The Statistical data in this report came primarily from information Maintained by the Department's Administration Division, Central Dispatch and the Michigan State Police.



YEAR IN REVIEW

2007

- Developed and proposed a law enforcement model as part of the safe county initiative to address school safety issues and response plans for all schools within Clinton County.
- Completed the plan for implementing the new operating procedures for the Special Rescue Team.
- Worked with Central Dispatch Director to implement a new paging system for Law Enforcement agencies and other Governmental Units.
- Worked with other County Departments to implement the new record management system with OSSI.
- Developed new jail housing agreements with Kalamazoo County and Statewide Security Transport. Maintained housing agreements with U.S. Marshall's and State Department of Corrections.
- Delivered in-service training modules for all volunteer support groups.

OFFICE OF CLINTON COUNTY SHERIFF

2008 GOALS

- Maintain existing housing agreements and contracts for Clinton County Jail.
- Increase the number of participants in the Cognitive Behavioral Class both in the jail and out in the community by working with the Judges and Probation Officers. This would promote and/or require attendance in the classes, as well as re-assess the evaluating criteria for the inmates to be able to participate.
- Create and maintain a stronger more involved Community Corrections Advisory Board to include more members and cover a variety of issues that have immediate and long-term beneficial effects on the Community Corrections 511 Program.
- Continue the development of expertise in Computer Forensic Analysis involving internet crimes.
- Deliver high quality in-service core training programs for Sheriff Office employees.
- Make certain that all First Responders of the Clinton County Sheriff's Office are trained in ICS 100 and 700 to meet the federal requirement for Federal grant money.

VICTIM SUPPORT TEAM

The Victim Support Team is a group of dedicated volunteers trained to assist Police Officers in dealing with victims to provide immediate crisis intervention in the event of sudden, unexpected death that occurs due to car crash, suicide, fire, homicide, illness, drowning, or other traumatic incidents. The Advocates strive to offer comfort, compassionate support and sympathy to the surviving family members.

In 2007 the Clinton County Sheriff's Office along with the Michigan Sheriff's Assoc hosted a training session for new Victim Support Team members. Through this training the CCSO was able to add 13 members. Each new member spent 20-hours over a weekend to learn how to lend support to the victims of violent crimes and also assist families during the initial crisis. They are available 24 hours a day to assist police agencies within Clinton County. The team is responsible for their program costs including cellular phones, pagers and vehicle expense. They receive minimal financial support from the County. The team meets on a monthly basis and is supported by a Liaison Officer from the Sheriff's Office assigned to address training needs, operational evaluation and other organizational concerns.

SHERIFF'S POSSE
(Mounted Division)

The Mounted Division is a volunteer organization with prime responsibility to support Clinton Counties Law Enforcement effort through the Sheriff's Office. The role of the Mounted Division continues to evolve into a direct support function with the primary focus on supporting the Clinton County Emergency Management Plan.

Over the past year, the Mounted Division was called on to assist with search efforts on two high profile homicide cases. The Ricky Holland case in Ingham County and the Hefton double homicide case in Clinton County

The Mounted Division also played a critical role in maintaining peace and order at the National Socialist Movement Rally at the State Capital. For their outstanding work they received a First District Commendation from the Michigan State Police, along with a Commendation from Congressman Mike Rogers, and a letter of appreciation from Lansing Police Chief Mark Alley.

In 2007, 27 members of the Mounted Division were involved in 43 events. The Mounted Division volunteered over 3,507 hours of service working foot patrol, horse patrol, searches, training and administrative hours that included a monthly meeting of the membership.



CLINTON SPECIAL RESCUE TEAM

The Clinton County Special Rescue Team (SRT) had a roster of 38 personnel for 2007. Vacancies were filled in the following command positions: Captain Jim Blemaster, Lieutenant Tom Lewis, and Sergeant Larry St. George.

