for non highway users, deepening of the Saginaw River to accommodate ocean going vessels, and a return to the Central Time Zone for Michigan.

The Bureau commended 4-H and other youth in the county for their trash pickup on roadsides, and passed a resolution urging the disbanding of the Building Authority appointed to study a proposed new building for county offices.

It is suggested that a building proposal be called for by a vote of the people as to whether a new courthouse be built.

The members voiced their approval of Agricultural Secretary Butz support for the American farmers and his stand in helping them get their "fair portion of the national economy." A unanimous ovation was given after the reading of a resolution thanking the 1973 membership team and especially co-chairmen Bill and Judy Kissane.

The delegation also voted to renew the corporate status of the County Farm Bureau but turned down 2 proposals to change the terms of County Road Commissioners from 6 to 3 years with a total of 6 years allowed in succession and to make this an elective office.

Elected to the board of directors were Bill Kissane representing Bingham - Olive

District and Jack Anderson for Essex-Lebanon. Also named to the board was new Young Farmer Chairman Mike Borton of Watertown township. Bill Kissane replaced his brother Bob, and Anderson will replace Dennis Phillips. Both of these had served the allowed 2-3 year terms.

A highlight of the evening was the crowning of the 1973 Farm Bureau Queen, Miss Becky Gibson. She is the daughter of Mr and Mrs Melvin Gibson of DeWitt and a senior at St Johns High School. She competed for queen with 7 other contestants who were Miss Ruth Fox, named runner up, Janet Davis, Agie Rademacher, Sharon Wood, Crystal Rhynard, Kathy Moore and Ellen Feldpausch.

Last year's queen Miss Connie Burnham was on hand to participate in the ceremony and the announcement of the winner was made by Young Farmer Chairman Tom Benson.

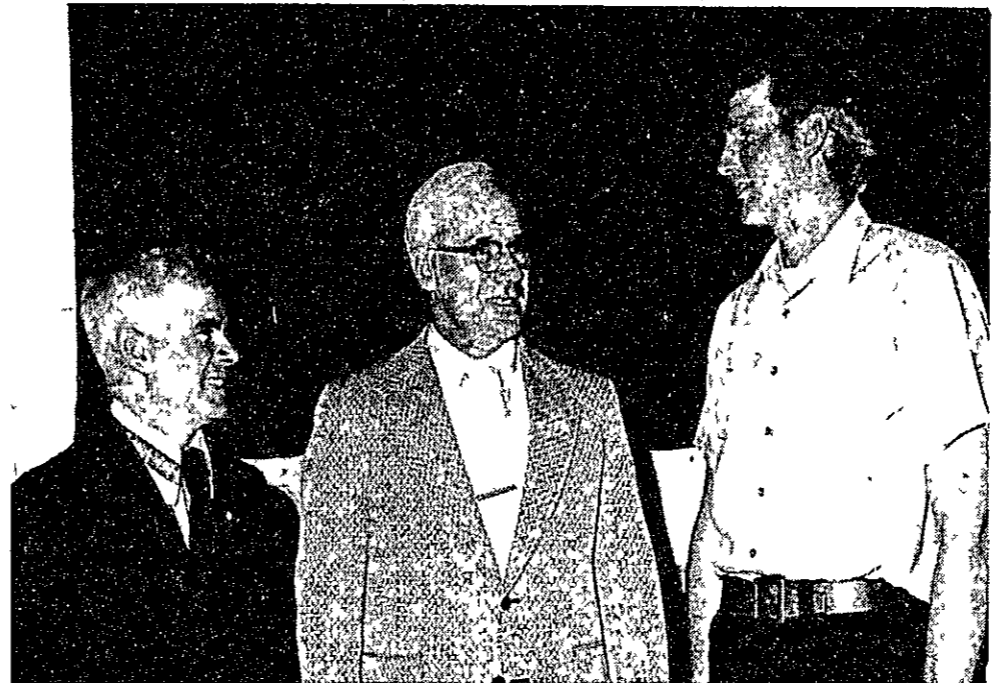
Miss Burnham sang several songs to her own guitar accompaniment. Judges in the queen contest were Mrs Ed Idzkowski, Mrs Melvin Warren and Mrs Virgil Zeb. The new queen will represent the County Farm Bureau in the state competition Dec 13 in Grand Rapids and the 1973 State Farm Bureau Queen will attend the National Convention in Atlantic City in January.

Other business included approval of the list of delegates to state annual meeting, a vote to seat Mrs Donald Swagart as a member of the board of director representing Farm Bureau Women, reports by David Morris District 5 Director on the State Farm Bureau board and Winston Ingalls Regional Representative from the Michigan Farm Bureau.

Winners of the table centerpiece contest were Maple River Group 1st, Clark Chandler, 2nd for originality, and Happy Hix 1st and Jason Center 2nd for beauty. Cash awards were given to the following groups for 100% membership renewal by January 1, 1973; Friendly Fringe Farmers, Friendly Farmers, Jason Center, Maple Valley, Parker Center, Prairie and Sleepy Hollow.

Door prizes were won by Ivah Kleuckling, Ilah Rose, Eileen Gillespie, Leon Schmitt, Judy Kissane and Levi Blakeslee.

