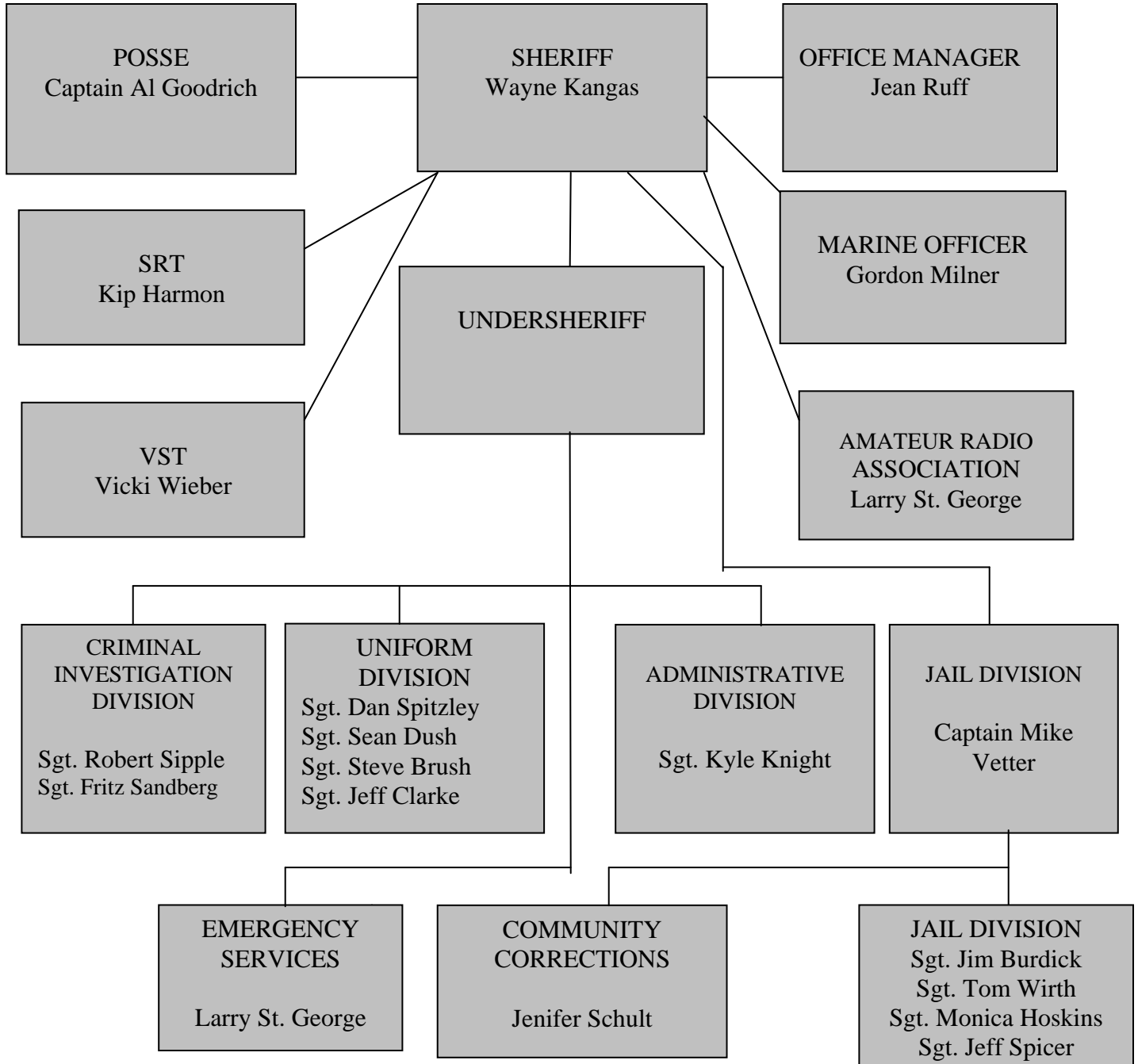

2013 GOALS

- Revise rules and regulations for inmate jail guidelines for violations of rules and discipline.
- Maintain our jail contracts with the Department of Corrections, Statewide Security and the U.S. Marshals Service.
- Resurface the exercise yards for the jail with a concrete surface.
- Redesign the squad room and install new equipment to serve as a backup E.O.C. at the Court House.
- Conduct a complete review of our current procedures for prescription drugs for inmates and seek competitive bids from vendors
- Hire a new Jail Administrator to replace Captain Vetter who will retire on April 27, 2013. Conduct a complete review of our organizational structure, position responsibilities and programing needs.
- Work with contractor in the completion of the New Animal Shelter.
- Conduct a review of the personnel staffing needs and hours for Courthouse Security Staff.
- Conduct a review of personnel training needs to address long-term Law Enforcement responsibilities.