The SRT responded to 4 call outs for the year:

- Lost elderly hunter in the Hubbardston State Game Area. Land and water resources were implemented, as well as an air search performed by the civil air patrol. The subject was located and was uninjured.
- Lost mentally challenged 15-year old at night. Land based search with K9 was performed. The subject walked out to a perimeter unit that was broadcasting over the PA. The subject had minor scratches.
- Subject that had fled police in Ovid and entered the river. A river search was conducted with negative results. Subject was later apprehended.
- Vehicle recovery from Maple River. Swimmers located a vehicle, the URRU responded and assisted the wrecker in the recovery. The vehicle was determined to have been stolen 9 years prior.

LAND SEARCH AND RESCUE:

The SAR unit held a drill at the Sleepy Hollow State Park. Land tracking techniques were used, as well as the GPS units. Lieutenant Lewis conducted a class on the proper equipment to be carried by personnel.

UNDERWATER RESCUE AND RECOVERY UNIT:

The URRU personnel were able to purchase two wireless communication units, along with an additional 1000 lb and 300 lb lift bags. Commander Harman was invited to attend a weeklong training with the MSU URU. Topics of training were ice diving diver rescue procedures, equipment maintenance and the use of the underwater remote operated vehicle.

The UDDR added one diver to the unit. Training and equipment issues are being handled, as funds are available.

ICE RESUCE:

Commander Harman taught a certification class along with a re-certification class in 2007.

CONFINED SPACE RESCUE:

The SRT conducted a drill at the Michigan Milk Plant in Ovid. A safety consultant from Pittsburg, PA observed the drill. He was very impressed by the team.

The SRT went through a period where some of the personnel were lacking dedication. Some personnel did not return to the team for 2008, but the personnel that did are motivated and want to strive to achieve greatness. A yearlong training schedule was made. Personnel are trained on a monthly basis, as well as a quarterly drill day.

GOALS FOR 2008 CLINTON COUNTY SPECIAL RESCUE TEAM

- Implement the new paging system
- Implement back up for the paging system
- Recruit additional personnel for the team
- Complete certification class for ice rescue
- Complete re-certification class for personnel trained in ice rescue
- Send 2-3 personnel of underwater rescue/recovery unit to dive rescue 1 class
- Mutual aid training with other underwater rescue/recovery teams
- Complete class in confined space rescue for untrained personnel
- Complete refresher class in confined space rescue
- Fill the vacancy of the Haz-Mat unit leader
- Bring the Haz-Mat unit on-line to operations level
- Train new personnel in land search and rescue techniques
- Train in multiple disciplines with the Metro Team



CLINTON COUNTY COMMUNITY CORRECTIONS

2007

Clinton County has participated in Michigan's Community Corrections Act (*Public Act 511 of 1988*) since 1990. The key objective of this Act is to provide participating counties with funding and resources. The funding and resources are intended to reduce prison commitment rates of felons who do not have a history of assault and have not demonstrated a pattern of violent behavior, improve the functionality of local jails and to decrease recidivism among offenders.

A fundamental goal of Clinton County's Community Corrections efforts and activities is to reduce the amount of jail time served by eligible offenders. The two primary methods used to reach this purpose are as follows: 1) Earned release, which is accomplished through participation in jail-based programs such as, Community Service Work, Cognitive Thinking Classes and Substance Abuse Treatment, and 2) Alternative placements, typically through placement in residential substance abuse treatment.

The guiding principle of the Community Corrections Act and the Clinton County Community Corrections Program is to maintain public safety while providing offenders with rehabilitative opportunities.

Significant features, highlights, activities and accomplishments of Clinton County's Community Corrections Program for the year 2007:

- ❖ The State of Michigan funded the program with a little more than \$123,000.
- ❖ This funding supported programs such as: Case Management, Community Service Work, Substance Abuse Assessment and Treatment, Cognitive Thinking Classes and Inpatient Substance Abuse Treatment.
- ❖ This year saw an increase from 3 Cognitive Thinking classes a week to 5 classes a week, both in the jail and out in the community.
- ❖ A total of 243 local offenders participated in the Community Corrections Program.
- ❖ 4,529 bed days were saved by offender participation in earn-release and/or alternative placement programming.
- ❖ From the saved bed days alone, the Community Corrections Program saved the county approximately \$136,000.
- ❖ Reducing the number of jail bed days served by local inmates made it possible to rent more jail beds to other counties and jurisdictions. These bed rentals produced more than \$1,228,033 for the Clinton County General Fund during the year.

