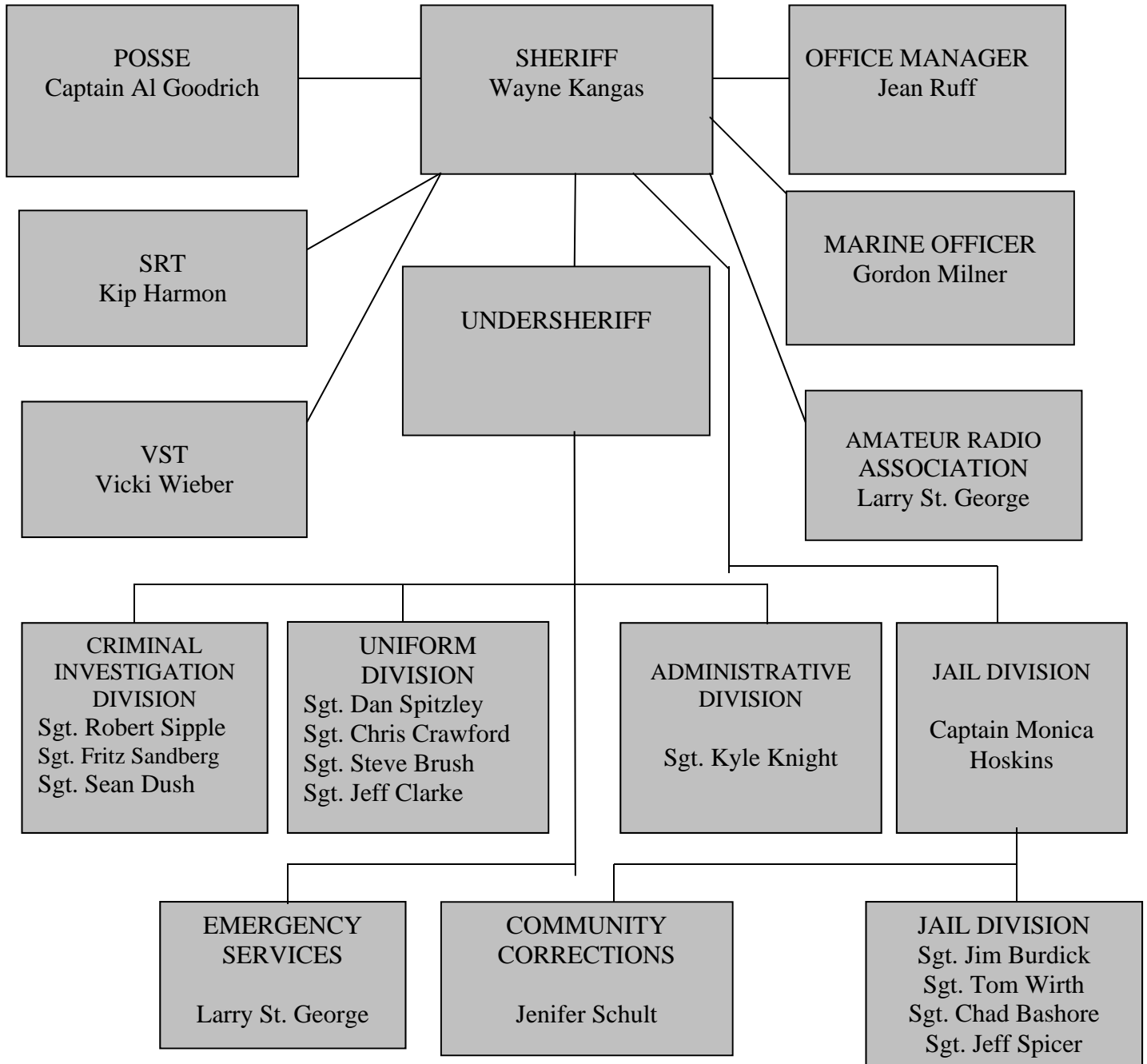

YEAR IN REVIEW

2013

- Completed a review of the inmate rules and regulations guide and revised the rules for violations and discipline.
- Generated a record amount of revenue for housing inmates at \$1,541,932. Additional jail revenue from phones, medical, local inmates totaled \$1,667,339. This is 282,000 over budget estimate for 2013.
- Completed a remodel of the existing squad room to serve as a backup emergency operations center.
- Implemented and negotiated a new contract on prescription drugs for inmates and established new procedures on distributing.
- New Animal Shelter completed and operational.
- Replaced Jail Administrator and completed an extensive review of all procedures and implemented several significant changes in Jail Operations.
- Jail exercise yards re-surfaced to allow inmates additional exercise opportunities.
- The jail has had shower curtains installed in each cell to address PREA (Prisoner Rape Elimination Act) issues.
- The Automated Phone Information System was completed. It provides information to the inmate's family and friends on their charges, bond amount, visitation schedule, amount of money in their account, release date, etc. Inmates may also access the system to obtain information.

2014 GOALS

- Conduct a review of all positions within the Sheriff's Office to cross train personnel to meet the critical responsibilities of this office.
- Train a new officer in Forensic Computer Analysis to make certain we meet the long term needs in this critical responsibility in protecting the public.
- Initiate a complete review of the positions of Office Manager/Administrative Assistant and a secretary position; both of these positions have had substantial responsibility added to their positions and need to be properly classified.
- Evaluate the long-term jail needs for the County and submit recommendations for addressing those needs.
- Submit a plan to address the problem of lack of storage for Homeland Security equipment and vehicles that require secure enclosed storage.
- Assure that PREA compliance standards are implemented.
- Resurfacing the jail showers to address Health Safety issues.
- Updating the Jail/Records Accounting System, adding money kiosk to lobby area and upgrading the Commissary System to allow inmates to order by phone.
- Providing a GED Program to the inmates

VICTIM SUPPORT TEAM