Entertainment at the meeting was furnished by Jim Carl, of Lansing who sang songs from Camelot and Fiddler on the Roof. He was accompanied by Mrs Rhonda Hamblen of St Johns. Carl also sang the Lord's Prayer as an invocation. He is District Life Marketing Director for Farm Bureau Insurance Company in the John Lynch District.

"If It Fitz . . . Hunters vs Harvesters

During the next war, the casualty lists should be written by the guy currently in charge of euphemisms for the Mich Dept of Natural Resources (DNR).

It wouldn't be necessary for grieving parents to explain the empty seat at the dinner table by using such raw words as: "Johnny was drafted and killed."

Instead, they could say: "Johnny was put and took."

THAT HAS A FLIP, even charming ring to it. Nothing bloody. To an uninformed guest, it could sound as if Johnny might show up in time for dessert. No sense giving anyone indignation by saying something indelicate, such as: "Johnny is as dead as that pheasant you just ate."

Pheasants are what turned me on this week. The DNR has begun a new program in which pheasants are bred at a hatchery and then trucked to game areas and freed to be shot by eager hunters.

The DNR calls this the "put-and-take hunting season."

According to the DNR, a hunter never kills a bird or a deer. He "harvests" it. The well-dressed hunter should wear bib-top overalls, carry a pitchfork and drive an Allis-Chalmers tractor. Back on the farm, the hired man is shooting wheat.

WHERE I LIVE, the put-and-take season got off to a rousing start. On Friday, 250 pheasants arrived by truck. (No hunting is allowed on Fridays, for fear the hunters will shoot at the truck as it crosses the city limits.) The birds were released in a designated hunting area the size of a

few city blocks. On Saturday and Sunday, the DNR reported 3500 hunters came after the 250 pheasants.

The hunters didn't have much room for maneuvering. They had to advance on the enemy in lock-step, after practicing close-order drill in the parking lot. Each pheasant was offered a cigaret and blindfold. Not a bird escaped. Thus the brave hunters were able to secure the area until next weekend when another invasion of pheasants will surely be fought off, no matter how high the cost.

One of the hunters took exception to my cynical attitude (I had asked him if nuclear weapons were allowed on Sunday). "The birds are bred to be shot," he explained. "It's a sport. It gets a man out into the woods and fresh air and gives him a chance to breathe and improve his marksmanship."

Oh sure. Put down that gun. I'm not really dumb enough to equate a pheasant with Johnny Soldier. I was just funning around. Pheasants aren't human beings. They are dumb animals, so why not breed them for no other reason than to shoot them?

EXCEPT A cock pheasant is about the prettiest bird you'll ever see fly across a country road. And I keep wondering if something in a bird's head doesn't think: "Hey, that hurts!" when a hunk of lead tears through its wing. I even wonder if a luckier pheasant feels bad, maybe mourns a little, when his buddy is blasted out of the sky.

Isn't that silly? Human beings should be too smart to think dumb things like that. As any red-blooded harvester will tell you, I should be put and took.

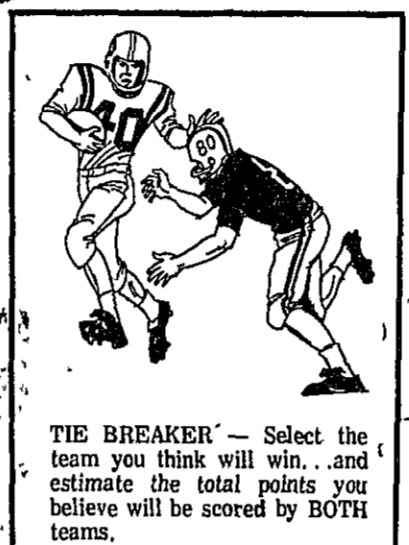

purchase. Anyone is welcome to attend the show and sale.

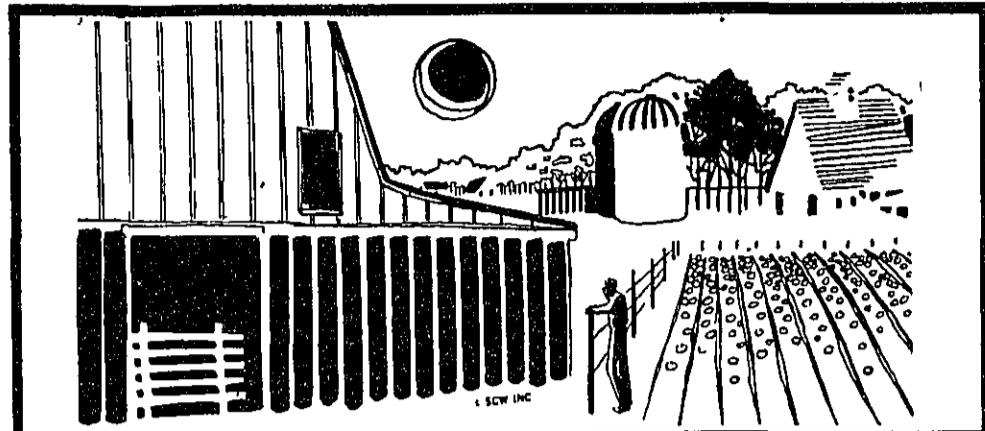