VICTIM SUPPORT TEAM

The Victim Support Team is a group of dedicated volunteers trained to assist Police Officers in dealing with victims to provide immediate crisis intervention in the event of sudden, unexpected death that occurs due to car crash, suicide, fire, homicide, illness, drowning, or other traumatic incidents. The Advocates strive to offer comfort, compassionate support and sympathy to the surviving family members.

Each member of the VST spent 20-hours over a weekend to learn how to lend support to the victims of violent crimes and also assist families during the initial crisis. They are available 24 hours a day to assist police agencies within Clinton County. The team is responsible for their program costs including cellular phones, pagers and vehicle expense. They receive minimal financial support from the County. The team meets on a monthly basis and is supported by Sgt. Jeff Clarke who is the Liaison Officer from the Sheriff's Office assigned to address training needs, operational evaluation and other organizational concerns.

SHERIFF'S MOUNTED DIVISION

The Mounted Division is a deputized volunteer organization with prime responsibility to support Clinton Counties Law Enforcement effort through the Sheriff's Office. The role of the Mounted Division continues to evolve into a direct support function with primary focus on supporting the Clinton County Emergency Management Plan, pursuant to federal grant fund stipulations.

The Mounted Division continues to focus on training that includes: Incident Command Systems; Department Use of Force Policy; FEMA Certification; Firearms Field Training and Qualification; Law Enforcement Authority, Limitations, and Supervision Requirements Training; Mounted Crowd Control and Field Training; CPR & First Aid Certification; Traffic Control Training; Search / Rescue, Meth Lab Information; Radio and Communications Training. The total amount of training for the unit was over 900 member hours.

In 2012, 32 members of the Mounted Division were involved in 52 work day functions. The unit worked 2,815.5 hours at events (in addition to unit administration) totaling 4215 hours of service and training to the county. In addition the Mounted Division provided direct support to both the community and the Sheriff's Office by doing 136 hours of ride a longs and over 900 hours of training that included Active Shooter Training for Clinton County Law Enforcement. The unit's services included foot patrol and horse patrol at Ovid Elsie, Fowler and P-W football games, parades, training, administrative hours, and monthly general/board meetings. The unit also assisted the Eaton County Sheriff's Office during their annual 4th of July fireworks display providing a uniform presence for crowd. The unit was also called on to help locate a lost individual in the Sleepy Hollow Game area. The Mounted Division is on call to provide our services to those departments who request them. As times change there are more instances where having an armed and trained representative of the Sheriff's Office provide safety to both search teams and the public.

Additionally, in 2012 the Mounted Division continued donating several thousand dollars to local charities.



CLINTON COUNTY SPECIAL RESCUE TEAM ANNUAL REPORT 2012

The Clinton County Special Rescue Team (SRT) is composed of 35 volunteer members. SRT members are trained in several emergency disciplines including:

- Ground Search and Rescue
- Confined Space Rescue
- Surface, Subsurface, and Ice Rescue
- Large incident management and support

In 2012, the SRT was called upon to provide support to several incidents and events. Some of these included the Mitt Romney Presidential campaign stop in DeWitt, MI, the Right-to-Work protests at the MI State Capitol, Hostage Negotiation training in Eaton County, and Special Operations Team training at East Essex Elementary School. The Underwater rescue and recovery unit was merged into the Tri-County Regional Dive Team. They participated in 8 body recoveries and 7 evidence dives in 2012.

In November of 2012, The Clinton County Emergency Communications Team merged with the SRT adding six new highly trained communicators.