- ❖ The Community Service Work Program provided more than 16,000 hours of trustee labor to various governmental and non-profit agencies throughout the county.
- ❖ The continuing partnership between the Community Corrections Program/Sheriff's Office and Community Mental Health provided hundreds of hours of services and enhanced the delivery of professional mental health and substance abuse assessments and treatments to jail inmates.

TRAINING

The Clinton County Sheriff's Office has in place a training program for all staff members to keep abreast of the changes taking place in the criminal justice field to enable them to perform their duties in meeting criminal justice standards and requirements.

Our three phase training program involves the following process:

1. **Sheriff's Office Core Training:** Training that is identified and developed using a Training Committee comprised of personnel from each division within the Sheriff's Office. An analysis of each job responsibility and duty is reviewed to identify the essential skills, knowledge and abilities required to perform their duties in an effective and efficient manner.
2. **Clinton County Law Enforcement Core Training:** Heads of each law enforcement agency in Clinton County working together to implement common training for the law enforcement officers in Clinton County. The concept to minimize training costs is met by utilizing trainers from each of the agencies to provide quality training, which is evaluated by the attendees and agency heads.
3. **Enhancement Training:** instructors within the Sheriff's Office cannot teach specialized training that. Additionally designated members of the Sheriff's Office are sent to courses that certify them as instructors on specific topics. Upon completion of their training they have the responsibility to provide instruction to other members of the Sheriff's Office in their area of expertise.

2007 Annual Report**

The Clinton County Office of Emergency Management enjoyed a tremendously successful year in 2007. In cooperation with our EOC staff, and our regional emergency management partners, Clinton County continues to advance the preparedness of its citizens and responders. 2007 marks the first full year under REGIONAL homeland security grant funding. Clinton County has continued to maintain strong relationships with our regional partners. In light of our efforts, Clinton County was able to receive over \$372,000 in grant funding this year, advancing our preparedness and response capabilities in this new, challenging funding environment

Goals Achieved in 2007

- Goal: Enhance the capabilities of the first responders through grant resources, maximizing existing equipment, and planning/training/exercising
 - Example: Special Operations Team (SOT) vehicle valued at over \$125,000 was purchased through regional funding.
 - Maintained the Solution Area Planner position in Clinton County with \$48,000 of regional funding.
 - Prioritized the expenditure of over \$82,000 in local Law Enforcement equipment.
 - Prioritized the expenditure of over \$61,000 in local Homeland Security specific equipment.
 - Communications and protective body armor were purchased to enhance this capability
 - Hundreds of area responders received advanced incident command training through \$10,000 of regional homeland security grant funding

- Goal: Enhance capability of EOC Staff to efficiently coordinate resources and information during a disaster or emergency.
 - Example: An EOC subcommittee developed a comprehensive standard operating procedure to efficiently manage information flow and sharing during EOC activations.
 - An EOC Support team was formed to help carry out these procedures and assist EOC Staff and responders during EOC activations.
 - Additional procedures were developed for opening the EOC, alternate EOC Operations, and support of the Modular Emergency Medical System (MEMS) and the Strategic National Stockpile (SNS)

- Goal: Enhance citizen preparedness and education
 - Example: Over \$44,000 in regional grant funding was dedicated to the www.do1thing.us preparedness program through homeland security funds and other regional partners. Clinton County is a founding partner of this program.
 - A professional media campaign was created which will include TV, radio, print media, billboards, and a web page.
 - Presentation equipment was purchased including a professional seminar display booth and an outdoor canopy tent.
 - SHSP funding will allow 250 www.do1thing.us “toolkits” to be distributed throughout Michigan to begin enlisting preparedness “partners.”