The Victim Support Team is a group of dedicated volunteers trained to assist Police Officers in dealing with victims to provide immediate crisis intervention in the event of sudden, unexpected death that occurs due to car crash, suicide, fire, homicide, illness, drowning, or other traumatic incidents. The Advocates strive to offer comfort, compassionate support and sympathy to the surviving family members.

Each member of the VST spent 20-hours over a weekend to learn how to lend support to the victims of violent crimes and also assist families during the initial crisis. They are available 24 hours a day to assist police agencies within Clinton County. The team is responsible for their program costs including cellular phones, pagers and vehicle expense. They receive minimal financial support from the County. The team meets on a monthly basis and is supported by Sgt. Jeff Clarke who is the Liaison Officer from the Sheriff's Office assigned to address training needs, operational evaluation and other organizational concerns.

SHERIFF'S MOUNTED DIVISION

The Sheriff's Mounted Division is a deputized volunteer organization that operates under a 501c3 non-profit status with primary responsibility to support Clinton County Law Enforcement efforts through the Sheriff's Office at the direction of the Sheriff.

In 2013 The Mounted Divisions 33 members were involved in over 50 work day functions and events and volunteered a total of 4,291.5 hours of service for events, training and administrative duties. The Mounted Division assisted the Sheriff's Office and other Law Enforcement agencies by providing Mounted members to fill the roles of actors and participants in the County wide Active Shooter training, and the Tri County area S.W.A.T., Special Operations Team trainings.

The Mounted Division annually trains in the areas of Department Use of Force Policy; Firearms Field Training and Qualification; CPR & First Aid Certification; Search and Rescue; Traffic Control Training; Mounted Crowd Control and Field Training; Radio and Communications Training; Legal Update; and Incident Command Systems Training.

In 2013 two members from the Clinton County Sheriff's Mounted Division were selected to be members of the Michigan Multi- Jurisdictional Police Drill Team that participated in the 2013 Presidential Inaugural Parade held in our Nation's Capital Washington D.C.