The Special Rescue Team meets each month for training. In 2012, there were several training events. Some of these included a Confined Space training class taught by Assistant Commander Tom Lewis, Water Rescue training at Motz Park taught by Karl Dahlke, Intermediate Incident Command taught by Lt. Larry St. George. Ropes, knots, and hardware training was taught by Commander Kip Harman. Operators Andrew Temme and Mike Weber completed the nationally-recognized SARTECH II Search and Rescue certification.

In 2012, the SRT acquired a remotely-operated robot that will be used for reconnaissance and air monitoring (and shared by the Special Operations Team). SRT also acquired a suite of confined space gear including an air monitoring meter, respiratory protection devices, ropes, and hardware. It also acquired various subsurface water rescue/recovery gear.

The SRT looks forward to several more training classes in 2013 and hopes to implement a new credentials and qualification system.

CLINTON COUNTY COMMUNITY CORRECTIONS 2012

For the past 22 years, Clinton County has participated in Michigan's Community Corrections Act (*Public Act 511 of 1988*). By participating, Clinton County receives funding and resources to decrease the prison commitment rates of felons, improve local jail utilization, and reduce the number of repeat offenders. The goal of the program in Clinton County is to preserve public safety while providing offenders with rehabilitative opportunities through participation in jail-based programs and the potential to earn days off of their sentence.

Highlights of the Community Corrections Program for 2012:

- ❖ The State of Michigan provided \$77,000 towards Community Corrections this year.
- ❖ The County Jail Reimbursement Program (CJRP) provided an additional \$6,100 from housing inmates whose sentencing guidelines could have resulted in a prison commitment.
- ❖ Programs such as Screening and Assessment, Case Management, Community Service Work, Cognitive Behavioral Classes, Residential Substance Abuse Treatment, and Substance Abuse Assessment and Treatment were provided this year.
- ❖ This year 75 inmates participated in the Cognitive Behavioral Classes, continuing our goal to provide the program to more individuals.
- ❖ This year saw the start of a community based cognitive behavioral class, which can be utilized for offenders on probation and provides an alternative to straight jail time.
- ❖ A reduction in 260 jail bed days served by local inmates made it possible to rent out additional jail bed days to other counties and jurisdictions. This is accomplished through inmates completing programming and/or community service work.
- ❖ Trustee labor was provided to various governmental and non-profit agencies throughout the county for numerous events, including the County's clean-up days.
- ❖ The continuing partnership between the Community Corrections/Sheriff's Office and Community Mental Health provided hundreds of hours of services and enhanced the delivery of professional mental health and substance abuse assessments and treatments to jail inmates.

TRAINING

The Clinton County Sheriff's Office has in place a training program for all staff members to keep abreast of the changes taking place in the criminal justice field to enable them to perform their duties in meeting criminal justice standards and requirements.

Our three phase training program involves the following process:

1. **Sheriff's Office Core Training:** Training that is identified and developed using a Training Committee comprised of personnel from each division within the Sheriff's Office. An analysis of each job responsibility and duty is reviewed to identify the essential skills, knowledge and abilities required to perform their duties in an effective and efficient manner.
2. **Clinton County Law Enforcement Core Training:** Heads of each law enforcement agency in Clinton County working together to implement common training for the law enforcement officers in Clinton County. The concept to minimize training costs is met by utilizing trainers from each of the agencies to provide quality training, which is evaluated by the attendees and agency heads.
3. **Enhancement Training:** Additionally designated members of the Sheriff's Office are sent to courses that certify them as instructors on specific topics. Upon completion of their training they have the responsibility to provide instruction to other members of the Sheriff's Office in their area of expertise.

2012 ANNUAL REPORT

New Emergency Manager

Larry St. George has served Clinton County as a Regional Planner since 2005 and before that as the Amateur Radio emergency coordinator since 2001.

New Regional Planner

Rob Wooten joined the Clinton County Emergency Management team in June of 2012 filling the vacancy created when Larry St. George was promoted to Emergency Manager. Rob comes to us from MSU where he served as a Student Supervisor for special events. He brings with him a rich background in large event project management and logistics. He is a 2011 graduate of MSU with a BS in Mechanical Engineering and BA Criminal Justice. In 2012 Rob has completed the FEMA Professional Development Series classes and the majority of the State of Michigan's Professional Emergency Manager (PEM) designation.

