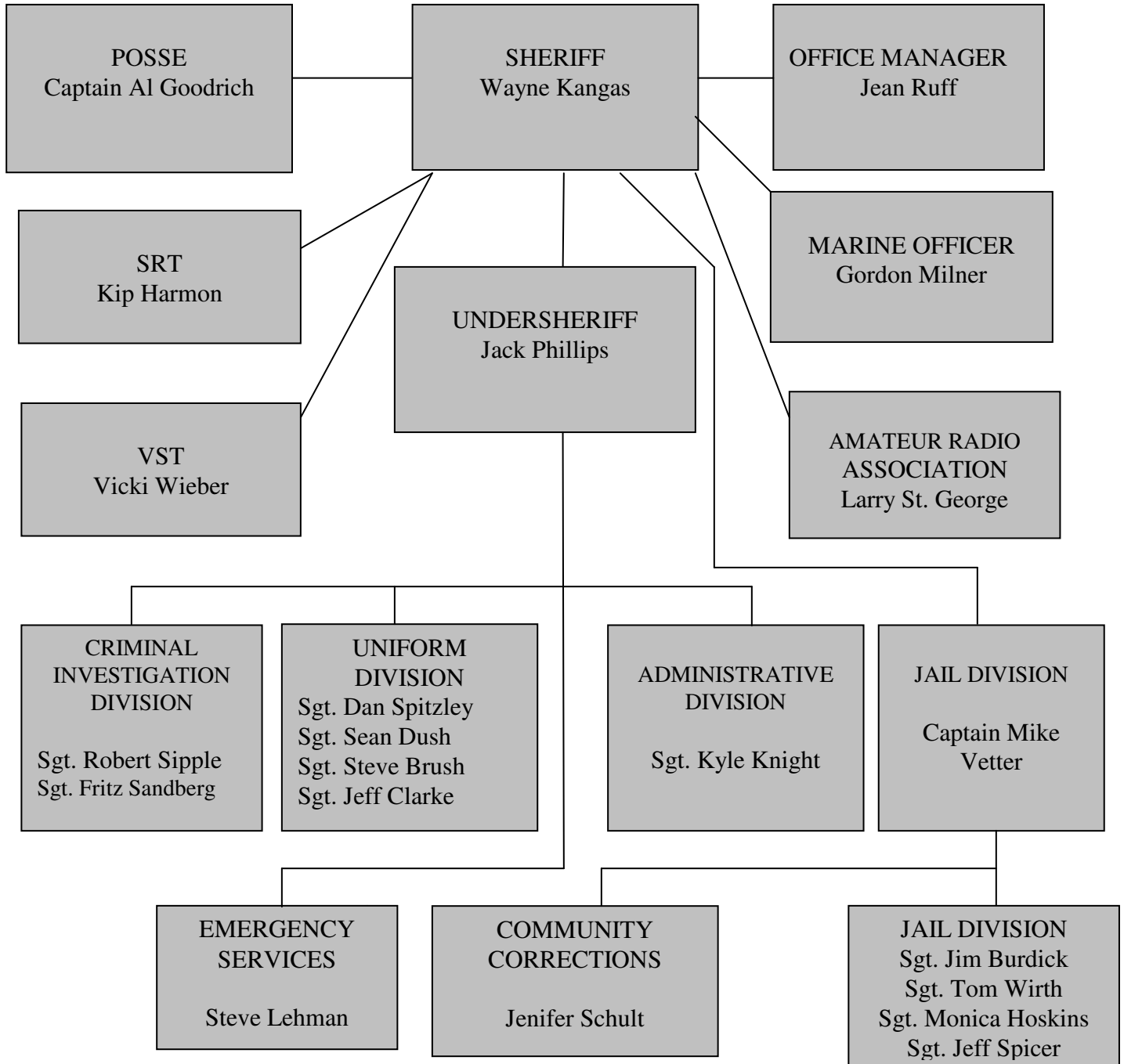

YEAR IN REVIEW

2011

Traffic enforcement continued to be a high priority for our deputies. Self-initiated calls increased to 21,742 an increase of 2,400 calls or 12%. Traffic citations increased by 20%, to 13,695. OUIL arrests increased from 198 to 245. There were increases in almost all areas of traffic enforcement.

Jail revenue from housing inmates for outside jurisdictions resulted in record revenue amounting to \$1,360,690. Additional revenue from phones, credit union collections should be 1.5 million in total revenue.

The Sheriff's Office secured a new contract for a Forensic Pathologist for autopsies with Dr. Brian Hunter at Hurley Hospital in Flint.