The Mounted Division played a key role in crowd control assisting the Eaton County Sheriff's Office through a Mutual aid request during their annual 4th of July fireworks display event, which drew thousands of people to their Sharp Park. They were also activated to assist with different Search and Rescue Missions.

The Mounted Division continues to provide a uniform presence at local area football games, parades, and assists with programs such as Fill a Cop Car, and the Shop with a Cop program. The Mounted division donated thousands of dollars to local charities and organizations including the Clinton County Food Bank, Eel's Place and the Child Advocacy Center.



CLINTON COUNTY SPECIAL RESCUE TEAM 2013 ANNUAL REPORT

The Clinton County Special Rescue Team (SRT) is composed of 30 volunteer members. SRT members are trained in several disciplines including:

- Ground Search and Rescue
- Confined Space Rescue
- Surface Water and Ice Rescue
- Large Incident Support

The Special Rescue Team was called upon to assist with several incidents covering all of the above disciplines, as well as assisting with Special Operations Team and Hostage Negotiation Team training. SRT also participated in several public outreach events including the Fowler Touch-a-Truck, Bath Days Parade, and Mint Festival Parade.

SRT meets every month to complete both new and refresher training. Throughout 2013 SRT members received training in Confined Space Rescue, Ice and Water Rescue, the Incident Command System, Ground Search and Rescue, as well as Search Management.

In September SRT hosted a NASAR FUNSAR training session. Eight team members participated and successfully completed the SARTECH II exam at the end of the 60+ hours of training. This was a huge accomplishment for the team and we are excited to currently have ten members trained to the SARTECH II level.

In November three SRT members attended a 16 hour Search Manager Training along with a Sheriff's Office Sergeant.

In 2014 SRT will continue to strengthen the capabilities offered by the team through ongoing training and exercising.

**CLINTON COUNTY COMMUNITY CORRECTIONS
2013**

For the past 23 years, Clinton County has participated in Michigan's Community Corrections Act (*Public Act 511 of 1988*).

At this time, the Community Corrections Program has been dissolved.

2013 TRAINING

The Clinton County Sheriff's Office has in place a training program for all staff members to keep abreast of the changes taking place in the criminal justice field to enable them to perform their duties in meeting criminal justice standards and requirements.

Our three phase training program involves the following process:

1. **Sheriff's Office Core Training:** Training that is identified and developed using a Training Committee comprised of personnel from each division within the Sheriff's Office. An analysis of each job responsibility and duty is reviewed to identify the essential skills, knowledge and abilities required to perform their duties in an effective and efficient manner.
2. **Clinton County Law Enforcement Core Training:** Heads of each law enforcement agency in Clinton County working together to implement common training for the law enforcement officers in Clinton County. The concept to minimize training costs is met by utilizing trainers from each of the agencies to provide quality training, which is evaluated by the attendees and agency heads.
3. **Enhancement Training:** Additionally designated members of the Sheriff's Office are sent to courses that certify them as instructors on specific topics. Upon completion of their training they have the responsibility to provide instruction to other members of the Sheriff's Office in their area of expertise.

2013 ANNUAL REPORT
PROGRAM OVERVIEW

In 2013, the Office of Emergency Management continued to build and maintain the capabilities of our first responders and emergency management partners. Our office's mission is to build our county's capability to prepare for, prevent, respond to, recover from, and mitigate the effects of disasters and emergencies in our county. Last year our Emergency Operations Center (EOC) began progressive training and exercising to implement the new Emergency Operations Plan (EOP) developed at that time. Based on the lessons learned from previous exercises, facility improvements to our primary, secondary, and mobile EOC were made. Improvements were made to our plans and procedures while training and exercising continued based on those changes. Our continued training and exercising as well as real-world experiences will continue to inform our grant projects and future efforts as we try to build and maintain capability.