Planning, Training, and Exercises

The Office of Emergency Management embarked on a planning, training, and exercise program to fully implement the County's new Emergency Operations Plan. Standard Operating Procedures (SOPs) were updated for opening the Emergency Operations Center (EOC), declaring a local state of emergency, and information sharing. The EOC Staff began training in these SOPs and a series of exercises was begun to further prepare our EOC personnel to operate effectively during real-world EOC activations.

Major Projects

Several major projects were completed in 2012 to build and/or maintain Clinton County's capabilities. The Special Rescue Team received the necessary gear and upgrades to safely provide confined space rescue response. A Mobile Data Terminal was installed in our mobile incident command trailer to provide law enforcement personnel immediate access to information during active violence, hostage negotiation or missing person response. Law Enforcement personnel were provided with computer forensics training to enhance their investigation capabilities. A tactical robot was acquired to provide improved officer and rescuer safety for our Special Operations and Special Rescue Teams. Members of our Mounted Division and Special Rescue Team were able to receive the nationally recognized SARTECH2 training and designation which will enhance our ground Search and Rescue capabilities. Finally, an ICS 300 and 400 training class was provided to area responders. These projects were part of this office's comprehensive capabilities-based planning and facilitated through the administration of five separate Homeland Security Grant programs.

2012
CENTRAL RECORDS

Central Records has the responsibility to respond to all requests for Administrative Services for the public. They are directly responsible for registering and processing all visitors to the confined areas of the jail. **They respond to over 50,000 incoming calls to the Sheriff's Office,** respond to requests for information, process all criminal complaints, criminal histories for other agencies, compile information in the criminal records management system, fingerprint responsibilities for all Concealed Purchase License, pre-employment and firearm inspections. They provide information on a variety of subjects to the general public and perform a critical support service to the public and the Sheriff's Office.

With recent concerns over the availability of firearms, especially handguns, and changes in the firearm laws, Central Records has seen a rapid increase in the amount of handguns registered and Concealed Pistol License applications. In 2011 there were 526 individuals fingerprinted for Concealed Pistol Licenses. In 2012 the number increased to 728 individuals. Additionally in 2012, there were over 1,200 more firearms registered in Clinton County.

ANIMAL CONTROL

The Clinton County Animal Control consists of two full-time employees. Their responsibilities are investigating complaints of dogs and farm animals running at large, handling lost and found pets, investigating animal bites, and investigating animal welfare and neglect complaints. They are also responsible for monitoring and caring for the Clinton County Animal Shelter. In 2012 there were 5,408 dog licenses sold in Clinton County.

UNIFORM DIVISION

The Uniform Division is responsible for providing direct law enforcement services to all county residents. They have the primary responsibility to provide traffic enforcement on all secondary county roads, in conjunction with traffic enforcement on State highways and expressways.

In addition, they respond to all emergency calls for service, provide court security, serve civil process, transport prisoners, and conduct safety education programs, along with a variety of other enforcement responsibilities.

The deputy's continue to function as one of the most effective traffic enforcement units within the State of Michigan. During the past year, deputy's issued 10,942 traffic citations. They also arrested 213 drunk drivers, issued 236 seat belt violations and 130 subjects were arrested for possessing and selling narcotics. The Sheriff's Office Crash Investigation Team investigated 13 crashes, 7 fatal, 6 serious injuries and assisted other agencies with 5 crashes. They also completed 22 crash data recording downloads. The Clinton County Sheriff road patrol ranks in the top five for all Sheriff's Department on a consistent basis for traffic enforcement. Over the past several years, one of our officers has been recognized as the top O.U.I.L. Enforcement Officer for Sheriff's Offices statewide.

Every Deputy has been trained in basic traffic accident investigation and we have three officers certified as traffic accident Reconstructionists. Additionally, the division has certified Laser Speed Measurement, Preliminary Breath Test, Firearm and Pressure Point Control Tactics Instruction. We have officers trained as Crime Scene Tech, Hostage Negotiators, Firearms Instructors, Laser Instructors, Defensive Tactics Instructors, PBT Instructors, CPR, A.E.D. Instructors, Taser, Pepper ball Instructors and Simunition Instructors.