Core Training for employees completed and we coordinated training for all law enforcement agencies in Clinton County.

Completed critical incident response training for deputies and coordinated the training with school districts.

The Sheriff's Office conducted a major audit of the evidence room to dispose of evidence, drugs and firearms on cases that have been closed. Fifty-five firearms were sold at a Sheriff's auction resulting in \$9,300. The completed audit reduced items in the evidence room by 30%.

Completed the installation of an upgraded wireless technology system to download the data from in-car video cameras to network.

Completed and upgraded our technology to submit U.D. 10 crash data from the vehicle directly to the State.

2012 GOALS

- Maintain existing contracts with the State Department of Corrections along with contracts with the U.S. Marshalls and Statewide Security.
- Implement a new proposal with Department of Corrections to add 20 new beds to the jail by installing 2 new beds in 10 existing dorms. Potential new revenue would be in excess of \$250,000.
- Continue to maintain a high level of effectiveness and efficiency with our traffic safety initiative.
- Continue to develop our Neighbor Hood Watch Program and Crime Prevention website.
- Continue to explore new technologies to deliver efficient and effective law enforcement services.

VICTIM SUPPORT TEAM

The Victim Support Team is a group of dedicated volunteers trained to assist Police Officers in dealing with victims to provide immediate crisis intervention in the event of sudden, unexpected death that occurs due to car crash, suicide, fire, homicide, illness, drowning, or other traumatic incidents. The Advocates strive to offer comfort, compassionate support and sympathy to the surviving family members.

Each member of the VST spent 20-hours over a weekend to learn how to lend support to the victims of violent crimes and also assist families during the initial crisis. They are available 24 hours a day to assist police agencies within Clinton County. The team is responsible for their program costs including cellular phones, pagers and vehicle expense. They receive minimal financial support from the County. The team meets on a monthly basis and is supported by Sgt. Kyle Knight who is the Liaison Officer from the Sheriff's Office assigned to address training needs, operational evaluation and other organizational concerns.

SHERIFF'S POSSE **(Mounted Division)**

The Mounted Division is a Deputized volunteer organization with primary responsibility to support Clinton Counties Law Enforcement effort through the Sheriff's Office. The role of the Mounted Division continues to evolve into a direct support function with primary focus on supporting the Clinton County Emergency Management Plan, pursuant to Federal grant fund stipulations.

Annual goals for the Mounted Division focused on training modules including: Incident Command Systems; Department Use of Force Policy; FEMA Certification; Firearms Field Training and Qualification; CPR & First Aid Certification; Traffic Control Training; Search & Rescue Training and Certification; Mounted Crowd Control and Field Training including specialized training using horses to move crowds in a specific direction, and separate individuals from a crowd. Members also assisted in Active Violence Incident training for Clinton County Law Enforcement totaling 937 member hours devoted to training.

In 2011, 32 members of the Mounted Division were involved in 60 work day functions. The unit worked 2,773 hours at events, and with administrative and training hours provided more than 4,779 member hours of service to Clinton County. Volunteer services included events like Shop with a Cop, Fill a Cop Car supporting our local food bank, parades and local Special Olympics events. The Mounted Division also assisted the Lansing Police Department on two occasions in 2011 with horses for crowd control for two high profile public speaking events. Mounted Deputies on horses also assisted the Eaton County Sheriff's Department with crowd control for their annual 4th of July Fireworks display.

The Mounted sponsors a local Country Western show event every year to raise funds for equipment and expenses and was able to use some of their proceeds to donate several Thousand Dollars to local charities and needy individuals.





Clinton County Emergency Communications Team 2011 Annual Report

The Clinton County Emergency Communications Team (CCECT) is a volunteer division of the Clinton County Sheriff's Office that provides emergency communications services for area responders. The team is comprised of 8 volunteers highly trained in emergency communications. All members are licensed amateur radio operators.

2011 Accomplishments:

- Trained with new Raytheon ACU-M Interoperable Communications Bridge to allow responders from different jurisdictions with different radio systems to communicate.
- Maintained the area's largest-coverage UHF radio repeater.
- Trained with D-Star digital radio repeater
- Began planning for a Spring 2012 communications exercise using the County's Communications Support Unit trailer.

2012 Goals:

- Recruit more team members
- Integrate more closely with Central Dispatch
- Complete NIMS training up to ICS-300

CLINTON SPECIAL RESCUE TEAM

MEMBERS: The team is currently at 37 members. We have updated and added new SOP's and SOG's. The team has also established a secondary paging and information system with the TexCom Program.