2013 Accomplishments

The Office of Emergency Management made several great strides in building capability in our county. These accomplishments would not have been possible without our partnerships with the agency representatives on our EOC staff, Local Emergency Planning Committee, and our first responder community. Much of our success is also due to the exemplary work of our Regional Planner, Mr. Rob Wooten.

Emergency Operations Plan (EOP) Implementation: We continued training with our new EOP in 2013 and held exercises that helped our staff become familiar with how to open our EOC, notify our personnel, declare a local state of emergency, properly document events, communicate with one another, and move the operation to the alternate EOC at the Sheriff's Department. We had several training sessions and 3 table-top exercises.

Real-world EOC Activation: The training and exercises above proved their value when on December 23; we activated the EOC for the ice storm that impacted our region. Power outages also caused us to move our operation to our alternate EOC at the Sheriff's Department. The diligence our staff demonstrated by participating in previous training and exercises helped our operation to run efficiently.

Clinton County School Safety Workgroup: The tragic school shootings in Sandy Hook, CT and other recent violent events underscored the importance of continuing our collaborative school safety planning in our county. The Clinton County School Safety Workgroup was formed to develop planning guidelines to aid Clinton County schools and districts in creating effective response plans using the most current best practices available. The workgroup also serves to facilitate communication and collaboration between Clinton County school districts and stakeholders.

Clinton County SRT Search and Rescue Training: Eight volunteer members of the Clinton County Special Rescue Team (SRT) achieved the nationally-recognized SARTECH II designation. This required two full weekends (over 50 hours) of classroom and field training including an overnight exercise using improvised shelters. The team members then had to complete a day-long practical. Each of these individuals will be able to lead a search team which

has dramatically increased our capability to perform missing person Search and Rescue. Four SRT members also traveled to Grand Rapids for a weekend to obtain their Search and Rescue Manager Qualification.

Grant Projects: Several grant projects were completed this year that contributed significantly to our capabilities. Some of these projects included: Major upgrades for our primary and alternate Emergency Operations Centers and our Mobile Incident Command Post trailer. We continued to provide ICS300 training to our responders. We also continued to provide computer forensics/cyber security training to some of our Sheriff Department personnel. We provided tactical ballistic vests to all of the members of our Special Operations (SWAT) Team. Each police vehicle in Clinton County was also provided a ballistic plate carrier vest for police officers to improve officer safety during an Active Violence or School shooting event.

New and Increasing Challenges for 2014

2014 brings several new challenges and burdens for the Office of Emergency Management. Many of these are in response to changing legislation and lessons learned from disasters. In some cases these are very positive changes but they also will demand increased resources and effort on our part.

EMPG Work Agreement: To comply with Public Act 390 and to remain eligible for Emergency Management Performance Grant (EMPG) funding, our office is required to meet the requirements outlined in our annual EMPG Work Agreement. In addition to our regular load of requirements, the MSP has added several new requirements such as increased participation in school lockdown drills, more stringent reporting and meeting requirements for the SARA Title III Community Right to Know act among several other new reporting requirements.

SARA Title III: The fertilizer plant disaster in West, TX caused the State of Michigan to tighten the reporting and meeting requirements of the SARA Title III (Hazardous Materials) Community Right to Know act. We are can no longer combine our EOC Staff and Local Emergency Planning Committee (LEPC) committee meetings so we must now have a separate meetings, engage new community partners, and hold our meetings in accordance with open meeting act guidelines. We are also obligated to complete new comprehensive off-site emergency plans for 11 facilities with hazardous materials.

Hazard Mitigation Plan: One of the cornerstones of our Emergency Management program is the Clinton County Hazard Mitigation Plan. State law demands that our county have a current FEMA and State-approved plan in place. Federal law dictates that certain disaster aid funds are contingent on our having a current, approved plan. We are currently working with the Tri-County Planning Commission, Ingham and Eaton County, and Delta Township to complete our required update to the plan. This effort will require significant effort to gather data from several departments, update maps, hold public meetings, and write a very complex and comprehensive plan.