Office of Emergency Management Goals for 2008:

1. Enhance our preparedness through the performance of exercises culminating in the AIREX08 full-scale exercise in June.
 - a. Continue to provide sound exercise planning assistance to Capital City Airport.
 - b. Test existing plans and systems within the scope of the exercise program
2. Continue to advance the preparedness needs of Clinton County within the existing grant funding environment.
 - a. Focus on sustainability of existing systems
 - b. Focus on training and recurrent training to enhance and maintain responder readiness
3. Continue to maintain regional partnerships and support regional preparedness initiatives.
 - a. Support equipment and planning for a Regional Damage Assessment Team.
 - b. Continue support of regional interoperable communications enhancement efforts.
 - c. Support to support the creation of regional response plans for topics such as mass fatalities, mass casualty incidents.

CENTRAL RECORDS

Central Records has the responsibility to respond to all requests for Administrative Services for the public. They are directly responsible for registering and processing all visitors to the confined areas of the jail. **They respond to over 50,000 incoming calls to the Sheriff's Office,** respond to requests for information, process all criminal complaints, criminal histories for other agencies, compile information in the criminal records management system, fingerprint responsibilities for all CCW permits, pre-employment and firearm inspections. They provide information on a variety of subjects to the general public and perform a critical support service to the public and the Sheriff's Office.

ANIMAL CONTROL

Two full time employees with a temporary position that is assigned to work dog census during the summer months staff animal Control. Responsibilities are to enforce laws applying to dogs, kennel inspections/licenses, investigation of animal neglect and animal bites. Investigating complaints of dogs running at large, handling lost and found pets, and responding to calls of large animals running at large are also duties of the Animal Control Officers. In 2007 there were 7,589 dog licenses sold in Clinton County.

UNIFORM DIVISION

The Uniform Division is responsible for providing direct law enforcement services to all county residents. They have the primary responsibility to provide traffic enforcement on all secondary county roads, in conjunction with traffic enforcement on State highways and expressways.

In addition, they respond to all emergency calls for service, provide court security, serve civil process, transport prisoners, and conduct safety education programs, along with a variety of other enforcement responsibilities.

The deputy's continue to function as one of the most effective traffic enforcement units within the State of Michigan. During the past year, deputy's issued 12,947 traffic citations. This is the most ever issued by the Clinton County Sheriff's Office. They also arrested 236 drunk drivers, issued 875 seat belt violations and 162 subjects were arrested for possessing and selling narcotics. The Sheriff's Office Crash Investigation Team investigated 10 crashes, 7 fatal, 3 serious injuries and assisted 2 other agencies. The Clinton County Sheriff road patrol ranks in the top five for all Sheriff's Department on a consistent basis over the past several years. Five of the past eight years one of our officers was recognized as the top O.U.I.L. Enforcement Officer for Sheriff's Offices statewide.

Every Deputy has been trained in basic traffic accident investigation and we have three officers certified as traffic accident Reconstructionists. Additionally, the division has certified Laser Speed Measurement, Preliminary Breath Test, Firearm and Pressure Point Control Tactics Instruction. We have officers trained as Crime Scene Tech, Hostage Negotiators, Firearms Instructors, Laser Instructors, Defensive Tactics Instructors, PBT Instructors, CPR, A.E.D. Instructors, Taser, Pepperball Instructors and Simunition Instructors.

The deputies continue to operate as single person cars, allowing us to maximize our Law Enforcement efforts. The assignment of a single officer to a vehicle on night shifts is very rare in law enforcement agencies today. We are very fortunate to have a staff of highly trained officers committed to public service and who perform their responsibilities in a highly effective manner.