CALL OUTS: The team responded to 5 call outs in 2011

- January: Assist to the Lansing Police Department for a missing suicidal subject that was presumed to be in the Fenner Nature Center. The subject's body was recovered.
- March: Assist to the DeWitt Township Police Department for a missing elderly subject that had walked away from an assisted living center in the middle of the night. SRT and Mounted worked together and the subject was located.
- November: Assist to Bath Township Police for a missing 14 y/o hunter in the Rose Lake State Game Area. The youth had been missing for 6 hours. A perimeter was established and the youth was located.
- November: Assist to Bath Township Police for a missing intoxicated subject in the early morning hours. Subject was located in a hunting blind.
- December: Assist to DeWitt City Police for a missing suicidal teen. SRT and mounted again worked together in a successful search. The teen was located using cell phone pings to narrow her location.

TRAINING

CONFINED SPACE RESCUE:

The team trained at Michigan Milk Producers factory on 2 occasions.
A tanker truck rescue and a powdered milk vat scenario were set up.

OBJECTIVES:

Train with MMPS along with their safety consultant from Pittsburg, Pa
Meet with representative from the Anderson's grain elevator for training and scenario.

UNDERWATER RESCUE AND RECOVERY UNIT:

The merge into the Capital Area Dive Team has been a great success for all the involved parties. The team trains 10 hours each month.
The team responded to the following calls:

- 8 evidence dives
- 4 body recoveries
- 2 vehicle recoveries
- 3 rescues

EQUIPMENT:

The SRT was fortunate this past year to put a new rescue truck into service. A 2011 Ford F550 with a custom box. This replaced the semi truck.
The Command Post had additional upgrades to the electrical system along with the addition of radio bank chargers. The CP1 will have a Mobile Data Computer added for 2012.

CLINTON COUNTY COMMUNITY CORRECTIONS 2011

Clinton County has participated in Michigan's Community Corrections Act (*Public Act 511 of 1988*) since 1990. This Act supply's counties with funding and resources to decrease the prison commitment rates of felons, improve local jail utilization, and reduce the number of repeat offenders. The goal of the Clinton County Community Corrections program is to preserve public safety while providing offenders with rehabilitative opportunities through participation in jail-based programs and the potential to earn days off of their sentence.

Highlights of the Community Corrections Program for 2011:

- ❖ The State of Michigan approved a new 3 year grant for Clinton County, providing \$77,000 per year.
- ❖ The continuing partnership between the Community Corrections/Sheriff's Office and Community Mental Health provided hundreds of hours of services and enhanced the delivery of professional mental health and substance abuse assessments and treatments to jail inmates.
- ❖ Programs such as Screening and Assessment, Case Management, Community Service Work, Cognitive Behavioral Classes, Residential Substance Abuse Treatment, and Substance Abuse Assessment and Treatment were provided this year through the support of the State of Michigan funding.
- ❖ This year 70 inmates participated in the Cognitive Behavioral Classes, continuing our goal to provide the program to more individuals.
- ❖ Reducing the number of jail bed days served by local inmates made it possible to rent out additional jail bed days to other counties and jurisdictions.
- ❖ Trustee labor was provided to various governmental and non-profit agencies throughout the county for numerous events, including the County's clean-up days.
- ❖ The County Jail Reimbursement Program (CJRP) provided an additional \$8,100 from housing inmates whose sentencing guidelines could have resulted in a prison commitment.

TRAINING

The Clinton County Sheriff's Office has in place a training program for all staff members to keep abreast of the changes taking place in the criminal justice field to enable them to perform their duties in meeting criminal justice standards and requirements.

Our three phase training program involves the following process:

1. **Sheriff's Office Core Training:** Training that is identified and developed using a Training Committee comprised of personnel from each division within the Sheriff's Office. An analysis of each job responsibility and duty is reviewed to identify the essential skills, knowledge and abilities required to perform their duties in an effective and efficient manner.
2. **Clinton County Law Enforcement Core Training:** Heads of each law enforcement agency in Clinton County working together to implement common training for the law enforcement officers in Clinton County. The concept to minimize training costs is met by utilizing trainers from each of the agencies to provide quality training, which is evaluated by the attendees and agency heads.
3. **Enhancement Training:** Additionally designated members of the Sheriff's Office are sent to courses that certify them as instructors on specific topics. Upon completion of their training they have the responsibility to provide instruction to other members of the Sheriff's Office in their area of expertise.

Clinton County Office of Emergency Management 2011 Annual Report

Emergency Operations Plan

During 2011, The Office of Emergency Management completed work on the new Clinton County Emergency Operations Plan (EOP). This was the culmination of nearly 18 months of effort bringing our existing plan up to new Federal and State planning standards and making our EOP more effective and user-friendly.