Standard of Care: The standard to which our county is held continues to grow on several fronts. Our growing population will require more capabilities and will demand more from our department and response partners. Our department will work hard to meet those new challenges.

CENTRAL RECORDS

Central Records has the responsibility to respond to all requests for Administrative Services for the public. They are directly responsible for registering and processing all visitors to the confined areas of the jail. **They respond to over 50,000 incoming calls to the Sheriff's Office,** respond to requests for information, process all criminal complaints, criminal histories for other agencies, compile information in the criminal records management system, fingerprint responsibilities for all Concealed Purchase License, pre-employment and firearm inspections. They provide information on a variety of subjects to the general public and perform a critical support service to the public and the Sheriff's Office.

With recent concerns over availability of firearms, especially handguns, changes in firearm laws, and a large gun retail business moving into Clinton County, Central Records has seen a significant increase in the amount of handguns registered and Concealed Pistol License Applications. In 2011 there were 526 and in 2012 there were 728 individuals fingerprinted for Concealed Pistol Licenses. For 2013 this number increased to 1,119 individuals printed and in addition to that there were 215 individuals fingerprinted for pre-employment purposes taking the total number of fingerprints taken to 1,334. This equates to an average of 6 set of fingerprints taken per day.

Also, in 2012 there were 3,791 firearms registered by our Office. This number has increased to 6,550 for 2013. With both fingerprints and firearms registered increasing, this has put an extraneous burden on Central Records to complete these tasks and also perform their day to day operations.

ANIMAL CONTROL

The Clinton County Animal Control consists of two full-time employees. Their responsibilities are investigating complaints of dogs and farm animals running at large, handling lost and found pets, investigating animal bites, and investigating animal welfare and neglect complaints. They are also responsible for monitoring and caring for the Clinton County Animal Shelter. In 2013 there were 5,159 dog licenses sold in Clinton County.

- 1,148 Complaints
- 424 Lost & Found Animals
- 107 Animal bites investigated
- 55 Citations (dog running at large or unlicensed dogs)
- 27 Kennels inspected and licensed

Listed below is the revenue for Animal Control:

- \$108,500 Dog License fees
- \$1,480 Kennel License fees
- \$6,121 Other Fees
- 581 Animals picked up

In addition to the above statistics, in 2013 a new Animal Control Shelter was built behind the Clinton County Sheriff's Office. This state of the art facility was approved by the Clinton County Board of Commissioners and was occupied in October 2013. This 4,694 square foot building houses 15 large dog kennels, 8 cat kennels, an isolation area for animals, a quarantine area for animals, a food prep area, a treatment room, a single car garage, and adequate office area for our two Animal Control Officers.

The old Clinton County Animal Control Shelter on Williams Road served the citizens of Clinton County for over 45 years and it is anticipated this facility will do the same.

2013 UNIFORM DIVISION

The Uniform Division is responsible for providing direct law enforcement services to all county residents. They have the primary responsibility to provide traffic enforcement on all secondary county roads, in conjunction with traffic enforcement on State highways and expressways.

In addition, they respond to all emergency calls for service, provide court security, serve civil process, transport prisoners, and conduct safety education programs, along with a variety of other enforcement responsibilities.

The deputy's continue to function as one of the most effective traffic enforcement units within the State of Michigan. During the past year, deputy's issued 10,904 traffic citations. They also arrested 219 drunk drivers, issued 182 seat belt violations and 177 subjects were arrested for possessing and selling narcotics. The Sheriff's Office Crash Investigation Team investigated 8 crashes, 7 fatal, 1 serious injury and assisted other agencies with 2 crashes. They also completed 22 crash data recording downloads. The Clinton County Sheriff road patrol ranks in the top five for all Sheriff's Department on a consistent basis for traffic enforcement. Over the past several years, one of our officers has been recognized as the top O.U.I.L. Enforcement Officer for Sheriff's Offices statewide.