DETECTIVE DIVISION

Detective Bureau cases of note:

- Detectives investigated numerous death scenes in 2007 most note worthy was a Homicide/Suicide investigation involving a 61 year old Essex Township woman who shot and killed her 24 year old cognitively impaired daughter and then killed herself.
- Detectives investigated the malicious destruction of over 66 grave head stones many of which dated back to the 1800's at the Riley Township Cemetery. Detectives identified four juvenile subjects all Clinton County residents that were subsequently charged in this case that estimated damages at approximately \$10,000.
- Detectives investigated a series of Home Invasion complaints that generated information on a suspect vehicle. Detectives with the use of GPS surveillance equipment were able to track two suspects in a vehicle who left a residence in Livingston County they had broken into. As a result of their arrests, they admitted to doing over 50 Home Invasions in six different counties including six homes in Clinton County.
- Detectives investigated a complaint alleging Fraud and a violation of the Michigan Builders Trust Fund Act involving St Johns business owners and a local general contractor. The investigations are very labor intensive requiring numerous search warrant executions for records to banks, title companies, appraisal companies, county offices requiring permits, and multiple sub contractors and material suppliers. These cases require the review of thousands of pages of documents and are becoming much more frequent as person's are seeking a criminal remedy for these cases where in the past they were handled through civil means.
- Detectives investigated a breaking and entering of the Highland Hills Golf Course a safe was stolen and a suspect was tracked down, interviewed and subsequently implicated five additional subjects who collectively admitted to committing one home invasion, ten Clinton County business break ins, seven of which involved safe breaking which is a life offense.
- The Detective Bureau investigated numerous Internet fraud complaints in 2007. These crimes are becoming very prevalent and are also very labor intensive requiring a lot of work hours to track. One case of note involved a Clinton County resident who purchased a snowmobile via the Internet paying for it through western union. The victim was defrauded \$3,000. Detectives served four search warrants for records on this case and tracked the money to Miami Florida with the scam originating out of Romania.

- Detectives continued the investigation into the double homicide of the Ovid couple, which occurred July 2, 2006. Detectives followed up on 15 leads, interviewed 17 suspects, conducted 11 polygraph examinations and executed 3 search warrants.
- Detectives investigated the break in of two cell phone/ radio towers in Clinton County. Four subjects from Monroe Michigan area were arrested and through interviews and follow up investigation it was determined that these subjects are responsible for breaking into cell phone towers for the purpose of stealing copper. Detectives are working with multiple state, county, and local law enforcement agencies to solve cases in their jurisdictions.

MARINE PATROL

The primary goals of the Marine Program is to provide boater safety for 12-16 year olds, conduct inspections of boat liveries, provide for enforcement of the Marine Safety Laws and to address the Sheriff's responsibility for the recovery of all drowned bodies as mandated by P.A. 139, 1947.

Funding for this program is through a grant from the Michigan Department of Natural Resources. Funding provides for a 75% match to provide for reimbursement for officer's wages, fringe benefits, and equipment needs, supplies and materials. Equipment for the program consists of a 14-ft. boat, trailers, 25-hp motor and associated equipment.

Program responsibilities are assigned to a part time deputy. The deputy is a certified police officer also certified as a Boating Safety Instructor by the Michigan Department of Natural Resources. Duties for this program are conducted during the period between Memorial Day and Labor Day, with enforcement patrols concentrated on weekends and holidays.

- During the past year 1,190 students were trained and certified in Boat Safety.
- Two liveries were inspected along with 44 boats.



JAIL DIVISION

- During 2007 the Clinton County Jail booked in a total of 3,407 individuals. Of that number 2,838 were male and 569 were females
- The average daily count for the year was 94 locals and 84 boarders for a total of 178 averages per day.
- The kitchen staff prepared a total of 206,518 meals with an average cost of .96 cents per meal. This is the same cost per meal as 2006. The cost of food has increased approximately 12% during 2007.
- The county jail continues to provide inmate programs to include religion, substance abuse, anger management, recreation and parenting classes. The jail has been able to maintain the same level of Mental Health Services through Community Mental Health.
- For the 5^h year in a row the county jail has a 100% compliance inspection from both the Michigan Department of Corrections and the Federal Bureau of Prisons.