Emergency Planning

In addition to a new Emergency Operations Plan, several other planning products were completed during 2011. Some of these include a new Courthouse Bomb Incident Management Standard Operating Procedure (SOP), upgrades to the Opening EOC and EOC Staff notification SOP, and upgrades to the Declaring a Local State of Emergency SOP. Many of these changes were made to address improvement areas identified during emergency exercises and actual incidents within the county.

Emergency Exercises

During the summer of 2011, Clinton County Emergency Management participated in a full-scale, regional exercise. This exercise is conducted at the Capital Region International Airport every three years. We also helped facilitate a table-top exercise and training program with the Mid-Michigan District Health Department to test the regional Strategic National Stockpile distribution node which is located at the Clinton County Road Commission.

Homeland Security Grants

During 2011, the Clinton County Office of Emergency Management administered four separate Homeland Security grants. These grants provided funds to build upon our county's capabilities in several areas and provided equipment, training, and exercises for Clinton County responders. Some highlights of grant projects completed in 2011 include providing handheld radios for the Clinton County Mounted Division, Providing an enclosed trailer to the Looking Glass Fire Department to house HazMat gear, and providing Incident Command System Training for area responders.

Citizen Preparedness

The Clinton County Office of Emergency Management continued to play a key role in the Do 1 Thing citizen preparedness program by holding both the board Chair and Vice-Chair positions for most of 2011. This program continues to provide preparedness tips and information to help build more disaster-resilient communities.

CENTRAL RECORDS

Central Records has the responsibility to respond to all requests for Administrative Services for the public. They are directly responsible for registering and processing all visitors to the confined areas of the jail. **They respond to over 50,000 incoming calls to the Sheriff's Office,** respond to requests for information, process all criminal complaints, criminal histories for other agencies, compile information in the criminal records management system, fingerprint responsibilities for all CCW permits, pre-employment and firearm inspections. They provide information on a variety of subjects to the general public and perform a critical support service to the public and the Sheriff's Office.

ANIMAL CONTROL

The Clinton County Animal Control consists of two full-time employees. Their responsibilities are investigating complaints of dogs and farm animals running at large, handling lost and found pets, investigating animal bites, and investigating animal welfare and neglect complaints. They are also responsible for monitoring and caring for the Clinton County Animal Shelter. In 2011 there were 5,400 dog licenses sold in Clinton County.

UNIFORM DIVISION

The Uniform Division is responsible for providing direct law enforcement services to all county residents. They have the primary responsibility to provide traffic enforcement on all secondary county roads, in conjunction with traffic enforcement on State highways and expressways.

In addition, they respond to all emergency calls for service, provide court security, serve civil process, transport prisoners, and conduct safety education programs, along with a variety of other enforcement responsibilities.

The deputy's continue to function as one of the most effective traffic enforcement units within the State of Michigan. During the past year, deputy's issued 13,695 traffic citations. They also arrested 245 drunk drivers, issued 473 seat belt violations and 112 subjects were arrested for possessing and selling narcotics. The Sheriff's Office Crash Investigation Team investigated 8 crashes, 4 fatal, 2 serious injuries and assisted other agencies with 2 crashes. They also completed 20 crash data recording downloads. The Clinton County Sheriff road patrol ranks in the top five for all Sheriff's Department on a consistent basis for traffic enforcement. Over the past several years, one of our officers has been recognized as the top O.U.I.L. Enforcement Officer for Sheriff's Offices statewide.

Every Deputy has been trained in basic traffic accident investigation and we have three officers certified as traffic accident Reconstructionists. Additionally, the division has certified Laser Speed Measurement, Preliminary Breath Test, Firearm and Pressure Point Control Tactics Instruction. We have officers trained as Crime Scene Tech, Hostage Negotiators, Firearms Instructors, Laser Instructors, Defensive Tactics Instructors, PBT Instructors, CPR, A.E.D. Instructors, Taser, Pepper ball Instructors and Simunition Instructors.

The deputies continue to operate as single person cars, allowing us to maximize our Law Enforcement efforts. The assignment of a single officer to a vehicle on night shifts is very rare in law enforcement agencies today. We are very fortunate to have a staff of highly trained officers committed to public service and who perform their responsibilities in a highly effective manner.

DETECTIVE DIVISION

CASES OF NOTE FOR 2011:

- The Detective Bureau investigated three separate Homicides in 2011. The first Homicide involved a 19 year old St Johns man who bludgeoned his 49 year old mother to death at their family home in rural St Johns, and then took his own life with a self-inflicted gunshot wound.