Every Deputy has been trained in basic traffic accident investigation and we have three officers certified as traffic accident Re-constructionists. Additionally, the division has certified Laser Speed Measurement, Preliminary Breath Test, Firearm and Pressure Point Control Tactics Instruction. We have officers trained as Crime Scene Tech, Hostage Negotiators, Firearms Instructors, Laser Instructors, Defensive Tactics Instructors, PBT Instructors, CPR, A.E.D. Instructors, Taser, Pepper ball Instructors and Simunition Instructors.

The deputies continue to operate as single person cars, allowing us to maximize our Law Enforcement efforts. The assignment of a single officer to a vehicle on night shifts is very rare in law enforcement agencies today. We are very fortunate to have a staff of highly trained officers committed to public service and who perform their responsibilities in a highly effective manner.

DETECTIVE BUREAU

* The Detective Bureau Investigated 282 Complaints in 2013 and made 57 Arrests with many of the arrested persons having multiple charges and counts. Of the 282 complaints investigated 65 were Medical Examiner Death Investigations, 25 were Criminal Sexual Assault or Child Abuse cases, 50 were Cell Phone or Computers that were analyzed by Detectives assigned to work Computer Crimes. The remaining balance of complaints investigated included two Homicide investigations and multiple Property Crime and Fraud Investigations including Identity Theft. The Detective Bureau also provided investigative and technical assistance to several other Police agencies within Clinton County on major investigations within the jurisdictions.

* In an effort to stay current and committed to investigating internet crime complaints, and support other Police Agencies within Clinton County the Detective Bureau has upgraded computer and cell phone programs to better respond to an ever more sophisticated criminal element. These new programs include the Oxygen Forensic Suite 2013 Program that allows data to be retrieved from more and newer model cellular and GPS devices. To assure that these devices are properly used to their fullest potential Detectives continue to attend regularly scheduled training sessions and gain certifications to run the ever changing programs in both computer and cell phone devices.

2013 CASES OF NOTE:

* The Detective Bureau investigated a Homicide in Bingham Township where a 28 year old male from the Detroit area was shot inside a rental house where he and three other subjects were staying. Detectives believe the victim and another subject inside the residence were targeted by unknown suspects with a possible motive being robbery as Detectives located an Illegal Marijuana Grow operation inside the residence. The investigation remains open pending results of DNA evidence submitted to the Crime Laboratory.

* The Detective Bureau investigated a large scale Embezzlement case involving a local funeral home. The suspect in this case was an employee of the funeral home and embezzled in excess of \$250,000.00 from the funeral home. The suspect confessed he embezzled the money over a six year time span by selling pre- paid funeral arrangements. The suspect was arrested and sentenced to 4-20 years in prison.

* The Detective Bureau investigated multiple Home Invasion cases in 2013 where a number of firearms were stolen. Detectives were part of a multi-jurisdictional task force that resulted in the arrest of two subjects from Midland County and the recovery of numerous stolen firearms. Detectives were able to clear up several Home Invasion cases in Clinton County and assist numerous other police jurisdictions with information the suspects provided about their involvement in over 200 Home Invasions from Ohio to Michigan's Upper Peninsula.