The deputies continue to operate as single person cars, allowing us to maximize our Law Enforcement efforts. The assignment of a single officer to a vehicle on night shifts is very rare in law enforcement agencies today. We are very fortunate to have a staff of highly trained officers committed to public service and who perform their responsibilities in a highly effective manner.

**DETECTIVE DIVISION
CASES OF NOTE FOR 2012**

* The Detective Bureau investigated 72 property crime complaints in 2012. 42 of those complaints were Breaking and Entering's and 30 complaints were larceny complaints. Of the 72 property crime cases investigated 21 cases resulted in arrests in Clinton County or resulted in the suspects being identified or arrested and prosecuted in other jurisdictions. Detectives identified a husband and wife team that were responsible for 9 home invasion complaints in Clinton County and over 100 home invasion complaints in the Tri-County and Southern Michigan areas.

* The Detective Bureau investigated a complaint from a St. Johns business reporting a suspicious subject attempting to pawn a 5 carat diamond ring. Detectives worked with the business to arrange for the subject to bring the ring back into the store at a designated day and time and found that the ring was stolen from a residence in Bath Township. The ring was appraised at over \$70,000 and was recovered and returned to the owner. The subject, a 27 year old St. Johns man, was arrested and charged with a felony larceny from a building over \$20,000.

* The Detective Bureau continued its investigations into internet crimes. Online investigations into drug related activities resulted in 4 arrests and convictions for individuals attempting to deliver drugs to young residents of Clinton County. One case in particular involved a tenured professor employed with a major university in Michigan. In addition, the Detective Bureau continued to support other law enforcement agencies in Clinton County with the forensic analysis of 18 computer hard drives and 34 cell phones. In 2012, the Detective Bureau saw an increase in Internet fraud complaints and investigated 10 cases of child solicitation. Many of these Internet crime cases involved suspects who live out of our county, state, or country. These cases, because of their complexity, continue to be time and labor intensive for Detective Bureau personnel.

*The Detective Bureau Investigated 17 Criminal Sexual Conduct cases in 2012, most of which were referrals from the Michigan Department of Human Services and involved minor children. All of the Detectives at the Sheriff's Office are trained in Forensic Interview Protocol with minor children and all continue to utilize the assistance and services of area Child Advocacy Centers with these investigations.

*The Detective Bureau reviewed 37 Medical Examiner Death Investigation complaints in 2012. The Detective Bureau works in direct support of the Clinton County Medical Examiner and his office as the primary investigators to oversee and review all deaths within Clinton County that fall under the Medical Examiners authority and responsibilities.

MARINE PATROL

The primary goals of the Marine Program is to provide boater safety for 12-16 year olds, conduct inspections of boat liveries, provide for enforcement of the Marine Safety Laws and to address the Sheriff's responsibility for the recovery of all drowned bodies as mandated by P.A. 139, 1947.

Funding for this program is through a grant from the Michigan Department of Natural Resources. Funding provides for a 75% match to provide for reimbursement for officer's wages, fringe benefits, and equipment needs, supplies and materials. Equipment for the program consists of a 14-ft. boat, trailer, and 25-hp motor and associated equipment.

Program responsibilities are assigned to a part time deputy. The deputy is a certified police officer also certified as a Boating Safety Instructor by the Michigan Department of Natural Resources. Duties for this program are conducted during the period between Memorial Day and Labor Day, with enforcement patrols concentrated on weekends and holidays.

- During the past year, 185 students were trained and certified in Boat Safety.



JAIL DIVISION

- During 2012 the Clinton County Jail booked in a total of 4,193 individuals. Of that number 3,363 were male and 830 were females
- The average daily count for the year was 92 locals and 110 boarders for a total of 202 averages per day.
- The kitchen staff prepared a total of 223,626 meals with an average cost of \$1.07 per meal.
- The county jail continues to provide inmate programs to include religion, substance abuse, anger management, recreation and parenting classes. The jail has been able to maintain the same level of Mental Health Services through Community Mental Health.
- For the 12th year in a row the county jail has a 100% compliance inspection from both the Michigan Department of Corrections and the Federal Bureau of Prisons.