The second Homicide involved an on duty Bath Township Police Officer responding to a 911 call of a man beating a woman and chasing her with a knife in hand. Upon arrival at the scene by the Bath Township Officer, a 49 year old Bath Township man approached the Officer with a double edged sword in hand held in an offensive posture. The man ignored repeated requests to put the weapon down and stop walking at the Officer forcing the Officer to shoot him in self- defense. The investigation was reviewed by the County Prosecutor and ruled a justifiable Homicide.

The third Homicide investigation the Detective Bureau handled came at the request of the Dewitt Township Police Department and involved a 45 year old Lansing woman who was strangled to death inside a Dewitt Township motel room that she had rented. This investigation remains open and on- going into 2012. Several potential suspects have been identified and interviewed, and detectives are waiting on DNA evidence to assist with the case.

- The Detective Bureau investigated a Car Jacking complaint involving a 35 year old Pewamo MI. woman who dressed in a disguise and had a stun gun and a loaded 9mm pistol. She hid in the trunk of a vehicle driven by a 39 year old St Johns woman who was traveling on US 127 in Olive Township when she noticed the open trunk light for the vehicle on. She stopped the vehicle to check the trunk when she was confronted by the suspect who got out of the trunk and fled the scene with her vehicle. The suspect led police on a High speed vehicle pursuit and subsequent foot pursuit and was able to elude police. Detectives developed information leading to a later interview of a suspect and found her to be the ex-wife of the victim's new boyfriend. The suspect was convicted of Car Jacking and received a sentence of 6 to 15 years in prison.
- The Detective Bureau investigated an Armed Robbery of Swamper's Party Store in Eagle MI. With the assistance of video surveillance cameras, two suspects were identified and arrested, a 25 year old Eagle man, and a 25 year old Portland man. Detectives conducted a search warrant on one of the suspect's residence and recovered numerous stolen items and drugs, were able to tie them to numerous Home Invasions in Clinton and Ionia Counties.

- Detectives investigated two separate Bank Robberies, one at the Citizens Bank in Fowler, MI. and the other at the Portland Federal Credit Union in Westphalia, MI. Both Robberies were committed by the same person a 43 year old Lansing man who was arrested and interviewed by Detectives and Agents from the FBI, which culminated in the suspect confessing to numerous other Bank Robberies in Ingham and Gratiot Counties.
- On Dec 5, 2011 the Sheriff's Department took a complaint of Wire Fraud where a County resident had \$8800 removed from his account at the Clinton County Federal Credit Union in St Johns. The money was wire transferred to a bank in Grafton, OH. Detectives were able to obtain images of the subject who obtained the money in OH and located him living nearby. Once his identity was obtained a coordinated effort with the Lorain County Sheriff's Office in Ohio resulted in the subject's apprehension and arrest. In interviews with the subject it was determined that the subject was working with criminals in the Russian Republic who were the originators of the cyber penetration of the victim's bank account. The computer hacking resulted in the wire transfer being made possible. The subject is awaiting trial.

MARINE PATROL

The primary goals of the Marine Program is to provide boater safety for 12-16 year olds, conduct inspections of boat liveries, provide for enforcement of the Marine Safety Laws and to address the Sheriff's responsibility for the recovery of all drowned bodies as mandated by P.A. 139, 1947.

Funding for this program is through a grant from the Michigan Department of Natural Resources. Funding provides for a 75% match to provide for reimbursement for officer's wages, fringe benefits, and equipment needs, supplies and materials. Equipment for the program consists of a 14-ft. boat, trailers, 25-hp motor and associated equipment.

Program responsibilities are assigned to a part time deputy. The deputy is a certified police officer also certified as a Boating Safety Instructor by the Michigan Department of Natural Resources. Duties for this program are conducted during the period between Memorial Day and Labor Day, with enforcement patrols concentrated on weekends and holidays.

- During the past year, 138 students were trained and certified in Boat Safety.
- Three liveries were inspected along with 58 boats.



JAIL DIVISION

- During 2011 the Clinton County Jail booked in a total of 3,396 individuals. Of that number 2,656 were male and 740 were females
- The average daily count for the year was 106 locals and 96 boarders for a total of 202 averages per day.
- The kitchen staff prepared a total of 221,190 meals with an average cost of \$1.08 per meal.
- The county jail continues to provide inmate programs to include religion, substance abuse, anger management, recreation and parenting classes. The jail has been able to maintain the same level of Mental Health Services through Community Mental Health.
- For the 11th year in a row the county jail has a 100% compliance inspection from both the Michigan Department of Corrections and the Federal Bureau of Prisons.