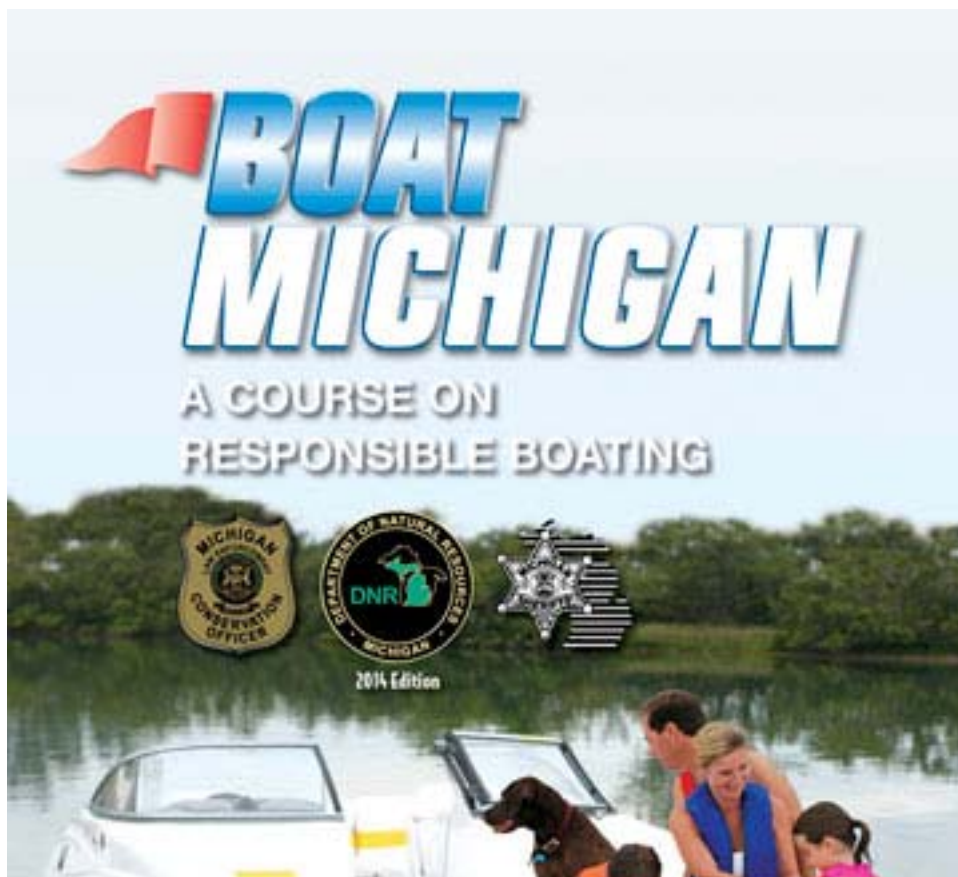
MARINE PATROL

The primary goals of the Marine Program is to provide boater safety for 12-16 year olds, conduct inspections of boat liveries, provide for enforcement of the Marine Safety Laws and to address the Sheriff's responsibility for the recovery of all drowned bodies as mandated by P.A. 139, 1947.

Funding for this program is through a grant from the Michigan Department of Natural Resources. Funding provides for a 75% match to provide for reimbursement for officer's wages, fringe benefits, and equipment needs, supplies and materials. Equipment for the program consists of a 14-ft. boat, trailer, and 25-hp motor and associated equipment.

Program responsibilities are assigned to a part time deputy. The deputy is a certified police officer also certified as a Boating Safety Instructor by the Michigan Department of Natural Resources. Duties for this program are conducted during the period between Memorial Day and Labor Day, with enforcement patrols concentrated on weekends and holidays.

- During the past year, 61 students were trained and certified in Boat Safety.



JAIL DIVISION

- During 2013 the Clinton County Jail booked in a total of 4,110 individuals. Of that number 3,617 were male and 493 were females
- The average daily count for the year was 86 locals and 125 boarders for a total of 211 averages per day.
- Approximately 234,878 meals were served from the kitchen
- The county jail continues to provide inmate programs to include: Religion, Substance Abuse, AA, Anger Management, Life Skills, Parenting Classes, and recreation. The jail has been able to maintain the same level of Mental Health Services through Community Mental Health.
- Both outside recreation yards were resurfaced so they could be better utilized for outside exercise for the inmates.
- The jail has had shower curtains installed in each cell to work toward becoming PREA (Prison Rape Elimination Act) compliant.
- The Automated Phone Information System was completed. It provides information to the inmate's family and friends on their charges, bond amount, visitation schedule, amount of money in their account, release date, etc. Inmates may also access the system.
